ARE YOU registered to vote?

If you are not registered now, forget about voting in the important city and school elections of April 3, BUT there's still time if you want to vote in the May 1 Primary.

If you don't have the new orange voter registration

card in hand, you'd better go directly to County Tax Assessor-Collector Nancy Trout's office (west end, first floor Courthouse in Eastland) and

Governor Clements told the members of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers he will recommend salary hikes to raise the pay of Texas teachers above the national average during the next biennium.

At the same meeting a group of teachers "handed Governor Clements a failing grade for his work in public education and announced formation of a Teachers for Temple (Buddy) Committee."

THREE DEMOCRATS and a Republican are filed as candidates in the contest for State Representative, District 65, into which Cisco has been "re-districted."

Filed are John Lee Blagg of Brownwood; Lee Haney, also of Brownwood; and Jim Parker of Comanche. The Republican candidate is Gary W. Logan of Brownwood.

The district includes Brown, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, McCulloch and Rannels counties.

District 22 State Senator Bob Glasgow has no Democratic opponent, but is faced with Gary Hagman of Weatherford, a Republican, in the Fall Election.

# People n Things

THOSE OF US who have seen the plans for the Mobley Hilton that is due for restoration here can't be anything but enthusiastic about the project and what it will mean to our community. Certainly, it will be a de luxe tourist attraction.

Cisco has some 33 clubs and organizations that will be able to use two large meeting rooms that are planned in the building. The Mobley Hilton will be a real show place as well as a community center that is needed.

Cisco's interest in the project is evidenced by the fact that a historical association has been formed and has spent a good many thousands of dollars to have our town designated as a historical city. This resulted because of the interest that was generated after the Hilton Foundation purchased the old Mobley, the first of the late hotel magnate's

chain. The First National Bank and the Sunland Insurance Company contributed some \$12,000 to help purchase the building and land back of the Mobley. And this will become the flower garden of the restored Mobley Hilton.

The Chamber of Commerce has an active committee ready to cooperate in any way. They're working on getting Cisco and the Mobley Hilton included on the well advertised Texas Trails tours that the Texas Highway Department encourages. The city has renamed Avenue D as Conrad Hilton Avenue.

Mayor Eris Ritchie was informed recently by UofHouston officials that the Mobley restoration project was off the ground and that contractors were studying plans to submit bids.

SATURDAY IS an important election day in our town. Voters will decide whether they will undertake a water and sewer bond issue, elect city councilmen, college regents, school trustee and hospital board directors.

A big majority of our people appear convinced that water and sewer improvements are needed, and we feel that the bond issue will carry by a substantial margin. Certainly, our community's water and sewer systems need updating after more than 50 years.

The opposition we've heard included a circular (memographed) that you would have to classify as anonymous since the name signed to it doesn't belong to a Cisco taxpayer or a person who has a utility meter. And you can't dignify anonymous circulars by quoting or contesting them, even if they're full of mis-statements of fact.

Those who think that the city's needs can be corrected at a fraction of the cost estimates have an obligation

to come forward with facts and information that can be used. We'll bet that the City Council will appreciate such information.

CISCO JUNIOR College had some 14 representatives at a state conference of Student Council people in El Paso last weekend. Mrs. Gus Smothers, director of student life and the CJC council's sponsor, accompanied 13 members of the local group.



This simply means that the committee is trying to draw up "rules of evidence" and put such rules into a code form. Presently, the judges and the lawyers refer to the Texas caselaw (previous appeals court decisions) to determine if particular evidence is admissible.

Proponents of the codification feel that having a rule book on evidence will simplify the rules of evidence and make the rules more understandable for the judges and attorneys involved. They feel that this will help prevent errors in

evidence rulings which often result in costly and time-consuming appeals. These appeals, in turn, further clog our court system.

The Federal court system and many states use codified rules of evidence. The proposed draft follows the format of the Federal Code while retaining the Texas rules of evidence.

The committee is composed of legislators, appeals and district court judges, prosecutors, plaintiff's attorneys and defense attorneys. Serving on the committee in my area are attorney Rusty Duncan of Denton, Judge Charles Murray of Fort Worth, District attorney Tim Curry of Fort Worth and myself. The committee has been meeting for the last several months and are trying to have a draft of proposed rules ready by the State Bar Convention scheduled for June 29 through July 2, 1982.

The proposed draft will also be appearing in the May and June issues of the Texas Bar Journal.

There is expected to be extended debate on both the merits of the proposed rules and their merits of whether or not we should codify the rules of evidence. In the pro-

posed draft, the committee is attempting as much as possible to stay away from making any changes in the substantive rules and just merely codify the existing Texas rules as our courts interpret them.





## Homestead benefits available to those over-65 until closing time April 1

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their School District Homestead Exemption in 1979 have until April 1, 1982 to still sign up. In this way, Over-65 homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 Homestead exemption given by the School Districts of the State.

According to House Bill 885 which was passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, Over-65 homeowners who qualified for the school homestead "Tax Freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the Chief Appraiser of

the County Appraisal District in which the home is located.

This application must be made with the Chief Appraiser of the Eastland County Appraisal District before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979, a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years of age or older
- Own his or her home
- Use that home as his or her Principal Residence

The Chief Appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the Chief

Appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the Over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.

For information and application forms, you may contact the Eastland County Appraisal District office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse. The mailing address is P.O. Box 914, Eastland, Texas 76448 and the telephone number to call is 629-8597.

Therefore, this office acted to assist with each complaint on an individual basis. We respond to over

5,000 individual complaints each year and are usually able to resolve the problem to the satisfaction of the customer."



**County Oil Report** Thursday, April 1, 1982

At a location 12 miles northeast of Breckenridge, Timn Oil Company of Denver City has finalized a new oil producer in Stephens County's Hela Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Whitfield, pumping oil at the rate of 38 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for 70,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas per

## CAPITOL UPDATE

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In 1978, when Congress last debated the subject of natural gas price decontrol, artificially low federally imposed prices on interstate gas had caused critical supply disruptions. Texans, whose gas came from the unregulated intrastate market, were paying several times more for their own supplies than out-of-state consumers.

The "compromise" solution adopted was the Natural Gas Policy Act, which provided for partial lifting of controls over a six-year period ending in 1985. Some of us warned then that this legislation contained serious defects, and could lead to further problems in future years. These prophesies have been fulfilled.

Let us for a moment look at some of the major problems we face, so that we can then see a logical solution to them.

The price levels set for the gradual decontrol of prices for some categories of gas were premised on the assumption that crude oil would cost approximately \$15 a barrel in 1984. Of course oil is now selling at more than \$30 a barrel. This means that when the controls expire in 1985, and the price rises to an actual but equivalent market price, we will see a drastic, traumatic rise in the cost of natural gas to business and individual consumers.

Secondly, we now are seeing distortions in supplies. The effect of partial deregulation already in place has been to give pipeline companies with large reserves of cheap, regulated gas an advantage in competing for expensive, uncontrolled "new" gas. They are able to bid at prices above the market value because they can average the cost of the new and old gas and sell at a competitive level. Companies without access to these artificially cheap supplies are not able to compete for these new reserves.

Since most intrastate pipelines do not control cheap, regulated gas, Texas and other producing states already are beginning to experience shortages. We cannot be expected to watch our resources being pumped to other states in vast quantities while we are unable to obtain sufficient amounts for our own needs.

Phased-in, complete decontrol of gas prices would solve these supply problems; allow the increased cost of gas to be absorbed by the economy and individual consumers gradually, and set us on a course of realistic, efficient use of our gas resources. Studies indicate that the longterm price to consumers will not be significantly greater with complete decontrol than with the currently scheduled partial decontrol. Further, with gradual decontrol, consumers will not face the burden of supply shortages ending in an abrupt price increase.

The President shares these views, but has concluded that this Congress is unlikely to act favorably on the issue. For that reason, he has decided not to press for action this year. I am extremely disappointed in this decision, though I understand the reasons for it. However, I will continue to urge the Administration to work to develop and prepare a feasible decontrol plan for submission to Congress as soon as is practical.

# Care Is The Concern At Cisco Nursing Center

Care is the concern at Cisco Nursing Center. This is evident as one walks through the 106-bed facility located at 1404 Front Street, Cisco.

Begun in 1962 under the name of Green Acres, Cisco Nursing Center is currently under the management of Mrs. Suzette Hendry, local administrator. Mrs. Hendry came to her position here in January, 1982, after five years of experience as assistant administrator of Ballinger Nursing Center.

"Nursing homes are necessary," says Mrs. Hendry. "Increased longevity and the problems of failing health that accompany this longer life expectancy demand this service."

Mrs. Hendry speaks with animation and authority. She secured her professional training at Incarnate Word, San Antonio, specializing in long-term health care. She later completed a 200-hour course sponsored by the Texas Nursing Home Association at Austin.

"Nursing care is the responsibility of the professional staff," Mrs. Hendry affirms, "but for these homes to be functional, residents need family support, volunteer services, and community identification. These contacts help meet their total social, emotional and spiritual needs."

"We are proud of our present staff of nurses and aides," Mrs. Hendry asserts. Heading the staff is Director of Nurses, Mrs. Donna Campbell. Mrs. Campbell comes to Cisco Nursing Center with seven years experience as a Licensed Vocational Nurse, the last four of

those in the position of Director of Nurses at Ballinger Nursing Center. She received her professional training from the San Angelo School of Vocational Nursing, a school now incorporated with Howard Payne University.

"All Mrs. Campbell's personal references come from the State Health Inspectors, and we feel fortunate to have a director of nurses with such excellent nursing care ratings," Mrs. Hendry remarks. Deliberate and quiet in her actions, Mrs. Campbell evidences her dedication when she invites response from families of the residents. "Families should feel free to contact me at any time and especially for emergencies," she promises.

In addition to a local competent nursing staff, Cisco Nursing Center receives professional reinforcement from R.P. Tanis and Association. This company provides a registered nurse who consults weekly with Mrs. Campbell. R.P. Tanis also conducts a bi-weekly state-approved training program for local nursing aides and dietary assistants.

Lloyd McGrew, Cisco pharmacist, spends six hours monthly reviewing the individual patient's drug regimen. He also checks to see that Cisco Nursing Center complies with all state and federal pharmaceutical regulations.

Assistant administrator Diane Wheeler, wife of the Rev. Steve Wheeler, has been employed at Cisco Nursing Center for three years. Families of residents are all acquainted with Diane and

her smiling face, for her office is the place where the monthly "payoff" takes place for resident care.

"I like my varied job of bookkeeping, admissions clerk, and acting administrator in Suzette's absence," Diane enthusiastically declares. "I find my job fulfilling. The residents are appreciative of a friendly touch, a word of encouragement, and any assistance that I can give them. I meet a constant misconception on the part of family and friends that a nursing home is depressing. A fear of nursing homes," Diane continues, "is dispelled when visitors come to see that this is a place of activity and sharing. We do not have visiting hours. Come to see us any time," Diane encourages.

In keeping with the concept of total care for the residents, Social Activities Director and Consultant, Mrs. Mae Green, supervises a varied program. Mrs. Green works closely with the Resident Council and its president, Mr. Henry Pence. The Resident Council is a representative voice for the people living in the home. Through this body questions are asked, problems are discussed, and goals are achieved.

The front yard patio of the Nursing Home is a result of the planning and vision of this Resident Council. The Volunteer Council, made up of interested citizens of the community and family members of the residents, worked with the Resident Council to achieve this goal. A bazaar, a bake sale, and a book sale were money-

making projects to establish funds. The Cisco Rotary Club gave a \$200.00 donation. Mr. Voy Wilks, a volunteer, built the forms for the foundation, and the dream of a patio became a reality when the cement was poured in May of 1980. Residents can be seen outside enjoying this patio in any suitable weather.

Mrs. Green works directly with the Volunteer Council which was organized three years ago. Christine Reich serves as president. "Without the faithful help of such volunteers as Vena Hart, Betty Cook, Eva Humphreys, Mildred Geist, Donald Rhyne, Voy Wilks and others, many projects could not have succeeded," Mrs. Green observes. The Volunteer Council annually supports the Easter Egg Hunt for the Day Care Center held on the Nursing Home grounds. They are involved in the Home's entry in the Folk-life Festival Parade, the Jerry Lewis Telethon, special anniversary celebrations for residents, and the annual Christmas Open House.

In addition to her work with the Resident and Volunteer Councils, Mrs. Green supervises the schedule of activities for the week for the residents. Mrs. Betty Hastings conducts a Bible study each Monday morning. Mrs. Eva Humphreys and Mrs. Doug Fry escort residents to the Cisco Junior College Cosmetology School each Tuesday for complimentary hairdressing.

Church services include a regular Wednesday morning worship conducted by the Rev. Dell Crockett of Redeemer Lutheran, a Thursday morning worship led by Mrs. Millard Slaughter, and a regular Sunday afternoon service conducted by the different Cisco ministers.

"I could not begin to thank all the people of Cisco who have done so much to keep 'our people' here in the home reminded that they are not forgotten," Mrs. Green commented. "School groups, church groups, and clubs—especially the Pleasant Hill Homemakers—have all enriched the lives of those who live here."

Crafts and exercise classes are part of the regular program Mrs. Green supervises. Senior Citizen luncheons and Friday shopping days are special favorites of the residents. Other treats include the Wilks Family Singing Group, the Monday Night Quartet, and Roland Smith

and his Sandy Land Band.

"My job as Activities Director is a lot of work," Mrs. Green admits. "It takes time and patience, but I enjoy seeing the residents responding to the family atmosphere of shared services and group activities."

Much of the trim look of the Cisco Nursing Home can be credited to Mrs. Nadine Stephan, head housekeeper, and her staff of three assistants. An employee for eleven years, Nadine admits, "My work is tiring but rewarding. Families of the residents are appreciative of anything my staff can do to make living facilities as homelike as possible." The installation of laundry in the Home has done much to expedite the return of laundry to the residents.

"We have not yet met our goal of a full-bed capacity, and we have many improvements we hope to make," Mrs. Hendry acknowledges. "But we are grateful for the cordial response we have received, and the excellent support of the working staff."

According to Mrs. Hendry, some of those improvements consist of the purchase of geriatric chairs which provide both security and mobility for residents who need extra support, and the installation of bubble type air mattresses to prevent pressure sores. Mrs. Hendry also stated that she is considering the purchase of a kidney-shaped table to accommodate residents normally confined to their rooms for meals. A group of six may eat together unhurriedly under the supervision of an aide in a family atmosphere because of the specially shaped table.

"I would like to invite all interested persons to our Family Night gatherings the second Thursday of each month," Mrs. Hendry reminds. "Join us for refreshments and fellowship on this regular date for sharing," urges Mrs. Hendry.

## Letters to the Editor

Citizens of Cisco,

The purpose of a letter to the editor is to express an opinion or thoughts on a given subject. Our sincere opinion and thoughts on the three propositions that will be voted on in the Saturday, April 3, election are as follows.

The question that will be answered in the election is not whether the water and sewer systems of Cisco are unsanitary and a health hazard. Consider that:

1. Lake Cisco is the city water supply. Any contamination on the lake's watershed is carried into the lake -- dead, diseased animals, herbicides/insecticides used in spraying pastures/fields, and leakage from septic tanks around the lake. This water is used by the city without filtration; chemical treatment is the only method that is and can be used by the city at the present time. This is ineffective in preventing many water borne diseases and certainly does not properly clean the water.

2. The city very often has low water pressure. In many areas of the city, water and

sewer lines are in the same ditch. Under the right conditions of water line surge and back pressure coupled with water and sewer line leaks, raw sewage can be pulled or drawn into the water lines and system. Cisco has water line surge, back pressure, and line leaks often.

3. On a regular basis, raw sewage backs up into alleys, yards, and homes because of overload of the system in certain parts of the city. It also overflows the manholes into the streets and water ditches of the city; most of the overflow excess is carried out of town in a small creek running past the elementary school.

4. On a regular basis, sewage is dumped onto the area watershed because the sewage treatment plant cannot handle the volume. Chemical treatment is used by the city but is not treatment enough to meet water safety and sanitary standards.

Without a doubt, the water and sewer systems of Cisco are unsanitary, filthy, and a health hazard.

The question that will be answered in the election is

whether the citizens of Cisco are going to vote to make necessary improvements, or whether they will vote to continue to live (force others to live) in these unsafe conditions.

Because of the above noted conditions, we are going to vote FOR all three propositions, and we urge all other citizens to seriously consider voting FOR them. John and Katherine Muller
