Absentee Voting To Start Monday

Absentee voting will begin Monday at City Hall in a special City Election that will select a mayor and four councilmen to replace recalled officials. Ballots for the absentee voting were assigned by the City Council at a special meeting at 5 p.m. Thursday.

The official ballot, delivered to Acting City Secretary Ginger Parker last Wednesday, lists Eris Ritchie, local business man, as the only candidate for mayor.

Each of the four council places to be filled has oppos-

ing candidates, as follows: Place One--Luke Harrison and Linton Batteas.

Place Two--Jay Maples and Brad Kimbrough.

Place Three--Loyal Lundstrom and Leonard (Tip) Tipton.

Place Four--Raymond Whitley, Nelda Fry and Bobby Odell Rains. They were assigned for absentee voting. Mrs. Parker was designated as absentee voting clerk, assisted by Mrs. Beth Prickett. Doug Fry was named by the City Council recently as judge of the election.

Historical Plan Report Is Given To CofC Group

Chamber of Commerce officials were given a report on Cisco's approval by a Texas Historical Society review board as a historical district at a meeting Thursday afternoon. John Muller, who attended a review board meeting in Port Aransas last weekend, appeared before the group.

As a result of the review board's approval, Cisco is expected to be designated as a historical district by the state organization and to be so listed in a federal registry.

"This can mean much to our community," Mr. Muller said, pointing out that the advantages include opportunities to become a tourist attraction. There are some tax advantages, too, he noted, as money paid out in restoration costs is deductible.

The young Ciscoan, winner of a Lyndon B. Johnson and Omar Burleson Congressional Internship in Washington for the month of June, will graduate with a degree in government at the University of Texas this month. His 3.95 grade point average, one of the highest at the school, was good enough for Hawari to qualify for Phi Beta Kappa. He will attend the UofT law school this fall.

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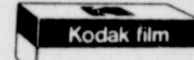
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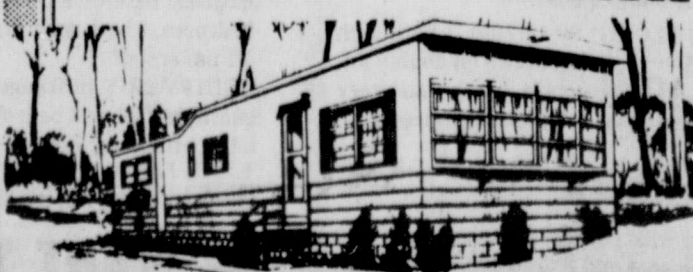

Beef Production Short Course For Farmers May 18-21

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held May 18-21 under the sponsorship of the Eastland High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. Ray Pruitt, Superintendent, and Mr. Charles Hutto and Fred Brown, Teachers of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the

Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Krehbiel has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B.S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, an M.S. degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph.D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic

Institute in 1966. His graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproduction performance of cow herds.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman and ranch manager in Oklahoma. He also served as beef cattle research assistant in Arkansas, and animal geneticists for the USDA at Miles City, Montana. For two years prior to joining the Agricultural Education Specialist Program, he served as Area Livestock Extension Agent in Ohio.

The short course at Eastland is scheduled to begin May 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Krehbiel will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Charles Hutto and Fred Brown.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Pruitt, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Hutto or Mr. Brown. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged.

Beef Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends all the training sessions.

Dr. Krehbiel states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed, and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesterday and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be



produced more efficiently in order to be a profit-making business. Dr. Krehbiel indicated that the beef production short course will deal with methods of producing beef at a lower cost and ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. The course will include such important topics as nutritional requirements, winter feeding, minerals, vitamins, feed additives, implants, facilities, equipment, selection of bulls and cows, animal identification including freeze branding, crossbreeding, feeder cattle grades, diseases, parasites, reproduction, market trends and management for efficient production. The course can be altered to meet the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers attending.

"Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This Cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to people engaged in agricultural production and agri-business."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef production, farm electric wiring and safety, arc welding, horticulture, tractor maintenance, pasture and oxy-acetylene welding.

Twins Fighting Leukemia Together

"It hurt, but I'd do it again," says Kristy, who has just given bone marrow for her twin sister Misty, who has myelogenous leukemia.

The intricate bone marrow transplant was done Monday at the Red Hutchens Cancer Research Center in Seattle, Wash., where the six-year-old twins, and their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Merlin Don Ratliff are staying for the treatment. Mr. Ratliff is a 1965 graduate of Eastland High School. He is the son of Mrs. Ted Rogers of Cisco, and brother of Mrs. H.V. O'Brien of Eastland.

Misty is reported to be responding normally to treatment following the transplant, which includes radiation and chemotherapy. Their two older sisters, Sherry and Angie are with them and assisting with their care, which will probably extend some 100 days at the hospital before the family is able to return to their home in Sacramento, Calif., where Ratliff is a Safeway Store

manager. The family considers itself blessed that there was an identical twin with matching marrow, without the dreaded Philadelphia chromosome that is present in Misty's system. Leukemia, which attacks the blood-forming tissues, is the most feared childhood disease, replacing polio in the minds of most parents. No other disease claims the lives of more children. Still, impressive strides have been made in recent years in the treatment and cure of this childhood killer.

The physician in San Francisco who diagnosed Misty's condition said that she is the youngest patient with this particular type. He is a Houston-trained specialist. 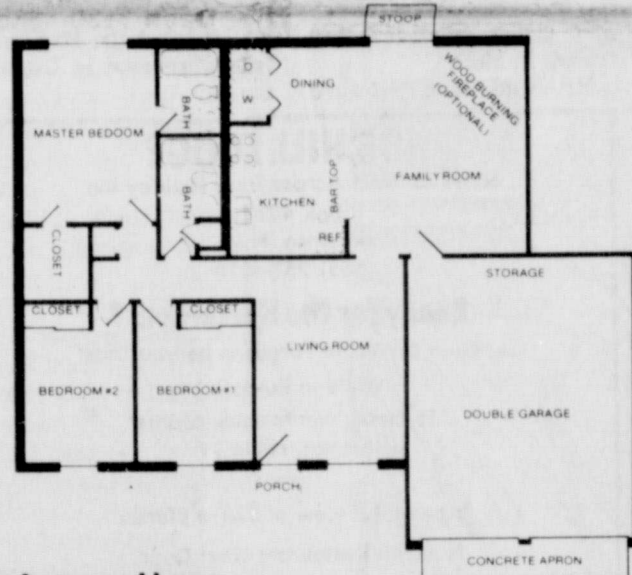

Dallas-Burgess Industries Incorporated today (May 1) reported a net loss of \$494,000, or 25 cents per share, on sales of \$12,213,000 for the second quarter ended March 31, 1981, compared with last year's net loss of \$152,000, or 8 cents per share, on sales of \$10,980,000. For the six months ended March 31, 1981, the net loss was \$1,059,000, or 55 cents per share, on sales of \$22,342,000 versus a net loss of \$101,000, or 5 cents per share, on roughly comparable sales during the same period last year. During the second quarter, however, there was a noticeable improvement in operations over the first quarter, particularly in raising the backlog of orders.

Donald L. Rogers, president, stated that unexpectedly poor results in the Burgess-Manning Process Equipment Division, continuing losses in the Power Equipment Division and a \$107,000 unrealized loss on foreign currency translation more than offset a sterling performance by the European Division. "Actually, the operating loss was less than last year (\$46,000 versus \$100,000) and considerably less than the first quarter (\$46,000 versus \$349,000). It should be remembered that last year's second quarter benefited from unusual gains on property sales and no income tax provision, whereas this year's quarter had no unusual gains, a significant income tax provision on European earnings and a larger loss on currency translation."

Mr. Rogers stated that there was some encouraging signs during the quarter. "European operations rebounded sharply from a dismal first quarter. Burgess-Manning Process Equipment's new orders set a record (almost \$4 million) and its backlog is approaching \$7 million. Power Equipment's market tempo picked up, albeit modestly, and so did Burgess-Manning Silencing Equipment's. Overall Company backlog increased by 13% during the quarter, including sizeable gains by Power Equipment as well as Process Equipment."

On the negative side, Mr. Rogers noted that the Burgess-Manning Silencing Equipment Division is involved in a disputed field problem with a customer on certain turbine silencing systems. As a result, the customer has delayed payment on a large current contract, while Burgess has expanded approximately \$1 million in materials and labor on work-in-process. No final resolution has yet been reached, and this has had a significant negative effect on Burgess' cash flow. A commercial resolution of the dispute is anticipated, but the dispute could result in litigation.

Mr. Rogers also stated that, in consideration of the lender's waiver of technical violations of certain covenants to the loan agreement, the terms of the Company's long-term loan from an institutional lender are being amended. This amendment provides for a more rapid repayment schedule, i.e., full amortization of the loan balance by the end of 1982 rather than by early 1987. "We plan to replace these long-term funds with a

combination of bank borrowings and earnings from operations over the next two years. As of March 31, 1981, \$2.6 million was owed under this agreement," he noted.

The near-term outlook for Burgess is optimistic, according to Mr. Rogers. "The second half should see greatly improved operations for Process Equipment in view of its growing backlog. Power Equipment is poised for a breakthrough, particularly if the general economy begins to turn up, and the European Division is forecasting a strong second half. We believe we have seen the worst and that the second half will bear this out."

Burgess Industries designs and manufactures a broad range of specialized industrial products and systems on an international scale, with particular emphasis on noise control, and distributes mechanical power transmission, fluid power and material handling components and systems. Burgess common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange.

Previously, stockholders approved an aggregate increase in the number of authorized shares to 15 million from 5 million and to reduce par value from 5 cents to 1.66 cents per common share.

Mid To Late June Likely Date For Legalizing Liquor Voting In Precinct One East Of Cisco

Voters in Precinct One (Eastland) will probably go to the polls in mid-to-late June to determine if alcoholic beverages will be legally sold.

The County Clerk's office will certify to the County Commissioner's Court Monday that the petitions asking such a vote did in fact contain the names of 390 certified petitioners. (Some 382 were deemed necessary to call the election.) County Clerk Joann Johnson has asked to be on the Monday's Commissioners Court Agenda for the purpose of certifying the signatures.

The petitions were turned in just before 5 p.m. on Wednesday, with a Thursday deadline. Some 422 names were listed on the petitions.

By law, the court "shall call" such an election if the required number of petitioners ask, within 30 days, so the voters probably will be going to the polls on a Saturday sometime in June.

Precinct One generally runs from the Stevens County line on the north, to the city limits of Carbon on the South, and from the West side of Lake Leon around Kokomo on the east side to just east of the Kendrick Amphitheater on the West.

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GORDON SPOT

Have you seen the large colorful caterpillars with a horn on the rear end? We have had some calls about this insect that is described similar to characters from a horror movie.

The large worms are the larva of the white-lined sphinx, which is a large brown moth with white stripes. The caterpillars are very colorful, ranging in colors from yellow and green to almost black. While they do

look very bad, they have not been causing any economic damage. They seem to prefer weeds rather than grass.

Weeds are a problem in backyard gardens just as they are in large fields of peanuts and cotton. They compete with your desirable plants for water, soil nutrients, sunlight and air. In some cases, they may harbor many different kinds of insects as well as

diseases.

What can you do about weeds in your garden? Believe it or not hand hoeing is probably still the best answer. It is inexpensive, quite selective, accurate, effective and, for some, even enjoyable. Some local gardeners feel a great deal of emotional satisfaction from leaning on a hole handle a viewing a clean row where weeds stood only minutes before. Remember, weeds should be relatively small when hoed or pulled from your garden since damage may occur to vegetables if weeds are allowed to get too big before being removed.

Another effective method of controlling garden weeds is to use a mulch. Mulching is one of the real keys to successful garden in this part of Texas. A mulch is simply defined as "any material spread on garden soil to protect plant roots from heat, cold or drought, reduce problem weeds and keep fruit clean." A mulch control weeds by keeping light away from seedlings and by providing a mechanical barrier to their emergence. Mulches work best against weeds and grass that come up from seed each year. Any weeds that do come through the mulch can be spotted easily and removed from the garden.

Good mulching materials in this area are compost, straw, leaves, hay, sawdust, wood shavings, bark, newspaper and plastic sheeting. Organic mulches are, by far, the most common but remember that they should not be applied too early in the spring. If you mulch a cold garden soil, it warms up slower, delaying the maturity of most vegetables. One benefit when using organic mulches is that at the end of the season, they can be turned under to improve the physical condition of your garden soil.

Black plastic film has been used as a garden mulch for a long time. It is probably the most popular synthetic material available. It will result in a warmer soil early in the season and will greatly reduce the weed population. However, if weeds are not a problem, it is an excellent mulching material. Several sheets of newspaper laid flat over the top of the garden row will also help control most weeds. However, like organic mulches, newspaper can cause delayed maturity of many garden vegetables such as tomatoes, peppers and squash if applied too early.

A third method which I feel has limited value for garden weed control is herbicides. While such chemicals work well in single crop situations, it is difficult to use them in a garden where a wide assortment of vegetables may oc-

cupy a fairly small space. I personally feel that herbicides are difficult to use in most garden situations and should not be used by the average home gardener in Eastland County.

If you have a relatively large garden, it is possible to use herbicides satisfactorily

by grouping vegetables for their tolerance to certain chemicals and diligently following all label precautions. However, your best bet for satisfactory weed control is to sharpen your trusty hoe and to practice the age-old and time-tested art of mulching.

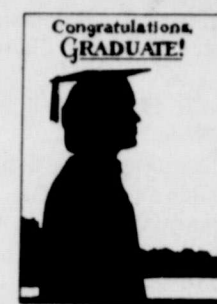

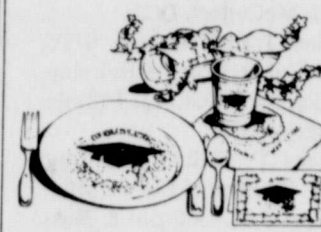
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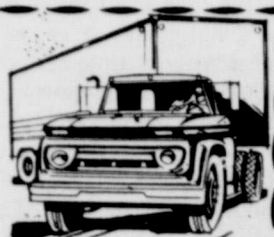

MAUDE BAILEY- Remarkable Mother

Mother's Day has a special meaning to the seven children of Maude Bailey and the late M.D. Bailey of Cisco, for their remarkable 91 yr. old Mother will be around to enjoy it. And this gentle, ageless person, who has been a homemaker, pioneer educator and Church worker, is looking forward to still another event soon. For the annual Bailey family reunion, held at Cisco, is scheduled for June. There, in addition to her children, she plans to visit with a number of her 21 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren.

All of the Bailey children are living away from Eastland County now except Judge Scott Bailey, who lives in Cisco. The children are: Melvin Davis Bailey, Jr. (a retired air force major) of Gilbert, Arizona, who works for a Sugar Refinery as an Operator. Julia Carolyn Bailey Bahler lives in Missouri, and is a homemaker. (Mrs. Davis has a degree as a teacher). Elizabeth Maude Bailey Edwards lives in San Antonio, and has been teaching for 22 years. One of the sons, Gayle Bailey, also lives in San Antonio. He spent 28 years in the Air Force as a Pilot, and retired as a Colonel. Now he is a stockbroker.

Dotty Bailey Adams lives in Denton, Texas, and is working on her PhD at North Texas State University. Kathleen Bailey Himmelsbach lives in Baker, Oregon, where she is Field Coordinator for the Eastern Oregon Community Development Council. And Scott Bailey, after serving in the Texas State Legislature became an Eastland County Judge. Judge Bailey is also a practicing Attorney.

This spring, as usual, Maude Bailey is caring for her home, raising a garden, serving as Assistant Teacher of the Woman's Class in the Church of Christ, visiting the sick, attending a number of Senior Citizen's activities,

and keeping in touch with her family. In 1980 she was Queen of the Senior Citizens for the year - a most rewarding experience.

"Not long ago," she chuckles, her blue-gray eyes catching glints of sunlight, "We were standing in line to pick up our meals at the Senior Center, and a younger person (who knew my age) asked if I wouldn't like to go to the head of the line, where I wouldn't have to stand so long."

"Well no thank you!" I told him. "I guess anyone who bends and stoops around, like I do, putting in a garden, can surely stand in line a little while!"

Born March 21, 1890, in the Long Branch Community south of Cisco, the life of Maude Bailey parallels much of the history of this area. Her Mother, Melinda Gann, was from a pioneer ranch family of Hamilton County. Her father, Edward (E.J.) Arnold, was born in Arkansas but raised by a sister in California after his parents died. After E.J. grew up he came to Texas, and one day during the 1870's he rode up to the Ike Gann ranch, six miles east of Hamilton, and asked for the ranch work for awhile - and obviously taking some time out to court Melinda - he and the Gann daughter were married.

By 1879 the young couple had two children and had also accumulated a herd of cattle. E.J. decided to drive the cows out to Mitchell County, where the land was unfenced and the grass was free. The only problem was a shortage of water and the fact that someone had to circle the herd constantly to hold it.

The family lived in a dugout near the settlement of Colorado City for about two years, then E.J. Arnold decided to move back where his children would have more chance for an educa-

tion. He settled at Coyote Peak, west of Rising Star, then bought land in the Long Branch Community. Maude was born in a log house - temporary quarters while the family was waiting to move into a new home near the Sabanno River.

The Arnold family had eleven children in all, and ten of them lived to be grown. The family also brought up one grandson.

Maude, although very young at the time, remembers the Cisco cyclone of 1893. Her father, like many ranchers who lived closely with nature, was an amateur weather forecaster.

"He knew a storm of some kind was coming," Mrs. Bailey remembers. "When he saw a funnel-shaped cloud near Cisco, he said, 'It's time to go to the cellar!'"

"We had to go to a neighbor's, for Father was digging ours, and it had no roof."

"When he found out what had happened in Cisco, he went over with a team to help bury the dead and remove debris."

Maude's Mother and Father were members of the

Church of Christ, with her Father serving as an Elder. Early memories include Church affairs and visits from other Church members.

Maude's father died in the year 1900, when she was only ten years old. E.J. Arnold had been a strong man - a cowboy - and he was prospering as a farmer and rancher. But, at age 49, he came down with some ailment the Doctors of that day called "Catrrah of the stomach".

Just before he died Maude and one of her sisters had been out working in the corn-patch, trying to help with the crops. Her father looked up from his bed and spoke. "Maude, it's just too hot for you girls to go and work."

Those were the last words she ever heard him say.

There was plenty of work after his death, for Maude's Mother and the girls and 4 yr. old boy stayed on the 321 acre home place and took care of things for several years. They continued to raise cattle, hogs, chickens, turkeys, corn and pecans. Grandfather Ike Gann, a wealthy man now, sent barrels of flour, bolts of cloth, and other supplies on the train up to Carbon.

A few years later Melinda Arnold rented her land out on the halves and moved into Rising Star, where the children could attend High School. Maude was in her Senior year when she took the mumps, so she dropped out and enrolled the next year at Hankins Normal College, at Gorman. After one

year there she took a State Teacher's Examination, and obtained her Certificate.

She accepted a teaching position at Mitchell, west of Cisco, then taught at Agee, in Hamilton County. During this time she joined the Church of Christ, and became a faithful worker.

With a desire to further her training, Maude Arnold enrolled in North Texas State, majoring in Home Economics. But during her Senior year two important things happened - World War I began, and she met a young man from Kentucky named Melvin Davis Bailey. Love prevailed over College, and she left school to marry. The wedding was in Ft. Worth, Texas, on May 30, 1917. Maude went with her husband to Kentucky, where they lived for nine years.

During those busy times

M.D. Bailey worked in the coal mines, Maude taught in a local school, and the couple had several children.

"All born at home," Maude comments. "None of my babies were ever born in a hospital."

In 1926 the family came to Eastland County, with Maude happy to be near her Mother and old friends again. M.D. worked in the area as a carpenter, helping build a Dormitory at the Cisco College. He bought an acreage at the edge of Cisco, and enlarged a three room house into a comfortable seven rooms.

This is the same home where Maude Bailey now lives, although the Interstate and its access roads have sliced off much of the acreage. She raised her children in this home, using her own mixture of love and

discipline. She also kept her Mother in the home for seven years, caring for her until her death.

And somehow - according to her family - she managed to inspire a love of education in them - something which has been of great benefit.

During the depression Maude Bailey taught Adult Education Classes on food, nutrition and clothing in the Cisco Public Schools. The Government sent her to a training class at Texas Tech during that time. She remembers the depression as a time "with almost no money, and the people who had money held onto it." M.D. Bailey, however, managed to keep busy. He did Oil Field pumping as well as carpenter work.

Another World War came, with Bailey sons in the Air Force. There were anxious times, but both came home safely. By the 1950's all the children grown, and all of them educated in various fields. Then, in 1964, M.D. Bailey died.

Since that time Maude Bailey has continued to be of help to her family and community. And now people are

wondering about her "secrets" for good health and a long and happy life.

"Trust and faith in God are the most important things," she says. "Nothing can take the place of that."

"But on the health part - I believe my early training in nutrition, and how to properly balance the diet, has had a great deal to do with how I feel. I think the right amount of protein, together with fruit and fruit juices, is very important."

There's nothing at all wrong with me now, other than a few vision problems. I never take any medicines.

"Another important thing - I believe that the majority of people are lovely persons. So I enjoy life and living."

She touches her hair, thick, iron-gray, with dark highlights.

"People wonder why it hasn't turned white! I tell them I don't know - it's about the shade it always has been."

She laughs, and I think how some people are noted just for the amount of years they have lived. But Maude Bailey is noted for the way she has lived every one of them

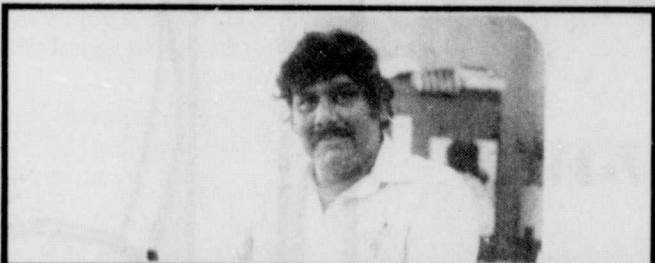
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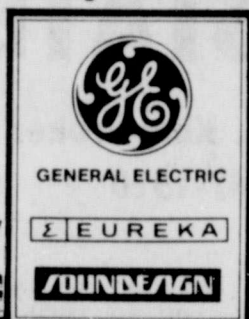
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Homemaker's Tips

Eastland County is beautiful with so many beautiful wild flowers. Also the flowers in town are brilliant in color. I have especially enjoyed seeing the roses. It seems to me that the flowers this year have been prettier than ever. If you would like to preserve some of this beauty - try drying some flowers. Flowers dried by the borax-cornmeal method can be beautifully preserved. Flowers that will respond to

this method include: zinnia, marigold, roses, hollyhock, peony, larkspur, carnation, daisy, and black-eyed Susan. Directions for the borax-cornmeal method are:
 1. Cut off all flower stems, and strip all foliage from the flower head.
 2. Insert a 6" length of No. 20 florist wire through the center at the head of the flower.
 3. Depending upon the thickness of the individual blossom, bend an 1/8" or a

1/4" of the wire tip backwards, then pull, letting this hook catch hold firmly in the flower head. The hook has now vanished and the remaining wire is the flower stem.
 4. Next, place "open faced" flowers such as zinnias and blackeyed susans face down. Thick-centered flowers such as roses and marigolds are placed up. Use a deep box filled with one inch layer of 1 part borax to one part of cornmeal. (If you wish you can purchase silica gel which works just as well as the one part of borax to one part of cornmeal mixture.)

5. The cornmeal-borax mixture is gently dribbled over the flowers so that their shape is not damaged. Be certain that blossoms are covered. The tightly closed box should be placed in a dry, warm, dark place. Drying time is about 3 weeks.
 Be sure to keep the borax-cornmeal mixture away from food preparation areas in the kitchen and label the mixture so that it will never be mistaken for cornmeal.
PRESSED FLOWERS - 1. Pick your flowers on a clear sunny day. Select specimen blooms and place between newspaper sheets, etc. in your encyclopedias or magazines that you can weight down with heavy objects.
 2. Some flowers dry quickly and will work better if all the moisture is not gone so you can push a curve in a branch or twist a root to help nature's beauty show on paper. Drying time is usually 5 days.
 3. Test for dryness by rubbing finger over the flowers. If they feel smooth, silky and release easily from the page they are ready.
 4. Now you are ready to frame, make pressed flower stationery, etc.

5. Remove the backing from a picture frame and pad it with suitable fabric. Black velvet is the classic background material, but your taste and imagination can come into play. Yellow velvet, for example, makes a most effective backing for purple pansies with green stems and leaves. The fabric is cut one inch beyond the perimeter of the cardboard and taped in place at the back. Now is the time to try to visualize your total collage of flowers.
 6. Work carefully for flowers are fragile. You may wish to use tweezers. Apply white glue to the back of flowers. A tooth pick works well to dab the glue on.
 7. Flip the glass and frame over the composition and the picture is ready. To hold the picture in place, very gently hammer small nails into the back edge of the frame against the cardboard backing.
 The result--something lovely for your home or a gift at little cost and lots of fun.

Tiny Texas Pecan Pies
 Crust: 1 stick oleo, 1 cup flour, 1 small pkg. cream cheese.
 Cream together, leave in refrigerator 30 minutes. Remove from refrigerator and take pieces of dough about the size of a large marble and press in very small muffin pans to form crust. Filling: 1 egg, 1 T. oleo, 1 tsp. vanilla, 3/4 cup brown sugar, 2/5 cup chopped pecans. Mix this and add to pie crust and bake at 325 degrees for 25 minutes.
