## CJC Wranglers Defeat SMU In Dallas By Score Of 27-14

Dallas—The Cisco Junior College Wranglers spotted the Southern Methodist University Mustang Junior Varsity seven points and then roared back to take its second game of the season Thursday night with a 27-14 victory here.  
Billy Richardson, 5-10, 195-pound sophomore from Goree, scored two touchdowns and picked up 120 yards rushing on 20 carries to lead the Wranglers. Tailback Keith Pantallion contributed 70 yards on only one carry—a touchdown run. It brought his season scoring lead to three touchdowns in two games.  
Jeff Apodoca got the Mustangs on the scoreboard first as he pulled in a Ned Frederick pass and raced 18 yards with 6:14 left in the opening quarter. Jeff Harrell's extra point gave SMU its only lead of the game.  
Richardson got the Wranglers on the scoreboard with 10:45 left in the first half when he rambled in from the four. Kioumars Rezaie kicked the extra point to tie the score.  
Less than two minutes later, the Wranglers grabbed the lead as Richardson scored from 12 yards out. Rezaie's kick put the Wranglers ahead 14-7.  
SMU countered with a Larry Sadberry touchdown from two yards out and the score was tied 14-14 at the half.  
Richardson put the Wranglers ahead to stay with 9:12 left in the third quarter when he scored from the one. This time, Rezaie's PAT try went astray and CJC led 20-14.

Pantallion put the game out of reach on a veer play with 1:46 left in the game when he outran the Mustang defenders for a 70-yard touchdown jaunt. This time

Rezaie's kick was true. CJC is now 2-0 for the season. The Wranglers travel to Lubbock Thursday to battle the Texas Tech Red Raider Junior Varsity.

# City Council Approves Budget And Tax Rate For Coming Year

A budget for fiscal year 1981-82 was approved and a tax rate of \$1.35 per \$100 valuation was adopted on final reading at a regular meeting of the City Council Tuesday night at City Hall. An audit of city records for 1979-80 was also approved.

In other action, the Council held over for further study the application of Southern Television Systems for a franchise extension, gave notice of withdrawal from the Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch Service, employed a delinquent tax legal firm, approved a hotel occupancy tax, and discussed a waste water facility plan.

The budget for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, 1981, anticipates revenues and expenditures of approximately \$1,023,302-\$660,695 for the general fund, \$316,400 in water and sewer funds, and \$46,207 from revenue sharing sources. The new budget represents an increase of some \$65,000 for the general fund and \$5,000 for water and sewer.

Revenue anticipated during the coming year includes \$239,445 from current taxes, \$32,000 in delinquent taxes, \$155,000 in sales tax money, \$90,000 for sanitation services, \$52,000 in franchise taxes, \$30,000 in court and parking fines, \$12,000 for cabin rentals, \$18,500 for Lake Cisco lots, and \$10,000 from financial administration.

The water and sewer fund anticipates \$240,000 from water sales, \$72,000 for sewer services and other income in lesser amounts. The revenue sharing fund expects \$11,551 per quarter.

General fund expenditures under the new budget include \$66,500 for city hall salaries, \$5,000 for engineering, \$7,000 for auditing, \$1,900 for the library, \$7,200 for the Chamber of Commerce, and some \$71,000 for retirement, social security, unemployment insurance,

health insurance and workmen's compensation. Other anticipated expenditures include \$5,000 for supplies and materials, \$27,500 for contractual services, and \$2,000 for maintenance.

The police and city court expects to spend some \$103,500 in salaries, \$13,500 for the central dispatch, and \$2,400 for the city judge. Supplies will cost some \$2,150, contractual services some \$5,800 and maintenance some \$3,800. Equipment costs are budgeted at \$7,000.

The fire department will spend some \$35,000 on salaries and some \$14,500 on other items. The street department expects to pay salaries of some \$62,000, to spend \$37,700 on supplies and materials, \$11,000 for contractual services, and \$22,150 on maintenance plus \$7,000 on new equipment. The parks and recreation budget calls for spending some \$23,500, and sanitation department expects to spend \$68,150.

Water and sewer expects to spend \$92,300 for personnel, \$21,150 for supplies, \$41,300 for contractual services, \$3,200 for maintenance, and some \$37,000 for capital outlay. The department's total expenditures are expected to amount to about \$207,500.

Revenue sharing fund expenditures are expected to include \$26,207 in the street department, \$14,000 for the water and sewer department, and \$6,000 for the fire department — all in new equipment purchases. The street department expects to spend \$10,000 for new street signs.

The \$1.35 tax rate is expected to bring in about \$100,000 more than last year, in tax revenues — an increase of some 67% over last year.

The council heard Don Fielder of the Fort Worth law firm of Perdue, Brandon, Blair and Fielder in a proposal to represent the city in delinquent tax collections. His firm deals entirely in this type of legal work, he said, and charges for services on the basis of 15% of money collected. The firm uses a computer and handles all details of the delinquent tax collection program, including sending two notices to taxpayers and filing suit after 30 days. The city reserves the right to make decisions regarding court action. The contract will begin Oct. 1 and will terminate on 30-day notice by the city or the law firm.

In this connection, the Council approved an ordinance that provides a penalty of 15% to defray costs of collection of delinquent taxes. Thus, the delinquent taxpayer will pay a 15% penalty plus interest on his unpaid tax balance.

CPA Joe Cooper, in presenting the audit for 1979-80, told the Council that the city's bookkeeping department, headed by Jean Grey, was doing a good job and that the city's books were generally in much better condition than a year ago. He went over the various accounts and made more than 20 recommendations to improve internal accounting control. The Council voted to accept the audit.

City Manager Mike Moore told the Council that his office needs more time to consider details of the television antenna franchise extension application, and the Council voted to hold up final approval.

Engineer Bill Jacobs of Abilene, who is assisting the city with the waste water disposal project, outlined alternatives that would comply with EPA standards.

This would include building an evaporation reservoir or obtaining a farm site where the water would be pumped for use in irrigation. He and the city manager expect to visit with EPA officials in Austin during the coming week before the council meets at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 17, to consider the plan further and to order a public hearing on the matter.

CoFC Manager Gene Abbott explained to the Council that the Texas Legislature has passed a law that enables cities to levy a hotel room occupancy tax with the proceeds to be used in promoting tourism. He said it was agreeable with local hotels, which have some 75 rooms, to levy a 2% tax with the revenues expected to bring in some \$5,000 per year for the CoFC to use in promoting tourism. An ordinance levying the tax was passed on first reading by a 5-1 vote.

On recommendation of the city manager, the Council approved (five for and one abstain) giving notice to the Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch that the City of Cisco is considering withdrawing water notice of one year as provided by the organization's regulations.

The dispatch office is located at Eastland and is supported by the cities of Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and others along with some financial help from Eastland County. Ranger, which had dropped out two years ago, has come back into the organization. The City of Cisco currently is paying about \$1,200 per month for the 24-hour radio dispatch service.

Mrs. Louise Allison, former member of the Council, told the group that a Cisco withdrawal would vitally affect the program. She urged Council members to visit the Dispatch center and study its mission and results before finally acting on the proposal. She noted that Ranger has returned to support the center after being out for two years.

"The Dispatch is the central point for ambulance service and for reporting crime," Mrs. Allison said. She added that she had been on the center's board for several years and felt that it was doing a good job with fine results.

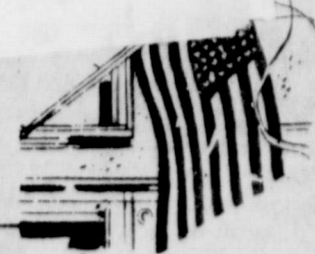
Mayor Eris Ritchie, who presided at the meeting, noted that by giving year's notice of withdrawal, the Council was not making a final decision. He said the Council would only take another look at the matter before the end of the year.

Minutes of the regular meeting of the Council, 25th and a special session Aug. 31 for budget items were read and approved. All members of the Council were present along with City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Attorney Bill Wright.

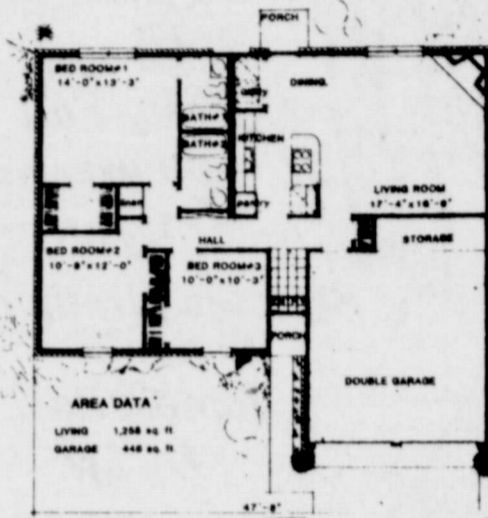

While a forage test may cost a few dollars, it can save you dollars in supplemental feed or livestock

### Selective Service List Posted

A list of Selective Service registrants born in 1962 and the first part of 1963 has been posted in the Eastland County Courthouse.

According to Colonel Paul Dean Aiken, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, the Military Selective Service Act requires that the names of Selective Service registrants be posted in a public place within each local board area.

Local Board tentative assignments have been made based upon the Zip Code of the registrants permanent home address.

Colonel Aiken says the law (the Military Selective Service Act) still requires all young men to register with Selective Service at age eighteen.

Currently, men born in 1963 are required to register within 30 days before or 30 days after their eighteenth birthday. Registration forms may be completed at any United States Post Office.

If any young man failed to register on time, he may clear his record by registering as soon as possible.

One way to learn the quality of your hay is to enter the Eastland County Hay Show. All you need to do is to bring one bale of each kind of hay you may have to the Vo-Ag teacher or farm supply store in your community Wednesday, September 16. The hay will be tested for protein and on October 2 it will be judged on both physical and protein content. There is no fee for entering.

Hay shows provide an opportunity to compare different samples of hay and help producers evaluate what makes high-quality hay. Hay is a major portion of the roughage diet of many ruminant animals, so an evaluation of food value and protein content can help growers determine hay quality more easily so that livestock can be fed according to hay value.

An individual entering a hay sample will know the value of his hay when the show is over. Samples will have a protein analysis run and physically evaluated as to leafiness, steminess, color, foreign material and maturity.

Livestock producers

preparing to feed hay will know if their hay is adequate to meet animal needs or supplements are needed. Hay shows can take a lot of guesswork out of livestock feeding.

Besides, providing a hay analysis, hay shows can be educational. Discussion topics often deal with such areas as hay production, haying equipment, soil fertility, hay storage, hay quality differences, feeding value, forage testing and value for hay production. It can be placed where interested individuals can learn a lot about hay production and feeding value.

## Enter Hay In Show

If you produce hay or use hay in your farming operation, you need to read this article.

The time is now to get those hay bales turned in for the Eastland County Hay Show. This years show will be October 2nd during the annual Eastland County Fair.

Why should you be interested? Because the hay show is designed to be educational and assist you in doing a better job of producing

high quality hay. It can show you the need for testing to determine the feeding value of hay you have purchased or produced. In going back to the records of the previous hay shows we find that the protein levels have consistently risen since the beginning of the hay shows nine years ago. This indicates that the hay show has pointed out the need for high quality hay production. You may enter the hay show by contacting the voca-

tional agriculture department in your community or bringing the bale(s) to the vocational agriculture building, feed and fertilizer dealers, or implement dealers. Please tag the bales with your name and address and the type of hay. Each person may enter one bale in each of the following classes: Alfalfa and other legumes; Coastal Bermuda and other Bermudas; Sorghum-Sudan Hybrids and forage sorghums; other perennial grasses; peanut; oats and other annuals; and legume mixtures.

There is no entry fee to enter. The bales become the property of the hay show and will be sold to help pay for the cost of testing. All entries must be in bale form, either round or square.

Deadline for entering is Wednesday, September 16th so that adequate time is allowed for testing.

## Texans May Pay For Doing Without

AUSTIN--Texans face the "looming spectre of living in the midst of rich gas field, unable to get adequate supplies, and paying artificially bloated prices for the privilege of doing without," said Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent as press conferences in Austin and Dallas this week.

Nugent said Texas consumers face higher natural gas prices and probable shortages in supply unless changes are made in the federal Natural Gas Policy Act.

As the act now stands, an estimated 40 percent of all U.S. natural gas will remain under federal price controls after 1985.

Most of the low-cost, price-controlled gas

continue to flow to other states under the federal law. The department of Energy estimates that this so-called "old interstate" gas will cost \$1.01 per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) in 1985, compared to 93 cents per Mcf in 1978.

By contrast, old intrastate gas prices will cost Texas consumers \$3.29 per Mcf in 1985 under the NGPA.

"This is the gas you and I burn every day, and we'll be paying over three times what it costs our northern neighbors," said Nugent.

Problems multiply for Texans when interstate customers use the dollars they save to bid up the price of new gas supplies. Nugent seriously questions whether the intrastate pipelines can compete for these new supplies without a base of con-

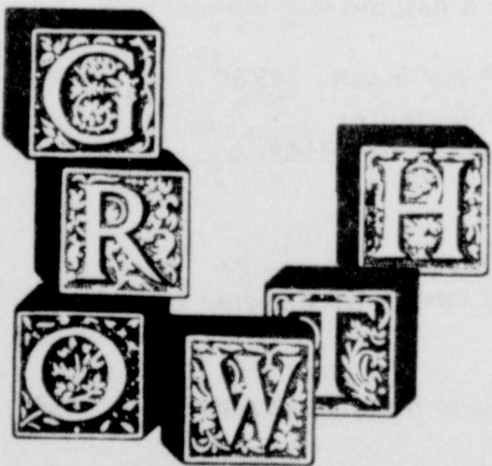
## A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

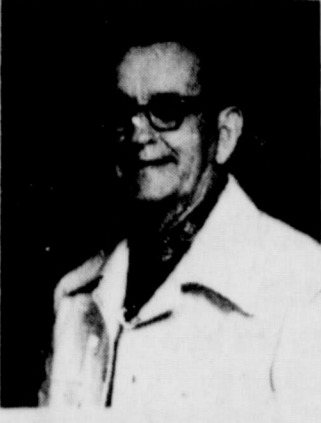

But, apparently, they can't remember their dislike from one day to the next, because I've seen them pick a tomato, take a bite, spit it and leave the ruined tomato behind. They do the same thing all over the next day.

When we first planted a garden, there hadn't been a rabbit sighted within ten miles of our neighborhood. Now we have more rabbits than the five and dime at Easter-time.

And believe me, there just isn't anything you can do to get rid of them. I remember one day suggesting casually at the dinner table how nice it would be to "get rid of the rabbits." My daughter looked up aghast. "You wouldn't kill a bunny rabbit, would you?"

I muttered something about buying them plane tickets to Australia and let the subject drop. Actually, my answer to the rabbit problem is to grow enough food to feed both them and us. Even at that, you have to make sure to pick your share every day. Rabbits, despite their benign appearance, are the furry equivalent of the seven-year locust.

This year, instead of a garden, I thought I might put up a sign on the fence that read: "The Patrick Cannon Nature Preserve." But it's a vain dream. You see both my wife and the rabbits prefer bib lettuce to wild flowers.-P.C.

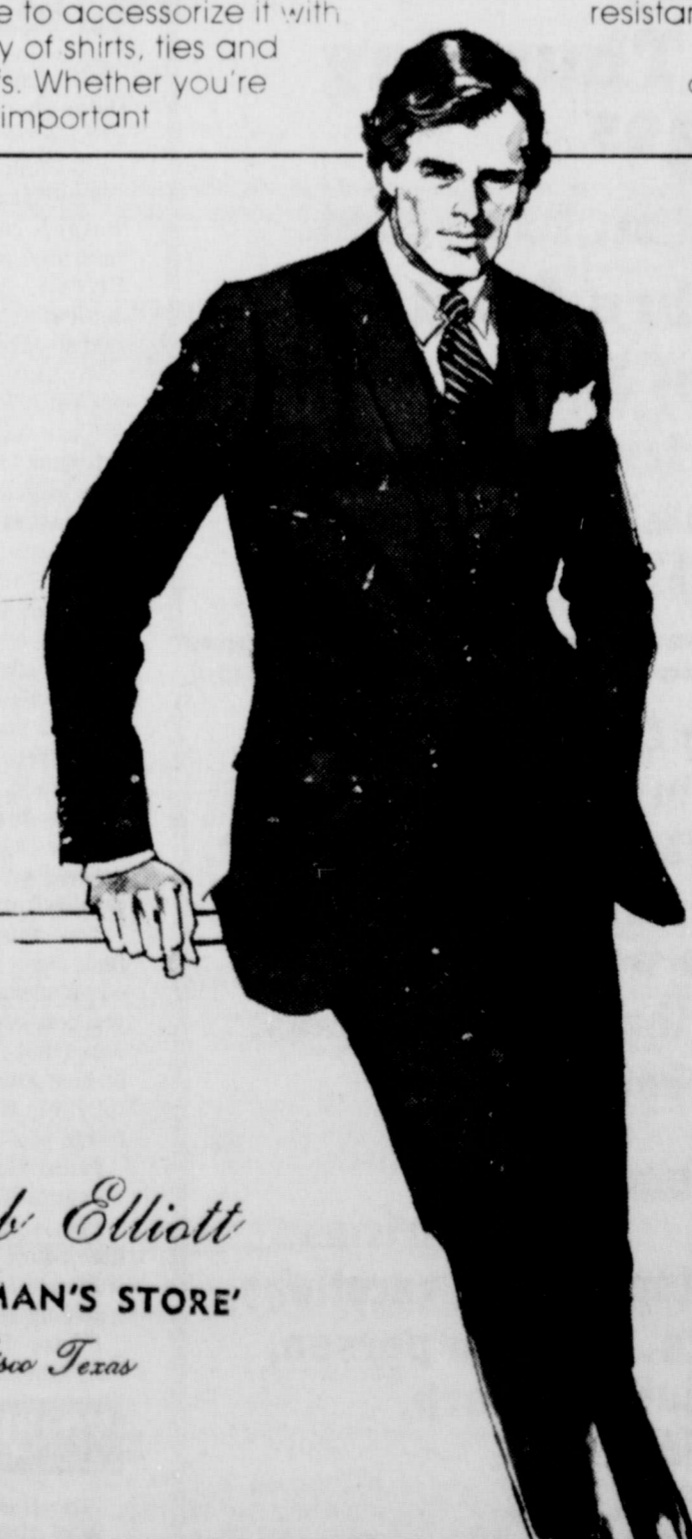

trolled low-price gas. He cited a recent Department of Energy study which estimates that half-a-trillion cubic feet of gas will be transferred from intra-to interstate markets in 1985 under the NGPA.

Even if state pipelines do compete successfully, Nugent said they will have to pay higher-than-market price for the gas. "If Texans are to burn gas, they will have to pay more than the free market price, because they will be subsidizing the costs to consumers in other states, particularly the Northeast," he said.

Other factors add to the problem, noted Nugent. Not only will interstate customers have privileged prices, they will have privileged access to new sup-

plies as well.

With few exceptions, he said, once gas is placed in the interstate market it is forever committed to that market. In many cases, the sale of gas from a single well binds the gas from an entire field until the field is depleted and abandoned. In other words, gas can move freely from Texas markets to the interstate market, but not back again.

Finally, Nugent said, federal rules effectively preclude intrastate pipelines from bidding from the Outer Continental Shelf, one of the most promising new areas for gas discoveries.

Nugent called on Congress and the Administration to:

1. Change the federal law which guarantees

privileged prices to interstate buyers, and  
2. Change the federal laws which guarantee privileged access to interstate buyers.

Nugent recently returned from a round of talks with congress-

sional and administrative officials in Washington where he discussed natural gas policy problems. He has also written to Texas senators and congressmen urging their assistance.

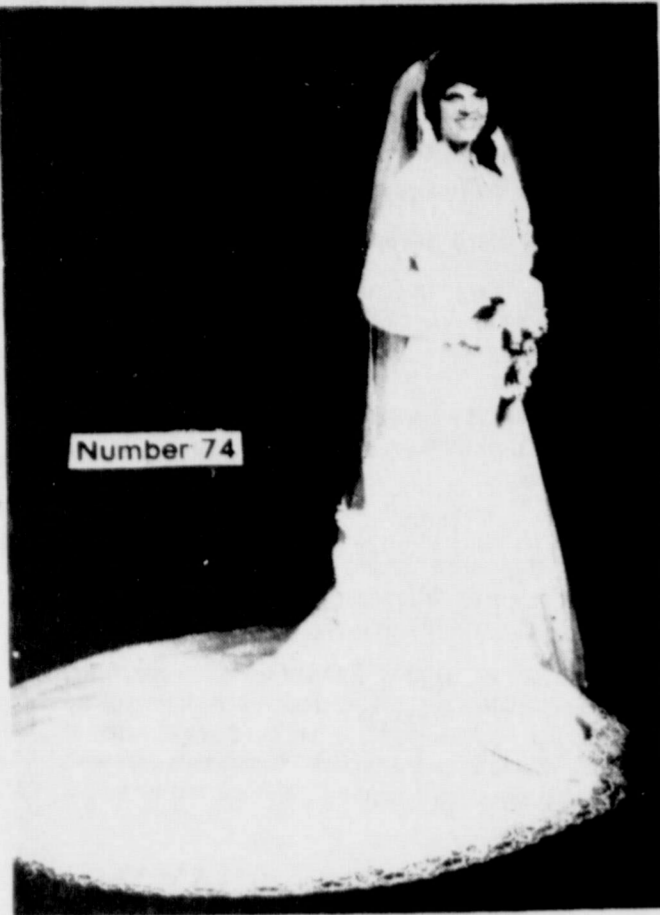

Proteins are not an ideal fuel source—they do not burn cleanly—they do not break down well within the body and the body has difficulty so that the proteins creates waste products that the kidneys must flush from the body.

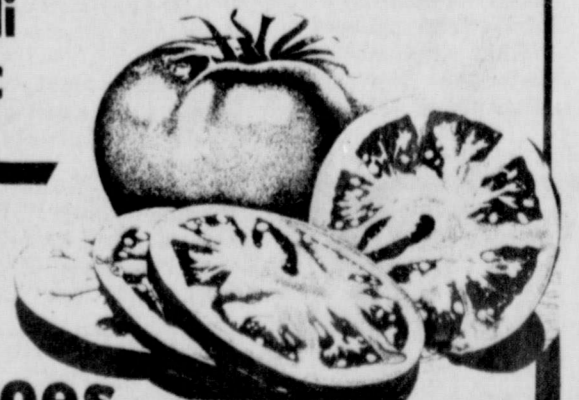
