IF YOU KNOW anyone who is a former member of the 222nd Infantry Regiment of the 42nd Infantry (Rainbow) Division then the following information may be of interest.

Widespread efforts are being made to inform former members of the 222nd Infantry Regiment of the 42nd Infantry (Rainbow) Division that the regiment will hold its annual meeting in conjunction with the Rainbow Division Veterans Association 1982 reunion in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The reunion will be held in the Camelot Hotel between July 11 and 14 and will include a visit to Muskogee, Oklahoma, where the Rainbow Memorial, an amphitheater, will be dedicated.

The 222nd, also known as the "Triple Deuce," has the largest chapter membership in the Rainbow Veterans association which is comprised principally of veterans who served with the division's various units in Europe during World Wars I and II.

Among those attending the 1981 reunion in Reading, Pennsylvania was Retired Army Colonel Henry L. Luongo. Colonel Luongo, who commanded the 222nd Infantry in its final phases of training at Camp Gruber, Oklahoma and throughout its World War II combat operations, brought back pleasant memories to many when he suggested that those seated at the regimental dinner head table not be served until all others had been. This was in keeping with the history 222nd Infantry policy that the "troops come first." As a result, Colonel Luongo's suggestion was favorably commented upon in columns of the late Washington (DC) STAR.

## CJC Board Approves Purchase Of Property, Employs Coach

The board of regents of Cisco Junior College voted to purchase the old Baptist Student Union property near the campus, approved a leave-of-absence policy for faculty members working on doctorate degrees, hired a new

girls basketball coach and transacted other business at their monthly meeting last Monday night.

The Baptist house and several lots adjacent to the campus will be purchased for \$12,000 and the money

will be used by the church organization in building a new BSU facility, reported Dr. Norman Wallace, CJC president. The college will use the property for future expansion.

The new leave-of-absence policy will enable 9-month

faculty members to spend a semester at a university to work on higher than master's degrees at half-pay, Dr. Wallace said. Twelve-month employees will be given an entire summer off at half-pay.

The college will use staff members and part-time employees to cover for those on leave, Dr. Wallace said. This will allow graduate students to be away without costing the college more instructional money, he added. The new policy is in keeping with regulations of the Southern Association of Colleges and Universities that encourages continuing education for faculty members, Dr. Wallace said.

The board voted to renew its contract with the Eastland County Tax Appraisal District for another year.

Ronnie Hearn of Jacksboro was employed as the new girls basketball coach, and he assumed his duties June 15th. He has been at Jacksboro three years and in coaching 11 years without a losing season. He will move his wife and two children to Cisco soon. He replaced Bruce Land who resigned recently to accept a college position at Kingsville.

Dr. Wallace said the board approved an application for \$72,000 in federal funds being allocated by the Texas Education Agency to colleges for use in technical and vocational school improvements. Most of the money would be used to add equipment to the CJC Technical-Vocational School, Dr. Wallace said.

Dr. Wallace told the board that a 39-hour work schedule was being worked out for business office personnel this summer. Under the schedule, the employees will use four days to put in 39 hours, giving them more time off for recreation.

Board President Lee D. Woolley presided at the meeting.

## Pafford-Patterson Ambulance Service Starts Second Drive

Pafford-Patterson Ambulance Service recently kicked off their second annual membership drive in both Cisco and Eastland with the signing of their first 1982-83 memberships.

In Eastland, Mr. and Mrs. Valliant Polk and Mr. Silas F. Owens renewed their memberships which they held last year. This year's first memberships from Cisco were renewed by Mr. and Mrs. Knotgrass and Ola Boles.

The deadline to join the ambulance service or to renew last year's membership is Saturday, July 31, 1982. New or renewed memberships will run from August 1, 1982 through July 31, 1983. A membership goal of 850 persons in each Cisco and Eastland has been set and Mr. James Patterson, who also manages the Eastland service stresses that if the goal is not met, they are not under any obligation to continue service. At present the membership stands at 200 persons for both Cisco and Eastland, Mr. Patterson reports.

He went on to explain that in addition to individual memberships, industry memberships are being offered this year. "Industry memberships will not only cover employer-employees but also persons who may be hurt on their property," stated Mr. Patterson. He went on to say "we are offering this service due to the fact many businesses are unable to supply health insurance for employees or the public."

Mr. Patterson was quick to relate that applications are being accepted from anyone within the county and service will be provided in these areas. "In case of extreme emergency, we will deliver a patient to the nearest hospital or to any hospital they request."

Memberships cost \$36 per year, per member, which is a husband/wife, plus any children under 19 living at home, or an individual living alone, or in a nursing home.

A non-member may use the ambulance service but they must pay \$70 per call plus \$1.50 per mile, \$10

minimum for oxygen, and \$15 for emergencies.

Service is provided to all hospitals within 60 mile radius of Eastland/Cisco are covered. This includes Abilene. Service beyond this boundary will be rendered at an additional charge of \$15 per mile, one-way.

Application blanks for membership may be obtained at either the city hall in Cisco or Eastland or at various businesses in both cities. Completed application forms may be returned to the city halls or mailed to Pafford and Patterson Amb. Serv. Inc. P.O. Box 912-Eastland, TX 76448.

Pafford-Patterson Ambulance Service was incorporated on March 1, 1982. They have been serving the Eastland and Cisco area for the past year and have 22 years of combined experience.

The Cisco service is managed by Mr. and Mrs. Quincy Foster whose combined years of experience total 15 years. Both Cisco and Eastland had 790 combined calls they answered last year.

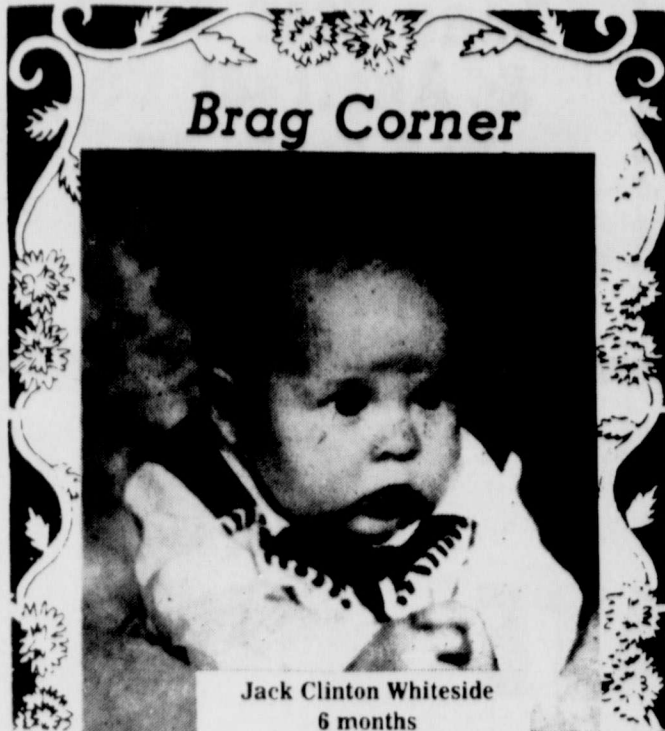

## Hints To Parents For A Successful Dental Experience For Your Child

1. Do not voice your own personal fears in the child's presence. The primary cause of fear in children is hearing their parents complain about their own dental experience. Explain in a matter-of-fact and pleasant manner what dentistry is and how nice the dentist will be. Great strides have been made in alleviating most of the pain of dentistry. The parent who educates his child to be receptive to dental treatment will find that it pays dividends in the child enjoyment of dentistry. The parent must also conceal feelings of anxiety when taking the child to the dentist.
2. At one year of age or whenever the child has most of his primary teeth, get the child a small, soft toothbrush and have an informal, low-key time every day to let him or her "brush". Use a tiny dab of paste and brush the child's teeth for him as well as he will allow. Do not force the issue, but be persistent with this every day. Establish a relaxed routine.
3. At around age two, begin taking the child for friendly dentist visits. An office tour and visual exam should be

done with no discomfort caused. These visits should be scheduled every six months so that a regular routine is established.

4. NEVER use dentistry as a threat of punishment.
5. NEVER bribe a child to go to the dentist.
6. NEVER shame, scold, or ridicule a child for being fearful of dentistry.
7. NEVER PROMISE a child what the dentist will or will not do. This will either limit what can be done or cause resentment and distrust if the dentist is required to break that promise. Never say "It won't hurt."
8. Never spring a surprise visit to the dentist on the child. Let him or her know several days ahead of time that a check-up is planned. Spend the time casually informing as to what to really expect.
9. Once at the office the parent should be willing to commit the child to the dentist's care and completely transfer the child to the dental staff's authority.

## Catchin' Country Catfish

Ever shuffled out of the house at four a.m. with a fishing pole over your shoulder? Nearly every country youngster can remember at least one daybreak of rounding up cheese, angleworms, night crawlers, dough balls, or chicken parts, and running off for some good catfish.

These chicken of the channel are common and widespread, bite when other fish won't, reach super sizes...and, above all, are incredibly tasty. And since catfish are available to most folks, their nutritional goodness can become an important part of anyone's diet.

Like to try catfishing? Get up bright and early one morning and head for the nearest river, lake, or farm pond. Nighttime will also produce good results. In fact, "cats" can be caught at all times of the day, at all water temperatures and depths. The best time to plan your expedition, however, is after a heavy rain...especially in the spring. When other fair-weather fish are sluggish and temperamental, the hungry catfish forage about in the freshly rejuvenated waters.

If you fish regularly, you probably have a favorite spot. If not, just ask some of the local od-timers. Though angling stories are famed for their dishonesty, there's generally some darn good tips in them somewhere!

Some people prefer an old-fashioned bait-casting rod and reel but almost any type of arrangement -- from Grandma's cane pole to a fancy spinning rig -- will catch a catfish. Use a small-to-medium-size hook and a sinker that's heavy enough to keep your bait on the bottom, in cat territory. The weight needed to do this will vary depending on water conditions.

Most conceivable baits will entice these tasty critters, but garden worms are the old standby. (Just don't take too many out of the vegetable patch!) Cast a generous bait to the bottom, and wait for the slow,

deliberate tugging which signals that a catfish is biting. Above all, be patient!

If the water you've chosen to fish is muddy, sluggish, or still, you're very likely to catch a bullhead (a member of the catfish family that grows to no more than 20 inches long and 4 1/2 pounds in weight). All of the three common color phases of the bullhead -- black, brown, and yellow -- have pink meat that's sweet and fine. Faster, clearer water will generally turn up nice channel and blue cats (especially from that little pool beneath a steady current where natural nutrients abound). The variety really doesn't matter, however, because all catfish are readily distinguishable from other fish (by the "whiskers" or barbels that grow out of their upper jaws, and the skin -- instead of scales -- on their bodies) and all are among the finest feasting anywhere.

Once you've landed your eating-size (eight inches and up), you're faced with the procedure of dressing it out. No problem. First, grip the critter so that its three protruding fin spines are firmly extended between your fingers. Beware of those spikes...they can easily inflict a painful, long-lasting wound! Next -- with a sharp knife -- cut a shallow ring about the fish's neck, immediately behind the gill openings.

Since all catfish are scaleless they must be completely skinned... but the operation is actually pretty easy. Grasp the edge of your incision with a handy pair of pliers and simply peel the skin down banana style. Then remove the head, fins, tail, and entrails so that you're left with a large piece of meat that is ready to be washed, cooked, and eaten. (Incidentally, the above system works for other

scaleless fish and rattlesnakes!)

How will you cook your catfish? There are probably about a million ways, all of them good, but here are two of our favorite recipes.

**CATFISH STEW**  
6 small catfish, cleaned  
1 pint milk  
2 tablespoons butter  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
pepper to taste

Boil your cats until their flesh can be separated from the bones. Then dice the meat and put the pieces in a saucepan with other ingredients. Heat the rich brew and serve.

This is a general recipe. Any combination of vegetables and herbs may prove tasty with the basic mixture.

**FRIED CATFISH**  
Cleaned catfish  
enough egg, beat, to coat above  
mixture of cornmeal and flour  
oil or shortening  
salt and pepper to taste

Dip the fish in the raw, beaten egg, then roll the chunks of meat in the cornmeal-flour mixture. Drop the prepared pieces in a pan of hot oil and jump back. Brown them quickly on both sides and serve. Absolutely delicious!

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## What To Do When The Freezer Fails

Once you learn how to properly prepare and package food for frozen storage, your freezer can be like a faithful friend. But what happens when it breaks down or the power goes out?

First of all, try to find out how long it will be before your freezer is working again, says Dr. Al Wagner, food technologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

A fully loaded freezer will stay cold enough to keep food frozen for two days, notes Wagner, while on half-full will only keep food cold for a day. The main thing is to keep the freezer closed and not to check the food regularly.

Meats that still contain ice crystals or that have been kept at 40 degrees F. or below for less than two days may be safely refrozen. Some quality may be lost but the product is still wholesome, points out Wagner. However, throw out foods which have an unusual or off-odor, and never refreeze ice cream.

If it looks like the power will be off for a long time or your freezer cannot be repaired for several days, use dry ice. If dry ice is placed in the freezer soon after

the power goes off, 25 pounds should keep the temperature below freezing for two to three days in a 10-cubic-foot half-full freezer and three to four days if the freezer is full.

Handle dry ice carefully and be sure not to touch it with your bare hands, cautions Wagner. Make sure the room where the freezer is located is well ventilated. Place dry ice on cardboard or wooden boards on top of packages in the freezer. Do not open the freezer again except to put in more dry ice or to remove it once the freezer is working again.

If using dry ice is not possible, move food to a locker plant in insulated boxes (ice chests) or thick layers of paper or other wrapping to prevent thawing, suggests Wagner.

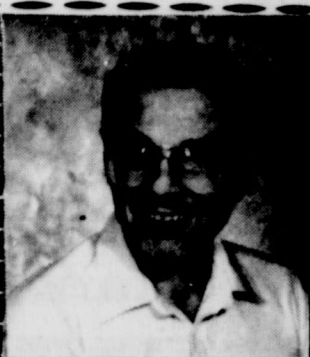

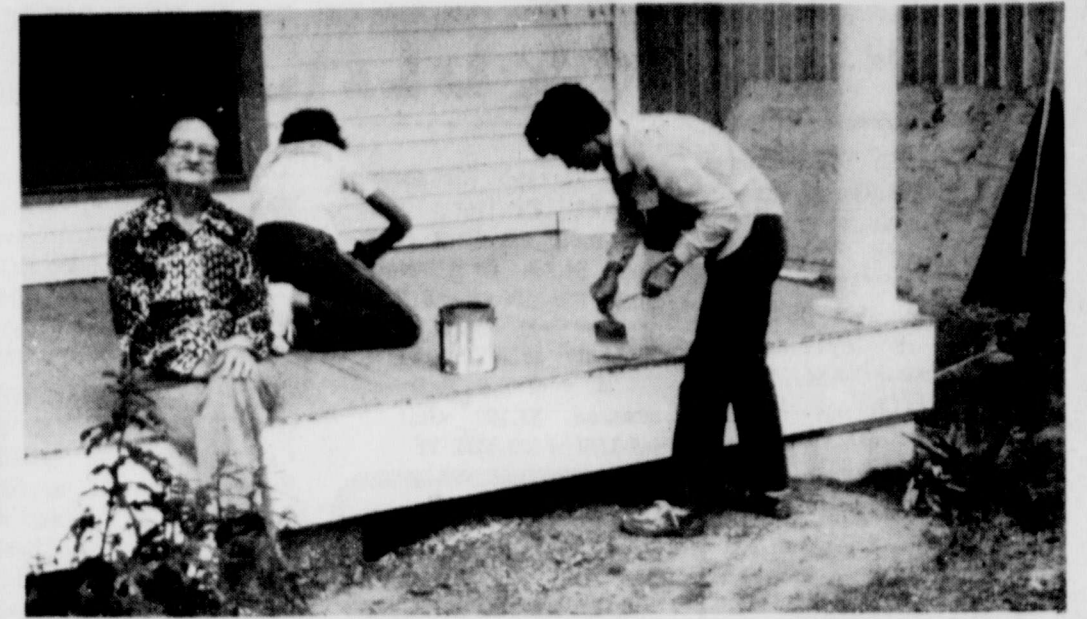

## Eastland County Airport And Ranger Municipal Airport May Be Excluded From Plans

AUSTIN-A preliminary Texas Aeronautical Commission report indicates that an Eastland County airport may not be included in its 20-year master plan.

The Ranger Municipal Airport, 10 miles from Eastland Municipal, may be excluded from the Texas Aeronautics Facilities Plan because it overlaps the service areas of another facility-plan airport, does not meet new standards and is not needed to provide

"reasonable air access."

The local airport was one of 21 Texas facilities not included in the plan. Commission Executive Director C.A. Wilkins said residents of those 21 areas indicated that they either did not want their facility upgraded, or that they did not want to build a new airport to replace a non-improvable one.

Wilkins said the plan was flexible though, and the ousted airports could be included in the future if area residents changed their minds. Meanwhile, the commission will continue to provide maintenance funds for the airports.

The new plan was developed in response to a mandate from the 67th Legislature. "We feel that major emphasis in development of our general aviation system should be placed on those facilities that are

essential to and can best serve business aviation users throughout the state," Wilkins said.

"A goal of the airport system is to provide reasonable access to the air transportation system for all Texans for the least and most practical cost," he said.

The report defined reasonable access as "50 miles or one hour's driving time for scheduled air passenger service and 35 miles or 30 minutes driving time for general aviation access." When the complete plan is implemented, 94 percent of Texas' population, 85 percent of the mineral value production and 94 percent of the agriculture value production would be within 25 miles of an airport.

The commission will approve the final plan in late September, Wilkins said.

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## State Tax Collections Make Texas History

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that state tax collections topped a billion dollars for the month of May, the highest monthly total in Texas history.

The \$1,013,475,464 deposited in the state Treasury during the month was nearly \$100 million more than last May's deposit and \$25 million above the previous high deposit of \$988 million that Bullock put in the Treasury in February.

"There may be some clouds on the horizon for our state and national economies," Bullock said. "But the sun is still shining in Texas and Texans are making hay while it does."

Bullock said part of May's record tax payments came from quarterly prepayments made by the state's largest taxpayers along with month-end minerals tax collections. Major taxpayers have an incentive to prepay taxes they collect because they are allowed to retain a percentage of collections for paying early and allowing the state

to begin earning interest on the funds.

Bert Wallace, director of the Comptroller's Revenue Processing Division, said he has expected tax collections to top the billion dollar mark for several months. Monthly collections during 1982 have been running about 20 percent higher than last year's, Wallace said.

The month's total passed \$1 billion with the Comptroller's final May deposit to the Treasury on the 28th, Wallace said.

### THE UNFORGETTABLE MARIGOLD

by Ted Brice, Garden Editor

The Marigold is among the most popular flowers in the United States. They are exceedingly easy to grow and require little attention. Their colors range from white, bronze, yellow, maroon and orange.

All marigolds are descendants of the wild Mexican species. They have been hybridized to produce four separate types. The African or sometimes referred to as the Aztec Marigold is the tallest variety ranging from 18 inches to three feet with double blooms in a ball shape of 3 to 5 inches. These Marigolds resemble Chrysanthemums.

Then we have the French Marigolds which are usually a low growing variety ranging from six to 18 inches tall with one to two inch single and double blooms. Next we have the African-French Marigolds which are hybrids ranging from 12 to 18 inches. These flowers are usually double two to three inches in diameter born on very sturdy stems.

We also have the dwarf Marigolds which usually run about 12 inches tall and are topped with masses of single yellow or orange flowers measuring about one inch in diameter. In this variety we find the foliage to be fern like and much finer than the other varieties. Many Marigolds have a brushing scent which is strong to some people and unpleasant while being attractive to others. There are some Marigolds that are odorless.

There are many ways to

use the Marigold in the garden. Their vivid color mass planted in beds produce a color spectacular from summer to frost. The taller ones can make good hedges. In Central America the Marigold is grown for chicken feed. When the blooms of the yellow Marigolds are fed to the chickens the hens will lay eggs with a darker yellow yoke.

Scientists have proved that the parasitic worm (nematode) vanishes where Marigolds are planted. Marigolds grow well in ordinary soil but need sunlight. They can be started inside from seed and set out after the danger of freezes are past. They can also be set out

as bedding plants or the seed can be planted directly in the garden. It takes the seed about five days to germinate.

Dwarf varieties may be planted 6 to 10 inches apart with taller varieties 12 to 24 inches apart. Keep your blooms cut and the plant will reward you with new blooms until frost. If you are going to cut some of the strong smelling variety cut them early in the day and arrange them outside.

## 'Uncle Jesse' Attends Barbecue In Eastland

Approximately 75 people with interests in the oil industry attended a barbecue Monday night, given at the home of Gene and Patsy Clift to welcome Denver Pyle and Otis Johnson to the area, and to generate new acquaintances.

Mr. Pyle, Uncle Jesse on the Dukes of Hazzard T.V. Show, and Otis Johnson are co-founders of Otis Energy Production, with headquarters in Denver, Colorado.

The Company was founded ten years ago while Mr. Otis was drilling on land leased by Mr. Pyle during the time he was filming "Grizzly Adams."

Their beginning can be traced to a trade the two men made, exchanging a beautiful sovereign Navajo necklace Mr. Pyle owned for 1,000 feet of a well Mr. Otis was drilling. It was finalized by a handshake. The well came in just past 1,000 feet.

He also supervises this area which includes Eastland, Stephens, Shackelford and Calhoun counties. The company plans on expanding their drilling fleet under his direction.

They also operate rigs in the rockies and the mid-continent areas.

Both Mr. Pyle and Mr. Otis are very high on the Eastland area, and plan to keep their operation here going strong.

"We feel there is great potential here to recover oil and gas at economical discovery cost," they both said.

"May this courthouse stand too, as a Hall of Justice where differences are settled in the courtroom rather than on a battlefield."

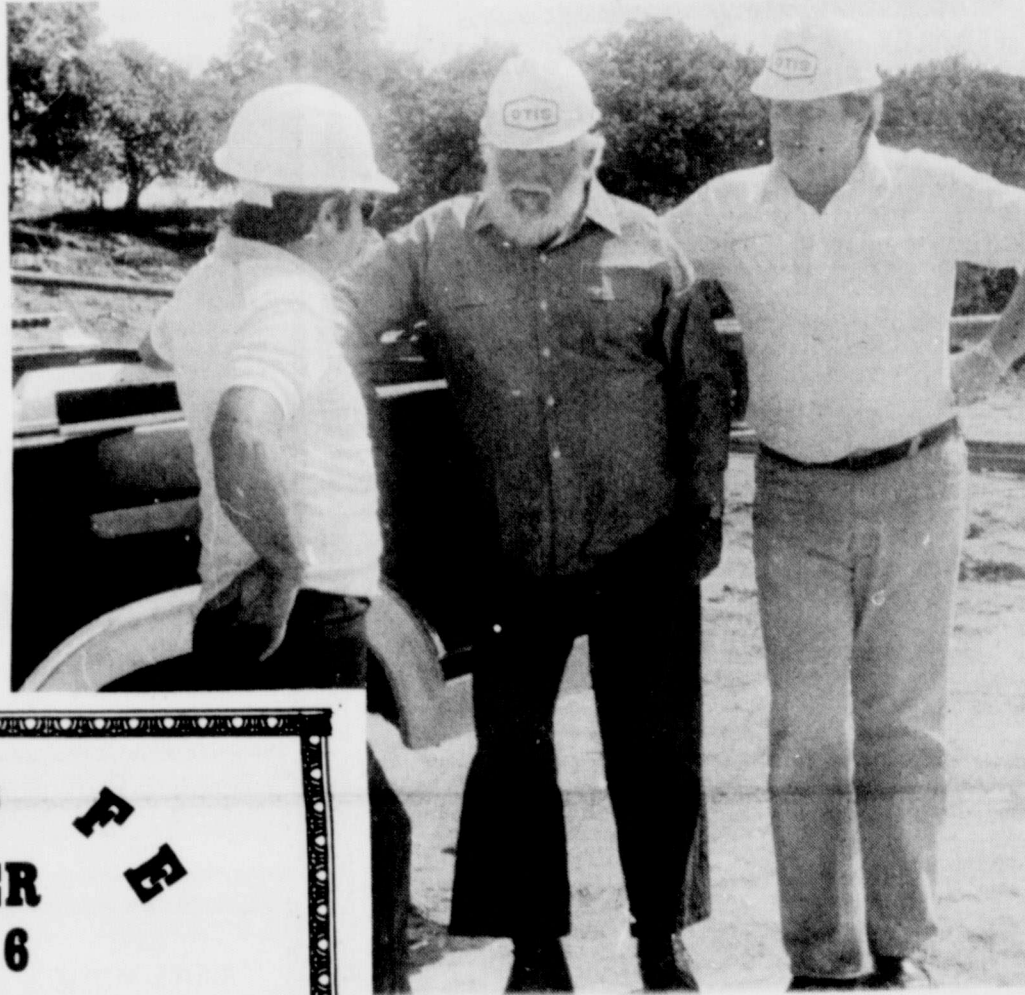

# Cash Flow Planning and Adjustments

During 1982, farmers and ranchers are skeptical about the chances of realizing an economic profit from most agricultural enterprises. As a matter-of-fact, the combination of the drought year of 1980, the low 1981 market prices and the dim price prospects of 1982 have numerous producers concerned with a continuing cash-flow bind.

Successful farm management involves the correct combination of marketing, financing and production decisions along with some luck. The survival of some agricultural producers in 1982 and later years will depend upon how effectively they plan and manage the business cash flow. Effective planning of the business cash flow will require the integration of marketing, financing and production considerations.

During the last few weeks, Eastland County crop producers continued with planting preparations and have planted grain sorghum. The planting of cotton and peanuts is rapidly approaching. Cash flow budgets prepared earlier this year are leading to actual cash flow statements, as dollars are spent in producing 1982 commodities.

As slack time periods come about, the farm manager should consider updating a copy of the business cash flow budget. Such corrections converts the cash flow budget to a statement of actual dollars removed from the business "cash tank" for payment of production items. From a producer and lender viewpoint, the real managerial significance is in the projections made in the cash flow budget and the financial control which results when the actual cash flow is compared with the projected cash flow.

At the time of completing a statement of cash flow for the recent past, most producers will recognize needed adjustments in the cash flow projections for the remainder of the year. Since the original cash flow projection was probably completed several weeks or months ago, new or improved information is now available and additional decisions have been made. To illustrate, revisions in cash flow projections at this point in time reflect refinements in fertilizer rates actually applied or to be applied, acreage reduction decisions, lease

and rental adjustments, last minute changes in the crop mix, insect control on small grains and more accurate estimates of crop and livestock marketings.

Even though many producers and lenders may have worksheets for cash flow planning, Eastland County Extension agents have two financial management publications for free distribution: (1) "Annual Operating Budget and Credit Plan" (MP-1240) is designed for summarizing the quantities, cost and dates of expenditures for operating and capital items as well as the expected dates and revenues from the marketing of commodity and capital items. The publication also contains a cash flow projection worksheet by months. (2) The other publication entitled "Financial Record-Agriculture" (L-1410) is a valuable tool for summarizing and analyzing the past performance and financial condition of the business.

The supporting documents available in this publication could provide essential information for completing the business cash flow projection. See your local county

Extension agent to obtain a copy of these financial management publications for your continued farm financial planning.
