

Bob Keyes Is Named College Football Head

Robert L. (Bob) Keyes has been named by the Cisco Junior College Board of Regents as head football coach for the 1982-83 football season.

Keyes, 33, replaces Bill Anderson who resigned last month to accept a job as defensive line coach at West Texas State University in Canyon.

A Seminole, Texas, native, Keyes has a master's degree in education from Abilene Christian University. He earned his bachelor's in physical education at ACU in 1970. Keyes is a 1966 graduate of Seminole High School. In 1977, he completed requirements for an all levels administrative certificate at WTSU.

Keyes began his coaching career at ACU in 1970 where he served as a graduate assistant in football. ACU finished 9-2 that year and was ranked 14th in the nation in NCAA Division II.

In 1971, Keyes became offensive line coach at Graham High School and in 1973 moved to Round Rock as defensive line coach. He worked in 1974 with the offensive and defensive lines at Hereford High School before going to Amarillo High School in 1975. At Amarillo, Keyes served as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach and taught math.

In 1978, Keyes moved to Cisco to become offensive coordinator and offensive line coach under Anderson. CJC has recorded records of 3-8, 6-3, 8-1 and 7-3 during the years Keyes has served as assistant.

CJC was seventh in the nation in team passing in 1979, 12th in total offense in 1980 and finished the season as the No. 11 team in the nation as voted by the Junior College Grid Wire. This year's team played Snow College of Utah in the annual Wool Bowl in Roswell, N.M.

Keyes is married to the former Ruth Nancy Dodd of Abilene and they have one daughter, Katie Dawn, 4. He is a member of the Cisco Church of Christ.

Mrs. Forbes died at 2:30 p.m. Saturday at E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital after a long illness.

She was born August 20, 1890, in Cross Plains. She married George Lee Forbes on December 13, 1925, in Eastland. He died in 1973. She was a Methodist.

Survivors include numerous nieces and nephews.

The CJC board unanimously voted to hire Keyes as head coach at its monthly meeting Monday night.

A 29-year old man whose car nearly sank in a stock tank after crashing through a fence along Interstate 20 Monday is facing charges of driving while intoxicated.

Department of Public Safety trooper David Mays said the accident occurred 3.2 miles east of Putnam in Callahan County when the man's car left the highway's westbound lanes, crashed through a fence and came to rest on the dam of a stock tank about 5 p.m.

The driver, who has several addresses including Big Spring and Oklahoma, was taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco with a broken collarbone or separated shoulder plus facial cuts, Mays said.

Law enforcement officers from Ranger had alerted their colleagues in neighboring communities to the west to be on the lookout for the man's car, Mays said, after he was reported slumped over the steering wheel at a

Schools and Industrial Users Of Natural Gas Close Monday

Lone Star Curtails Gas Supply Due To Extreme Cold

Cisco public schools and industrial users of natural gas were asked to close here Monday and Tuesday due to the increased demand for natural gas and electricity Monday morning as area thermometers dipped as low as five degrees.

The increased natural gas demand caused Lone Star Gas Company to ask for a systemwide 100 percent curtailment by industrial users and schools, according to Wayne West local manager at Lone Star Gas. He also said Cisco's larger commercial users were asked to shut down their gas consumption by 25 percent.

Mr. West stressed that Lone Star has the gas, but the demand was so great that they could not get enough gas pushed through

their pipes. He explained that the schools and industrial accounts are on a cheaper rate for their gas, but had agreed in order to receive that rate, that if gas is needed elsewhere they will be the first shut off from their supply.

Lone Star monitored its customers which were asked to shut down and Mr. West said the local people "complied just great."

The natural gas curtailment forced West Texas Utilities Company, one of the largest area industrial users, to ask customers Monday morning to reduce electric usage, according to Sherwyn McNair of Abilene's WTU information office.

McNair said WTU, like most utility companies, uses

natural gas to generate its electrical power. The gas curtailment forced WTU to burn fuel oil, which cut its generating capability because not all its plants can run on fuel oil, McNair said.

The limited generating capability and a large increase in electrical demand because of the cold weather pushed WTU to its maximum capacity Monday morning, McNair said.

However, by mid-afternoon as usage decreased WTU was "back to normal for this time of year," McNair said.

Cisco City Manager Mike Moore stated Tuesday morning that the city had experienced a few problems due to the weather. He said some of their equipment had frozen up, causing difficulties for city crews to do their work properly.

He said the sanitation truck had frozen up, causing trash not to be picked up on Monday and he said they would probably get a late start on Tuesday. Therefore, he said the sanitation crews would be about two days behind in their pick-up schedule.

The City also suffered a rash of broken water lines, according to the city manager. He said there had been no major breaks as of Tuesday morning.

Mr. Moore said he had talked to the Chief of Police and as of 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, there had been "no fender-benders" in Cisco. He contributed this to the fact that there was no school so there were fewer cars on the streets.

James Couch, superintendent of Cisco Public Schools, said Tuesday morning that plans were for school to resume at its regular time Wednesday morning unless Lone Star Gas contacted them prior to that time and asked them to close another day.

He said students were at school Monday morning when they were asked to close and the students were released about 8:30 a.m. for their unexpected holiday.

Local streets had a thin covering of ice early Tuesday morning, but by mid-morning most of the streets had thawed.

The National Weather Service had forecast a winter storm warning for Tuesday, including the possibility of snow. Snow and sleet were forecast for late Monday night and freezing rain was expected by early Tuesday morning, according to NWS. An 80 percent chance of precipitation was forecast and temperatures were expected to dip near 20 overnight with highs Tuesday and Wednesday only in the lows 30s.

In contrast to the earlier forecast, local streets had thawed and a light rain was falling in Cisco by 11:00 a.m. Tuesday with the local thermometer at First National Bank showing 48 degrees.

A revised forecast said the freezing rains should miss the Cisco area with only a 20 percent chance of precipitation and warmer temperatures. Overnight lows Tuesday were predicted to be 18 degrees.

Cisco Lobos Up District Record

The Cisco Lobos upped their district record to two wins and 0 losses last week with wins over Eastland and Brownwood Early. The Lobos defeated Eastland 54 to 41 and Early 56 to 52. In the Eastland game defense was the key for the Lobos with good rebounding and great hustle. Gary Speegle scored 14 points, Joey Worley, 13 points and Larry Adams had 10 points. In the Early game good composure and great desire in the later stages of the game proved to be the difference. Early controlled the first three quarters, but the Lobos



W.A. Criswell Heads Conference Speakers List

W.A. Criswell, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Dallas, headlines the cast of pastors, evangelists and lay persons who will address the annual Texas Baptist Evangelism Conference at the Tarrant County Convention Center in Fort Worth, Jan. 18-20.

Criswell, who is pastor of the world's largest Baptist church, will be the keynote speaker during the closing session of conference Wednesday morning.

The theme of the three-day conference is "Listen now. Hear forever". Dr. Carlos McLeod, director of the Texas Baptist Evangelism Division, said the theme was chosen to "provide impetus for simultaneous revivals which are slated in Southern Baptist churches across the state this spring."

McLeod said he hoped the conference would set the pace for a year that would see 75,000 baptisms in Texas Baptist churches.

Other speakers on the program include Perry Sanders, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Lafayette, La.; Gardner Taylor, pastor of the Concord Baptist Church in Houston; and Frank Pollard, Pastor of the First Baptist Church in San Antonio.

Frank Cooke, of the Purley Christian Trust, Purley, Surrey, England, will lead the Bible study for the conference.

On Tuesday evening, there will be a special commissioning service for McLeod who became director of the Evangelism Division, Nov. 1, 1981.

The conference sessions of inspirational messages and music begin at 7 p.m., Monday; 9 a.m., 1:50 p.m., and 7 p.m., Tuesday; and 9 a.m., Wednesday.

The Evangelism Division of the Baptist General Convention of Texas sponsors the conference which is free and open to the public.

GOT YOUR CARD?

Eastland County Law Enforcement Officers will first issue warnings rather than citations on failure of motorists to comply with the new Liability Insurance law.

Information from Cisco, Eastland and Ranger Police Department indicate that they will follow the general guidelines set up by the Texas Dept. of Public Safety, giving a 90 day period of time in which to phase in compliance. Exceptions to this may be made in case the motorist is involved in an accident, or has been issued an initial warning.

The state law came into effect on Jan. 1, 1982, with fines beginning at \$75.00 for drivers found without proper proof of insurance.

"I would like to impress upon motorists that the law is in effect," stated Sgt. Jerry Matthews of the Eastland-Callahan County division of the D.P.S.

"We will attempt to warn motorists to comply with the law. That is the purpose of the phase-in period."

Norwegian Disk Can Save Lives

A product that saves lives in Norway, the land of the midnight sun, is being introduced in Texas by a former Norwegian businessman.

Jens F. Busch, now retired in Austin, saw the popularity of a small, reflective disk used in Norway by pedestrians. "Refleksbrikke" it is called in Norway. Busch refers to it as the STAR DISC. He feels it can help reduce the numbers of pedestrians killed every year in Texas.

"More than 700 pedestrians were killed in this state in 1980," he says, "and the figures for 1981 are expected to reach the same tragic level."

If Texans would wear the STAR DISC as Norwegians do, the statistics could be significantly cut, Busch feels. Returning from a business career in Norway a few months ago, Busch brought a batch of the disks with him and is introducing them to schools and safety agencies around the state.

The STAR DISC measures 2 1/4 inches across and may be worn from a string around the neck or pinned to any outer garment. It has remarkable reflective powers. Joggers, walkers, and bicyclists can wear the reflectors to increase their visibility at night.

Recently, the Sunday Mirror in London ran a public service campaign and distributed two and one half million disks in a year. Busch hopes some Texas corporations will want to distribute the disks as promotional items.

Research reveals that most pedestrians are killed during hours of darkness.

Pedestrians repeatedly have been urged to wear retro-reflective materials on their clothing. These come in various types and shapes, but very few people know where they may be obtained. Most cannot be transferred easily from one piece of clothing to another, and this discourages usage.

Awareness of the importance of being seen in the dark is very strong in Europe. The availability there of retro-reflective disks and the extensive use of them, has saved many lives.

Busch points out there are more than 1 1/2 million kindergarten and elementary school students in the

state of Texas. More than one third of all pedestrian accidents causing deaths and injuries involve these youngsters. More than 50 children were killed during the first half of 1981. "Here is where PTA councils could play an important part in getting the safety disks out to the kids, either by outright financing or through fundraising activities," Busch says.

Also, Busch comments that 15 percent of all fatal pedestrian accidents strike down senior citizens.

Busch is a recently retired Chrysler executive who spent most of his working years in Europe. He has decided to make Texas his retirement home and lives in Austin with his wife, four children, and two grandchildren.

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1981-A GOOD AND A BAD YEAR FOR TEXAS AGRICULTURE

1981 seemed to offer a lot of hope for Texas farmers and ranchers as the new year unveiled. Almost anything had to look good after the disastrous drought of the previous year. Producers who had managed to survive financially were ready to play their cards again in one of the biggest gambles going—agriculture.

THE LIVESTOCK PICTURE

1981 did get off to a good start, for the most part. The winter months were mild, which was a blessing to livestock producers faced with short hay supplies due to the drought-shortened 1980 crop. Then spring rains came with regularity over the state, a sign of things to come. Grazing conditions got off to a good start over virtually all of Texas and continued throughout most of the year. Some ranchers in western areas acclaimed grazing conditions to be the best in about 20 to 25 years.

However, too much rain at times also caused problems for livestock producers. Some livestock were lost to flood waters that ravaged parts of North Central and West Central Texas, the Hill Country and the Coastal Bend in late summer and early fall. Thousands of chickens also perished in northern counties of the Coastal Bend when fall rains dumped almost 20 inches in a short time.

Some livestock also were lost due to grazing poisonous

range plants in western areas. Blackleg, an infectious cattle disease, reared its ugly head again in South Texas late in the year after a long absence. Many producers also continued to be concerned about another cattle disease—brucellosis, but one old enemy, the screwworm, was virtually absent from Texas this year.

All in all, then, the livestock picture generally was good in Texas except for one major drawback—prices. The cattle market, which was down as the new year dawned, continued on its sluggish path. Cattlemen kept looking for the slightest hint that things might get better. General indications pointed to some positive signs—fewer cattle on feed, continued low total cattle numbers, and a possible turnaround in the economy with a new Administration. But the upswing in prices didn't come until mid-year, and then price gains were only mild and short-lived.

Many cattlemen are holding on "by the skin of their teeth," still waiting for an improved cattle market. Traditional heavy fall marketings were light, and cow culling has not been excessive as ranchers try to hold on to what they have, hoping that things will be

better next spring. Fortunately they have plenty of hay to overwinter their herds because a bumper crop was harvested this year although some was lost to heavy rains and flooding. With a generally mild winter forecasted for this part of the country, most cattlemen should be in good shape for the coming year. But how long can they continue to face low prices? And, how long will feedlot operators continue to stay in business when they are losing so much per head on every animal fed?

THE CROP PICTURE

Cattlemen were not alone with price problems in 1981. Farmers can attest to that. The past two years have been in sharp contrast to each other as far as the crop production picture is concerned, and each time farmers have come away as the losers.

In 1980 farmers saw their crops ravaged by drought. The few that managed to have something to harvest got top dollars. This year it was a different story. Farmers generally harvested bumper crops but the prices they got were near or below their cost of production. A case in point is the fact that cotton deficiency payments (the difference

between the market price and the government target price) will likely be paid for the first time since this concept was devised in 1974.

1981 crops got off to a good start because of spring rains although these came a little late in some areas. Once the rains started, some were too heavy and lingered too long and often were accompanied by damaging hail. Flooding and hail caused some crop losses in South and Southwest Texas, making replanting necessary. Young crops also were hurt by heavy rains in coastal areas. As a result, some cotton and soybean crops never got off the ground along the Upper Coast. Weedy fields caused by extensive wet conditions also plagued crops. And, to add to the woes of farmers in coastal areas, wet fall weather hampered harvest operations, causing further crop losses.

Late summer and fall flooding in North Central and West Central Texas and in parts of the Coastal Bend that caused heavy livestock and poultry losses also took its toll of some crops. Cotton production was reduced sharply, peanut quality suffered, and some small grains that had just been planted were washed out. Some cotton stored in modules—as well as some baled cotton—was lost in the Coastal Bend. Fall rains over much of the plains and western areas also delayed cotton maturity, but a later than normal killing frost helped that situation.

Cotton root rot, a severe cotton disease during wet years, took a heavy toll of the crop in the Central Texas Blacklands where it is most prevalent. Losses ranged from 15 to 30 percent.

Despite these problems in some areas, Texas farmers harvested record yields of wheat, corn and grain sorghum and better-than-average yields of cotton, rice, peanuts and most other crops. But the good news ended at the marketplace.

Why the low prices for farm commodities? It's generally a problem of over-supply due to bumper crops in this country as well as abroad. Many grain warehouses are filled to the brim. Unless something unforeseen happens to sharply reduce supplies in the coming months, the outlook for significant price improvements for farm commodities in 1982 will remain bleak.

THE YEAR AHEAD

A lot of things are weighed on the minds of farmers and ranchers as 1981 comes to a close. How long will they be able to keep their operations afloat financially? How long can they keep producing crops and livestock as just a meager profit or, in many cases, at a loss? Those are heart-rendering questions that they face at a time when the entire economy of this nation is stagnant.

Economic recovery can't come too soon, and if and when it does come, will farmers and ranchers get a fair share or will they continue to flounder for survival? The questions are many but the answers are few. The new farm bill, when it finally surfaces, will shed some light on farm and ranch decisions for the next few years, but many problems will continue to persist.

Agriculture remains an honorable profession, one that has made this country what it is today. Nevertheless, farmers and ranchers continue to fall by the wayside almost daily, victims of the cost-price squeeze. Production expenses have been driven up by rising energy costs, spiraling inflation and high interest rates on borrowed capital. Yet the marketplace has been unyielding in offering higher returns to those who produce the food and fiber for this nation and for many other countries as well.

HOUSE PLANTS

Since the holidays are over and a lot of people received house plants as gifts I am devoting this column to house plants, including information on the most popular ones. Generally speaking, most house plants are killed by too much T.L.C. (tender loving care). Usually house plants are killed by over watering and Not under watering. Let's first look at the rubber plant. The correct name for the rubber plant is Ficus elastica and it is a member of the Moraceae family. It is a native to Southeast Asia and the Malay Archipelago regions where it grows to a height of 65 to 80 feet. It likes a half-shaded and warm place. During the summer it requires a great deal of water and can be kept outside during this time. During the winter it likes to be 59 to 64 degrees.

Another of the more popular house plants is the Sansevieria or Snake plant as it is better known. Its current name is Sansevieria trifasciata and is a member of the Liliaceae family. The Sansevieria is a native to East Africa and is a robust plant. It is a warmth-loving plant and should be kept in a sunny or lightly shaded location. In no instance should it be kept too wet. Dry summer air suits it very well. When kept in a cool place, it should be watered even less often than usual. As a pot plant, the Sansevieria may grow to a height of three feet.

Now let's look at the Split leaf Philodendron. This plant is a native of Brazil and is one of the most popular of all house plants today. The Philodendron can have enormous leaves reaching two feet across and three feet long. It likes medium to high light near a bright east or south window and prefers a temperature of 65 to 85 degrees. Allow the surface of the potting mixture to dry out between waterings and fertilize every two months with a water soluble fertilizer. This plant likes humidity of 25% or more.

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

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OILFIELD DISPATCH

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Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas operators reported 116 gas and 47 oil discoveries in December 1981.

One year ago, 74 gas and 56 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the twelfth month of the year included 29 in the Refugio area, 27 in deep South Texas, 15 in Southeast Texas, 11 in West Central Texas, eight in

East Texas, seven in North Texas and the San Angelo area, five in the Midland area, four in the San Antonio area, and three in the Panhandle area.

Oil discoveries includes eight in the San Angelo area, seven in North Texas, six in Southeast Texas, five in West Central Texas, four each in East Texas and the San Antonio, Refugio and Lubbock areas, three in deep South Texas and two in the Midland area.

In December, operators reported 366 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 3,382 in December compared with 3,556 in the same period of 1980.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in December

amounted to 3,636 against 3,825 a year earlier.

Operators filed 795 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 728 amended requests.

An Eastland County wildcat will be drilled four miles east of Eastland as Keystone Oil Co. Inc., Abilene, No. 1 Mickle.

The planned 4,000-foot test is located on an 89-acre lease.

Drillsite is 330 feet from the south and 1,022 feet from

the east lines of Section 44, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Oil & Gas Logistics, Tulsa, will drill two proposed 2,000-foot wildcats six miles southwest of Cisco.



A cow is a completely automated milk manufacturing machine. It is encased in untanned leather and mounted on four vertical movable supports, one at each corner.
