Reappraisal Work For Cisco To Begin Within Few Days

The reappraisal work for Cisco and the surrounding area will be starting within a few days. The work will be done by field appraisers of McMorris and Company, a professional valuation firm that has been employed. The work will probably take several weeks as every piece of property must be accounted for, the completion date for the entire county is set for the fall of 1981. Plans call for one crew to be working the rural area of the Cisco district while a second crew starts work in the city. The work is being done in order for the taxing bodies of Cisco and Eastland County to comply with State Property Tax Laws which now require that all taxable property be equalized and valued at 100% of market value by the 1982 tax year. The work done by the appraisal firm will have no effect on the value or tax rates of Cisco districts for 1981. All of the reappraisal work is geared to satisfying the State required deadline of 1982. The Roof Garden Theater, operated by Cisco Junior College, begins its third summer season, Thursday, June 11, with the opening of "Mary, Mary" by Jean Kerr. 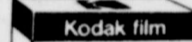

Popular Racquet Sports Causing Eye Injuries

There's a "ping" in the air and it's causing problems, most often to those in the 25-64 age group, warns the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness.

The "ping" is the sound of balls being hit by the millions of Americans who have taken up racquet sports to keep fit. The problem is that the tennis, squash and racquet balls they're hitting are too often "pinging" into other people's eyes rather than, as intended, other people's racquets.

"More than 4,200 Americans suffer racquet sports eye injuries each year, almost 90% of which could be prevented with proper eye protection," says Jack B. O'Neill, Safety Chairman of the Society.

"Players must realize that a ball propelled by a racquet can travel up to 120 miles an hour. No eye can withstand a blow at that speed unless eye protection is being worn."

"Such injuries occur most frequently to adults," O'Neill noted, "few of whom wear any protection at all; or they wear only regular eye glasses which offer virtually no protection against the impact of high speed balls."

"The result is that racquet sports have now become the leading cause of sports related eye injuries," O'Neill went on. "The injuries range from retinal damage that causes serious vision loss to lacerations that result in several day's discomfort."

"Yet the eye protectors that can help avoid these injuries are readily available

in sports equipment shops and optical stores," he said. There are many kinds to choose from and the National Society to Prevent Blindness, in conjunction with safety organizations and manufacturers, is currently studying the effectiveness of each kind. In the meantime, in response to many requests, the Society has published interim recommendations on the selection of sports eye protection.

The recommendations note that any eye protection device is designed to reduce the risk of an injury. However, it does not provide a guarantee against all injury possibilities.

Individuals who require corrective lenses have two options available:

- Industrial-quality safety glasses with plastic lenses and a headband or curved temples to hold them in place and a frame without adjustable nose pads. These glasses can usually be obtained through opticians.

- Sports eye protectors with prescription lenses. These generally cost more than safety glasses and are also available through opticians.

Individuals who do not require corrective lenses have two options available:

- "Plano" or non-corrective safety glasses with plastic lenses. These are available through eye doctors and safety equipment suppliers.

- Sports eye protectors or plastic goggle-type eyeguards. They can be purchased from most opticians, sporting goods stores and racquet clubs.

Watching Washington

During Congressional debate on the Fuel Use Act in 1977-78, the prevailing belief was that the United States would experience serious shortages of natural gas by the end of the century, if not sooner.

However, that prediction has since gone awry. Unfortunately, though, federal policy in regard to natural gas has not kept up with the change in events.

The Fuel Use Act flatly prohibits the use of natural gas as a boiler fuel for generating electricity after 1990—a response to the dire warnings sounded during the bill's debate.

With passage of the Natural Gas Policy Act of 1978, though, the picture has changed, with producers looking for and finding substantial amounts of natural gas which had been previously uneconomical to produce.

Right now there are about 250 natural gas fired electrical generating units in the United States with a remaining useful life after 1990. The Fuel Use Act will force them to convert from natural gas to coal or fuel oil. This shift will cost electric consumers in Texas more than \$16.7 billion.

Recently I testified before the Senate Energy Regulation Subcommittee against this costly, unnecessary law. I pointed out that it is technically and economically unreasonable in many cases to force these power plants to switch from natural gas to coal or fuel oil.

The boiler of a gas fired plant would have to be replaced, rail lines built, extra real estate and expensive environmental equipment would be required before the unit could burn coal. For these reasons, it would be cheaper to build a new power plant from the ground up than to convert an existing natural gas fired plant.

Conversion to fuel oil would be an equally costly proposition. Although we cut back on our use of foreign oil last year, the United States still paid nearly \$80 billion for imported oil. If we force existing natural gas plants to switch to coal or fuel oil our dependency on unreliable, foreign sources of oil can only increase.

Current plans for one Texas utility company alone call for it to spend some \$19 billion over the next 15 years on new construction just to keep up with increases in demand. Converting still useful natural gas boilers by 1990 would add substantially to that capital outlay, since this company would continue to generate about 55 percent of its electricity with natural gas.

When Congress, as a result of the gloomy natural gas projections of 1977-78, mandated the conversion from natural gas to coal or fuel oil through the Economic Regulatory Administration. However, the national administration has indicated it wants to cut funding for ERA. If these cuts are approved, future administrative remedies will be unavailable—a strong reason a legislative solution is urgently needed.

My proposal to revise the Fuel Use Act would let existing gas fired plants continue burning natural gas, but it would not permit construction of new units fired by natural gas. It is a conciliatory remedy; I hope that my colleagues in Congress will approve it—and spare the Texas consumer an unjustified, ridiculously expensive rate hike in his utility bill.

Selective Service Begins Program To Select Local Board Members

Selective Service has begun a program to recruit and train civilian volunteers for possible future local boards throughout the nation. This is a part of the Congressionally approved and funded total revitalization of Selective Service. The boards themselves would not



be established unless Congress directed a return to the draft. However, pre-selection and training of board members in peacetime will be beneficial in several ways.

(1) It will assure that people selected will be representative of the communities they serve.

(2) It will give Selective Service time, in the relative calm of peacetime, to train the board members in Selective Service policies and procedures. This will assure uniform treatment, should the draft ever be resumed, of individuals requesting postponements, deferments and exemptions.

By law, local board members are nominated by each state governor and appointed by the President. To be eligible for consideration, an individual must:

- Be a citizen of the United States between the ages of 18 and 60,

- Not be a member of the armed forces (including reserve or retired status, but not excluding veterans of military service),

- Not already have served as a local member for a total of 15 or more years,

- Be willing to participate in a national program; and, if the draft is ever resumed, be willing to serve without pay in making difficult but

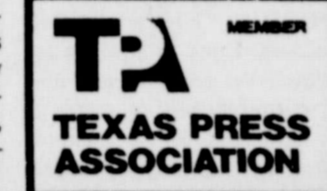

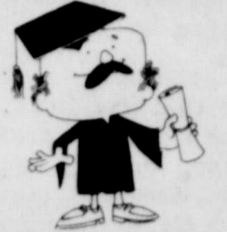

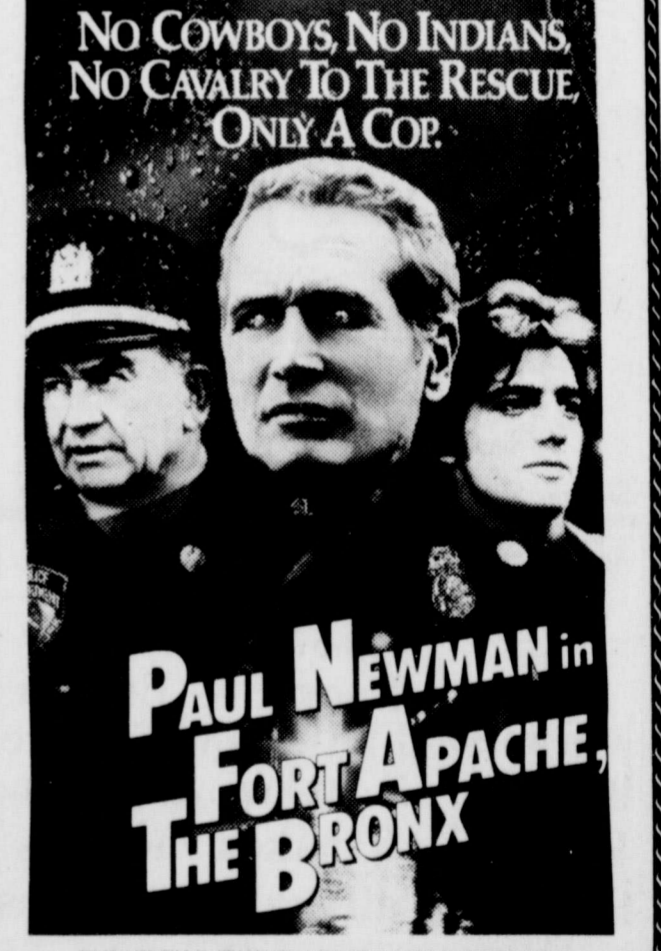

Dangerous Days For Depletion

By Viola M. Payne

In the 97th Congress, now meeting in Washington, three measures under consideration can have an enormous impact upon independent oil producers and royalty owners. And anything which affects these two groups touches all citizens of this country - and of the world. The current surge of U.S. exploration and development of new oil has had its measured effect upon O.P.E.C., which met this week and had to leave prices about the same. The part played in this scenario by the recent deregulation of oil prices in this country is well understood by analysts.

The pending measures are the 1,000 barrel per day exemption on Windfall Taxes, a possible Gas Deregulation bill, (which will probably come from the Reagan Administration) and two bills which would freeze the Oil Depletion allowance at 22 per cent. In the House, Bill No. 1328 has been introduced by Congressman Jim Jones of Oklahoma, and in the Senate Bill 5566 has been introduced by Senator Malcolm Wallop of Wyoming. These measures, if passed, will change a 1975 law - preventing the depletion rate from decreasing to 15 per cent by 1984.

The depletion allowance permits a certain portion of a Company or individual's oil income to be deducted from taxable income. It was

set up on the premise that oil is a non-renewable product, and that the life of an average well is less than 20 years. Although some oil fields and well last 40 or 50 years, the production in others dwindles in five or six. This situation helps keep the Independent oil producer from rolling in the wealth he is generally accused of. And the public, unfortunately, is not informed of his difficulties.

Perhaps this gap between myth and reality has helped make the oil industry one of the most regulated in the free enterprise system. And regulated, most producers will tell you, by persons who have no knowledge of the business. This lack of insight is found in surprising places, as reported by this excerpt from a Senate Finance Committee Hearing on March 18, 1981: Office of Management and Budget Director David Stockman testifying:

Senator Bentsen: "I would like to ask you about one continual rumor I'm hearing. I hear the OMB and the Administration are studying the phaseout of the depletion allowance - what remains of the depletion allowance - on oil and gas production. Now could you enlighten me as to Administration's position on that?"

Director Stockman: "The Administration has no position in the sense that

we have not recommended any change in the depletion allowance. There are various people, including myself, who have a private or personal opinion about it, but that is not on the table in terms of the package of tax and spending proposals before you."

Senator Bentsen: "Would you like to tell me your personal opinion?"

Director Stockman: "Well, my personal opinion is that it's an obsolete benefit that we probably don't need in the tax system any longer, but I haven't - that is not part of the Administration's recommendation."

Senator Bentsen: "Thank you very much. So obviously any depletion allowance is in danger, and it will take some real explaining by Congressman from oil-producing states to effect passage of the two bills to repeal the 1975 law."

Before 1969 the applicable depletion rate was 27.5 percent, but in that year a Tax Reform act reduced the rate 5 to 22 percent. In 1970 exploratory drilling in the United States dropped by 2,008 wells, a 21 percent decline from 1969. This was the biggest drop in a single year in the history of the oil industry. Return to the 1969 drilling level did not occur until 1977.

The Tax Reduction Act of 1975 eliminated percentage depletion for about 85 per-

cent of domestic crude oil and natural gas production. Independent producers and royalty owners were exempted, but there is a limitation on the volume of production eligible for percentage depletion. And beginning this year, the applicable rate phases down. This will hit 15 percent by 1984, under present laws. And eligible production will shrink from 2,000 to 1,000 barrels daily during the same period.

The 1975 percentage depletion was enacted during a time when public and Congressional sentiment was negative toward the oil producer, with an impression by many people that this group has "caused" the 1973 Arab oil embargo shortage and the dramatic rise in prices. Oil men believe that the 1975 Legislation should be reevaluated in the light of better understanding of the cause of the nation's energy problem and the available solutions, including increased exploration and production activity of domestic producers.

It might be noted, also, that legislation to "punish" the large, multinational oil companies actually hurts them very little, and

companies would hardly bother with. And if the Independent producer gets a bit catankerous and crusty while out slugging through the rattlesnakes and dust - who can blame him? From his viewpoint it looks like even his own government is

cannot and will not defend. There are others that may sound excessive, but are necessary to meet accepted constituent services needs. The costs of the 70,000 flags flown over the Capitol, for instance, and requested by (and paid for by) many schools, civic organizations and individuals. A long-standing House tradition, but one that now costs \$22,000 just for the personnel needed to fly the flags. Printing costs and radio and TV studio costs are debatable, perhaps, but play an important role in my attempts to keep in constant communication with the people I serve. These programs, by the way, are discontinued during election periods to avoid charges of political use of the services.

The largest single expense item in my Congressional budget is travel. Even though I continue to believe that frequent contact with people I serve is absolutely essential (and it's cheaper for me to come to see them, than to expect large numbers of them to come to Washington). I have been making fewer trips back to the District and crowding more and more visits into each trip. Inflation has hit Congress, too, don't forget. The cost of airline tickets alone has almost doubled since I've been in office.

I'd also point out that I have returned a total of \$58,625.12 to the U.S. Treasury from my allowed

WASHINGTON, D.C.

Members of Congress have been patting themselves on the back all week, sharing congratulations for having passed a really tight federal budget resolution that is the first step toward putting this country back on sound financial footing.

I certainly cannot defend \$16,000 worth of new furniture to decorate three Republican and Democratic leaders' offices in the House, while the furniture used by their predecessors sits in storage.

Nor can I defend or justify the cost of maintaining a private gymnasium, swimming pool and attendants for Congressmen and I can't seem to find a Congressman who will admit to having time to ever use the facilities anyway.

There are many, many other individual items that I

More Allotments, Peanuts For '81

While the government has increased acreage allotments for the 1981 peanut crop to ease current short supplies, allotments—the heart of the peanut program—are in jeopardy under new farm program proposals.

Increased allotments will mean a bigger peanut crop in both Texas and the U.S. this year, points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Allotments have been upped 8 percent, but the poundage quota eligible for the 1981 rate was reduced the maximum 5 percent. Plantings should be up 2 percent in Texas and 4 percent across the nation. This means some 315,000 acres for Texas and 1.6 million acres nationwide.

Last year's drought cut peanut production sharply, with Texas farmers harvesting 42 percent fewer acres than in 1979.

both in Texas and across the nation, left peanut supplies for the current marketing year at about 3 billion pounds, one-third less than the previous year and the lowest in 11 years, points out Feagan.

Because of a good crop in 1979, peanut exports were the second highest on record during the 1979-80 marketing year. However, this year's exports will be limited due to the past season's drought-plagued crop. In fact, import quotas were increased to bring in more peanuts for domestic use, notes the economist.

With these low peanut supplies, farmers can generally expect good prices for their 1981 crop. Texas farmers averaged almost 31 cents a pound for their short crop last year while the national

However, farmers face higher costs and should consider forward contracting of their crops to reduce some of the risk, advocates Feagan. Contracts have been available at or around \$600 per ton for quota peanuts, with several types of contracts available for additional peanuts. Contracting allows growers to "lock in" a price for their crop and assures shellers of a peanut supply.

Sharply higher prices for high quality peanut planting seed are a key reason for rising production costs of the 1981 crop. Growers are paying anywhere from \$60 to more than \$100 per acre for good seed due to short supplies, notes the economist.

On the other hand, leasing of allotments is moving at a normal pace, with prices running 1.5 to 2 cents a pound. Arrangements for land and equipment vary.

Alcohol Plant In Operation

When the availability of fuel becomes more important to agricultural producers than the price, Texas A&M engineers will be able to tell them all about an available alternate fuel — ethyl alcohol or ethanol.

The engineers have been running a research and demonstration ethanol production plant for the last five months. It produces 184 proof alcohol from grain through a series of fermentation and distillation processes. It's just a matter of cooking the alcohol up, as Henry O'Neal explains.

"To this point we have used only grain sorghum and corn as the feedstock for making alcohol," O'Neal says. "The general process is to, first, grind the grain, put it into a cooker, add water and add an enzyme to keep the mixture liquid during the heating process."

"This mash is heated to just below boiling and cooked for about an hour. Then it is cooled down to between 95 degrees and 100 degrees F. Another enzyme is added to change the starch to sugar then yeast is added to begin the fermentation of the sugar."

It's allowed to ferment for three to four days, after which we have an alcohol concentration of about 10 percent," explains O'Neal. "Finally, the alcohol is distilled so we can get a high enough proof to use as a fuel."

The production plant at Texas A&M is a small-scale model and has less cooking

and fermenting capacity than an actual on-farm plant would have. The demonstration model has four cooking tanks, each with a 12½-bushel grain capacity, which gives the plant a 30-gallon per day production rate. Its distillation capacity is 10 gallons per hour.

"There are some residues left which are a good protein source for feeding livestock," O'Neal says. "We are easily recovering 8 pounds of 27 to 28 percent protein per bushel of grain that went into the cooker."

Many products can be fermented to produce ethanol, including wheat, potatoes, sugar cane, sweet sorghum and sugar beets. The engineers plan on testing the production potential of several feedstocks. Thus far, they have found that grain sorghum and corn both produce 2½ gallons of 184 proof ethanol per bushel.

"We will be using the alcohol we produce in a 1,000-hour engine test," O'Neal says, "so we can get a feel for any out-of-the-ordinary wear or maintenance that might have to be taken into account if we're going to use this alcohol as a fuel under long-term conditions."

The energy requirements of the plant and environmental and safety aspects of alcohol production are also

being studied.

Research and demonstration data are available to the public, and tours of the plant can be arranged through your local county Extension agent.

3 Arkansas Tech Men From Cisco JC Receive Honors

The West Texas Connection continues to play a vital role in Arkansas Tech University's athletic program. Head football coach Harold Steelman and his offensive line coach, Tom Rutledge, who also directs ATU's track and field program, hope the liaison never ends.

It all began four years ago when a husky Houstonian by the name of Mark Smith migrated to the Arkansas River Valley from Cisco Junior College and took domicile in Brown Hall, ATU's athletic dormitory. He immediately staked claim to the strong safety position in the Tech secondary and hit a "bonanza" his senior year, earning All-Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference honors as well as a spot on the All-Dist. 17 NAIA team.

Smith's successor, Lew Thompson of Pearsall, also an import from Cisco JC, has kept the West Texas influence strong in the Tech football camp. He ran out his eligibility string last fall after two seasons in Smith's old shoes, but he plans to remain on campus as a graduate assistant to defensive coordinator Phil Collins.

Assuring the Wonder Boys of at least three more years of West Texas flavor is 230-pound strong man Jimmy Smitherman of Crane, Texas, who ran track at Odessa JC one semester and played football last fall at Cisco JC before transferring to ATU in January. He wasn't eligible for track this spring but, by virtue of the one-semester rule adopted recently by the AIC, he will be eligible for football next fall.

Coach Rutledge, who recruited Smitherman, made arrangements for Jimmy and two other Tech midwestern transfers to compete against conference competition this spring as members of the Russellville Striders. Although their performances didn't qualify for points, they were good enough to instill high hopes in Rutledge for ATU's track and field future. Ditto, the offensive line in football.

Smitherman's best throws of the spring, 174 feet in the discus and 55 feet in the shotput, far outdistanced the conference's top marks. Rutledge already is considering "franchises" for Smitherman and sprinter-jumper T.C. Hagen, a second-semester transfer from the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville.

Both Steelman and Rutledge were impressed with Smitherman's blocking prowess and feats of strength in spring football. The Texan was the starting quick tackle on the winning White team in Tech's annual spring intrasquad game. He is a conspicuous figure in the Wonder Boys' new weight room at Stoupe Athletic Center where he has bench-pressed 375 pounds on the free bar, excelled only by burly noseguard Kenneth Bledsoe's 388 pounds.

"Barring unforeseen circumstances, Smitherman will be our starting quick tackle when we line up against Pine Bluff (the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff) on September 5," states Rutledge.

The two Tech coaches have been just as impressed with Smitherman off the field and both feel he has outstanding leadership qualities. A 3.0-point student majoring in economics, Jimmy also is a member of ATU's university choir.

Rutledge feels Smitherman has all the tools to become a bonafide pro prospect: "He's big (6-2 and 230) and strong, he's quick, he thinks fast on his feet, and he has a wonderful attitude. Moreover, he has the desire."

Smitherman, as have many other Tech athletes in the past, certainly will be exposed to the scrutiny of many pro scouts. Hardly a week goes by during football season that NFL scouts aren't among the sideline viewers. The Wonder Boys sport a good draft record, too. Most famous selection was Eddie Meador, an all-pro free safety for eight of the 12 years he was with the Los Angeles Rams. Most recent is cornerback Irvin Phillips, a third round choice of the San Diego Chargers. Others include Aubrey "Cob" Fowler (Baltimore), Bill Nelson (Minnesota), Rick Thone (Green Bay), Joe Hoing (Philadelphia), Benny Shepherd (Miami), Jeff Welch (Washington)

and Firman Bynum (Detroit).

Smitherman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Smitherman of Crane, was a four-year letterman as an offensive tackle and defensive end at Crane High School. He also served as the team captain his senior year. In addition to football and track, he also lettered two years as a postman on the basketball team. He had career bests of 59-9 in the shotput and 179-2 in the shot and discus, winning district and regional championships enroute to the state finals his senior year. His high school coaches were Joe Allen and Bob Hinds.

Rutledge, Tech's aggressive young head track coach and offensive line coach just a few years removed from Ouachita Baptist University, likes to recruit in Texas. He's had some good results this spring in East Texas (Paris, Tyler and Longview). But, he covets more from the plains of West Texas.

"I hope we can recruit more young men out of West Texas for football and track....they grow some good ones out there."

Rutledge lists as good selling points for Arkansas Tech "our excellent academic program, outstanding athletic program and the recreation opportunities that abound in our area."

Many Tech students take advantage of the water ski-

ing and fishing facilities of nearby Lake Dardanelle along with the deer, quail and turkey hunting that flourishes in the Ouachita Mountains to the South and the Ozark Forest to the

FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW

THE TEXAS REAL ESTATE LICENSE ACT

"SECTION 1. (a) This Act shall be known and may be cited as 'The Real Estate License Act.'

"(b) It is unlawful for a person to act in the capacity of, engage in the business of, or advertise or hold himself out as engaging in or conducting the business of a real estate broker or a real estate salesman within this state without first obtaining a real estate license from the Texas Real Estate Commission. It is unlawful for a person licensed as a real estate salesman to act or attempt to act as a real estate agent unless he is, at such time, associated with a licensed Texas real estate broker and acting for the licensed real estate broker.

"(c) Each real estate broker licensed pursuant to this Act is responsible to the commission, members of the public, and his clients for all acts and conduct performed under this Act by himself or by a real estate salesman associated with or acting for the broker.

"(d) No real estate salesman shall accept compensation for real estate sales and transactions from any person other than the broker under whom he is at the time licensed.

"(e) No real estate salesman shall pay a commission to any person except through the broker under whom he is at the time licensed.

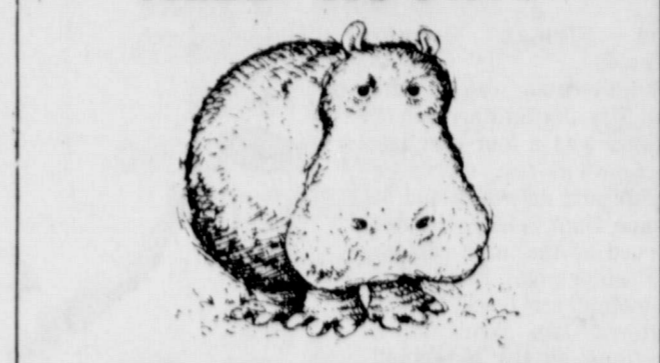
