Storm Warning Is Sounded Here Last Wednesday

The Cisco Fire Station siren was sounded as a storm warning at 2:20 p.m. Wednesday after two calls came in from oil supply companies with reports of sighting tornadoes (twisters) south of town.

Fire Chief C.W. Guthrie said the storm warning siren consists of a steady 40-second blast, off 20 seconds, another 40-second blast, off 20 seconds, and a final 40-second blast. If a storm actually strikes in the city the siren will be turned on and left on until the situation improves.

Mr. Guthrie asked residents not to telephone the fire station when a storm warning sounds. "We were swamped with calls Wednesday and couldn't have taken an actual fire call," he said.

There were no reports of twisters actually striking the ground south of Cisco. Residents of that area reported high winds, heavy rain and pea size hail in places. Further south and east in Comanche County, heavier hail and winds were reported in places.

This area received between one and two inches of rain to bring the month's total for Cisco to nearly three inches.

High winds at Lake Cisco damaged the boat dock on the south shore, according to reports.

City Council Gets Cemetery Report, Approves Ordinance

The annual report of the Cisco Cemetery Association was accepted, an ordinance raising sewer rates was passed on its second and final reading, and the final report of the municipal airport improvement program was submitted at the semi-monthly meeting of the City Council Tuesday night.

President Anton White of the cemetery association submitted the report that was prepared by Treasurer Trixie Whitley of the operating fund and Treasurer Louise Karkalits

of the trust fund. Mr. White said the trust fund of the perpetual care organization was approaching \$100,000.

The reports showed that the operating fund had receipts of \$16,672 last year, including \$7,200 from the city and \$7,005 from the sale of cemetery lots. Expenses amounted to \$16,483. This included \$2,326 for lawn mower purchases, \$1,735 for plastic pipe, and \$8,750 for labor.

The trust fund statement showed that the association

had Certificates of Deposit totaling \$86,962 at the beginning of the year. The CDs earned \$15,243 during the year. Earnings of the trust fund go into a fund available for cemetery upkeep.

Mr. White said the association's big project last year was replacing some 25,000 feet of pipe in the cemetery water system. This was completed at a total cost of some \$4,600, he added. He said a filing system of names of all persons buried in the cemetery had been completed. The cemetery has

two riding power mowers and four other power mowers. Much of the labor is being donated, Mr. White said.

The Council accepted the report with a vote of appreciation to Mr. White and the association "for a job well done."

The sewer ordinance, passing last month on first reading, became official with the final passage. It raises residential sewer rates from \$4 to \$6 per month (\$2.50 to \$4.50 for senior and disabled citizens), to be effective with the June 1 billing.

The new rates will finance a \$175,000 sewer out-fall line that is designed to relieve congestion in west and north Cisco. Construction work is scheduled to begin in the next few months on the project.

The airport report was a complete statement of cash flow from the day work began May 1, 1979, through April 30, 1982, when the airport project was completed and finally approved by the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

The report showed that the airport project cost a total of about \$129,000 over the three year period. The source of income to defray the cost came from the Texas Aeronautics Commission (over \$110,000), donations by Ciscoans of some \$7,000 and balance in "in-kind" labor by using city equipment when it was not needed elsewhere. No city tax revenues were used on the project, the report showed.

The Council approved two applications for oil well drilling permits by Hanby Drilling Co. of Dallas for projects on the old airport tract. The first well was due to commence drilling almost immediately.

Tony Waits of Lake Leon asked the Council for permission to offer Lake Cisco home owners a trash removal service similar to one he operates at Lake Leon. Customers would pay \$6.50 per month for weekly pick-up. Mr. Waits said he would pay the city for use of the landfill. The Council gave him permission to contact potential customers.

Bill Carr of Lake Cisco appeared before the Council to request a meeting "to see by what authority land was leased for cabin building around the lake." He said he has spent several years researching records and didn't feel that the city has title to land leased for cabin building.

Mayor Eris Ritchie told him to talk with City Manager Mike Moore and City Attorney Bill Wright to determine whether the Council would meet on the subject. Mr. Carr said later that he felt that his family, owners of ranching land in the lake area, should have a royalty from land used for cabins.

The city manager said plans were near completion for the swimming pool to open May 29th. An announcement appears elsewhere concerning the pool.

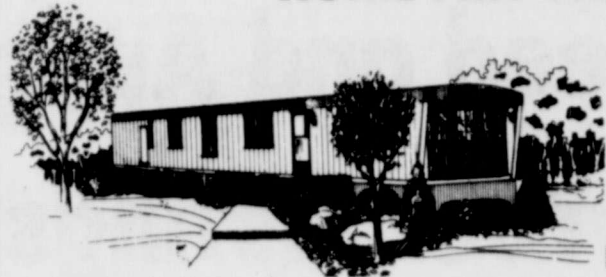

May is "Older Americans Month". Who are the older people in your life? A parent, a neighbor, someone in your church that you see on Sundays, a former teacher? Take time to think about and acknowledge the older people you know during May.

Older American's Month is a time to let the older people in your life know that you care. This can be done with a personal visit, telephone call, a card or letter. In making a personal expression of thanks, you are contributing to that individuals sense that their life has truly had an impact on you.

As we grow older, we wonder about what makes a good, long life. Attitude seems to be one of the key factors that researchers are finding which relates to a successful, long life. More important, than diet or heredity, it is one over which the individual has some control. In a recent study, Dr. George E. Vaillant of Harvard Health service found that between the ages of 48 and 53, the physical health of men who had been rated the "worst adjusted", deteriorated two and one half times more rapidly than that of those who were considered "best adjusted." Dr. Lisa Berkman of the University of California at Berkeley found in her study of the habits of 7,000 people that those who took an active role in socializing were more likely to live longer. Those who remained at home tended to be overweight and to drink and smoke more.

Loneliness has been found to be an aging factor in many studies. A sense of loss manifests itself in many

older people as a continuing emotional difficulty. The loss of a spouse, children, or other relatives and peers; the loss of a job because of mandatory retirement; the loss of a home and neighborhood where one has resided for a lifetime—all these contribute to what is often an overwhelming sense of loss. While most work through the grieving process and are able to find ways of coping, there are others who need assistance.

Therefore, a general sense of well-being has often been linked by researchers to a longer, more enjoyable life. The reduction of stress is considered one of the ways of achieving this and thereby leading to general benefits to one's health. Enjoyment of life at every stage is another factor. One doctor of geriatric medicine noted that all his healthy elderly patients seemed to have one factor in common—a good sense of humor. Looking forward to an active and varied old age often results in a more positive outcome for people as they grow older.

So, during the month of May, let that special older person in your life know you care and appreciate them!!!

TASTY ZUCCHINI CASSEROLE

IMPORTED FIRE ANTS

Imported fire ants have become a tremendous concern to Texas citizens. Reports of suspected imported fire ants are being reported to the County Extension Office more frequently. The relatively mild winters and high humidity of the Texas Gulf Coast has contributed to the success of this insect. Imported fire ants are found in more than 100 counties.

Four species of fire ants are found in Texas. Three are native to the state; the fire ant and the southern fire ant are the most common native species, followed by the rarely seen desert fire ant. The red imported fire ant causes the most concern. This species first appeared in the United States near Mobile, Alabama, about 1940 and has spread over nine states from the Carolinas to Texas. The black imported fire ant was imported around 1918, but it is confined to northeast Mississippi

Hugh C. Mahaffey is among Eastland Co. WWI Vets

More names of World War I veterans are coming in to the Eastland County newspapers. We appreciate the public interest in these people. Several of the veterans are living at Valley View Nursing Home, in Eastland.

Hugh C. Mahaffey, one of the Nursing Home residents, was born in Gonzales County in 1896. His parents brought him to Roby, Fisher County, in Dec. 1900, where they bought land. He lived at Roby until war was declared, in 1917, and then he enlisted in the Army.

Mahaffey was with a group made up at Sweetwater, then placed in Company C, 111th Engineers. He trained at Camp Bowie, and was sent to France in 1918. His job was to help in building and repairing roads in France, especially around the Argonne Forest bat-

tlefield. He still remembers how heavily the roads were shelled in that area.

A big celebration broke out after the Armistice was signed. Several months later, in 1919, Mahaffey was returned to the U.S. and discharged at Mitchell Field, Long Island. His family had moved to Eastland, but his ticket destination read "Sweetwater".

As the T and P train reached the Eastland depot the conductor yelled "Eastland", but said: "You don't get off here!"

"Why not?" asked Mahaffey. "This is where I belong."

"No, you belong in Sweetwater," the conductor argued.

But Mahaffey managed to get off the train, and has made his home in this area ever since. He farmed down in Comanche County in the 1930's, but always came back to Eastland. He married after the war, and raised two daughters and three sons, who all live in nearby towns.

The red imported fire ant spreads naturally through queen flights; however the queens also spread by crawling; drifting downstream on logs; or traveling aboard cars, trucks or trains. Shipments of nursery stock or soil from an infested area may relocate an entire ant colony or nest.

The primary diet of fire ants includes insects, spiders, earthworms and other small invertebrates. They also feed on the carcass of dead animals and are attracted to sugar and honeydew.

Imported fire ants damage young plants by gnawing holes in roots, tubers, stalks and buds. They may attack young, unprotected animals, such as newborn calves and pigs and newly hatched quail and poultry.

Fire ant mounds damage machinery, hinder mowing operations and reduce land value in infested areas. The imported fire ant also is quite annoying to urban residents. These ants invade lawns, parks, playgrounds and golf courses.

The ants, which can sting repeatedly, attack anything that disturbs their mounds. Symptoms of the fire ant sting include burning and itching, often followed by a white sore or pustule that may leave a permanent scar.

Spread of the red imported fire ant is limited only by temperature and moisture. The high temperatures and lack of moisture should halt the natural spread in that direction. However, if it is transported by man, it may be able to establish in watered lawns or irrigated areas.

The red imported fire ant does not hibernate and is susceptible to cold temperatures. The red imported fire ant cannot apparently survive temperatures below 10° F. This would include approximately 2/3 of Texas.

Eastland and Comanche counties fall within this region. However, the local area would be considered marginal due to temperature and moisture requirements. Hopefully, natural limitations on spread of the red imported fire ant will keep them out of this area.

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Highway Fencing For A Hazardous Hill

Because of the multitude of accidents that occurred on a stretch of highway on Interstate 20, 10 miles East of Ranger, Texas, it was decided in 1979 that something needed to be done. A raised concrete median 1½ inches high, with a 3-foot metal guard rail, was the only fence dividing the two lanes of heavy traffic between Dallas and Abilene daily. This 1.09 mile stretch is well known to truckers, and is called (not affectionately) "Ranger Hill."

Harley Fox, Engineer Technician IV, from the Texas Highway Department, Eastland, Texas, said that this section of highway is the only place on Interstate 20 that is considered mountainous. Signs warn trucks to use their lower gears when going down the hill.

"The hill climbs into a severe curve," Mr. Fox said, "and heavy loads have difficulty on good weather days. During an ice or snow storm, the possibility of making it to the other side is almost nil. Pileups during this type weather usually ended in death and destruction of both vehicles and barriers. This was the reason for our decision to change to another type fencing."

The fence proposed for this section needed to be tall enough and strong enough to prevent vehicles from ending up in the land of oncoming traffic. And it needed to be a glare screen fabric, for many accidents had been caused by the glare of headlights suddenly hitting drivers going up the hill and around the curve.

Bids for the project were offered statewide, and Asphalt and Paving Construction of Corpus Christi, Texas, were the contractors to win the bid. The APCC sub-contracted with Concrete Precasters, also of Corpus Christi, to do much of the job. All of the concrete elements were built ahead of time and then taken to the construction site. Cost for the concrete elements at the time was \$36 a foot. U.S. Steel Corporation of Arlington, Texas, provided posts, and miscellaneous hardware as well as the fabric for the fence, and did the actual installation.

The crew moved in July 2, 1980, and the job was completed September 9, 1980. The chain link barrier fence, also called a control-of-access headlight barrier fence, was 5,780 feet long. U.S. Steel made all the beams for the project, and

they were cast in 30 foot sections, for a total of 192 beams. All line posts and terminal posts were drilled for attachment of pull cables and erection on posts for metal-beam posts four-foot long, were used, with 23 three-inch metal posts, four-and-a-half foot long being used.

All the steel-wire cable and fittings were galvanized by the hot-double-dip or electro-plate method, and the metal had a continuous coating of zinc of a uniform thickness.

The wire mesh fabric used was one woven into a maximum one-inch mesh opening, with a knuckled finish for the top and bottom selvages. The wire in the fabric is able to withstand a minimum tensile strength of 65,000 pounds per square inch after aluminum or galvanized coating. One hundred and sixteen (116) rolls of 9-gauge, with one strand of 7-gauge at the top and bottom, was used in the construction of the headlight-barrier fence.

Sergeant Jerry Matthews, with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Highway Patrol, Eastland, Texas, is very pleased with the results achieved with the fence. "We haven't had a single vehicle get over the fence since its installation. We find tire tracks along the concrete barrier frequently, but evidently the vehicles are redirected away from the barrier, and are able to continue without incident."

Sergeant Matthews showed proof of fatal and destructive accidents occurring on this particular stretch of highway. His records for 1976, 77, 78, and 79 showed some of the following collisions.

"A large truck lost the ring off a wheel, and the driver lost control; the tire then lost air, and the truck hit the guard rail and ended up crossways in the lane.

"A semi-trailer rolled on to its left side after striking the center guard rail, splitting the trailer's roof from the side walls; it finally went

completely through the center guard rail into the opposite lane of traffic.

"During a rain storm, a driver of a car lost control of vehicle on curve and spun around, striking the guard rail on side, and then went in to hit the center guard rail. A large semi-trailer hit the car, then went completely through the guard rail and overturned in median. The driver of the truck was killed.

"Two vehicles had collided. Because of the blind curve, the following happened. A driver towing a camper trailer came upon the wreck. Before the camper trailer could get past the two wrecked vehicles, a pickup truck ran into the back of the camper. A fifth vehicle, a white car, drove to the rear of the camper, when a truck tractor semi-trailer came over the hill upon the five vehicles now visible. The truck driver, to avoid hitting the crashed vehicles, crashed into the guard rail in the center, and then became airborne. He struck the rear of the camper, and finally came down on top of the last car involved in the collision. Two were killed in this pileup, and there was extensive damage to all vehicles involved, and to the guardrail. Time involved in cleaning up the wreckage was 12 hours.

"A truck-tractor semi-trailer was attempting to go up the steep grade and was trying to downshift. He could not get it back in gear, and ended up striking the guard rail, ending up crossways on the highway."

There were many such accidents which were recorded in Sergeant Matthews files, many of them hitting the guard rail. The metal guard rail saved the lives of many of the accident victims, but too many were not stopped

completely, and ended up on the other side.

"We were very skeptical about the barrier," Fox said. "We were afraid it would not hold those big trucks, and might cause as many accidents or more as before. Before the barrier was built, we were having several accidents occur a week. Our men were constantly being called to repair the guard rails, and the highway patrol was called to handle the accident victims and details. Since the fence has been built, we have had only three incidents in which the fence has been knocked down, and no deaths have been reported."

"The glare screen type fabric has helped cut down on the number of accidents, too," Fox said. Although no statistics are available for this type thing, it almost assuredly has prevented accidents that would be caused by the glare from headlights, as well as the sun.

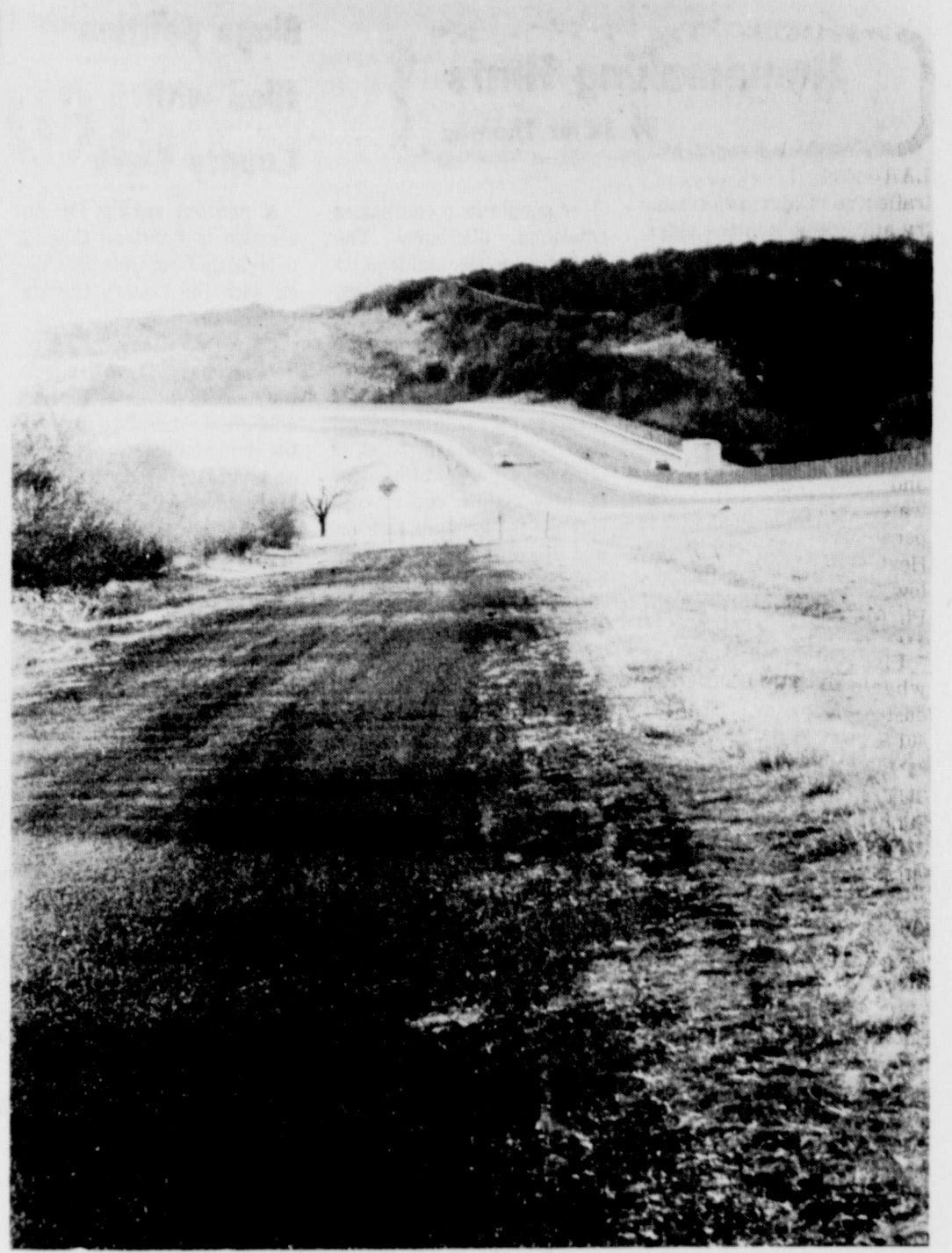
Fox said that the cost for the job, which was a Federal Aid Project, was about \$49 a linear foot, to remove the old barrier, and install the new fence barrier. "The paperwork on a project like this is astronomical," Fox said. Several folders filled with information concerning each nut and bolt that went into the building of the fence, was evidence of his statement. "The complete cost of the job was \$303,964, which in-

cluded material and installation."

Roadway cross section significant affects guard rail and median barrier performances. Curbs, dikes, sloped shoulders, and stepped medians can cause errant vehicles to vault a barrier or to strike it so that the vehicles overturn.

An engineer technician from the Abilene Highway Department, said that he believes that a concrete barrier with the a slope fence is preferable to a wire fence, in many instances. "It has many advantages," he said. "This type barrier will deflect a vehicle striking it at the likely impact angle. It had a pleasing appearance and requires little maintenance. Wire fences constantly need repair when a car strikes, but the concrete doesn't get hurt much at all. Because of the contour, it redirects the colliding vehicles in the same directions as the other traffic. In addition, the design has a pleasing contour."

"If a stretch of dangerous highway, just 1.09 miles long, can be sedated by simply applying a glare screen and concrete median, then the cost and trouble involved was well worth the effort. To accommodate the driving public, the engineers must continually update existing fences on highway systems, and most frequently erect new ones.

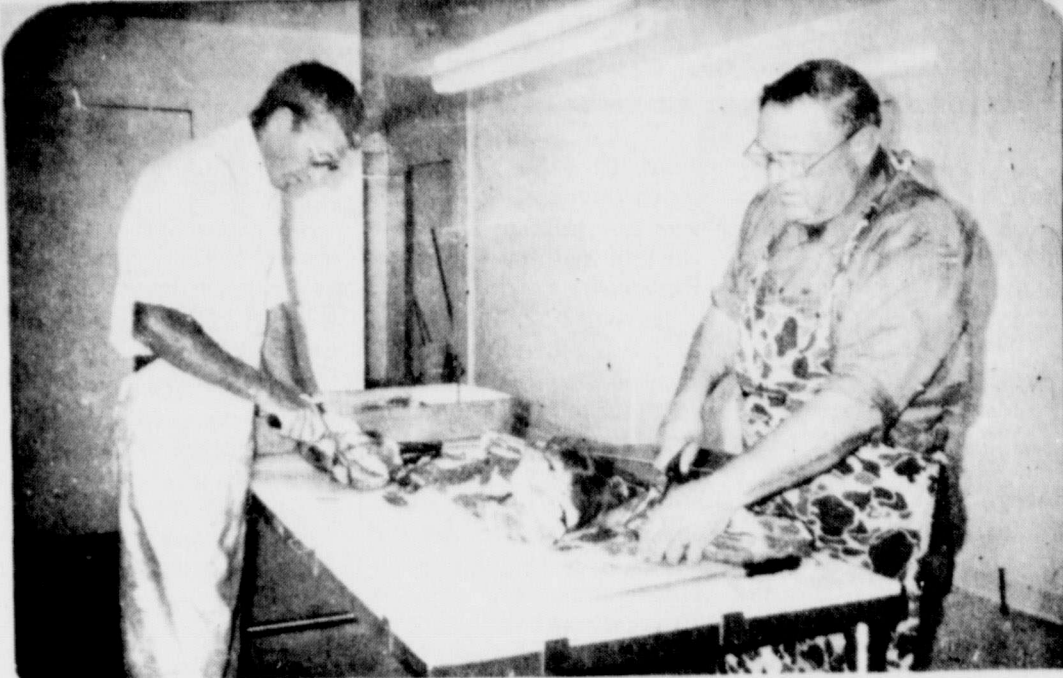

Local Girl Is Helping To Date Early Man In Ecuador

Obsidian artifact fragments gathered from the highlands of Ecuador and tested with up-to-date obsidian hydration dating methods have provided substantial clues to early man in Ecuador for a Texas Tech University archeologist.

Dr. William J. Mayer-Oakes, who has done archeological work in Ecuador since 1960, has received confirmation that pieces collected at a San Jose site vary in age from 9,321 years old to 11,248 years old and fall consistently into sequence according to the levels from which they were excavated.

"This provides for the first time a consistent series of dates placing early Ecuadorian human occupation in firm relationship with other 'Early Man' sites in South and North America," Mayer-Oakes said.

Mayer-Oakes submitted his specimens to a specialized laboratory in Pennsylvania—Mohl—operated by Dr. Joseph Michels of Penn State University, a hydra-

tion dating specialist. The dating method was invented in 1960, but Michels used a series of advanced techniques, including atomic absorption spectroscopy and laboratory-induced hydration rate determination, to provide more precise and accurate dates through the method.

Obsidian hydration dating is now comparably accurate to carbon dating, according to Mayer-Oakes. He said the laboratory dates are correct within a 300-year margin of error in either direction. He has relied on obsidian dating because carbon dating is difficult for the particular San Jose site.

"The site was a camping and workshop site rather than a kill site," Mayer-Oakes said. "The only available charcoal at San Jose is in small amounts and is scattered throughout the site, not enough for accurate carbon dating, while obsidian is abundant."

The obsidian hydration dating method measures water absorption in the lustrous black glass over a

period of time. The obsidian is chipped for making tools and the exposed surface absorbs moisture from the air, Mayer-Oakes said. The thickness of the band that absorbed the moisture provides the archeological clues as to when it was chipped.

Tools found at the San Jose site—obsidian blades and burins (grooving instruments), worked from one face only and used for cutting, scraping and chiseling—indicated an older culture than obsidian projectile points and spearheads excavated at Ecuador's El Inga site, dated at 8,000-10,000 years ago.

San Jose tools, Mayer-Oakes said, are typical of upper Paleolithic technology throughout the world. Two-sided tools came with further technological development.

Mayer-Oakes is piecing together his research findings to determine how early Ecuadorian man made and used his tools and how he lived at San Jose.

He said more study and dating is needed, but

research so far suggests an extremely early use of the High Andean area in Ecuador.

"If San Jose was the home of a highly developed and environmentally adapted hunting society at 11,300 years ago, it is very likely there were earlier and simpler 'pioneer' settlers yet to be found," Mayer-Oakes said. Mayer-Oakes' introduction to early inhabitants of Ecuador was at the El Inga site he discovered in 1960 with Dr. Robert Campbell of the University of Oklahoma.

Led to the San Jose site in 1965 by an experienced foreman, Mayer-Oakes and his son David returned in 1971 to excavate it with Ecuadorian archeologist Maria Carlucci de Santiana under the auspices of the Museum of the Central Bank of Quito and its director Hernan Crespo T. Financial support came from the National Research Council of Canada and the University of Manitoba, where Mayer-Oakes was anthropology chairman.

Since coming to Texas Tech in September 1971, he and Texas Tech colleagues have studied the large and complex collection of tools, almost all made of obsidian. Mayer-Oakes did fieldwork in Ecuador in 1973 and '74, searching for natural sources of obsidian. A research grant provided by Texas Tech funded the recent dating tests.

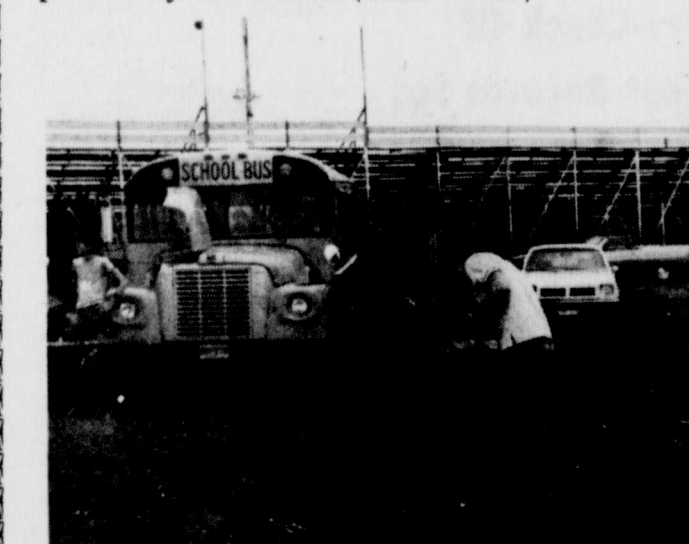

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OBSIDIAN FROM ECUADOR—Obsidian specimens collected by Texas Tech University anthropology Professor William J. Mayer-Oakes from the highlands of Ecuador have been dated between 10,000 and 12,000 years old. 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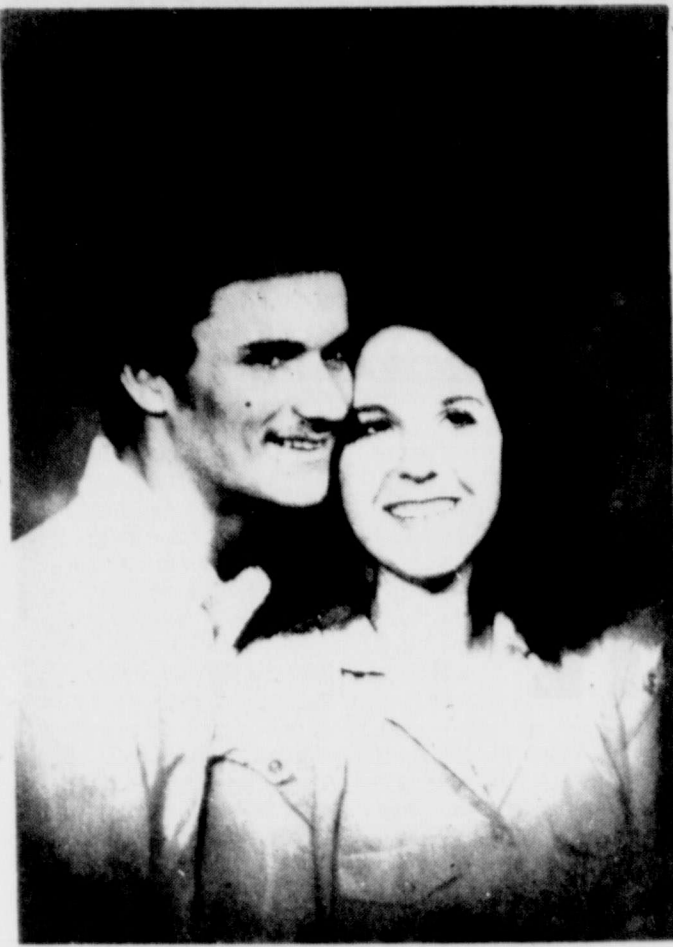

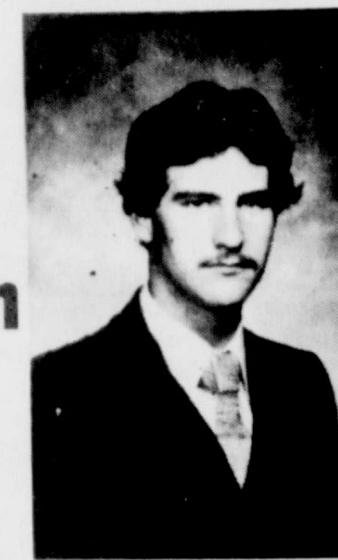

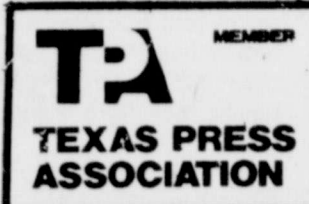
Greg, member of the graduating class, plays the trombone and finished

SHINGLE YOUR ROOF

Mother Earth News Reprinted From Mother Earth News Magazine June '81

A number of years ago, I covered my home's entire 1,800 square foot roof with aluminum shingles - a job that would have set me back more than \$2,000 if it had been done commercially.

I chose aluminum because it can last a lifetime is fire and rustproof, and will often reduce heating and cooling expenses. In addition, such shingles are lightweight...an important consideration when you have to lug hundreds of them up a ladder. What really clinched my choice, however, was the discovery that this roofing material can be easily salvaged from inexpensive, used printing plates.

SHOP AROUND

A little research convinced me that the best print-shop "lofters" for shingle use, at least .009" thick and measured 24-5/8" X 36". Telephone calls to several local presses proved that such plates vary quite a bit in availability and in price. However, I finally located one small job printer who had thousands of the shingles-to-be that he was more than willing to unload for a bargain price.

So, I drove to his shop and carefully selected undamaged plates that had a sturdy, 1/8" doubled-over edge (created when the aluminum was locked in the press). In two hours I had loaded 600 of the metal sheets in my truck...and had thoroughly blackened my clothes and gloves. (Printers ink soaks everything it touches, so always don old stained garments when you work with this recycled aluminum.)

CUT 'EM UP

I soon determined that if I cut the 2' X 3' plates into fourths I could produce shingles that were attractive and strong enough to resist our Utah mountain winds. So I place a single aluminum sheet-printed side up on my work surface...measured carefully to determine the midpoint of each side...lined a yardstick up across the marks...and scratched in a "cross hair". I then used scissors to divide the plate up into four equal sections...and these rectangles became the patterns for the rest of my plates.

I found it easy to cut the sheets with my stout scissors. In fact, I was able to quarter 10 sheets in about 25 minutes...and the job could be done much more quickly with a paper cutter. (An even faster method would be to pay the print shop to "size" the plates with a power knife...but my pressman didn't have one of the tools on hand.)

A TEMPLATE AND TOOLS

I decided to fashion each shingle into a parallelogram...for a number of reasons: The "lopsided rectangles" only required one thickness of aluminum...involved few manufacturing steps...allowed me to overlap each piece of "roofing" on all four edges, produced slanted vertical "tiles" (to shed water well)...were easy to mount,

I found I could finish 40 shingles in 20 minutes, and after working four Saturdays and five week nights I had the 2,000 shingles I needed.

It's years since jobs roof was installed, our heating and cooling bills have been less, and the homemade, interlocking shingles have weathered 80 MPH winds and heavy snows. Yes sir...my bargain basement roofing has passed the test of time, and I still feel a glow of pride and accomplishment every time I come home and see its beautiful, diamondlike pattern glowing in the afternoon sun.

and make it possible to secure three of each shingle's corners with only two nails.

In order to produce the finished metal "shakes", however, I first had to make a template 17" long and 19" high...I cut it from a piece of 1/8" plywood...then marked two points...I then used a pencil to scribble the shape of the shingle onto the plywood.

I placed the upper right corner of the shingle on the left side of the sheet and six inches from its right edge. The next step is to wrap the exposed triangles of metal up and over the sides of the template. A wooden block (such as the one in Photo 2) is used to press each fold almost-but not quite flat.

The last stages in shingle production are shown in Photo 2. Place the piece of strap iron along the slanting fold at the right side, and bend the triangle of metal back over itself. When the strap is removed, it will leave a small trough or pocket. A table knife is then used to lift the 1/8" tab between the two bottom folds.

MY SHINGLE MOUNTING METHOD

I'm not a professional roofer by any stretch of the imagination, so what I'll say here certainly won't be the last word on shingle mounting. However, the method that follows did work on my own house, and can probably give you some idea of how to proceed.

First, since aluminum is slippery stuff - and because I didn't want to put too much stress on my lightweight creations - I planned to work from right to left and place the shingles (one above the other) in vertical strips... while I sat safely on one side on the old asphalt roof.

Here's the procedure: I hooked each plate's 1/8" "lip" - beneath edge "A" - over the top of the shingle below it, and slipped the right side "B" of the aluminum shake into the strap-iron form - a pocket of the matching shingle in the row immediately to the

right. This placed the upper right obtuse corner of the "new" tile beneath the upper left acute angle of the shingle in the preceding row. These two corners - "C" and "D" - were then secured with one nail (near enough to the upper edge to be covered by the next shingle), while a second fastener was used to hold down the "flap" at "E". In this way, all of the sides of my shingles overlapped, and two roofing nails were sufficient to secure three corners of each of my plates. Finally, any nailheads - because of non-uniform shingles - were not covered by another aluminum plate received a waterproofing coat of black plastic sealant.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Although Mr. Simmons didn't use them, we recommend rubber-fitted roofing nails for this job.

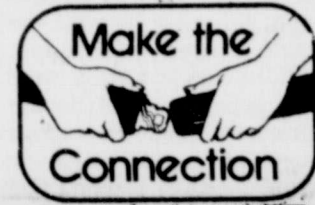
