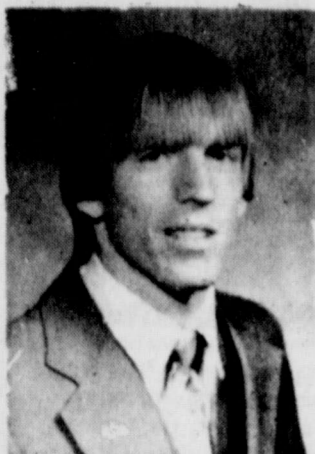

# Investigation Is Continuing In Murder Case; Inquest Verdict

An investigation of the murder-kidnapping of a Cisco convenience store worker was continuing Friday with city, county and state police cooperating in efforts to apprehend the person or persons responsible for the death of Mrs. Debra Garcia.

Justice of the Peace Carlton Holder rendered an inquest verdict Friday after receiving a report from the Southwest Institute of Forensic Sciences, Dallas, with autopsy results. The report said that Mrs. Garcia, 29, who disappeared from Quickway Grocery at about 5:45 a.m. last Sunday, died from a gunshot wound in the head. A small caliber bullet was removed from her neck.

Mr. Holder's verdict ruled the death "a homicide by person or persons unknown." Complete autopsy results will not be

available for sometime, the JP added. Indications were that Mrs. Garcia had been dead less than 24 hours when her body was found, Mr. Holder said.

Police Chief Larry Jernigan of Cisco said his department was investigating all leads coming in here. Texas Ranger Gene Kea and Sheriff Morren were checking reports from elsewhere in the area. Several people have been questioned and several polygraph tests have been given in clearing suspects, the sheriff said.

A reward for anyone providing information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the murder of Mrs. Garcia had increased to \$3,600. Those offering rewards were Quickway Grocery, \$2,500; Mayor Eris Ritchie, \$500; Taylor Center, \$500; Linton Batteas, local contractor and member of the city council, \$500; and Big Country Real Estate \$100.

It was reported that Ranger Kea and city and county police authorities were to meet Friday afternoon to study the case.

Mrs. Garcia apparently surprised someone robbing a cash register at the West 8th Street store and was taken captive. Left behind were her car, purse and a sweater.

District Attorney Emory Walton, who has spent considerable time in Cisco helping with the investigation, reported that it was believed that Mrs. Garcia died sometime Monday and that her body was taken to the site west of Cisco and placed in the roadside ditch after she died. The bullet wound was covered by the woman's hair and not easily noticed.

Mr. Walton said that clues were coming in to authorities and that all help was appreciated.

"The incident is certainly reasonable cause for concern among our citizens," Mr. Walton said. "It is natural for our people to take

caution, especially those who work in all-night businesses."

Mayor Ritchie said that "I think that I can speak for the community in expressing our very sincere condolences to the family of this fine young woman. We are very concerned and hopeful for speedy solution to the crime."

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## Firemen Helped Locate Body Of Store Victim

Locating the body of Mrs. Debra Garcia, 29, victim of a Cisco convenience store robbery-kidnapping, resulted last Tuesday from an organized search of area roads, authorities reported Friday.

Police Chief Larry Jernigan, Policeman Raymond Blevins and Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie planned the search, recruited volunteer firemen who manned four vehicles and located the body after about one and a half hours.

Mr. Guthrie, who headed the search party, located the body in the mouth of a cement culvert over a shallow creek on the old Abilene Highway about three and a half miles west of Cisco. He said that he and Joe Jarvis, an employee of Burgess Industries, were in the Fire Department's emergency vehicle. They walked on each side of the highway from time to time.

When he first saw the body, Mr. Guthrie said she reminded him of someone sunbathing. She was fully dressed, wearing a blouse and blue jeans, and shoes. Her glasses were in place. She appeared to have been carefully placed on the ground about seven feet from the culvert, he said.

First, Mr. Guthrie said he checked for a pulse. Finding none, he went to the

emergency vehicle and called by radio to report to the fire station, asking that authorities be informed.

There were no signs of blood or violence, Mr. Guthrie said. He felt that the body had not been there long or someone would have seen it.

In a short while, city police, sheriff's department officers, the district attorney, the justice of the peace, and others were at the scene. An inquest was conducted before the body was removed by the funeral home. The body was taken to Dallas Tuesday night for an autopsy.

Mr. Jernigan, Cisco police chief, told The Press that "Mr. Guthrie and members of the fire department are due a 'well done' for their help. I know the community appreciates them."

Other firemen in three other radio equipped vehicles were Gerald Jackson, W.T. Eaton, Kenneth Boyd, David Gill, Bobby Ingram and Bill Webb. Each vehicle was working in a different sector. All four had their radios tuned to the center at the fire station.

The search was organized and carried out with the knowledge and approval of county authorities, Mr. Jernigan said.

## Funeral Services For Victim Held Friday

Funeral services for Debra Jo Garcia, a young mother who lost her life in a convenience store robbery-kidnapping here, were conducted at 2 p.m. Friday at the Church of Christ, IH-20 at Avenue N.

J.B. Hudson, retired minister of the church, officiated, assisted by the present minister, Jim Reeves, and Gary Adams, head of the Bible Chair for the church at Cisco Junior College. Burial followed at Oakwood Cemetery with Cisco Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Garcia was born September 30, 1952, in Colorado City. She lived at Snyder most of her life and married Willie Garcia there August 29, 1970. She had lived here for some two years and was an active member of the Church of Christ.

Surviving Mrs. Garcia are one son, Issac, 3; her father, Allie E. Ivison of Fairfield; her mother, Mrs. L.E. Booth of Cisco; two brothers, Allie E. Ivison, Jr., and Barry Wood Ivison, both of Fairfield; and four sisters, Carolyn Tuttle of Sanger, Susan White of Fort Worth, Sharon Cunningham and Sheila Ivison, both of San Antonio.

Serving as pallbearers were Kim Squires, Benton Lacy, Roy Dennis, Bobby Fink, David Roberson and Rayburn White.

A number of family friends were contributing money to establish a savings

account for Mrs. Garcia's little son, Issac. The contributions were being sent to her mother, Mrs. Booth.

Mrs. Garcia worked for about a year at Quickway Grocery where fellow workers described her as "friendly and very dependable." She resigned from the store after nearly a year to seek daytime work and spent several months as a machine operator at the Russell Newman Company. Supervisors there described her as "a real good Christian girl." She returned to work at Quickway recently while waiting for another job to open.

An hour after she was abducted at about 5:45 a.m. Sunday, Mrs. Garcia was to quit working at the convenience store as she has been hired to begin working for Thrift Mart in a daytime job.

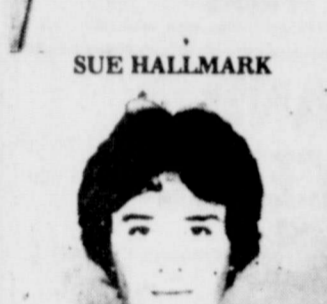

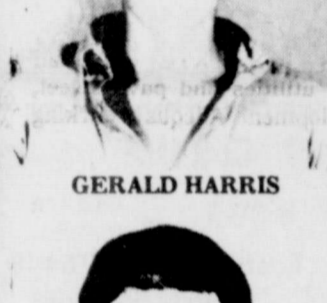

## Interclub Contest Proposed For Rotarians Of This Area

The challenge was brought by O.C. Cook of Dublin, on behalf of District Gov. Noble Harris, Abilene.

He asked that the club give consideration to the program, which would involve a joint luncheon as the concluding feature.

During a brief business session, Vice President Dell Crockett called for the election of officers to serve a year beginning next July. In accordance with Rotary International regulations, Crockett, pastor of Redeemer Lutheran Church, automatically becomes president of the club at that time.

The company today is turning more and more to items of special issue including commemorative sets of five each, and handles handmade and decorated with scrim-

shaw designs, a method of engraving developed by the northern Indians and Eskimos.

## Texas Farm Bureau Gives Service Award To Omar Burleson of Anson

Former Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson is the 1981 recipient of the Texas Farm Bureau "Meritorious Service Award," it was announced Monday, Nov. 30, at the 48th annual meeting of the farm organization here.

TFB honored Burleson for his "outstanding service to agriculture" during the 32 years he served as a U.S. Representative from the 17th District of Texas. The announcement was made by TFB President Carrol Chaloupka.

Burleson was elected to the 80th Congress, taking his

seat in the House in January, 1947. He was re-elected to succeeding Congresses, through the 95th Congress. The former Congressman worked closely with agriculture during his 16 terms, and was instrumental in the creation of legislation to increase the estate tax exemption, an act which allows a large number of farmers and ranchers to pass down their estates tax free.

In 1968, Burleson was elected to the House Ways and Means Committee. Other committees he served on were the Budget, Foreign Affairs, and Home Ad-

ministration Committees, the latter of which he chaired.

During his career, Burleson has served as a county attorney and county judge, and in 1940 he became a special agent to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

His record during the years he served the 17th Congressional District was that of a progressive-conservative. Burleson's attendance throughout his 32 years of service in the Congress was one of the best in the House.

Burleson retired in January of 1979 and now resides in Abilene. At the time of his retirement, he was the 7th ranking Member of the House of Representatives and the 10th ranking Member of the United States Congress.

## TFB Holds 48th Annual Meeting

CORPUS CHRISTI—Although the nation has made a dramatic turn-around in the past year, more economic reforms are needed, Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka told delegates to the 48th annual meeting of the TFB here Monday, Nov. 30.

Among the delegates were Earnest Reich of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, and directors Luther Fambro of Strawn and John Kidd of Eastland.

"We are not half way home, but we have made a beginning," the Dalhart grain and cattle producer said.

"The revolution at the ballot box left no doubt that the American people were fed up with the direction we were headed," Chaloupka said in his annual address to delegates. He cautioned against expecting too much too soon.

"We did not get into our present situation overnight, and we will not get out of it in a day, or a week, or even a year," he said.

"We have been heading toward today's welfare state for almost 50 years. In those dark days of the Great Depression, fearful people permitted social and economic experiments that have weakened our free enterprise system and enslaved generations with handouts," he said.

Chaloupka said the federal government caused the current inflation, using "printing press" money to pay for social programs.

"The social programs — those that transfer wealth from some people to other people — have put us so heavily in debt that our federal government has been operating with deficits most of the time since World War II," the farm leader said.

The TFB leader said the most spectacular growth in federal spending occurred in the 1970s when the so-called entitlements — welfare, food stamps, school lunches, unemployment compensation, Social Security, among others — were tied to the consumer price index.

In the past ten years, the cost of living increased about 140 percent; yet, in that same period spending on entitlement programs increased more than 400 percent, he said.

In addition to hay samples from throughout the state, the show will feature a program of interest to hay producers, users and commercial suppliers, points out Dorsett. Keynote speaker will be Dr. Monte Rouquette of Overton, forage researcher with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The show also will feature 4-H and FFA hay judging contests.

Dorsett adds that the Texas State Hay Show will culminate several days of agricultural activities in Waco. The three-day Mid-Tex Farmland and Ranch Show starts Jan. 25, and the following day features meetings of the Blackland Income Growth (BIG) program and the Texas Forage and Grassland Council.

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On the subject of government involvement in agriculture, Chaloupka said any workable farm program must abide by the principles of the marketplace.

"It so happens that agriculture is now in the best shape of all industries to prosper in a free market climate," he said. "No other segment of the economy competes as well as we do in the world market."

"However, if we are to make it in a free market, we must have economic stability, little or no inflation, reasonable interest rates, and an equitable political system in which labor is not given unfair advantages."

"Under those conditions — and they are attainable — agriculture can make it on its own," he said.

In discussing agriculture's current depression, Chaloupka said the best way to understand the cost-price squeeze is to compare the buying power of agricultural products over a period of time.

"For example, in 1973 it took 68 bales of cotton to buy a John Deere tractor, model 4630. To buy an equivalent tractor this year would take 161 bales," he said. He charged that inflation is the number one reason behind low net farm income.

Chaloupka said there is no easy solution to the current low net income on the farm and ranch.

"We must realize that the law of supply and demand does work, and sometimes it can be exceedingly cruel," he said. "We have the capacity to over-produce, and when the good Lord

smiles on us with good weather, our cup runneth over with surpluses."

He warned against depending upon government for a solution.

"Inevitably, if you have a farm program that produces surpluses, politicians will find ways to feed these onto the market to depress prices — and thus assure cheap food for the masses," he said. "This has been an historical fact of life for three decades, at least."

Despite gloomy economic conditions in this country, Chaloupka pointed to what he called "silver linings in today's dark clouds." These include:

—A growing demand for U.S. agricultural products around the world. But, he said, "We cannot stand restrictions — such as embargoes to our free access to world markets."

—Budget and tax cuts that will help curb inflation, bring interest rates down, and encourage economic growth. He said the tax cuts only attacked the rate of increased spending and people would have to keep pressure on Congress to make needed additional cuts.

—Indications that Americans are willing to turn to "voluntarism" to replace some of the government programs for the truly needy. "Americans are compassionate people," he said. "We are predisposed to good works."

In summing up, Chaloupka said, "There are tough actions that must be taken, sacrifices that must be made if we are to endure as a nation."

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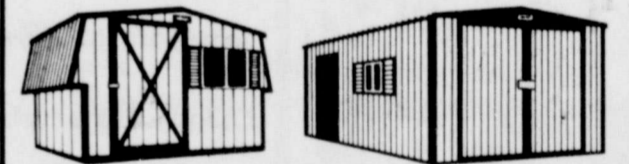

A Pecan Bake Show will be one of the many highlights at the 29th annual Eastland County Pecan Show, next week on Friday, December 11th.

The public is urged to enter some of their homebaked pecan goodies in the bake show.

The Eastland Extension Homemakers Council is offering a special prize this year in addition to the ribbons and cash awards which are made available by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. An engraved silver tray will be presented to the Grand Champion winner and Reserve Grand Champion winners in the Adult division of the Pecan Bake Show.

The general rules of the Pecan Bake Show are as follows:  
**Adult Division**

1. There shall be 6 division of products with a requirement of:

- Pies - must enter one whole pie
- Cakes - must enter one whole cake
- Candy - must enter at least 12 pieces
- Nut Bread - must enter one whole loaf
- Cookies - must enter at least 12 cookies
- Snacks - must enter whole recipe or ample portion for judging and display. Food entered as a snack cannot be entered in the above 5 baked food divisions. Suggested pecan snack items would include coated or salted nuts, party appetizers, etc.

2. Recipes should accompany all bake show entries.  
3. All entries must contain pecans. No refrigerated items and no food products made with mixed will be accepted.

4. Anyone, man or woman, from Eastland County may enter products in the show.

5. All entries must be entered and in place by 11 a.m., Friday December 11 when the judging will begin in the Courthouse Lobby.

6. The judges will be trained in Home Economics.

7. Score cards will be used to judge entries in all 6 division and cash prizes and ribbons award according to score. Cash awards shall be as follows: 1st-\$2.50; 2nd-\$1.50; 3rd-\$1.00.

8. There will be a Grand Champion and a Reserve Champion for the whole show. Cash awards shall be as follows: Champion-\$7.00, and Reserve Champion-\$4.00.

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**Union Oil Expands Injection Over Water Association Protests**

AUSTIN, Tex.--Railroad Commission has approved the application of Union Oil Company to expand a fluid injection program begun in 1975 in the Riley North Field in Gaines County.

In testimony at a hearing conducted by the Commission's Oil and Gas Division on August 18, Union requested approval for 23 injection wells in addition to the 16 it presently operates in the field. The company said the additional injection wells are part of a 21 year secondary recovery pro-

gram expected to deliver 16 million barrels of oil. Union said the total program is expected to cost \$20 million.

The Southwest Soil and Water Protection Association opposed Union's application because fresh water is being used for the waterflood project. Union owns approximately 1,680 acres of fresh water rights in the project area. The company expects to use 107 million barrels of the estimated 166 million barrels in place under their acreage. Union said available salt

water was unsatisfactory for injection.

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent and Commissioners Mack Wallace and Buddy Temple heard oral arguments by both sides in the case on November 9. The Southwest Soil and Water Protection Association asked the Commissioners to require Union to use salt water for the in-

jection program to prevent future depletion of the Ogallala aquifer. Union argued that the Commission does not have statutory authority to deny company use of fresh water in the project, noting their ownership of the water rights.

The Commission order found the Union application to be in compliance with all statutory requirements. The order states the Commission does not have statutory or implied authority to require Union to use salt water instead of fresh water.

The order goes on to state that although Chapter 27 of the Water Code requires a

permit from the Railroad Commission whenever an injection well is to be used to dispose of oil and gas waste, fresh water from the Ogallala aquifer is not oil and gas waste within the meaning of the statute. The order also says the Commission has the implied authority to examine all aspects of a secondary recovery program before approving it, but that can't be construed as statutory to deny Union's request because salt water could be used instead of fresh water.

Union Oil Company estimates there were 138 million barrels of oil originally in place in the

Riley North Field. Primary recovery (without injection) is expected to recover 20.6 million barrels and secondary recovery (with injection)

is expected to recover an additional 16 million barrels. Commission records show the Riley North Field was

discovered in June, 1947. Cumulative oil production from the field through January 1, 1981 has been 18.5 million barrels.

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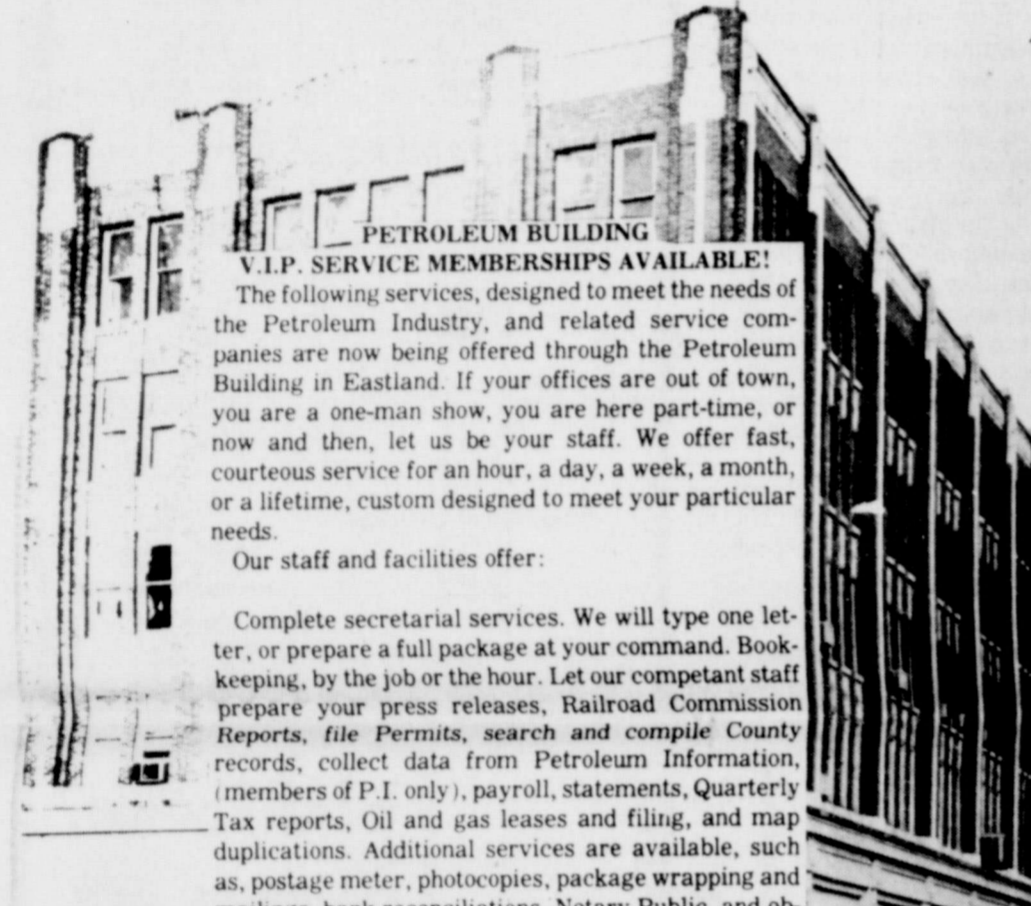
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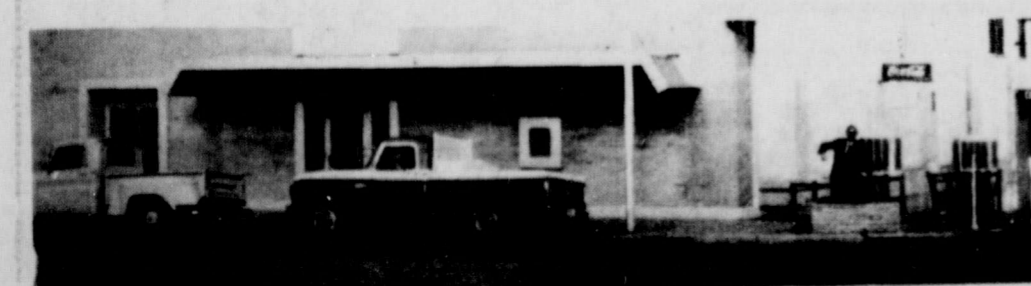
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# Homemaking Hints

All entries must be

registered on Friday, December 11th by 11 a.m. when the judging will begin. Recipes should accompany the entry.

Pecans, a taste tempting, nutrition, year-round treat, are a favorite among Texans. Honored years ago as our state tree, pecan trees are native to 151 Texas counties and are grown commercial in 182 counties. - 3 cups powdered sugar
- 3 cups sifted flour
- 2 cups pecans, chopped
- 1 cup margarine
- 1 tablespoon vanilla
- 3 cups corn flakes

Cream shortening, margarine, sugar and vanilla together until smooth. Add flour and mix well. Next, stir in chopped pecans. Crush corn flakes and stir into flour mixture. Roll into small balls and press onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 15 minutes at 350° F.

#### On Brucellosis Program

AUSTIN -- Dec. 8 is deadline for submitting comments on proposed federal regulations to brucellosis, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said.

"These changes will have an impact on Texas, and producers need to be aware of them," Dr. Holcomb said. If approved, the changes will become a part of the Uniform Methods and Rules, which are minimum federal standards for states to follow.

Dr. Holcomb noted the major change in the proposals is one which will provide for a four classification system for states or areas within a state.

The classification designation is: Free, A, B, and C.

Free means no herd infection. A means herd infection; B will be from .25 percent to 1.5 percent herd infection; C will be 1.5 percent

I believe this was one of the most enjoyable trips the Gem and Mineral Society has ever made.

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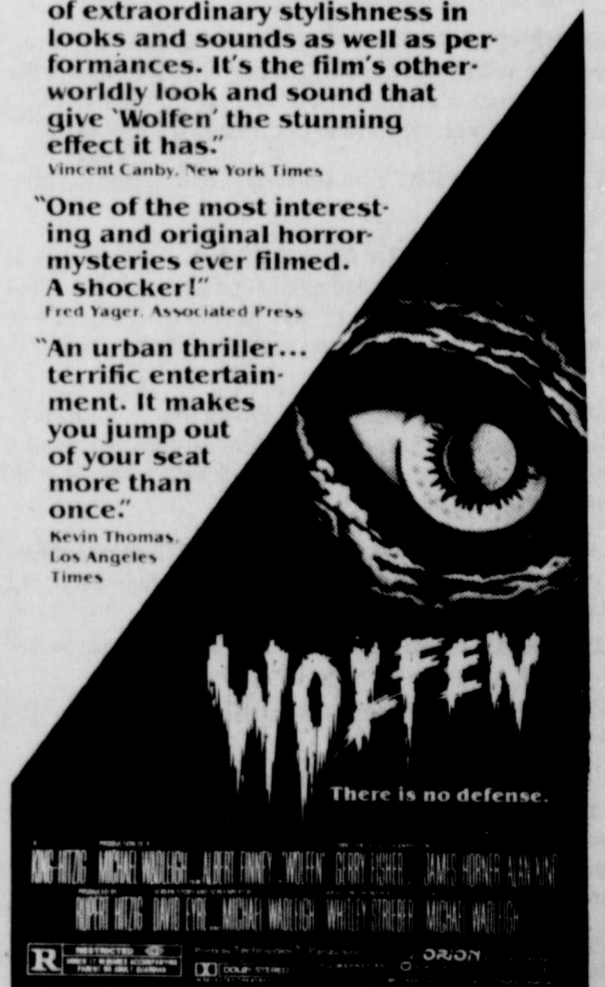

## Agriculture Dept. Proposes Conservation Program

(Editor's note: The U. S. Department of Agriculture has identified the critical soil and water resource problems of the nation, analyzed them, and proposed a national conservation program to address them. This is the first in a series of three articles that outlines the conservation problems, trends and analyses, and the proposed national program.)

America will face reduced agricultural productive capacity and increased production costs unless the critical soil and water resource conservation problems of the nation are addressed. This is the conclusion of a three-year study by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The study was required by Congress in the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA), according to Ron Baily, Soil Conservation Service (SCS) district conservationist in Eastland.

Specifically, the RCA study showed that:

—One-third of America's

cropland is eroding faster than the soil can rebuild itself through natural processes. Unless corrective actions are taken, the acreage of this excessively eroding land will increase further.

—Floods threaten human life, cropland and other property, livestock and crops in upstream watersheds. Greater damage is likely in the future.

—Depletion of groundwater threatens the continuation of irrigated agriculture in extensive areas of the West.

—Deterioration of water quality may limit the use of water for irrigation, municipal and industrial supply, fish and wildlife habitat, and other purposes.

These RCA findings are based on the most intensive and accurate appraisal of the country's nonfederal natural resources ever conducted, Baily reports. "Much of the data came from on-site examinations at about 200,000 sample points across the United States. In Texas, some 14,550 sample points provided information

for the national summary."

The information gathered included data on land uses, soils, erosion, prime farmland, cropping sequences, and crop residue treatment.

Beside the SCS inventories and other USDA studies and evaluations, the RCA process drew on studies made by the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, Fish and Wildlife Service, Environmental Protection Agency, Water Resources Council, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation and others.

RCA Appraisal Part 1, the first of three major documents, contains detailed information of the resource base - status, conditions and trends. A reference copy of all three major RCA documents is available for use at SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state.

Copies of a short leaflet summarizing the RCA findings and proposed conservation program are also available at the two USDA offices. It contains a pre-addressed, postage-paid response form that people may use to comment on the program.

Of about 200 important food plants known to us, only a handful were in this country prior to civilization. These few include pecans, blueberries, wild strawberries and sunflowers. As time evolved, other plant varieties like corn, wheat, and just about everything else were brought here by the migrating inhabitants.

Among those few native food plants only the pecan is important in Eastland County. Perhaps that is the reason pecan growers in

Eastland County held the first county pecan show in Texas 29 years ago. There have been pecan shows every year since and about 40 other counties have followed the example.

We can not think of pecan shows or even pecans without remembering one of the pioneer growers who helped to organize the first pecan show and served on the state committees to organize regional and state pecan shows. That person was Mr. Ben B. Freeman of Ranger.

Last Wednesday, Mr. Freeman called to say he would not be able to help with the county pecan show this year. The next day he died. It will be difficult to have the pecan show without him, but we will continue as he would want us to, and have the best pecan show ever.

The pecan show will be next weekend, December 11 and 12 in the county courthouse lobby.

We would like to encourage everyone who grew pecans in 1981 to enter a sample in the show. A sample consists of 43 pecans of any one variety. They may be left at the county agent's office anytime before 4:00 p.m. on December 10.

Ribbons will be given to exhibitors of all first, second, and third place entries. There will be a class for the smallest pecan. A class will be made for any variety if there are at least two entries of that variety.

Plaques will be awarded to the Champion In-Shell, Champion Shelling and Champion native pecans. Rosettes will be given to the Reserve Champions in the above mentioned groups. If you would like a list of pecan show rules contact our office.

The pecans will be processed by Eastland Chamber of Commerce members and County Pecan Grower members on Friday morning. The entries will be judged Friday afternoon by Extension Service Horticulturists and specialists. Pecans will be left on display until noon Saturday.

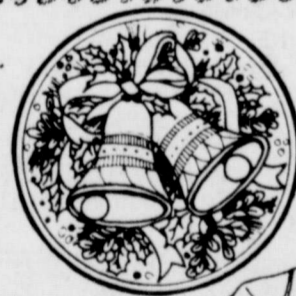
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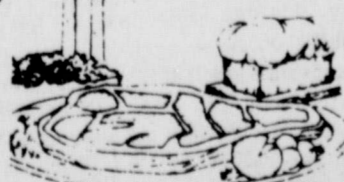

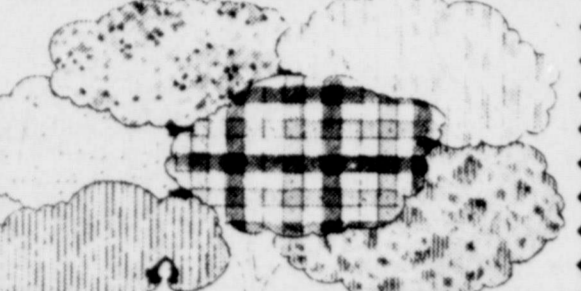

at Texas Safari at Clifton, southeast of Hico.

Billed as the World's Largest Animal Drive-Thru, this wildlife park was established only last May. Yet 40 different species of exotic animals from all over the earth are already established on its rolling acres. And the best part they are not the listless, droopy, undersized creatures often seen in zoos, but happy, alert animals free to roam over a wide area.

There are only a few animals in cages at Safari headquarters. The most dangerous ones such as lions, cougars, panthers, bobcats and black bears. The little animals of the "petting zoo" are loosely confined, as well as some baby animals in the nursery. But others follow cars around the drive with friendly curiosity, often poking heads into windows.

To find the place you drive from Hico to Clifton, then follow the signs about 3 mi. southwest into the hills near the Bosque River Valley. The Safari area has been developed from a scenic old ranch, and you enter at a large headquarters gate. Admission is \$3.50 per adult, children 6 to 12 \$2.50, and children under 6 free. The Safari is open 7 days per week from 10:00 a.m. until one hour before sundown. Bags of food for the animals (.25 each) are available around the Safari Camp area, as well as gifts, food, camera supplies and rental binoculars. An attractive area is arranged for family picnics.

In order to actually see the main groups of animals you must be prepared to drive your car slowly over winding, paved roads. The Park is divided into 4 main sections besides the Safari Camp - International Plains, Mount Kilimanjaro Preserve, Texas Plains, and the Ponds and African Compound. The same safety rules apply to all, including STAY IN YOUR CAR AT ALL TIMES!

As you turn to the left from Safari Park into the International Plains, you are met by a conglomeration of curious, good-natured animals, each hoping to get a treat from food bags. Huge ostriches and camels jog beside your vehicle, delighting all visitors. Along the way there are ducks, wild turkeys, emus, rheas and other birds. And everyone wants to linger near the pretty lake and look for the resident of Monkey's Island.

The roads on the place pull out into the open and to high points above rugged, wooded canyons. The amount of animals you will see depends on the seasons and time of day. Visitors to the Park report that they see something new everytime they go. The latest star attraction is a 50 lb. baby hippo, born recently to a 5,000 lb. mother. The ranch seems to be a good breeding ground for other rare species, such as the Ibex, Sika and Fallow Deer, and Indian Black Buck.

Other exotic deer, some with huge racks of horns, graze about. There are giraffe, and many elk and American buffalo. Strangely enough, these animals seem to be compatible with each other. Or at least these specimens are. The zebras are along, grazing in a large fenced-in area. Nearby are ponds with rare black-necked swans and other

## Area Band Featured In Hollywood Christmas Parade

A crowd estimated at 750,000 and a national cable television audience of millions watched the "World Famous" Cowboy Band and the Six White Horses from Hardin-Simmons University parade down Sunset Boulevard and Hollywood Boulevard in Hollywood, California Nov. 29.

The two HSU groups were the only non-California units invited to the 50th annual Hollywood Christmas parade and were introduced as "the 1981 feature band" throughout the three-mile parade.

Gene Autry, who wrote the Christmas standard "Here Comes Santa Claus" years ago after participating in the parade when it was still called the "Santa Claus Lane Parade", rode in a float in front of the White Horses and the band. He appeared with the Cowboy Band in 1935 at the Texas Centennial celebration.

Other old friends of the band were also on hand, including Roy Rogers who appeared on the HSU campus in the 1920's when he was still relatively unknown. He and Dale Evans served as

parade marshals for the event.

Bleacher seats for the parade sold for \$12-\$20 each and thousands of viewers arrived by 1 p.m. to camp out on sidewalks along the parade route so they would be assured of good vantage points. The parade did not begin until 6 p.m. and lasted approximately three hours. KTLA, a microwave "super station" in Los Angeles televised the parade live and then re-broadcast tapes of the parade three times over the next two days.

The band members and the White Horse riders, who were designated as "Goodwill Ambassadors" for the city of Abilene by mayor Elbert Hall prior to heading for the West Coast, were greeted enthusiastically by the crowd which applauded the western attire, the six matched white horses, the copyrighted "cowstep" of the band and the rousing music (especially "The Eyes of Texas").

Transplanted Texans yelled out their hometowns as the HSU students marched

by and the band members responded with cheers for Kilgore, Dallas, El Paso, Texarkana and numerous other Lone Star state cities.

On Nov. 27 the band marched and gave a stand-up concert at Disneyland.

A typical Southern California weather (a high temperature of 48 degrees) threatened the concert but the first chilled raindrops didn't fall until the band was concluding its last number. Of course, the rest of the day was free time at the famous amusement park and everyone was thoroughly soaked by noon.

As the Texans huddled with tourists from all over the world under whatever cover was available, approximately 20 Cowboy Band members wound up at the same snack bar. ## PUBLIC NOTICE

Dear Customer:

The City of Cisco during the month of October, 1981, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria (1) the monthly average exceeded one (1) turbidity unit (TU).

The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness or disinfection of the water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five tur-

bidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection; (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system; or (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date. This notification of the public is in compliance with the Texas "Drinking Water Standards" and the "Safe Drinking Water Act" as a means of keeping the public informed.
