Progress Noted In Handicapped Aids

Considerable progress has been made during the past few years in removing barriers that prevent handicapped people from using buildings and facilities, Henry Schaefer, well known Ciscoan, told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk Wednesday noon at the White Elephant Restaurant.

Mr. Schaefer said that 110 Texas cities now have offices that have been established in the past two years to work on the proposition of eliminating stumbling blocks for the handicapped. These stumbling blocks include curbs without inclines for wheel chairs, buildings and rest rooms with no facilities to benefit handicapped people, and the like.

The speaker noted that a new state law provides a \$200 fine for parking in spaces marked for the use of handicapped people.

Mr. Schaefer said the Eastland County courthouse soon will have a door and ramp for the handicapped. He has been working with the state organization for several years and has been invited to attend meetings in Washington and New Jersey where the problems of the handicapped will be studied. Lion S. Lopez arranged the program and introduced Mr. Schaefer.

The Chamber of Commerce will participate in a Physician Placement Seminar, sponsor the annual community Christmas Parade, and begin work soon to hold the annual CofC Banquet, it was decided at the monthly meeting of the board of directors last Tuesday noon at the White Elephant Restaurant.

The Physician Placement Seminar will be held Oct. 24-25 in San Antonio, and Cisco will be represented by two people from the Chamber of Commerce and two from E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital. The seminar is being held to give communities seeking doctors an opportunity to meet doctors seeking locations to practice medicine.

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Ron and Mel Scaife

Eastland County Pioneers - 1981

One hundred years ago settlers were coming from far away to obtain Eastland County land and establish homes. Many of them stayed, leaving their imprint on the area. Now, in 1981, we have proof that their spirit is not dead. For the Ron Scaife family has come halfway around the world to establish a home between Morton Valley and Ranger.

Maybe Ron and Mel Scaife and their children - Debi, Kelly, and Brent - didn't definitely have Eastland County or their Kiwi Ranch on their minds when they left New Zealand about three years ago. But they had a general idea of a ranch home, and they planned to travel around the western

part of the United States until they found something which looked like a place where they would care to stay. They were following in the pattern of their own grandparents who had left England and Scotland in the late 1800's to pioneer in New Zealand. And naturally they expected agriculture to be their way of life, for they had grown up in a country oriented toward agriculture.

"There are 3 1/2 million people in New Zealand," remarks tall, personable Ron, "And 20 million cattle and 60 million sheep. The economy is based on products of the land. New Zealand is a world leader in agricultural technology, with farming and ranching having top priority there.

"There is one difference we have noticed in America, and it is puzzling. The needs of farmers and ranchers don't seem to have the same public interest and importance as they do where we came from."

Scaife was actively involved in agriculture in his homeland. He graduated from Lincoln University, and worked for the Department of Agriculture in the same capacity as a County Agent here. He specialized in sheep and beef cattle breeding and management, and pasture development. He also worked with Fisheries.

Attractive Mel, with her bright smile and golden-brown hair, grew up in a New Zealand city. But she

worked as a secretary for the Government Forestry Department, and spent all the time possible out-of-doors.

"Most women in New Zealand, besides being homemakers, work at a profession of their own," she explains.

The Scaifes state that New Zealand is a beautiful and interesting country, and probably the nearest in culture to England of any of the Colonies. Descendants of the Maori, a Polynesian people who once controlled the Islands, live in apparent harmony with their neighbors of English and European blood. The climate is tropical on the northern part of the two Islands, becoming colder on the one nearest to the South Pole.

"They have 'southerlies' which feel about the same as the 'northers' here," says Mel. "The climate here in Texas is somewhat similar to what we are used to, although the changes in New Zealand are not quite as sharp."

The Scaifes finally found New Zealand a bit confining. There was not much opportunity to travel in their camping trailer and see new sights and meet people from varied backgrounds.

"We had to travel 1200 miles to even see Australia," notes Ron, "And then it was similar to where we came from."

They decided on the United States as a place which had a culture they could live with, yet more variety in life - with perhaps a chance to own ranch land. So they left New Zealand and arrived in California in December, 1978.

From the start they were surprised at how difficult it was for them - people capable of taking care of themselves in the United States - to ever become citizens. At the present time they have permanent resident visas, and hope to acquire citizenship within a few more years.

After traveling in the

western part of the United States (but not Texas) in a camper for about six months, the Scaifes decided that they liked Colorado (around Denver) and Nevada very much. Ron became manager of a large sheep ranch south of Carson City Nevada, and soon came in contact with persons of Basque descent who herd sheep.

"We had studied Spanish to prepare us for living in the southwest," Ron smiles. "But we sure hadn't included Basque. But the herders could speak a little English, so we managed to make ourselves understood."

There were many other surprises and adventures in adjusting to life in America. "The people in New Zealand don't really know much about everyday life in the U.S.," Mel notes. "All they have studied is the history and geography of the country."

The Scaifes decided to look over Texas because they found the cold of Colorado and Nevada more severe than they were accustomed to. An advertisement of land-for-sale led them to Eastland County, and they bought the land. They consider it a fortunate move - and better ranch land than a lot they had traveled over.

"Everyone should see Texas," declares Ron. "Texas is the real America. And the people - they are great. They don't even seem to notice our British accent too much."

They moved into their house, which is two miles off the Ranger-Morton Valley Highway, in Feb. 1981 - the coldest day of the year. But the climate has improved since, and so has the remodeled house and the approx. 200 acres surrounding it, which they named Kiwi Ranch. Ron has a flock of sheep now, a crop of peanuts almost ready to harvest, and has sold produce from truck gardens. He is also custom-farming for anyone who needs extra work done. And Mel is working as a Secretary in a medical clinic in Eastland.

The family belonged to the Church of England in New Zealand, and are now attending the First Methodist Church in Ranger. Their future plans include general improvements on the Scaife land, including the planting of pecan trees. Ron hopes to acquire some good cattle to go with the livestock they now have. The couple would also like to write a book especially for the people of New Zealand, telling of their experiences and detailing differences between life in America and that far-away country. But first the family wants to soak up more information about southwestern Agriculture and Texas life in general.

And there's no better way to do that than by personal experience!

Homemaking Hints

Big game, mainly deer in Eastland County, provides variety and contributes high quality nutrients to meals of families in Texas. Utilization of this wild game aids conservation of a valuable resource and can be a food budget stretcher the year round.

The quality of dishes prepared from big game will be only as good as the quality of the meat and other ingredients used. The quality of the meat is affected by the age, sex, manner in which the animal is killed and the way it is dressed, temperature and aging process after being killed.

Big game can be cooked and served in a variety of ways. The way it is cut up will determine to some extent the way it is cooked. The hind and fore shank may be used in soups and stews or ground for sausage, meat loaf and patties. The ham or

round of the carcass is usually tender enough for steaks. If less tender, use it for Swiss steaks or grind it for sausage, patties, or meat loaf.

Leg muscles may be cut from the bone and trimmed of connective tissue. It may be cut into strips across the grain of muscle and fried or ground. If ground, remove fat and add beef fat.

The backstrap of loin of game is used for steaks or choice roasts. Shoulder or chuck may be cut into roasts for pot roasting or ground. Rump roast is used for pot roast. Flank and breast cuts may contain considerable meat. Use for soups or stews or grind for patties, meat loaf or sausage.

It is fun to try new recipes and to make up some of your own. Expect some failures along with successes when you are experimenting with big game cookery. Be sure to write down the recipe for any dish you really enjoyed. General rules for successful cookery of big game are:

- * Cook big game the same as lean beef. Most game has little fat and corresponds in quality to beef carcasses with little or no external fat. It should be cooked the same way. The tender cuts such as the loin and rib can be pan fried or roasted. Round steak, meat from the leg and the less tender cuts are best when cooked by moist heat - braising, stewing or pot roasting.
- * Do not overcook big game meat. It has short fibers that toughen quickly if overcooked or cooked at too high a temperature. Plan to serve it medium to well-done, never rare or overcooked.
- * Use acid to tenderize. Vinegar, tomato sauce and French dressing sauces are good for tenderizing big game. Cover slices or chunks of meat and allow to stand in the marinating sauces for at least 24 hours. Pan fry to medium-done.
- * Reduce the sugar in sauce recipes. The natural flavor is sweeter than other meat. Sauces made for domestic meats may be too sweet, use 1/4 less sugar.
- * Remove all visible fat before cooking. The gamey flavor is exaggerated in the fat. If fat is desired, ground pork or beef fat may be substituted.
- * Big game is a dry meat, moisten to prevent dryness. Chunks of beef fat may be

added to self-baste it or the surface may be covered with bacon strips anchored with toothpicks.

1 tablespoon garlic salt
1 egg
1 cup milk
Mix together flour, pepper, salt and garlic salt. Beat egg and milk together. Turn steaks in egg and milk mixture, dredge in flour. Fry quickly in hot oil. Do not over-fry to keep steaks tender and juicy.

Aphids Attack Fall Gardens

Several kinds of aphids or plant lice become active in the fall when days are warm and nights are cool. These small, soft-bodied, sucking insects rapidly multiply when most gardeners think their problems are over.

A sharp eye and persistence will find aphids before they cause extensive damage. The insects often take on the color of the foliage or plant parts they are feeding on or they feed under the leaves or in developing leaf and flower buds.

Some of the aphids' favorite plants this time of year are pansies, stock, calendulas, chrysanthemums and carnations. Aphids will also attack many fall vegetables including cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, brussel sprouts, beets and collards. Check these plants frequently during periods when daytime temperatures are mild and nighttime temperatures are colder.

Since aphids are sucking insects, their injury is not too obvious. Be suspicious of plants that are not growing as actively as they should. If leaves, stems or flowers are curled or deformed, look closely for aphids.

To prevent aphid damage, you may treat the areas where you are setting out bedding plants or bulbs with granular systemic insecticide before you plant or soon after you plant. Follow directions on the label carefully.

If aphids are already a problem, spray them with malathion, Cygon (dimethoate), diazinon or Meta-Systox-R (MSR). Choose a warm, still day for spraying and apply the spray as a very fine mist.

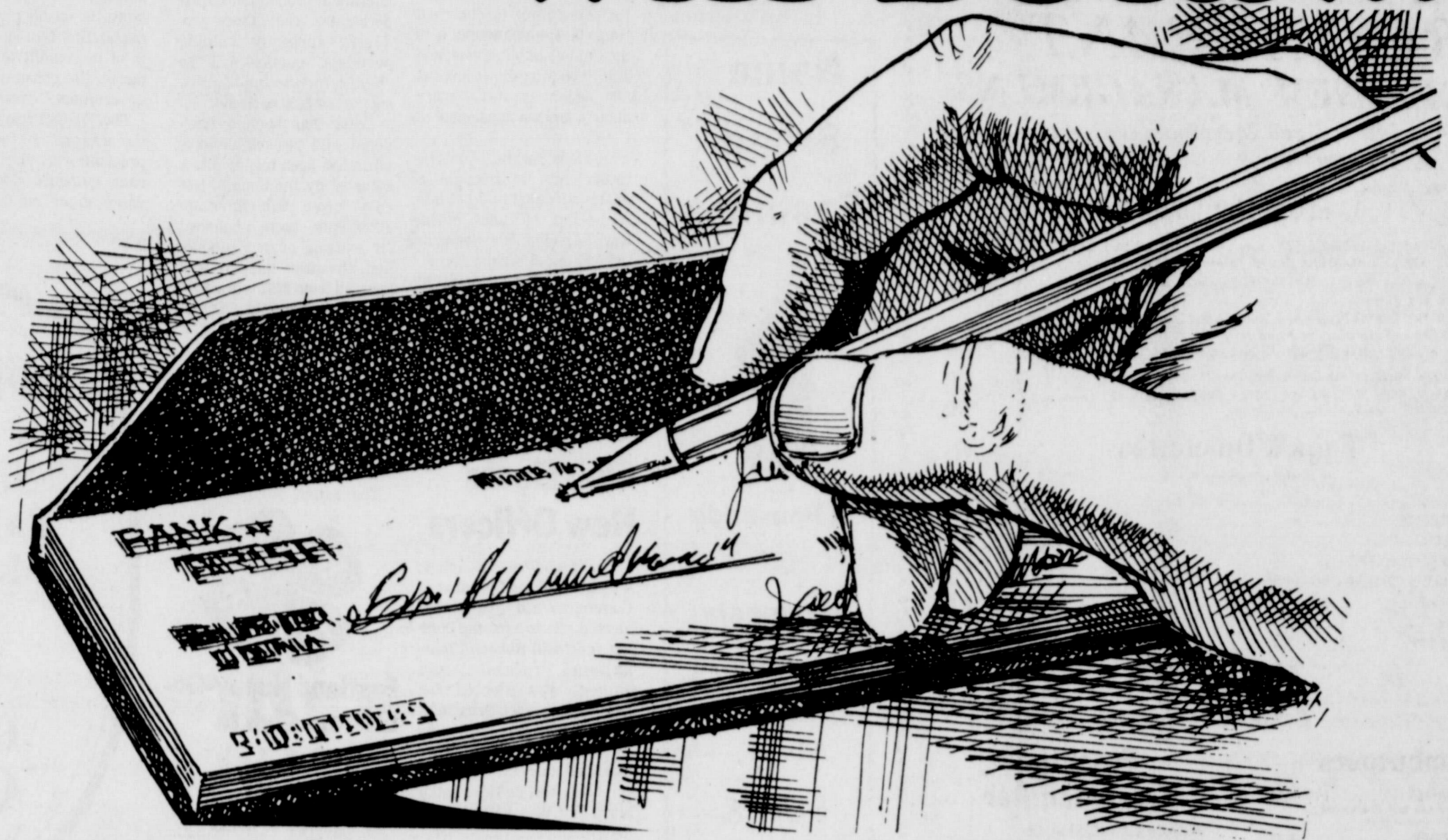
