CJC Board Studies Dorm Room Needs

The board of regents of Cisco Junior College employed two instructors, purchased shelving for a library room, and discussed the need for more dormitory rooms at their regular monthly meeting last Monday night.

Phillip Craik, who has been attending LSU where his work for a PhD degree is near completion, was employed to teach in the drama department. Mr. Craik is a graduate of H-SU as well as LSU. He and his wife, Jan, are the parents of one daughter.

Terrell Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kay Jackson and a native of Cisco, was employed as a welding instructor for the vocational school.

Shelving and tables for a room adjoining the Texas Room in Maner Memorial Library were ordered for use in displaying the collection of western books and artifacts purchased by CJC from the estate of the late

Randy Steffen.

Dr. Norman Wallace, CJC president, said the Steffen Collection would fill the room and that it would be ready for viewing by the public in a few weeks. He added that the collection was significant and would grow in value with the years.

Dr. Wallace recommended to the board that a financial consultant be invited to advise the college as they consider adding more dormitory rooms. A Dallas firm, he said, would provide this service without charges.

Revenue bonds would be used in the event additional dormitories are built, Dr. Wallace said. Demand for rooms has been such that CJC has three students to a room this year, he added.

Chief C.W. Guthrie and Fire Marshal Bill Webb of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department were present to offer suggestions for more fire plugs on the campus. The board took the matter under advisement.

Legislature Work Outlined By Hanna

The work of the Texas Legislature during the regular and special sessions was outlined by State Representative Joe Hanna of this district in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club.

A record \$26.6 billion dollar state budget was passed and, hopefully, no new taxes will be needed, Mr. Hanna said. A drop in revenues raised by gasoline taxes threatens the budget of the Texas Highway Department, he added, and the Legislature will have to arrange new financing for this agency if the trend continues.

The Legislature omitted the "four-fifths rule" this year for the first time in 50 years, Mr. Hanna said. Under the plan used, legislators were permitted to introduce bills during the first 30 days after which committee hearings began. This gave members an opportunity to study bills before they reached the consideration stage, he said.

The re-districting proposition, which comes up every 10 years, proved to be a big problem, and the supreme court overruled the plan worked out by the Legislature. A five-man board of state officials currently is working on the matter. Little change was expected in Mr. Hanna's district.

Mr. Hanna said he agreed with the majority and voted against expanding bilingual education through grade 12. He supported competency tests for teachers, bingo for non-profit institutions, and a state water trust fund plan.

Voters were urged to study constitutional amendment proposals on which Texans will ballot in November. These are important mat-

ters and you need to be informed," he said. Mr. Hanna, who lives at Breckenridge, was introduced by Lion Truman Kirk. Guests at the luncheon included Don Wallace and Leo Lipshitz.

Wranglers Defeat Texas Tech Red Raider JV By Score 29-7

Lubbock—Sparked by two Kioumars Rezaie field goals and a 51-yard interception return by defensive back Randy Hodges, the Cisco Junior College Wranglers roared to their third straight victory of the season here Thursday night with a 29-7 win over the Texas Tech Red Raider Junior Varsity.

Coach Bill Anderson's Wranglers jumped out to a 12-0 lead in the first quarter, then added 14 more in the third to put the game away. The action was in the annual Shrine Bowl at Jones Stadium on the Texas Tech campus, and it was the first loss of the year for the Raider JV.

Rezaie booted a 25-yard field goal with 8:30 left in the opening quarter to get the scoring off to a good start. The boot came following a 77-yard, 16-play drive which ate up almost six minutes of the opening period.

Quarterback John Farris went to the air to move the Wranglers down the field, completing long passes of 11 yards to Matt Ligon, 20 yards to Barrette Douglas and 13 yards to Robbie Birdwell.

A bobbled snap on a fourth down kick try by Tech's Joe Vance provided CJC with two more points with about three minutes left in the opening quarter. Vance simply fell on the ball in the

end zone and CJC led 5-0. The Wranglers came right back after the free kick and marched from the Tech 24 after a Kelly Fisher return. It took them only four plays to move the score to 12-0 as fullback Billy Richardson broke several tackles after taking the handoff at the Tech 10. Rezaie added the extra point.

Tech got on the scoreboard with 7:51 remaining in the first half when quarterback Rusty Roark hit Midland wide receiver Jerry Zachery on a swing pass and the speedy former District 5-A AAAA back raced 52 yards for the only Raider touchdown.

On the second Tech series

following the second half kickoff, the Raiders had moved from their own 26 to the Tech 41 when Brock went to the air again, looking for paydirt. This time, however, Hodges stepped in and picked off the pass, then raced the remainder of the 59 yards for the goalline. A bad snap foiled Rezaie's second PAT boot.

On their next possession, the Wranglers again drove a long distance, moving 65 yards in nine plays. Farris, operating from the shotgun, nailed one into Ligon's hands for a 12-yard gain, then pitched to freshman Ronald Hunter on the option and Hunter raced the final 24 yards. This time, Farris chose the airways for the conversion and hit Ligon again for the two-pointer and a 26-7 Wrangler lead at 1:30.

Rezaie got into the scoring picture again in the last quarter with 24 seconds left on the clock as he kicked a 20-yard field goal.

Hunter finished the game as the leading rusher with 36 yards on six carries. Farris completed 11 of 21 passes for 142 yards and Ligon was the top receiver with four catches for 76 yards.

CJC travels to Breckenridge next Saturday to battle Ranger Junior College, now 1-1 for the year, in the fourth Lions Club Benefit Bowl at Buckaroo Stadium.

Sun Gas Drilling Increases 30% In '81

Interest rates are not high, however, relative to the rate of inflation. Mortgage interest rates historically average about 3 or 4 percentage points more than the rate of inflation. Thus given the current 12 percent inflation, mortgage rates are not usually high. If inflation can be reduced sufficiently, the interest rate will decline to a level at which more people can afford to buy a home.

Rep. Joe Hanna Is Leader In Battle To Curtail Drug Abuse

State Rep. Joe Hanna, D-Breckenridge, played a significant leadership role in the battle to curtail drug abuse by children and adolescents in Texas, the Texans' War on Drugs Committee announced today.

The Texans' War on Drugs Committee, established by Gov. Bill Clements and headed by Ross Perot, was formed to combat illegal drug trafficking in Texas. The committee's weapons are the education of parents, support of anti-drug legislation and improved communications among state law enforcement officers.

"Hanna and several other legislators went above and beyond the call of duty to support the Texans' War on Drug program," said Perot, chairman of Dallas-based Electronic Data Systems Corp. "He heeded the call from parents all over the state to protect the children of Texas from the drug culture."

Perot emphasized that without the effective teamwork of state officials like Hanna and concerned Texas parents, the five-part legislative package developed by the Texans' War on Drugs Committee

would never have been passed. Perot also stressed that support from House Speaker Billy Clayton and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby was also an integral part of the program's success.

"The record number of letters and personal visits to state officials from their constituents during the regular legislative session indicates that illegal drug trafficking is a major concern for Texans," Perot said.

New statutes passed in the session toughen penalties for delivery of drugs to minors, tighten the laws against drug trafficking and make it illegal to manufacture, deliver or possess drug paraphernalia. Also passed was a triplicate prescription bill that will help identify persons who divert prescription drugs to the illegal market. The fifth new law permits immediate revocation of licenses of health care professionals convicted of drug-related felony crimes. All of the laws became effective September 1, with the exception of the triplicate prescription bill.

The 97th Congress' first six months in action was the most productive of any period in recent memory. The Administration's program for economic recovery was passed virtually intact.

That means federal spending has been slashed far below projected levels, your taxes will be lower and the intrusion of federal government into the business of its citizens will be reduced. But more than that, it means there has been a dramatic shift in the philosophy of government. The budget and reconciliation package represents the first downward movement of federal spending and federal involvement in well over 20 years. The tone has been set for a continuation of this new approach in future years.

But there still is much to be done this year. Congress is back in session this week after a month-long recess from legislative activity. That doesn't mean that most of the members of the Congress have been vacationing.

Rather, this respite from work in Washington has provided an essential period for members to attend to their jobs in their home states and to do other research to improve their knowledge of legislative issues. For instance, I spent much of the recess period visiting military installations within the continental United States to get a better idea of our defense needs. As chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, I need to have this information from military people in the field.

Now that we are back in Washington, we have much business before us. The defense procurement bill is still in a conference committee, awaiting Administration recommendations on such vital programs as the MX Missile and the long-range bomber.

Only one of thirteen major appropriations bills has passed the Congress, even though the 1982 fiscal year begins October 1. That likely will mean a resolution to fund most federal agencies on an interim basis. The second concurrent budget resolution also will require prompt attention.

Expected Administration recommendations on still more cuts in federal spending will affect decisions on both of these actions. Continuing high interest rates have made these new reductions essential if we are to keep the size of the federal deficit under control. However, I am confident that these needed economies can be effected through still more cuts in domestic programs -- which are the programs that have grown in geometric proportions over the past decade. In fact, many of the "cuts" approved thus far this year actually have been only reductions in projected budget increases. There still is room for real trimming of many federal programs.

Other important legislation awaiting us will include the farm bill and foreign aid package.

In addition, the Senate will vote early on confirming the President's nomination of Sandra O'Connor as Supreme Court Justice. Judge O'Connor is eminently qualified for the position, and has demonstrated a philosophy of strict adherence to the intent of the Constitution.

The President has announced he will send to Congress a proposal to sell an arms package to Saudi Arabia which the Administration believes will help increase the stability of the Middle East. Careful attention will be given this proposal.

In short, the fall season in Washington will be not only a busy one, but one which will be of importance to the citizens of this nation. I would urge you to follow our activities closely, and let me and your other representatives know your views on the issues to be considered.

The Grand Jury of the 91st District Court in Eastland County will reconvene Tuesday, September 22 at 9:00 a.m.

Another date had been set earlier, but had to be changed due to circumstances. All interested persons need to make note of the new scheduled date.

September City Sales Tax Rebates Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said 750 Texas cities received \$40.9 million in city sales tax rebates for September.

The September payments push the city's rebates for this year to \$480.3 million, up 14.7 percent over yearly payments to date during 1980.

Cisco's check this month is for \$8,816.47 bringing the city's 1981 total to \$123,560.06.

Eastland will get a check for \$12,896.50 pushing the city's total to \$126,328.61.

Ranger's check for September totals \$13,763.38 making their total so far in 1981 to \$102,836.87.

Rising Star does not received a check for the month of September but their 1981 total amount to \$12,702.53.

Gorman's September check is \$1,140.44 bringing their 1981 total to \$22,434.90.

Therapeutic Device Taxes Discontinued

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reminded Texans that sales tax is no longer due on any therapeutic device bought or rented by a person when it's prescribed by a doctor.

"This exemption doesn't cover hot tubs," Bullock warned.

The change, authorized by the Legislature last spring, affects the buying or renting of oxygen equipment, devices which help reduce or eliminate pain and all therapeutic items obtained under a physician's prescription.

Bullock said the Legislature also broadened the motor vehicle tax exemption to include vehicles modified for orthopedically-handicapped persons.

The exemption now applies to modified vehicles whose primary use is to transport an orthopedically-handicapped person.

Eastland County Farm Bureau 1,505 Members Strong

The Eastland County Farm Bureau is 1,505 members strong and has been growing since 1962, according to figures released by President Ernest Riech. The bureau in Eastland County began in 1939 with W.B. Starr as the first president, John Love, director and Mrs. John Love as secretary-treasurer. Mrs. Love became an agent with the bureau in 1947 and for

years was the only woman agent in the state. First offices for the Eastland County Farm Bureau were in the Bob Perkins Implement Co. Building. In 1962 they moved their offices to the Exchange Building. They also had offices at 301 E. Main St. and the Western Auto Building on Commerce St. before moving to their current home on East Main St. in

1968. Farm Bureau is an independent organization of farm and ranch families who use the organization to help analyze their problems to formulate actions to solve those problems. The Farm Bureau is totally controlled by its members through majority decision and is financed by voluntary dues. The Farm Bureau has represented agriculture in

Austin since the mid-30's and in Washington D.C. since 1920. Some of their accomplishments are a limitation on taxes for agricultural land; a farm-to-market road system; state sales tax exemptions for machinery, feed, seed and fertilizer; refunds of state and federal reform of inheritance and gift tax laws; improved feed, seed, fertilizer and insecticide laws; better animal programs to help reduce losses from brucellosis, hog cholera and screwworms; rural electrification and telephones; price support programs assigned to help with orderly marketing and eliminate seasonal price slumps; expansion and protection of foreign markets

Use All Pesticides Safely

Homeowners faced with decisions on buying and using one or two of the hundreds of pesticides available for home and garden use need to couple some common sense with a few precautions to minimize pesticide waste and abuse.

The first precaution and probably the most important is to carefully read the label and understand the effectiveness and the limitations of the pesticide.

During each application or use, prepare only as much pesticide mixture as you will need for that particular job. When containers are emptied in preparing the spray mixture, rinse them several times and add the rinse water to the spray mixture. All containers, including empty ones, should be kept under secure storage until they can be properly disposed of.

One way to dispose of containers is to wrap them in several thicknesses of newspaper, seal the packages with tape or twine, and the break the packaged container. Do not attempt to crush, break, or puncture aerosol cans, just wrap them and place them in the garbage.

In short, the safe use of pesticides begins with well planned purchases and concludes with proper disposal of used containers.

Using pesticides on animals which have been formulated for plants can be dangerous. Don't do it! Although the same material may be used in some cases on animals or plants, the concentration and chemical formulation may be vastly different. On the other hand, there may be considerable difference between insecticide formulations for plant and animal use. If manufactured specifically for plant use, the formulation may contain solvents that speed up absorption by animals and results in poisoning.

Trouble comes, only when label directions are not closely followed. Pesticides are safe when used as intended by the manufacturer and in accordance with his directions. Apply insecticides only when needed for the control of a specific pest problem. Use only recommended pesticides and at the exact rates suggested. Read the label prior to each use of the material and follow the instructions to the letter.

Also, use care in treating crops to be used as livestock feed and observe all limitations and precautions. Be careful when treating for other pest problems in areas open to livestock. Particular caution is advisable when treating around water and feed facilities or milking equipment and supplies. Keep pesticides stored in their original containers so there will be no confusion when they are used.

And again, be sure to read and follow the instructions given on the labels of all pesticide containers.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Pears are plentiful fruit right now and delicious to cook with. Fresh pear coffee cake is very good - try it!

Fresh Pear Coffee Cake

2 pears
1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
2 teaspoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
1 egg
1/2 cup buttermilk
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 tablespoons butter or margarine

Sift together flour, sugar, baking soda, baking powder and salt. Cut in the shortening until pieces are very small. Beat eggs into buttermilk and add to dry ingredients. Mix only until all moisture is absorbed. The dough will be fairly stiff. Press lightly into a 8 inch pan. Peel and core fresh pears and slice in 1/2 inch sections. Cover top of coffee cake with pear slices. Crumble together brown sugar, cinnamon and butter and sprinkle over pears. Bake at 375 degrees for 35 minutes.

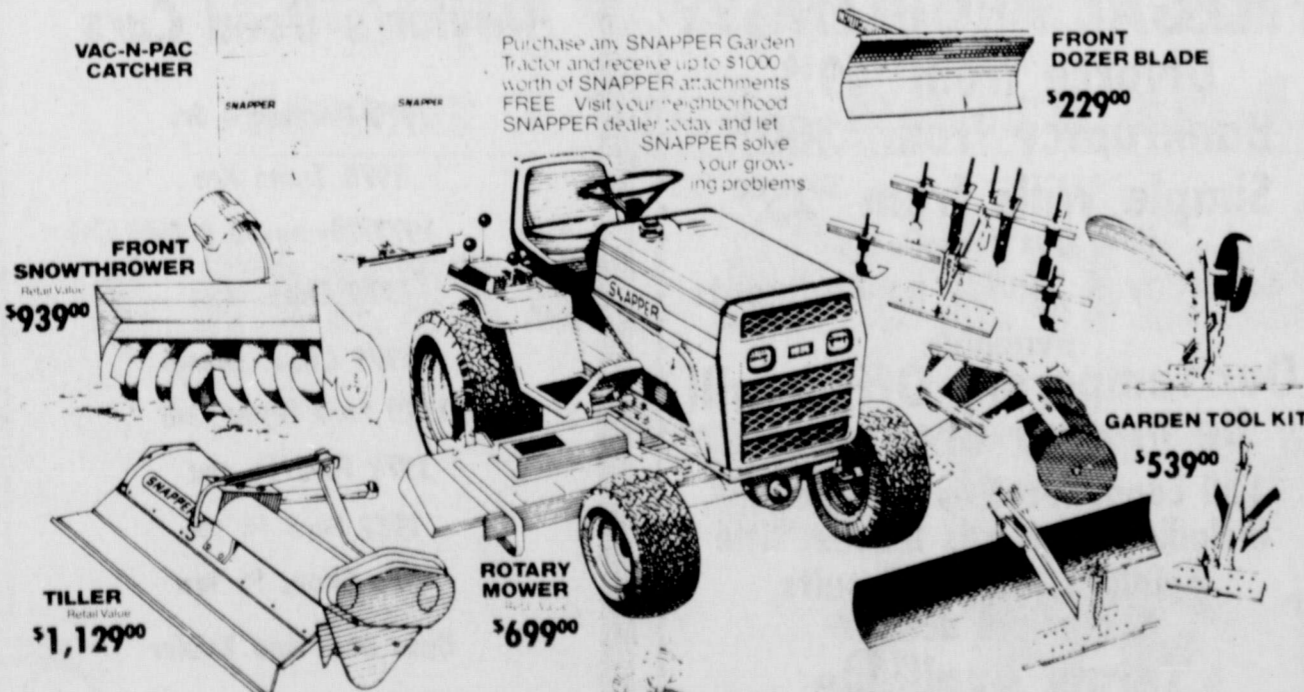

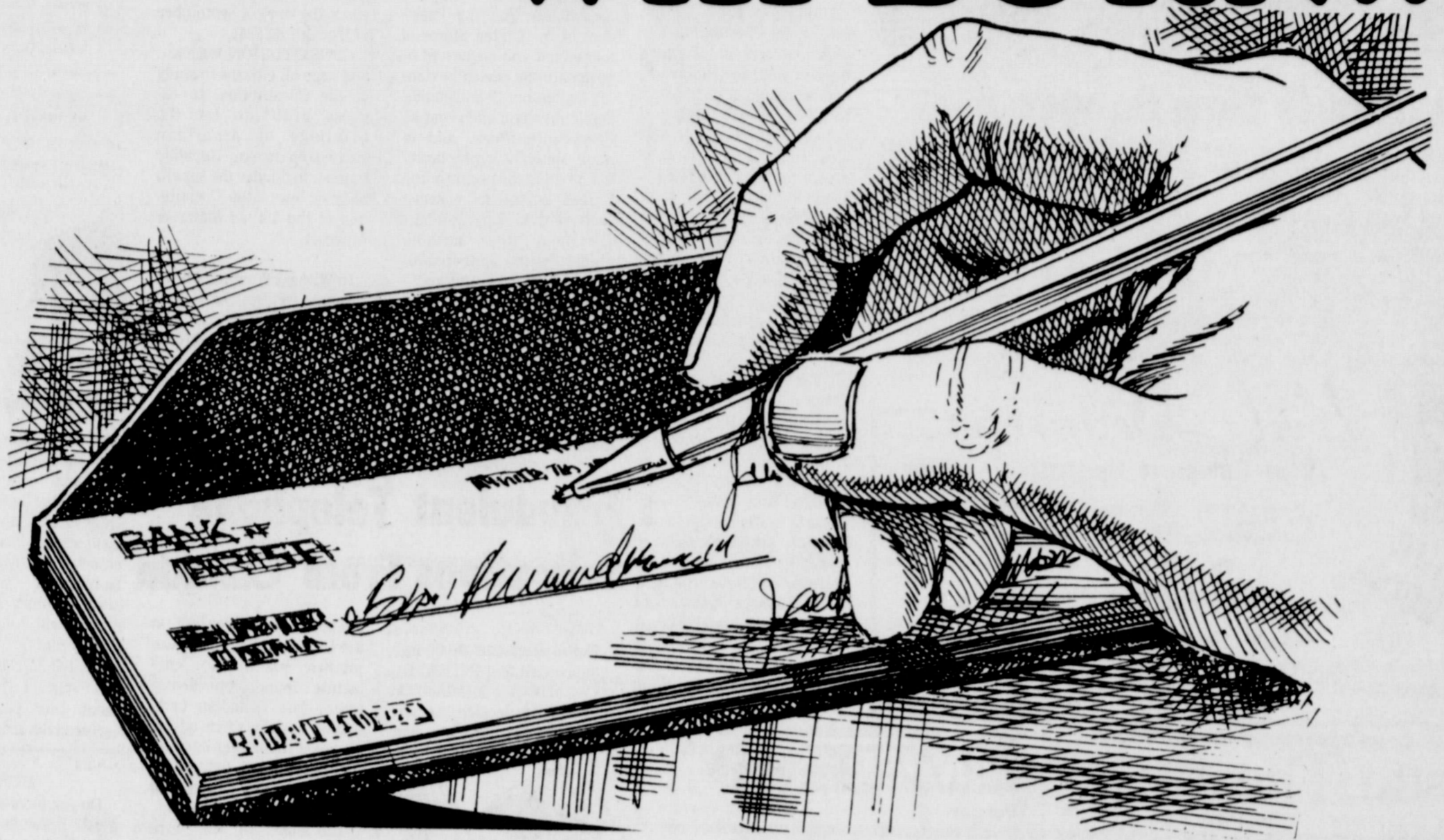

Gene Kea Is New Ranger

There's a new Texas Ranger in the office in Eastland County Courthouse. Ranger Gene Kea arrived August 1st replacing Ranger George Frazier, who was transferred to San Angelo. Ranger Kea and his wife Dorothy and children Pamela Jean and Monty moved to Eastland from

Lubbock, where Kea had been stationed for almost nine years.

Among the cases the Ranger has been involved in since coming to Eastland has been the disappearance of Ryan Burton of Breckenridge. This small child was apparently taken from her home on Sept. 6th,

beginning a case characterized as "baffling"

Coming to Eastland is almost like returning home to the Ranger, for he was born in Gorman. While a boy Kea and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F.W. Kea, lived on a Comanche County farm in the Beattie Community. In

the 1960's F.W. Kea moved to Snyder to work in the oil business, and Gene Kea attended Snyder High School. He graduated from Snyder High in 1961, and shortly afterward married Dorothy Payne of Snyder, a girl he refers to as "My High School sweetheart"

In 1966 Kea entered the Army, and served in Viet Nam from Oct. 1967 to October 1968, when he was discharged. During his Army service he reached the rank of Sgt. E5. In December, 1968 he entered the Department of Public Safety, and his first station in the Highway Patrol was Quanah. In 1972 he was moved to Lubbock.

During this time Patrolman Kea enrolled in night classes at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, and received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from this school in 1977. Then, on Jan. 1, 1978 Kea realized a long-time dream by being promoted to Texas Ranger, which is the Criminal Investigative Branch of the Department of Public Safety. Ranger Kea continued to be stationed in Lubbock, but was pleased when the opportunity came for a transfer to Eastland.

"I would rather raise my children in this type of environment, away from the larger cities," he says.

The Kea family are members of the Baptist Church, and hope to participate in Church and community affairs whenever possible. Here the Ranger might even find a little time for his favorite outdoor hobbies of hunting and fishing. But he can't always count on that - for dedication to the work at hand is part of the Ranger tradition.

President Designates Constitution Week

The Constitution of the United States of America was drafted September 17, 1787, ratified June 21, 1788, in effect March 4, 1789. The United States will celebrate the 200th Anniversary of the drafting of the Constitution in 1987.

On January 5, 1956, Senator William F. Knowland introduced the following Senate Joint Resolution 105:

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled, that the President of the United States is authorized and requested to designate the period beginning September 17 and ending September 23 of each year as Constitution Week, and to issue annually a proclamation inviting the people of the United States to observe such week in schools, churches and other suitable places with appropriate ceremonies and activities."

This Resolution was adopted July 23, 1956, and signed into law (Public Law No. 915), August 2, 1956.

WHEREAS, It is the privilege and duty of the American people to commemorate the one hundred ninety-fourth anniversary of

the drafting of the Constitution of the United States of America with appropriate ceremonies and activities; and

Public Law No. 915 guarantees the issuing of a proclamation by the President of the United States of America, designating September 17 through 23 of each year as Constitution Week,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Charles P. Marshall as Mayor of the City of Eastland do hereby proclaim the week of September 17 through 23, 1981,

CONSTITUTION WEEK and urge all citizens to study to the Constitution, to express gratitude for the privilege of American citizenship in our Republic functioning under the superb body of laws - the Constitution of the United States of America.

Mr. W.R. Newsome, Postal Inspector in Charge, announced that INTERPOL-CANADA has informed the Postal Inspection Service that various Canadian companies are soliciting sales by telephone to businesses in the United States using sales pitches which may constitute fraud representations: The Canadian companies usually offer advertisement items such as pens, key chains, and lighters on which business names and phone numbers are printed. The salesmen, who work out of "boiler-room" type operations, describe the products as being Shaeffer-type pens and Zippo-type lighters, and many offer free trips to Las Vegas, Miami, or Cuba, or free Kodak-type cameras, as extra incentives to customers to buy the merchandise. Newsome said the products are of very poor quality and are not manufactured by the name brand companies. The free trips do not include transportation and consists only of discount coupons for accommodations, meals, entertainment, etc. The promoting companies send the shipments C.O.D. so victims cannot examine the contents prior to paying for them. These companies have been known to change their trade names after a period of time, so Newsome cautioned businesses to be alert to solicitations of this type and to request callers to send written offers describing their merchandise.

DISTRICT CLERK Mary Jane Rowch passes along this most interesting letting from Great Britain, and while most of us were not here, perhaps might have some knowledge and want to write directly to: David H. Cruickshanks, 16, Brockstone Court, Peckham Rye, London SE15, Jun, England:

Dear Sir or Madam, I do hope that you will forgive me the liberty of writing to you "out of the blue" from England with a query the history of the Cisco area. I am attempting to document the life of Charles A. Haws, who is mentioned in the following verbatim quote from the El Paso Lone Star, 18 Feb. 1882.

"Three men, Pony Dehl, Al Tiebet, and Charles Haws were arrested in Cisco, Texas, a few days ago upon the charge of robbing the Bisbee, Arizona stage a few weeks ago. They will be taken to Arizona for trial." It would certainly be of the utmost help to me if you could possibly let me know the details and outcome of this arrest. The robbery in Arizona took place about Jan. 6, 1882 and, I believe, the men were at least held for extradition in Eastland Co.

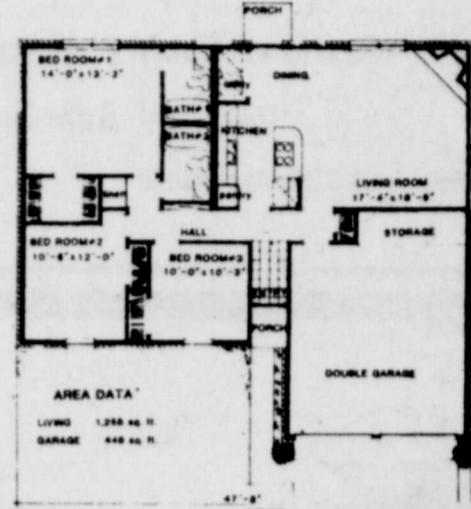

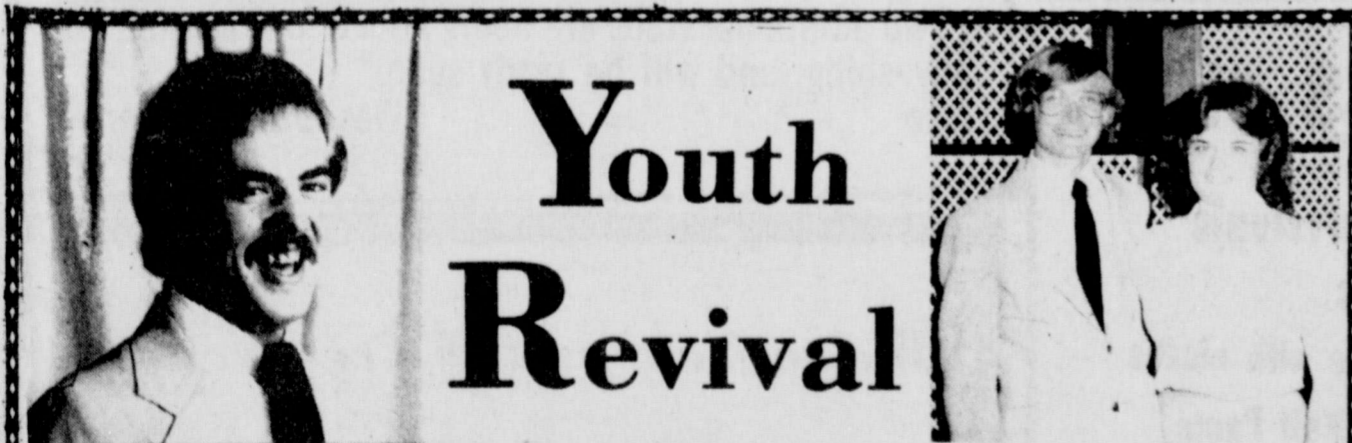
