It Is Your Ambulance, If You Are A Subscriber

Next time you hear the ambulance siren sound in Cisco, remember, its your ambulance—it is if you are a subscriber to the Pafford Ambulance Service that is.

And the ambulance driver and attendant, who is an Emergency Medical Technician, know their jobs. Edna and Rickey Haile have been hired to perform the duties by James Pafford, owner of the ambulance service which was approved by the Cisco City Council June 30.

Rickey is the EMT, and has been since 1975. He took his training at three hospitals—Brownwood, Stephenville and Cleburne. The stint at Cleburne was in the maternity ward where he watched and helped with the delivery of the couple's now two year old son, Kyle.

Edna is a native of Cisco, and, as Edna Wink, attended the Cisco Public Schools and Cisco Junior College. Rickey is a graduate of Santo High School and attended Tarleton State College before completing his EMT training and becoming an employee with the Stephenville Fire Department.

As a member of the fire department, he served as a paramedic and as a firefighter, reaching the second level of classification as a firefighter, intermediate. All the members of the Stephenville Fire Department are cross-trained to perform both duties. At the time he was hired to serve as EMT for Pafford, he was serving as a firefighter with the Eastland Fire Department.

His training for his EMT certificate included 120 hours, and he has taken three 40-hour and one 20-hour refresher courses.

Edna will be entering EMT training at Ranger Memorial Hospital in September and Rickey will be beginning another refresher course at the same time. "Right now," she says, "I'm just the driver."

The husband and wife team has been operating in Cisco since July 1 the same date the membership drive for the Pafford Ambulance Service began in Cisco.

Cisco citizens have been urged by the members of the City Council and by other citizens to fill out the membership forms and turn them in at City Hall. The membership is \$36 a year and the drive will continue through July 31. At that time, the membership drive will close and citizens who currently live in Cisco will not have another opportunity to join until July 1, 1982.

Included in the membership price is the use of the ambulance service for every member of your immediate family and includes travel to any hospital within a 60 mile radius of Cisco, as well as to E.L. Graham Memorial, at no extra cost.

Non-members will be charged the regular rate of \$70, with a \$15 charge for an emergency call, plus \$1.50 per mile from point of pickup and \$10 for oxygen or special equipment. Members will have to pay a \$1 fee per mile for travel outside the 60-mile radius.

Rickey and Edna had their first "major" run last Tuesday when a car-truck accident sent them to the intersection of Avenue D and Interstate 20. It was Edna's first real "experience," but she handled it like an old pro. "We were so busy, I didn't have time to think about it. I may fall apart in the next 30

minutes though," she added. "We went to help the people and I didn't really think much about it."

Speaking of the service to the citizens of the City of Cisco, Edna said she wanted, to make sure that the people understand that this service is "theirs." "This is a service that does not belong to the government—it's paid for by the people," she said.

"We need the cooperation of the people of Cisco, the city government and the hospitals to make this thing work," Rickey adds. "The community has to get behind it to make it work."

The service already has the support of the city government, with the council approval and the approval of the city offices for collecting the memberships and the permit for soliciting memberships. The people are beginning to respond, too.

As of last Tuesday, there were 123 of the 850 memberships needed already taken in, and that was after just one week.

Rickey and Edna are now a part of Cisco, and the service they perform helps the citizens of Cisco. They expressed the desire that the people of Cisco join in to make this service work.

Citizens who avail themselves of the memberships and the citizens who do not, will still have something they can call their own. So just remember, the next time you hear the siren—it's your money at work and the Hailes are performing the service for you.

PEANUT PRICE SUPPORT THREATENED

Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller warned peanut producers in the state a move is underway in congress to destroy the peanut price support program. Amendments to the 1981 Farm Bill proposed by Congressman Peter Peyser of New York and Senator Richard Lugar of Indiana "are threats not just to the peanut program in this country, but to the entire farm price support program as well," Moeller stated.

Peyser and Lugar went to offer changes in the bill for peanuts which in Peyser's words "begin to remove the price support system for this commodity" as stated in the Congressional Record of June 15. "With congress caught up in the budget cutting hysteria, there is a good chance an amendment like this could be adopted," Moeller remarked.

According to Moeller, critics of the commodity programs in congress are using arguments of costs savings to the government if the programs are reduced and a savings to the consumer on prices at the shelf. "What will really happen when this so called free market approach is adopted is that many peanut farmers will be forced out of business

because of low prices and a disorganized planting program, followed by a shortage which will produce price hikes on all peanut products. The cuts will be of no benefit to the government or to the consumer," Moeller stated.

The Texas Farmers Union President said critics of the price support program for agricultural commodities are gradually chipping away at the various programs with attacks already underway on the dairy, peanuts and sugar programs. Moeller said the best way to insure protection for the farmers is to adopt a Farm Bill which guarantees producers a fair price for their crops with a realistic loan level.

Homemaking Hints

Everyone loves a pretty landscape with colorful plants and flowers. Of course, one of the favorites is the Texas bluebonnet. As you will remember, this spring the bluebonnets were

breath taking. If you're planning a cover of Texas bluebonnets for the home landscape next spring, seed should be planted as soon as possible.

Late summer planting is essential because bluebonnets are actually winter annuals. They germinate in late summer, and exist as a small rosette of leaves throughout the winter while developing a good root system. They then grow rapidly during the spring rainy season to produce sheets of blue flowers.

Many seeds are wasted each year due to improper planting. Just tossing the seed into a grassy area along the road or in the corner of the yard does little else than provide expensive food for birds.

Germination is also a problem. Poor germination usually occurs unless something is done to soften the hard seed coat to allow moisture to penetrate.

The often recommended practice of puncturing the seed with a needle or ice pick will work, but is rather time consuming as well as hard on your hands. Scratching the seed coat between layers of sandpaper on a hard surface will help break the outer surface. Seed may also be soaked in water for several days prior to planting.

Since the Bluebonnet is a legume, there is some indication that better results are obtained if the seed is inoculated with a proper nitrifying bacteria. Some of the seed companies have the inoculating material available with the instructions as to how to use it.

In large scale plantings, it would probably be advantageous to use these agents. After treating, broadcast the seed on tilled soil, cover with 1/4 to 1/2 inch of soil, firm the soil, and water. Keep the soil moist until seedlings appear

usually in a week to ten days.

Once established, bluebonnets seed themselves year after year, provided the seed has been allowed to mature, grass or weeds haven't become too thick and there has been sufficient rain in July and August to soften the seed coat. With a late drought, it would be advisable to soak the bluebonnet seed several times to assure good germination.

Grubs In Turfgrass

One of the most common problems of Turfgrass in Texas is damage caused by the feeding of White Grubs. White Grubs are larval stages of June Beetles. They also feed on agricultural crops such as Corn, Sorghum and Sugar Cane.

It is the White Grub stage which causes lawn damage during the Summer and Fall by feeding on the roots. Feeding of large numbers of Grubs causes lawns to turn yellow in the affected areas. Positive identification of the damage is possible when the yellowed grass can be lifted easily from the ground.

The Grubs become dormant through the Winter months living on fat reserves. In the Spring the Grub resumes feeding on organic matter. The Grub pupates (rests) for three weeks and then emerges as an adult ready to mate.

Major adult flights occur at different times of the year depending on the geographic location of the State. This is important, as it determines the critical treatment period. The flight period, in which adults are active, lasts about 1 1/2 weeks. After mating, the egg laying period averages 30 days. The egg will hatch in three or four weeks.

It is important to treat for White Grubs while they are in an early stage of development, the critical treatment period. Larger Grubs are difficult to control because of their size and the difficulty of getting enough insecticide down through the lawn. The critical treatment period is

about four to six weeks after egg lay. In this area it arrives during late July or early August. Lawns suspected of being infested with White Grubs should be inspected during the critical treatment period. Lawns can be checked by cutting and digging a 1-square-foot sections of sod and examining the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Sod and soil should be replaced and watered in. Take several samples at different locations in the lawn.

Treatment is usually recommended when more than four 1/4 to 1/2-inch Grubs per square foot are found. Insecticides recommended for Grub control are much less effective against eggs and large Grubs than against small Grubs. The toxicity of these insecticides is greatly reduced two to four weeks after application. Thus, insecticides applied too early

may not be effective in the soil after the eggs hatch. Granular forms of Diazinon or Dursban are recommended for the control of White Grubs. Granular forms of insecticide should be watered in with 1/2 to 1 inch of water.

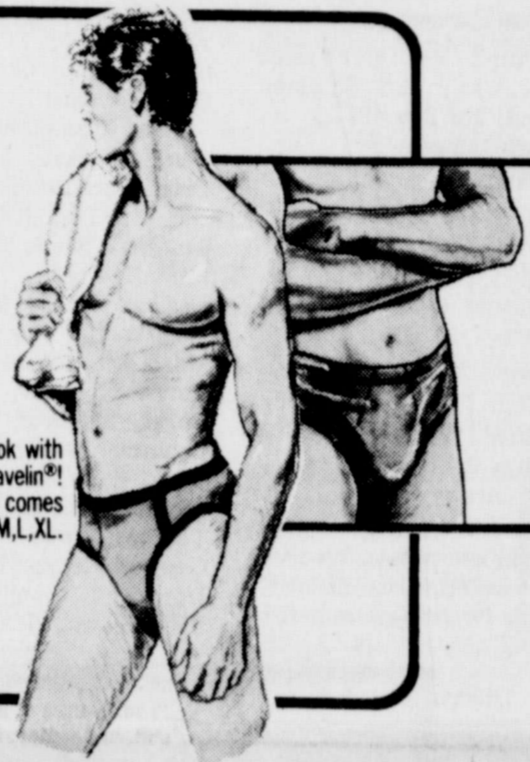

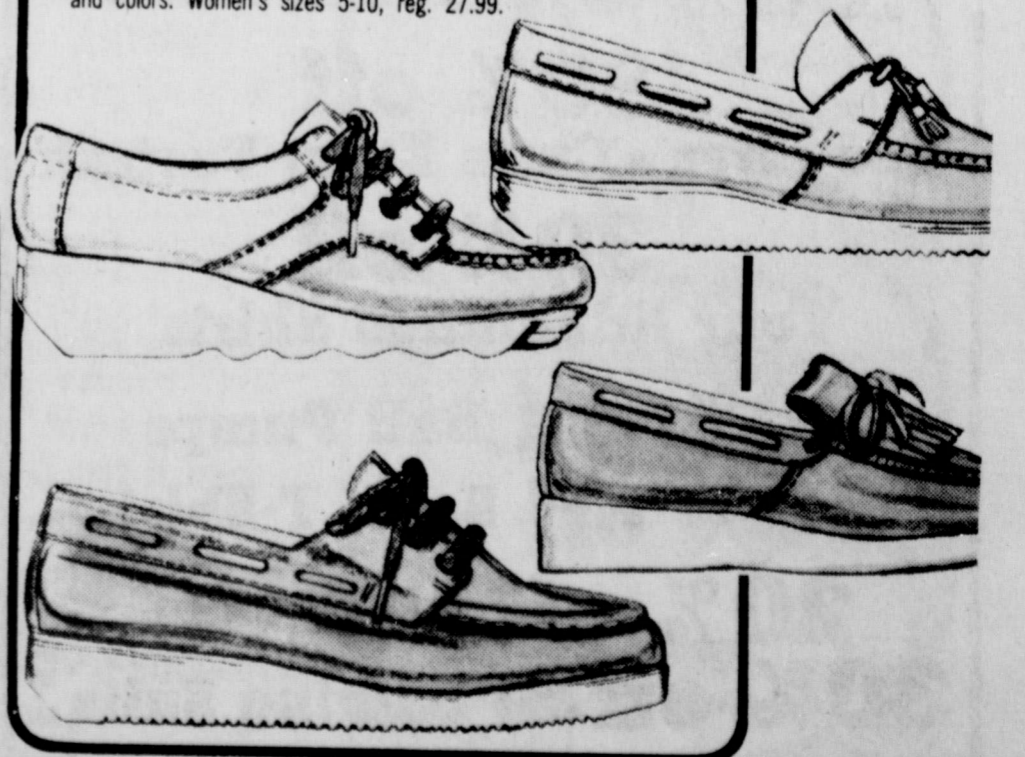

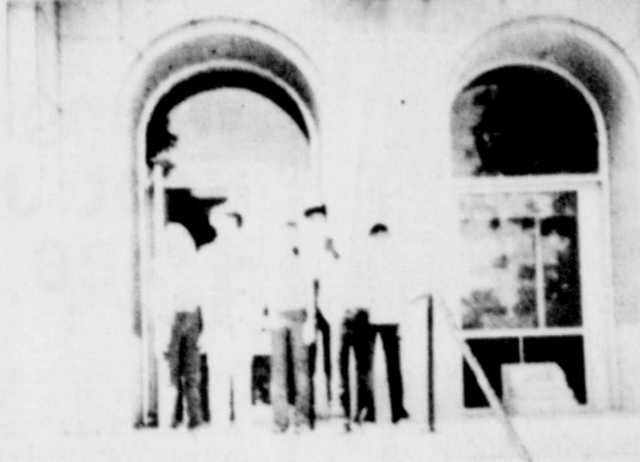

Food Allergy Tests

Allergic reactions to foods and food-related substances sometimes pose an ever present threat to the physical and emotional well-being of you and your family.

However, you can take some simple and inexpensive steps to recognize and treat many food allergy problems. They're outlined by Dr. Doris J. Rapp in an article appearing in the summer issue of *The Professional Nutritionist*, a quarterly magazine published by the Foremost-McKesson Foods Group. Dr. Rapp, who practices pediatric allergy and clinical ecology in Buffalo, New York, is the author of a variety of books on allergies.

Dr. Rapp suggests identifying suspected allergy-causing foods by keeping a list of what is eaten on days of no allergic reactions and on days in which allergic reactions occur. By crossing off foods which appear on both lists, you'll probably be left with one or two foods eaten on a "bad" day, Dr. Rapp says.

You can then test the suspected foods by omitting each one... one at a time... from the diet in a five-day cycle. Reintroduce the omitted food into the diet on the sixth day. If you're sensitive to that item, you'll probably have exaggerated allergy symptoms within one hour, Dr. Rapp points out.

You must then either avoid the offending foods in all forms, or find a physician who knows how to treat food allergies with food extracts injected into the arm, or by using drops of the correct dilution extract under the tongue," Dr. Rapp says.

The author also reviews emergency procedures an allergy victim can use if stricken while away from home or visiting in a foreign country:

"Try to vomit. If you can't, take a cathartic, such as plain milk of magnesia, to help the food move more rapidly through the intestines.

"An alternative is to take from half to full a teaspoon of baking soda in a half glass of water. Following with an additional full glass of liquid to further dilute the baking soda into the stomach. This may stop the food-related symptoms in any body location, not just in the digestive system, within about 20 minutes," Dr. Rapp advises.

In a dire emergency, advises Dr. Rapp, a hospital emergency room can relieve food for chemically-related symptoms in some patients within 10 to 20 minutes with intravenously-administered sodium bicarbonate or baking soda. And oxygen can be used to help relieve symptoms caused by food or chemical exposures which have precipitated sudden illness.

Some people have allergic reactions after eating innumerable food items to which they are sensitive while others are affected by eating only one or two foods. And sometimes it's not the food item which is at fault but an insecticide, preservative, additive or chemical in or on the food, Dr. Rapp says. Drugs, vitamins, mouthwash, toothpaste and similar items should also be placed on the suspect list since they contain food ingredients, she advises.

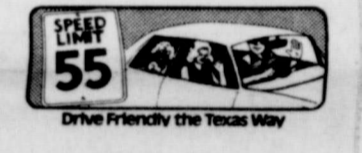

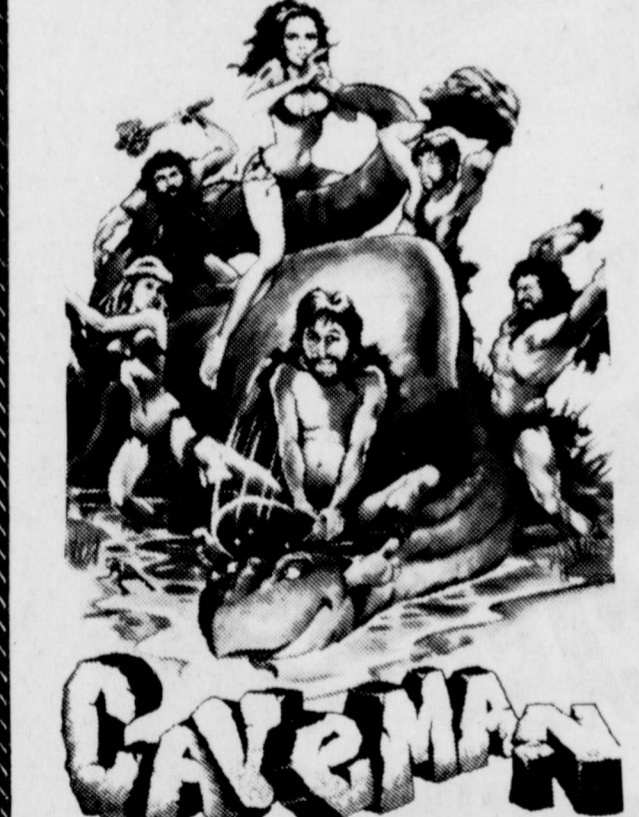

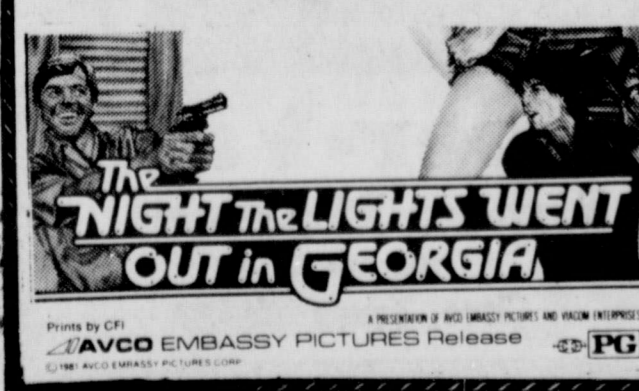

Recently, the director of the Eastland and Cisco Senior Centers, Ruth Cartee, attended a seminar in regard to the hispanic elderly.

The U.S. Census Bureau estimates there were 1.1 million hispanics, age 55 and over or 9.2% of the total hispanic population.

However, the estimates of the hispanic association estimates the numbers to be greater than two million elderly in the U.S.

There are a variety of terms making reference to the hispanic community in the U.S. which includes Cuban-American, Mexican-American, Puerto Ricans and those from the Caribbean, Central South America and Spain.

The Mexican-American elderly comprises the largest number of hispanic elderly in the U.S. It is estimated over 800,000 of the Mexican Americans over 55 account for 10% of the total

Mexican-Americans population. The life expectancy for Mexican Americans is less than the majority of the population.

The seminar discussed most of the hispanic elderly do not have pension plans and are forced to work after the age of 65.

Many social factors were discussed concerning the elderly hispanic: for instance only 50% of the hispanic elderly receives social security compared to 75% for all other elderly; and the life expectancy for the Mexican-American is 56.7 years.

We found from the results of the seminar, as presented by David Malonado, that far too long the hispanic elderly has been ignored. The hispanic elderly, to be understood, the ethnocultural background has to be understood as it holds the key to their value systems.

The discussion at the seminar revealed the hispanic elderly of today have slowly overcome economic obstacles during their lives. They have done this by reaffirming the belief in the strength of themselves and within their culture.

If you know any Mexican-Americans, or other hispanics, encourage them to join the activities at the Senior Center. They may call 442-1557 or 442-2263 for additional information.

The programs for the past week were: Mark Bird, music director of the East Cisco Baptist Church, who sang religious songs while accompanying himself with his guitar; and Jack and Fay Stevenson, sang old time songs and many religious songs.

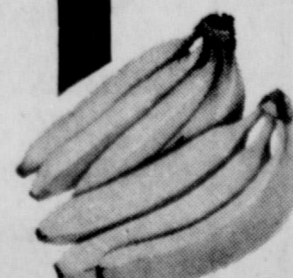

Dr. Blazer has shared some facts on Parvo Virus so dog owners can be aware of the disease and be on guard. Dr. Blazer feels that vaccination for immunity is the best answer. He says better vaccinations are available now.

The virus has been known only since 1978 with the first cases in this region being found in late 1979.

According to Dr. Blazer, only a canine dog variety can get the disease, but it is highly contagious. It is transmitted by the feces or urine of infected dogs. Flies may carry the disease from one place to another.

Parvo Virus Diarrhea is caused by a virus that destroys the lining of the small intestine. Dehydration from the diarrhea and vomiting is the major cause of death. The animal is unable to absorb nutrients because of dehydration.

Symptoms of the disease have been listed as high fever, listlessness, vomiting, and diarrhea which often contains blood.

From the time a dog is infected to recovery or death is usually twenty-four hours to five days. The overall recovery rate is approximately 80%.

Treatment is aimed at prevention of dehydration and reducing inflammation of the bowels. Medication is given to control nausea with I.V. fluids and antibiotics to prevent secondary infection.

Large or medium size adult dogs usually recover often in 24-48 hours even with no treatment.

Young puppies and small or older dogs most often die. After a dog recovers its

immunity last six to twelve months. Vaccination for immunity also is in effect for the six to twelve months period.

Two different vaccinations are given three weeks apart. Dr. Blazer advises owners to keep accurate records of their dog's vaccinations.

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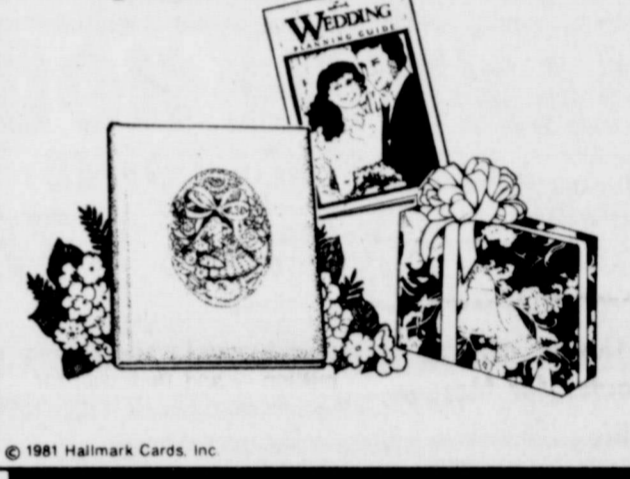

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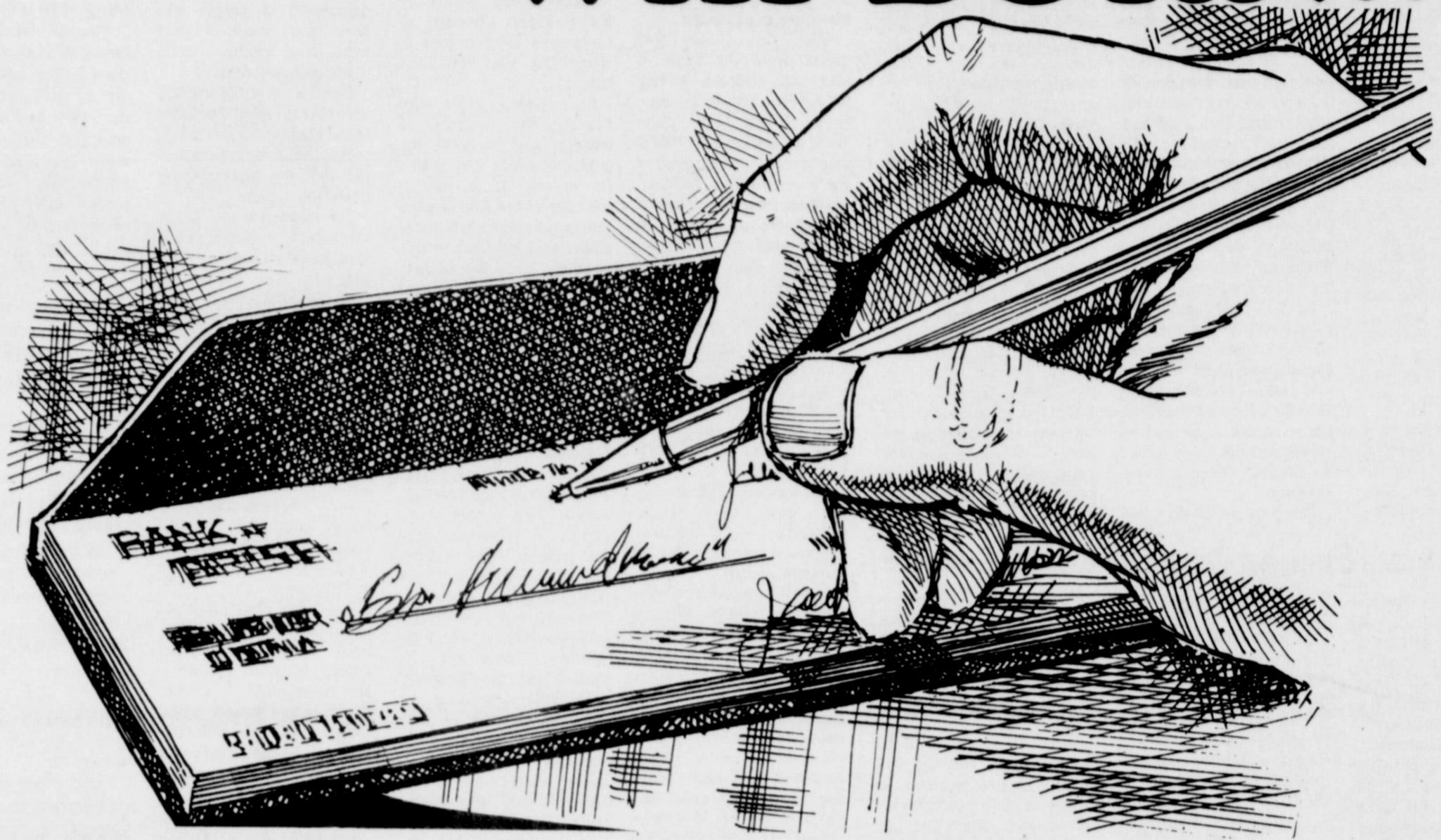

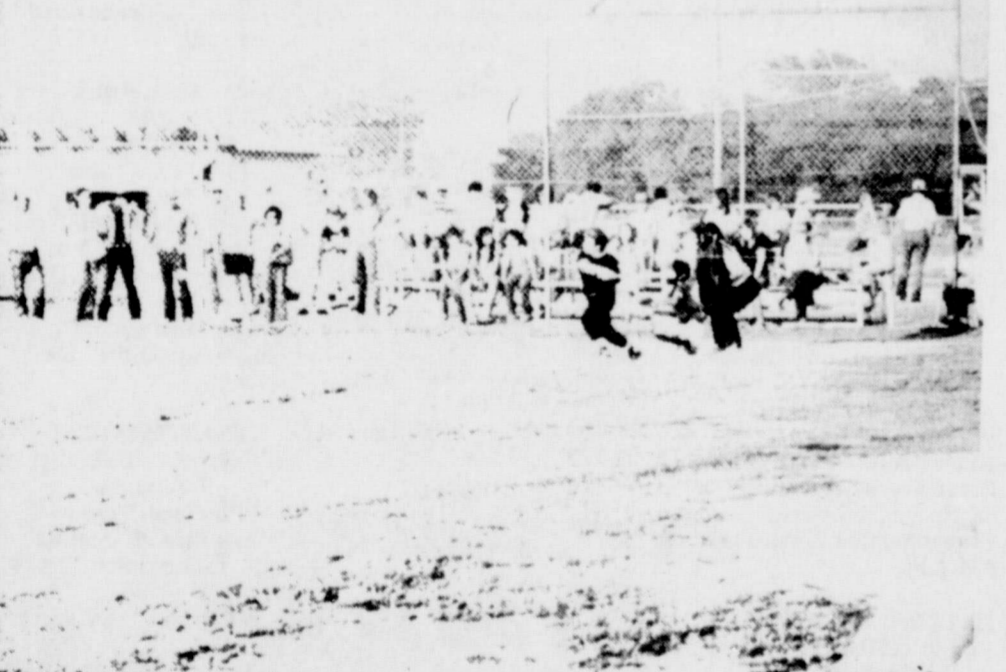
Cisco and Albany played for five innings with Cisco scoring in each inning except the last one. Albany scored in the second and last inning.

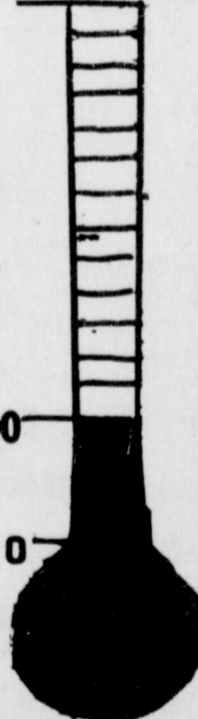

FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW

THE TEXAS REAL ESTATE LICENSE ACT

"SECTION 15. The commission may, on its own motion, and shall, on the verified complaint in writing of any person, provided the complaint, or the complaint together with evidence, documentary or otherwise, presented in connection with the complaint, provides reasonable cause, investigate the actions and records of a real estate broker or real estate salesman. The commission may suspend or revoke a license issued under the provisions of this Act at any time when it has been determined that:

"(L) placing a sign on real property offering it for sale, lease, or rent without the written consent of the owner or his authorized agent; or

"(M) inducing or attempting to induce a party to a contract of sale or lease to break the contract for the purpose of substituting in lieu thereof a new contract; or

"(N) negotiating or attempting to negotiate the sale, exchange, lease, or rental of real property with an owner or lessor, knowing that the owner or lessor had a written outstanding contract, granting exclusive agency in connection with the property to another real estate broker; or

"(O) offering real property for sale or for lease without the knowledge and consent of the owner or his authorized agent, or on terms other than those authorized by the owner or his authorized agent; or

"(P) publishing, or causing to be published, an advertisement including, but not limited to, advertising by newspaper, radio, television, or display which is misleading, or which is likely to deceive the public, or which in any manner tends to create a misleading impression, or which fails to identify the person causing the advertisement to be published as a licensed real estate broker or agent; or

"(Q) having knowingly withheld from or inserted in a statement of account or invoice, a statement that made it inaccurate in a material particular; or

"(R) publishing or circulating an unjustified or unwarranted threat of legal proceedings, or other action; or

"(S) establishing an association, by employment or otherwise, with an unlicensed person who is expected or required to act as a real estate licensee, or aiding or abetting or conspiring with a person to circumvent the requirements of this Act; or

"(T) failing or refusing on demand to furnish copies of a document pertaining to a transaction dealing with real estate to a person whose signature is affixed to the document; or

"(U) failing to advise a purchaser in writing before the closing of a transaction that the purchaser should either have the abstract covering the real estate which is the subject of the contract examined by an attorney of the purchaser's own selection, or be furnished with or obtain a policy of title insurance; or...

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Oil Producer Believes Tax Increase A Mistake

The president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association said Tuesday that it would be a mistake for Texas to increase severance taxes on crude oil and natural gas as proposed by Texas Attorney General Mark White.

Dallas independent producer Edwin L. Cox disagreed sharply with White's contention that raising oil and gas production taxes was "the only response" to the U.S. Supreme Court's recent

decision upholding Montana's 30-percent severance tax on coal.

"Because of the deregulation of crude oil prices and the gradual decontrol of natural gas prices, we have seen a spirited upsurge in drilling in Texas," Cox said. "This activity has created jobs in all sectors of the state's economy, located new reserves of secure oil and gas, and increased tax collections for all levels of government. We should concentrate on continuing the

favorable climate for finding and producing energy in the state, not becoming involved in a severance tax war with other mineral producing states," Cox said.

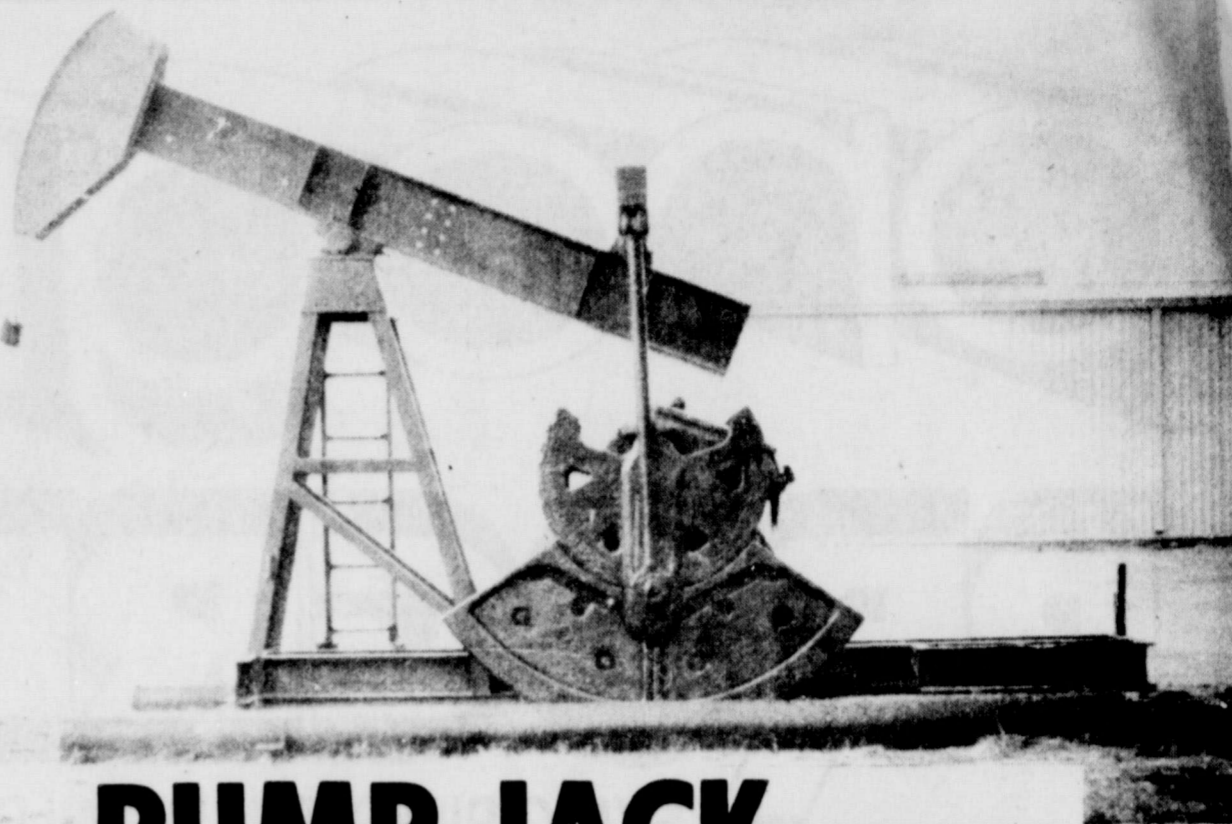
Texas consumers - both industrial and residential - would bear the brunt of an increase in the gas severance tax. Texans consume two-thirds of the state's natural gas production.

Cox said that any increase in the oil severance tax would have to be borne by Texas producers and royalty owners. It could not be passed along to consumers in other states as White ap-

parently envisions, Cox added.

"This is because the price of crude oil is determined in the world market. Texas producers are price takers, not price setters in this market," Cox said.

Cox pointed out that Texas petroleum producers have been responsible taxpayers and currently are providing about one-quarter of the state's tax revenues. In Fiscal Year 1980, for example, crude oil and natural gas production taxes alone amounted to more than \$1.5 billion, representing 24-percent of the state's net tax collections, he noted.



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Eastland County Oil Activity

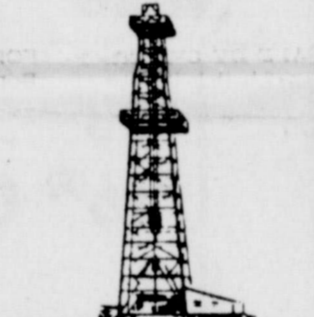

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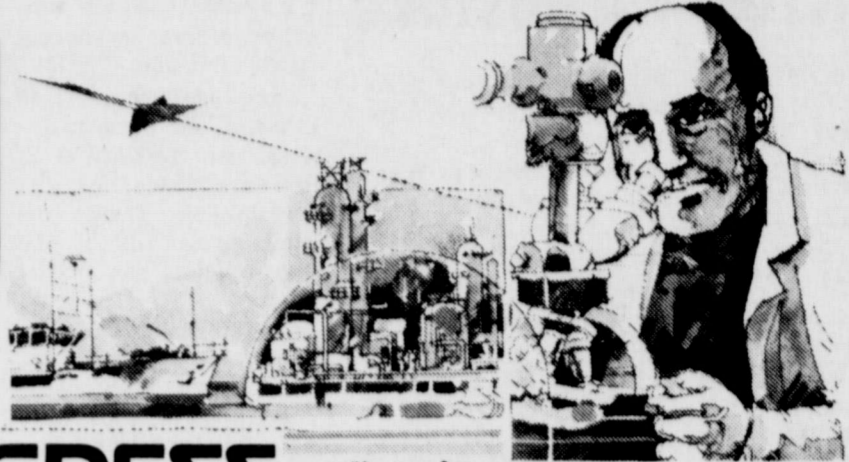
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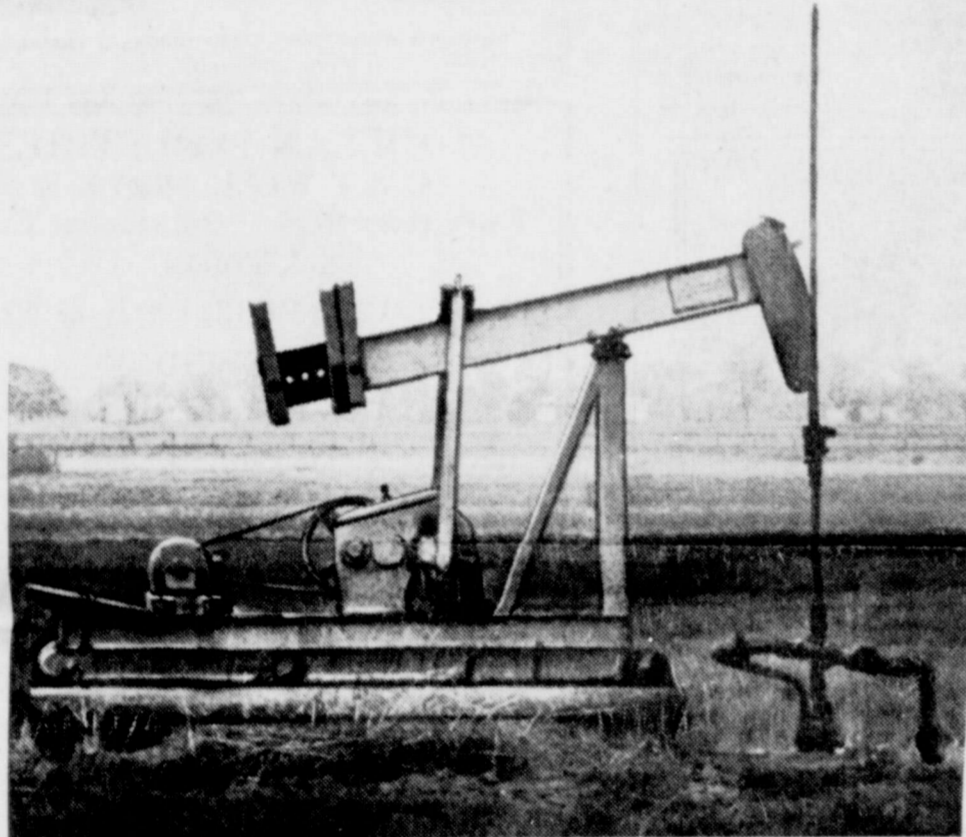


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
