Seven Alarms Answered By Firemen Past Week

Seven alarms were answered by the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department during the six-day period of Dec. 23-28, records at the fire station showed Tuesday. These calls brought the year's total to 168.

On Dec. 28th, the fire department sent a truck to 1409 Beech Street after a microwave oven began smoldering. Mrs. Beth Prickett of the home said the oven was damaged and that there was some smoke damage.

A small barn and some 100 bales of hay burned at the John Scott home on the Lake Cisco Road on Sunday, Dec. 27, at 1:45 p.m. Cause of the blaze was not determined. An adjoining chicken house was also damaged extensively.

On Christmas Day, the fire department answered two calls. A smoke alarm went off at No. 6 Country Club Ridge at 4:40 a.m. An electrical wiring short was believed to have caused the smoke. No appreciable damage was reported, firemen said.

At 2:40 p.m. on Dec. 25th, firemen were called to the duplex near the water tower on IH-20 access road when an electric wire short caused smoke and a threat of fire.

At 10 p.m. on Christmas Eve, firemen sent a unit to the 1600 block area of Avenue N after a car hit a gas meter. The unit stood by while the line break was shut off.

On Dec. 23rd, firemen sent the rescue unit with foam equipment to Ranger to help put out a fire that was caused by an explosion. A grass fire near the railroad at North Avenue D was put out later in the day.

Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie reported that as of Dec. 29th, the fire department had answered 28 alarms during December and 168 for the year. Mr. Guthrie expressed the

Memorandum states jurisdiction over oil & gas waste

The Railroad Commission approved Tuesday a memorandum of understanding with the department of Water Resources and Department of Health describing the jurisdiction of each agency over waste relating to the oil and gas industry.

The existing authority of the agencies is not changed by the memorandum, just clarified. House Bill 1047, passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature, required the agencies to issue the memorandum before January 1, 1982.

Generally, the Railroad Commission has jurisdiction over waste materials resulting from the exploration, development or production of oil and gas. The Commission agreed in the memorandum to execute their responsibility in agreement with the water quality standards of the Department of Water Resources.

Oversight of industrial solid waste and the discharge of waste into

waters in the state not related to oil, gas or geothermal resources falls under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Resources.

The Department of Health has jurisdiction over the management of municipal solid waste. When both municipal and industrial solid waste is involved, the Department of Health assumes jurisdiction.

Waste under Railroad Commission authority may be disposed of at facilities permitted by the other two agencies when the facility owner and the agency with jurisdiction over the facility agrees.

Specifically, waste generated from refinery storage tanks is subject to the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Resources, while solid waste resulting from the marketing of refined products is controlled by the Department of Health.

Spills occurring during the transportation of crude oil to the refinery will be handled by the Railroad Commission.

Spills which occur during transportation within the refinery or from oil tankers are subject to the jurisdiction of the other two agencies.

Disposal of waste from compressor stations and from pipeline cleanup operations is under the jurisdiction of the Railroad Commission. Discharge of wastewater from pipeline pressure tests falls under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Resources.

Waste from all crude oil reclamation plants is subject to Commission jurisdiction. Also under Commission authority is waste from gas plants and pressure

maintenance or repressuring plants.

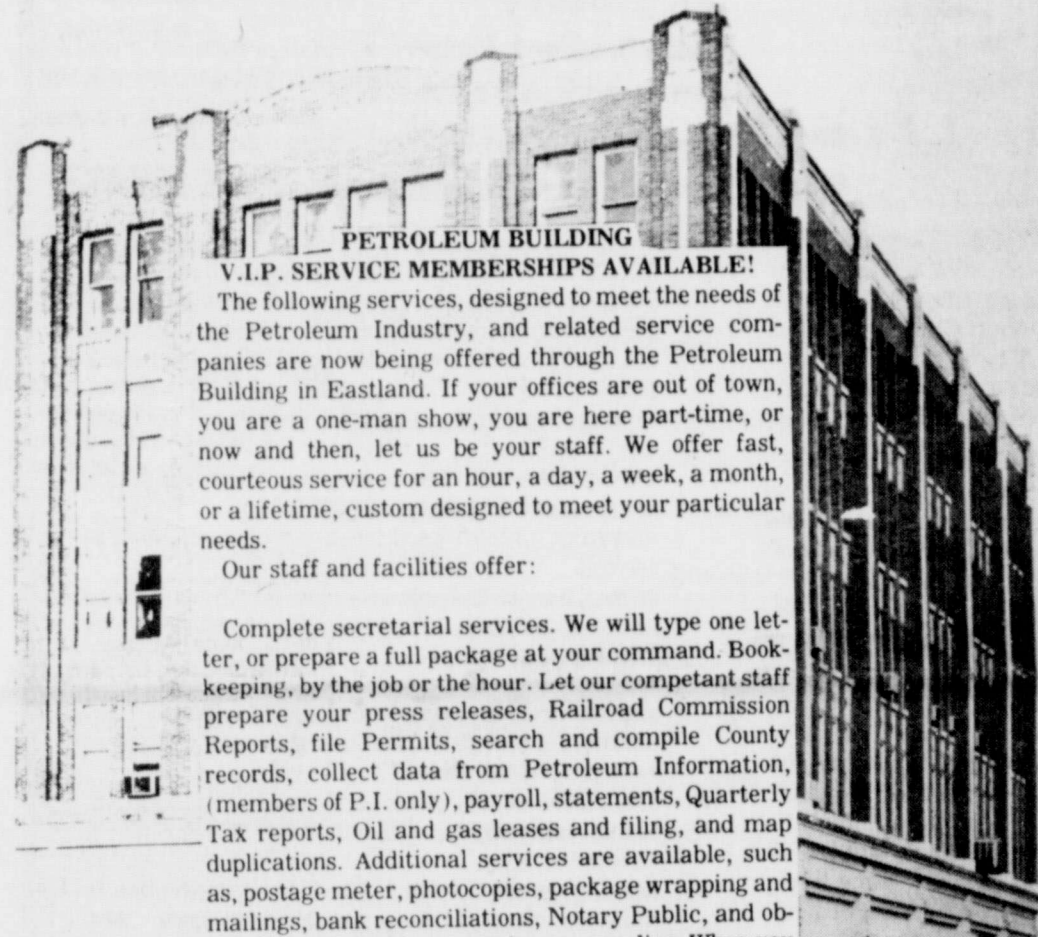
Waste streams resulting from refining operations are managed by the Department of Water Resources.

All waste from exploration, drilling and well completion for oil, gas and geothermal resources including drilling muds, cuttings trash, waste hydrocarbons, fracturing fluids, spent acid, waste cement and saltwater are supervised by the Railroad Commission.

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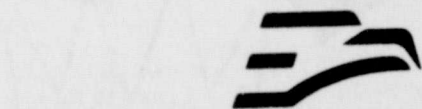

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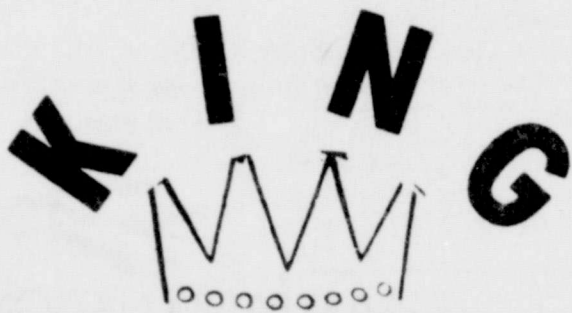

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If You Itemize, 1981 Is "Good Year"

COLLEGE STATION--If you "itemize" (use the "long form") on your tax return, 1981 is a "good" year for deductions, recommends Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist.

The Economic Recovery Act of 1981 will lower tax rates for 1982, so it behooves taxpayers to take deductions before January 1, 1982, she advises.

Granovsky is on the home economics staff of Texas A & M University system.

For example, if you planned to contribute money to a favorite charity, church or educational institution anyway, do it now during 1981--IF YOU ITEMIZE, she says.

If you wait until 1982, your tax benefit on the itemized "long form" will be lower than it is this year.

That's because tax rates will drop 10 percent from 1980 rates--starting January 1, 1982.

On the other hand, if you file the "short form," there's reason to wait until 1982.

That's when you'll be able to add to YOUR STANDARD DEDUCTION 25 percent of the first \$100 you donate.

The percentage allowed will keep climbing until 1986 when the allowable deduction will be the same as for people who file the "long form."

1982 marks the first time people who file the "short form" will have a chance to deduct any of their charitable contributions even though the

allowable deduction is only 25 percent of the first \$100 donated.

Of course, not all donations are tax deductible, Granovsky reminds taxpayers. Some groups, such as lobbying groups, do not fit the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) definition of "charities" even though the groups themselves may have "tax-exempt" status.

When you donate money to these groups, the donations are not tax deductions for you.

If in doubt about the tax status of any group--or a donation's "tax deductibility" check with the IRS, the specialist says.

Because the IRS will expect proof of your contributions, you should pay by check or get a receipt whenever possible, she adds.

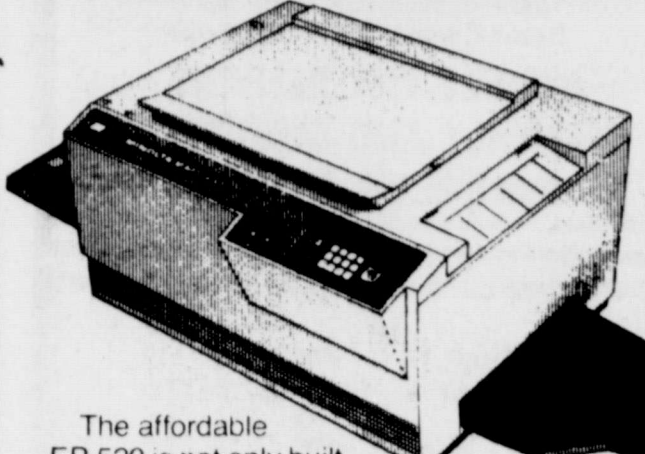

1981 Farm Bill Called 'Farm Bankruptcy Act'

WACO—Passage of the 1981 Farm Bill by Congress will do little to halt the decline family farmers are facing in prices and income which will result in the liquidation of many family farms in 1982," stated Mike Moeller, President of the Texas Farm Union. "We think the bill should be renamed the 1981 Farm Bankruptcy Act because that is exactly the affect it is going to have on many producers."

Moeller said "Because of the irresponsibility of the Congress and the Reagan Administration, we want them to reopen hearings for emergency legislation for farmers. Also, the TFU will be calling on the Congress to adopt legislation which will allow farmers and ranchers to bargain directly for the sale of the commodities and allow for a democratic referendum on supply management for commodities." The TFU president added "If our elected officials are serious about

wanting to get the government out of agriculture, we believe it is time they passed legislation which will allow producers to democratically control their own destiny."

Because of the low loan levels and price supports set for commodities in the farm bill, Moeller said the Congress and the Reagan Administration are ignoring the economic reality of the agriculture economy today. "We have to face facts. Farm prices right now are at the lowest level on the parity index since the height of Depression in 1933. On top of that, we are still faced with high interest rates and projections that 1982 net farm income will drop \$3 billion to \$17 billion," Moeller said. Farm income levels will drop for the third year in a row with this projection making it the first time since the 1950's such a decrease has been recorded.

The TFU urged the Texas Congressional delegation to vote against the Farm Bill

Peanut growers to meet in Ardmore, Oklahoma

Bill Boswell of DeLeon, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association Vice President, has announced that peanut growers from southwestern states will convene beginning at 10:00 a.m. on January 7 at the Holiday Inn in Ardmore, Oklahoma.

Boswell said all peanut growers are being asked to attend the January 7 meeting for a dual purpose. He said there will be a review of the provisions of the 1981 Farm Bill recently enacted by Congress and, second, there will be a general evaluation and planning session in regard to activities to be undertaken in 1982.

The Association official said that special invitations are issued to boards and executive personnel of the Texas and Oklahoma Peanut Growers Associations, Texas Peanut Producers Board, Oklahoma Peanut Commission and the New Mexico Peanut Growers Association. Boswell said this will be the fourth such annual

meeting involving the combined directors of the six Southwestern area peanut grower organizations. He added that the meeting agenda and discussions for these meetings have proved to be of interest to all peanut growers. "Although it is desirable to get our grower boards together at the beginning of the year, Boswell said, it is also very desirable to have as many growers as possible present for participation in these sessions."

Boswell said the day's discussion will include the recently modified peanut program, the grower referendum to be held in January, 1982, Washington based consultants, price support activities, funding for special projects and other items of interest to growers.

when it came up for a vote. "Fortunately, the majority of our delegation went against the bill. We hope when all of our Congressmen go home for the holiday season, they will see the true picture of the sad state of the agriculture economy and the family farm system," Moeller said. The TFU president said the organization would be contacting members of the delegation during the Christmas recess "and we hope many of the farmers in the state take this opportunity to speak out to their elected representatives."

Farmers can expect the low prices they are receiving to continue because of the provisions in the 1981 Farm Bill. Price supports for the major grain crops will drop to as low as 40 percent of parity by 1985. Milk will drop to a 60 percent level. Currently, the overall parity level for all commodities stands at 57 percent.

"Farmers will not be the only ones to suffer under this legislation, because ultimately the consumers of this nation and the rest of the world are going to have to pay," Moeller said. "With more family farms going out of existence, we can look forward to more corporate and foreign ownership of our farmland," Moeller concluded.

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C.—It isn't too often that I agree with the Washington Post and the chairman of the Interior Committee Morris (Mo) Udall, but we all supported passage of legislation that makes private financing of the Alaska Natural Gas Transportation System possible.

Opponents of the proposed waiver of law to remove obstacles to the private financing of the pipeline charged that it was a "consumer rip-off," a charge that often draws automatic support of liberal House members. My colleague Mo Udall, however, presented a convincing argument for passage of the resolution:

"The pipeline will provide access to proven conventional energy equal to at least 400,000 barrels of oil per day, with potential energy supplies of perhaps 10 times that amount. We should not be so comfortable with the current world oil situation as to disregard this source, and natural gas shortages may return."

"The waiver proposal does not provide Federal or consumer guarantees—the project must be funded by private investors who will only do so if

they determine it is commercially viable and will deliver a marketable product.

"The 'worst case' consumer financial risk, a highly unlikely contingency of utter project failure after completion of the two most expensive segments, would involve average consumer payments of less than \$1 per month to pay off the project debt, and the U.S. private sponsors would

lose all their equity investment. In the event of delay, again assuming a tariff allowing pre-billing is approved as just and reasonable by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, any payments by consumers would reduce and lower their later payments when the system is finished. Consumers would under no circumstances be asked to pay for sections that are not completed.

"The consumer's regulatory protections are left largely intact, with waiver only of FERC's power to revise its final decision on the pipeline for the hypothetical and unprecedented purpose of impairing the repayments of project debt."

"We have a national commitment to Canada to clear the way legally for private financ-

ing of the pipeline, a commitment Canada was relied upon to build in advance a major part of its pipeline segment and authorize exports of gas they would not otherwise have exported. The waiver discharges this commitment in full, even if the private market does not finance the project; defeat of the waiver may kill for decades the chance of an Alaskan gas pipeline through Canada, an ally that will feel betrayed.

"No alternatives have been advanced that are cheaper, surer, or more timely than this pipeline."

I needed no convincing to support this necessary move, but I give Mo Udall the credit for convincing enough of his colleagues to pass the measure last week by a substantial margin.

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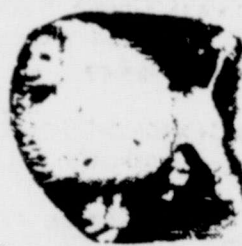

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Judge Bailey Looks Ahead Working With Change

Since 1978 the Eastland County newspapers have published observations on the New Year by Judge Scott Bailey. Each year old topics are updated and new ones included, for the County Judge is a person of wide interests. When I went to his office recently to discuss current events and projections for the future, the theme of the conversation was that 1981 has been a year of transition, and 1982 will continue as a period of tremendous change.

This change seemed to lap around the solid gray courthouse, which has been an Eastland County fixture since its offices were first occupied in Dec., 1928. Due to the energy boom there is actually a shortage of courthouse office space now. During 1981 Judge Bailey - who has held this position since 1963 - had relocated his own quarters, moving to an office once occupied by the County Superintendent. His former office is now occupied by the County Tax Appraisal Board, with Steve Thomas as Director.

Judge Bailey, a native of Eastland County, is a member of the State Bar of Texas. He is also Chairman of the Eastland County Historical Society, and Chairman of a Four-County Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. He has recently been appointed as Representative of the West Central Texas Division of the Texas Department on Aging.

In looking back over 1981, Judge Bailey remarked that it had been a good year for Eastland County in many ways. There had been enough moisture to produce good agricultural crops and grass for cattle.

"But the prices for farm products have been a real disappointment", he adds. "I don't believe anyone expected them to fall as drastically as they have."

"Fortunately, in Eastland County, oil and gas discovery and exploration continues at an amazing rate. Areas where dry wells were once reported have been proved to have oil. Modern methods of recovery

have made a drastic difference."

In mentioning the Sun Oil Co. program to recover oil from the old Ranger Boom Field, Judge Bailey noted that Eastland County has a small mineral interest in some of the property. This came about through the will of a citizen named Edward Disney Farm who owned land and mineral property acquired during the 1918-20 oil boom. He left property south of Eastland for a "County Poor Farm", as well as oil royalties.

Judge Bailey recalled that 1981 changes in Eastland County began right in the Courthouse, with the death of Judge R.L. Rowch (Justice of the Peace, precinct 1). I.W. Usery was appointed to fill this position. Mr. Roy Lane, 91st District Clerk, resigned his office and moved away. Mrs. Mary Jane Rowch was appointed to fill this place. And with the setting up of a County Tax Appraisal Office, as mandated by law, a new concept of taxation entered the scene.

Taxation, and the cutting back of Federal Funds to the County, were two of the big stories of the year, according to Judge Bailey.

"The reappraisal of the County - which is almost finished - with all property to be listed at market value, will undoubtedly cause a lot of shifting and readjusting. This will cause some people to have to pay taxes on their homes for the first time. Eastland County was one of the first in the state to grant a \$3,000 exemption. Under the old system, persons who bought homes a number of years ago still had them valued under \$3,000. The new law will put them on the rolls, creating a hardship for some."

"Since Eastland County has never depended too heavily on Federal Funds, the cutback in Federal Grants will not affect us as drastically as it will some other areas," notes Judge Bailey. "We still don't know how these cuts will work. The money is supposed to be cut 25 per cent, then come to the state uncommitted, I understand that the Dept. of Labor C.E.T.A. Program, with area headquarters in Eastland, has already been severely cut. I am concerned about possible cuts in the School Lunch Program. And I am personally involved in the programs for Senior Citizens. I feel these Centers are doing a great job for our people. I go along with the

criteria Congressman Stenholm puts on any spending program:

Can we afford this program?

Is it needed?

Can someone else do it better?

"On all these counts, I feel the Senior Citizen's Program should stay."

"Another worthwhile program which has already been cut is the Mental Health Mental Retardation Program. The County has voted to double its contribution to this program. This is only a small part of what is needed."

Spending for basic County functions has continued to rise, says Judge Bailey. During 1981 this slowed to about 10 per cent for Eastland County from the 12 per cent a year ago. This is slightly under that reported for other Texas counties. The County was able to more than pay its bills. It spent \$1,769,400 and received \$1,814,618.00. A modest pay increase - about 4 per cent - was voted for the County employees in 1981.

For 1982 the County is projected to spend \$1,875,864.00, and take in \$2,115,570.00. The tax base has been greatly aided by the oil development, as well as related industries.

"These have provided so much work that almost no one in the county is unemployed," states Judge Bailey. "We have an unemployment rate of only 3.5 to 4 percent. This would lead to high local prosperity, if it weren't for the inflation rate."

In 1981 the county paid the interest on the cost of the new jail, but still owe a principal sum of \$825,000 on that facility. And it cost more to operate the new jail than the old one, but is obviously more secure. The Road and Bridge Tax is bringing in adequate funds for the operation of the jail, and the County didn't lose its Lateral Road Funds, as feared.

There has been an increase in the Eastland County population even since the 1980 census. In the near future this data will be computerized, and available to county officials for information. On the minus side, the county, was hit with a lot of

escalating cost, it still rising in the County. Theft - especially of rural residences - is on the upswing. There is increased abuse of alcohol and drugs. Violent crime is definitely rising.

Divorce, too is almost epidemic in the county. Many children are growing up with step parents now.

"But there were a number of outstanding events in the county during 1981," Judge Bailey says. "For the first time, two Eastland County ranches received a Texas Land Heritage Award, which is given to families having the same land in continuous agricultural production for 100 yrs. or more. The Hargus Ranch of Eastland and the Johnson Ranch of Desdemona were the properties which qualified. There is a chance that another tract of Eastland County will qualify for this award in 1982."

"And this year - for the first time - an Eastland County building was placed on the National Registry of Historic Places. This was the Mobley Hotel of Cisco, the first Hotel owned by Conrad Hilton.

The Cisco Centennial was a memorable event for 1981, offered education and enjoy-

ment for all. Along with this was a fine Historical Pageant presented by the school children of Cisco and directed by Davina Jeffcoat.

"The First Methodist Church of Cisco celebrated their own Centennial at the same time as Cisco. And the First Presbyterian Church of Cisco is to be commended for their fine Centennial celebration this year."

The Judge looked thoughtfully across his office suite, past the multitude of shelves which once held school books. Now they were being filled with law books

and his own ceaseless correspondence and other material.

"The only thing I miss in this really nice office," he said, "is the view of those other corner windows onto the Square, where the traffic flowed by. Maybe that's just curiosity."

"But time goes by sort of like that traffic. That's why I like history. We need to know where we have been, so we'll know where we are going."

"And 1982, with all the changes ahead, will be challenging. That's one prediction I can be certain of."
