

Proposed Bond Election Project The Cisco City Council, in the interest of informing the voters as to the timetable of possible projects resulting from the bond election passage, and also to advise citizens of the possible economic impact of the approval of the three issues, has given the following information to The Cisco Press for publication at this time:

(1) The \$1,450,000 water filtration plant and system improvements...This program, if approved Saturday, will carry some "ifs." If we get the 5.6% financing from the state for \$500,000 of the project, along with most of the remaining amount at 11%, then we could begin the preliminary work within 6 months to a year. When the bonds are sold, the increase in water bills would take effect. Water bills would go up

on an average of 90 to 95 percent when the project begins, and the bond payments would be largely paid off in 20 years. If we do NOT get the state financing, then we must turn to the federal agency, the Farm and Home Administration,

approving financing for us. Their current interest rate is 12.3%, but the rate fluctuates periodically. If this funding is used, water bills would still be approximately doubled, but the bond payments would extend to 40 years due to the higher rate of interest. If the FHA will not fund us, the project will of necessity be abandoned until such time as other funding can be arranged. We foresee no other available sources of funding, however. Naturally we are hopeful of the statefunded methods which is by

Vote For Health And Progress

When the voters of the City of Cisco go to the polls on Saturday, April 3, to ballot on the proposition of issuing some \$1,925,000 in bonds to finance water and sewer improvements they could well be deciding a matter vital to the community's health and progress.

The need for water filtration at Lake Cisco has been pointed out by the State Department of Health. This agency has used water analysis results compiled over a period of years to show that the water we drink is something less than ood quality and that our community is fortunate Roat no disease outbreak has occurred as a result the water.

It has been common knowledge for some years that our city's sewage and waste water disposal facilities are quite inadequte-a situation that could very well affect community health condi-

Three propositions are on the ballot in the Saturday bond ballot. Each proposition contributes in part to remedying the conditions of our water and sewer facilities. It is important that a "yes" vote be recorded for each of the propositions.

Certainly, the improvement program will be costly. The some 2,000 customers of the water and sewer systems will pay considerably more for this service after improvements are made. Hopefully, our city government will be able to obtain a considerable part of the total expense in the form of a grant. Efforts are going forward with this in mind.

The progress of our community is very definitely at stake in this important election. Our city council, reluctant to act in haste, has placed the matter before the people, feeling that Cisco has no alternative. This is a matter that cannot be delayed further-its enactment is too vital to our people's health and the community's general welfare.

This newspaper, weighing the pros and cons, endorses the bond issue and urges its support. We, as citizens of a progressive community, cannot in good conscience continue to ignore a very real problem. Let's rally behind the improvement program at the polls next Saturday





There will be a dinner on the grounds following the Sunday morning service. For transportation needs call 442-1450 or 442-1512.







> ORDINANCE NO. 1982-3-23

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS

ESTABLISHING THE HOURS OF OPERATION OF THE CITY SANITARY LANDFILL ESTABLISHING USER FEES FOR THE LAND-

FILL: PROHIBITING SCAVENGING; ESTABLISHING A PENAL-TY; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Cisco, Texas, has provided an approved facility for the collection and disposal of garbage and refuse to promote the health, safety and convenience of its citizens and for the safeguard of necessary and required health standards in accordance with state law; and

WHEREAS, the City of Cisco is not financially capable of underwriting a garbage disposal operation such as the sanitary landfill without charging appropriate fees; now

THEREFORE, BE IT OR-DAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT: Section 1.-Hours of Opera-

1. The City's sanitary landfill normal hours of operation shall be established, amended and maintained by the City Manager. The sanitary landfill will be open and available to the general public during the following

Monday 8:30 a.m.4:30 p.m. Thursday 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Saturday 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

2. The City Manager shall be authorized to revise the hours that the sanitary landfill is open to the public to accomodate a later hours usage of the landfill during Daylight Savings Time.

3. The landfill may be closed by direction of the City Manager due to unsafe con-

ditions resulting from inclement weather or other conditions that may create a hazardous or unacceptable situation; and during normal City holidays.

Section 2.-Landfill Rates 1. Any citizen of Cisco or City sanitation customer may use the landfill free of charge during the hours the landfill is open to the public by the presentation to the gatekeeper the water bill stub from the previous month indictating a sanitation charge and a valid driver's license.

2. Any water customer of the City of Cisco who is not a resident of the City of Cisco and is not paying a monthly sanitation charge and any individual who is leasing or renting City property for residential purposes, may utilize the landfill in the same manner as City sanitation customers as indicated in paragraph 1. of this section upon the payment of a charge of \$10.00 per month. All such customers shall be billed quarterly, and the minimum payment shall be for said three months. All such payments shall be prorated on the quarterly basis and shall be non-refundable.

3. Except for the users established in the above paragraph, the following schedule of fees and rates shall be charged users of the sanitary landfill:

a. Passenger car or any vehicle smaller than a pickup truck-Charge each b. Pickup truck, up to and

including 34 ton, width standard bed; single axle trailer; van or panel truck; or passenger vehicle with interior space and/or trunk space equivalent to a pickup truck--Charge load-\$5.00

c. Pickup truck or single axle trailer with extended bed: trucks up to and including one (1) ton-Charge each load-\$8.00

d. Trucks, one (1) to two and one-half (21/2 ton) tons; two (2) axle trailer-Charge each load-\$10.00 e. Trucks, two and one-half

(2½) tons or larger; two (2) axle trailers with extended bed--Charge load-\$12.00 f. Trucks, semi-trailer;

eighteen (18) wheel vehicle-Charge each load-\$25.00

g. Compactor trucks, 29 cubic yards or less-Charge each load-\$30.00

h. Compactor trucks, between 30 and 39 cubic yards-Charge each load-\$35.00

i. Compactor trucks, 40 cubic yards or larger-Charge each load-\$50.00 j. Charges for vehicles not

specifically indicated above

will be at a rate as set by the

City Manager. 4. The amounts prescribed herein as landfill rates shall be charged and collected per load from vehicles not owned and operated by the City of Cisco or the State of Texas for dumping refuse at the City's sanitary landfill, and such afore prescribed charges shall be paid in legal tender prior to the dumping of such refuse unless other-

Manager. 5. a. It shall be unlawful for any person to scavenge or carry off waste, garbage, refuse, rubbish, or any other item or materials from the City's sanitary landfill so as to violate regulations and rules of the Texas Department of Health. Permission to do so must first be obtained in writing from the City Manager.

b. It shall be unlawful for any person to loiter at the City's sanitary landfill unless unloading garbage or refuse.

6. Violation of any provision of this article shall be deemed a misdemeanor and upon conviction punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for each violation.

7. Upon approval, this ordinance shall come into effect and be enforceable on April 1, 1982.

Dear Mayor

On August 5, 1980, our representative, Mr. Jim Soper, R.S., contacted Mr. Frank Young, Superintendent of Public Utilities, and discussed a complaint of burning at the City of Cisco Landfill and of no water and/or low water pressure in the distribution. On August 7, 1980, our representative, Mrs. Judy M. Willingham, R.S., contacted you, the Acting City Manager, Ms. Marilyn Smith, and Mr. Young to further investigate the report of low water pressure.

It is understood that the City has engaged Yeatts and Decker, Engineering Firm, Abilene, Texas, to update the previous study prepared on the water system and prepare plans for improvement of the system. We are pleased to note preparation of long term plans for improvements, but it is necessary to provide more immediate corrections or action to waintain the safest water supply possible under the circumstances.

low water pressure is of public health significance since inadequate water pressure in the lines can allow a back-flow of contaminated water into the potable water line. In cases where water lines and sewer lines are located in the same ditch or very close, as has been found in Cisco, the potential of disease transmission becomes much greater.

Until such time that permanent corrections can be made to improve the water quality, production, and distribution, the following immediate actions should be considered:

- 1. A thorough check should be made of the system to determine that there are no valves closed which would restrict the flow of water in the system.
- 2. During times of high water use and pressure problem, after usage by high volume consumers should be restricted. Las would include a decrease in watering of park , cometeries, football ticlus, golf courses, or other such activities.
- 3. Rationing of residential customers as necessary and in indicated to prevent the occurrence of law or no pressure.

At the time of the inspection, low water pressure could not in confirmed; however, reports from various sources indicate that the problem is erratic and seems to occur most often after 5:00 P.M. Any difficulties of which the City is aware should be corrected as soon as possible, or if such that immediate correction is not possible, these should be brought to the attention of the City's consulting engineers for inclusion in the study of the water system.

The Cisco City Council set a date for a special called meeting to canvass the results of the upcoming election of April 3rd, which will have the places of two council members on the ballots along with a water and sewer improvement bond issue. The council set Tuesday, April 6, at 7 p.m. for the

canvassing. A discussion of proposed new water and sewer rates resulting from the Waterworks and Sewer System Improvements Bond Issue were discussed at the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday night. Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie said the discussion was added to the agenda following a town hall type meeting Monday in the Cisco High School auditorium.

Mayor Ritchie stated that after more investigation, the proposed water rates (if the bond issue passes) may be higher than hoped. The newly proposed rates would have a \$6.50 increase in the minimum water bill, from \$5.50 a month to \$12.00.

Council Member Brad Kimbrough stressed that the rates could still "fluctuate either way due to interest rates." He said a change in the standard rate of interest on loans between now and the time the bonds are sold could change the rates, either higher or lower.

City manager Michael Moore agreed the proposal rates are based upon current applications using the existing interest rates.

Mayor Ritchie stressed that he hopes for a good turnout of voters on April 3rd to let the council members know what the citizens want for their town. He also said citizens will be able to vote on the three items separately and if they were to pass, the new rates will not come into effect until the bonds are sold.

In other action at the meeting, recommendations by the city manager for the administrative operations and procedures of the municipal swimming pool were approved. Council member Linton Batteas made the motion to accept the recommendations and council member Kimbrough seconded the motion. Council members Batteas, Kimbrough and Ivan Webb voted for the motion, while Bobby Ingram voted against and Robert Rains and Loyal Lundstrom abstained. Mayor Ritchie cast the

Under the city manager's recommendations, the pool will open on the Saturday of the Memorial Day weekend and close for the season on Labor Day. The normal hours of operation will be from 1:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m., Tuesday through Sunday. The pool will be closed on Mondays.

The admission rates to the pool will be \$1.00 per person, with seasonal family passes available for sell through the Water Billing Office in City Hall. Upon purchase, a seasonal family pass will be issued listing the name of each family member covered by the pass. Rates for the passes will be as follows: one member-\$45.00, two members-\$50.00, three members--\$55.00, four members--\$60.00, five members--\$65.00, members--\$70.00, and a charge of \$5.00 per person over six members.

Private parties may be held with approval by the city manager, but they will be restricted from 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., with no more than 20 guests. The rates for private parties will be as follows: one to ten guests-\$25.00 per hour; 11 to 20 guests-\$35.00 per hour.

City manager Moore also said Shirley Darr of Cisco has been named as the pool manager for the summer of

The council approved a motion to allow Stanson Oil Company to purchase a drilling permit for a well located inside the city limits. Ruby Pirtle was present for Stanson Oil and stated when the well was staked, they thought it was out of the city limits. She had a check for \$125 which she paid to the city manager at the meeting for the permit. Council member Lundstrom made the motion to approve the permit and Ingram seconded the motion. All members voted in favor.

City manager Moore also asked the council for permission to get together with City Attorney Billy Wright and amend the present oil and

gas ordinance of the city and bring it up to present standards. Mayor Ritchie gave Mr. Moore permission to "go ahead and proceed."

The council unanimously accepted the second reading of an ordinance "establishing the hours of operation of the city sanitary landfill; establishing user fees for the landfill; prohibiting scavenging; establishing a penalty; and establishing an effective date."

City manager Moore said the ordinance would go into effect with the opening of the new landfill around the first of April. The hours of operation for the landfill to be open to the general public will be from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.. Monday, Thursday and Saturday. The ordinance also states the city manager will be authorized to revise the hours the landfill is open to the public to accomodate a later hours usage of the landfill during Daylight Savings

The ordinance states, "Any citizen of Cisco or City sanitation customer may use the landfill free of charge during the hours the landfill is open to the public by the presentation to the gatekeeper the water bill stub from the previous month indicating a sanitation charge and a valid driver's license.

ed widening of Avenue D from 12th Street to Interstate-20 was tabled by the council since the State Highway Department's representative was unable to

attend Tuesday's meeting. Billy Reynolds presented a petition to the council signed by more than 50 property owners who live along Avenue D in the area for discussion. The petition stated the owners were opposed to the widening of the street due to the closeness to their homes and businesses for safety and also for the intolerable noise which will

decrease property values. The discussion will be placed back on the agenda for April 13th.

City manager Moore gave a financial report to the council in which he stated the city had completed 42 per cent of its fiscal year at the end of February and he stated the total expenditures thus far are "not too bad." Mayor Ritchie commended the city staff and city manager on the efficiency of the financial report.

In his city manager's report, Mr. Moore said he plans to buy asphalt and put city crews to work patching potholes in city streets when the weather is cooperative.

Mayor Ritchie and all council members were present for the regular meeting.

Dear Mr. Moore:

Your letter of November 9, 1981 addressed to Stanley Thompson, P.E., our Regional Engineer in Abilene has been referred to this office for reply. We are very pleased that the City of Cisco has decided to actively seek funds for upgrading its water supply facilities. Please be assured of our support in this endeavor.

In response to your questions, the City of Cisco's water treatment facilities are grossly inadequate. As you are aware, at the present time the Cisco Water Treatment Plant consists only of a sedimentation basin with pre and post chlorination. This makes the City of Cisco the only municipal supply in the state which provides unfiltered surface water to its customers. This is, as you know, a direct violation of Article 4477-1 of the Texas Civil Statutes. This has also resulted in the City consistently violating the turbidity standard established by the Department's Drinking Water Standards. While there are other systems of comparable size in your immediate area which have major problems with their water treatment facilities, they are all capable of filtering their surface water supplies.

The City of Cisco has been fortunate that no incidence of water borne disease has been noted in the City, because while chlorination is most effective in reducing bacteriological contamination, it is ineffective for cyst removal.

Were it not for the limited financial ability of the City of Cisco, this Department would have instituted legal action to force the City of Cisco to comply with the law.


The sewer lines are grossly overloaded, especially the main line down 8th street causing flooded sewer water to be in people's yards and houses, causing untold damage and creating health hazards.

I will not take time or space to comment on the water system, as it has been discussed to the point that everyone knows it needs to be upgraded the same as the sewer plant and lines.



Former Mayors Are **Divided About Issues**

Two of Cisco's former mayors have announced support of the three bond issue proposals on the April 3 election ballot, and two have made public statements in opposition to the proposals.

Former mayors Fry and Brown have expressed support of the current City Council in their endeavors to promote the upgrading of the city's water and sewer treatment facilities, and they have urged citizens to vote for all of the propositions. They have listed reasons such as health factors, possible availability of state and federal assistance, and community pride as some of their considerations. They've also stated that we cannot afford to wait any longer to upgrade the city's utility facilities.

Cisco's citizens can handle the economic burden that the increased rates will mean to local families' already strained finances as a major factor in their opposition. Mr. Webb also feels that the proposed systems are too large and costly, and Mr. Cartee has asked the City Council to offer other alternatives, and to wait until after the May revelations of the city's property reevaluations before asking voters to approve long-range indebtedness.

Current mayor Eris Ritchie has been very active during the past few weeks in making speaking appearances and public statements in support of the proposals. Mayor Ritchie, however, has stated that he simply wants the people of Cisco to let the City Council know what their desires are regarding the three issues, and he says that the council will accept the decision of the voters. But he has urged a large turn-out on election day so that the true wishes of the majority of citizens will

Local Doctors and Health Service Professionals Endorse Bond Issue

Cisco's two doctors as well as all the other major health service professionals of the city are unanimously endorsing the three bond issue prothe April 3 election.

Doctors Ayres Cermin and E.E. Addy, Jr., were among several of the members of the Eastland County Medical Society submitting a prepared statement urging Cisco citizens to vote for all three propositions. Their endorsement appeared in a recent Cisco Press. The doctors cited the health problems of Cisco's water and wastewater treatment systems as reasons for their

unqualified support. Helen Orr, administrator of the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital, is publicly backing the three propositions, as is the hospital's Director of Nursing, Kay Mosley, R.N. Mrs.

Orr's letter of support appears in the Letters to the Editor section of today's Suzette Hendry, ad-

sing Center, has announced her support of all issues in the election, and her Director of Nursing, Donna Campbell, has done so likewise. All four of Cisco's phar-

"In regard to sewer increases, we are now anticipating a 50% increase in the rate per customer-from \$4.00 to \$6.00 per month per tap. We also anticipate continuing to allow citizens over 65 a slight discount on sewer bills, so their new rate would be \$4.50 per tap. This would provide the revenue for the new sewer outfall line. If the \$300,000 issue for our part of a 75% federal-25% local EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) grant program is approved, then when and if the federal government funds the program-which could be no earlier than 1983 or 1984-sewer rates would at the time the project begins again be increased by about \$2.25 per tap to cover our 25% of the total project. But any chance of our getting EPA grant funds for the new sewer plant would be pretty well voided unless the sewer plant issue passes." 'We are doing our best to

present the situation as accurately as we can, so that our citizens can know what to expect if these propositions pass on April 3. Any underestimates we have made previously were made honestly at the-time according to the best figures we had available to us then. But the proposed creases that you now see in black and white are those that are going on our applications to the TDWR and FHA, and we want everyone to be fully aware of them. The figures simply represent the best projections that can be made by our engineers and financial consultant."

Mayor Ritchie concluded, "We have people who are good civic-minded citizens who are opposed to the programs, including two former mayors, and we certainly will have no falling out with them because of their opinions. They honestly feel that our citizens cannot afford these kinds of increases in their personal budgets. Our differing view with them is that we feel that we simply can't afford NOT to do it now, before any more time elapses, or before legal action is instituted against us by governmental agencies. But we most definitely want all opinions heard, and we hope the matters will be discussed thoroughly-both pro and con-between now and April 3, so that the voters can render their decision after being as fully informed as possible.

"I urge every eligible voter to study these issues and be sure to go to the polls on April 3. We hope that this election will have the largest turnout of voters for a local election in Cisco's history, so that we can get a true measurement of what our citizens want."

This week marks the 1982 National Poison Week. The theme for this year observance is "Children Act Fast...So Do Poisons."

To prevent poisoning accidents, we all need to practice safety rules in our homes.

Adult carelessness is usually a direct cause of acpoisonings. cidental Poisonous household plants cause the greatest number of poisonings. child Detergents, cleaners, and soaps rank second. Vitamin and mineral preparations rank third. Until the 1970's, aspirin was the substance most commonly involved in poisonings of young children. However, since safety closures were put in use, deaths of young children from aspirin ingestion have decreased 76 percent.

Parents and grandparents might use the following check-list to poison proof their homes.

Keep all household products and medicines out of the reach of children and preferably, locked up when not in use.

When these products are in use, never let them out of your sight-even if you must answer the telephone or doorbell. Take them with you!

Store internal medicines separately from other

household products. Keep items in their original containers.

Leave the original labels on all products, and read the label before using.

Always leave the light on when giving or taking medicines.

Avoid taking medicines in front of children since youngsters tend to imitate

Refer to medicines as "medicine" and not as "candy"

Clean out the medicine cabinet periodically, and dispose of unneeded medicines when the illness for which they were prescribed is over.

Use safety packaging properly - by closing the container securely after use. Is your home poison-

proof? If it's not, someone may get hurt. Take time to poison-proof your home

CUTWORMS

This is the time of year to start preparing and planting vegetable gardens. One of the problems which a gardener may encounter during the early part of the season is cutworms. Cutworms are larval forms which develop into a variety of moths

Cutworm larvae usually appear as dingy, grayishblack smooth worms that curl into a ball or tight 'C-shape" when disturbed. The larvae have chewing mouth parts and damage plants by their feeding activity.

Cutworms attack almost every garden vegetable, fruit tree, lawn grass and ornamental plant in the home garden and landscape. Seedling plants are particularly vulnerable to cutworms since the main stem is tender and can be easily

Extension Homemaker program on 'Closet Clutter vs Clever Cleanups" will be presented to cub program leaders on Tuesday, March 30th at 2:00 p.m. in the Extension Service offices announces Mrs. Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent.

The program will include creative ways to organize clothing and accessories for closets that homemakers can make.

Cutworms spend most of their time below the soil surface and emerge at night to cut off tender seedlings soon after they reach the surface. The damage normally occurs in concentrated areas

causing patches in lawns and

Cutworm control techniques include many cultural practices. Gardens should be turned under and kept weedfree during the off season. Because cutworms seek hiding places during the day, one may take advantage of this by placing boards in the garden as traps. Cutworms congregate beneath the boards and can be easily

destroyed by hand. They can also be reduced by searching them out at night by flashlight and crushing them. Safety to seedlings may be provided by placing a can with both ends cut over the plant.

Soils infested with cutworms can be treated with Diazinon[®] prior to planting seeds or transplants in the garden or flower bed. However, worm control in established vegetable and flower gardens and in lawns is another matter. Application rates vary according to the type of plants and species of cutworms. Insecticides recommended for control of cutworms in established situations include Sevin*, Diazinon* and Dylox* . However, one should always refer to the label to be sure of recommended rates for specific pests on specific plants.

For additional information on controlling cutworms and other pest, contact your County Extension Office.





CAPITOL **UPDATE**

Americans are by nature an open people. This trait is reflected in the way we conduct our national business. Our national policies -- even regarding the military -- are openly pronounced and vigorously debated.

Yet, there are obvious areas in which our national security depends on secrecy. One of these is convert intelligence activities. If we could depend on every nation in the world to act honorably and in the open in every circumstance, we would not need intelligence agents. But we do not live in that sort of world. We must guard against covert actions by potential adversaries which would threaten our interests throughout the world.

In order to insure our ability to protect ourselves from these potential threats, we depend on courageous Americans who go abroad to perform dangerous informationgathering tasks. The ability to do this without detection not only is essential if they are to be effective, but also is necessary to protect their lives.

In 1975, Richard Welch, then the CIA's station chief in Athens, was assassinated within a month of the disclosure of his covert function in the Greek press. That information came directly from former CIA agent Philip Agee's "Counterspy" Magazine. Agee and others who engage in revealing agents' names are trying to undermine our intelligence system. To say they are behaving in an unpatriotic fashion is a gross understatement.

In another case, 15 CIA agents in Jamaica were publicly identified. The residence of one was attacked with

submachine guns and explosives. Fortunately, no lives were lost in this case, but several agents and their families had to be evacuated.

The Intelligence Identities Protection Act, now before the Congress, would provide legal remedy against those in the ghoulish business of endangering our agent' lives and jeopardizing our national security.

As amended in the House, the bill would allow prosecution in cases in which there is a "pattern of activities" intended to identify and expose covert agents, with "reason to believe" that such activities would impair or impede the foreign intelligence activities of the United

This standard insures that only those individuals who deliberately set out to identify our covert agents could be prosecuted. There is no danger to the First Amendment right to a free press, a right which we all cherish.

Nothing in this legislation inhibits the revelation of # intelligence abuses or calls for reform. In fact, in 1975, a 🎎 Senate Committee conducted an exhaustive investigation of CIA activities without ever identifying a single agent.

It is incomprehensive to me, and to our agents M. abroad, that these brave individuals' lives and the lives of their families should be jeopardized by other Americans who remain safe from prosecution.


If we are willing to tolerate casual or malicious interference with our intelligence services, we will be admitting that we are helpless to conduct an effective foreign intelligence system in this dangerous world. We cannot afford to drop this responsibility. Thus, we must XX enact this necessary legislation.


