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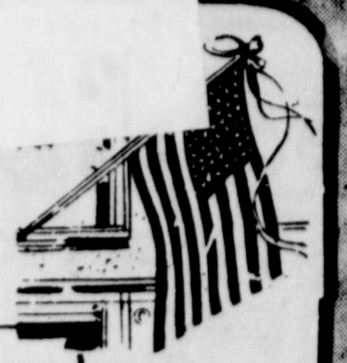

Volunteer Ambulance Service Ready To Start Here June 1st

An ambulance service manned by volunteers and headquartered at the Cisco Fire Department station is ready to begin operating at

12:01 a.m. Monday, June 1, the City Council was told at their semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night. Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie

reported that the volunteer ambulance service will utilize the Fire Department's rescue unit, an ambulance that was presented to firemen by Kimbrough Funeral Home two years ago, and an ambulance on loan from Cisco Funeral Home. Both vehicles are fully equipped.

The Council heard two proposals for ambulance service and took them under advisement. The matter will be on the agenda for the next regular meeting of the City Council when new members are due to take over duties.

An ordinance passed by the Council authorizes the use of city funds if needed in the emergency program. The ordinance also noted that the matter would be reviewed by the council at each meeting until a permanent solution to the problem is provided.

In other action, the Council approved minutes of the regular meeting of May 12th and a special meeting on May 18th.

A financial statement prepared by Jean Gray, city accountant, was approved. It showed general fund revenues for April totaling \$28,031 to bring the year's gross to \$373,938. Expenditures for April amounted to \$52,789.

The water and sewer department had April income of \$21,868 and expenses amounting to \$18,803. The revenue sharing fund receipts amounted to \$12,286 with expenditures of \$4,912. Bills for the month of April were approved. These totaled \$52,850 from the general fund, \$19,500 from the water and sewer fund, and \$4,926 from revenue sharing funds, Miss Gray's summary showed.

In discussing the monthly expenses, Councilwoman Louise Allison noted that the city has been buying gasoline from R&R Fuel Co. of Ranger since November 1980, and that some \$17,835 has been paid to that firm for fuel. "I think local dealers should be considered," she added. The fuel is purchased on bids, it was understood. The April R&R account amounted to \$4,015.

Accounts paid from revenue sharing funds during April included the sums of \$1,726 to Pengo Completions, Inc., and \$2,500 to R.M. Sneed Construction Co. for sewer line work to the new White Elephant Inn and the West Cisco area. The sum of \$500 was paid to the Cisco Softball Association for use in the summer program.

The Council voted 4-to-1 for monthly bills checks to be signed at council meetings after a discussion. This would enable Councilmen to be able to ask questions about any statements, it was decided.

Luke Harrison asked the city to call for grass lease bids on city owned land around Lake Bernie and Cisco. This will be done prior to the next regular meeting, it was decided.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Cartee and Council Members Bobby Ingram, Ivan Webb, Louise Allison and Bill Eudy. Officials absent were Councilmen Harold Phippen and Jerry Jeffcoat, City Manager R.J. Turpin and City Attorney Wm. B. Wright, Jr.

Reappraisal Work For Cisco To Begin Within Few Days

The reappraisal work for Cisco and the surrounding area will be starting within a few days. The work will be done by field appraisers of McMorries and Company, a professional valuation firm that has been employed. The work will probably take several weeks as every piece of property must be accounted for, the completion date for the entire county is set for the fall of 1981. Plans call for one crew to be working the rural area of the Cisco district while a second crew starts work in the city.

The work is being done in order for the taxing bodies of Cisco and Eastland County to comply with State Property Tax Laws which now require that all taxable property be equalized and valued at 100% of market value by the 1982 tax year.

The work done by the appraisal firm will have no effect on the value or tax rates of Cisco properties. Most of the reappraisal work is geared to satisfying the State required deadline of 1982. The 1981 tax rates will be set this summer by each individual jurisdiction as always.

Each property owner will be contacted by a field appraiser who will measure the improvements upon the property. If the owner is not at home, the improvement will be measured and a card left for the owner. It is emphasized by representatives of the firm that they do not need to go in any house or residence, they can get the information they need from the outside measurements and from those property owners who are at home.

Your cooperation is asked as the more accurate information the appraisers have, the more accurate the value and classification of your property can be. Again it is emphasized that work will be going on in Cisco and our surrounding area for the

next several weeks so please be on the lookout for the appraisers. If you have any questions concerning the appraisal work being done in Cisco or the surrounding area, please call or contact the Cisco ISD tax office.

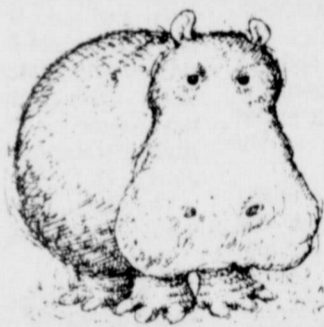

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Ed Syers Spent Two Years Researching Eastland Lore

Eastland edges a broad area rich in supernatural lore, according to Kerrville author Ed Syers, who has spent two years researching the state's fifty major twilight zone stories.

Several regional tales came under consideration for his book, "Ghost Stories of Texas," to publish this fall. The novelist-historian, well-known for works on Texas heritage, has written such award winners as "Off The Beaten Trail," a comprehensive state guide, "Backroads of Texas," and an acclaimed bicentennial novel, "The Devil Gun."

Below Stephenville, the fabled and deadly ghost of the McDow water hole, is included in the collection, as is an old Norwegian church below Meridian whose sanctuary echoes to ghostly voices. "Several others were close contenders," Syers adds.

"There's an Indian legend here," he said, "and an old house near Cisco. There's some talk about Thurber, and below Abilene, the ghost of a buffalo hunter. I couldn't develop enough background

for solid stories and passed them."

Syers' research required some 15,000 miles of travel and more than two hundred interviews, all resulting in the first statewide collection of supernatural tales. Television's "That's Incredible" already has filmed one of his stories for fall viewing and at least one other is planned, the author says.

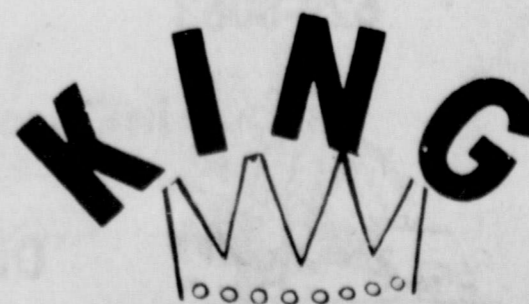

GORDON SPOT

Have you had trouble getting your tomatoes blooms to set fruit? Pollination has been a problem around the county. The blooms have been falling before fruit is set. The tomato bloom is classified as a perfect flower, which means that the same flower has both female and male parts. If pollen is inactivated by high temperature or made sticky by cool, wet, cloudy conditions, the female flower part will not be pollinated and the entire flower and the potential tomato will fall off.

We had about 2 weeks of cool nights. During this time few tomato blooms were pollinated. During most of last week the night temperatures have been higher and the blooms are beginning to set fruit. If you are still having problems of fruit setting, try using a blossom-set hormone which is sold at local stores. These tomato-setting products are most effective during early spring when cool temperatures and cloudy conditions cause poor fruit set.

We have seen some Early Blight fungus on tomato leaves this past week. This disease starts out as black spots mostly on the older leaves. Tissue surrounding the spots may turn yellow and the entire leaf turns yellow. If high temperature and humidity occur at this time, much of the foliage is killed.

Fungicides should be used to prevent Early Blight. There are a number of fungicides that are recommended. Some of these and Kocide 101, Manzate 200, Diathane M-45, Difeolation 4F, Bravo and Cooper County N.

When, how and how much to water are common questions asked by gardeners. Watering is one of the most enjoyable aspects of home gardening but it is also one of

the most misunderstood. Misuse of water in your home garden often causes many problems, among them soil crusting, poor root growth, blossom drop, cracked fruit, nutrient deficiencies and various types of plant diseases.

Regardless of how you water your garden, remember to apply sufficient water to wet the soil to a depth of at least 6 inches. How often to water will depend upon climatic conditions, rate of growth, stage of maturity of your garden, and soil type.

Check the soil, not the plants, to determine when to water your garden. Looking

at plants for symptoms such as wilting to determine when to water is a serious mistake. Plants wilt for many reasons, such as diseases, too much fertilizer, heat or perhaps too much water. If soil is relatively moist an inch or so deep, you do not need to water. Remember, heavy soils will need watering less frequently than sandy soils.

Most gardeners water by flooding or furrow irrigation. For this method to be effective, it is best to have plants on raised beds so water can go between them. With flood or furrow irrigation, apply water slowly to soak the soil thoroughly.

Watering with a sprinkler

is probably the most convenient method. It is simply a matter of placing the sprinkler where it can water the entire garden. Be sure to apply at least one inch of water at each watering. This can easily be determined by placing a coffee can in the sprinkler pattern and catching about an inch of water.

When using a sprinkler, turn it on early enough in the day to allow foliage to dry off before nighttime. Wet foliage in combination of cool nighttime temperatures often results in serious types of foliage diseases.

Drip or trickle irrigation is a relatively new concept

which is gaining popularity. This type of system literally drops water onto the soil surface near plants so that it seeps slowly into the soil. This method is much more efficient than either furrow or overhead watering although the initial cost is high. However, being more efficient, these systems generally pay for themselves within a short period of time.

Paying attention to how, how much and when you water can make the difference between success or failure of your garden.

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Homemaking Hints

Economizing is important to all of us these days. However, when it comes to buying home canning jars, it pays to buy the real thing. Saving empty mayonnaise and peanut butter jars for home canning may seem like a smart inflation-fighting idea now, but in the end it may cost more. The wise consumer knows not to take chances when home canning.

Commercial food jars are excellent glass jars, but they are made to serve a single purpose only - to package food products bought at the grocery store. Although they are made from the same raw materials as home canning jars, they are not meant to be reused in home processing. If they were made to be reusable for home canning, then the food we buy in glass jars would cost more.

Consider the condition of a commercial jar after the food has been removed. Aren't metal knives commonly used to scrape the last bit of peanut butter or mayonnaise from the jar? Metal utensils can scratch the inside of the jar. When the jar is heated, stress will build up at the scratched point and may cause a break at this point. This will also cause a loss of food as well as the time and energy spent in preparation. That's not a wise money-saving idea.

Not only can home processed peanut butter or mayonnaise jars break more easily, there are other overlooked problems when using commercial jars for home canning. All-important processing times may be inadequate. A mayonnaise jar may look like a standard home canning jar, but it may actually hold several ounces more food. If processing is

done according to standard recipe processing times, the food may not be heated through to the center of the jar and be underprocessed. Underprocessed food will spoil and will not be safe to eat. Processing times need to be exact and that's hard to do with odd sized jars.

Sealing commercial jars creates other problems. Even though two-piece home canning lids appear to fit correctly on commercial jars, they may unseat later in storage. The jar rim on a commercial jar may not be as even as the rim on a home canning jar, leaving a space where air can enter and cause spoilage. Special closures are made for commercial jars; two-piece lids are specifically made for home canning jars. The two should not be interchanged.

Our advice is don't try to save money by home canning with salvaged peanut butter or mayonnaise jars. With the possibility of jar breakage and food spoilage, why gamble with expensive food and your family's health and safety? Stick with standard home canning jars; it is the wise choice.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Tomato Catsup
4 quarts peeled, cored, chopped tomatoes (about 24 large)
1 cup chopped onions
1/2 cup chopped sweet red peppers
1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon salt
1 1/2 teaspoons celery seed
1 teaspoon whole allspice
1 teaspoon mustard seed
1 stick cinnamon
1 1/2 cups vinegar
1 tablespoon paprika
Cook tomatoes, onions and pepper until soft. Press through food mill or sieve. Discard seeds. Cook rapidly

until thick and reduced by one-half (about 1 hour). Prepare home canning jars and lids according to manufacturer's instructions. Add sugar and salt to tomato mixture. Tie whole spices in cheesecloth bag, add to mixture. Simmer about 25

minutes, stirring frequently. Add vinegar and paprika; cook until thick, stirring frequently. Carefully pour into hot jars, leaving 1/4 inch head space. Adjust caps. Process 20 minutes in boil water canner. Yield: about 3 pint jars.

Ciscoans Grandson Undergoes Life-Saving Heart Surgery

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article is being reprinted from the Fort Worth Star Telegram edition of Thursday morning, April 9, 1981. The article is about Brian Black, grandson of Walter Fletcher of Fort Worth, formerly of Cisco and the great-grandson of Mrs. Pernecia Cearley of Cisco.)

Brian Black played hard like any other 2-year-old. But he huffed and puffed more. He had to rest often. His fingers sometimes turned purple, his toes and lips, blue.

His parents knew it was time to make a decision. They had been offered little hope for Brian's long-term health. He underwent surgery when only 4 days old, to bypass an obstruction blood flow to his lungs.

The obstruction was not his only problem. Brian was born with a three-chambered heart—a single left ventricle pumped all his blood.

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"We had an offer to go to Houston, but it's new there, too," Pam Black said. "We decided we had the best doctors we could want right here."

"I told the surgeon, I've got faith in you. You'll do the best you can, and God will be

with you to help you." He said, "I'll take all the help I can get."

That was February 17. After weeks in the intensive care unit at Harris Hospital and follow-up care at Fort Worth Children's Hospital, Brian is home in Burleson.

"It's been a real choker to everybody here—to be that near death and come out that well," a nurse at Harris said. "It was a very rare kind of triumph."

"It's just a beautiful family," the nurse said. "His little brother, who's 5, was sending Brian stuff all while he was in the hospital."

Several Sundays ago, Brian's brother, Jerry was asked to lead prayers for Brian at the Meadowbrook Church of the Nazarene. "Dear Jesus, please help Brian to get better so we can all go home and be a family again," Jerry prayed.

His prayers were answered. But it wasn't just Jerry praying. Mrs. Black said, "People all over the country were praying. People I had never heard of were sending me cards and walking up to me in the halls of the hospital and telling me that they were praying for Brian," she said. "There were prayer circles and prayer chains."

"God has been with him. We feel that's who gave us this choice. Two years ago they didn't do this operation on babies."

"They had always told us we should wait as long as we could, and when the time came we would have to make the decision," Mrs. Black said.

They expected the decision to come in Brian's first year of life, but the shunt inserted four days after birth had

worked well. Eventually he grew too large for it and there was danger of heart damage from over-work.

"Finally we had to choose," Mrs. Black said. "They could go back in and do another shunt (but Brian's lifespan would be limited) or they could just let it go, and he might have lived another three or four years before he just dwindled to nothing and died."

"We decided this new procedure was our only chance."

The procedure converts the right atrium, a chamber normally used only as a reservoir for blood, into a ventricle. This reduces the pumping load on the single left ventricle, a pediatric cardiologist said.

"The procedure...has only recently been adapted to treat some patients with a single ventricle," the cardiologist said.

The obstruction, temporarily bypassed through insertion of the shunt, had to be permanently patched to make the procedure work, said the Fort Worth doctor, who asked not to be identified.

"We're very optimistic. Everybody is nationwide. It should improve these patients' lot over the long term," he said.

"But, you learn to be very cautious in this business about being overoptimistic, even with simple heart problems. What we actually have is a malformed heart that's been patched and put back together. There are scars and stitches and plastic involved."

"Until the patch holds 50 years and the heart func-

tions well, we have to be cautious in our optimism," he said. "There is something new. There's no long-term history of how these patched hearts are going to hold up."

Nonetheless, he agrees it's a special case.

"It was a very difficult operation," the nurse at Harris said. "We haven't gotten one this far before—but neither has hardly anyone else. This is a special success, not just for Fort Worth, but for anywhere."

"It made me realize what special doctors we have here," said Mrs. Black. "And the nurses, at Harris and Fort Worth Children's, they love him as much as we do—just about. They knew how much we needed to be in there with him all the time. They made everything a lot easier."

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THE TEXAS REAL ESTATE LICENSE ACT**
"SECTION 1. (a) This Act shall be known and may be cited as 'The Real Estate License Act.'
"(b) It is unlawful for a person to act in the capacity of, engage in the business of, or advertise or hold himself out as engaging in or conducting the business of a real estate broker or a real estate salesman within this state without first obtaining a real estate license from the Texas Real Estate Commission. It is unlawful for a person licensed as a real estate salesman to act or attempt to act as a real estate agent unless he is, at such time, associated with a licensed Texas real estate broker and acting for the licensed real estate broker.
"(c) Each real estate broker licensed pursuant to this Act is responsible to the commission, members of the public, and his clients for all acts and conduct performed under this Act by himself or by a real estate salesman associated with or acting for the broker.
"(d) No real estate salesman shall accept compensation for real estate sales and transactions from any person other than the broker under whom he is at the time licensed.
"(e) No real estate salesman shall pay a commission to any person except through the broker under whom he is at the time licensed.

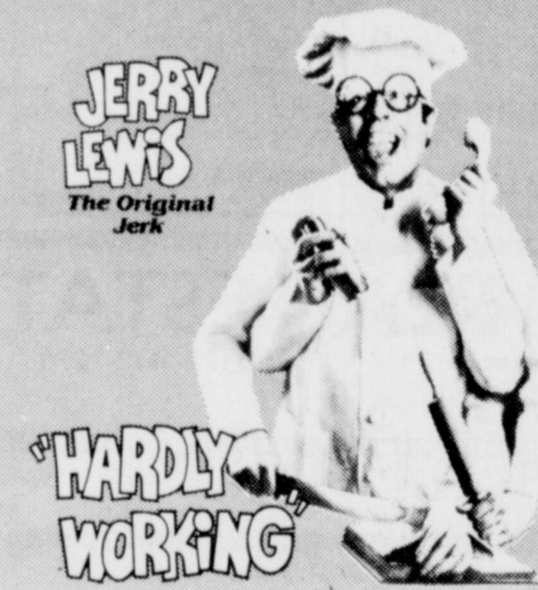

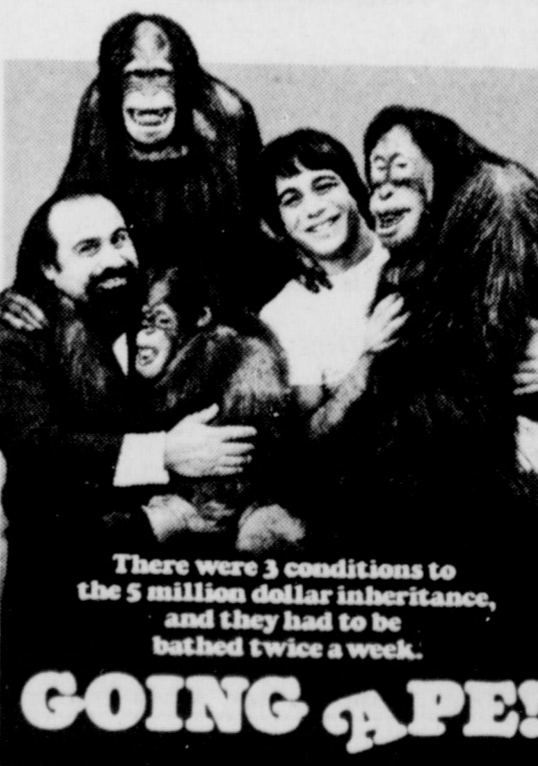

IWU Reflections in Perspective

Noelli, our Turkoman maid in Teheran was a very no-nonsense individual when it came to saving money. Whether it was hers or ours, she was equally watchful of the cost of things.

The Rockefeller Foundation, through its agency "International Board of Economic Consultants," known acronymically as "IBEC" built 209 houses just off the northeast corner of Teheran and in the foothills of the mountain range. All the houses, half of which were one-story and the other half two-story structures were contained in a single compound not far from the old Teheran Palace. We lived there for eleven years, and it was at the first home we leased that we acquired Noelli.

The maid scolded me roundly once for paying a coolie a dollar to cut the grass and clean the flower beds. "Mahn shukal" (My work), she insisted. And until we moved to a larger house in the same development and engaged the services of a gardener full time, Noelli took care of the yard and flower beds.

We noticed one morning that, while the breakfast dishes had been cleared from the table Noelli nor the dishes were to be seen in the kitchen. Casting about, My Lovely Wife discovered that Noelli had taken the dishes out to the little park just outside our garden wall where a hydrant was installed by the developers and from which water was drawn to water the tiny park. Sitting in the grass, she was washing the dishes and the pots and pans in the shade of a weeping willow.

MLWV insisted, and Noelli reluctantly returned with her pan of work to the kitchen. "Ohnja - sherkat puh. Inja-shuma puh!" Was her explanation. Translated it meant... "Out there; it is the Company's money. In here, it is your money." And she was ever mindful of any opportunity to save the Agha's money.

The development was somewhat self-contained, in that respect. On the slope of the mountains which rose to 14,000 feet the developers had drilled eight deep water wells. They also installed pumps, a chlorination plant and even a flouridation system. Four wells were pumped at a time and the water was distributed through a well-engineered system to all the houses. We had excellent water service for which we paid a monthly...no, as I recall it was a quarterly minimum flat rate. Noelli was not aware of that; she was only certain that the water from the hydrant underneath the willow was furnished by the Company while that inside the

house was paid for by Agha. The fact that Madame insisted on washing dishes in scalding water didn't phase her at all. To her, as to practically all rural Persians water is water is water. And if it is running water it is clean and healthful, notwithstanding what may be dropped into the stream uphill a way.

I think I have mentioned that she also did the laundry out there in the shade of the willow until, again at the insistence of MLWV she moved that activity into the place provided in the paved courtyard alongside the furnace room. But I suspect that Noelli never fully understood why Agha would pay for water when it was to be had, free, just for the taking.

Now Is Time To Stop Squash Bugs

Now is the time to be keeping a close eye on your Squash and other Cucurbits (Pumpkins, Melons and Cucumbers) for Squash Bugs. If you plant Squash, you will more than likely have Squash Bugs. So unless this is your first time to plant Squash you have probably encountered this pest before.

These insects suck the juices from the foliage causing discoloration and stunting. The leaves wilt rapidly and soon become blackened, crisp and dead. Attacked plant stems often are enlarged but later wither and die.

Mature Squash Bugs are brownish gray to dark gray. The immature Squash Bugs have a green abdomen with a crimson head, thorax, legs and antennae. They later become grayish-white with nearly black legs and antennae. They grow to about 5/8 inch long at maturity. Eggs are yellowish to bronze-brown and laid in clusters on the underside of leaves, usually in vein angles.

Eggs hatch in 1 to 2 weeks. Both the immature and mature Squash Bugs feed in groups. Six to eight weeks are required for Squash Bugs to reach maturity.

Control of this insect is often difficult, especially if populations are allowed to reach high numbers. Squash Bugs can often be controlled in the Home Garden by hand-gathering or by trapping them under boards or shingles placed beneath the plants. Early monitoring and removal of eggs is also very important.

If insecticides are used, apply when the Squash Bugs first appear on plants. Probably the most effective in-

secticide for controlling this pest is Carbaryl (Sevin). The wettable powder formulation of this insecticide is preferable because of the better coverage provided by spraying. Endosulfan (Thiodan) is also recommended.

Another important Squash pest is Squash Vine Borer. This pest is a larval form of a moth. Larvae are white, heavy bodies and over 1 inch long when fully grown. On hatching, they bore into vines, killing the plant.

Treatment should begin when Borers are first observed, about the time of first bloom. Recommended insecticides include Carbaryl (Sevin), Malathion, and Endosulfan (Thiodan). Treatment may have to be repeated at 7-day intervals to control heavy infestations.

As always please refer to label instructions for application rates, minimum days between application and harvest, and other important information. Please contact the County Extension Office with any questions regarding this or any other pest problem.

An outbreak of measles is occurring in the State of Texas (80 times the rate for the entire United States). Almost half of the patients are below the age of 15 months. Eighty percent are of preschool age (less than 5 years old).

consultative advice provided from the National Center for Disease Control has reviewed the use of measles vaccine and the following recommendations have been instituted.

1. All persons attending school, including those attending institutions of higher learning, should be fully protected against measles by vaccination or certified in writing by a physician to have had a case of measles (rubeola). In circumstances of increased risk, as explained below, consideration should be given to removing school all individuals not immunized or certified by a physician as having had measles (rubeola).

2. Texas children at increased risk of exposure to measles should be protected by an intensified schedule of immunization. The augmented special recommendations for measles immunization in all such children at increased risk of exposure to measles are as follows:

a. Single antigen measles vaccine should be administered as soon after six months of age as possible, up to the age of twelve months.

b. Children who have reached twelve months of age should receive MMR (mumps, measles, rubella) vaccine.

c. Children who received immunization against measles between six and twelve months must be reimmunized against measles at 15 months of age, using MMR vaccine.

3. There are at least two categories of children who are currently recognized to be at increased risk and requiring special protection:

a. Children living in Texas city or county which experiences measles activity (i.e. even one confirmed case of measles which exposes unprotected persons) within calendar year 1981.

b. Children at high risk of exposure to measles, such as children in families of migrant workers; or children who anticipate travel to or through any area where measles is being transmitted.

4. The severe morbidity associated with the outbreak is also unusual. Hospitalizations and cases of pneumonia were frequent, particularly in children under 15 months old. The age of the

fatal case - 13 months - is within the age range for which mortality from this disease is highest.

In view of the fact that cases of measles have been reported in Region 4, an immunization clinic will be held for all who need vaccine by the above criteria. Clinic hours are 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. at 104 N. Lamar, Eastland on June 11, 1981.

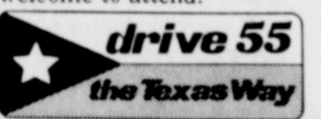
