Appraisal Of All Taxable Property In County Now Underway

The task of appraisal of all taxable property within Eastland County has been underway for several weeks now. The work is being done in order for the taxing jurisdictions of the County to be in compliance with tax legislation passed by the 1979 legislature. The legislation requires that all property be valued equally according to categories and placed on the tax rolls at 100% assessment ratios by 1982. A central appraisal office was created for each county within the state to see that this job was done by the 1982 deadline.

The Eastland County Appraisal District has retained the firm of McMorries and Company, a professional valuation firm, to do the work as required by the law. Field men for McMorries and Company have been at work for several weeks within the County. They have completed work in the Rising Star area and are wrapping up work in the Carbon area as well. Work has also been going on in the Cisco area. Crews will begin in the Eastland and Gorman area within the next few days. When the field men visit the property owner they will identify themselves before doing any work. In the event the property owner is not at home, the proper identifica-

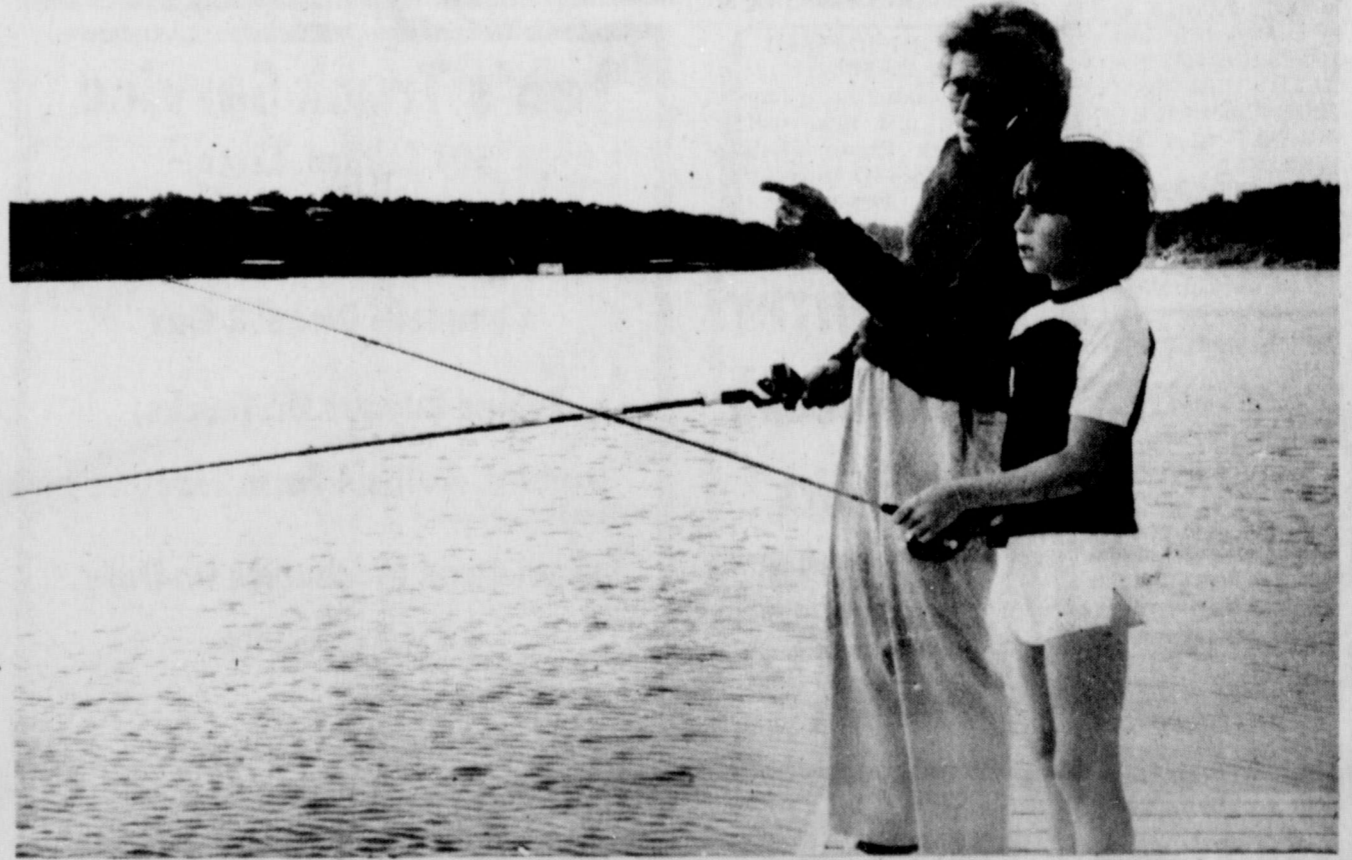

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Transportation Issues Addressed At Statewide Hearing

AUSTIN--More than 300 representatives of transportation industries, shippers, cities, and the general public

attended a statewide hearing conducted by the Railroad Commission in San Antonio Thursday.

All three members of the Commission -- Chairman Jim Nugent and Commissioners Mack Wallace and Buddy Temple -- participated in the hearing.

Nugent set the tone in his opening remarks saying, "The principal purpose of this meeting is to provide a forum in which motor and rail carriers, shippers, local officials and any other interested persons can address transportation issues. We want to hear about your problems, your suggested cures, and particularly what you think the Commission is doing right or wrong."

According to Nugent, federal legislative initiatives have a potentially large impact on the state. "The Motor Carrier Act, the Staggers Rail Act, and the proposed Motor Bus Act represent major intrusions into state affairs," he said. "As the largest state, where in-

trastate rules have played a larger role than usual, Texas transportation stands to undergo the greatest disruption by the Washington upheaval."

Heading the list of speakers from the floor was Mayor Henry Cisneros of San Antonio who expressed the hope that the Commission would assist the city in developing truck and rail links with the port of Corpus Christi. He said this was very important to get waterborne transit from the Gulf to the San Antonio area.

"I see that as very good for San Antonio because it makes it possible for us to try and attract industry with freight rates that we presently can't offer because of our land-locked situation," he said.

Some trucking industry participants expressed their concern that the rates they were allowed to charge were not keeping pace with inflation. Kenneth Hofmann of Highway Pipeline Trucking

Company indicated the goal should be to have today's rates reflect today's costs. Several in the standing-

room-only crowd spoke highly of the transportation industry in Texas and the work the Commission is doing. Joseph Chandler of Red

Arrow Freight Lines said, "I think it's an undisputed fact that the intrastate motor common carriers in Texas are the finest in the nation and we want to keep it that way."

Tim Herman, a private attorney present for the hearing lauded the Commission's Transportation Division saying, "From the director down to the examiners you have a quality group of people. The level of expertise and professionalism is high and I commend you."

This was the second such statewide meeting called by the Commission to receive comments on surface transportation in Texas. Some 200 people attended the first meeting held in Austin in 1979.

Pecan Nut Casebearer

Gordon Woolam The heavy Pecan crop set by area Pecan trees is possibly the best in recent years. Recent rains have helped to increase the size of the nuts. Thus far this season promises to be a good one for Pecan growers.

The first generation Pecan Nut Casebearer infestation was very light locally this year. The first eggs were found in area orchards on May 22nd. The recommended spray date was set for May 25th. But because of the rains spraying was missed by some growers. However, nut loss due to the Pecan Nut Casebearer remained light.

The low level of nut loss was probably due to the weather. Late season cool

fronts in early to mid May and rains in late May reduced the Moth activity and prevented a large egg lay.

Two or three days after adult female moths emerge, they deposit from 60 to 150 eggs on the tips of nuts. Larva hatch from eggs in 4 or 5 days and migrate to buds below the nuts to feed. After a day or two they enter the nuts, usually at the base. Frequently several or all of the buds are destroyed. Upon reaching maturity, larvae pupate in nuts and emerge as adults approximately 42 to 45 days later.

Those Pecan Nut Casebearers which have survived to maturity will be emerging soon (42 days after hatch). These emerging

adults will be mating and laying eggs for the second generation. The second generation Pecan Nut Casebearer has historically not been much of a problem in the area. However, they should not be taken lightly. Populations of the first generation may have built up in unmanaged native trees. Local growers should begin inspecting their trees for the second generation Casebearer on about the 4th or 5th of July. This is not a projected spray date but merely an alert to begin watching for the second generation.

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Public Education: America's Strength

What keeps America strong? That's a perfect question for the Fourth of July, and this year, in Minneapolis, over 10,000 Americans have an answer: public education. The 10,000--Americans from every corner of the country--are spending their July 4 at the 119th Annual Meeting of the National Education Association, the biggest and the oldest education group in the United States. They've made

"Public Education: America's Strength" their theme for 1981. The theme is actually as old as our nation. For more than 200 years, the greatest Americans have always recognized the importance of education to America's strength and freedom. "Knowledge is in every country the surest basis of public happiness," George Washington told congress in 1790. "To the security of a free Constitution it con-

tributes in various ways: by convincing those who are entrusted with the public administration that every valuable end of government is best answered by the enlightened confidence of the people, and by teaching the people themselves to know and value their own rights." But even before President Washington addressed himself on "teaching the people," and even before the Constitution was adopted in 1789, the generation of 1776 had committed federal government support for public schools. In ordinance of 1785 the Continental Congress

decreed that a lot be reserved in every township "for the maintenance of public schools" and, in the ordinance of 1787 that established the Northwest Territory (Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and eastern Minnesota), Congress reinforced that concept. Down through the years Presidents have often initiated education programs, using the prestige of their office in the effort. In private correspondence, public addresses and messages to Congress, the record is filled with Presidential interest in the advancement of public education.

Many remember Thomas Jefferson's famous statement, "If a nation expects to be ignorant and free in a state of civilization, it expects what never was and never will be." Less well known is an excerpt from a letter Jefferson wrote to a Virginia friend: "I am now entirely absorbed in endeavors to effect the establishment of a general system of education in my native state..." Jefferson went on to cite the need for "elementary schools which shall give to the children of every citizen, gratis, competent instruction" as part of a "triple basis" for education that would also include "colleges within a day's ride" and a state university. Abraham Lincoln, in an

1832 address to his home county folk in Illinois, made a similar point. "For my part," said Lincoln, "I desire to see the time when education--and its means morality, sobriety, enterprise and industry--shall become much more general than at present." Education is, he told his listeners, "the most important subject which we as a people can be engaged in." Theodore Roosevelt, in a 1905 address to the National Education Association, declared: "The children, wherever they have been born, wherever their parents have been born, who are educated in our schools side by side with another, will inevitably grow up having that sense of mutual sympathy and mutual respect and

understanding which is absolutely indispensable for working out the problems that we as citizens have before us." Teddy Roosevelt's contemporary, Woodrow Wilson, couldn't agree more. "Without popular education," Wilson once wrote, "no government which rests upon popular action can long endure." Added Franklin Roosevelt

Sunday, July 5, 1981 in a 1935 message to teachers published in the NEA Journal: "It is your duty, no less than mine, to look beyond the narrow confines of the schoolroom; to see that education provides strength, and security for those institutions we have treasured since we first established ourselves as a nation and shall continue everlastingly to cherish."

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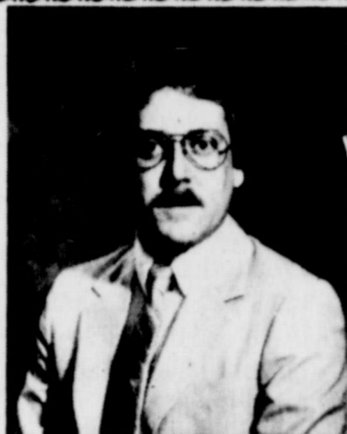

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"SECTION 15. The commission may, on its own motion, and shall, on the verified complaint in writing of any person, provided the complaint, or the complaint together with evidence, documentary or otherwise, presented in connection with the complaint, provides reasonable cause, investigate the actions and records of a real estate broker or real estate salesman. The commission may suspend or revoke a license issued under the provisions of this Act at any time when it has been determined that:

"(L) placing a sign on real property offering it for sale, lease, or rent without the written consent of the owner or his authorized agent; or

"(M) inducing or attempting to induce a party to a contract of sale or lease to break the contract for the purpose of substituting in lieu thereof a new contract; or

"(N) negotiating or attempting to negotiate the sale, exchange, lease, or rental of real property with an owner or lessor, knowing that the owner or lessor had a written outstanding contract, granting exclusive agency in connection with the property to another real estate broker; or

"(O) offering real property for sale or for lease without the knowledge and consent of the owner or his authorized agent, or on terms other than those authorized by the owner or his authorized agent; or

"(P) publishing, or causing to be published, an advertisement including, but not limited to, advertising by newspaper, radio, television, or display which is misleading, or which is likely to deceive the public, or which in any manner tends to create a misleading impression, or which fails to identify the person causing the advertisement to be published as a licensed real estate broker or agent; or

"(Q) having knowingly withheld from or inserted in a statement of account or invoice, a statement that made it inaccurate in a material particular; or

"(R) publishing or circulating an unjustified or unwarranted threat of legal proceedings, or other action; or

"(S) establishing an association, by employment or otherwise, with an unlicensed person who is expected or required to act as a real estate licensee, or aiding or abetting or conspiring with a person to circumvent the requirements of this Act; or

"(T) failing or refusing on demand to furnish copies of a document pertaining to a transaction dealing with real estate to a person whose signature is affixed to the document; or

"(U) failing to advise a purchaser in writing before the closing of a transaction that the purchaser should either have the abstract covering the real estate which is the subject of the contract examined by an attorney of the purchaser's own selection, or be furnished with or obtain a policy of title insurance; or . . .



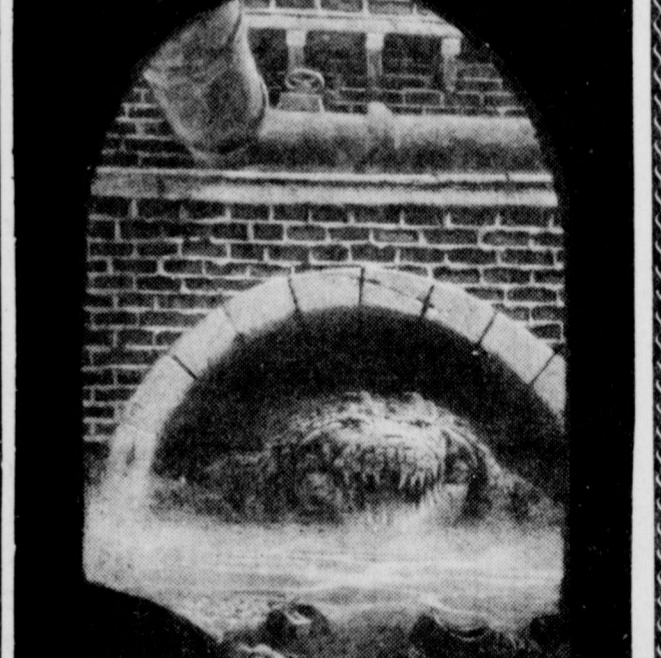

An Expression Of The American Mind

"We hold these truths to be
self-evident, that all men are
created equal, that they are
endowed by their Creator

with certain unalienable
Rights, that among these are
Life, Liberty and the pursuit
of Happiness."

These words, of course,
are from the American
Declaration of Inde-
pendence, the 205th an-
niversary of which we
celebrate this July 4.

Thomas Jefferson once
described these words and
the Declaration of Inde-
pendence itself as an ex-
pression of the American
mind. Having composed the
Declaration, Jefferson
devoted the remaining years
of his life to explaining these
self-evident truths and draw-
ing out their consequences
for the experiment in self-
government that he and his
compatriots had begun. It is
a fitting occasion to reflect
upon Jefferson's life's work
and his ideas, which remain
in their essence an expres-
sion of the American mind
today.

All of Jefferson's political
principles flowed from the
fundamental fact, that
"self-evident truth," of
human equality. Because
men were equal, no man
could claim by nature or by
the grace of God any rightful
power over any other man.
Because men were created
equal, therefore, they were
created free. "The God who
gave us life, gave us liberty
at the same time," wrote
Jefferson. Furthermore,
because no man had a
natural right to rule over his
equals, government could be
justly established only if
men agreed to establish it.
As Jefferson wrote in the
Declaration, "Governments
are instituted among men,
deriving their just powers
from the consent of the
governed."

Men could form various
kinds of governments

through consent, but Jeffer-
son had no doubt about
which was the best form. As
he wrote, "From the mo-
ment that to preserve our
rights a change of govern-
ment became necessary, no
doubt could be entertained
that a republican form was
the most consonant with
reason, with rights, with the
freedom of man."

What is the defining
characteristic of republican
government? "The first
principle of republicanism,"
wrote Jefferson, is that ma-
jority rule "is the fundamen-
tal law of every society of in-
dividuals of equal rights."
"This law once disregard-
ed," he warned, "no other
remains but that of force."

Equality, freedom, con-
sent, majority rule—these
were the elements of Jeffer-
son's understanding of self-
government. "Every man,
and every body of men on
earth, possess the right of
self-government. They
receive it with their being
from the hand of nature."
Nevertheless, Jefferson
understood that men did not

automatically know how to
exercise their right of self-
government. "The qualifica-
tions for self-government in
society are not innate. They
are the reward of habit and
long training."

If men were to respect the
rights of others, they had
first to learn to subdue their
own selfish passions. This
was an extraordinary de-
mand and would indeed take
habituation and training if
men were to comply with it.
But every man had to learn
to govern his passions, if a
nation's self-government
were to survive. Even ma-
jority rule, "the fundamen-
tal law" of republicanism,
was not a law unto itself. In
his first inaugural Jefferson
spoke of the "sacred princi-
ple, that though the will of
the majority is in all cases to
prevail, that will, to be
rightful, must be
reasonable; that the majori-
ty possess their equal right,
which equal laws must pro-
tect." Self-government
meant ruling those passions
that would otherwise lead

men to ignore the rights of
others and to subject the
minority to inequality before
the law.

Jefferson believed that the
American people were
capable of self-government,
and so he worked with his
fellow patriots to put the
government into their hands.
In so doing, however, Jeffer-
son did not feel that he was
acting only for Americans.
"It is impossible not to be
sensible that we are acting
for all mankind; that cir-
cumstances denied to others
but indulged to us, have im-

posed on us the duty of prov-
ing what is the degree of
freedom and self-
government in which a soci-
ety may venture to leave its
individual members."

More than 200 years after
Jefferson and his com-
patriots began our experi-
ment in free government, the
experiment and the duty

Sunday, July 5, 1981

is still ours. In fulfilling this
duty we may take comfort in
the words of the last letter
that Jefferson wrote in his
life. Too ill to attend the
celebration in Washington of
the fiftieth anniversary of
the signing of the Declara-
tion of Independence, Jeffer-
son, who would die on that
anniversary, wrote to the
Mayor of Washington that
"all eyes are opened, or
opening, to the rights of
man...The mass of mankind
had not been born with sad-
dles on their backs, nor a
favored few booted and spur-
red ready to ride them
legitimately, by the grace of
God. These are grounds of
hope for others. For our-
selves, let the annual
return of this day forever
refresh our recollections of
these rights, and an un-
diminished devotion to
them."

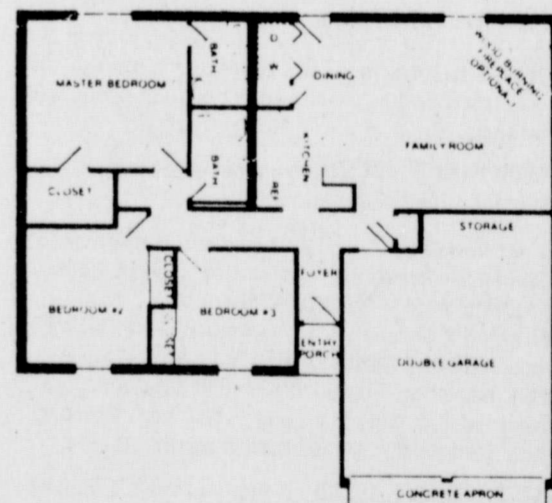

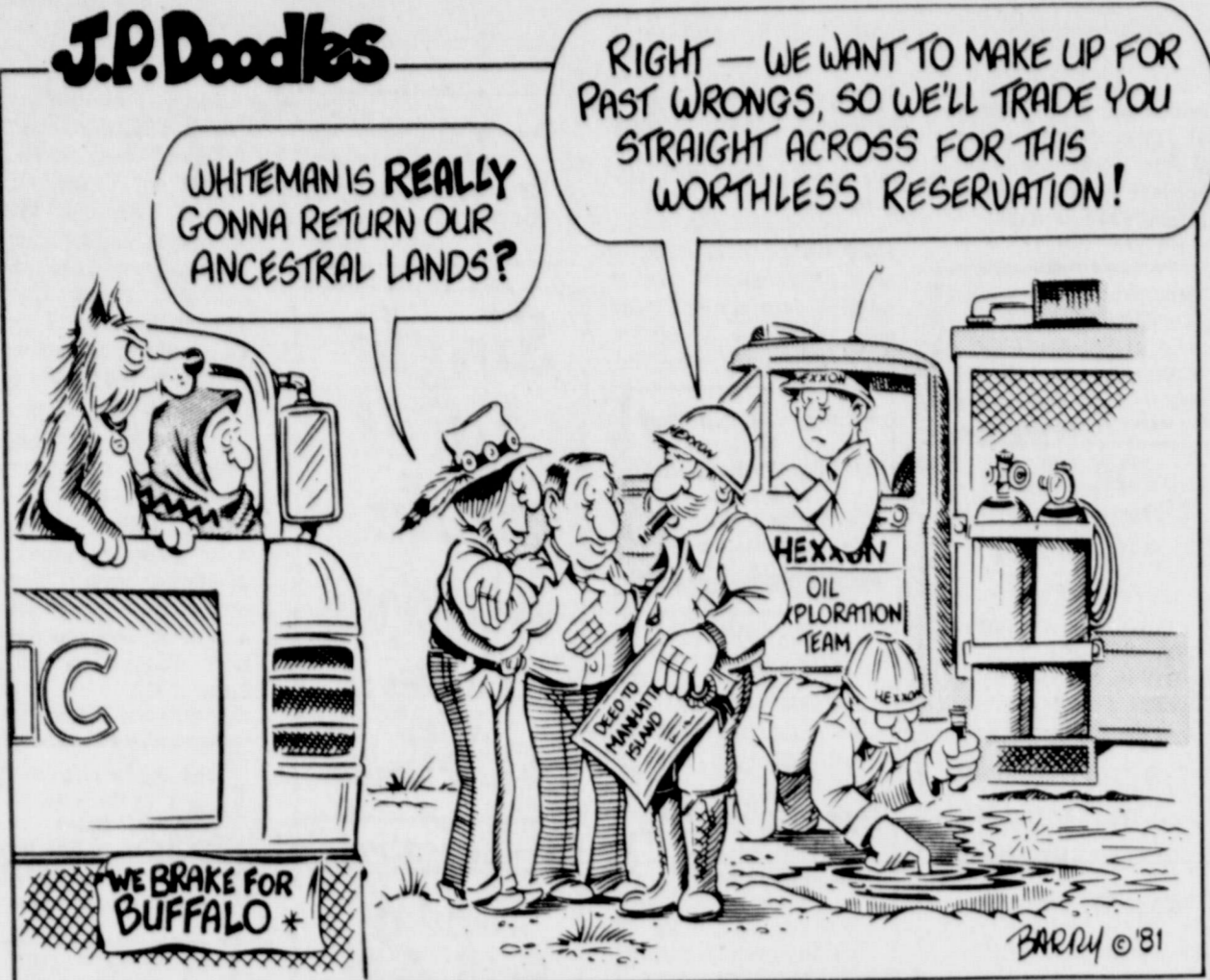
