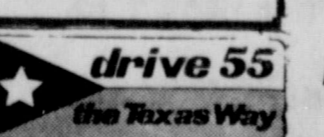

Appraisal Of All Taxable Property In County Now Underway

The task of appraisal of all taxable property within Eastland County has been underway for several weeks now. The work is being done in order for the taxing jurisdictions of the County to be in compliance with tax legislation passed by the 1979 legislature. The legislation

requires that all property be valued equally according to categories and placed on the tax rolls at 100% assessment ratios by 1982. A central appraisal office was created for each county within the state to see that this job was done by the 1982 deadline.

The Eastland County Appraisal District has retained the firm of McMorries and Company, a professional valuation firm, to do the work as required by the law.

Field men for McMorries and Company have been at work for several weeks within the County. They have completed work in the Rising Star area and are wrapping up work in the Carbon area as well. Work has also been going on in the Cisco area. Crews will begin in the Eastland and Gorman area within the next few days.

When the field men visit the property owner they will identify themselves before doing any work. In the event the property owner is not at home, the proper identification will be left in the door or mailbox before they measure and classify the improvement. Representatives of the firm have stressed that it is not necessary for them to enter the house. They can get the information they need from their measurements of the outside and by asking the property owner a few questions.

Work is expected to take several more months but hopefully will be completed by about November. As stated above, this work is being done in order for the taxing jurisdictions to meet the 1982 deadline established by the legislation for implementation. The values established through this appraisal will not be used for 1981. If you have any questions concerning the appraisal, please contact the local school district tax office.

Splashin' Around

Sign Up For July 4 Swimming Activities

Attention all swimmers, splashers and divers! It's time again to sign up and prepare for the annual 4th of July Swimming Pool Festivities, which will include swimming races, splashing and diving contests, chicken fights, and fun and surprises for all. There will be no admission charge on Saturday, July 4, and the pool will be open from 12 noon until 6:00 p.m. The festivities will begin at 10:00 a.m. punctually, so make sure if you plan to participate, you are there before 10 a.m.

Gene Abbott, Chamber of Commerce manager, will m.c. the event, and will be assisted by three to five judges who will be announced later.

The contests will be broken down into four age groups in order that all entrants may be more evenly matched. The age groups will be beginner (6-9 yr.), advanced beginner (10-12), intermediate (13-15), and advanced (16 and over).

There will be four swimming races; the beginners' race will be the width of the pool; advanced beginners will have to swim one length of the pool; intermediate swimmers two lengths of the pool, and advanced swimmers three lengths. All races will be free-style, which means the swimmer may

choose any stroke which he prefers.

The diving contests will be judged by two criteria: (1) how neat and smooth the entry into the water; (2) the difficulty factor of the execution of the dive (i.e., forward 1 1/2, jackknife, etc.)

The splashing contests will also be judged on two criteria: (1) the size of splash (height and width), (2) the difficulty factor of the maneuver used to enter the splashing position (backwards flip, gainer, etc.)

Ribbons will be awarded for all winners and placers. There will be no limit placed on the amount of entrants for each contest, but in order that we might better plan and organize the festivities, please sign up as quickly as possible at the City Pool. (If we are planning for 20 people to enter swimming contests and 60 show up, things will be mass confusion...please help us avoid this by signing up early!)

Honoring Late Dancer

Lebanon To Stage Ralph Sloan Days

Lebanon, Tenn. - The first Ralph Sloan Days, featuring song and dance, will be staged at Potter Park here on July 17 and 18, according to Mayor Willis H. (Tex) Maddox.

The two-day event - in honor of the late "King of Square Dance" - will include competition by gospel groups, square dance groups, buck dancing, blue grass bands, novelty acts, fiddlers, banjo pickers and harmonica players. It is hoped this will become an annual event.

For anyone to enter this contest call the Chamber of Commerce in Lebanon (615) 444-5503, Laura Bentley Director.

The gospel group competition will lead off the program at 7 p.m., Friday, July 17. Competition of the dancers and musicians will start at 10 a.m., Saturday, July 18, the mayor said.

"We'll rope off some side streets by Potter Park, but we won't halt traffic on the Public Square," said Laura Bentley, executive director of the Lebanon and Wilson County Chamber of Commerce.

Thirty-six years ago, an unknown by the name of Ralph Sloan started keeping the door at the Cedars of Lebanon State Park.

It was here that he learned to square dance - an art that kept him and his Tennessee Travelers on the stage of the Grand Ole Opry for 25 years.

And it was right here in Lebanon at the Cedars that he taught many of his dancers how to do the fast country steps. During his tenure on the Opry and performing nationwide, he has taught a total of 125 square dancers.

The star of That Nashville Music, Ralph Sloan drew more mail than any other artists on the show. He would dance before 10,000,000 people a week on the syndicated program.

For a man who didn't think he could learn to dance, Ralph Sloan had battled 1,000.

"Square dancing is like baseball," once confided the husky-built caller-dancer who presented one of the liveliest acts ever to draw center stage of the Opry House.

"You've got to practice, practice, practice to achieve perfection."

His dancing was mostly a free-lance step with each

member of the troupe doing their own thing to a set pattern. However, the intricate figures and patterns were carefully rehearsed before being shown to an audience.

Sloan selected his dancers on the basis of rhythm and coordination. And they never missed a scheduled Opry appearance.

The audience loved them. The group has continued under leadership of one of its members, and still thrills crowds.

Ralph Sloan was an optimistic man. Even with a lengthy bout of illness before his untimely death, he made plans for exhibitions and Opry work.

And he was equally optimistic about life. "Make yourself think you are going to be one of the best in the world," he often told me. "And before long, you probably will be. At least, you'll think you are."

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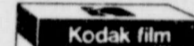

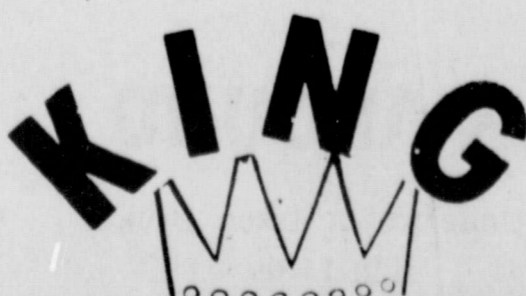

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Don't Play With Fireworks They Are Not Toys!

With Independence Day approaching the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness is once again issuing what has become its annual warning: "Don't Play with Fireworks; They are not Toys!"

"Fireworks are dangerous projectiles that injure thousands of Americans each year," says R.E. Margo, M.D., State Medical Chairman of the Society. "Last year alone 9,400 people were treated in hospital

emergency rooms for fireworks caused injuries, 1,700 of these were injuries to the eyes, a regrettable increase of nearly 40% over the number reported the preceding year. The figures, moreover, represent only a fraction of the problem because they don't include injuries treated in doctor's offices or those admitted directly into the hospital."

"The sale of fireworks is illegal in many Texas cities," Dr. Margo noted, "but efforts to extend the law statewide have been stalled. The 1981 Legislature passed a bill which limits the amount of explosives allowed in fireworks, but does not restrict their sale." "This means that the same eye-damaging fireworks, especially bottle and sky rockets, will once again be available in Texas. And con-

trary to what salesmen may claim, there is no such thing as a 'safe' firecracker. Even sparklers, which often thought of as harmless, can sizzle at temperatures over 1500 degrees. A burn to the eye at that temperature can impair sight for a long time, even for a lifetime." "The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness directs its July Fourth warning to parents in particular," Dr. Margo stressed, "because youngsters under 19 yearly suffer two-thirds of all reported injuries. Most of the accidents also occur at

home, an environment that parents can control." To keep the Fourth the happy holiday it is meant to be, the Society urges parents not to purchase fireworks this year. Take the family instead to a safe, licensed public display," Dr. Margo concluded. The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness is an affiliate of the National Society to Prevent Blindness, the oldest voluntary health agency nationally engaged in preventing blindness through community service

programs, public and professional education and research.

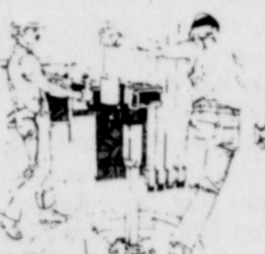

FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW

THE TEXAS REAL ESTATE LICENSE ACT

"SECTION 15. The commission may, on its own motion, and shall, on the verified complaint in writing of any person, provided the complaint, or the complaint together with evidence, documentary or otherwise, presented in connection with the complaint, provides reasonable cause, investigate the actions and records of a real estate broker or real estate salesman. The commission may suspend or revoke a license issued under the provisions of this Act at any time when it has been determined that:

"(L) placing a sign on real property offering it for sale, lease, or rent without the written consent of the owner or his authorized agent; or

"(M) inducing or attempting to induce a party to a contract of sale or lease to break the contract for the purpose of substituting in lieu thereof a new contract; or

"(N) negotiating or attempting to negotiate the sale, exchange, lease, or rental of real property with an owner or lessor, knowing that the owner or lessor had a written outstanding contract, granting exclusive agency in connection with the property to another real estate broker; or

"(O) offering real property for sale or for lease without the knowledge and consent of the owner or his authorized agent, or on terms other than those authorized by the owner or his authorized agent; or

"(P) publishing, or causing to be published, an advertisement including, but not limited to, advertising by newspaper, radio, television, or display which is misleading, or which is likely to deceive the public, or which in any manner tends to create a misleading impression, or which fails to identify the person causing the advertisement to be published as a licensed real estate broker or agent; or

"(Q) having knowingly withheld from or inserted in a statement of account or invoice, a statement that made it inaccurate in a material particular; or

"(R) publishing or circulating an unjustified or unwarranted threat of legal proceedings, or other action; or

"(S) establishing an association, by employment or otherwise, with an unlicensed person who is expected or required to act as a real estate licensee, or aiding or abetting or conspiring with a person to circumvent the requirements of this Act; or

"(T) failing or refusing on demand to furnish copies of a document pertaining to a transaction dealing with real estate to a person whose signature is affixed to the document; or

"(U) failing to advise a purchaser in writing before the closing of a transaction that the purchaser should either have the abstract covering the real estate which is the subject of the contract examined by an attorney of the purchaser's own selection, or be furnished with or obtain a policy of title insurance; or ...

IWU Reflections in Perspective

She was attractive, appeared to be in the late thirties or early forties in the age department. Comfortably and tastefully dressed in a soft cotton print house dress. And she was very much the lady. Wearing also a white hat which could have been categorized as either a fishing hat, a tennis hat, a work-in-the-garden hat or just a general step-outside hat; she plead the case of her husband with soft-spoken intensity.

The manner in which she came to his defense, and the sincerity with which she plead his case was nothing sort of refreshing. Not the strident-fishwife voice; quite softly, she spoke, and articulately. But her defense was somewhat disoriented.

No; she was not keeping her eye on the speedometer. No, she could not testify under oath that the car was not travelling at a speed far in excess of the legal limit. The problem was contained in a question which this fledgling court has already heard more times than once...why, when travelling in a veritable convoy of other vehicles, trucks and cars in front of us and behind us, all apparently going at the same speed did the trooper have to single us out of the pack? Why didn't all the other cars receive a summons?

To that question there is seldom an answer which suits the offender before the Court, but the only one I can think of is that this Court can only hear the case of those who did receive the summons while perhaps joining with the offender in wondering about the ones that got away. However, this Court is inclined to leave the determining of degree of violation to the qualified troopers who are trained and expert in their field.

"It is just a speed trap". She said, still without raising her voice above conversational level. "Madame" I responded, bristling inwardly. "That is an indictment which this Court does not take lightly. It has connotations which conjure up sinister pictures of a red-necked judge crouching behind a decrepit desk in a gravy- and soup-stained white shirt, expect-

torating noisily and inaccurately at a nearby cuspidor before turning to the equally red-necked arresting officer with a grin which is almost a leer as he then faces the accused with a growling "Twentyfi dollah. Pay or go to jail". It is the desire and intent of this Court to dispense equal justice under the law. It is likewise the sworn obligation of this Court to uphold the Law. This Court is inclined to accept the testimony of the arresting officer in this case, and having done so is compelled under the law to impose a sentence. And you may be assured that there is no feeling of malice associated with the imposition of the sentence".

THE SOUTHERN MAGNOLIA

The Southern Magolia is an evergreen and a leaf-losing tree and a shrub, many of them having large and attractive flowers which place them among the most decorative occupants of our gardens. Some kinds flower in earliest spring in advance of the leaves, others flower in later spring, and still others during summer and

early autumn. Some have attractive fruits.

The hardy kinds are found wild in the Himalayas, China, Japan and North America, but there are also hybrids, some of which can be grown in colder districts than most wild kinds.

Magnolia gives its name to the family Magnoliaceae, and the name commemorates Pierre Magnolia, Professor of Botany and Director of the Botanic Gardens, Mont-

pellier, during the latter part of the seventeenth and the early part of the eighteenth centuries.

The fruits of the Magnolias are often conelike and brightly colored. When the seeds are ripe, they are released from the fruits, but are held for a few days by short silky threads before falling to the ground.

The Southern Magnolia is not the slow growing tree that so many people seem to think it is. It can be made to grow at an unusually fast rate, according to the horticulturists at North Carolina State University.

The "slow-grow" reputation may have become attached to the Southern Magnolia because it is so often planted and neglected. Under those conditions it probably will not grow fast.

With proper soil preparation and fertilization, it will grow rapidly. It could grow 20 feet tall in less than 10 years.

Here's the formula for such growth: Start with a large tree, around four to five feet tall, if possible. The hole should be three to four feet across and two to three feet deep.

Thoroughly mix in some form of organic matter with the soil removed from the hole. Use about one-third peat moss, leaf mold, pine bark or similar substance. Plant the tree NO deeper than it grew in the nursery. Mulch with pine straw or similar material to a depth of about two to three inches of settled mulch. Extend the mulch tree feet from the trunk.

Water during any dry period, especially during the first and second growing seasons. Fertilize twice a year with a balanced fertilizer, such as 8-8-8. Apply one cup of fertilizer per inch of trunk diameter. This should be done each spring and repeated in midsummer. Soak the fertilizer into the soil.

The Southern Magnolia has been proved to be winter hardy as far North as Washington, D.C. Do not discount this beautiful flowering tree when you are planning to add trees to your landscape when it will grow fast with proper attention.

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Tick Picking Should Be New Pastime

This summer Texans should engage in a new outdoor pastime: tick picking. With Rocky Mountain spotted fever appearing in the state, tick removal is even more important than just wanting to get rid of the pests. Some types of ticks can spread the fever which killed a four year old Central Texas boy early this summer, although the disease only occasionally is fatal, the Texas Medical Association says.

Not all types of ticks carry the fever and not all ticks who can carry it do so, but tick picking is an easy way to be sure you're safe. It needs to be done anyway to keep from carrying them home where they might drop off in the house. The trick is to get ticks before they bite. Ticks usually tour the victim for about four hours before settling in for a snack so you have a chance to get them off easily if you check every four hours.

Ticks particularly like to dine in areas where clothing is snug, such as skin near waistbands and sock tops. However, they will munch anywhere so a thorough body inspection is recommended. Remember to

check hair line, ears and areas covered by underwear.

Once a tick settles in, it is easy to pull it off but leave the head still embedded, which sometimes can become infected.

There are several methods for tick removal. The most controversial and the easiest, is to pull the tick off carefully and slowly, using a cloth, tissue or tweezers to keep from touching the tick directly since accidentally crushing and touching a tick may spread disease, too. The controversy arises because some people think it is too easy to leave the head by merely pulling the tick off. Supporters say this method works quicker and better than other ways.

Other methods are designed to get the tick to evacuate on its own. One method is to give the tick a hot seat by holding a recently extinguished match very near it. Another way cuts off its air by applying a thick covering of petroleum jelly or some other substance and waiting about 15 minutes.

The family pet also should be inspected regularly for ticks since the ticks later may decide to have a human meal. Using an insecticide

safe for pets may help decrease this problem.

Rocky Mountain spotted fever, the disease which makes ticks more unwelcome than usual, usually occurs in northeast Texas within 100 miles of the Oklahoma border. However, the fever ticks can show up in many areas.

From three to 12 days after being bitten by an infected tick, the victim develops headache, chills, muscular pains and feels exhausted. A few days after this misery starts, a rash develops that is the telltale sign of Rocky Mountain spotted fever. Early treatment by a physician can help prevent serious consequences.

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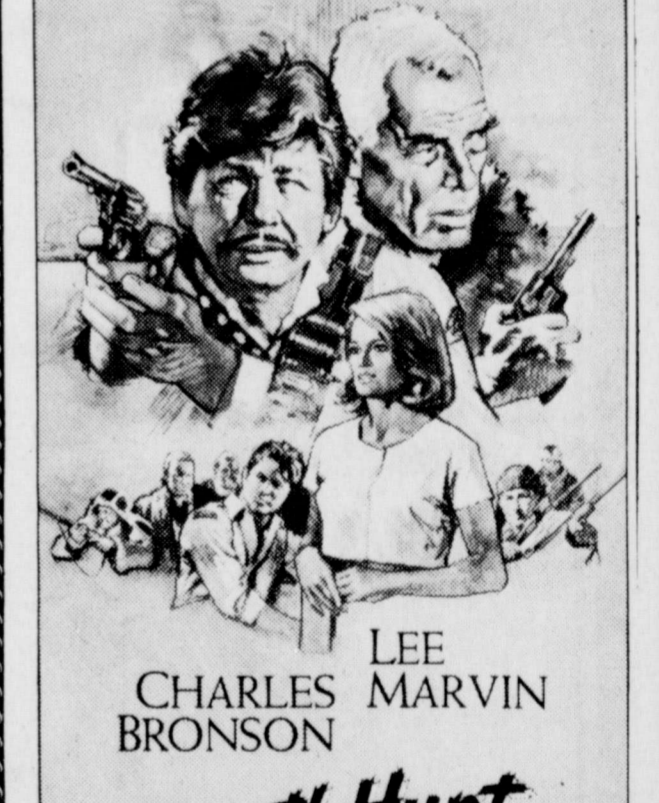

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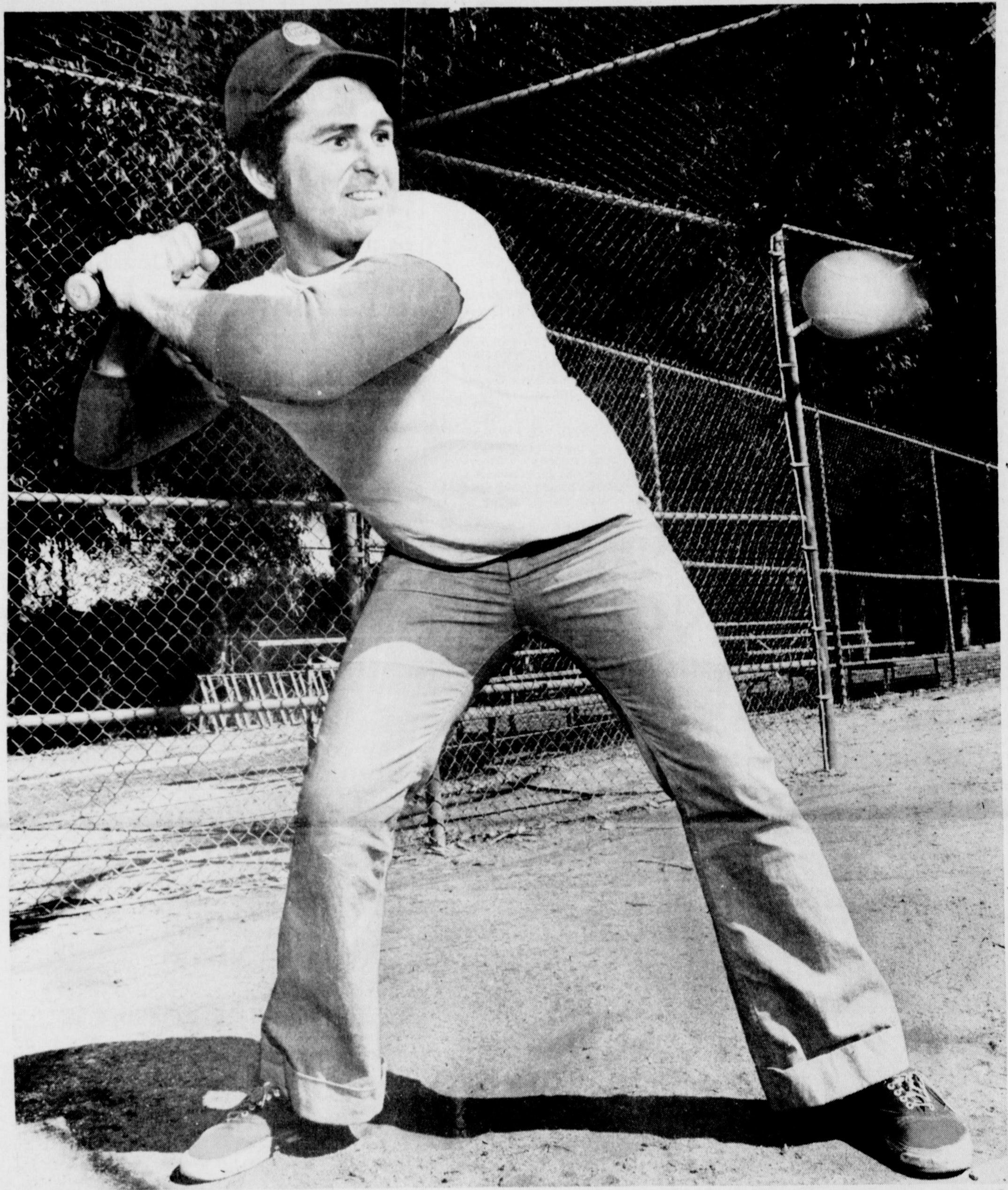

Agriculture Strong But Farmers Under Pressure

THRALL—Agriculture is one of the strongest industries in this country, but unless our farmers get some help, we could see a food crisis by the end of this decade, State Rep. Dan Kubiak told a gathering of some 700 at the annual Stiles Farm Foundation Field Day here June 16.

"The production of wholesome food will be a major concern in the years ahead unless steps are taken now to remedy the plight of farmers," Kubiak, of Rockdale, stressed. "Without agriculture, this country would be on its knees.

Agriculture must become the concern of both producers and consumers," Kubiak emphasized. "The cost-price squeeze and the limitation of natural resources that our farmers face are issues that must be addressed. Interest rates and fuel costs are simply too high for our farmers to cope with."

For agriculture to survive and for our food needs to be met, farmers must make

better use of marginal land, they must make better use of water, and they must lower their energy requirements and other input costs, the state legislator pointed out.

Kubiak noted that "agriculture is strong in Texas because of our abundant natural resources, our strategic geographical location, and our resourceful people and leaders."

He lauded the work of Texas of Texas A&M University and its agencies, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, for their work in making agriculture what it is today in the state and for futuristic thinking in dealing with the many problems that lie ahead. "The work here at Stiles Farm (conducted by the Experiment Station and Extension Service) demonstrates a total management system designed to increase production," Kubiak added.

"Dollar-wise, we have the best research institute in Texas A&M University among

those found anywhere in this country," he said. "Our investment in agricultural research and Extension programs are the best use of state funds that we can make. Agriculture in Texas produces a 40 to 50 % return for every dollar invested. No other industry can make that claim.

"For agriculture to survive in the years ahead, we must do something about spiraling property taxes and high interest rates, and we need to produce more of our own energy," said Kubiak. "We also need to do more in the area of market development for our agricultural products, and that's why I'm calling on the speaker (House Speaker Bill Clayton)

to name a special committee to deal with this key issue."

Kubiak noted that he is concerned about the present decline in agricultural production that has led to rising food costs and the high average of farmers in this country today—59.7 years. "we need more young people in agriculture, and we need to work hard to increase production if we are to survive as a nation," he said.

Prior to Kubiak's address, field day visitors had an opportunity to see and hear about various phases of crop and livestock production under way at Stiles Farm. Discussions centered on fish farming, sorghum varieties, brucellosis research, soil and water conservation

programs, gardening, swine production, and replacement heifer management and bull selection.

Information booths highlighted insect pest management, cotton production, forage sorghums, swine production, program-able calculators in agriculture, rodent control, ornamental plants, and weather and agriculture.

Ten Central Texas high school graduates were recognized as recipients of Stiles Farm Foundation Scholarships valued at \$500 a year to study agriculture at Texas A&M University. The four interns were selected from a field of 56 applicants, of whom nine were interviewed by a special committee selected from the district by Stenholm.

"I am extremely impressed with Congressman Stenholm and the job he is doing in representing the district," commented Hawari. "For a sophomore legislator, his is an important voice as the coordinator of the Conservative Democratic Forum (CDF) on matters such as the budget and tax cuts. From reading the mail, I can see that Congressman Stenholm reflects the ideals and wishes of his constituents. And believe it or not, he reads all constituent mail and signs every letter. That's more of an exception than a rule here on Capitol Hill."

"Despite the view of many Americans that Congress and the federal government in general is comprised of lazy bureaucrats, at least from what I've seen the vast majority work hard and do their best to deal with the broad and complex problems that confront them every day," Hawari said. "Probably 80 percent of the Congressman's mail involves constituent casework and requests for help or information. The Congressman and his staff do a fantastic job of providing personal attention and assistance to these people."

"But in four weeks here, I've probably learned more about the actual workings of Congress than I ever did in class. There's just no comparison." 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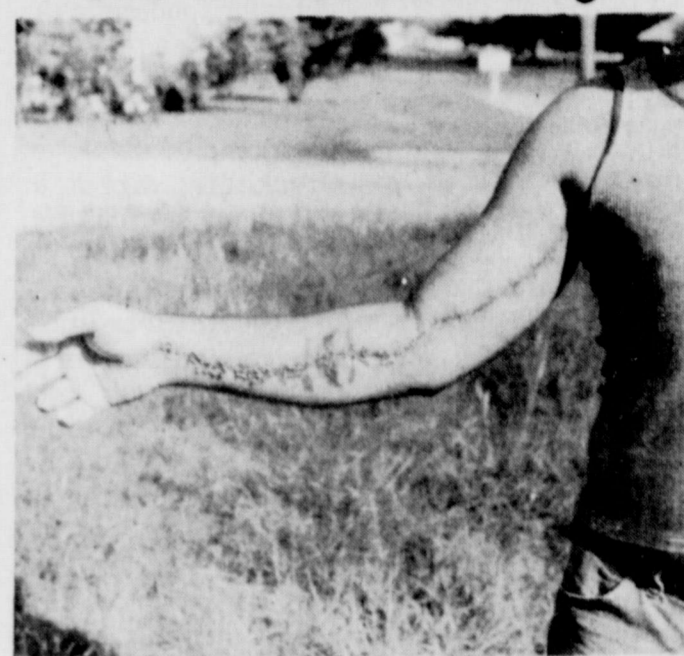

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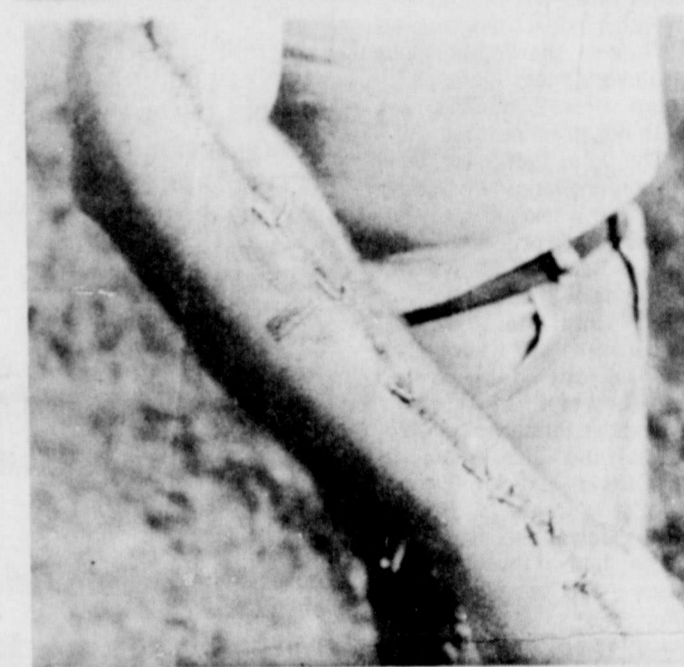
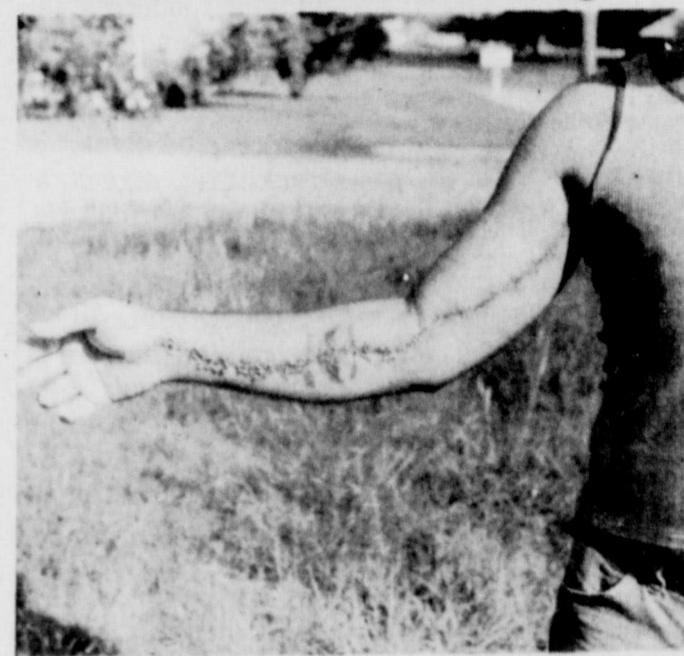
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
