THIS WEEK makes you feel like you have spring fever, since afternoon temperatures on Monday crawled up into the 70s. Tuesday afternoon highs were predicted for the 70s and so were Wednesdays.

I could get used to this kind of weather real quick. It is nice to be able to go outside and do something without being so cold.

Normally I like cold weather, but I am ready for the spring to begin and stay around for awhile. The past few days have been beautiful.

IF YOU ARE considering buying a used car, the following information might be of interest, especially if you are going to purchase it out of town.

Good used cars are hard to find these days, but you're really better off asking some simple questions before you buy, advises Rod Birmingham, an investigator with Aetna Life & Casualty's arson/fraud unit.

That used car may look great, but a second look — and knowing what to look for — can mean the difference between having the car you want and having nothing but an empty wallet.

The car could have been stolen, Birmingham warns. Even if you don't know it's a stolen car, you can lose the car, and the money you paid for it.

"Of course you can always sue the seller if you unknowingly purchased a stolen car," he adds, "but that's likely to be a lengthy and expensive process, and it certainly won't save you any money!"

"Auto theft is a big business these days. Whether it's chopping up stolen cars for body repair parts or placing a stolen car body on a chassis for which there is legitimate title, professional auto thieves are making money," Birmingham explains. "And the unwitting used car buyer, on the other hand, could lose money on what at first appears to be a real bargain."

So if you're in the market for a good used car or expect to be in the future, Birmingham offers these tips:

Go to a reliable, established dealer when buying a used car. Be especially careful when buying a car from an individual without a specific address. Check to see whether the seller can be located should you need to reach him or her after the sale.

Check the Vehicle Identification Number (VIN), which is usually embossed on a metal plate over the driver's dash section and visible from the outside of the bottom of the windshield, for signs of alteration or replacement. The VIN must match the VIN shown on the seller's certificate of title.

Inquire about past insurance and financing on the car, and then verify this information with the insurance agent, bank or finance company.

Look at the body paint on a new model. A fresh paint job

may indicate cover-up work by thieves.

Check the license tag and inspection sticker to be certain that they are current and issued by the same state.

Ask for at least one set of the original manufacturer's keys rather than a replacement set. Be suspicious if the seller provides you with remade keys for a late model car.

Review and complete all paperwork at the time of sale. Don't forget that certificate of titles frequently can be counterfeited. Check documents carefully for signs of possible alteration.

Police Chief Warns Parking In Alleys Violates Ordinance

Cisco's Acting Chief of Police Raymond Blevins stated here this week that citizens are violating a city ordinance by parking their automobiles in alleyways.

The blocked alleys cause city sanitation crews problems when picking up garbage. They are sometimes unable to pass through the alleys, according to Chief Blevins.

An ordinance was passed on January 9th, 1973, dealing with the parking of cars in alleyways. The ordinance was passed as an emergency and went into effect immediately. Douglas Fry was

mayor and Sutton Crofts was city secretary at the time.

The ordinance reads in part as follows:

"It shall be, and it is hereafter, unlawful for any person or persons to park or leave unattended any motor vehicle in or on any alley located in the City of Cisco.

"Any person, firm, partnership or corporation who violates any provision of this ordinance or fails to comply with any of its provisions shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00."

Pickup Totaled In Accident On IH-20 Near City

A pickup truck with camper was a total loss in an accident at 7:10 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 13, one-tenth of a mile west of Cisco on IH-20.

Mr. and Mrs. Jeffrey Spencer and their two children were in the truck en route to his Navy base at San Diego, Calif.

Public Safety Trooper Steve Tone said that Mrs. Spencer, 27, was driving when the westbound pickup hit a culvert on the right side of the highway. The pickup over-turned three times, he said, but landed upright in the outside highway lane.

Mrs. Spencer, who complained of chest pains, was admitted to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital but later released. A Ted & Rex Fields wrecker brought the pickup to Cisco. Mr. Spencer rented a U-Haul truck and departed late in the day with the pickup in tow.

The Spencers planned to return to Winchester, Ky., where he expected to leave his wife and children with her parents until he could fly to San Diego, report to the Navy and arrange housing.

Trooper Tone said the camper shell had to be left at the wreck site while the pickup was being towed to town, and when the wrecker returned for the shell it was gone.

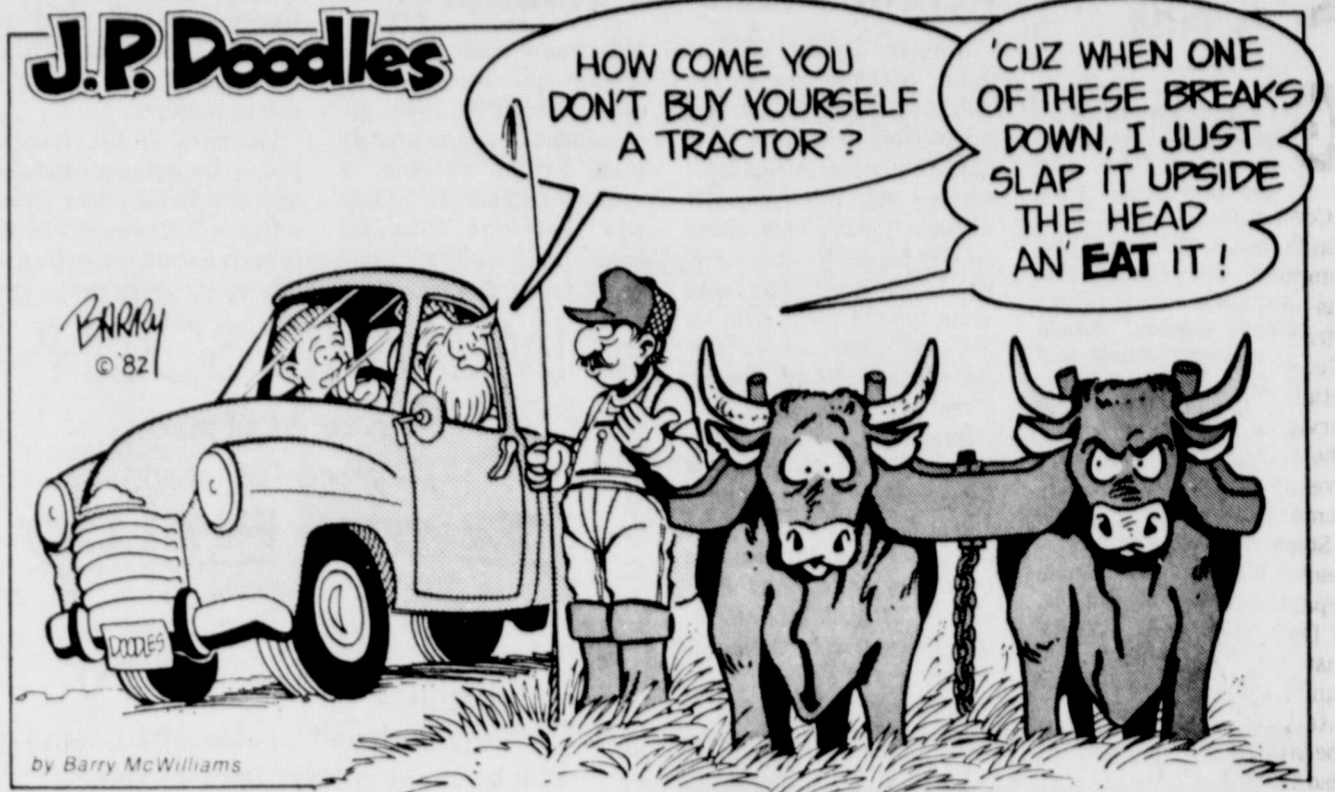
Medicare Patients To Pay More For Part A This Year

Medicare patients, you'll pay more for your Part A "deductible" this year - that's the part you pay for yourself (or which you may have supplemental insurance for), reports Judith L. Warren, a family life education specialist.

As of Jan. 1, 1982, patients are responsible for the first \$260 of each new 90-day benefit period. In 1980, the Part A deductible was \$180. In 1981, it was \$204.

Also, during 1982, Medicare patients in the hospital from 61-90 days will be responsible for paying \$75 a day, rather than the \$51 they had to pay last year.

Bullock Reports Sales Tax And Mixed Drink Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday returned \$106.4 million in local sales tax payments to 954 cities who levy the one-percent local tax.

"This is the biggest single payment since city sales tax rebates began in 1968," Bullock said.

The \$106.4 million payment represents a 16 percent jump over last February's checks, which in turn had grown 16 percent over the previous February. Payments so far in 1982 are running 13.2 percent above last year's January-February total.

"This increase is higher than inflation and population growth put together," Bullock said, "and at least part of this rise has to come from our work making sure these cities get every penny of sales tax that's coming to them."

The biggest check—\$2.4 million—went to Houston, up 23 percent over last February's check.

Dallas received \$11.1 million, compared to \$10.5 million for the same period last year.

The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The net payment this period for Cisco is \$31,091.99. The 1982 payments to date is \$41,506.67. The percent change to date is 14.89%.

Eastland's net payment this period is \$36,493.39. The 1982 payments to date are \$46,417.43. The percent change to date is 47.38%.

The net payment this period for Gorman is \$4,861.45. The 1982 payments to date are \$5,393.83. The percent change to date is -16.78%.

Ranger's net payment for this period is \$16,801.30. The 1982 payments to date is \$23,476.43. The percent change to date is 16.41%.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Tuesday that the more than one and a quarter billion dollars worth of mixed drinks Texans bought during 1981 netted \$125 million in tax revenue for state and local governments last year.

Bullock made the observation in returning more than \$10 million in local shares rebated of the 10 percent gross receipts tax on mixed drinks to 383 Texas cities and 209 counties for the fourth quarter of 1981.

Texas cities and counties receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax charged on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries.

The state will pocket more than \$24.3 million from mixed drink taxes from the October, November and December period.

During 1981, the state's share of mixed drink taxes totaled \$88.7 million. City-County rebates totaled \$36.3 million.

The tax, authorized by the same law that legalized mixed drink sales, is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and rebates are sent quarterly to cities and counties by the Comptroller.

Eastland County's 15% tax remittance is \$1,679.78. The 15% tax remittance for Eastland is \$153.96. For Ranger the remittance is \$308.98.

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Introducaon To Camellias.

Studying the history of the
 camellia, you will find the
 natural camellia belt along
 the coast of China and the of-
 fshore islands including
 Japan and Foremosa.
 In 1948, twenty plus
 varieties of camellia
 reticulata were introduced
 to the United States from the
 vicinity of Kunming in the
 province of Yunnan, China.
 The camellia belt extends
 from cold areas of Korea in
 the North to the Semi-
 tropical area of Indo-China
 in the South.
 One story about the
 camellia introduction to the
 western world involves the
 Tea plant which is a close
 relation to the camellia.
 Around 1700 a British
 Trading Company commis-
 sioned one of its sea captians
 who was leaving for China to
 bring back specimens of
 China's Tea plant. The
 British were planning on
 growing Tea in Europe and
 thus eliminating the expen-
 sive time-consuming and
 hazardous trip to the Orient
 for Tea.
 China, however, was
 aware of what would happen
 if they let their tea plants get
 to Europe. They gave the sea
 captain ornamental
 camellias as tea plants. This
 is reported to be the in-
 troduction of Japonicas to
 England.
 The botanical classifica-
 tion of which the camellia
 belongs is called Theaceae.
 The camellia is one of six-
 teen genera of this family.
 The camellia is the only
 genus of this family of major
 ornamental importance,
 measured by their populari-
 ty, the japonicas, the sasan-
 quas and the reticulata.

Japonicas, being the most
 popular, are therefore con-
 sidered to be the most impor-
 tant by many growers.
 There are several thousand
 named varieties of the
 Japonicas. The Japonica has
 a uniform growing habit and
 superior foliage and flower.
 You will find the simple five
 petal single to the most com-
 plete double camellia.
 In Japonica species you
 will also find the widest
 range of colors pink, rose,
 red, chalk white and blushes.
 The Japonica has the longest
 blooming season due to the

large number of varieties.
 You can have a continuous
 bloom up to six months from
 late fall to late spring with
 Japonicas. This is good for
 landscaping giving the yard
 and garden color when they
 are bare in the winter.
 The foliage of the Japonica
 looks as if it has been waxed,
 making its appearance far
 superior to the other
 varieties. The Japonica
 bloom is noted for its diversi-
 ty, formality and lasting
 qualities. The bloom size

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Peanuts Plentiful Again

Remember the peanut shortage two years ago when the price of peanut butter went out of sight and it and other peanut products were hard to find at the supermarket?

Well, the situation has done an about-face following a bumper peanut crop in 1981, says Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Just look at the number. Total peanut stocks last November at 2.87 billion pounds were up 72 percent from a year earlier and shelled peanut supplies were up 94 percent. That's good news for peanut butter lovers and those who enjoy roasted peanuts and other peanut snacks, says Feagan. Faced with a good domestic demand for peanuts which will keep prices strong, farmers in Texas and other peanut-producing states plan to plant about the same number of acres this year as in 1981, notes the economist. And most will have to take their chances on the open market rather than contracting their crop.

Peanuts grown under the national poundage quota set by the Secretary of Agriculture will enjoy a price support of \$550 per ton during the new four-year farm program. However, the support price will be increased annually based on increased production costs not to exceed 6 percent.

Under the new farm program, traditional acreage allotments have been eliminated, allowing anyone to grow peanuts, says Feagan. However, farmers with allotments will be able to grow peanuts under the poundage that is tied to the price support program.

Plans call for the national poundage quota to be reduced from the current 1.2 million tons to 1.1 million 1985. According to the economist, farmers with quotas who have not grown peanuts in recent years will be the first to suffer cut-backs.

A support price for non-quota peanuts is still to be set by the Secretary of Agriculture based on projected world market prices for peanuts and peanut products. That price will be at a rate that would result in no cost to the government.

Abraham Lincoln was not only one of our nation's greatest President's, but also one of our most eloquent. As the anniversary of his birth approaches, much will be said to honor this great leader and statesman.

Yet, his own words are a far better tribute than any we can devise. It is a tribute to the greatness of Abraham Lincoln that his observations about people and their government hold true now as they did when they were made five score years ago. I would like to share just a few of his statements which are well worth remembering now:

"The dogmas of the quiet past are inadequate to the stormy present. The occasion is piled high with difficulty, and we must rise with the occasion. As our case is new, so we must think anew, and act anew."

"The legitimate object of government is to do for a community of people whatever they need to have done, but cannot do at all, or cannot so well do, for themselves, in their separate and individual capacities. In all that the people can individually do as well for themselves, government ought not to interfere."

"The maintenance inviolate of the rights of the States, and especially the right of each state to order and control its own judgment exclusively, is essential to that balance of powers on which the perfection, and endurance of our political fabric depends."

"This government must be preserved in spite of the acts of any man or set of men. It is worthy of your every effort. Nowhere in the world is presented a government of so much liberty and equality. To the humblest and poorest amongst us are held out the highest privileges and position."

And finally, the Gettysburg address lives on as one of the most moving tributes to the principles which bind us together.

Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate -- we can not consecrate -- we can not hallow -- this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work

which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for use to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us -- that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion -- that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain -- that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom -- and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

The President's budget proposal for the next fiscal year reflects two basic commitments -- to control and where possible reduce the amount of federal spending, and to rebuild our national defense capability to a level which will enable us to defend our vital interests in the world.

The defense portion of the fiscal year 1983 budget is undeniably large, with spending projected to be \$215.9 billion. But its merit should not be judged merely on its size. The validity of the budget proposal must be determined by the contribution it makes to our nation's ability to meet its defense needs, and the extent to which it uses the taxpayers' money efficiently.

Clearly our defense needs are great. We are forced to increase the level of spending for national defense now because we neglected that area in favor of domestic programs in past years. During that period, the Soviet Union increased its military investment. Thus, our capability relative to that of the Soviet Union deteriorated to an alarming degree. We began last year to redress these deficiencies, but must continue that effort this year and for the next few years.

Yet, even the magnitude of our needs does not give the military a blank check. Our dollars are finite, and our validated requirements are many. That means that we in Congress, and the Administration, have a special obligation to make certain that every dollar spent contributes the maximum amount possible to our defense.

The Defense Department has made an excellent start in this regard. During the past year, it has initiated a series of programs and actions to improve efficiency and management in the department.

These include a reform of the strategic planning, programming and budget process; reform of the process by which weapons systems are acquired; a major attack on fraud, waste and abuse; economies and efficiencies in a number of internal management operations, and creation of a Management Improvement Council.

Thus the budget which has been presented to us reflects new efficiencies. It also reflects the Defense Department's determination to budget realistically to reflect actual cost and inflation factors. This approach in some cases provides higher figures now, but these amounts are much less likely to be subject to cost overruns later.

I am confident that the budget the Administration has sent to the Congress reflects its officials' best efforts to use each dollar wisely. However, Congress still has an obligation to scrutinize each aspect of the budget.

As the Armed Services Committee begins examining the defense request, we will not approve programs which are not cost-effective. This has been the case in past years,

and we will be especially vigilant this year. We also will be looking very closely at the procedures and management systems embodied in the proposal provide maximum efficiency.

On behalf of the committee, I already have requested the Government Accounting Office to audit several of the Defense Department's money-saving programs. I also have requested GAO to review compliance on cost overrun reports.

In addition, I have asked the GAO comptroller-general and his staff to provide further suggestion to the Armed Services Committee that will assist us in our scrutiny of the budget.

You, the American citizen, are entitled to a strong national defense. In every poll, and in your letters and comments to me, you have reiterated your determination that your federal government should provide you with this strong defense.

But you also are entitled a program of national defense which is free of inefficiency and waste. We in Congress will work diligently to make certain that you get both a strong and a cost-effective national security system.

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

SAVE MONEY BY PAINTING YOUR HOUSE YOURSELF!



Here are a few hints that can make the chore of painting your house a little easier... and allow you to have the satisfaction of doing a good job yourself, while saving money for more necessary—or enjoyable—activities.

Before you begin, here are some suggestions to help you estimate just how much paint to buy for a given house painting job: (1) Compute the number of square feet of surface to be covered. To do so, determine the distance around the house, in feet, then find the average height to the eaves and add two feet to that figure. (This will allow for the paint you'll need for the gables.) Last, multiply the former result by the latter. (2) Ask your paint dealer approximately how many square feet each gallon of undercoat will cover, then divide the total area of the house by this figure. (3) Finally, learn how much area a gallon of topcoat house paint will cover and compute how much of that you'll need. Here's an example: Let's say your home is 20' by 40' with an average height to the eaves of 13'. By multiplying 120' (the perimeter) by 15' (the average height to the eaves plus 2'), you'll find that the surface area is about 1,800 square feet. A good grade of undercoat or primer should cover about 350 square feet per gallon, and a top-quality house paint covers 400 square feet per gallon. A little simple arithmetic reveals that 5 gallons of undercoat and 4-1/2 of house paint should do the job.

The first portion of your house painting task is surface preparation, which usually involves scraping, sanding, and caulking... with maybe a bit of priming here and there. It'll take about half a day for the average home.

Begin by hosing down the exterior surfaces, then scrape any peeling, cracked, or chipped spots. (Areas which are taken down to the bare wood should get a coat of primer.) Finally, replace any loose or missing putty around windows, and recaulk the window frames, doors, and chimneys as needed.

The second part of the chore is painting the trim and windows. The trim is usually easy, unless you've got an old house with overhanging eaves (wear a hat for this job). If you use care when painting the windows, you'll save time in the long run, because you won't have to scrape the panes later on.

Then comes the main body of the house... which is the easiest part, because you can use a wide brush and make long strokes. For large, smooth areas you can try painting with an industrial roller. It holds a lot of paint and, in most cases, will cover as well as a brush... but do so much more quickly.

Don't forget drying time... allow at least 48 hours between coats.

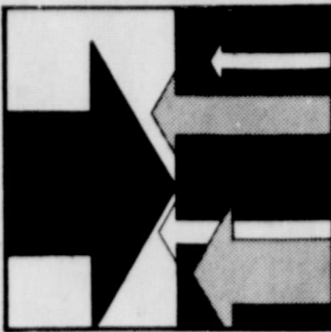
The final task is to clean up the yard area by gathering stray paint chips, old caulking, and putty, and throwing them away. (Do a good job... scraps of old paint can be ingested by children and cause lead poisoning.) Once you've finished, you can sit back and relax, knowing you've done a thorough job and hedged yourself against inflation one more time!

UNDERSTANDING ALLERGIES

Sneezing. Wheezing. Itching. Weeping. An allergy? Could be. But before jumping to a conclusion you should consider a few facts about allergies. Too many today are willing to blame allergies for almost any discomfort they experience.

It's true that allergies are common. Probably as many as one out of every five persons regularly experience uncomfortable symptoms of an allergy. The allergic response they feel is actually a defect in the immune system of the body to protect against an attack of microorganisms. The body tissues simply overreact to foreign substances, which are otherwise harmless.

However it's just as important to know what allergies are not. The inability to digest a particular food in a normal way, while referred to as a food allergy, is not an allergic response. It has nothing to do with the function of the body's immune system. There are many irritants, such as chemicals, which produce discomfort but don't trigger an allergic response.

To see what happens when one experiences an allergic reaction let's follow the pollen grain as it comes into contact with the mucous lining of the nose. The pollen is coated with distinctive molecules—a unique blend of proteins. If the person attached to the nose is allergic, antibodies that recognize these foreign molecules will be in the vicinity attached to a mast cell. The antibodies stick to the

foreign molecules, with many quickly accumulating on the surface. This triggers the mast cell to release histamine, as well as other substances. Histamine causes the characteristic itching and makes the tiny blood vessels (capillaries) swollen and leaky, causing the redness and swelling associated with the allergic response. Mast cells also release substances which constrict the air passages in the lungs, producing the characteristic wheezing of asthma.

This series of events, with individual variations, underlies every allergic reaction. But there are still many mysteries about allergies. Why, for instance, does one person get hay fever from ragweed, another develop eczema from exposure to milk, and yet another get hives from seafood? These differences simply are not understood.

Of the little that is known, it has been established that a combination of factors must be present to bring it on: an inherited susceptibility, exposure to a foreign substance that acts as an allergen, and some kind of stress. That's all that's needed to get the ball rolling.

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Watching Washington

Whether he had it in mind or not, poet Robert Frost's whimsical defense of inept accounting was tailor-made for the federal government.

I recently introduced legislation to improve government accounting procedures by establishing Inspectors General to weed out waste and fraud within the Defense Department and other agencies.

My bill provides for Inspectors General with sweeping powers to audit and investigate the Pentagon along with the Justice and Treasury Departments and the Agency for International Development. These agencies were excluded from a 1978 law which set up such positions within other government offices.

Last year, the House of Representatives gave resounding approval to legislation similar to mine.

We have to spend as much as it takes to insure that the United States does not come out second best to any country in defense. I continue to give all-out support to a strong defense as I have done since coming to the Senate.

But, while we must spend enough money to get the job done, we must also make sure that our money is well-spent.

I'm pleased that the Reagan Administration agrees with my views on this important issue and is supporting efforts to create these needed new positions.

The Inspectors General would be "in but not of" the various government departments where they would operate. They would be authorized to perform internal audits and investigations, independent of the agencies.

The Defense Department Inspector General, for example, would be instructed to coordinate activities with those of existing Inspectors General within the individual branches of the U.S. Armed Forces.

Although the Administration is on record supporting the establishment of Inspectors General, the departments affected, with the exception of Treasury, are opposing the legislation.

For decades, every Congress and every Administration that have come to Washington have worked to eliminate waste, fraud and abuse in government programs. To this point the efforts have met with limited success.

This idea, of naming independent Inspectors General with sweeping investigatory powers, holds forth great promise. I'll push—and push hard—for quick enactment.

Public opinion surveys indicate that, as the recession deepens, fear of unemployment is gradually overtaking concern about inflation in the minds of the American people.

But down the road, as we move further into the decade of the 1980s, the major economic problem in this country may well be a shortage not of jobs but of workers, especially skilled workers.

It's ironic that, at a time when millions of Americans are losing their jobs, a minimum of 250,000 skilled labor jobs have gone begging each year since 1978.

Labor Department projections for the period 1978-90 show there will be a yearly shortage of 57,500 industrial machinery repairmen, 28,000 computer operators, 21,300 machinists and 19,000 licensed practical nurses, to mention but a few examples.

In the 13 occupations facing the most critical shortages during this period, the number of trained workers will fall short of demand by some 2.5 million.

Our skilled labor shortage is forcing American firms to spend billions of dollars annually for stop-gap, in-house, on-the-job training. This shadow educational system is a patchwork quilt conceivably rivaling our entire higher education system in size.

According to studies I've worked on with the Joint Economic Committee, robots will help ease the skilled labor shortage that our country faces. But increased use of robots will also cause some additional problems.

Right now, Japan leads the world in the manufacture and use of robots—they have 11,000, over half of the world's supply. Our country has about 4,000 robots.

Whether we like it or not, the robot revolution is coming. We have no control over this; we're being pushed into robot production because of competition from other countries.

Robots can help to raise productivity, and do the dirty, dangerous, repetitive jobs. But we must also keep in mind that increased use of robots can be expected to have some harmful consequences and we must work to diminish their impact.

We must, for example, make sure that there are enough skilled workers to build, run and maintain these robots. And we must by all means take steps to provide the vocational education, the training that will be needed by workers who are displaced from their jobs by robots.

This anticipated increase in the use of robots is but one facet of a skilled labor shortage that will lead to severe economic problems for our country later in this decade, if we fail to anticipate those problems and deal effectively with them.

Eastland Co. Dispatch Completes 6th Year

The Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch has now completed its sixth full year of operation in serving the Law Enforcement Agencies of Eastland County.

The Dispatch which operates 24 hours a day is being supported by the County of Eastland and the Cities of Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star.

629-1728 is the number to call for EMERGENCIES requiring the Police, Fire dept. or Ambulance service. Persons outside the toll free area of Eastland may call this number COLLECT. The number is a 24 hour a day number for EMERGENCIES.

With the 24 hour a day operation of dispatch the Law Enforcement Agencies of Eastland County can increase their ability to strive for a low crime rate, maintain their programs of crime prevention, investigate crimes and enforce the laws.

During the calendar year 1981 the dispatch serving the Law Enforcement Agencies

of Eastland County, handled a total of 310,296 pieces of traffic which is as follows: 152,466 radio transmissions, 115,693 pieces of teletype traffic, which include 12,894 request for Texas vehicle registration information,

8,249 request for Texas drivers license information, 16,619 requests for checking on wanted/stolen persons, vehicle and property in Texas,

12,027 request for checking on wanted/stolen persons, vehicles and property throughout the United States,

2,260 requests for out of state information on vehicle registrations and driver license information,

1,825 messages sent requesting or sending information to other Law Enforcement Agencies throughout Texas and the United States.

Dispatch Handled 37,146 telephone calls which include 5,058 (13.6%) requesting emergency services from the Police, Fire Department or ambulance service.

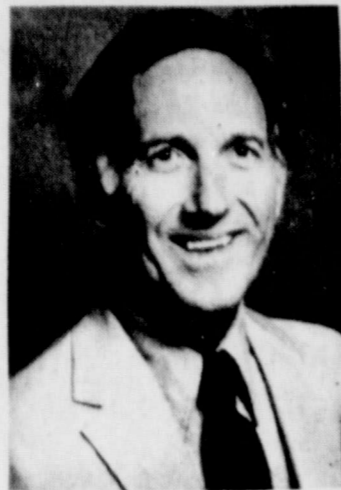

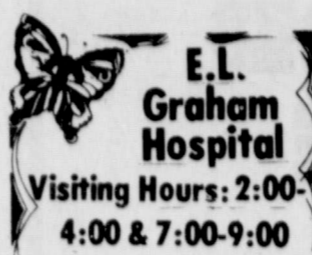

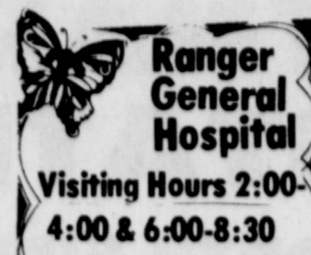

WTU To Increase Rates To Customers

A settlement agreement allowing West Texas Utilities Company to increase its rates to retail customers has been approved by the Texas Public Library Commission of Texas.

compared with \$26,202 for the same month last year. Other area cities and their January checks included Eastland, \$36,493; Putnam, \$2,087; Moran, \$1,168; Rising Star, \$2,805; and Ranger, \$16,801... Barbara Wylie of Cisco was the winner of a "name that tune" contest of FM Radio 97, Eastland, recently.

The new rates, which will average about 8.3 per cent above the old rates, were placed in effect on Friday, February 12. This action is in accordance with a stipulated agreement with all intervenors, including cities represented by the Texas Municipal League, WTU and the PUC staff.

The increase is designed to increase the Company's annual retail revenues by \$11.8 million. A wholesale rate increase of \$5.5 million, also settled by agreement and expected to be approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, would bring WTU's total annual revenue increase to

\$17.3 million. The Company had applied for a total increase of \$32.2.

The effect on a residential bill for 600 kilowatt-hours of electricity per month would be slightly over 10 per cent. This would include the fuel cost adjustment. For 600 kilowatts at a residence, the bill would be \$37.89 under the new rates and \$34.39 under the old rates.

Truck Load Of Concrete Pipe In Mishap Here

A driver sustained minor injuries and his truck overturned with a cargo of heavy pipe on IH-20 southeast of Cisco around 2 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 13.

The driver, Ronald A. Cash, 44, of Grand Prairie, was treated at Eastland Memorial Hospital. He had

DPS Trooper Steve Tone, who investigated the mishap, reported that Driver Cash was going west with a truck carrying a load of concrete pipe to Lubbock. The truck had started to pass a car and overturned when the car being passed veered into the left lane, the report said.

The truck came to rest upside down in the median area between the east and west paved traffic lanes. The huge pipe joints, each weighing about 16,000 pounds, were still on the ground between the highway lanes Monday afternoon, awaiting a truck and loading equipment.

The mishap occurred on IH-20 south of the Colony Restaurant. A Mangum Service Center wrecker from Eastland picked up the truck, which had extensive damage.
