Convention Report Is Given To Lions

A report on the District 2E-1 band that represented this region of Texas at the convention of Lions International in Atlanta, Ga., June 28-July 2 was given by Chairman Al Young and Misses Sue Scott and Tracey Couch at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday noon.

Mr. Young, who organized the district band and served as chairman of the project for the second year, told Lions that some 22,000 persons appeared in the convention parade. There was a Texas State Lions Club Band of 150 pieces, and District 2E-1 was the only Texas region represented at the convention and in the parade.

The district band of 55 pieces spent three days at H-SU to practice playing and marching together under the supervision of Doug Kincaid, Abilene High School band director, and Mr. Young. Students stayed in H-SU dormitories during the three days. They made the trip to Atlanta by chartered bus along with five adult sponsors.

Mr. Young reported that Texans were particularly vocal and proud as Ebb Grindstaff, Ballinger Lion, took office as president of Lions International. He said Mr. Grindstaff has an ambitious program for the year that features the eye bank and blind benefit projects.

The 1983 convention will be held in Hawaii, Mr. Young said, and he has been authorized by district leaders to begin work to organize a band for a trip there.

Misses Scott and Couch were introduced and told Lions that they thoroughly enjoyed the trip, meeting interesting people from throughout the world, and "enjoying a very memorable experience."

The district band was invited to play a 15-minute concert at a barbecue gathering of Texas Lions during the convention, Miss Scott reported. The concert was so well received that the band was given a standing ovation and was invited to play for 30 more minutes.

Would the two Cisco girls like to attend next year's convention as members of a district band, Miss Couch, the club sweetheart, was asked? "Would we ever!" was her answer.

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Weed Ordinance Will Be Enforced

Letters will begin going out soon to property owners in violation of the City of Cisco's ordinance regarding grass and weeds on vacant lots, City Manager Mike Moore reported Friday.

The letters will notify owners of such property that they have ten days in which to comply with the ordinance. If no action has been taken at the end of the period, city workers and equipment will be sent in to do the work and the property owners will be sent a bill.

Mr. Moore said use of the city's tractor will cost property owners \$25 per hour plus \$7.50 per hour for labor

plus a \$10 administrative fee plus a \$10 penalty. The minimum charge for an hour's mowing time would be \$52.50.

The city will charge an additional \$50 if a truck and men are required to pick up and haul trash and debris before the mowing work, Mr. Moore reported.

"We are interested in the appearance and the health conditions of our city," Mr. Moore said. "Tall grass and weeds along with debris provide mosquitoes and insects with breeding grounds that can be eliminated. We will appreciate the cooperation of property owners."

Council Will Consider Street Widening And Parking Meters

A minute order of the Texas Highway Department for widening Conrad Hilton Avenue from IH-20 north to 12th Street will be studied, the city's parking meters will be discussed and an application for an oil drilling permit will be considered when the City Council holds its regular meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 13, City Manager Mike Moore reported Friday.

The widening of Hilton

avenue was proposed by the Highway Department several weeks ago, and the Council gave tentative approval, which permitted the department to continue plans for the project.

To authorize work on the project, which calls for widening the street eight feet on each side, the Council would have to adopt a resolution of acceptance, Mr. Moore said.

Any one interesting in be-

ing heard for or against the project was asked to attend the meeting. In a similar project several years ago, Hilton avenue was widened from 12th Street north to West 8th Street.

The Council will consider a suggestion that the downtown parking meters be removed, Mr. Moore said. The matter came up about six months ago and the parking meter ordinance has not been enforced during that

time. Results of a questionnaire sent out to business firms will be reported to the Council. Anyone wishing to express an opinion was invited to be present.

Propositions to lease or drill oil wells on city land, including the Mitchell Airport, will be on the agenda for consideration, the city manager said. The Council also will ask the Missouri & Pacific Railroad for a right-of-way easement for the new sewer outfall line.

Disaster Relief Drill Planned For July 14th

The City of Cisco and the E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital will hold a mock disaster drill at an unspecified time on Wednesday, July 14, according to an announcement Friday.

The drill will be conducted by hospital employees, ambulance personnel, city police and volunteer firemen who will respond to a simulated tornado disaster, City Manager Mike Moore reported. Mr. Moore and Hospital Administrator

Helen Orr will direct the operation.

There will be 15 injury victims in the disaster area, and Cisco Boy Scouts and student nurses will play the part of the victims. A State Health Department official will be here to observe the operation and to evaluate the drill results, Mr. Moore said.

"We will need the cooperation of all citizens," Mr. Moore said. "We want everyone except authorized personnel to stay away from

the site of the simulate disaster. Men will be on duty to discourage people from entering the area."

City Councilman Bobby Ingram will assist officials in evaluation work and monitoring the work of personnel.

"This will be a test of our people and facilities," the city manager said. "The object of the drill is to acquaint personnel of their duties in the event of a real disaster. This type of program is being encouraged throughout the state."

GOOD THINGS around Knoxville, in addition to the Fair:

Oak Ridge, Tenn., the American Museum of Science & Energy, just a few miles off I-40 before you get to Knoxville.

The museum, operated by the Dept. of Energy, opened in 1949 in an old wartime cafeteria. The new facility opened in 1975 and continues to provide energy information to the public.

As visitors pass the guard-tower, they are drawn back to the early days of the super secret Manhattan Project, the development of nuclear energy, and the birth of Oak Ridge.

The museum gives a good history of the project, and shows in an exciting way, progress that's being made today with the atom.

It's a good visit.

in the sale and manufacture of native craft items. You can see 'em working in over 300 shops. The town also means music, shows and excitement. In the winter it's a ski resort.

SMOKY MOUNTAINS--state line for Tennessee and North Carolina bisect the 500,000 acres which have been preserved and protected in the Park. For 36 miles along the main crest has an altitude in excess of 5,000 feet, with 16 peaks over 6,000.

About 40 percent of the Park is maintain in its original forest state. More than 1,300 tree, shrub and flowering plant varieties illustrate the fact that as far as vegetation is concerned, you make an extended 1,000 mile journey from the mid-South of Canada when you drive from Gatlinburg to the top of the Smokies.

They'd be a rapture to visit in the early spring with wild flower in bloom, or in fall when the foliage turns.

Over the Smokies into North Carolina, stop at the Pioneer Farmstead, where you'll visit a typical pioneer homestead where most of our ancestors who had come down the valleys from Pennsylvania and Virginia, up from the lowlands of North and South Carolina, to carve out a new territory, and finding the Cherokee Indians. Most of these early settlers were Scotch-Irish, an adventurous people who learned

from the Cherokee, to "make do or do without." When most of the Indians were forced-moved west, the settlers stayed to whit out a living with the basic necessities: water, shelter and food.

The sample farm explains a great deal in how they did it.

On into Cherokee Reservation and at the town of Cherokee you learn the heart-breaking story of the "removal" when most, but not all of the Cherokees were forced-marched to new land in Oklahoma. You can see them as they lived in the 18th century Indian village here. We were too early for the outdoor drama "Unto These Hills," about the routing of the tribe.

Just out of Cherokee is the beginning of the Blue Ridge Parkway, a unit of the National Park System, which extends 469 miles through the southern Appalachians, linking the Great Smoky Mountains National Park to the Shenandoah National Park in northern Virginia. You can join and leave the Parkway at many points: we stayed with it up to Balsam Mountain for a family picnic, overlooking the Smokies, and returned to the "low-lands", through Maggie's Valley and onto I-40 into Asheville, N.C., where we visited the Biltmore House and Gardens.

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
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Finance Committee Initiates Tax Bill

Under the leadership of Chairman Robert Dole (R-KS), the Senate Finance committee initiating the Congressional process to draft a 21 billion tax bill for federal consumption during the nation's coming fiscal year.

The eleven Republicans members of the Committee agreed in caucus to attempt independent producers from the minimum tax proposal feature, which erodes intangible drilling cost (IDC) expensing by 15 percent. In addition, percentage depletion was exempted from the proposal.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen has also given full support to the exemption of independent producers and percentage depletion. The Senator spoke during Committee hearings in June, defending IDC ex-

pending and percentage depletion for their role in encouraging domestic drilling activity.

The next step in the Congressional process will unfold later this month on the Senate floor. Other proposals include ad valorem tax measures for domestic reserves, and various excise or Btu value taxes on oil products and crude oil. The two-barrel-per-day exemption from the windfall profit tax for royalty owners is also under attack. There are some who believe that if this modest tax break is lost, the industry is in serious trouble in all taxation fronts.

All citizens should contact members of Congress and let them know their feelings on oil taxation. Decisions of this nature vitally affect the local as well as state economy.

Total drilling depth was 1,165-feet, and the pay zone was entered at 1,126-feet, the well was perforated to produce from an interval 1,126 to 1,130-feet into the hole.

Nimrod Operating Co. of Cisco has also posted initial production figures for the No. 1 Maxwell, new oil well in the Hawk-Eye Field, 1.25 miles southwest of Romney. Ceiling Price Being Considered

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission is reported to be on the verge of publishing to set a "floating ceiling price" for gas qualifying for special incentives under NGPA (Natural Gas Price Act) section 107.

A cap of 65 percent to 75 percent of refinery acquisition costs for crude oil is being considered. This would currently approximate 150 percent of the section 103 price. Thus tight sands prices, which are now capped at 200 percent of section 103, would generally be rolled back. It is not known whether an attempt will be made to reduce prices for existing wells in addition to prices for production from wells drilled in the future.

Homemaking Hints

With summer here which means higher utility bills for cooling your home, many families are considering ways to save on their cooling bills. The Texas Energy Extension Service newsletter provides some good guidelines to consider if you are interested in buying a ceiling fan. Here are some tips on what to look for in considering a ceiling fan purchase:

1. Determine how many years you plan to use the fan. A cheaper plastic motor housing will suffice if you plan to use it only 2-3 years.

2. Do not be overly concerned with whether blades are wood or plastic because blade material is a fairly minor consideration.

3. Remember that fans with a metal housing usually last longer and are quieter than those with a plastic motor housing.

4. Remember that fans with sealed bearings may eliminate the need for periodic oiling, but fans requiring oiling have proven reliability and length of service.

5. Check warranties when purchasing a fan. The better fans usually carry a 5 year warranty.

6. Consider the diameter of the blades because the wider the diameter, generally the more air movement the fan will provide. A 48-inch or 52-inch fan should be considered for a den or living room, but an average sized bedroom can probably manage with a 36-inch fan.

7. Check into installation costs; they can run a high as the actual cost of the fan.

8. Remember that the brass and other decorative features do not add to the

cooling power of the fan and increase the cost significantly.

With central air conditioning can I block off unused rooms by closing the louvers and directing the cold air to other rooms?

The Texas Energy newsletter states that contrary to what most people think, blocking off the vents in unused rooms will not save you much money on your utility bills. In fact, it can actually be harmful because the blocked cool air can cause mold and fungus to grow on the closed louvers.

Another energy related question that we often hear is that air conditioning in automobiles will reduce gas mileage significantly.

Both air conditioning and open windows can decrease gas mileage. American Automobile Association (AAA) tests reveal that fuel economy improves 5 percent to 14 percent when air conditioning is not used. The air conditioner should be used carefully and sparingly.

On the other hand, open window can create a wind drag that can also reduce mileage. According to one source, sun roofs can contribute substantially to this problem.

The driver must then determine when it is most efficient to use air conditioning, despite the added weight of an air-conditioner which may decrease fuel efficiency somewhat. The drag created by driving at 55 mph with open windows can consume more fuel than using the air

conditioner with the windows shut at least for some model cars. The least desirable time to use the air conditioner is in stop-and-go traffic.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Fresh peaches pineapple, cantaloupe, water melon pears, strawberries are now in season. What could be more delicious than a fruit salad. This week I am featuring a fruit salad dressing that is very and one I recommend.

HONEY DRESSING

4 T. Sugar
1 T. Salt
1 T. Paprika
1 T. Dry mustard
1/4 T. Pepper (optional)
1/4 Cup fresh lemon juice
3/4 Cup oil (any kind for salads)

1/2 T. Scraped onion with juice

1/2 Cup Honey
1 T. Poppy seed

Combine first 6 ingredients and dissolve sugar, shake in a jar. (I warm this enough to dissolve sugar and salt-seems faster). Add remaining ingredients and shake in a jar vigorously until thoroughly blended and chill before serving. Makes about 1 1/2 cups. Just before serving fruit, carefully pour over the fruit and gently toss to coat fruit. This dressing will get thick when chilled.

I've poured it over the fruit (while fruit is in a mixing bowl) and gently toss fruit - then put the fruit in a watermelon bowl or a salad bowl lined with lettuce leaves, if it is a buffet meal. It can be served with the dressing on it. Put the dressing on just before serving.

Helmers, Horticulturist at the A and M Research and Extension Center in Stephenville. "This large acreage of mostly unmanaged pecans sets the market for pecans each year, depending on whether they produce a crop or not."

"Eastland County has about fifteen thousand acres of these trees," says DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent. "They grow along the forks of the Leon River, on the Sabanna, and various creeks. That is much larger than the 2,250 acres in budded and grafted orchards. In a good year, all the orchards can produce as much as 960,000 lbs."

"Eight or ten landowners harvest the natives on an annual basis, and 35 or 40 more sell them at times."

"No two of these native pecans are ever alike," explains Gordon. "Each is an individual variety. There are many variations in size, shape, and shell coloring among the wild pecans here."

"Generally the native nuts are smaller in size than the grafted or budded variety, and have a thicker shell. The larger varieties of pecans, however, were produced by locating a good native tree, then propagating it - or in some cases, crossing it."

"The most famous, of course, is the Burkett pecans, which originated from a native tree in this locality."

"In some places in Texas, such as down the Colorado River and at Temple, some of the native pecan trees have been dated as being

four and five hundred years old. The Eastland County trees may not be that old, but some are probably several hundred."

"A pecan tree apparently never dies of 'old age'. Generally lightening finally strikes it, or high winds break off limbs. The drought of 1980 - which is extremely high temperatures - caused some of the Eastland County natives to die."

Gordon explains that there have been problems with making native pecans profitable in Eastland County.

"The price factor is one of the main things. Almost all of the native nuts go to the 'shellers' for commercial use, and must be marketed in that way. When there is a large native crop, the price is generally low. Last year,

for example, it was .32 cents per pound to the grower - hardly enough to pay for picking them up. This year it appears that the crop will be light."

"In order to turn a native grove into a paying proposition a lot of work and expense is involved. There is the expense of thinning out the trees, evaluating and saving the ones with the best nuts. Then the land must be cleared, and a spray-management program started."

"It costs about \$10,000 to set up mechanical harvesting equipment, so most owners of native groves just sell the crop on the trees to pecan buyers, who then take the responsibility for harvesting."

The native pecans, say Gordon, will cross-pollinate with budded and grafted trees in an orchard, thus changing the characteristics of the offspring of the natives. He refers to budding and grafting as "cloning", which is the only way to get an exact duplicate of a tree.

With all the groves around, it appears that the native pecan trees of Eastland County will continue to furnish beauty, shade, and a certain character to the land around here. They will also furnish good food for man and beast and fowl - sometimes more to the wild creatures than to the person who hopes to harvest them!

No wonder that all varieties of the native pecan trees are sometimes lumped under the colorful local name of "Squirrel's Delight"!

White Grubs Can Be Controlled if Gotten in July

One of the most common problems of turfgrass in Texas is damage caused by the feeding of white grubs. White grubs are the larval stages of June Beetles. They also feed on agricultural crops such as corn, sorghum and sugar cane.

It is the white grub stage which causes lawn damage during the summer and fall by feeding on the roots. Feeding of large numbers of grubs causes lawns to turn yellow in the affected areas.

Positive identification of the damage is possible when the yellow grass can be lifted easily from the ground.

The grubs become dormant through the winter months living on fat reserves. In the spring the grub resumes feeding on organic matter. The grub pupates (rests) for three weeks and then emerges as an adult ready to mate.

Major adult flights occur at different times of the year depending on the geographic

location of the state. This is important, as it determines the critical treatment period. The flight period, in which adults are active, lasts about 1½ weeks. After mating, the egg laying period averages 30 days. The egg will hatch in three or four weeks.

It is important to treat for white grubs while they are in an early stage of development, the critical treatment period. Larger grubs are difficult to control because of

their size and the difficulty of getting enough insecticide down through the lawn. The critical treatment period is about four to six weeks after egg lay. In this area it arrives during late July or early August. Lawns suspected of being infested with white grubs should be inspected during the critical treatment period. Lawns can be checked by cutting and digging 1-square-foot sections of sod and examining the roots and soil to a depth of four inches.

Sod and soil should be replaced and watered in. Take several samples at different locations in the lawn.

Treatment is usually recommended when more than four ¼ to ½-inch grubs per square foot are found. Insecticides recommended for grub control are much less effective against eggs and large grubs than against small grubs. The toxicity of these insecticides is greatly reduced two to four weeks after application. Thus, insecticides applied too early may not be effective in the soil after the eggs hatch.

Granular forms of Diazinon or Dursban are recommended for the control of white grubs. Granular forms of insecticide should be watered in with ½ to 1 inch of water.

Blister Beetles Pose Serious Threat to Area Cattle

Blister beetles can be a serious problem to different classes of livestock, but their toxicity is most severe in horses, notes an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Blister Beetle poisoning in horses is manifested as a severe colic. The toxic chemical produced in the beetle causes severe blistering of the mucus lining of the animal's digestive tract and other internal tissues. A horse that eats two to five beetles, usually in hay, can die within 12 to 24 hours. So producers should check fields for the beetles before cutting hay.

The soybean market could improve later this year if soybean meal use increases due to gains in hog and broiler production, notes an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. However, soybean supplies are up from a year ago, and U.S. Farmers plan to increase plantings this year. This will keep pressures on prices which

stood at \$5.84 a bushel on April 15, down from \$7.50 a year ago. Soybean oil supplies in the U.S. could exceed last year's record unless both domestic use and exports increase sharply. Brazil and Argentina are heavy exporters of soybean oil.

The attorney general, who is the state's legal counsel, says the governor insisted that the Houston firm be hired to represent the state in the federal government's suit to force prison changes. Neither the governor nor the attorney general asked the Houston law firm what costs would be involved.

If you get right down to it, the federal government didn't have any business to tell Texas how to run its prison in the first place. In the second place, the governor shouldn't tell the attorney general to hire an outside lawyer, and in the third place the attorney general should do the job people elected him to do.

We can't give Clark or Clements anything but a failing grade for performance in this case.
