
At 710 E. 11th A residence at 710 East 11th Street was extensively damaged by fire that broke







WASHINGTON, D.C.-The House Agriculture Committee today (July 29) exceeded its goal for spending cuts called for by the First Budget Resolution and should serve as an example to other committees currently debating spending cuts, Congressman Charles W. Stenholm said.

"If every other committee acted in as conscientious a manner, great strides in reduction of federal spending would be made quickly," Stenholm, a two-term member of the Ag Committee, added.

The Ag Committee was directed by the First Budget Resolution to make savings in program spending of some \$779 million. Actual savings approved by the committee totaled \$1.3 billion, an additional savings of \$539 million

'Agriculture has taken more overall cuts than any other area of spending over the past few years," Stenholm said, "but there is a limit as to how far this one committee can go or how much one industry can bear. As far as I am concerned we would not cut one more penny until other committees prove that they are going to do their share. To date there

Texas D.P.S. Reports : 65 Deaths In 82 -**5 Deaths-74 Injuries Local**

The Texas Department of Public Safety reports that for the first six months of 1982, 65 persons have been killed in traffic accidents in the Ablilene district of the D.P.S. The Abilene district comprises 25 counties in this West Texas area including Eastland County. These 65 deaths were the result of 53 fatal accidents. For the same period in 1981, records indicate that 66 deaths resulted from 56 fatal accidents.

In Eastland County for the first six months of 1982, the D.P.S. has recorded five deaths out of four fatal accidents and 74 injuries as the result of 39 injury accidnts. D.P.S. troopers in Eastland County have investigated a total of 134 traffic accidents for the first six months of 1982.

For the same period in 1982, in Eastland County, D.P.S. records indicate that three deaths resulted from three fatal accidents and 44 injury accidents occurred with 64 persons injured. A total of 129 accidents occurred during the same period last year.

A survey of the fatal reports for the district shows that driving while intoxicated and speeding was listed as the contributing factor on more of the reports than any other single factor.

off. Leaves may yellow slightly and drop off, but heavy defoliation is not a characteristic symptom. Cultural controls can help

in preventing infection. Cultural controls include: 1) planting in a sunny area; 2) not crowding the plants; 3) avoid overhead watering; 4) pruning out and destroying heavily diseased braches; raking and destroying fallen leaves. Preventing infection of the new growth is important in controlling powdery mildew.

Chemicla applications should begin before new foliage is infected. Fungicides will protect foliage from infection but will not remove the dense,

white fungal growth from infected leaves. Bonoyml is the recommended fugicide for control of powdery mildew. Adding a wetting to the spray solution will greatly improve coverage. Liquid household detergents make good wetting agents when

one teaspoon is added for each gallon of spray solution. Crape myrtle and zinnias are also very susceptible to powdery mildew.

Euonymus is also attacked by many species of scale. The most common and destructive is the eyonymus scale. The males are narrow and white, and they cluster in great numbers on the leaves and stems. The females are rather dark brown and shaped somewhat like on oyster shell.

Treat the scale with insecticidal oils during the dormant season and with con-
