



Don't Call Me Robin Hood---

I had moved to Southwestern Iowa where I was pastor of the First Methodist Church in Nodaway. October was almost upon us and that meant Deer Season! I had arrived too late to apply for a gun license and since I knew nothing about hunting deer anyway the members of my congregation insisted that I purchase a bow and some arrows and become involved in their most exciting sport.

I purchased a cheap bow and a few arrows and with the help of my teenage son we set up a practice target against two bales of hay, placed beside the garage. My son was quite proficient with the bow and could hit the target, usually scoring a bulls-eye. After a great deal of practice I became so expert that I could hit the side of the garage.

The man who sold me the bow had told me that deer like apples. On my first day of hunting I filled my pockets with Jonathans and at 9:00 a.m. I was in the woods where I immediately climbed a tree, ate apples until I had the stomach ache and threw the cores on the ground, expecting a deer to come running to eat them. After two uncomfortable hours I decided that the deer were not hungry. I climbed down and drove to the store where I had purchased the bow. The gentleman laughed at my story and explained that the deer would often be found in an apple orchard and that a person could not feed them by throwing apples on the ground. He informed me that I should get into the woods very early and that I should use some musk-lure that he was selling.

The next morning I got out of my car beside the woods at 3:00 a.m. with my four ounce bottle of lure. The man had not told me that I should only use a few drops of lure on my clothing. He did tell me that the lure contained a scent of the female deer and that it would make the buck come hunting me. I sprinkled a few drops on my hat, rubbed more on my chest and then reached over my shoulder and poured the entire contents of the bottle on my back. I strung my bow and carried my three arrows in my hand, for I did not have a quiver, and headed into a very strong north wind.

In the darkness I suddenly realized that something or someone was standing immediately ahead of me. The hair on my head pushed against the top of my hat,

goose pimples were tattooing my skin, I was scared! I finally fumbled my flashlight from my pocket and with its enigmatic light I saw the world's largest raccoon standing there on his hind legs. That coon probably weighed forty or fifty pounds but at that moment I was sure he weighed two hundred! After an eternity of glaring at each other and a few words of exhortation on my part the coon lumbered into the woods and I continued my creeping pace into the cold north wind.

As I topped a small hill I found myself in grass that was shoulder high. Suddenly pandemonium broke loose. I had walked into a herd of sleeping deer! I heard a large buck snort and scream and suddenly I remembered that the newspaper had said that a buck had gored a child to death only last week. Here I was, soaked with female musk and that big buck was snorting and pawing the ground, first on one side of me and then the other. I backed into some rows of frost-bitten corn stalks, hoping perhaps to be able to "skylight" that man eating buck.

After three hours of agony and frustration dawn finally cracked enough for me to see. The buck had gone away but now the fog had rolled in upon me.

In desperation I found a large tree on the banks of a nearby stream and decided to climb it to safety and to perhaps get a shot at a deer. The tree was about eighty feet tall, its arthritic limbs punching holes in the fog, and its foliage was forming a thick welcome mat on the ground. I could not reach the first limb so I tied my arrows to my bow, reached as high as I could and hung the bow on a twig far above my head. I hoped to find a small log, lean it against the tree, step on it and reach the first limb. I could then pull myself up the tree, retrieve my bow and arrows and be ready to shoot at a deer.

As I turned to hunt a log I froze in my tracks for there in the fog, just thirty feet from me, were seven of the largest deer I have ever seen, standing in a line like a freight train, staring directly at me. Seven deer standing just thirty feet away, the answer to a deer hunter's prayer! I thought I had hit the jackpot until I suddenly realized that my bow and arrows were hanging in the tree, far above my head. I knew that I would be unable to retrieve my bow, untie the arrows, and get a shot at those deer. I knew they

Chest Drive Total Only Half Of Goal

Drive workers were hopeful that additional contributions would be coming in. Anyone not contacted was asked to send or leave a check for the Community Chest at the First National Bank or the Chamber of Commerce.

1982 Tax Exemption Applications Mailed

Eastland County property owners will be receiving 1982 tax exemption applications in the mail within the next few days. These exemption applications will cover many of the exemptions granted to property owners by the tax units of the County.

Employees of the Eastland County Appraisal District have placed over 6,600 exemption applications into the mail. The new State Property Tax Code which becomes effective as of January 1, 1982, makes the County-wide Appraisal District responsible for the administration of all exemptions granted by taxing bodies of the County.

The applications mailed were sent to all Eastland County property owners who had been granted an exemption of any kind for the 1981 year. If your name was left off the mailing list or you just do not receive an application in the next few days, please check with the Appraisal District office for the property application.

All applications must be returned by May 1, 1982 and must be completely filled out. The law provides that any application submitted after that date or incompletely filled out cannot be granted.

The completed applications may be returned by mail or dropped off at either

the Appraisal District office in Eastland or one of the local school tax offices.

If you have any questions concerning the exemptions or your possible eligibility for one, you are urged to contact the Eastland County Appraisal District for assistance. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse and the telephone number is 629-8597.

New Painting At Kimbell

"Cheat with the Ace of Clubs," a renown painting by the great French master George de La Tour (1593-1652), has been acquired by the Kimbell Art Museum in Fort Worth, Dr. Edmund P. Pillsbury, director, announced Monday.

This composition of four figures at a game of cards in an interior setting, which measures 38 1/2 x 61 1/2 inches, was painted about 1620 to 1630.

Dr. Pillsbury said, "This is one of La Tour's greatest subjects and a key work in his early development."

The picture is recognized by leading authorities on French art as a masterpiece

of the artist's work. In 1972 the French scholar Francois-Georges Pariset acknowledged that the painting was one of the surprises in a retrospective exhibition of the artist's work held that year in Paris. He commented that compared to a related version of the subject, subsequently acquired for a record price by the Louvre, this "Cheat" is more spontaneous in feeling and refined in execution.

Benedict Nicholson, the British authority who also compared the two paintings, noted that the Kimbell "Cheat" is altogether more harmoniously composed, and psychologically more subtle."

The Kimbell's acquisition comes from a private Swiss collection. Purchased in March 1981 from a descendant of the Prominent Pictet family, the painting hung in the ancestral family chateau "Le Reposoir" on the outskirts of Geneva since at least the mid-19th century. The late Dr. Richard F. Brown, former director of the Kimbell (1966-1979), began negotiations for the acquisition in 1977. According to museum policy, terms of the purchase were not disclosed.

The subject of the painting constitutes a moral essay on the vanity of worldly affairs. Three elegantly clad figures and a serving maid are grouped around a table in a dark room, illuminated by a strong light from the left. The warm light, together with the rich hues of yellow, red and brown, unifies the solidly constructed figures in a compact and forceful composition. The worldliness of the female card player in the center and the cheat at the left contrasts with the innocence of the young man at the right, who as in the story of the Prodigal Son, falls victim to the temptations of wine, women, and gambling.

The precision and quality of the Kimbell painting were first recognized by Pierre Landry, a La Tour scholar who formerly owned the Louvre version. Other scholars who have commented upon the beauty and importance of the new Kimbell acquisition include Walter Friedlaender, Anthony Blunt, and Pierre Rosenberg.

SACK THE BAGWORMS!!

The small, silk weaving that resembles a Christmas tree ornament on your favorite evergreen is not there for decoration. Such woven bags protect the larvae and eggs of bagworms. Now is a good time to remove any bagworm pouches hanging on landscape. The most likely place to look is on juniper plants but they may be found on almost any nearby plant. Remove these bags and destroy them to prevent starting the cycle over.

Both broadleaf and coniferous trees and shrubs are attacked by this pest. This includes willow, cedar, cypress, white pine, box elder, locust, sycamore, maple, wild cherry, sumac, persimmon, arborvitae, and other ornamental evergreens. Bagworms become exceedingly abundant every few years, but always present a persistent problem.

The bagworm larva builds a tough, portable, silken case covered with layers of leaves, twigs and fragments of bark. The bag has a small opening at the lower end to expell refuse. A wider opening at the top allows the worm to partially crawl out to feed. These bags are the most easily seen and identifiable feature of the insect. Infestations may not be noticeable at first, but if left unchecked, can completely defoliate trees and shrubs.

The adult female looks like a maggot, with no eyes, legs or antennae. The adult male resembles a small moth. After larval development subsequent pupation, adults emerge. The males escape through the lower end of the bags. The wingless females only emerge halfway and await mating. After mating, the adult female deposits large number of eggs in her bag and then wiggles

through the lower opening, drops to the ground and dies. As the larvae hatch, they let themselves down a single strand of silken thread and attach to adjacent limbs, where they begin building their own silk bags.

Handpicking the pest is the surest and cheapest means of control for small evergreen shrubs and trees in home landscapes. Be persistent and be sure to pick all of the bags and then smash or burn them. If thrown to the grounds, the eggs in the bag will still hatch in the spring and the larvae may crawl back into the trees. It is useful at any time during the year to remove the bags. However, now is an important time break the cycle before the eggs hatch in the spring.

When there are too many bags to handpick or the trees and shrubs are too large to reach safely, then the infested plants can be sprayed. However, insecticide application should be made in the spring soon after the eggs have hatched or while the larvae are small and actively feeding.

Grand Award winner will be selected from the winners of the mother and child, day wear, and evening wear divisions.

Sponsors of the event include the Southwest Hardware & Implement Association and Progressive Farmer. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service

TRANSPLANT WOODY PLANTS

Trees and shrubs are essential to a pleasant home environment. If they fit into a well planned landscape, they greatly increase in value of your home. There are normally two ways trees are sold. The first is bare-root plants. When planting bare-root trees and shrubs, dig a hole large enough to allow the root system to spread naturally. It is not necessary, however, to dig the hole much larger.

It is very important not to allow the roots to dry out. If you plan to plant within the next 24 hours, it is a good idea to soak the roots in a pail of water during this time. If it will be several days before you plant, dig a shallow trench and cover the root with loose soil.

Before planting, cut back any broken or damaged roots. Mound a good topsoil in the bottom of the hole to form a cone around the roots. Then fill in the hole completely.

Another way trees or shrubs are sold are ball and burlapped or canned nursery stock. Balled and burlapped plants, as well as those grown in containers, have a distinct advantage over bare-root plants by having a

relatively undisturbed root system. If this advantage is to be retained, use care to avoid breaking or damage the root ball. Most nursery stock of this type can be planted anytime of the year. Bare-rooted plants must be moved while the tree is dormant.

Occasionally you may buy a plant which has been growing in a container too long and has become root bound. This condition is characterized by a mass of roots spiraled around the bottom and sides of the drainage holes. Begin by thoroughly soaking the root ball. Unless you pry and loosen this root mass or cut some roots, the plant will probably never outgrow this condition. If you have to damage or remove parts of the root system, you will need to compensate by pruning off about one-third of the top growth. This should also be done with bare-rooted plants.

January 15 is Arbor Day and this would be a good time to plant a tree or shrub. If you have any questions, contact the Eastland County Extension Office.

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RRC Approves Underground Injection Control Rules

The Railroad Commission today adopted amendments and a new rule dealing with the underground injection of fluids in the state's oil and gas fields. The changes were designed to qualify the RRC-administered program with federal guidelines.

If the rules are approved by the federal Environmental Protection Agency, they will be used to regulate such operations in the state. If the

RRC rules are not approved by the EPA, federal regulations as well as current state regulations will apply to underground injection operations in Texas.

In recommending adoption of the rules to the Commission, Examiner Glenn Jordan said that the RRC's rules accomplish "the main purposes of federal and state law--protection of fresh water and prevention of

waste--without adopting the unwieldy and lengthy federal UIC (underground injection control) procedural rules."

The new rules establish permit requirements and standards for enhanced recovery and disposal wells and hydrocarbon storage facilities. They also provide for increased notice of injection well permit applications

to local governments and other interested persons.

The technical standards include requirements for casing and cementing, tubing, and valves, as well as for testing, monitoring and plugging. Review provisions for unplugged wells were also established.

Jordan added that the rules will "satisfy the federal requirements and allow us to submit a UIC program by Jan. 15, 1982, as required by federal rules."

They were published for public comment on June 9, and a hearing was held Sept. 10. The rules will be effective in Texas on April 1 of next year.

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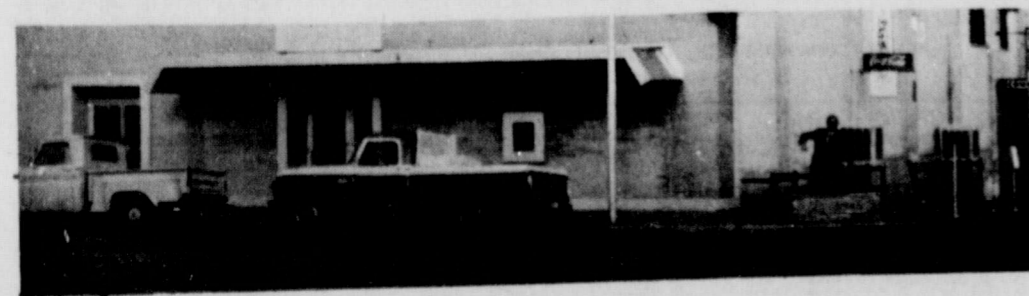
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Exemption Regulations Changes Are In Effect

One of the major changes made by the new State Property Tax Code which went into effect as of January 1, 1982 was in the area of tax exemption application and administration.

Previously each tax jurisdiction was responsible for their own exemptions and the property owner would often have to file on the same piece of property at several different jurisdictions. The new law stops this duplication; all exemptions will now be filed with the County-wide Appraisal District within each County.

The Eastland County Appraisal District has recently mailed out over 6,700 exemption applications to property owners of Eastland County. The majority of these applications were for Residential Homestead Exemptions and Open-Space Land Exemptions. However, also included were exemption ap-

plications for many non-profit, religious and charitable organizations.

According to the new law, these organizations must now file an application in order to retain any previous tax exempt status. If your organization does not receive an application or feels that it might qualify for an exemption under the new law, then you are urged to check with the Appraisal District. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse and the telephone number is: 629-8597.

The following is a partial list of organizations that may be eligible to obtain tax exempt status through the filing of the new exemptions; hospitals, churches or religious organizations, water districts, veterans organizations, private schools, and community service clubs.

Health Agency of Texas Is Approved For Home Care

The Texas Department of Human Resources has notified the Home Health Agency of Texas, that this agency is approved for participation in the Primary Home Care Program effective November 1, 1981. The geographical service area for this program corresponds to the licensed area for the agency's Medicare/Medicaid certification service area.

Many community organizations and government bodies contract with the Texas Department of Human Resources to provide medically related services to D.H.R. clients. One of the programs delivered through contract agencies is Primary Home Care. These contracts are funded through Title XIX. Services are provided to the client by an attendant who may be either a part-time or full-time employee of a Class A Home Health Agency. These agencies are reimbursed on a statewide unit rate basis as established by the Department of Human Resources Board. The attendant cannot be an individual who is a legal or foster parent to a minor child or spouse of the recipient. Services are pro-

vided for aged or disabled adults who are functionally limited in the performance of daily activities. The range of services include: Personal Care, Housekeeping, Meal Preparation, and Escort Service.

Eligibility is determined by the Department of Human Resources field representative. The D.H.R. worker for Shackelford County is Eva Latham. Clients must be S.S.I. recipients and reside in their own homes. The service must be ordered by a physician and must be provided under the supervision of a registered nurse.

The objective of the Primary Home Care Program is to provide nontechnical, medically prescribed and supervised in-home personal and housekeeping services for eligible Medicaid recipients whose chronic health problems cause them to be functionally limited in the performance of daily living activities.

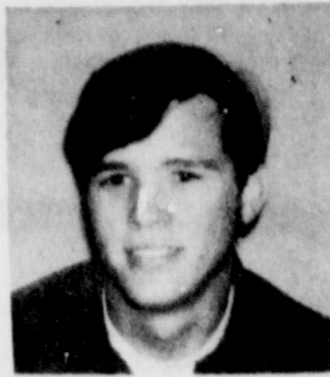
In the future Donny plans to work in the Accounting Department of a business, with hopes of taking some graduate studies in this field when possible.
