Man Is Arrested, Stolen Car Found

The suspicions of a Cisco city policeman resulted last Sunday in the arrest of a New York man wanted on charges of rape and grand larceny and the recovery of a stolen automobile.

City Policeman John McConnell noticed a 1975 Oldsmobile parked at the Crossroads West Motel with license plates that didn't look right during a routine round at about 1 a.m. Sunday. Checking the plates, he said it was obvious that the front plates were on the back of the car and vice versa.

Officer McConnell had a police check made on the license plates and the auto number. Within a short time, the report came back that both the plates and the car were stolen. Officers McConnell and Billy Rains then began watching the car to

arrest the driver who had checked into the motel Saturday night.

At 8:30 a.m. Sunday, the officers were advised by the district attorney that they had enough evidence to warrant an arrest so they entered the motel room. The man offered no resistance. Kenneth Thomas, 18, of Buffalo, N.Y., was taken to the county jail at Eastland and placed under \$25,000 bond by JP Carlton Holder. His 17-year old girl companion was jailed for a time but later released. Police said Thomas waived extradition and that Buffalo authorities would pick him up this week. His girl friend used some of the \$431 in the young man's billfold to return home to New York on Monday.

The stolen car was at Ted's & Rex's One Stop pending the arrival of the owner.

Biennial Survey Made At Hospital

An inspection team has completed a biennial survey of the nursing care, safety procedures and equipment, laboratory and other facilities at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, according to a report by Mrs. Helen Orr, acting administrator.

The national joint commission on accreditation of hospitals conducts the survey every two years, and Graham officials believed that its accreditation will be extended in a report expected in some three months, Mrs. Orr said.

All aspects of hospital care and facilities are examined in the survey, Mrs. Orr added.

Fire Destroys Old Residence

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Clark of 600 West 10th Street early Sunday morning. The two-story frame home was owned by Mrs. Hattie Nix of 811 West 5th Street, and it was reported to be a total loss.

Jesse Reynolds, member of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department, was on duty when the fire alarm was given by a neighbor at 1 a.m. Sunday. He said the blaze was out of control by the time firemen arrived. All units of the fire department went to the scene, and the ruins smoldered most of the day Sunday.

Firemen said that an investigation was still in progress in efforts to determine the cause of the blaze.

Mr. and Mrs. Clark and their two children who attend Cisco High School had gone to Lubbock Saturday to attend funeral services for a nine year old nephew. The youth lost his life when he fell into a construction ditch and dirt caved in to suffocate him.

Mr. Clark operates a business in Abilene and formerly was in construction here. Mrs. Clark works for Russell Newman Company's plant here.

The residence was built in the 1920s, it was reported, and was purchased by the late Henry Nix in 1945. Mr. Nix completely rebuilt the home and he and Mrs. Nix lived there until his death. Donations may be left for the Clarks at Russell Newman.

City Hall To Close Two Days For Thanksgiving Observance

Virtually all business activity will come to a halt here Thursday in observance of the traditional Thanksgiving Day and, in a number of cases including the Cisco City Hall, the holiday period

will continue through Friday.

City Manager Mike Moore reported that City Hall would be closed both Thursday and Friday as approved by the City Council recently. There will be no garbage pickup Thursday or Friday but it will be business as usual for garbage haulers on Saturday, Mr. Moore said.

Most business firms and offices, including local super markets, plan to be closed on Thursday.

Cisco Junior College and the Cisco Public Schools will be out for the week. The college closed for the holiday weekend after the last classes on Tuesday, and the public schools were to close at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday.

College students were turned out a day early due to the absence of many on official trips, including the Wrangler Band and Belles leaving Tuesday for New York City and a Thursday appearance in the annual Macy's Thanksgiving Parade that will be on television from 8 to 11 a.m. Thursday. The college basketball

teams were also out of town for weekend tournaments. The Wrangler football team was in Roswell, N.M., for a Thursday bowl game.

Both college and public school students will resume normal operations next Monday.

Thanksgiving weekend was expected to be the occasion for numerous visitors in town as former residents return to visit home folks.

Holiday travel was expected to be heavy and the Department of Public Safety has urged caution on all highways.

The resignation was submitted by Rev. Pingleton at a special meeting of the church's official board last Sunday night.

Ben Hubert, youth minister at the church for the past year, was appointed interim pastor. He has been with the church for the past year. He is a sophomore student at Cisco Junior College and is a member of the

Wranglers To Take On Snow College In Bowl

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, ranked No. 12 in the final National Junior College Athletic Association Top 20 poll are preparing for what may be their toughest game of the year.

CJC has accepted an invitation to play Snow College of Ephraim, Utah, in the 16th Wool Bowl in Roswell, N.M., on Thanksgiving Day. The 2:30 p.m. kickoff will be in Wool Bowl Stadium and will have the Wranglers, who finished 7-2 this season, going against the 7-2-1 Badgers.

Coach Bill Anderson and his squad is one of the top teams in the nation this year in pass defense, with the team allowing only 79.0 yards a game. Snow is one of the top passing teams in the nation, so Thursday's game will be a real test for the Wranglers.

Sophomore fullback Billy Richardson finished the season as the top rusher and was No. 3 in receiving for the Wranglers. The Goree native rushed for 662 yards on 110

carries for a 6.0 per-carry average. He also caught 22 passes for 244 yards and scored eight touchdowns—seven on the ground and one through the air.

Garland sophomore John Farris led the Wranglers as second year quarterback, completing 100 of 156 passes for a .641 completion percentage. He threw for 1,198 yards and for five touchdowns. The sophomore signal caller also was first in total offense with a 133.1 per-game average.

Leading the receiving corps for the Wranglers was sophomore Matt Ligon, who caught 20 passes for 325 yards and one touchdown. Sophomore wide receiver Barrette Douglas finished second with 19 catches and 308 yards. He also scored three TDs.

Richardson's eight touchdowns gave him the scoring crown with 48 points. Finishing second was placekicker Kioumars Rezaie. The Sulphur Springs freshman kicked 24 extra points and six field goals for 42 points this season.

Snow coach Bill Kelly, whose team finished the season only last Saturday, relies on his passing game to guide the Badgers. The pass has helped the Badgers produce some lopsided scores this season.

Two quarterbacks guided the Badgers to 2,369 yards and 15 TDs after the first nine games. They are Dave Archer and Kevin Kott. The leading rusher for the Badgers is Eddie Stinnett, a

6-2, 210-pound sophomore running back who had gained 693 yards on 117 carries and caught 29 passes for 244 yards and scored 14 TDs before last Saturday's finale.

Mike Drury, a 6-2, 187-pound tight end, was the top receiver for Snow through the first nine games with 45 catches for 745 yards and four TDs.

This will be Snow's first trip to Roswell, but CJC was invited to play in the first two Wool Bowl Classics—in 1966 and in 1967. The Wranglers lost to Taft, California, Junior College 21-19 the first year and fell to New Mexico Military Institute 20-13 in 1967.

RAILROAD GRADE CROSSING SAFETY-There were 1,154 car-train accidents in Texas last year, including Eastland County. And this doesn't count the near misses! Texas has more crossings than any other state, and this area has its share. These crossings present a real danger to motorists who fail to observe warning signs, or assume there is no train coming. It should be noted that today's rail traffic runs on flexible schedules - unlike the old precise time tables. So the thought when approaching a crossing should be "Anytime can be train time."

The railroads of Texas and the Texas Safety Association sponsor a program called Operator Lifesaver, which promotes safety at public grade crossings in the State. The Texas program was established in 1977; 30 other states also participate in the program. Operator Lifesaver programs are available to civic clubs and school groups, particularly those of vehicle driving age. These programs consist of a short talk about grade crossing dangers, and a film. Programs can be arranged by writing or calling the Texas Safety Association in Austin.

In the case of car-train collisions, the car almost always has the options. While the car can stop quickly, and usually has more than one pathway available, the train obviously has only one route at a crossing. It also has very limited ability to stop in time to avoid a collision. The average freight train weighs more than 6,000 tons, and when traveling 60 m.p.h. needs more than a mile to stop.

To avoid becoming a statistic in the most violent traffic accident imaginable, follow these basic safety rules:

Never race a train to a crossing. Nationally the chance of death or serious injury in a car-train accident is 40 times greater than for other types of highway accidents.

Obey railroad crossing and warning signs. Listen for the train's whistle. Two long toots, one short one and another long one means, "Stop! A train is coming!"

Never play follow-the-leader and cross blindly in behind the car in front of you. Stop, look, and listen - every time.

Do not go around the gates just because you are in a hurry. It is risky and against the law.

If you stall on the tracks when a train is coming, leave your car immediately and run in the direction from which the train is approaching. Keep alcohol, distractions, and fatigue out of your car. They are factors in a large percentage of crossing accidents.

In more than 45 percent of train-car collisions, the drivers disregard the mechanical devices - bells they could hear, flashing red lights, even watchmen who tried to flag them down!

So don't be the central figure in a local tragedy! Eastland County wants you - **ALIVE!**

Winter Is Buyers Market

When is the best time to buy a home in Texas? After examining 500,000 transactions over the past seven years, researchers have determined the best time to buy is during the winter months.

The first quarter of the year--January, February and March--is the best buyer's market. First-quarter buyers seem able to negotiate a lower price, perhaps because they are dealing with anxious sellers.

However, even though first quarter prices are lower for that particular year, they are still higher than were prices in the last quarter of the previous year. In other words, you may save money by buying in the first quarter rather than in the second or third, but you will pay more by waiting from one year to the next.

This means that if you have to sell a home in order to buy another, you may come out ahead in buying but lose in selling.

TAX BREAK FOR THE ELDERLY

Now that your kids have grown and moved away, does the home that once seemed so crowded now seem too big? If you are 55 or older, it may be possible to sell your house and not pay taxes on the sale.

Federal law allows persons 55 or over to get as much as \$125,000 tax exemption from the gain on the sale of a personal residence sold after July 20, 1981. Prior to that date, the limit was \$100,000. There is a requirement that you have lived in the house at least three of the five years before the sale.

The Homestead Act prohibits Texans from placing additional debt against their home to raise money. Therefore, selling a home and using the tax exemption may allow you to have the best of two worlds--a home more fitting your needs and extra cash. Ask your tax consultant if you qualify for this important exemption.

CHECK OUT A GPM

If you expect your income to rise predictably in the next few years but cannot quite afford the full monthly payment to buy a house today, you may want to look into a graduated payment mortgage (GPM).

With a GPM, your payments in the early years of the loan will be inadequate to cover the required interest. The lender defers this interest and adds it to the principal.

A graduated payment mortgage may help you qualify for a loan on a more expensive home. It will reduce housing expenses in the early years but increase payments later. Note, however, that GPM does not reduce the down payment, the amount of interest or the principal. You may find later that your income does not match rising housing expenses and may be forced to sell.

Talk to your lender about GPM or one of the other alternative mortgage plans.

HINTS TO HELP YOUR HOME SELL

Whether you are selling your home yourself or working with an agent, here are some suggestions to help your house sell more quickly.

Curb appeal is important. The lawn should be mowed and edged, the flowerbeds weeded and the lot free of debris. Scrub or paint the front door so the home looks more inviting.

Windows should be cleaned and drapes should be opened to create an impression of airiness and light. If prospects are looking at night, be sure plenty of lights are on.

Rooms should not be crowded with furniture--give potential buyers the opportunity to imagine how their furnishings would fit in. Remember, buyers are distracted by television, stereos and noisy children. Give the would-be purchaser a quiet atmosphere in which to view your home.

WHAT'S IN A POINT?

When you borrow money to buy a house, one of the most confusing items you may deal with is called a point. You may find that in order to obtain a loan, you will have to agree not only to principal and interest payments but to payment of several points at the time the loan is granted.

A point is 1 percent of the amount of the loan. Thus, if you take out a loan for \$40,000, each point will cost

\$400. When the lending institution charge you three points for making the loan, it really is charging you a \$1,200 fee. Many such fees are appropriately described as loan origination fees.

So, remember to include the number of points you have to pay in with the cost of buying or selling a house. With today's high prices and tight money market, the amount of money paid in points can be substantial.

May To Unveil Texas Marker

May, a community located on U.S. Highway 183 19 miles north of Brownwood in Brown County, will unveil a Texas Historical marker on Monday, Nov. 30, 1981 at 3:00 p.m. in front of the May Community Center in the north part of town. The marker entitled the "May Community", will commemorate 100 years of the post office. Nathan Lumpkin May, who became the first postmaster, established a trading post one mile north of present-day May in 1879, and two years later housed a new post office in it.

May was first settled in the 1870s as part of an empresario contract from the Mexican Government to John Cameron, May 21, 1827, to settle 100 families in Central Texas, the north-third of Brown County being in the grant. May, once a thriving town, has lost its bank, railroad, gin, drugstore, newspaper, hospital and doctors; but it still boasts a fine school system, fine churches, a general store, cafe, post office, garages, Masonic Lodge and the peanut plant.

Pat Coursey, chairperson of the Brown County Historical Commission, will serve as Master of Ceremonies. Rev. Estill F. Allen, retired May Methodist minister, will give the invocation. Brown County Judge, Earnest Cadenhead, will welcome guests. Dr. Ben H. Moore retired teacher and retired Presbyterian minister, will read his dedicatory poem.

Marion J. McDaniel, who researched the marker and served as chairperson of May Community Centennial Committee, will give the dedicatory address. Hon. Lynn Nabor, state representative from Brownwood will read the inscription. After Sook Burnett and Earl McMurry unveil it.

Immediately following the unveiling, the May Community Improvement Club will serve refreshments in the May Community Center.

Technology Changes Agriculture

Agriculture is moving in new directions with increased use of modern technology for innovative and productive ways of farming - both on land and in water.

Youth enrolled in the 4-H agriculture program already are exploring new concepts in aquaculture and hydroponics. The program is conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and supported by International Harvester Co.

In a pilot 4-H project, youth are experimenting with aquaculture or "fish farming". Using small, drainable, fresh water systems like family ponds, 4-Her's are raising catfish, bluegills and trout. Ponds are stocked with fingerlings in early spring and fish are harvested in September. At the season's end, 4-Her's sell fresh fish to area restaurants, neighbors and friends, and keep some for family consumption.

4-H agricultural program members also are keeping abreast of new farming techniques on land. They are actively involved in agricultural innovations to

increase efficiency and economy of farm management. One such project is integrated pest management, where 4-Her's study and survey fields to determine the necessity and most feasible time to spray.

International Harvester provides incentives and awards for 4-H members who excel in the agricultural program. These include medals of honor to four members in each county, an expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress in Chicago for one 4-Her from each state, and six \$1,000 scholarships for national winners award

Storing Pesticides For Winter

The approaching cold winter weather has driven the home gardeners indoors or at least reduced gardening activities. Now is a good time to take care of that equipment used to spray the garden for diseases and insects. Inflation has increased the value of equipment so that replacement would require a considerable outlay of funds.

The one- to three gallon type sprayers should be thoroughly washed to remove any chemical left in the tank. Also wash out the nozzles to remove any trash. Once this has been done, fill

the tank with clean water and then spray about a quart through the nozzle. A small amount of summer oil may be added to the water to protect sprayer parts. Drain the tank thoroughly and store the sprayer with the lid off in an area out of the reach of children. This will help insure that the sprayer is ready for next year.

A hose-on sprayer should be washed out and then clean water run through the nozzle tip to insure that no chemicals are left in the tank.

Many gardeners have chemicals left from last

year. In most cases the materials, if stored properly, will still be effective for next year. Most fungicides are wettable powders and, as such, should be protected from exposure to high humidity. If you have fungicides left over, place them in a large plastic or glass jar with the lid tightly sealed. Do not remove the chemical from the original container.

Remember the label on the bag is your final authority on how you can use the pesticide and at what rate. Pesticides should be stored where they will not be exposed to extreme hot or cold temperatures and out of direct sunlight. Fungicides which have lost their effectiveness should be placed in a dry hole in the soil and covered with one to two feet of soil. Most fungicides once they are placed in direct contact with the soil are inactivated within a few days.

Insecticides should be handled much like fungicides in regard to storage. Most insecticides are liquid and it is sufficient to seal the container thoroughly. Destruction of old materials should be like that carried out for fungicides. Do not dig in an area which would wash into a garden site or into an area near a source of water.

All spray equipment and chemicals should be stored in an area out of the reach of children. A locked cabinet is ideal. By taking these precautions, you will be able to keep the last of your garden supplies as long as possible and be confident that you will not be the cause of any accidental pesticide poisoning.
