made. Sheriff Morren testified that LeFlore was advised of his rights by Carleton Holder, Cisco justice of the peace, when the youth was arrested on Jan. 6th in Cisco. LeFlore was held in the county jail from Jan. 6 to Jan. 9 without being charged, the sheriff said. Mr. Morren said he warned LeFlore of his rights each time he

questioned him. Authorities said LeFlore was released Jan. 9 and taken in custody again Jan. 14. At that time, Texas Ranger Gene Kea and Cisco Police Chief Larry Jernigan took LeFlore to Abilene for a polygraph test, and LeFlore was again advised of his rights, Mr. Morren said. The sheriff added that he was present Jan. 18 when LeFlore dictated a confession to Ida Quinn, jail matron and the sheriff's

secretary. Justice Holder testified that he had advised LeFlore of his rights on Jan. 18th when the murder charges were filed.

LeFlore remained in the county jail under \$50,000 bond.

WHEREAS nurses provide care in hospitals, nursing homes, extended care facilities, clinics, rehabilitation hospitals, physicians' offices, private duty nursing, and industrial nursing; WHEREAS nurses' skills and knowledge provide disease and injury prevention, and aim toward restoration of health;

WHEREAS nurses strive to provide comfort, solace, and education to those entrusted to their

WHEREAS nursing is a highly technical, sophisticated, and exacting science; Now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President is authorized and requested to designate May 6, 1982, as "National Recognition Day of Nurses," and to call upon the people of the United States to observe such day with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities. 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

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

All three companies hold royalty interests in the Faske Well in Lee County. The report said that the well is currently producing 190 barrels per day and yielded 105,000 barrels of oil plus 106 million cubic feet of gas in the 18-month period since it

went on production. Richard F. Hare of Fort Worth, president of IRO, was re-elected. Robert Kamon was re-named president of Golden Triangle, and Ivan Webb was re-elected as Black Giant's president. Other officers and directors of the three firms were also

elected. Mr. Webb, reporting to Black Giant stockholders, said his company has added new emphasis to shallow oil production prospects where drilling costs are considerably less than deep holes. BG has acquired interests in 216 acres for shallow pay in Eastland County, and in Indiana where eight wells are projected on 1,600 acres. Another deal pending is a three well program on 8,200 acres in a proven gas area of Pennsylvania, Mr. Webb said. BG is also negotiating for interests in Kansas and

Ohio, he added. Mr. Kamon, who returned April 30th from Australia, reported on activities in

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
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

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

Usually male blooms will appear first on squash and cucumber plants. Male blooms are attached to the plant by a green stem while each female bloom has a small squash or cucumber attached directly behind the

Female squash and cucumber blooms falling off early in a plant's life when male blooms are not present is normal. However, when female and male blooms are both present and female blooms continue to fall off, then there's a pollination problem

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County Extension Office Offers Advice On Crepe Myrtle Shrubs

The crepe myrtle is rapidly becoming the queen of landscaping shrubs in the south. The beauty of this plant can be seen in many places - including old abandoned homesites. Seeing the crepe myrtle still thriving under these neglected conditions says something for its stamina; being able to pull through some of the most

adverse conditions. Many crepe myrtle admirers are curious as to why those plants in the wild, so to speak, are less often attacked by the powdery mildew fungus than those that receive an abundance of TLC.

One explanation of this phenomenon might be the difference in the humidity level surrounding the plants in different locations. Usually crepe myrtle growing in well manicured landscapes are watered and fertilized frequently, thus increasing the humidity and promoting lush tender growth. This is an ideal environment and a perfect food source for the powdery mildew fungus.

Usually mildew is not a serious threat until the flower buds begin to form in late May or early June. It is at this time when the cellular carbohydrate level begins to increase and this is caviar in the mildew diet.

Mildew-infected flower buds are much more deforming and distracting from the plant's beauty than the leaf infection. Consequently, preventive measures should begin just at the first signs of

flower bud formation. Repeated applications at timely intervals will be needed throughout the entire

flowering period. If insects such as aphids or "plant lice" appear during the blooming period, both problems can be taken care of by mixing an insecticide and fungicide.

General use fungicides for preventing mildew on crepe myrtle include: folpet, karathane, actidione PM, funginex and benomyl. These are compatible with insecticides diazinon, malathion, orthene and others

Infected leaves, flower buds and petals drop off and collect around the base of the plants. This serves as the overwintering home for the mildew fungus. These should be raked up and destroyed to help reduce the chances for infection from this source the next growing season.

Mildew on other plants in the landscape, such as roses, euonymus, zinnias and daylilies, is not likely to spread with crepe myrtle. Powdery mildew is host specific and does not usually spread from one type of plant to another.

Feeding crepe myrtle with adequate amounts of phosphorus, the middle number, will help increase its tolerance level. Phosphorus promotes vigor and that is a necessary ingredient for disease prevention.

Vaccinating Adult Herds From Texas Animal Health Commission

AUSTIN-While a calfhood vaccination program is considred sound management practice for brucellosis, the question arises: what about adult vaccination?

"It's a good question, and the answer depends on several factors," Dr. James Alexander, epidemiologist, Texas Animal Health Commission, said recently.

Adult vaccination does have a place, but a producer must consider his own herd situation.

"Adult vaccination may be useful in herds that are chronically infected or where an 'explosive' situation exists; that is, the possibility of an outbreak of brucellosis. This would involve vaccinating all of the females in the herd that are over 12 months of age.

"This is most useful in herds with a low percentage or no vaccination at all. It should also be considered in non-infected herds when there is a high potential for exposure," Dr. Alexander
