City Manager Says Cisco Has No Security Problems

The City of Cisco has no security problems as a result of five policemen turning in their resignations at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council last Tuesday night, City Manager Mike Moore reported Friday.

The policemen--Terry Petree, Steve Brackeen, Wayne McGlothlin, Jerry Eudy and Jim Pence--went in a group into the City Council meeting room and laid their police badges on the desk beside Mr. Moore. They then left without a word. Earlier, Mr. Petree came in during the meeting and whispered to the city manager who excused himself for a few minutes to talk with the policeman outside the room.

The group came in some 30 minutes later to leave their badges. Mr. Moore went to the Police Chief's office when the Council called a 10-minute break after considering about half of the items on the agenda. When he returned, Mr. Moore asked for an emergency executive session of the Council after the regular agenda items were completed.

Police Chief Jerry Jernigan, Lake Patrolman C.H. (Cats) Ingram and Officer Rebecca Mendez were the other three members of the Police Department.

Mr. Moore said that Fire Marshal Bill Webb, who is certified as a police officer, has joined the police force to help during the emergency period. Billy Rains, a former police officer who is certified as a policeman, has volunteered to work during weekends.

Carl Neal, formerly of the Cisco Police Department, has been employed and will begin work early in the coming week as a regular member of the department. Mr. Moore was interviewing several applicants for the vacant posts and said he hopes to have a full staff very soon.

Mr. Moore also reported that he hopes to have a decision on or before Oct. 1 as to a new chief of police. Mr. Jernigan has been the acting chief for several weeks.

"To the best of my knowledge, Mr. Jernigan has done a good job as our acting police chief," Mr. Moore said. Several applicants were to be interviewed for the post.

After the meeting last Tuesday, Officer Petree told interviewers that the officers were resigning because of disagreements with the chief over the schedule of working hours. In a television interview on an Abilene station Wednesday

Bank Buildings Bought by FNIC

Purchase of the Sunland Life Insurance Building and the First National Bank Building by First National Indemnity Company of Cisco has been announced by Fred S. Brown, chairman and president of FNIC and Sterling Drumwright, chairman of Sunland Life Insurance Company.

The two buildings, adjoining in the 700 block of Avenue D, have been owned by Sunland since the mid-1950's and have housed the general offices of the life insurance company since that time, and the bank for some 65 years.

FNIC is a wholly-owned subsidiary of First American Associates, which has general offices in Mexico. Brown is the principal stockholder of the holding company, and has extensive oil and gas and related business holdings in Texas and Arkansas. First National Indemnity Company

was acquired nearly five years ago in a transaction with previous ownership, including the late James P. McCracken and other Cisco interests.

"We are most happy to be able to acquire this property as a permanent home office for FNIC," Brown said. "This gives the company an opportunity for expansion of its facilities in a very desirable location."

"Our plans for the building are not finalized as to remodeling and ultimate use, and with the bank still a year away from moving, we have some time to decide how to utilize the 13,000 feet in the two buildings," he noted.

Bill Philpott is executive vice president of the company, having been associated with FNIC since shortly after its move to Cisco in 1968. Sherry Whatley is corporate

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

That undoubtedly says a lot about the type of people they are and the kind of close-knit families they have.

In theory bringing the Cambodians to Eastland would appear to be ideal: Morgan Portable Building needs employees, and these folks need jobs and a place to live.

Implementation probably could have been much smoother had their been early-on planning and coordination between Morgan and Eastland, through the Chamber of Commerce, but it appears now that Tom Snedden, the Morgan executive who is here now, is taking care of things.

It's a fact that the Cambodian people want to become Americanized, and are eager to learn. A total of 36 adults have signed up for Adult Education Classes at Eastland High School, and will be attending classes each Monday and Thursday evenings, beginning Monday, Oct. 5.

The Church of Christ on Daugherty St. and the First Baptist Church are making plans to assist with the transportation of the Cambodians to and from the high school, utilizing their church buses and vans.

Ten of the Cambodians are signed up for the beginning

class; ten for the G.E.D. class; ten for A.P.L.; and 14 for English as a Second Language training.

Morgan has signed a contract for 20 mobile homes to be brought here and placed

on a site to be selected where a permanent village will be established including a day care center for all Morgan employees.

The new people are presently living in temporary housing on Morgan's site, and are generally comfortable.

Their needs right now include more warm bedding, blankets, winter clothes, and towels and wash cloths and things of that nature.

Persons and organizations wishing to provide items may do so through Morgan's office during normal hours, or these could be delivered directly to the Cambodians, by turning east off Highway 69, immediately past Morgan's plant, north of

Eastland, onto a dirt road, and following along the fence line, turning back south at the end of the fence, and the Cambodians are living in the Morgan buildings alongside the north-south fence line.

Two Cambodian women, who have been in Breckenridge for a number of years in a similar project, are here helping get the newcomers established.

MORGAN ELECTRICAL Supervisor Phil Schaefer of Cisco has watched the people being phased into the plant operation and he is most enthusiastic. "It wasn't long before the men were outstanding workers. You couldn't help but be impressed with their dedication and the efforts they put into doing a good job," he says.

Tony White Presents Program To Rotary Club

Tony White, long-time superintendent of the now closed Boss Manufacturing plant in Cisco, brought to the Rotary Club Thursday noon his impressions of economic conditions in the Michigan-Illinois industrial area gained during a recent trip back to his home country, and the impressions were not cheering.

Decline in the automobile and related industries in that highly industrialized area have cost it much of its highly skilled population, he said. These workers are moving southward and westward into new fields of opportunity, and a growing residue of lesser skilled workers has become a cause of much concern in Kewanee, Ill., his old home town, and many similar communities where the economic emphasis has been and continues to be on manufacturing plants, particular ZU automobiles and farm machinery.

In contrast, he said, Texas is experiencing a boom of considerable proportions which is attracting thousands of technologically skilled and professional people, such as school teachers, to this state. He called upon his experience as manager of the Boss company to sound a sober note concerning the future of this trend.

"We found at the Boss plant," he said in effect, "that whenever there was a decline in economic conditions in the north it took about six months for the effects to domino into Texas. I am wondering whether or not what is happening in the mid-western industrial areas will not in time reach into our state."

In contrast to the industrial decline, he and Mrs. White were impressed with the extent and prosperous condition of the agricultural economy, particularly the corn crop. All through the corn belt from Oklahoma north to Illinois, the fields were lush and crowded with ears of corn which promise a

crop, estimated by government surveys, that will mature into billions of bushels - enough to fill a freight train 22,000 miles in length. Ideal planting and growing conditions are responsible, he said.

White prefaced his talk with information about the Rotary Club archives on deposit with Cisco Junior College. These consist of historical records since the club's organization in 1921, including a weekly attendance roll meticulously kept. Tony, who himself served some 28 years as secretary, paid tribute to E.P. (Pansy) Crawford, first secretary of the club, for establishing and maintaining a standard of excellence which succeeding recorders have followed. Billy Reynolds is the current secretary.

He also called attention to the leadership which members of Rotary clubs have provided the community Cisco. At least four members, including Eris Ritchie at present, have served as mayors of the town, and many other members have filled positions of significant responsibility in the political and social fabric of the community, he reminded.

A project of noteworthy value in which members of the club, including White himself, are now engaged is the Cisco Cemetery Association. He said that since its reorganization is on a basis looking to self-support, the endowment fund of the cemetery has grown to \$87,000 - \$13,000 short of a goal of \$100,000. It cost, he revealed, about \$20,000 a year to maintain the burial grounds.-BAB

GORDON SPOT

Everyone remembers the drought of 1980. But did you know that we have had only one half inch more rain at this time in 1981 than we had in 1980? That may not be true in many parts of the county, but that is what the records show in Eastland. At this time last year Eastland had recorded 17.13 inches for the year. At the present Eastland has had 17.84 in 1981.

There is a big difference in the weather when comparing the two years. In 1981 the rainfall has been better distributed while in 1980 over one-half the annual rainfall was in two months, May and September. The temperatures were much hotter in 1980 than in 1981.

People living near the lakes tell me the water level is lower than at this time last year.

Fertilizing lawns now will boost fall growth and get them in shape for next spring.

A fall application of fertilizer not only prolongs green color in lawns but also stimulates root growth, reduces winter injury and promotes early spring recovery. Fall fertilization also increased turf density and reduces weeds.

Warm fall days and cool nights provide conditions favorable for grass to accumulate carbohydrates that promote root growth and help the grass survive winter months. Leaf growth is also less during the shorter fall days.

We recommend applying a fertilizer high in nitrogen and potassium and low in phosphorus. Both nitrogen and potassium are important to leaf growth and color and root growth. Potassium is also important to winter survival, disease resistance and drought tolerance. While phosphorus is essential, it is required in much lesser amounts than the other nutrients.

Use fertilizer with a 15-5-0,

12-4-8 or similar analysis for the fall application. If you can't find these analysis the next best is a 1-1-1 ratio such as 12-12-12.

Base the rate of application on the nitrogen content, the first number in the fertilizer analysis. Apply 1 to 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn. So, with a 12-4-8 fertilizer, use 10 to 15 pounds per 1,000 square feet, depending on when the last fertilizer application was made. If the lawn has not been fertilized for the past six weeks or longer, use the higher rate.

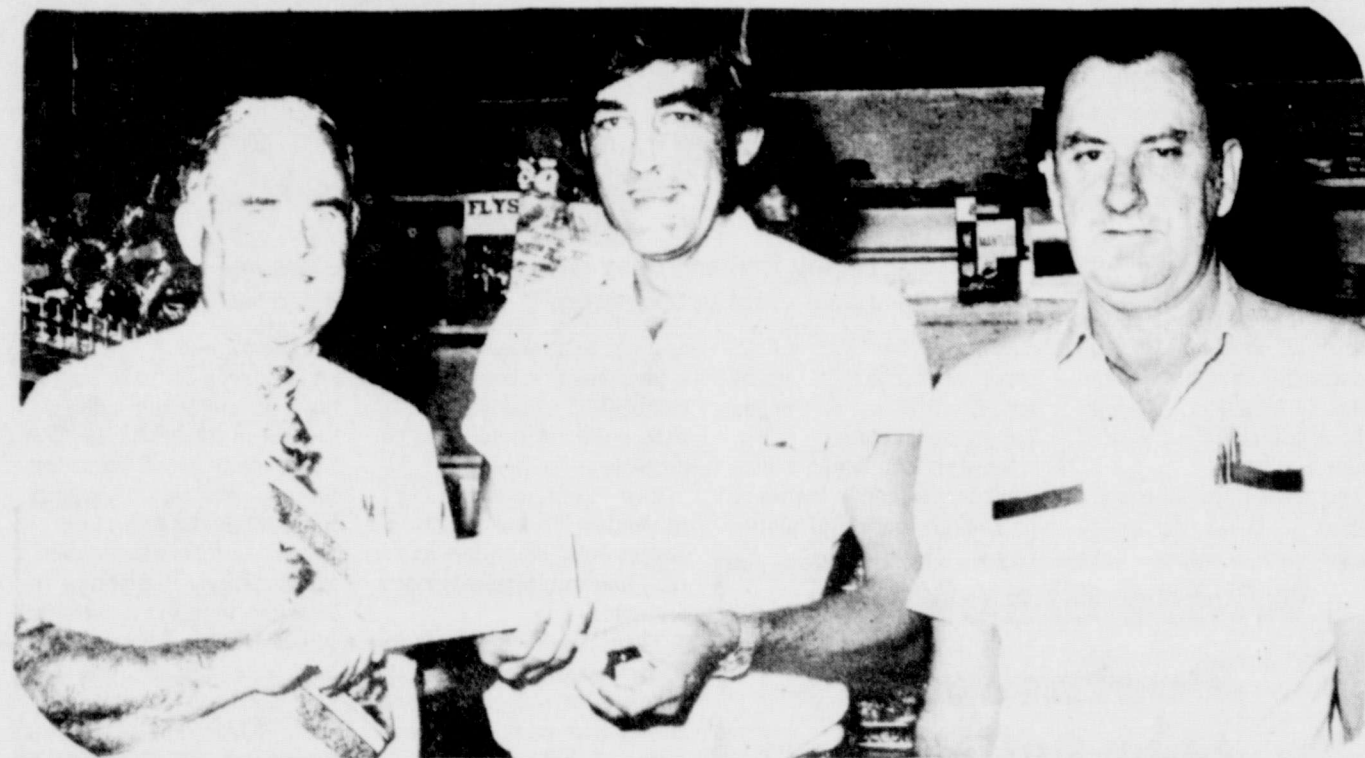
For the homeowner interest in an attractive lawn this fall and early recovery next spring, fall fertilization is a must.

Applying nitrogen for small grains this fall will be important. There are four important reasons why wheat and other small grains need nitrogen at planting or a short time afterward:

- aid in development of good root system
- for early grazing
- to hasten decomposition of excess residual straw
- for high production of forage and grain

Sufficient fall growth for early grazing cannot be expected without adequate nitrogen in planting. The advantages of early planting and favorable fall growing conditions can be lost if nitrogen fertilization is delayed until late fall. Establishing a good uniform stand with good tillering requires nitrogen, and most soils are deficient in this nutrient.

To meet nitrogen requirements during the fall growing period, producers can apply the total requirement before planting on heavy textured soils for both forage and grain. Or they can apply a small amount of planting followed by top-dressing soon after planting or in late winter for grain production only.

City Council Orders Hearing Approves Several Ordinances

The City Council ordered a public hearing on a new waste water facility, approved several ordinances and resolutions on important community matters, approved the 1981-82 city budget, called for bids on new street department equipment, and took care of other matters in a four-hour meeting Tuesday night.

A public hearing on the waste water matter was ordered for 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 29, at the city hall. Engineer Billy Jacobs of Abilene, who is working with the city on the project, outlined a third option that can be taken in disposing of waste water. He had previously pointed out that the water could be pumped to a farm in the area for use in irrigation or a mechanical treatment plant could be developed.

The new alternative would utilize several adjoining ponds through which the water from the sewage system would pass before eventually going into a creek as purified water.

Details of three options plus financing plans will be explained at the public hearing. The project will cost from \$930,000 for the Pond plan to about \$1,300,000 for the mechanical treatment plant. Revenue bonds would be used to finance the project, and sewage system customers would pay a regular monthly sum to retire the debt.

Development of a waste water disposal plan has been ordered by the Texas Department of Water Resources, and Mr. Jacobs and City Manager Mike Moore visited that agency in Austin last week.

The Council passed on final reading an ordinance that would provide for a penalty to defray the costs of collecting delinquent taxes. The city has entered into contract with a Fort Worth concern that will handle delinquent tax collections on a yearly basis for a fee of 15% - the amount of the penalty.

An ordinance granting Southern Television Systems, Inc., a cable franchise extension of 20 years was approved on first reading. The firm has been operating here since 1958 under a franchise. Terms of the new franchise set cable charges at their present rates and provide that council approval will be needed if rates are increased in excess of five per cent. The five per cent increases can be postponed for no more than three years without council approval. The cable company was given authority to bring in movie channels that would require customers to pay for same.

An ordinance levying a hotel occupancy tax as proposed by the Chamber of Commerce was approved. A two per cent tax will be levied beginning Oct. 1 and will be paid directly to the city by local motels. The Chamber of Commerce will use the money, expected to amount to about \$5,000 per year, to promote tourism. A resolution authorizing a contract between the city and the CofC for expending the funds was also approved.

A public hearing on the City's budget for 1981-82 was held. City Manager Moore outlined the budget, which will become effective Oct. 1, and noted that it calls for anticipated revenue of \$1,027,987 and the expenditure of a like amount. The budget was reviewed by The Press after the Sept. 8th meeting.

Following the public hearing, the Council approved the budget and an ordinance adopting it on first reading. A tax rate of \$1.35 per \$100 valuation was approved recently for the coming year.

A group presented a petition signed by Betty Clapp, O.R. Williams and Vina L. Blackburn of the 600 block of West 9th Street, protesting the location of a fence in the alley between their property and that of the James Wheats of 605 West 8th Street. They contended that the Wheat fence was taking in several feet of the alley. The council explained that it was powerless to act and

suggested that relief would have to come in the form of an injunction from the 91st District Court. A spokesman for the group said they would carry the matter to the court.

A resolution declaring and invoking the three-fourths rule and adopting policy for a seven-member governing board for the Eastland County Appraisal District was approved by a vote of four for, one against and two abstaining votes. Steve Thomas, chief appraiser for the new taxing authority, explained that the rule allows taxing entities to depart from certain regulations in the conduct of affairs of the county-wide district.

The Council decided to accept bids to be opened at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 21, for the purchase of a backhoe machine, a dump truck and for supplying the city with gasoline and oil. The bids will be opened by the city manager at his office and notices of the plans to purchase these items will go out soon. The Council will award contracts after considering the bids at their Oct. 27th meeting, it was decided.

An agreement between the city and the Twentieth Century Club for library services was approved by the Council. The agreement provides that a free-lending library will be maintained by the club and that the city will pay annually to the club the sum of \$1,900 - \$1,075 on Nov. 1st of each fiscal year and \$75 per month for the next 11 months.

Mrs. Louise Allison, president of the Twentieth Cen-

tury Club, was present and told the Council that the club has provided the community with a free library for 81 years. Mayor Eris Ritchie noted that "I know that all of our citizens very much appreciate the work of the club in providing us with an outstanding library."

Following the regular agenda, a citizen inquired what procedure should a subscriber to the tv cable service take in the event service is interrupted. It was explained that the cable franchise provides that an office shall be maintained in Cisco by the cable company and that it would respond within 24 hours to any complaint about service. The city manager noted that patrons might register any complaints at city hall and that a record would be maintained.

In other actions, the Council approved minutes of the regular meeting of Sept. 6th.

A financial report for the month of August was submitted by City Accountant Jean Gray. It showed general fund income for the month amounting to \$59,743. This included \$17,406 in sales taxes, \$2,603 in current taxes, \$682 in delinquent taxes, \$2,931 in franchise taxes, \$605 in court fines, \$955 for grass leases, \$930 in cabin rentals, \$25,000 in financial administration funds, and \$7,174 in sanitation charges.

General fund expenses for the month totaled \$42,964.

The water and sewer fund had income of \$31,595 and expenses of \$55,553.

Miss Gray listed bills

payable for August totalling \$47,776 out of the general fund and \$43,403 from the water and sewer fund. It was recommended by the city manager and approved by the Council that bills not be paid beginning with the new fiscal year until they were read and approved by the Council.

Mid-way in the agenda, five members of the city police department marched into the meeting room and laid their badges on the desk of the city manager. Mr. Moore visited the police officers during a brief intermission and then reported that five policemen had resigned and turned in their badges. He asked for an emergency executive session that was held following the regular meeting. A story about the police action appears elsewhere.

Mayor Ritchie and all members of the council were present, along with City Manager Moore, City Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Attorney Wm. B. Wright, Jr. Some 12 people were in the audience.

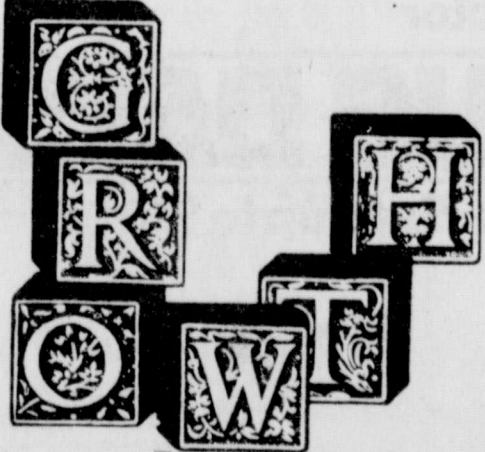

This was a big loss for the pageant as every effort has been made to make the production as realistic as possible to portray the story of the LIFE OF CHRIST, which was termed by the July 1980 edition of the Texas Monthly Magazine as being the "BEST OUTDOOR DRAMA IN THE STATE OF TEXAS."

Those seeing the final performances of the 1981 Summer Production, as well as the cast and the Kendrick Family, said the Wisemen scene just wasn't the same without the camel.

Sugar was purchased for the amount of \$2,000.00 10 years ago, but due to inflation, the cheapest price found by the Kendrick Family thus far is \$6,000.00 for a weaning size female. This bid is from a dealer in Michigan and due to cold weather setting in, should the Kendricks have to purchase this animal, it will have to be transported dur-

ing the month of October, which doesn't leave much time for the fund drive, or it will be too cold to transport the camel. Too, the camel is booked for three nights in Abilene, three nights in Weatherford, and tentatively four nights in Fort Worth to churches for live nativity scenes prior to Christmas, which leaves very little time for her to be trained for the stage as well as being in the public.

The fund thus far to help purchase the camel is \$1,198.04 which leaves a balance of \$4,801.96. PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE No. 577

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY TO DEFRAID COSTS OF COLLECTION OF DELINQUENT TAXES AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Cisco is of the opinion that said expense of collecting said delinquent taxes should be borne by the delinquent properties and their owners who are responsible for causing such expense;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Cisco:

Section 1: Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owed the City of Cisco are given to its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Cisco shall be entitled to, and shall collect, an additional penalty of fifteen (15%) percent of the delinquent taxes at the time of collection, either before or after suit and or foreclosure sale as provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

Section 2: In addition to

the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Cisco shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the City of Cisco in providing all data and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of the property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent taxes.

Section 3: This ordinance shall become effective immediately after its publication in the manner and for the length of time required by law.

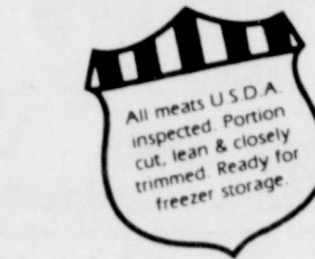
