# Registration For Public Schools Will Begin Here This Week

Cisco Primary School registration will be held August 13th. The schedule is as follows:

First And Second Grades

All first and second graders are to register on Friday, August 13, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. The children already have their room assignment; therefore, go to their homeroom teacher to register. Only those who received a special letter in May need to bring the immunization record. Every first and second grader must have shots up-to-date before they can enroll for the

1982-83 school year.

New Students

If a student did not finish the 1981-82 school year in Cisco and will be a first or second grader in the Cisco Schools this year, please come by the Primary School on Tuesday, August 10, or Wednesday, August 11, to register and get a room assignment. Please bring immunization records and report card from the last year attended. Come to Mrs. Webb's room.

Kindergartners  
The boys and girls in the Cisco School District who

are now five or will be five on or before September 1, 1982, will register for kindergarten on August 13 at the Kindergarten Building. Registration will be from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. with kindergarten teachers, Mrs. Collins and Mrs. Denison.

But if a child's immunization records and certified birth certificate has not been checked by Mrs. Webb, go to her first before enrolling a child.

Parents and students may come by the Primary School any morning from 9-11 beginning August 9th

through August 12th to get their child's records checked.

Do not bring a hospital birth certificate. Parents must have a certified copy of the birth from the city hall of the town where their child was born, or the county seat courthouse, or the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin (if a Texan).

The shots required before a child can enroll in kindergarten are: 3 DPT (one has to be after the fourth birthday); 3 polio (one has to be after the fourth birthday); one measles, one mumps and one rubella, (sometimes these are given as one shot called the MMR).

All other kindergartners must see Mrs. Webb before registering.

All students of Cisco Intermediate School in grades 3, 4, 5 and 6 will need to register Friday, August 20, from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Students who attended school in Cisco last year will report to their homeroom teacher. (Names and room numbers will be posted in the hall.) All new students will need to come by the principal's office for room assignment and will need to bring a copy of their scholastic and immunization records from the school they last attended.

Classes begin Monday, August 23.

All students in the seventh through the 12th grades who plan to attend Cisco Junior-Senior High School this fall need to pre-register at the high school August 10 through August 13.

Students will be given a pre-registration packet and a class schedule which are to be returned the first day of school. Students are encouraged to come by the school on the date set for their particular grade level in order to avoid delays in scheduling.

The following dates and times for students to register are:

Tuesday, August 10-9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, seniors; 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. juniors.

Wednesday, August 11-9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, sophomores; 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. freshmen.

Thursday, August 12-9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, eighth grade; 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. seventh grade.

Friday, August 13-9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, late registration for all grades.

Classes will begin August 23 with all students (7-12) reporting to the high school auditorium at 8:05 a.m.

## Cong. Stenholm Reports Ag Committee Exceeds Spending Cut Requirement

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The House Agriculture Committee today (July 29) exceeded its goal for spending cuts called for by the First Budget Resolution and should serve as an example to other committees currently debating spending cuts, Congressman Charles W. Stenholm said.

"If every other committee acted in as conscientious a manner, great strides in reduction of federal spending would be made quickly," Stenholm, a two-term member of the Ag Committee, added.

The Ag Committee was directed by the First Budget Resolution to make savings in program spending of some \$779 million. Actual savings approved by the committee totaled \$1.3 billion, an additional savings of \$539 million.

"Agriculture has taken more overall cuts than any other area of spending over the past few years," Stenholm said, "but there is a limit as to how far this one committee can go or how much one industry can bear. As far as I am concerned we would not cut one more penny until other committees prove that they are going to do their share. To date there

has been no indication that they will do so."

Stenholm commended Ag Committee Chairman E. (Kika) de la Garza in his work on the reconciliation process, saying, "I can't give enough credit to de la Garza, because there is tremendous pressure to ignore the First Budget Resolution recommendations and continue with spending patterns of the past. That is where the budgetary process bogged down last year. Anytime a committee chairman is able not only to make recommended cuts, but to actually exceed those goals, it has to be considered something of a political miracle."

"Now we will see if other chairmen can come close to that achievement," Stenholm said.

Major changes in the

agriculture budget were recommended in areas affecting dairy, feed grains, wheat, cotton, rice and food stamps.

"The dairy provisions proved to be central," Stenholm said. "Without the initiative taken by the dairy industry itself to resolve problems caused by oversupply, our task would have been almost impossible. Revision of the dairy program not only accounted for a large portion of the total savings, but the industry's actions were the first critical step in rebuilding the farm coalition broken apart during debate on the farm bill last year. We have to have cooperation among all farm groups when we begin work on the next farm bill or we will all go down together."

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## Texas D.P.S. Reports : 65 Deaths In 82 — 5 Deaths-74 Injuries Local

The Texas Department of Public Safety reports that for the first six months of 1982, 65 persons have been killed in traffic accidents in the Abilene district of the D.P.S. The Abilene district comprises 25 counties in this West Texas area including Eastland County. These 65 deaths were the result of 53 fatal accidents. For the same period in 1981, records indicate that 66 deaths resulted from 56 fatal accidents.

In Eastland County for the first six months of 1982, the D.P.S. has recorded five deaths out of four fatal accidents and 74 injuries as the result of 39 injury accidents. D.P.S. troopers in Eastland County have investigated a total of 134 traffic accidents for the first six months of 1982.

For the same period in 1982, in Eastland County, D.P.S. records indicate that three deaths resulted from three fatal accidents and 44 injury accidents occurred with 64 persons injured. A total of 129 accidents occurred during the same period last year.

A survey of the fatal reports for the district shows that driving while intoxicated and speeding was listed as the contributing factor on more of the reports than any other single factor.

Euonymus is an evergreen shrub used in landscapes throughout Texas. In recent years the development of dwarf and variegated varieties have increased the use of Euonymus to add color and variety to the landscape.

However, this shrub can be troubled by disease and insect pests.

Powdery mildew is the most common and difficult disease to control on Euonymus. It forms a flat, whitish growth on the leaves which can easily be rubbed

## Homemaking Hints

Recently, I have received several telephone inquiries about "Starch Blocker Diets." The following information was printed in the May, 1982 issue of Nutrition Perspectives. The source is the University of California at Davis, Cooperative Extension Service.

A new weight reduction scheme hitting the market is a protein from kidney bean which reportedly blocks the digestion of dietary starch by blocking the starch-digesting enzyme,  $\alpha$ -amylase (ALPHA-Amylase).

The story is that "you can eat the starch food that you love... without gaining the starch calories from these foods" if you take with your meals pills containing the kidney bean protein.

Is there a scientific basis for the claims that such products are effective in weight control?

Experiment Station research from U.C. Davis indicates that there is no basis for such claims. Present evidence indicates that so called "Starch blockers" are only a very expensive source of dietary protein. It has yet to be verified that they are either safe or effective for weight control.

The Food & Drug Administration has asked more than 100 manufacturers and distributors of "starch blockers" to discontinue marketing them until scientific testing confirms the safety and efficiency of these weight management products.

Users of the products have complained to FDA of nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and stomach pains. Persons with diabetes should not depend on starch blockers in calculating their diets.

FDA has been refused specific information by manufacturers about the exact chemical composition of starch blockers. Information supporting claims of safety or effectiveness in weight control or weight reduction has not been provided to FDA. FDA is also concerned about the safety of longterm use of starch blockers, because of the lack of adequate safety testing data.

Some manufacturers assert that starch blockers are special dietary foods. However, because the claimed effect of these products is weight control or reduction by their action to block or interfere with digestion, they may affect the body's normal metabolism function. Under the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, a substance that is offered for a nonfood purpose and THAT alters a function of the body is classified as a drug, rather

than a food, even if it is derived from a vegetable product.

FDA, by letter, has asked the firms to discontinue marketing starch blockers and to provide the agency specific information about their manufacture and distribution.

Persons wishing to lose weight should follow a recommended reducing diet which provides adequate nutrition for good health. The Extension Service office has recommended weight reduction bulletins that are available free upon request.

If your garden is producing an abundance of Zucchini, here is a good recipe for a delicious relish.

### ZUCCHINI RELISH

- 10 cup ground zucchini squash
- 2 cups chopped green peppers
- 5 T. salt
- 4 cups ground or chopped onions
- 2 cups chopped sweet peppers (red) or pimento

Mix together and let stand overnight. Drain and rinse.

### MIX:

- 3 cups vinegar
- 2 teaspoons celery seed
- 1 teaspoon turmeric
- 4-1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon powdered mustard
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg

Bring to a boil; add drained relish and simmer for 30 minutes. Seal in hot jars. Process for 10 minutes in boiling water bath.

off. Leaves may yellow slightly and drop off, but heavy defoliation is not a characteristic symptom.

Cultural controls can help in preventing infection. Cultural controls include: 1) planting in a sunny area; 2) not crowding the plants; 3) avoid overhead watering; 4) pruning out and destroying heavily diseased branches; raking and destroying fallen leaves.

Preventing infection of the new growth is important in controlling powdery mildew. Chemicla applications should begin before new foliage is infected. Fungicides will protect foliage from infection but will not remove the dense, white fungal growth from infected leaves. Bonyomil is the recommended fungicide for control of powdery mildew. Adding a wetting to the spray solution will greatly improve coverage. Liquid household detergents make good wetting agents when

one teaspoon is added for each gallon of spray solution. Grape myrtle and zinnias are also very susceptible to powdery mildew.

Euonymus is also attacked by many species of scale. The most common and destructive is the euonymus scale. The males are narrow and white, and they cluster in great numbers on the leaves and stems. The females are rather dark brown and shaped somewhat like an oyster shell.

Treat the scale with insecticidal oils during the dormant season and with con-

ventional sprays (including summer oils) in the spring and summer. Chemicals recommended for control of scale include Malathion, Cygon<sup>®</sup>, Metasystox R<sup>®</sup>, and Sevin<sup>®</sup>. Thorough coverage is important for ef-

fective control. Applications should cover both sides of the leaves and all twigs and branches.
