CJC Band & Belles Receive 4th Invitation To Macy's Parade

College To Sponsor Tour To Accompany Group On Thanksgiving Week

The Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles, who have appeared in three Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parades in New York, have received an unprecedented fourth invitation for the famous nationally-telecast Thanksgiving Day event, according to an announcement by CJC officials today.

At the same time, the college revealed that it would sponsor a four-day, three-night tour to New York in cooperation with American Airlines, which will allow some 200 extra persons to accompany the performing group on their trip. A similar tour was held in 1977 when the band and Belles made their third appearance in the parade.

Tim Jones is director of the Wrangler Band and Pat Owens is the director of the Belles. Both groups are expected to have approximately fifty members next year, the directors said.

Eris Ritchie, former CJC official who handled arrangements for the three previous Macy's appearances, will again be responsible for the mechanics of the tour. Mr. Ritchie has been doing promotional work in seeking the invitation for the groups ever since the 1977 appearance, and has agreed to line up all of the travel, hotel, sightseeing, and entertainment again this year, a CJC spokesman said.

Band Director Tim Jones will handle the business arrangements for the tour, and will receive reservations, deposits and payments.

The official letter of invitation, received by Mr. Ritchie recently, came from Mark Schonberg, Operations Supervisor for Special Productions at Macy's-New York. It read, in part, "It gives me great pleasure to extend this invitation to the Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles to participate and represent the state of Texas in Macy's 1981 Thanksgiving Day Parade."

In revealing particulars concerning the CJC-sponsored tour, Mr. Ritchie stated, "We will have an absolutely fantastic travel bargain for anyone interested in going to New York. We will have a trip that will include a dozen or more features, some of which are: all air and

ground transportation, three nights' hotel lodging, a sight-seeing tour, Thanksgiving Dinner and show, a show at Radio City Music Hall—and more. The really great thing about this is that we'll include all of the features for \$50.00 less than the price of a round-trip plane ticket from D/FW Airport to New York. A current price for this ticket is \$484.00. The price for our complete package is \$434.00 per person, based on double occupancy."

The sight-seeing tour will go through lower Manhattan, take a ferry boat to the Statue of Liberty, and include a guided tour of the United Nations. A separate tour will go backstage at the famous Radio City Music Hall. The group will also see the multimedia production of "The New York Experience" in Rockefeller Center, and will enjoy a Thanksgiving Dinner and floor show at a well-known restaurant-club, the Riverboat, in the Empire State Building. They will also go to the observation deck of the Empire State Building for a view of the city at nighttime. Mr. Ritchie said that the group will also likely take at least one ride on New York's 'infamous' subway, and would see the lights of Times Square.

The students and tour group will be housed at the Southgate Tower Hotel, across the street from Madison Square Garden at Seventh Avenue at 31st Street. One unusual feature of this particular hotel is that each room has a kitchenette, Mr. Ritchie said. The hotel is also very convenient to Macy's and the television rehearsals and parade viewing, he pointed out.

Dr. Wallace Talks At Cemetery Event

The pioneer spirit is still strong enough in the people of the United States for that nation to survive in the face of all threats to security, Dr. Norman Wallace, president of Cisco Junior College, told a Memorial Day audience at Oakwood Cemetery in a program talk Monday morning.

Dr. Wallace cited three principle sources of strength that have sustained the American people as the nation has matured and progressed over the years.

"Our belief in God and our religious heritage, our high regard for family, and our dedication to the freedom to work form the basic foundation strength of our nation," Dr. Wallace said.

The speaker noted that "the many thousands of young men who gave their lives that our nation might endure did not die in vain for we as a people care too much for our freedoms to abandon the causes for which they stood and died."

The program opened with a welcome talk by Brad Kimbrough, commander of the John William Butts Post 123 of the American legion sponsors of the annual cemetery program of Memorial Day. Some 100 students of Intermediate School, directed by Mrs. Davene Jeffcoat, sang several patriotic songs. The Rev. Jim Pingleton, pastor of First Christian Church, gave the invocation.

The program was concluded with Bugler Ben Hubert, youth leader at the First Christian Church, playing

"Taps" on a trumpet, and the benediction by Jim Reeves, Church of Christ minister.

At the conclusion of the program, the American Legion provided miniature flags for use in decorating the graves of deceased military veterans.

The 1980-81 school year will end with Commencement Exercises at 8 p.m. Friday at Harrell Fine Arts Building at Cisco Junior College. Presentation of diplomas to the fifty members of the 1981 graduating class of Cisco High School will be the program feature.

Voters To Fill Vacant Council Seats In Saturday's Election

A mayor and four council members will be elected when voters of the City of Cisco go to the polls Saturday, May 30, in a special election to fill vacancies caused by an April 4th recall election. Approximately

1,000 votes are expected to be cast.

Voting will be at the Laguna Hotel in the hall adjacent to the Corral Room. A previous commitment prevented use of the Corral Room for voting as has been

the case for several years.

The polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. with Douglas Fry, local rancher and a former Cisco mayor, as election judge. Carl Gorr was named as alternate judge and some six clerks will be on hand to help with the election.

Absentee voting ended at 5 p.m. Tuesday, and a light turnout was indicated as only 22 votes had been cast by 9 a.m. Tuesday.

Eris Ritchie, local business man and former member of the staffs at Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College, is unopposed for the office of mayor.

Two or more names are on the ballot for each of the four Council places that will be

filled. Places one and two will be for two years and places three and four for one year. Candidates for the various places are listed on the ballot as follows:

Place One—Linton Batteas and Luke Harrison. Mr. Batteas is a local contractor and cabinet shop owner. Mr. Harrison is employed by an oil company here.

Place Two—Brad Kimbrough and Jay Maples. Mr. Kimbrough is the owner of a local funeral home, and Mr. Maples is employed by a rubber products manufacturing company.

Place Three—Leonard (Tip) Tipton and Loyal Lundstrom. Mr. Tipton is a retired military veteran employed by a steel products manufacturing company, and Mr. Lundstrom owns a motel and monument works.

Place Four—Raymond Whitley, Nelda Fry and Bobby Odell Rains. Mr. Whitley owns an automobile paint and body shop. Mrs. Fry is a cosmetology student at Cisco Junior College, and Mr. Rains is employed by an oil company.

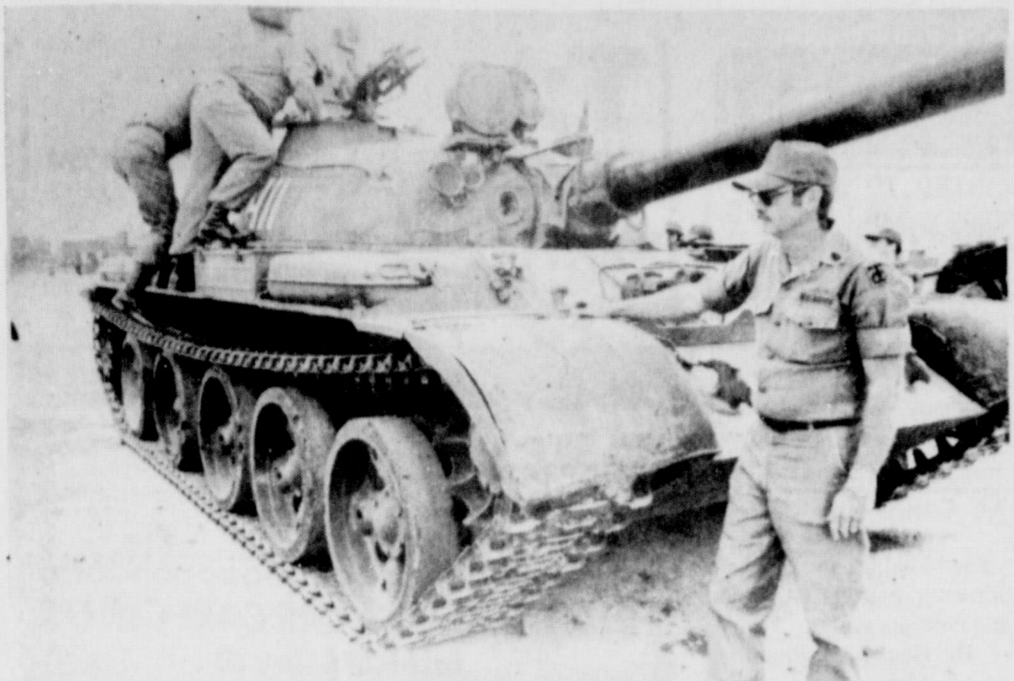

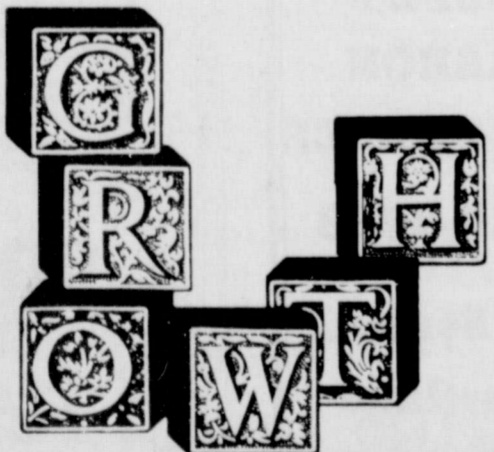

IWU Reflections in Perspective

In a society where illiteracy is the rule rather than the exception, one discovers various means of communication. The transistor radio has become almost a necessity in many parts of the world. But that item only keeps the nomad of the desert in touch with what is going on outside his sphere, it cannot bring word from his friends and loved ones. Not infrequently the Bedouin goes for months without "word from home". Of course, in many instances that presents no problem as he has all his immediate family with him. Same is true of the nomadic tribes of Iran who spend months on end far from the centers of population...but rarely more than a stop or two from his battery-powered portable radio.

And history is recorded only "in the memory of man". Passed down from speaking mouth to listening ear for generations, it is amazing to note the accuracy with which it is kept alive. Sitting in the sand under the flag of a mohair tent during a night in the desert and in such quiet that one can hardly believe he is really alive, and with the stars so bright and apparently so close that they could be touched from the top of a towering dune; the handed-down history to which one can listen as his host relates the story of his fathers is a study in accuracy of memory.

I have heard the story of "Abu Ibrahim" (Father Abraham) and his trek from lower Iraq to the southwestern corner of Turkey, thence down and along the toe of the mountain range which separates the semi-desert from the Mediterranean. Told in a low but firm tone of voice by an Arab who has never read a single paragraph from the Bible; I was nothing short of amazed by his accuracy with which the spoken tale paralleled that which we've studied from the Book of Genesis.

Likewise the story of the Exodus of the "Children of Moses" (they are not known as "Hebrews" to the Arab, as they are ethnic brothers). For almost half the night one sits in the sand and listens, punctuating the tale now and then with a tiny cup of very sweet tea or with a cup of cardamom-flavored coffee. The raconteur carries his listener through the tribulations of the trek to the shallow water and marshes at the upper end of the Red Sea, across the Sea "between the waters which were parted by Allah" and through the wilderness of the Sinai. The biblical story takes on a renewed meaning as it is told by a direct descendant of those who escaped the Egyptians to begin a new life...with a new generation...in The Promised Land.

As for news of current events and places nearer at hand in time, the "Darwish", or what is generally considered to be the legendary "Whirling Dervish" serves a very useful purpose. Taking his position within a circle of his friends (and among many people he has never seen before) the Darish tells the tales of his travels. Gesticulating wildly, and at point in his tale working himself almost into a frenzy of enthusiasm, he does in fact whirl, dance and wave his hands as he describes the wonders of the faraway places he has

visited. At the close of his story, coins are tossed at his feet by those of his audience who consider the tale worth the price. He has been rewarded. Some of them develop a certain degree of fame as story-tellers and are sought after by those who want to learn of the vast world beyond the mountains.

And then there are the scribes. These worthies, professional writers of letters (for a fee) can be found near almost any local post office. In Teheran, through the General Post office of which all mail, both domestic and foreign passes, at least a dozen and during special feast day and holiday seasons many more are stationed along the side walk near the post office. Sitting crosslegged beside a box or crate which serves as a desk, they write letters for the illiterate to their families...usually equally unshooled.

On the tiny island of Das in the Persian Gulf, the "Coolie Camp" had its own scribe. On the payroll of the Oil Company, it was his duty to write letters for the workers to their loved ones. A story was told of one Arab coolie who had received a letter from his wife. Taking it to the scribe, he commanded that it be read to him. But only after the scribe had stuffed cotton in his ears to prevent his hearing what the beloved wife had to say in the letter.

Now Is Time To Spray Pecan Trees

The end of this week and the first of next week will be the time to spray pecan trees to control the pecan nut casebearer according to County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon.

The adult casebearers which are small moths have been depositing eggs on the small nuts during the past

week. These eggs will be hatching by the end of the week, May 28-30.

Gordon says the spray should be applied after most of the eggs have hatched and before the small worms enter the pecans. This period of time in Eastland County will be May 29 - June 2.

Proper timing through coverage of spray on the trees and recommended insecticides are all important in the control of this pest.

The best insecticides for yard trees include Sevin, Malathion and Zolone. Commercial producers may use Zolone, Sevin, Guthion, Malathion or Torak P. Malathion gives a quick kill, but the residual lasts for only a day or two. Both Zolone and Sevin will leave a residual for about one week. Gordon warns producers and homeowners to read the labels and follow directions on the insecticide containers.

The county agent reports that the casebearer development varies from one part of the county to the next and even from one orchard to the next. Therefore, it is important that every producer examine his own trees to determine the best time to spray in his orchard.

Commodity Programs Do No Require A Producer

None of the 1981 commodity programs will require a producer to set aside cropland or to plant within a farm normal crop acreage to qualify the producer for program benefits.

Target prices that are used to determine if deficiency payments will be needed have been increased for 1981. Wheat (bushel) 1981 \$3.81; 1980 \$3.63.

Corn (bushel) 1981 \$2.40; 1980 \$2.35
Sorghum (bushel) 1981 \$2.55; 1980 \$2.50
Upland Cotton (lb.) 1981 .7087; 1980 .584.

Loan rates have also been increased for the 1981 program.

Wheat (bushel) 1981 \$3.20; 1980 \$3.00.
Corn (bushel) 1981 \$2.40; 1980 \$2.25.

Sorghum (bushel) 1981 \$2.28; 1980 \$2.14.

Upland Cotton (lb.) 1981 .5246; 1980 .48.

Program benefits include prevented planting protection, low yield protection, deficiency payments, loans and purchases.

An accurate report of planted acreage must be filed to be eligible for any of these program benefits.

FINAL PLANTING DATES
The final planting date for program purposes for corn and cotton is MAY 31 and

grain sorghum is JUNE 20, 1981.

PREVENTED PLANTING
An application for prevented planting must be filed within 5 days after the applicable final planting date to be eligible for disaster consideration.

PEANUT PLANTING REQUIREMENTS
SOME REMINDERS ARE—A farm must plant 62.9% of the effective allotment to be eligible to carry forward any undermarketing of quota peanuts.

A farm must plant 47.18% of the effective allotment to be eligible to transfer quota from the farm at harvest time.

TRANSFER OF PEANUT ACREAGE/QUOTA
Transfer of peanut acreage and quota may be made through June 15, 1981. This office maintains a list of those interested in transferring to or from the farm. Transfers must be signed by all persons by the final date.

CONTRACTS FOR ADDITIONAL PEANUTS
The Form CCC-1005 to be used for contracting additional peanuts must be signed by the producer, operator (if different from the producer) and handler by June 15, 1981.

The signed contract must be filed with the county office by June 15, 1981.

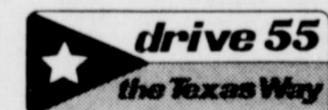

Texas Cattle Industry Begins Program

On July 1, 1981, the Texas cattle industry will implement a voluntary 25-cent-per-head beef promotion investment program.

Under the new system, 25 cents will be collected on cattle and calves sold through participating markets, packers, dealers and order buyers. The funds will be remitted entirely to the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board for use in national programs of research, education and promotion.

Endorsed recently by five Texas organizations, the investment plan is designed to generate additional funding

needed for aggressive beef market development.

The organizations initiating the 25-cent investment are the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assn., Texas Cattle Feeders Assn., Texas Farm Bureau, the Independent Cattlemen's Assn. and the Livestock Marketing Assn. of Texas.

At a meeting May 6 in Irving, Tex., these groups agreed to put the investment program in motion and also to form a beef promotion coordinating committee which will oversee the implementation of the entire effort.

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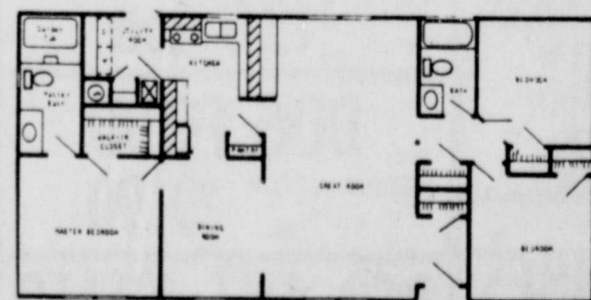

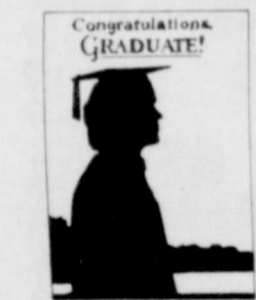

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Achieve The Six Flags Look With Landscaping

From early March to late November, visitors to Six Flags Over Texas are delighted by its flowered pathways, hanging greenery and lush lawns. Envious green thumbs admire the landscaping which is as innovative as the rides and shows at the Sun Belt's No. 1 entertainment attractions.

For homeowners trying to achieve that special "Six Flags Look" in their own backyards, creative design, seasonal planting and year-round maintenance is essential according to Richard Warner, Six Flags landscape manager.

Warner holds a degree in park administration and is a state licensed landscape architect. For the past 12 years, the visual delights of Six Flags have been directly attributable to Warner's care.

"Landscaping is similar to a woman's make-up," Warner said. "The existing features should be highlighted and accented. Designing around a Colonial style home, for example, would be different from designing for a Ranchstyle home," said Warner.

More formal techniques are used with Southern Colonial styles in Six Flags' Confederate section. Formal flower beds are small and rarely mix color. Borders lend a formal touch.

Informal landscaping

styles are suited to contemporary homes. Larger flower beds and a wider variety of colors provide the widest range of design creativity. Six Flags uses pansies, bulbs and winter plants that can survive cold temperatures for early spring and late fall color. As spring progresses, park color is enhanced by petunias and begonias - blooming plants that can survive cool temperature at night. Summer flowers at Six Flags include marigolds, zinnias, caladiums and lantana, which grows well into the fall. More than 4,500 mums provide Six Flags with a majority of its fall color.

"Choosing the right variety of foliage for the amount of light that it will receive in a particular location is just as important as choosing a color design," said Warner. Marigolds, zinnias, petunias, pansies and lantana grow best in sunny locations. Caladiums, coleus and sultana should be planted in the shade.

Contrast, provided by permanent foliage, is important for good color mixing. "White and yellow variegation in leaves, seasonal blooms and different shades of green highlight flower plantings," said Warner.

"Dark colors will tone down bright areas and light colors will make shady areas stand out.

"For example, red accents a drab gray building. Lacy, light greenery can soften red. White flowers and border plants can highlight brightly colored buildings, as they do the famous orange Six Flags' oil derrick."

Warner attributes much of Six Flags' beauty to the simple planting technique of clustering.

"Too many homeowners plant bulbs in dreary straight rows. "When straight rows are used, more bare dirt is visible, so more plants than are necessary are required to fill the bare spots. Instead, bulbs should be staggered or offset when planted."

Tulips cluster especially well. In flower beds, 10 to 15 bulbs can be planted four to five inches apart. Marigolds, which are larger, can be planted in twos and threes to add spot color.

Seasonal planning plays a major role in landscaping, especially in the southwest, according to Warner.

"When you analyze the averages for the southwestern region, we're a borderline Temperate Zone which receives just the right amount of annual rainfall. The catch is that over half that rainfall occurs in a very short time frame," Warner said.

With Six Flags receiving millions of guests from March through November, Warner combats

temperature extremes ranging from late frosts to dry summer heat. When a late frost occurs, Warner washes the frost gently off the plants before the sun rises. The plant is warmed by the water.

"It's a tricky method and not guaranteed to work," Warner warns. "The best way to deal with frost is to plant after the danger is past."

Extreme heat does not have to be a major problem for plants.

"Plants can accommodate themselves to heat as well as people can," Warner said. "The danger lies in dehydration, the lack of water. With a regular watering routine, water stress can be avoided."

Homeowners should time their planting, according to Warner, in order to take full advantage of plant life cycles.

Bulbs go on sale in early fall and be planted through November. If a fall planting is missed, the bulbs can be kept chilled in a refrigerator and then planted after the first of the year.

Many bulbs will repeat, or grow again, the following year. Tulips, daffodils and hyacinths need the cold of winter to mature. After they bloom, the flowers should be cut back.

"At the park we've had Narcissus daffodils repeat for as long as five or six consecutive years," said Warner.

Planning by season is crucial to maintaining the more than 500 hanging baskets at Six Flags Over Texas. Approximately one-half of the park's baskets are hanging greenery which must be replanted every three to four seasons.

"A greenery hanging basket takes more than one year to mature and fill out before it ever hangs in the park," Warner said.

Needlepoint, Devils, and Roosevelt ivies, Boston ferns and Fluffy Ruffle ferns provide warm weather baskets. Asparagus ferns and English ivies survive well through cool spring and fall nights. Approximately half of Six

Flags' baskets are placed for color accents. Petunias are widely used because they have two different colors on each bloom. Pansies are good for the spring weather. Lantana can be grown for summer and begonias and mums for the fall.

"Blooming baskets must be repotted annually or they become root-bound," Warner said. "They are also hard to grow because they dry out so quickly."

All of the Six Flags baskets receive daily watering. To increase moisture retention, homeowners should add peat moss or a hydrogel to the soil.

"With daily watering, a considerable amount of soil runs off the hanging baskets. We fertilize baskets in the

park once a week to minimize the effects of soil run-off," Warner said.

"It's important for homeowners to decide how much time they want to spend maintaining their yard," Warner advises.

"Care and feeding of lawns is a year-round task. Too many people expect to take care of their lawn only during the warm months of the year."

Early spring is the best time to scalp both St. Augustine and bermuda lawns in order to remove the dead grass cuttings or thatch, says Warner. After scalping, a complete fertilizer, containing a 2-1-1 ratio of nitrogen, potassium and phosphorus, should be applied on a regular

schedule throughout the year.

"We fertilize the Six Flags lawn in March and June, lightly in August and again in early October," Warner said. "With the equivalent of 144 average home lawns, we use about 1,296 bags of fertilizer each year."

No rule of thumb exists for developing a regular lawn watering schedule. Warner recommends at least one good soaking a week.

"You have to learn to gauge your own yard," he said. "If your grass looks wilted in the late afternoon, it needs a good soaking right then and there."

"Achieving a total 'Six Flags Look' from well-kept lawns to seasonal baskets, clustered flowerbeds and

creative color designing, requires basic planning, hard work and dedication," Warner concludes. "But every homeowner will agree, the beauty is reward enough."

Warner, a native of Oklahoma, has lived in Texas for more than 20 years. He received a park administration degree from Texas Tech University and

has worked on Six Flags landscapes for 12 years. During that time, he has also helped design and construct the landscapes of Six Flags

Over Georgia and Six Flags Over Mid-America. In addition, he assisted in the design and construction of Six Flags' Astroworld, in Houston.

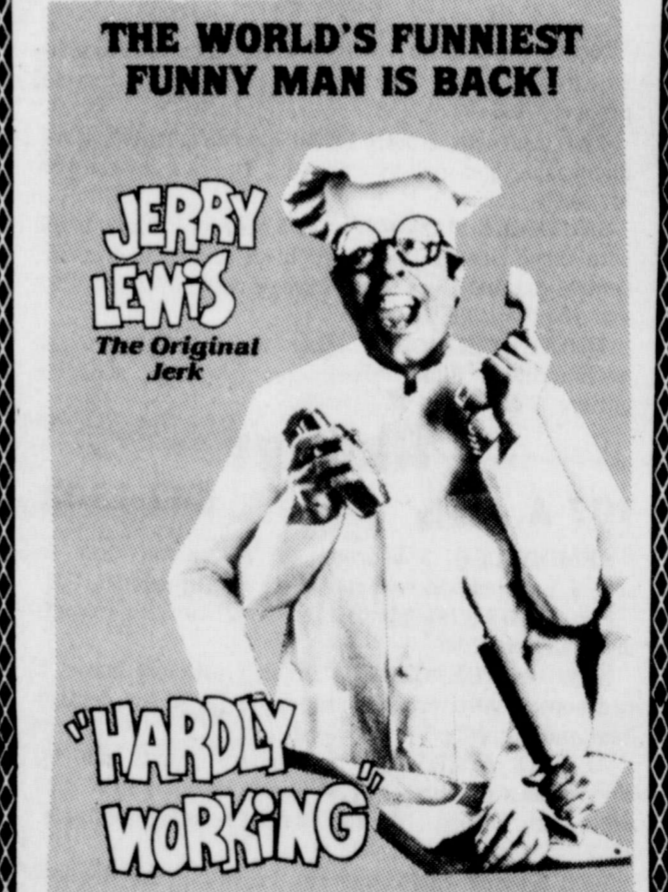

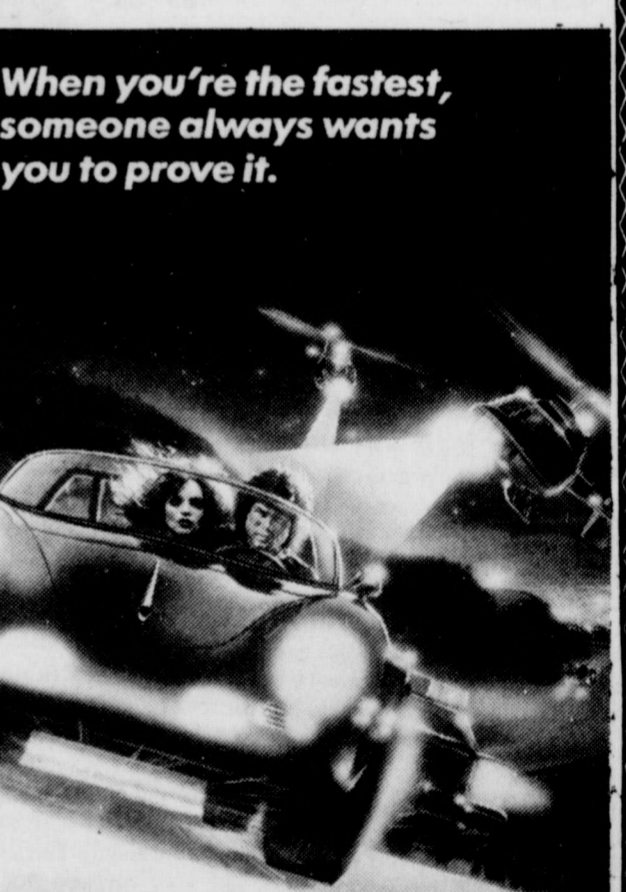

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The House Agriculture Committee is in the midst of formulating American farm policy, through the Omnibus Farm Bill, that will set this country's food and fiber policy for the next four years.

This work is being done during a period of the most austere budgetary restraints for decades and in analyzing the budgetary cuts, there will be very few areas of our society that will face cuts as severe as agriculture. If the program is successful, however, farmers and ranchers will be among the greatest beneficiaries. While inflation and high interest rates have seriously affected all Americans, the agricultural industry, with its heavy dependence on energy and operating credit, has been especially hard hit.

It is still too early in the legislative process to accurately predict the outcome or the final form the Farm Bill will take, but I have noted a shift in concepts that make up the backbone of any farm program that cannot be ignored.

The days of direct payments to farmers are over, in my opinion. Farmers

themselves are among the first to realize this and to make it clear that they do not want direct payments, but only to receive a fair price out of the market. The only effective marketing tool we have to get this price is a more realistic loan level.

I have proposed amendments that would increase the present loan rate to a more liveable level: \$4.25 for wheat, a reserve entry rate of \$4.70 per bushel and a set-aside trigger of at least 10 percent when a 900 million bushel carryover is reached.

These amendments have been made with the recognition that if we do set the loan rate at a higher level, there must be a mandatory set-aside, with only those producers who choose to participate in the program protected and only those producers affected. That option must remain open.

Many producers remain committed to the target price concept in operation under present farm legislation. That target price concept works fine — with one exception. We

seem to have maintained the net price of wheat, for instance, considerably below the

cost of production under that system. If the target price system is working well for the producer, then why are all of the producer organizations complaining about the fact that the net price of wheat is below the cost of production? I say quite honestly that what we have been doing is totally inadequate for the producer's welfare. Therefore, I can't see maintaining the target price system. As a wheat grower myself, I'm much more interested in seeing that the market price moves up to a profitable level on the wheat I produce for which there is a market than I am in maintaining a system that hasn't worked.

I think we now have a golden opportunity to implement some farm programs that will truly get farm commodities above the cost of production. There must be, however, an agreement that there are better ways to run farm programs and, at the present, we don't have that consensus. Once the hard realities of the budget impact become known, however, I think we will begin to see the solidity of the agricultural community behind that consensus.

Now in her fourth week following a bone marrow transplant from her twin sister Kristie at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center in Seattle, Wash., Misty is slowly beginning to manufacture her own platelets. She has leukemia, and intense radiation and chemotherapy killed her own platelet-manufacturing ability, until her sister's bone marrow replaced it.

They are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Merlin Don Ratliff of Stockton, Calif. He is a 1965 graduate of Eastland High School, and since the first story appeared here about them, the six-year-old twins have been showered with cards and letters from Eastland Countians including churches and Sunday School classes.

That was part of her wish. Another one was realized recently when Reggie Jackson, "her favorite baseball player" visited her in the Seattle Cancer Research Center.

Misty and Kristie helped the Center set a special record: They are the 1,000th bone marrow transplant per-

formed by the center's special team. The center has more of these transplants to its credit than all other facilities combined throughout the world.

Dr. E. Donnal Thomas, head of the Hutchinson Center's Medical Oncology program, and transplant pioneer who has received the American Cancer Society's highest award for his work, said yesterday, "Counting the thousand begins with the first one in March 1969."

The count includes procedures the Seattle marrow transplant team has done at the University of Washington, Children's Orthopedic Hospital and Medical Center, Providence,

U.S. Public Health Service and Swedish hospitals in addition to the Hutchinson center.

"It will be two years before we'll know," what success the treatment has had for Misty, Thomas said.

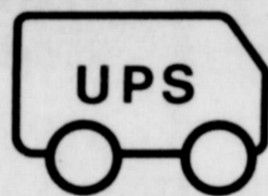

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What To Know About Grasshoppers

Grasshoppers eat greenbacks...at least that's the end result of their destructiveness to rangeland grass. They cost everyone, from farmer and rancher to the consumer at the meat counter.

With the possibility of an exceptionally heavy infestation year because of favorable winter weather conditions, the race for grasshopper control has been initiated on a local level.

Grasshoppers get into everyone's pocket because of their consumption of forages. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has compiled a fascinating picture of how they can devastate livestock forages:

- 15 to 20 grasshoppers per square yard, spread over a 40-acre field of alfalfa, will eat one ton of hay per day. Their consumption equals that of one-half cow per acre - the same as 20 cows per day on the 40 acres.

- 10 to 20 grasshoppers per square yard in bluegrass pasture equal one cow per acre.

- Four grasshoppers per square yard on sparse range grass reduce forage by 62 percent.

The good news is that ranchers have available tools for control of these pests. A rangeland spray program administered by USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service was developed in 1934 and still is in effect for ranchers on a cooperative basis. More than 5.3 million acres in 1980 and

approximately 7.1 million acres in 1979 were treated as part of this program, according to Ron Johnson, staff officer, National Program Planning Staff, USDA/APHIS.

"We have no way of knowing at this time how extensive the program will be in 1981," he says, "but, according to last year's adult survey, approximately 30 million acres are infested by potentially high levels of grasshoppers. Guesstimating by this figure, we likely will spray from five to seven million acres in 1981. We usually must treat 10 to 15 percent of the infested areas every year."

Weather plays a big part in controlling infestations naturally, according to Roy Moritz, APHIS south central region coordinator, Lubbock, TX. Early in April, a new hatch of nymph grasshoppers numbering 200 per square yard was discovered in the El Paso Valley in southeast New Mexico. Fortunately, a cold snap and snowfall took care of that hatch.

"That's an indication of a pretty hot year," Moritz says. "Pre-season planning for grasshopper control programs with chemicals was low this year compared to last, but ranchers can get interested in a hurry with a big hatch."

In coming years, farmers and ranchers will have to show a lot of initiative and involvement in the pre-season, because of cuts in USDA/APHIS personnel, ac-

ording to Dick Jacks, APHIS northwest area director, Seattle, WA. Because of tight money during the winter months, little interest developed in organization for the programs.

"What a lot of people don't realize is grasshoppers are important pests of rangeland and pastures if left uncontrolled," warns Jackson. "No year passes without economic loss to rangeland and crops due to grasshoppers."

"With outbreaks like last year of 30 to 60 grasshoppers per square yard on rangeland, cattle often have to be moved or sold early," he continues.

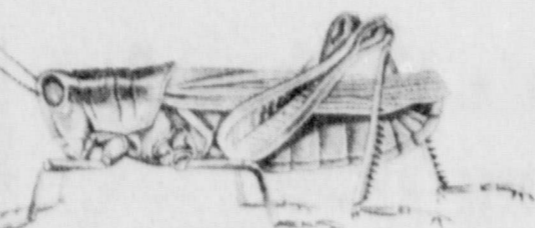
Jackson says by contacting local county Cooperative Extension Service Agents, state Department of Agriculture or APHIS office, land managers can get details regarding cooperative control. The APHIS grasshopper cooperative control program is voluntary and must be organized on a local level to meet certain criteria.

Jackson explains the guidelines: "There has to be an economic infestation of grasshoppers present on rangeland (eight per square yard); there must be at least 10,000 acres in a proposed spray area; everyone in the spray area must participate; and the landowner's money must be on deposit.

"As one can see, there is a lot of work that must take place before a program goes," he adds.

Many cooperative programs are conducted each year, resulting in millions of dollars of savings of forages and other crops. Insecticides are the most effective and readily available means of grasshopper control.

Jackson recommends two insecticides in the cooperative control program: SEVEN 4 OIL carbaryl, a product of Union Carbide Agricultural Products Company and ULV Malathion, a product of American Cyanamid. "Both of these insecticides were chosen due to their relatively



low mammalian toxicity, lack of environmental persistence and good efficacy," he says.

With high grasshopper infestations as in the past few years and the dry '80-'81 winter, pressure could be

high this summer, according to Johnson. The cooperative control program fits this need and its important to farmers, ranchers and consumers, because of the pest's significance to rangeland economy.

Protect Your Tomatoes

Now that those beautiful garden Tomatoes are full of blooms and soon to begin bearing fruit, you sure don't want to see all of your toil and labor go to feed the Insects, warns Gordon Woolam, Extension Pest Management Agent.

The most destructive and wide spread pest of Tomatoes is the Tomato Hornworm. It is a large green caterpillar with diagonal white stripes and a hard, curved horn on the rear end. The adult is a 4 to 5 inch gray-brown nocturnal flying moth.

Tomato Hornworms feed on foliage for 3 to 4 weeks starting in the late Spring. A few Hornworms can strip an entire plant rapidly.

This pest can often be controlled by hand-picking. Insecticides should be applied when damage appears on plants. Recommended Insecticides include Seven (R), Dipel (R) (Bacillus Thuringiensis) and Thiodan (R).

Other major Tomato pests include Red Spider Mites, Stink Bugs and Tomato Fruitworms. Spider Mites are not Insects, but are minute Red Mites related to Ticks and Chiggers. They suck juices from the undersides of leaves, causing discolored areas. A heavy infestation can cause leaves and flower buds to shed. Kelthane (R) should be used for controlling Red Spider Mites, usually two to four applications are needed.

Stink Bugs also suck plant juices. These Insects feed on the fruit of a variety of vegetables including Tomatoes. Treatment should begin when the first signs of damage occur on the foliage

FAREWELL TO AN OLD FRIEND

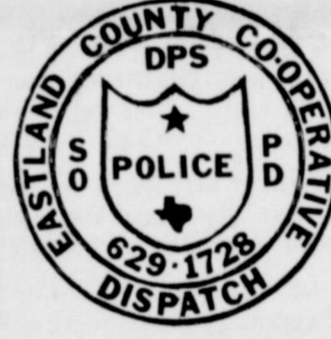

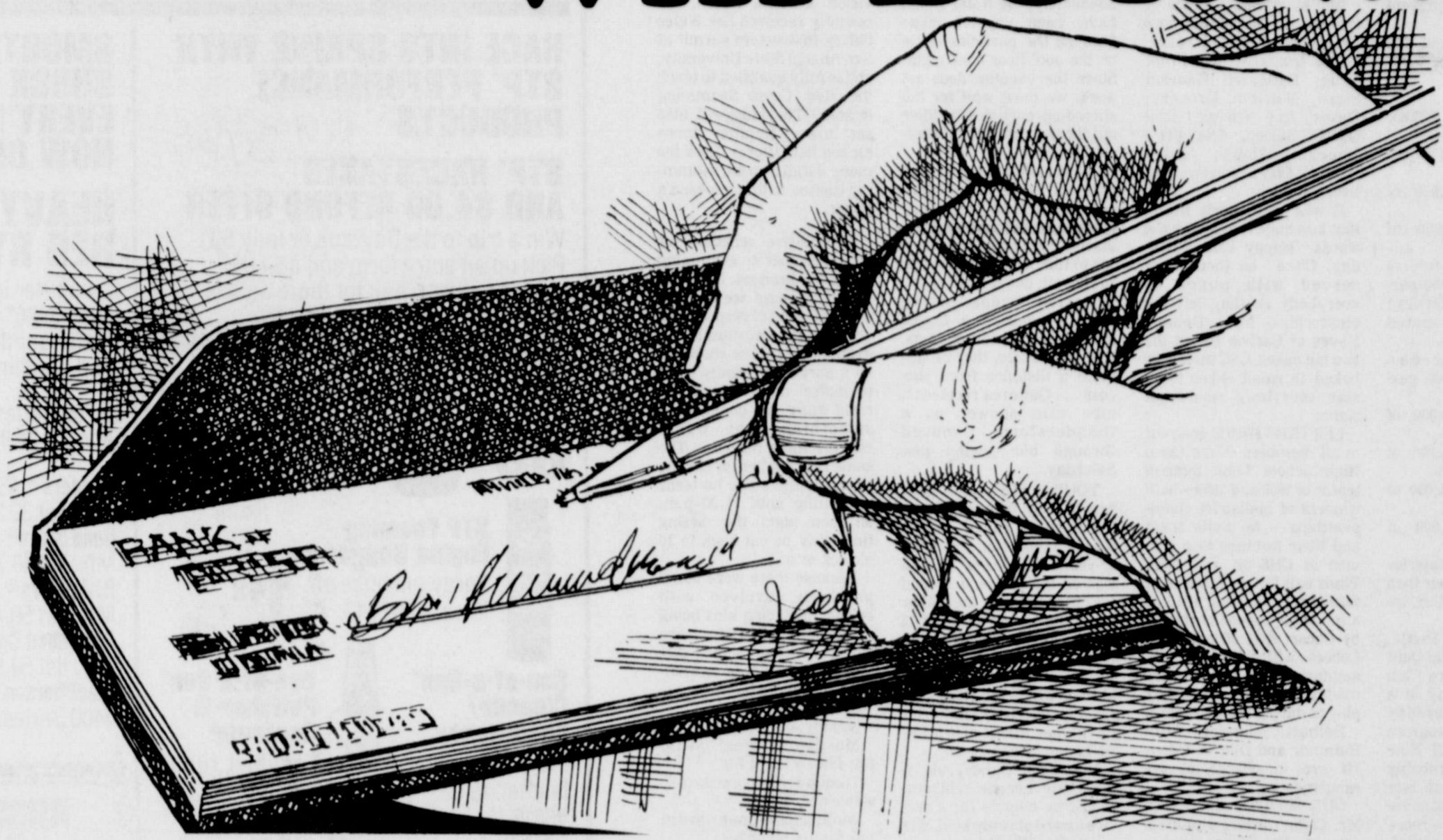

It was 119 years ago that Memorial Day was observed for the first time. It is a time to honor those military service members who lost their lives in U.S. wars. To know just how many men died in the service of their country is to resolve to do everything you can to help prevent wars.

The U.S. wars and the number who died in them follows:

American Revolution-4,000 of 290,000 participants.

War of 1812-2,000 of 287,000 participants.

Mexican War-13,000 of 79,000 participants.

Indian Wars-1,000 of 106,000 participants.

Civil War-(Union forces) 364,000 of 2,213,000 who participated; (Confederacy) 133,821 of an estimated 1,000,000 participants.

Spanish-American War-11,000 of 392,000 participants.

World War I-116,000 of 4,744,000 participants.

World War II-406,000 of 16,535,000 participants.

Korean Conflict-55,000 of 8,807,000 participants.

Vietnam War-47,000 of 9,834,000 participants.

And the number of injuries was much, much higher than that number of lives lost. Incredible, huh?

The City Pool opened Monday, May 25, with an impromptu splash day for a little over 100 area kids. The water is still a bit cloudy and greenish, but the pH and chlorine levels are well within the normal and safe limits.

The cloudy water is a result of two things. A good deal is from the dirt sediment in the city's water supply. The rest is undissolved soda ash, a chemical which is used to balance the water's pH. If the pool vacuum had been working adequately, the water would have been crystal clear because the particles settle on the pool floor over night. Since the vacuum does not work, we must wait for the stirred-up particles to filter out through the pool's filtering system.

The cost of swimming this year will be \$1 (one dollar) per person. Last year if you

started throwing coins in a jar to finance a vacation trip to Hawaii, our scouts report. Inflation keeps hiking prices, requiring a bigger and bigger jar full of coins. And, we're told, they're still quite a distance from success. Our area received a nice rain shower as a thunderstorm moved through our region last Saturday.
