



City Councilmen Loyal Lundstrom and Bobby Rains were sworn in for new threeyear terms of office after results of the April 3rd city election were canvassed and certified at a special meeting of the Council last Tuesday night.

The two councilmen, who were unopposed for reelection, were given the oath of office by Mayor Eris Ritchie. They received 937 and 952 votes, respectively, in the voting

The Council also canvassed results of the bond issue propositions and certified the approval by the voters of the three items - 692 for and 344 against issuance of \$1,450,000 for a new water filter plant and system improvements, 682 for and 357 against \$300,000 for a new sewer and waste water facility, and 682 for and 394 against \$175,000 for a new sewer main line system.

Mayor Ritchie reiterated a

statement that the Council would proceed with caution. "We are pleased with the results of the election - the approval of this important matter by a good majority,' the mayor said. "We realize fully the urgency for improvements and the need to proceed with caution. We will insist on quality work at

the best prices." Mr. Lundstrom, in a brief statement, said he was grateful for the support of Cisco citizens. Mr. Rains noted that "we have a big job ahead, and we will work hard to do it right."

The Council gave Election Judge Doug Fry, who attended the meeting and presented the returns for canvass, a vote of appreciation, noting that he has been helping with elections here for a good many years. He said a total of 1,042 votes were cast in the election.

Band Receives Superior U.I.L. Rating

Cisco High School's Lobo Band, directed by Alvin Young, received superior ratings and a special award in concert and sight-reading contest Tuesday in Stephenville. The event was the regional University Interscholastic League (U.I.L.) contest.

The Lobo band was rated superior unanimously by six different judges, three judges for concert and three for sight-reading. Cisco received the highest rating of any AA band at Tuesday's

Tuesday's award was the highest U.I.L. rating received by a Cisco High School band since 1971. The 1971 high school band was directed by Lynn Low and received a Sweepstakes award, scoring superior ratings in concert, sightreading and marching contests that year.

This year's band missed out on a sweepstakes award by receiving an excellent or II rating in marching contest earlier in the school year. However, it was the only band in Eastland County to receive a first division rating in concert and sight-reading Tuesday in Stephenville.

The only band in the region which scored higher than Cisco was Brownwood High School which had three first division ratings (one in concert, sight-reading and marching contests). Other bands to score first division ratings at Tuesday's contest were Stephenville Junior High and Stephenville High School.

Superintendent James Couch attended the Tuesday performance and said, 'They sounded terrific. They played perfectly. It just great." Carolyn Sipe of Cisco also attended

the performance and was quoted as saying, "It was a stirring performance and I got cold chills listening to (the band)." Cisco Mayor Eris Ritchie sent a letter of congratula-

tions to Director Young and the Lobo band. He congratulated them on winning their Superior ratings and said he knows of the effort involved. He also commended them on their performance, stating, "The band is a year around representative of the school and community."

Some of the comments made by the judges of the concert contest were as follows: James Streit of Quanah said, "You have a fine band. You and your director are to be congratulated on a fine performance." Gerald Smith of Panhandle stated, "Band gets some very good ensemble sounds. Good training and teaching going on here.

Congratulations!" Comments from sightreading judges were: "A most enjoyable performance. I enjoyed hearing you. A lot of good teaching and learning is taking place. Keep up the good work and good luck in the future. Congratulations!"-Greg Miller of Iowa Park.

"It was nice to hear an aggressive sight reading by people who were not afraid of the notes. Nice job. Congrats!"-Norman Deisher of Mineral Wells.

"This band plays very musically - good phrasing, good intonation for the most part. Some minor problems as sight-reading always presents, but over all a very fine job. Congratulations to a fine group of young people. You did good!"-Don Theode of Highland Park High School in Dallas.

Bands participating in the contest are rated on their performance and may be awarded any of five division ratings. Those possible ratings are Superior (I), Excellent (II), Average (III), Below Average (IV), and

Poor (V).

Other area bands and their ratings in Tuesday's concert and sight-reading contests were: Eastland, one in concert and two in sightreading; Ranger, three in concert and two in sightreading; Rising Star, three in concert and four in sightreading; DeLeon, two in concert and two in sightreading; Dublin, two in concert and one in sightreading; and Goldthwaite, one in concert and two in sight-reading.



Inspected By SHD The city's new landfill area, which was opened for use by sanitation crews and the public last Monday, has been inspected by the State Department of Health and approved, according to City Manager Mike Moore.

New Landfill Area

State inspectors were pleased with the landfill project, noting that it complies fully with state laws, Mr. Moore said. The new landfill was provided for by a city ordinance adopted by City Council recently.

Mr. Moore said there had been a few cases of people refusing to abide by provisions of the landfill ordinance, dumping trash and debris outside the area.

"We will make every effort to learn the identity of violators of the ordinance and will prosecute them," Mr. Moore said. Under the ordinance, violators are subject to paying a fine.

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

SUBTERRANEAN TER-MITES

Spring is the time of year when homeowners are most likely to encounter termites. Subterranean or groundnesting are by far the most important destructive insect pests of wood.

Termites are found throughout the United States, but are most active and destructive in the temperature parts of the country. Termite damage results in millions of dollars

Subterranean termites are social insects that live in colonies or nests in the ground. Each colony is composed of three forms - reproductives, workers and soldiers.

It is the reproductive or winged forms which are most commonly encountered by the homeowner. This is often the first indication of a termite colony. Flights or swarms of the winged termites occur most frequently after the first warm days of

spring, often following a warm rain. However, they may occur at any time during the spring or summer.

These winged reproductives are formed in well developed colonies. The winged forms mate and return to the soil to find a suitable site for establishing a new colony. Most of these perish, but some pairs do survive to begin new col-

Most termite infestations in buildings occur because wood touches or is close to the ground, particularly porches steps or terraces. Cracks or voids in foundations and concrete floors make it easy for termites to reach wood that does not ac-

tualy touch the soil. The primary form of control is prevention. Prevention begins at the building site. All stumps and wood debris should be removed before and during construction. Burying such material will only contribute to termite infestation. Other control preventative measures include chemical soil treatment prior to construction, proper construction techniques to avoid contact of wooden materials with the soil and proper ventilation beneath buildings.

However, for most homeowners it is too late for pre-constructions prevention. Ridding existing structures of termite infestations is a major problem in termite control. The major principle of preventing termite infestation in existing structures is the same as that in pre-construction eliminate conditions which permit the passage of termites from soil to woodwork of the building.

Buildings should be periodically inspected for evidence of termite attack. This is a good practice and should be done regardless of how completely preventive measures were employed during construction. Sanitation practices such as removal of all wooden materials from underneath and adjacent to buildings and filling cracks and expansion joints in concrete with cement grout.

There are a limited number of chemicals available to the homeowner for controlling termites. However, because of the complexity of application and need for thorough application, it is advisable to obtain the services of a commercial applicator. It is important to hire a reputable applicator, who offers a warranty with his service. For additional information, contact the County Extension



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

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

WW I Veterans Live In County

By Viola Payne It was April, 1918, during World War I. The battlefields of Europe made a strange contrast to the beau-

ty of springtime.

America, too, was at war. In Eastland County 762 young men enlisted, planning to serve their country through any hardships.

When many of them, along with thousands of other American troops, poured across England on their way "to make the world safe for Democracy", King George of England wrote a letter to be delivered to these soldiers. The text read:

Thirty of the men from Eastland County never returned. For them it was the supreme sacrifice, the most any human can give. But fortunately a number of the others returned to Eastland County and were joined by veterans who moved to this area after the war.

There are few World War I Veterans still living among us. All are outstanding citizens, and have great stories to tell.

The newspaper staff has made an effort to locate all these Veterans. If you served in World War I but have not been contacted, please notify one of the County

Bailey, so that you may be properly recognized. Cisco, according to infor-

mation available, has seven WWI veterans, more than any locality in the county. One of these is Luke Pippin, who was a gunner on the U.S.S. Benham, a Navy Destroyer. Part of the job of this ship was to help convoy troopships across the Atlantic. Pippen was on the American Flagship at the surrender of the German

newspapers or Judge Scott

W.L. (Roy) Pippin was the famous 36th Division, Company C., 111th Engineers. This group saw a lot of action in France.

Homer Bible was with another group of Engineers, the 106th Engineers, 31st Division, Company C. He helped build hospitals and storage buildings in France. He says they could hardly build the hospitals fast enough for the casualties.

E.F. (Chief) Bender of Cisco was stationed at Camp Bowie in a Truck Division. The Armistice was signed Nov. 11, 1918, before he could be sent overseas.

Criglar Pascall served as a Military Policeman with the 90th Division during the war. He was stationed in

France, then in Germany after the Armistice.

Gordon Murray was with the 7th Division, 5th U.S. Engineers, Company F. He served overseas, mostly in France.

John Green of Cisco was with the 28th Infantry in France. This group saw some very hard action on the battlefields.

In Eastland there are only two surviving World War I veterans. One of these is Carl Timmons, who enlisted in the Montana National Guard and was placed in the 163rd Montana Regiment when war was declared. Timmons played the trombone for General Pershing's Army Band, but also served in a Casuality Unit in France. He was very happy to play for the ticker-tape Victory March in New York City when the war was over.

During World War I Willie Speaker of Eastland enlisted in the Infantry, and was put in training at Newport News, Va. preparatory to going overseas. Fortuanately the Armistice was signed before his departure.

Ranger also has two WWI veterans, and one of them is George R. Pate. He served in Battery E, 64th Coast artillery. After his stateside training he was sent to France.

Thomas Browning of Ranger was a member of the 36th Division, 111th Ammunition Train, Company F. After training at San Antonio and Camp Bowie, he also was sent to France.

Over in Rising Star there are two more veterans: O.E. (Dutch) Shults, and James R. Hogan. Schults says he had just three months training in Boot Camp when the Armistice was declared and

he was discharged. James Hogan went into service in 1917, and was placed in the 4th Division of the Infantry. He trained in Calvary Drill in N. Carolina and was sent to France. After the Armistice he was stationed in Germany.

Apparently Gorman has only one surviving WWI veteran, George Bennett. Bennett was a Quartermaster Baker at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, during the war. He was attached to the 35th Division. This veteran is presently known in Eastland County as a writer for the Gorman Progress.

This makes a total of 14 Eastland County veterans, 62 years that 1918 springtime in Europe. Our gratitude and high regard is extended to these brave men, who remind us that "Eternal vigilance is the price of liber-



Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

The many studies of the needs of nutrition for the elderly indicate the great needs for fiber.

The refining process removes fiber from foods and one of the important sources of fiber in the diet is bran. Although the role of fiber is not fully known, it can help in avoiding constipation. Too much bran. however, can prevent the body from absorbing some minerals. Therefore, eating whole grain breads and cereals and plenty of vegetables and fruits is a better way to add fiber to the diet than adding bran to cereal or other foods.

Scientists supported by the National Institute on Aging are studying nutrient intake and requirements in the elderly, changes in taste and smell with aging, behavioral aspects of dietary habits, and the influence of nutrition on health in old age. Through such research we hope to gain a better understanding of how diet and the aging process affect one another.
