#### Lubbock Legion Nine Beats Muleshoe Team By Score of 29 to 4

The Muleshoe American Legion junior baseball nine lost their first district game to the Lubbock Legion junior team by a score of 29-4 Sunday afternoon at Chapman field in Lubbock. Lubbock pitchers, Denny Davidson, Jack McCabe and Bill Wylie allowed the local boys only five hits during the afternoon. The Lubbock nine took a three run lead in the first inning, made four more in the second and then scored 21 more during the next four innings. The local lads were held scoreless until the sixth inning. They made three more scores in the eighth. Muleshoe pitchers were Bobby Precure, Max Ragsdale and Carter Taylor.

Lubbock pitcher Davidson was given credit for the win as he held the Muleshoe team hitless for three innings and was credited with eight strike-outs.

Funeral services for Junia Silas Glasscock, pioneer citizen of this area, were held last Thursday afternoon at the First Methodist church here. Burial rites were conducted by the Muleshoe Masonic Lodge, of which Mr. Glasscock was a member. Interment, under direction of Steed Funeral home, was in the Muleshoe cemetery.

Mr. Glasscock, 71, died at 9 p. m. Monday in the Payne-Potwell hospital in Littlefield, after being stricken Monday morning. He had been in failing health for some time. He had just returned in Friday

before his death from a trip to Alabama for a visit with his two sisters.

Mr. Glasscock was born June 6, 1876 in Blount Co., Alabama. Both his mother and father died while he was very young and at the age of nine, he came to Texas to live with other relatives. Most of his boyhood was spent near Walnut Springs, Texas, where he met and married Miss Lula Mae Huffstutler on Oct. 9, 1902.

Soon after their marriage, they moved to Wellington, Texas, where five of their nine children were born, one dying in infancy.

The family later moved to Seymour, Texas, where four more children were born.

### King Elevator Begins Operation

Monday saw the first wheat start pouring into storage tanks of the new \$120,000 elevator now nearing completion by H. D. and Bob King. The first three tanks to be completed have been put into use, and, according to H. D. King, within the next week or ten days, an additional 50,000 bushel tank will be completed and available for storage. Storage space now used is about 70,000 bushels.

If construction proceeds on schedule, additional tanks will be completed approximately every two weeks until nine have been completed. The new elevator will then have a total capacity of about 250,000 bushels. It will be fireproof and bonded with steel tanks and elevator leg.

Crews are working night and day to rush the completion of the new elevator and to provide the badly needed storage space for this area's record wheat crop.

### Box Car Shortage Becoming "Acute"

With the county's wheat harvest an estimated 30 per cent complete, hundreds of truck loads of wheat continued to pour into Muleshoe this week, filling local elevators to capacity. Harvesting began to get into full swing last week and is thought to be at its peak this week.

Wheat farmers, jubilant over the prospects of the greatest wheat crop they have ever had, are receiving the highest market prices ever paid on the Plains and most of them are exacting top yields from their land.

The weatherman cooperated with the farmers of the area during the past week and with 10 more days of weather similar to the past week, most of the wheat will be in, with the exception of a few isolated fields.

Only the box car situation darkened the picture surrounding the greatest harvest in the history of this area. Elevator operations were stymied by the shortage of cars which local elevator men and farmers termed as "acute." Most of the local elevators have been filled since Wednesday and the ones with any space expected to reach capacity before the end of the day.

Information received from the railroad indicated that box cars are coming in only a few at a time and prospects are that they will be scarce throughout the season. Neither elevator men nor the railroad could see any chance of getting the needed number of cars in the near future.

Latest reports from County Agent J. K. Adam's office were from Tulla where they are piling wheat on the ground. Adam said that same situation will happen here very soon.

Other counties have been pressed for combines than has this county, since farmers in other counties have placed 50 or more orders for combines with their county agents. According to Adam, there have been no calls for combines in his office. The county agent's office is serving as a clearing house by placing custom combine operators on farms that need outside help.

According to information received from local elevator men and County Agent Adam's this year's wheat is of high quality. Ninety to ninety-five per cent of the wheat is testing dry enough to store. Overall yields are running well past the 20 bushel mark. Yields from the dry land farms are crowding 20 bushels and reports from some farmers indicate that they are getting a yield as high as 35 bushels to the acre. Yields from irrigated farms are most commonly in the 30's though some are reported much higher.

L. M. Ware, Bailey county farmer, has reported that he averaged 46 bushels and 49 pounds per acre. This is the highest yield reported at this time.

Most of the wheat is weighing over 60 pounds to the bushel and is testing grade no. 1.

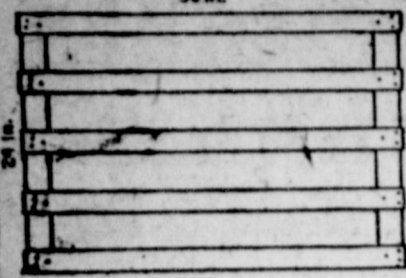
It is estimated that Bailey county farmers have some 60,000 acres of wheat to harvest this year. Of this acreage, about 8,000 acres are under irrigation while the remainder is dry land wheat.

According to the local AAA office, the final rate for wheat loans has not yet been received from the Commodity Credit Corporation, but a temporary, or approximate, rate has been set at \$2.08. This rate with the terminal taken out leaves a temporary rate of \$1.77. That office has not yet been authorized to take wheat loans and probably will not take them until the final rate has been established, which will likely be around July 1.

**Hurdle for Hogs**



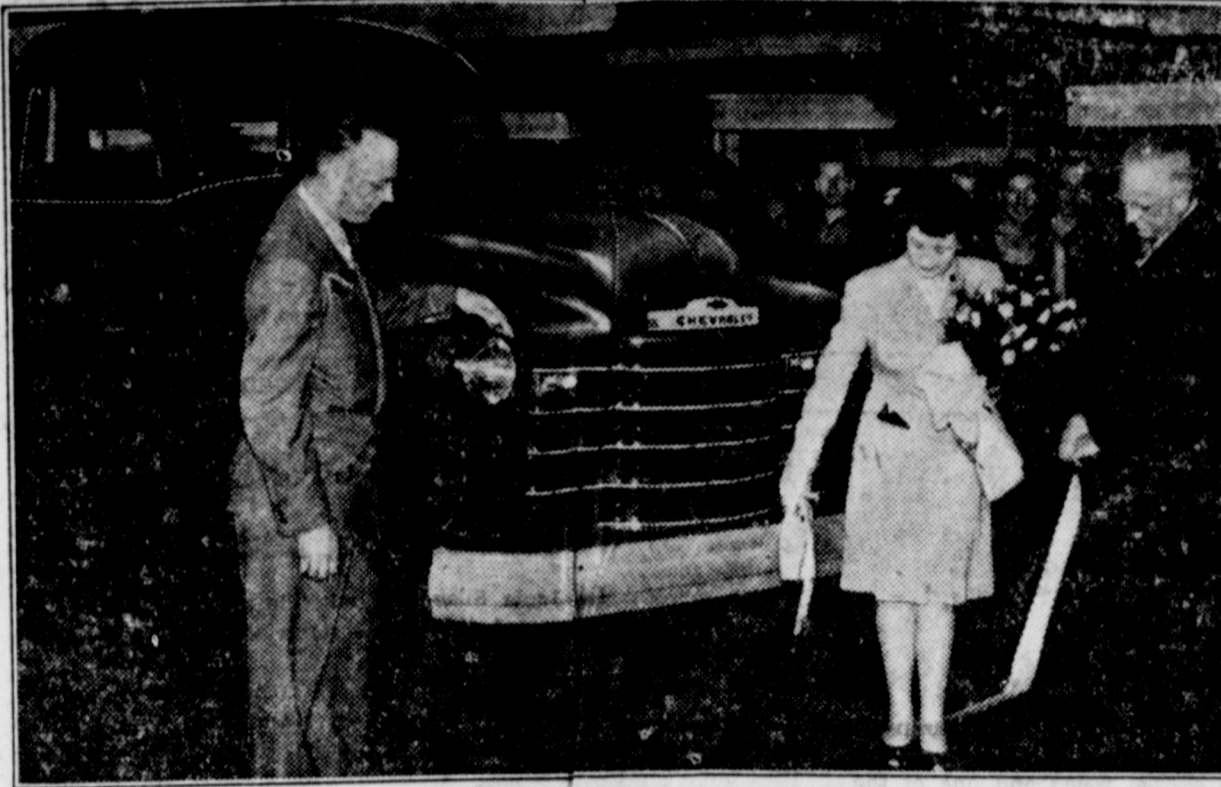
Much time can be saved in herding, moving or catching hogs by use of the easily constructed hurdle shown above.

In recent months small unit pasteurizers have been placed on the market. Tests conducted by state experiment stations and research organizations have proven that the taste, quality or value of milk pasteurized by these units is not diminished—but on the other hand the health factors are greatly increased.

There is a serious milk-borne disease danger of using raw milk. This danger may be entirely eliminated. With many cities, counties and districts demanding pasteurization of milk sold, the small units will prove of value to owners of a small number of cows who desire to retail the excess milk supply. The only safe way to avoid disease from milk is to heat it sufficiently to kill disease-producing bacteria—this can only be done properly by pasteurization. Boiling will kill bacteria.

**Veterans May Be Allowed To Cash Terminal Leave Pay**

Speaker of the House, Martin forecast last Wednesday that Congress will vote this session of congress to allow veterans to cash their terminal leave bonds immediately.

Martin said that Congress could use savings obtained by cutting President Truman's spending budget to cash bonds at this time and that way, help reduce the national debt.

The speaker suggested any legislation would be permissive to allow veterans who wished to do to retain their bonds. He said also the government could save money by immediate cash payment since it can borrow money cheaper than the two and one-half per cent rate being

paid on terminal leave bonds.

Under present law, the bonds issued to enlist veterans who did not receive paid terminal leave, are cashable when they mature in five years.

Treasury figures show that \$1,830,455,000 in these bonds are outstanding.

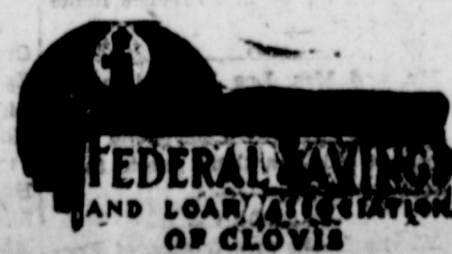

## Farm Notes

### LATEST ON DDT

Latest recommendations for the use of DDT to kill cotton insects have been released by the entomologists of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

To control flea hoppers, the entomologists recommend a mixture of five per cent DDT and sulphur, with at least 75 per cent of the mixture consisting of sulphur. Applied at the rate of 12 to 15 pounds per acre, one application is usually enough to get the hoppers.

The bollworm takes a 10 per cent DDT and sulphur mixture, consisting also of 75 per cent sulphur. Ten to 15 pounds of this mixture per acre at five day intervals is the recommended rate of treatment. Stink bugs and plant bugs can be controlled, the entomologists say, with the same poison mixture recommended for bollworms.

Thrips, another pest, are controlled with a five per cent DDT and sulphur dust, applied at 10 pounds an acre.

### 4-H ROUND-UP, SEPT. 4 and 5

The State 4-H Club Round-Up, the biggest event of the year for Texas' 4-H Clubbers, has been set for September 4th and 5th on the campus of Texas A. and M. College.

J. W. Potts and Lorene Stevens, state 4-H Club leaders of the Texas Extension Service, have announced that each county may send to the Round-Up two 4-H boys, and two 4-H girls, one woman club leader and one man leader.

The 1946 Round-Up, first of the type program held in Texas, was planned by and for 4-H'ers who ran the whole show for three days of entertainment and instruction at Texas A. and M. College. Plans in the making now call for a similar program, with maximum participation scheduled for the youngsters.

Potts and Miss Stevens explain that in addition to the county attendance quota, 4-H members who are taking part in the state dress revue, rifle matches, or who are on any other part of the scheduled program will attend the get-together. All boys and girls, however, must be at least 14 years of age to make the Round-Up trip.

### NO DRESS AT ALL

The ideal work dress would be so comfortable that the wearer would not know whether she had on a dress at all.

Clarice Scott, USDA clothing specialist, has designed four summer work dresses which come pretty close to this ideal.

The Texas A. and M. College Extension Service clothing specialist, Dora R. Barnes, says Miss Scott's designs offer complete freedom of movement with no pulling or binding anywhere. "They are made for an easy fit, which is quite different from oversize," she points out. The designs are based on studies on safety and comfort in dresses for such jobs as gardening, canning and washing. The four dresses were scientifically planned for convenience and durability; they flatter the wearer, too.

Since the dresses are for Summer use, they have no collar and no sleeves. Wings used in place of sleeves are double-layered to hold shape and crispness. Pockets are at hand level, with the openings slanted for convenient use. Ties, belts and sashes are made to fit closely and to fasten out of the way at the back.

Skirts are about calf length and just wide enough for the normal stride—long or full skirts drop about the feet when the bearer stoops

and may be caught on shoe heels or stepped on.

Each dress is easy to put on and take off, and easy to wash and iron.

Paper patterns for the four new dresses are now being put out by commercial firms, according to Mrs. Barnes. They may be identified at pattern counters by the credit line: "Designed by the Bureau of Home Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture."

### SHOWDOWN FIGHT ON JOHNSON GRASS

Farmers and other local folks in Lynn County are ganging up this summer to fight Johnson grass, which is threatening to do a lot of damage to crops this year.

Civic Clubs, the commissioners court and everybody in the county who is interested in bettering local agriculture are joining the farmers in a drive to kill out the grass pest. A Johnson grass committee has been

formed in the county to spark the movement.

Lynn County Agricultural Agent, William B. Griffin reports that when the groups are ready to go into action, they plan to set aside several days to concentrate on killing grass, and spurring local interest in getting rid of the pest.

The county agent says that local commissioners have purchased a power sprayer for each precinct and 200 drums of poison to use in the Johnson grass eradication drive.

**Increase Milk With Electrical Heaters**  
**Higher Production Can Be Secured With Control**

Of all the problems which livestock farmers face during the winter, one of the most annoying is the task of preventing ice from coating the surface of their stock tanks. An adequate year-round water supply is essential to enable dairy cows to continue top milk production and to maintain economical gains on beef cattle and hogs. A pressure water system will do the job most of the year, but what about those freezing months farmers now are facing? The following results of tests conducted by Purdue university help in approaching the problem: There is



no advantage in actually warming water for stock; the maintenance of an ice-free drinking hole is sufficient; water under pressure eliminates the necessity of having large capacity storage tanks. Given these findings, agricultural engineers have turned to electricity as a means of overcoming winter stock tank worries. Research has shown that electric heaters, with wattages rated as low as 300, are capable of keeping ice-free holes open in small tanks without difficulty. Among newly developed electric stock tank heaters, operating at low cost, is a device which is designed to float on the surface of the water. It consists of a hollow metal disk, encircled by a heating element and containing a thermostat. Tests show that it can keep a recommended drinking hole open in temperatures far below zero.

**CITES NEED FOR FAT**



Roscoe C. Edlund, secretary-treasurer of the American Fat Salvage Committee, thanks members of the Association of Agricultural Extension Editors for their cooperation at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York. Mr. Edlund asked for their continued support, pointing out that the need for salvaged fat is greater now than at any time.

Building, Austin, Texas.

The Veterans administration regional office emphasized that it had not relinquished supervision of some 4,000 veterans engaged in job training but that sufficient funds have been allocated to the State in order that it may inspect and supervise the facilities which provide the training.

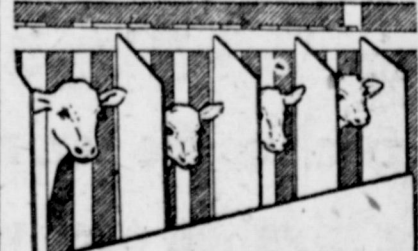
Texas Longhorns first were introduced to this continent in 1521 by

**Shelter for Calves**



Shelters for calves and heifers should be dry and well-bedded. The Washington State college individual pens about 24 to 30 square feet in area may be used for small calves. They help prevent the calves from sucking each other, make it easier to feed the calves individually and help to prevent spread of disease.

**Penicillin Fails at Pear Blight Control**

While penicillin has proven the wonder drug of the century, it has proven utterly unsuited to control pear and walnut blights, according to work done by Dr. B. A. Rudolph, University of California deciduous fruit station at San Jose. Large concentrations failed completely to check the disease when injected into the trees. It is believed that excessive dilution of the drug by the sap stream is responsible.

**VA To Supervise Veterans Training**

Veterans Administration regional office at Lubbock announced today that the State of Texas has assumed complete responsibility for inspection and approval of all facilities for on-the-job training of World War II veterans under Public Law 346 (GI Bill).

In addition, the State has taken over the supervision of 6,043 West Texas firms, establishments and shops presently conducting on-the-job training for veterans.

VA advised that all future requests for inspection and approval of concerns to train veterans on the job under the GI Bill should be addressed to State Approving Agency for Veterans Education, Land Office

**CLIP-OUT CUES**  
For the Homemaker's Cupboard



In the "M" file—MOTH KILLERS

CANS and chemicals—a combination that spells death to those destructive winged creatures known as moths—are back in good supply again, freed from their war-time duties.

The chemicals in crystal, spray or cake form protect your clothes, carpets, furniture, etc., and the light-tight, shatterproof can protects the chemicals—a protective combination that can't be beat as an investment, when you consider that the moth and its children destroy \$200,000,000 worth of goods every year!

The illustrations above may help with the selection of moth killers for your particular need.

The liquid spray type of moth killer is especially suited for protecting fabrics in daily use—such as rugs, draperies, upholstered furniture. Drawing No. 1 above shows the spray can "gun" in action protecting draperies. The liquid used to fill the "gun" comes in another can that protects the chemicals from deterioration when not in use. Drawing No. 2 shows the use of the liquid spray (or crystals) in the vacuum sweeper attachment.

For cedar chests and sealed boxes of woolen clothes, blankets, etc. (Drawing No. 3) the anti-moth agent in the form of crystals is the most practical type. Just sprinkle the crystals right from the can, layering them in the folds of fabrics as they are packed in the chest.

The hanger-type can (Drawing No. 4)—a specially made can with "breathing holes"—holds the anti-moth agent in crystal or cake form and can be hung on the clothes rod in the closet where its vapors (pleasantly scented) are a constant threat to the visiting moth. The can is a lifetime purchase, for refills of the moth killer are available.

Moth killers at hand, where to use them? All woollens from baby booties to afghans are moth bait. Clothes should be cleaned, brushed and sunned before moth proofing and storing away. Whether the clothes are sprayed or crystals used, concentrate especially on seams, folds, insides of pockets.

Although moths prefer not to be disturbed by air or light, don't be complacent about woolen fabrics in daily use. Shadowed spots of the rug under chairs or sofas are attractive to moths—so are the folds in draperies, and the area underneath the cushions in chairs and sofas.

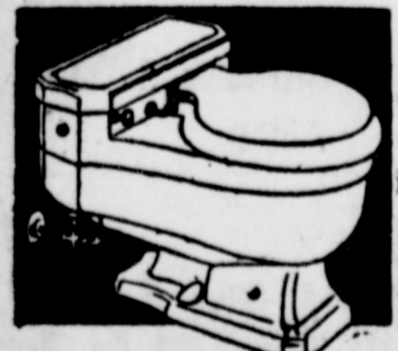

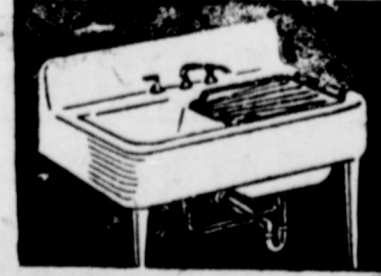

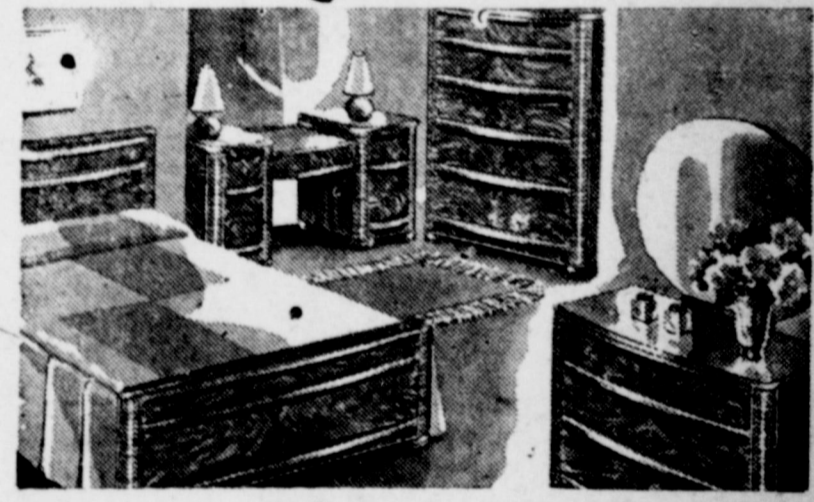

was developed by Dr. Lyndon F. Small, chief of the U. S. Public Health service. It has been shrouded in wartime secrecy.

Snyder explained that metopon is in short supply and at this time can the pain of sufferers from advanced stages of cancer.

Dr. Nathan B. Eddy, pharmacologist of National Institute of Health, emphasized that the drug is not a cancer cure and that its sole use at the present is to make a patient more comfortable.

He added, however, that it provides quick and certain relief from pain but does not "dope" or sicken the patient.

Metopon, he explained, is a derivative of morphine. It can be given orally, eliminating the use of a hypodermic needle.

Eddy said one of the most important benefits of the new drug is that it does not produce in the patient the shadowy confusion which results from use of morphine. Thus, he pointed out normal business and social activities can be carried on while metopon is being used.

Use of the drug will be supervised by American Cancer Society.

Commercial production now is under way, but the drug is difficult to manufacture and the supply is expected to remain small for some time. It will be issued to physicians only on presentation of a signed statement giving information as to the number of patients to be treated and the diagnosis in each case.

## DDT Spray Readily Removed From Fruit

DDT residue on apples and pears do not present a serious difficulty according to research results reported by Dr. J. E. Hoskins, University of California. Any excess residue can be reduced readily to below tolerance allowed by washing the fruit with detergents.

The tolerance is provisionally set by the government is seven parts of DDT to one million parts of pears or apples.

### GET READY FOR CANNING

The improper care and use of canning equipment are still two of the major causes of failure in home canning. Williamson, county home demonstration agent of Bailey county. Equipment people are busy making repairs and supplying parts, and further delay may mean the loss of days and weeks in getting equipment in tip-top shape.

There are some kinds of checking

homemakers can do for themselves. Mrs. Williamson points out. For example, they can check their jars to be sure there are no cracked or chipped ones, set aside for this year. Make certain the rings they buy are suitable for the type of closure they intend to use, and they should follow carefully the instructions which come with jars, closures, and tin cans.
