Super Duper Will Build In Eastland

A contract has been signed with Vista Construction Inc. and site preparation is to begin Monday on the Super Duper Food Store in Eastland, according to James Parker, building owner.

The announcement came at a press conference held Tuesday morning at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce office.

Mr. Parker stated it will take approximately 180 days for construction with November 15 being the projected opening day for the store.

"This store will be newest and most modern store in the area", Mr. Parker said as he talked with the press.

Vince Daddio, General Contractor for Vista Construction Inc. out of Stephenville with Mr. Parker at the meeting. He told the group that sub-contractors were lined up and they were ready to go. He quickly emphasized "we will be using as many local sub-contractors as possible to keep the dollars here in Eastland."

The store, number 21 in a chain with headquarters in Abilene, will set on a three acre tract of land with 22,000 square feet. It will be a pre-engineered metal structure with a brick front.

"We want a complete shopping center and have left 60 feet for that purpose" Mr. Parker stated at the meeting. He went on to say "any merchants wanting to build facilities there are welcome.

Plenty of parking will be available at the new store with two large light fixtures to brightly illuminate the area.

The store will also feature as in store bakery, a delicatessen, sit down snack bar, floral and gift shop and an enclosed brick produce room.

According to Mr. Parker, the store will definitely be open seven days a week but hours are still uncertain. He said the store could possibly be open from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. or 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

It has been estimated that 30 to 35 persons will be employed at the new store with applications being taken in September and October. More information will be released later.

Mr. Parker ended the conference by stating "I want to thank the Eastland National Bank for the financing and the people of Eastland for showing so much enthusiasm about this project. We have had delays and we apologize and know that you understand."

Smokey And Bambi Join In Forest Fire Prevention Effort

WASHINGTON--Two of America's most beloved forest dwellers are working together this summer in a special effort to remind people of the dangers of forest fires and what can be done to prevent them.

Smokey Bear, the official fire prevention spokesman of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service, and Bambi, the star of one of Walt Disney's best known productions, will tour cities across the country spreading the message "Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires. We Can't."

Don Hansen, the Forest Service's manager of the Smokey Bear program, said Smokey and Bambi make a natural team.

"Smokey and Bambi are undoubtedly the world's most experienced promoters of forest fires prevention," Hansen said. "Since 1945, Smokey has been reminding forest visitors to be careful with fire. His efforts have resulted in greatly reducing the number of forest fires

which occur each year as well as saving billions of dollars worth of natural resources."

Hansen said periodic surveys done by a leading marketing firm show that Smokey is one of the most widely recognized symbols ever used in a publicity campaign.

"Bambi was helping prevent forest fires even before Smokey," Hansen said. "Bambi appeared on a fire prevention poster issued in 1944 which depicted characters from the Disney movie 'Bambi' and which included the message 'Please Mister, Don't Be Careless.'"

Hansen said the Disney production of Bambi has played an important role in raising public awareness of the dangers of forest fires. "I doubt that anyone who has seen the film can forget the sequence in which the fire races through Bambi's home and the effect it has on the forest and the creatures who live there," Hansen said.

Smokey's manager said a

new public service television announcement featuring Smokey and the fire sequence from the Bambi film has been produced.

The spot announcement will be distributed to television stations through the nation this summer by the Advertising Council, Inc., which coordinates the donation of about \$50 million worth of advertising space and broadcast time to the Smokey Bear campaign each year.

In addition to the television announcements, Hansen said, special Smokey Bear activities are planned to coincide with the re-release of the movie "Bambi" this summer. A special fire prevention poster, coloring sheet and sticker depicting Smokey, Bambi and other characters from the movie, such as Thumper and Flower, also will be widely distributed.

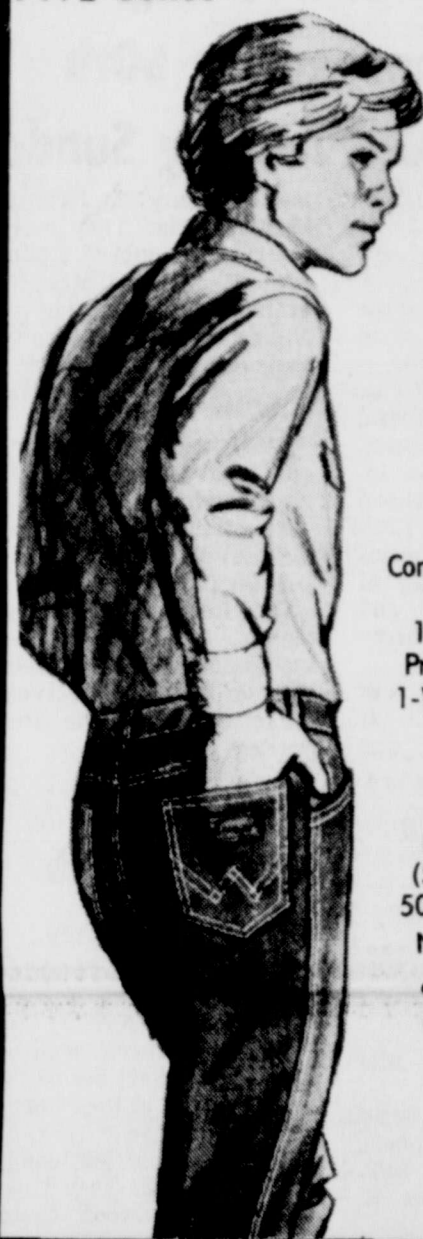

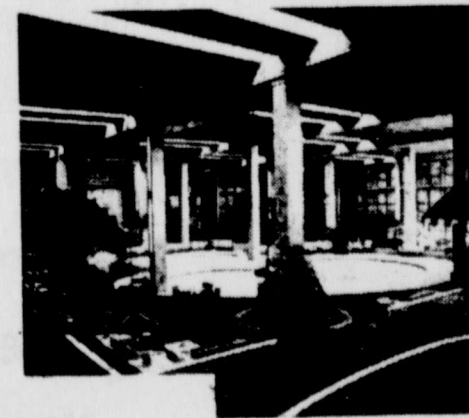

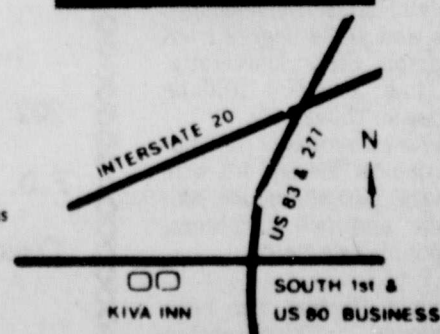

Albany's Fort Griffin Fandangle Will Be June 17-19 & 24-26

The reception will be hosted by their six children, Howard and Alva Ingram, Lawrence and Carolyn Ingram, Doris and Alfred Green, all of Cisco, Kitty Davis of Fort Worth, Charles and Winnie McElhaney of Grand Junction, Colo., and Henry and Odessa Stanberry of Tucson, Ariz.

Mr. Ingram (Dick) was born August 11, 1899, at Nimrod. Mrs. Ingram was

For more than forty years the people of Albany, Texas have been entertaining West Texans with song and dance, depicting the lives of early Texas settlers through the production of the Fort Griffin Fandangle.

The two hour outdoor musical is scheduled to run for six performances June 17-19 and June 24-26 at the prairie theatre just outside the Albany city limits.

A cast of over two hundred local citizens begin rehearsing as early as February each year to make the historical narrative possible. With the exception of the directors and technicians, the cast and crew of the show volunteer their many hours of rehearsal and performance.

The Fandangle was created 44 years ago by Albany playwright and author Robert Nail as a senior class play. The production was such a success that local citizens encourag-

ed Nail to expand the endeavor to include the townspeople.

Over the years scripts for the show were carefully constructed to tell the story of the old west and how it was settled. Following Nail's

death in 1968, the town drew from within itself for continued leadership and guidance.

For two generations the Fandangle has pulled from Albany talents that other-

wise would have gone undeveloped. All music and lyrics for the production are the products of Albany citizens as are the props and scenery.

The large outdoor stage is

the setting for scenes that include a herd of longhorns, buffalo, a stage coach, countless cowboys and a replica of the Texas Central locomotive. Also used is a large street set that transforms the two acre stage into the wild and reckless Main Street of Fort Griffin, a cattle trail town and home of a military fort by the same name.

Albany celebrates the annual production with a parade scheduled this year to begin at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 25. The sixty or more entries in the parade represent local organizations as well as several of the moving props from the show such as the steam powered calliope.

Fandangle visitors are encouraged to come early enough to view Albany's many historical buildings, including the courthouse which was constructed in 1883. Organ concerts are held each evening of performances on the handcrafted pipe organ in the Matthews Memorial Presbyterian Church located one block off

the square. Calliope concerts are held before each show at the theatre.

Albany's latest achievement is the founding of the Old Jail Foundation Art Museum which was a recipient of one of four cultural achievement awards given by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce this year. The prestigious award has been bestowed on Albany twice in the past, once to Robert Nail and then again to the people of Albany for the production of the Fandangle.

The art museum will be featuring an exhibit entitled "Taos Today" during the Fandangle dates.

Barbecue and all the trimmings are available on the court house lawn beginning at 5:00 p.m. each night of the performance.

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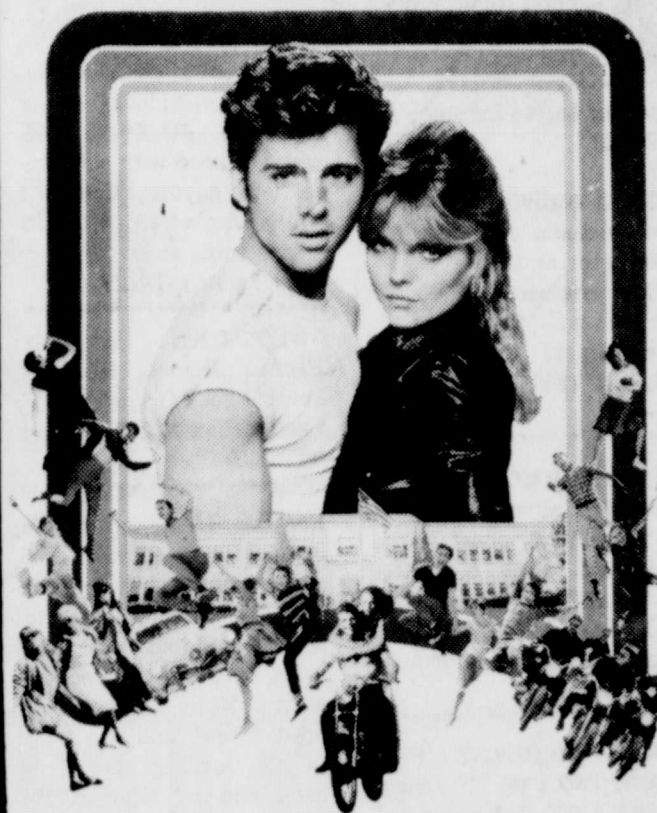


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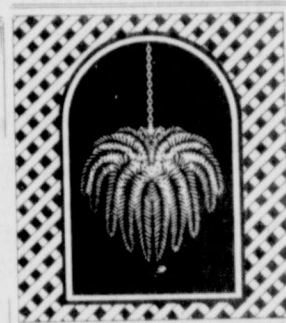

Reappraisal Notices Near Release

Most Eastland County property owners will be receiving their 1982 property revaluation notices within the next few days. The revaluation or reappraisal notices are set to be mailed out from the Eastland County Appraisal District during the week of June 14, 1982.

The reappraisal notices will inform the owners of taxable property within the County as the new reappraised value of their property. Every type of taxable property—residential, commercial, business personal, and agricultural has been reappraised.

The reappraisal work is being done by the professional appraisal firm of McMorries and Company. The work has been going on for over 12 months in order to meet the State mandated deadline of 1982. The new State Property Tax Code requires that all taxing districts have a fair market value placed upon all categories of property for the 1982 tax year.

Each appraisal notice will contain information as the name and address of the property owner, the legal description of the property being valued, the taxing jurisdictions the property is located within, the new appraised value for the property, and the estimated tax rate and amount of tax due for the property. This last item is only an estimate, as the actual tax rate and amount of tax due on the property will not be determined until later when the various taxing jurisdictions set their 1982 tax rates and set their 1982 budgets.

It is important that the property owner not confuse the notice of reappraisal

with a tax statement. It is not a tax statement and is not to be paid.

The next issue of the paper will carry a sample form of the reappraisal notice as well as information concerning the 1982 Board of Review Hearings which will be held at the end of June.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Reports On Texas Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Tuesday that gross sales in Texas for the fourth quarter of 1981—October, November and December—totaled almost \$109 billion.

Fourth quarter sales in 1981 passed 1980 fourth quarter sales by \$18 billion, Bullock said, a 19.9 percent increase.

Bullock's report details gross sales—all sales made by Texas businesses—as well as those subject to sales and use tax.

The Comptroller said the sales tax analysis for October, November and December of 1981 shows 375,699 outlets reporting, compared with 341,539 reporting in 1980. Out of state taxpayers numbered 6,815 compared with 6,096 a year earlier.

P-T Operating Co. of Breckenridge has filed for permit for to re-enter a plugged well in the Stephens County Regular gas field, seven miles south of the Caddo townsight. The well concerned is the No. 2 M. Langford. It carries projected total depth of 2,254 feet and is located in a 40-acre lease, T&PRR Survey.

Derby Oil of Ventura, Calif., has finaled a new oiler in the Stephens County Regular Field, five miles northeast of the Ivan

townsight. Tested on pump with open choke, the well indicated ability to produce oil at the rate of seven barrels per day, along with a small volume of casinghead gas. The well is designated as the No. 2-A Ford-Derby.

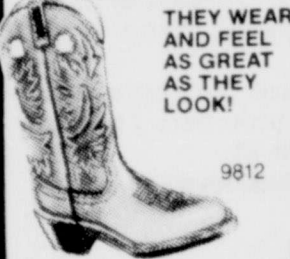

be in the audience at the Americana Friday morning (June 11) for Sen. Bentsen's talk and question period. 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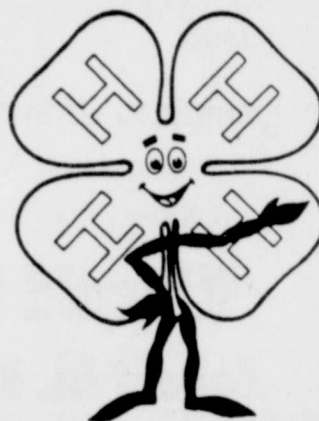
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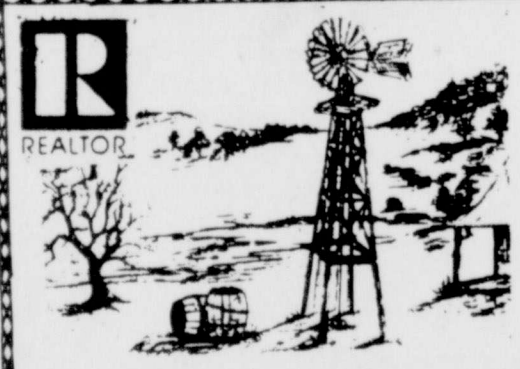

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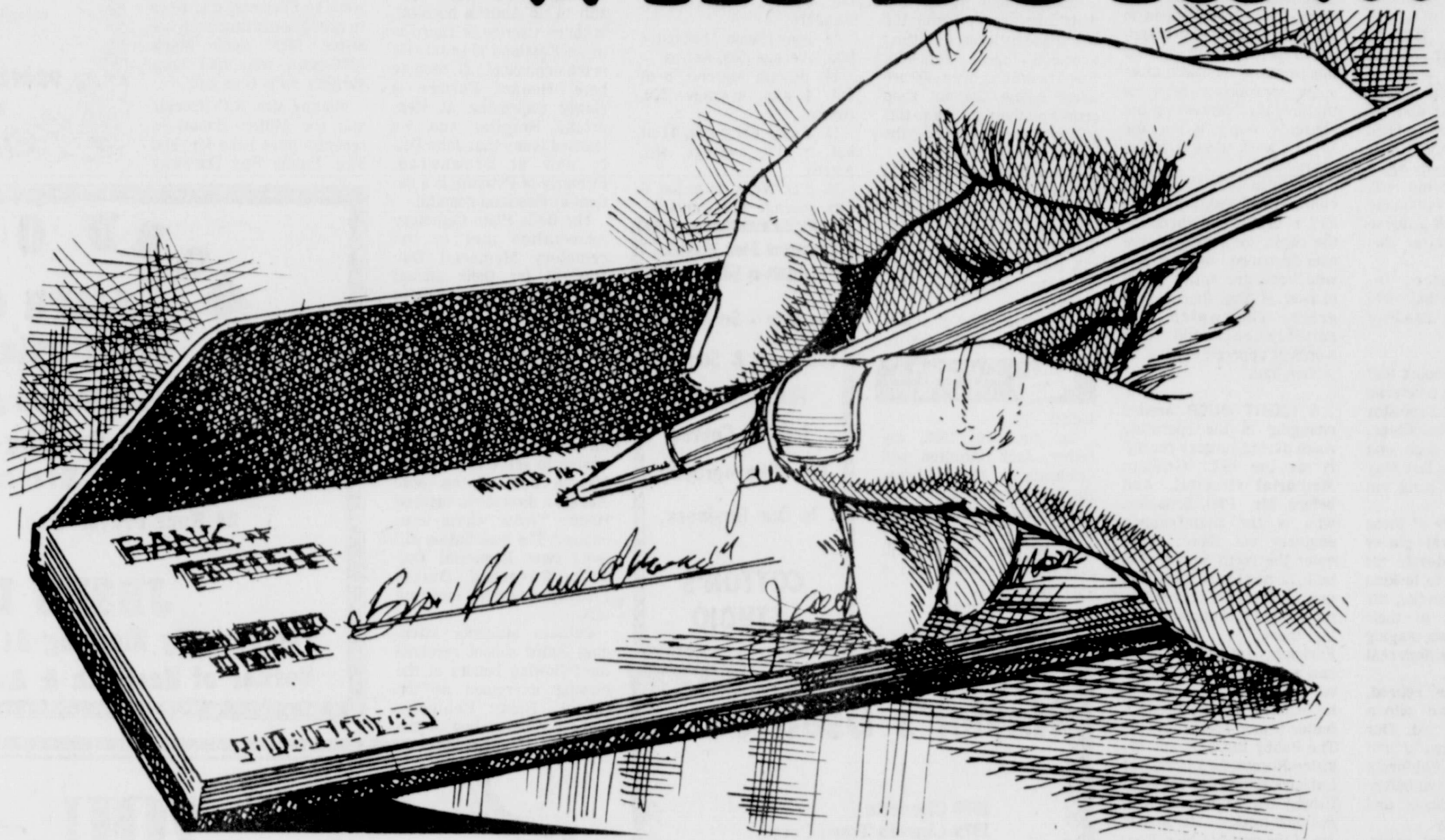
