National Listing Places No Requirements On A Property Owner

According to John Muller, president of the Cisco Historical Society, "being listed on the National Register of Historic Places is like having your cake and eating it too - there are a number of advantages and no disadvantages." Muller noted that "what a property owner can or cannot do with his property is not changed." The national listing "places no requirements on a property owner."

In the short run there are tax advantages which are available to persons restoring or rehabilitating income producing property in a historic district; guidelines are available and must be followed to take advantage of the benefit.

The Cisco Historical Society, however, is more optimistic about the long term advantages of being on the Register. The Society had three major reasons for working for the listing.

First, Cisco was built during the turn-of-the-century. While there have been some changes, the integrity of the architecture and the atmosphere is still early 20th century. Cisco to a large extent has lived on the energies and building of the turn-of-the-century citizens. These buildings and atmosphere are worth preserving.

Second, becoming and fully developing a historical

He and his staff devoted months of work in Cisco and Houston making the necessary architectural preparations.

The necessary \$25,000 came from many sources. The Rockwell Foundation, contacted by Dr. Norman Wallace of Cisco Junior College, donated \$5000. The Hilton Foundation, contacted by Dr. Petrini, donated \$5,000. The remaining \$15,000 was raised through contributions by many generous citizens and businesses. NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS OF HIGH TURBIDITY Dear Customer:

The City of Cisco during the month of April, 1981, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU)

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, or (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date. This notification of the public is in compliance with the Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act" as a means of keeping the public informed.

Homemaker's Tips

Planning nutritious, appetizing meals and snacks is a major responsibility for the homemaker. Meal planning and budgeting the family food dollar is more of a challenge than ever before. The average family spends one-fifth of their income on food. The limited income family will spend an average of 1/5 of their income on food.

Here are some ideas for you to use in developing a cost-saving plan for your family. Doing the best job of food buying starts before you walk into the supermarket; it begins with inventory, meal planning, and a "super shopping list."

TAKE INVENTORY
Take inventory of the food in your cabinets, refrigerator and freezer. This information helps you use food ads a bit later to plan meals on a weekly basis.

PLAN MEALS WEEKLY
Plan meals on a weekly basis. Involve family members in the plans. They can help with menu selection and in assuring variety. This "pre-planning" a week ahead helps you make use of seasonal best buys, specials and coupons - and that saves money. Planning menus on a weekly basis also helps cut down "impulse buying", and it answers the ever-present question, "What shall I fix for dinner?"

MAKE "SUPER SHOPPING LIST"
Once you've taken inventory and planned your meals, make a "super shopping list". This starts with a "running" grocery list. It is a list you keep in a handy place in the kitchen so you can jot down food items on it during the week as sup-

plies run low. Near your list, keep coupons and food ads - to keep the whole system efficient.

BUYING STEPS - Before you go to the store, organize your coupons and group your shopping list by areas of the store. This helps eliminate time and added steps. Eat before shopping. You will probably do less impulse buying if you aren't hungry. Follow your shopping list, but be flexible - so you can take advantage of unadvertised specials.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
This week's recipe is entitled yeast biscuits. They are very good and very economical to make.

Yeast Biscuits
2 tablespoons warm water
1 package dry yeast
6 cups flour
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon baking powder
1/2 cup oil
2 1/2 cups buttermilk

Combine warm water and yeast. Combine dry ingredients in a separate bowl. Mix dissolved yeast with oil and buttermilk mixture. Add flour mixture. Mix well. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and stow in refrigerator. Dough will keep for a week in refrigerator.

To Use: drop by tablespoons on ungreased cookie sheet at 425 degrees for 12-15 minutes. Yield 3 1/2 dozens.

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GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

The cool weather recently has delayed the development of the pecan nut casebearer. The first casebearer egg was found in Eastland County on May 20. This would indicate the best time to spray pecan trees will be May 26-30. Within a few days we will be better able to pinpoint the spray dates. Based on our observations at the time this column was written, our best guess is the dates given above.

The recommended insecticides for commercial pecan orchards include Zolone, Sevin, Guthion, Malathion or Torak P. The best insecticides for yard trees are Sevin, Malathion or Zolone.

Zinc should be added to the spray. Pecans require zinc for normal stem and leaf growth. Growing a good crop of pecans means good nitrogen management in combination with soil, water, zinc and weed management.

Pecan trees store a large percentage of the food they manufacture each year. As this stored food accumulates, the tree can then begin to bear relatively regular crops. So nitrogen needs to be applied every year and not just when a deficiency is seen. We recommend using nitrogen fertilizer such as 21-0-0 or 33-0-0.

Orchards which have been out of production but have adequate space and well-drained soil should receive a large initial application of nitrogen, such as 1,000 pounds of ammonium sulfate or ammonium nitrate per acre the first year. Standard rates of nitrogen for bearing pecan orchards are as follows: natives - 60 pounds per acre; upland orchards - 120 pounds per acre.

have their greatest water needs in March immediately before growth begins, in June as nuts begin to size, in late July as kernels begin to fill and in early September as kernels continue to develop. Severe droughts at these four periods can result in complete crop failure or serious crop loss. The last period can also result in a poor crop the following year.

Pecan roots can dry out and die if no rains occur from September to April. Therefore, a mid-winter irrigation may be needed to insure good tree health and regular production.

Loss Of Memory? Get It Back

COLLEGE STATION - Feeling you aren't quite as "sharp" lately?

Ah, just getting older," you say.

Millions of people think failing memory and aging are like the proverbial horse and carriage - "can't have one without the other."

Not true, says Judith L. Warren, a family life education specialist - aging.

Here are some factors that really do affect memory

- job satisfaction
- disappointments of all types
- family stresses
- security

FORGETTING - A SYMPTOM

Forgetting actually is a symptom of something else, Ms. Warren says.

Many people over age 50 begin experiencing losses in their world - some real, some imagined.

Failing memory often is a SYMPTOM of the person's feelings about these other losses, she says.

Once something, even a name, slips his mind, then

his anxiety about "all the losses lately" starts to grow, and this does affect mental alertness.

At that point, the person assumes his mind is "beginning to go," too.

"I'm getting senile" may be said jokingly, but this label is very disturbing to any older adult, the specialist emphasizes.

Ms. Warren is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

SENILITY - MUCH TREATABLE

Actually, senility has nothing to do with normal aging.

It is simply a word - perhaps the most dreaded for the aging person, and it is a word for many, many conditions with an equally large number of causes, Ms. Warren stresses.

Many of these conditions respond to treatment, she points out.

Furthermore, the vast majority of people who experience a failing memory

have a correctable problem.

'SAME OLD BRAIN'

Basically, everyone has the "same old" brain they had all of their adult life, Ms. Warren says.

Even though scientists do think the brain starts to lose cells after person reaches their 20's, recent research suggests the brain doesn't really change very much with age, IF there is a stimulating environment.

A SLIGHT 'SLOWDOWN'

There IS a seemingly slight "slowdown" in the brain's working capacity, however, the specialist explains.

"Think of it this way: it takes more time to process 60 years of information, for example, than it does to process 20 years of it," Ms. Warren says.

"Still, while it may take more time, the quality - or end result - is not decreased," she adds.

MEMORY 'LOSS'? CHECK IT OUT

If you think you're becoming "forgetful" or feel you

are losing your mental edge, take a close look at your life, the specialist advises.

Maybe it's time to say "no" to being on the sixth committee or that extra project.

Maybe just the simple realization that disappointment - personal or professional - happens to all of us will help," Ms. Warren stresses.

If that doesn't help, and your loss of memory continues, check with a doctor who does not dismiss complaints as "just old age," she says.

Ask about the following treatable disorder:

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE - this may be controlled by diet, exercise or drugs.

VITAMIN DEFICIENCIES - ask about B-vitamins, in particular Vitamin deficiencies often can be corrected by diet, or if that isn't possible, the doctor may prescribe vitamin supplements.

METABOLIC DISORDERS - such as low thyroid. Tests can indicate these.

HIGH BLOOD CHOLESTEROL LEVELS these may be corrected through diet.

DRUG-INDUCED MEMORY LOSS - Large doses of tranquilizers, sedatives and sleeping pills can cause memory loss. This may be corrected through reduced drug intake.

DEPRESSION - this may be treated with counseling

and medication. **CHRONIC INFECTION OF BRAIN TISSUE** - this is often treatable.

PREVENTION - A KEY

While you can't always foresee disappointments or family problems, you can become more realistic about what stresses are affecting your life, Ms. Warren says.

Change what you can and try to cope with the rest, she says.

"Be pro-active - try not to let potential problems build up, whether they're at the job or in a personal relationship."

Tanning- When Is It 'Sun Sensible'?

Tanning is a "national pastime," but when is it "sun sensible?" - and is it dangerous?

A tan can perk up looks and make a person appear healthier, but it can be overdone, too, says Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist.

There is increasing evidence that overdoing tanning causes skin cancer, and it is a fact that it dries out the skin.

Of course, sure and painful signs of too much sun are burned or peeling skin. And even if you don't have skin that burns easily, too much sun be damaging without you knowing it at the time, the specialist says.

Dr. Shirer is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M

"Beat the problem before it beats you into a depression," Ms. Warren adds.

"Keeping the mind and body active is one of the best ways to avoid problems associated with a brain disorder."

"Develop new interests, hobbies or careers."

"Become involved in community or neighborhood activities."

"Keep physically fit and eat properly."

"While the memory is a remarkable storage system, it must be used - to keep the files from getting rusty"

"Citizenship is a lifetime job," County Judge Scott Bailey told the Cisco Rotary Club, a large number of guests and two Cisco High School graduates honored Thursday noon at the club's 16th annual Citizenship Awards program. "Awards such as you have received here cannot be won by a late-comer effort. They must be worked for over the years - throughout your school career."

He was speaking directly to Gretchen Cermin and Mike Keating, the two graduates to whom Eris Ritchie, program chairman, had a few moments before presented engraved plaques, significant of honors for which they had been chosen by a faculty committee of the Cisco school. WTU Signs Agreement With Exxon Coal, USA

West Texas Utilities Company, a subsidiary of the Dallas-based Central and South West Corporation, has signed an agreement with Exxon Coal, USA, to meet future fuel needs.

The contract calls for the delivery, beginning in 1986 and continuing over a 20 year period, of 48 million tons of Wyoming coal to the Oklahoma Power Plant site in north central Texas. The Oklahoma project is being managed by West Texas Utilities which will own 350 megawatts of the unit's total capacity of 640 megawatts. Two other Central and South West System Subsidiaries, Central Power and Light Company, Corpus Christi, with 115 megawatts, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa, with 175 megawatts, are participants.

The fuel contract between West Texas Utilities and Exxon Coal is extendable for a 15 year period following completion of the initial 20 year delivery schedule.

Exxon will ship the coal from its Rawhide Mine near Gillette in Campbell County, Wyoming.

On May 8, 1981, West Texas Utilities, acting on behalf of its partners, filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for a certificate of convenience and necessity which will allow construction of the power generation station and related facilities to proceed. The plant is to be operational by December, 1986.

Estimated cost of construction of the 1900 acre site is \$675 million. The location is in Wilbarger County, southeast of Vernon, Texas, and near the community of Oklahoma.

...Lest We Forget Cemeteries in Eastland County

Cemeteries are interesting and revealing areas set apart for burial places of the dead. Here old family names and bits and pieces of history are exposed for those who have inquiring minds. Some graveyards are located at old church house sites, other are family plots located on the site of the old home place, and others are places set aside by city governments in the county to take care of all who choose to use them. This may not be a definitive list of burying places in Eastland County, but at least eighty places are identified by name and there is some information about date of origin and location of some of them.

The Alameda cemetery is located south of Ranger on F.M. 571, and originated in 1860. There is an Ames cemetery located at Ranger. Four and four-tenths miles east of Cisco on Baseline Road is located the Baseline Cemetery. Basham Cemetery is located 7.5 miles south of Carbon on Basham's place. Bear Springs Cemetery originated in 1884, 4 1/2 miles northeast of Carbon. Bedford Cemetery originated in 1897 and is

located north of Eastland. The Bollinger graveyard originated in 1881 and is located southwest of Staff on F.M. 2214. To find it, turn south 1 mile southwest of Lake Leon Bidge on a dirt road. In 1878 the Brewer burying place was located southwest of Ranger in an open pasture. The Brown cemetery is located southwest of Carbon about 1,000 feet from the west bank of the Sabanno River. The Bullock cemetery is located 3 1/2 miles north of Ranger.

The Carbon cemetery was established in 1871, and is located south east of Carbon. Center Point cemetery is located 6.7 miles from Carbon. Central cemetery is located 3.2 miles east of Cisco on Highway 80, and the colony cemetery is east of Morton Valley on F.M. 101. The Cook cemetery is located 9 miles north of Rising Star on Highway 36. Corinth cemetery was established in 1896, and is located north the Corinth Baptist Church west of Eastland off Highway 80. One of the first, if not the very first, graves is completely covered by large rocks in about the center of the graveyard. The annual homecoming and cemetery working is held in the Corinth Cemetery on the Satur-

day before the third Sunday in May each year. The Coyote Peak cemetery is located 4 miles west of Rising Star, the Crossroad Cemetery was established in 1907 seven miles south of Ranger on F.M. 571, and the Curtis cemetery is located 1.5 miles east of Sabanno Church, then north 1.5 miles across Sabanno Creek.

The Dabney cemetery is located 1 1/2 miles west of Desdemona, toward Lake Leon, there is also the Davidson and the Desdemona cemeteries in the same general area. The Dothan cemetery is located west of Cisco on the old Abilene Highway, then north 3/4 mile on the road to Moran. The Downtain Place cemetery was established east of Eastland on January 16, 1877. The Eastland cemetery was located in Eastland October 16, 1877. The Ellison Springs cemetery is located east of Gorman, and southwest of Gorman is the Elm cemetery. Another Elm Cemetery is located 1.5 miles east of Okra on F.M. 1027, and has been there since 1895. The Evergreen cemetery is located at Ranger.

In 1899 the Flatwood cemetery was located 6 miles south of Eastland Highway 6, then one mile east on F.M. 2563. The Freedom cemetery is unidentified as to date of origin or location of site. The Gorman cemetery is located at Gorman, and the Gregg Cemetery was originated in 1883, south east of Eastland on F.M. 570. The Haskell cemetery is situated 11 miles north of Pioneer on F.M. 569. There is a Hittson cemetery; the Howard cemetery was located north of Desdemona

on Highway 16 in 1828. Jewel cemetery is located six miles southeast of Carbon, while the Jordan cemetery is located on the Jordan Ranch 2.8 miles south of Carbon. Kokomo cemetery is located near Kokomo, and the Lane cemetery was established in 1879. Latham Cemetery was begun on September 26, 1879, on the Yellow Mound-Red Gap road. There is a Lem Switch cemetery in the county, and the Liberty Hill cemetery is located 3 1/2 miles north of Pioneer on F.M. 569. There are also these three cemeteries Long Branch, Lutheran (Mossman), and Mangum. The McBroom burying place was set up in 1900 1.5 miles south of Jewel Cemetery. McGough Springs cemetery is still identifiable, and Merriman Cemetery is located southwest of Ranger. This is the cemetery that was near the Merriman Baptist Church, and the church refused a \$100,000 oil lease offer during the Ranger oil boom, because of their respect for the dead. This has given rise to the nickname of Merriman as The Hundred Thousand Dollar Cemetery. Merriman pioneers still rest in peace in the tree shaded cemetery, because the people cared.

The Mitchell cemetery originated in 1879, and the Monroe cemetery was started in 1890. The Moran cemetery was established in 1882 three miles northeast of Nimrod on F.M. Road 1131.

There are also cemeteries located at Moss and at Mountain Top. The Murray Memorial originated December 14, 1937, and is located 1.3 miles east of Carbon on Highway 36. Nimrod Cemetery was established in

1885. The Oakland cemetery is located southwest of Gorman toward Duster. The Oakwood cemetery is located in Cisco. The Old Providence cemetery is located on the north shore of Lake Leon and is accessible now only by boat. However, when this cemetery was established on October 3, 1876, it was beside the Providence Baptist Church about six miles east of Eastland. This church is said to be the second church organized in the county. The minister officiating was W.C. (Uncle Bill) Brashears of Parker County who spent much of his time in Eastland County looking after his ranching interests. Participating in the organization of the church were W.C. McGough and his wife Purline, H.F. and Sallie Brashears, and Caldwell and Martha Brashears. Soon others joined, and Providence was the largest Baptist church in Eastland County at the time of the organization of the Red Gap Association in 1877, and for some years thereafter. The Owens cemetery originated on October 31, 1887, and is located north west of Eastland in an open pasture.

There is an old cemetery near Ranger called the Pioneer cemetery, and there is another Pioneer cemetery located eight miles west of Rising Star on Highway 36. The Pisgah Cemetery was originated March 26, 1835, and the Pleasant Grove cemetery is located two miles east of Morton Valley since it was started in 1910. The Pleasant Hill cemetery originated in 1893 and is located seven miles north west of Carbon on F.M. 2516. Pleasant Valley cemetery started in 1879, while the Rising Star cemetery is located 1/2 mile north of Rising Star on Highway 36. The Romney cemetery is located eleven miles north of Rising Star on Highway 183.

The Sabanno cemetery is located 7 1/2 miles north of

Pioneer at the intersection of F.M. 206 and F.M. 569. The Salt Tank cemetery is located five miles west of Rising Star on Highway 36. Scranton cemetery has many graves of Civil War veterans. There are cemeteries at Simpson, Sipe Springs, and Smith which is located west of Eastland on the old Dick Smith place. There is a cemetery at Staff, and the Sutton cemetery was opened on May 26, 1915, 8.5 miles southeast of Carbon on the Sutton farm. The Tipton cemetery is three miles southwest of Pioneer. Other cemeteries in the county are Tudor, Union, Wayside, three miles west of Rising Star, and Weaver which is located south of Gorman.

IWU Reflections in Perspective By: I. C. Will Usery

The Bedouin Arab of the desert was described as being straightforward, generous and kind. That is not to say that he cannot nor will not be otherwise. The Arab, from desert nomad to highly placed businessman can be as devious as he is generally suspected to be by most Westerners.

The Arab responds in kind to the treatment with which he is faced, either socially or in business dealings. He responds to honesty and firmness in the sense that he appears to feel honour bound to match honesty with honesty. It is only when one attempts to play underhandedly that his capacity for deviation rises to the surface. When one attempts to outsmart the Arab with trickery in a business deal he is playing a game which the Arab originated. Once the Arab has given his word, he will stick to it, whether the end result is profitable or not. As was mentioned, he considers his word to be his sacred bond.

And while he is generous to his friends, he can be brutally cold-hearted. Along the desert track which ran between Jebel Dhanna and the Oil Company's base at Tarif, we spied two "Bedus". There was no way of knowing just how they had got there. There was not a camel in sight (and the nearest sand dune behind which they could have been hidden was at least five miles away across the "sabka" flat), nor was any other form of transportation in sight. They were just standing there, impassively enduring the scorching rays of the sun.

I instructed my driver to stop, which he did but only after having gone some fifty yards past the two men. Returning to the Land Rover, he started the engine and put the machine in gear with... "They only want water. I tell them Sahib only drink beer". There I sat, with two gallons of ice water between my feet and five gallons of extra water in a can in the back. Only after I'd threatened to throw him out of the Rover did Abdullah turn around and return to give the thirsty Bedus a drink. And we didn't have a can of beer in sight...nor out of sight either, for that matter. Abdullah felt only one responsibility, in his simplistic philosophy. He was to take care of his Sahib; nothing else. Even his fellow tribesmen took second place to his performance of that responsibility. So; even with his simplicity the Arab can be somewhat baffling. Perhaps it is that we live in too complex a society.

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


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
