# Ambulance Service Proposals Studied

Proposals to provide the community with ambulance service after June 1st were heard by the City Council at a special meeting Monday night at City Hall. Action was delayed until the May 26th regular meeting. The Council heard from three groups interested in providing ambulance ser-

vice, including the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital of Cisco, Brown County Emergency Medical Service of Brownwood, and West Ambulance Service of Fort Worth. A Breckenridge concern called and indicated an interest in talking to the Council. The Fort Worth firm was the only one to provide any cost figures. They said they would provide one ambulance equipped for emergency service and driver for \$3,000 per month. A second, or backup ambulance, would cost the cost to \$4,600 per month. Tim Ward of the Brownwood firm said that communities there contribute to the cost of service on the basis of the number of electric meters in each town or area. He added that his firm would be pleased to work with or out of Graham hospital here. Councilmen expect concrete offers from the interested bidders for the service contract at the May 26th meeting. Brad Kimbrough of Kimbrough Funeral Home and Arno Chambers of Cisco Funeral Home were present and told the Council they would be unable to continue providing ambulance service beyond June 1st. In other action, the Council appointed Robert Blalock as a member of the city tax equalization to work with Garl Gorr and Ardythe Caldwell who had previously accepted appointment to the board. Present were Mayor Roy Cartee and Council Members Bobby Ingram, Ivan Webb, Louise Allison and Bill Eudy and Acting City Secretary Ginger Parker.

# Eight Burglary Cases Cleared Up With Arrest Of Two Youths

Eight burglary cases were cleared up Sunday with the arrest of two Cisco juvenile boys, Police Chief Bill Pence reported Monday. Statements were taken from the boys, and there was a possibility that two other youths would also be arrested in the case, the chief said. The juveniles admitted a

robbery at White Auto Store, the Little League concession stand, Bill Hill's Gulf storage building, the Rebekah Lodge, the College Rodeo storage house, the L.C. Hull place at 208 East 9th where a welding machine was taken, a residence where a gun was stolen, and a pickup truck that was looted.

Chief Pence said police recovered the stolen items. After arresting the youths, city police were assisted with taking statements from the boys by the Eastland County Sheriff's Department. Mr. Pence said police worked on the case 14 hours Sunday. The two boys, ages 13 and 14, were assigned to custody

of a local minister pending a hearing before District Judge Jim Wright at a date to be set by the 91st Court. They face charges of breaking and entering and theft of goods valued at \$2,000 or more. Chief Pence said they expect to pick up and question two other juveniles in the case.

# Scott Bailey To Be Speaker At Rotary Awards Luncheon

Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, will be the guest speaker for the annual Cisco Rotary Club Citizenship Awards luncheon to be held on Thursday, May 21, at the Colony Restaurant. The luncheon will honor Mike Keating and Gretchen Cermin, Cisco High graduating seniors who were chosen as the club's award recipients for good citizenship.

1966. "We know that our county judge is one of the most pro-good citizenship people to be found anywhere, and we're delighted that he can be with us," Mr. Ritchie said. Judge Bailey was born and reared and is a lifetime resident of Eastland County. He attended local public schools in Cisco and graduated from Cisco Junior College in 1951. After transferring to North Texas State College, he received a B.S. degree in Secondary Education with history and government as teaching fields. After college graduation, he entered the U.S. Army during the Korean conflict

and served with the 17th Infantry Regiment in Korea. After returning to the United States, he was employed by the Oil Well Supply Division of U.S. Steel Corporation. He resigned this employment to continue his education, and entered the University of Texas at Austin for graduate study. Judge Bailey was a high school teacher for three and one-half years before being elected to the 57th Session of the Texas Legislature in 1960, representing Eastland, Callahan, and Shackelford Counties. In 1962, Eastland County was redistricted to include Stephens and Palo Pinto Counties. Mr. Bailey was unsuccessful in his bid for re-election to the new district, but later in the year of 1962 he was nominated and elected to fill the vacancy of Eastland County Judge, which was created by the death of the late Judge John S. Hart. He has occupied that position since that time.

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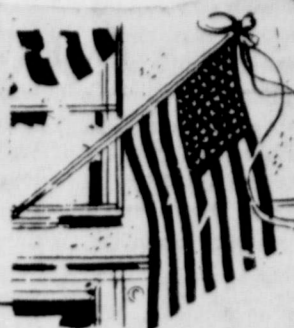

### ENERGY BRIEFS

Tips on saving fuel and money from experts at Mobil 1, a motor oil that saves gasoline.

It makes sense to invest in an automatic clock-driven thermostat with separate day and night settings. You should be comfortable at 65° F in the daytime and 50° F after bedtime. Remember, if your house needs 1,500 gallons of oil a year at 65° F, it will use about 1,700 gallons at 70° F. If you are chilly at these temperatures, you may need a humidifier. Moist air at 68° F and 35% humidity is as comfortable as 72° F air in a very dry house.

Make sure, also, that your heating unit is properly cleaned and maintained. The conversion of an obsolete oil burner to a modern "retention head" unit will conserve additional fuel.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and is rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to cities where it is levied.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — "I didn't fill out your card (the response card on my questionnaire) because you don't read them and only a computer will ever see it."

That was one of the letters triggered by my latest questionnaire. Contrary to the writer's assumption and similar comments attached to mail from constituents from time to time, I do read every letter that comes into my office. And every letter receives a personal reply. I have maintained, since first coming to Washington, that a voter who took the time and effort to let me know their views on any issue deserved the same attention from their Congressman. That is a policy that I don't intend to change.

Obviously, when material goes to over 200,000 postal patrons, however, it is more practical and economical to use computer technology to count the returning responses rather than tie up every member of my staff counting reply boxes. I simply cannot answer every questionnaire — unless specific comments are included — but I will report the consensus of the questionnaire to everyone through the press when the results are compiled.

Questionnaires are an important communications tool, reaching a large number of people that might not ordinarily think that their voice is heard and encouraging them to speak out. I realize that this approach is considered impersonal by some, but there is simply no other means to ques-

tion so many, so quickly. And the answers to those questions are so vital to me as each of these issues is dealt with in the House of Representatives.

Speaking of mail in general, people all over the United States seem to have taken pen in hand to let their Representative know their opinion, resulting in the largest backlog of mail delivery experienced by the House Postal Service in nine years.

Mail now being received in my office is around two weeks old and consequently my own response to that mail has been slowed considerably. I apologize for the delay, but this is an unusual situation. Normally, I receive 400-500 pieces of mail each day and right now I would estimate that the count has tripled.

I'm certainly not complaining. This great outpouring of opinion by the people has proven that Americans can no longer be called "apathetic" about the circumstances that touch their daily lives and are letting those who were elected to represent them know about it.

Constituent communications are the most important means a Congressman has of measuring the will of the people and, if anything, more and more individuals should be taking part in that process.

I would encourage everyone to keep on writing, but ask for patience. I'm answering those letters as quickly as I can during this busy legislative session.

# CAPITOL UPDATE

The recent death of General of the Army Omar Bradley marked the end of an era. He was the last of the great generals of World War II, a man who stood out among the ranks of many heroes.

On the occasion of his death, I was asked whether we will produce other heroes as great as he from today's military.

I pray daily that we will not have to, that we can maintain peace. That is the goal of our defense program -- to be strong enough that we don't have to go to war.

Neither the Soviet Union nor any other potential adversary will risk pushing us into an armed confrontation as long as they are convinced we are strong enough that their venture would be unsuccessful.

It is for that reason that I and others in Congress and in the Administration are working so hard to try to rebuild our national defense system. History has shown over and over again that he who does not prepare for war is most likely to have to fight one.

Yet, that is only part of the answer to the question I was asked. I do believe that in our armed services we find the stuff from which heroes are made. Those who work to keep the peace deserve as much respect and honor as those who win the battles when the peace is broken.

It is only fitting that we pay tribute to General Bradley and those others who have fought with valor. But we should also pay tribute to those who day-to-day, with little noise and, regrettably, sometimes less praise are our defensive bulwark.

The mechanic who keeps the planes in the air, and takes pride in his work.

The infantryman who drills and trains in the mud preparing for a mission everyone hopes he won't have to undertake.

The sailor, separated from his family for months at a time, who works a 60 or 70 hour week keeping his ship in working order.

When I visit our military bases, I find heroes everywhere, at all ranks. These fine men and women believe in what they are doing.

They are frustrated because they don't have the equipment they need, or the spare parts, or the fuel or ammunition for sufficient training exercises. They wonder if the American people understand their problems -- or their contributions. They read stories attacking the calibre of our military personnel, and they take personally these criticisms.

They are underpaid and overworked. But still they work, still they train, still they believe in their missions. That, to me, is true heroism.

After visiting with these fine Americans, I feel a renewed responsibility to make sure they have what they need to do their jobs. Man for man, we have the best military in the world. But we have not provided them with the wherewithal to do as good a job as they are capable of doing.

We have consistently failed to compensate them properly for the vital work they do.

They are doing their part. We must do ours.





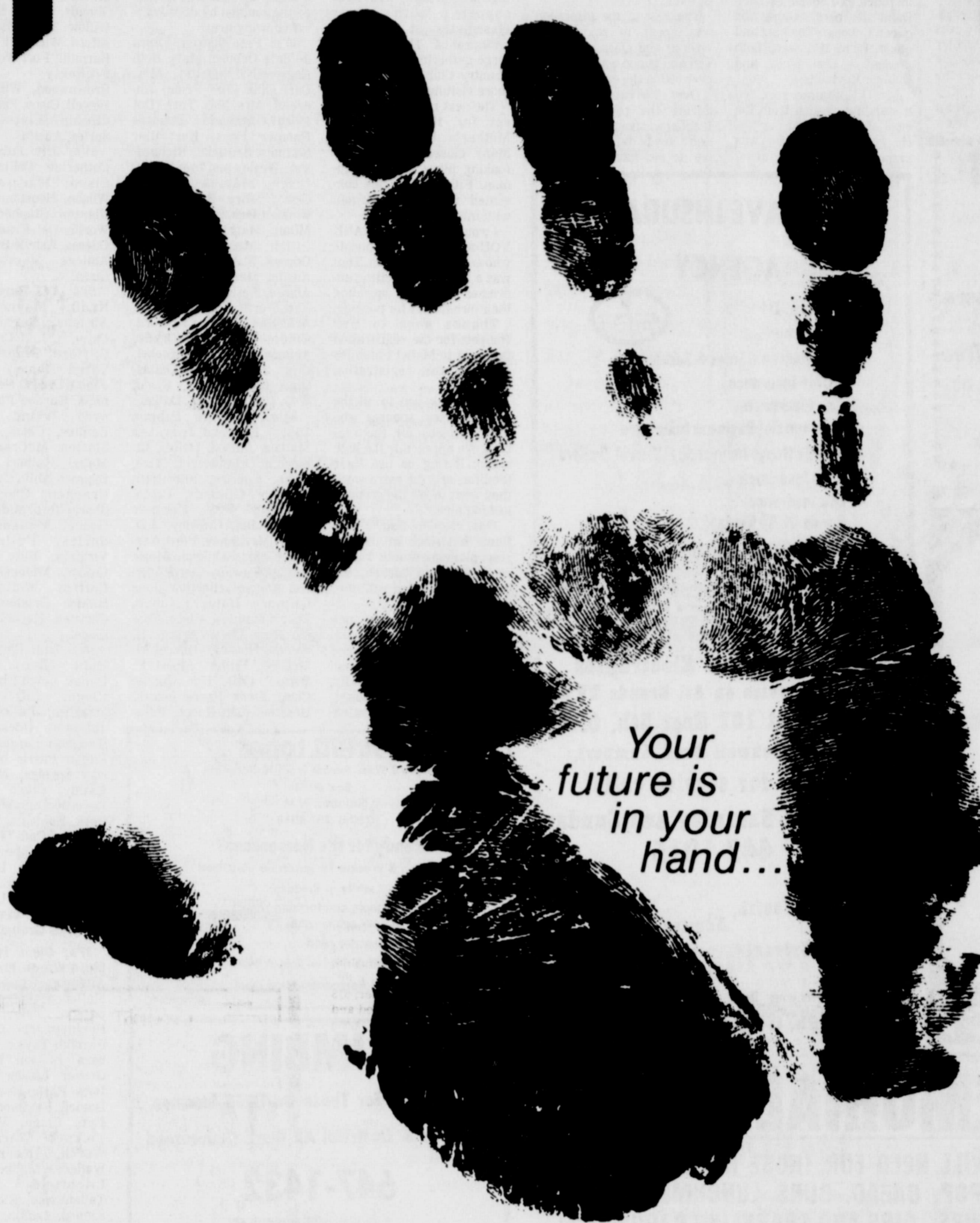

## Not All Insects Are Pests

Contrary to the beliefs of many people not all insects are harmful or pestiferous. Only about 3% of the approximately one million known insects are pests. Of those that are left about 7% are classified as beneficials, the rest are of no consequence to man.

However the 3% which are pests have given the entire class of animals a bad name. Everyone has had some experience with a Mosquito or Ant bite, a Cockroach scurrying across the kitchen floor, Fleas on their pet, or Tomato Horn Worm devouring their prize tomatoes.

It is because of these personal bad experiences or social conditioning that we often over react when we encounter any Insect in the yard or garden. Of course none of us want to share our Homes with any unwanted guests.

Nevertheless, it should be remembered that many insects perform valuable services for us all. Bees are involved in the tedious work of pollination of many fruit and vegetable crops. Many insects are involved in the breakdown of dead animals and plants.

Probably the most beneficial work done by insects is the control of other insect populations. Insects

which feed on other Insects fall into two classes: Parasites and Predators.

The Beneficial Parasitic Insects which live on or in other Insects are usually Flies or Wasps. These Flies or Wasps lay their eggs on or in soft bodied adults (such as Aphids) or Larvae (such as Leaf Feeding Caterpillars). After the eggs are hatch the Larvae of these Flies or Wasps feed on the Pest Insects.

The Beneficial Predator

Insects are probably better known. These Insects devour their prey. Some of the better known Beneficial Predators include Lady Beetles and their Larvae, Lace-Winged Fly or Aphid Lion, Praying Mantis, and Assassin Bugs. Many Spiders also fit into this category.

The moral of the story is you shouldn't always kill an Insect just because he's an Insect. You might be killing one that does Mankind a service. If you have any questions or have any insects which you would like identified, contact the county Extension Office.

## Soil Stewardship Week Held Nationwide

Soil Stewardship Week will be held nationwide this year May 24-31, according to W.D. "Bill" Brown, Director of the Upper Leon Soil & Water Conservation District.

Since 1965, Soil Stewardship Week has been recognized in millions of churches and school across the nation. It is designed to focus on the nation's natural resource problems and to consider ways to solve them.

"This country must, at whatever cost, maintain the capacity of the land to produce food and fiber," cites the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in its booklet for the 1981 observance. NACD

sponsors Soil Stewardship Week in cooperation with the nation's 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

"With our own population at 220 million and growing and with many regions of the world depending on the United States to supplement their food supply, the need to maintain our productive capacity becomes increasingly apparent," according to NACD.

This year's event focuses on "Society's Pressure Points" as its theme and covers such topics as soil and water conservation, urbanization, and loss of prime farmland.

of transplantation history. The count began when the team performed it first transplant in March, 1969.

Bone marrow transplants are performed primarily on leukemia and aplastic anemia patients. The Hutchinson Center team has performed more of these procedures than any other facility world-wide. Patients have come to Seattle from 46 states and 18 countries.

Heading the Center's bone marrow transplantation team is E. Donnal Thomas, M.D., who pioneered this form of therapy in the 1950's and '60's. Dr. Thomas performed the first human marrow transplant in Cooperstown, New York in 1956.

More than a dozen years of intensive research passed before enough progress had been made to warrant application of the procedure to humans suffering from leukemia and aplastic anemia.

Over the years, survival statistics have improved and Hutchinson Center scientists now show an overall success rate of 50-60 percent for leukemia patients and 75-80 percent for those with aplastic anemia.

The long years of research are beginning to pay off for people like Misty Ratliff. Her disease, chronic myelogenous leukemia, was diagnosed less than two months ago. Doctors here term her prognosis as excellent because she has an identical twin and her disease is being treated in an early stage.

Out of 12 identical twins with leukemia in which transplants have been made in the past four years, ten are still in remission.

Misty is the youngest person in whom a transplant has been made.

She is now in the third week of what was expected to be the most critical three-week period, when her own system will begin manufacturing healthy platelets as the result of the marrow transplant. Virtually all of her own platelets were destroyed by radiation prior to the transplant.
