

Killions End 13 Years Yrs. At Cisco Church

Sunday, Aug. 29 will be a milestone in the lives of Pastor O.T. and Vida Killion of Cisco. On that day Killion will give his last pastoral

sermon to the Assembly of God on West 7th St., ending 13 years of their ministry for the group. On Sept. 1 James R.

Fellers of Bogota, Tex. will become Pastor of the Assembly, and move to Cisco to assume his duties. The Killions have pioneered work for the Assemblies of God all across the southwest, raising up a number of Churches. Pastor Killion began evangelistic

work in 1927, and accepted his first pastorate at Wills Point, Texas.

He met his wife, Vida (Frazier) at an evangelistic meeting, and they were married in 1933. The couple have a daughter, Judge Dou Vena Kripe, who lives in Houston. They also have four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Vida Killion obtained a Ministerial license after her marriage, and was ordained in 1944. The young pastors established churches in Greenville, Trenton, Whitewright, Tom Bean, Sherman, Talco, and Paris, Texas. They also pastored churches in Los Angeles, Dallas, Texarkana, Sulphur Springs, Ballinger, and then Cisco. They began work with the Cisco Assembly in 1969.

In addition to other duties, the Killions held evangelist crusades in the churches, taught Teacher Training Classes, worked with Vacation Bible Schools and Young People's Activities and furnished music for a number of occasions. During WWII Pastor Killion was a contact chaplain for the Armed Forces. Vida Killion, with talent in writing, provided original skits and programs as well as material for publication in Church magazines.

The Killions have contributed much to community life in Cisco. They have worked with the Senior Citizen's programs, have provided regular weekly programs for the Nursing Home, and musical programs in the Church. Vida Killion is a member of the Cisco Writer's Club and the Cisco Music Study Club. Both Pastors are members of the A.A.R.P., Senior Citizens groups, and recently became Charter Members of the Assemblies of God Heritage Society.

Pastor Killion was appointed as a Municipal Court Judge by the late W.B. Wright, Sr. on June 8, 1974. He served as a Court Judge for eight years, leaving the office in May, 1982.



During his time he was on call 24 hrs. per day, and worked many hours of overtime. He stated that he hoped to do more than simply "punish" persons who broke

the law, but to also try to assist them in making a better way of life.

Pastor Killion is a Charter Member of the Texas Municipal Court Associa-

tion, and is also Chaplain of the Eastland County Law Association. He holds current membership in the National Association of Chiefs of Police, the International Academy of Criminology, and the Sheriff's Association of Texas.

One of the honors from his Church was an appointment to the office of Honorary Presbyter of the North Texas District of the Assemblies of God.

The Killions state that they have enjoyed their work with the Assembly of God in Cisco, and they have also enjoyed their many other friends in the area.

All these people have a

host of varied memories of the Pastors. Memories that include how Pastor O.T. helped plan and build the spacious Fellowship Hall on the Cisco Church building, and how he was often painting, remodeling, and cleaning up something. And his flowers - what beautiful flowers the Pastor raised in his yards! And Vida Killion - the good food she seemed to always be taking somewhere - and her graceful piano music at the Senior Center luncheons. Most of all they think of the kindness and hospitality given so freely by the couple.

This will be very hard to replace.

County Dove Season Starts September 1

Opening day for mourning dove hunting in Eastland County - which is listed in the North Zone of Texas - is Sept. 1. This year, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has standardized season lengths for all management units at 70 days, which gives Texas hunters 10 more hunting days than they were allowed last season. In the North Zone, the change will allow a winter season set for Jan. 1-10, 1983, in addition to the Sept. 1 Oct. 30 regular season. The daily bag limit for mourning doves remains unchanged at 12 per day and 24 in possession. Shooting hours for mourning doves is 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset.

Allye Terrell Wins In Writers Contest

Allye Terrell, Cisco author, has had a recent honor and a recent acceptance of an article for publication. She won "Honorable Mention" for an article called "Educate A Woman", which she entered in a nationwide contest sponsored by the Rocky Mountain Writer's Guild, Englewood, Colorado. 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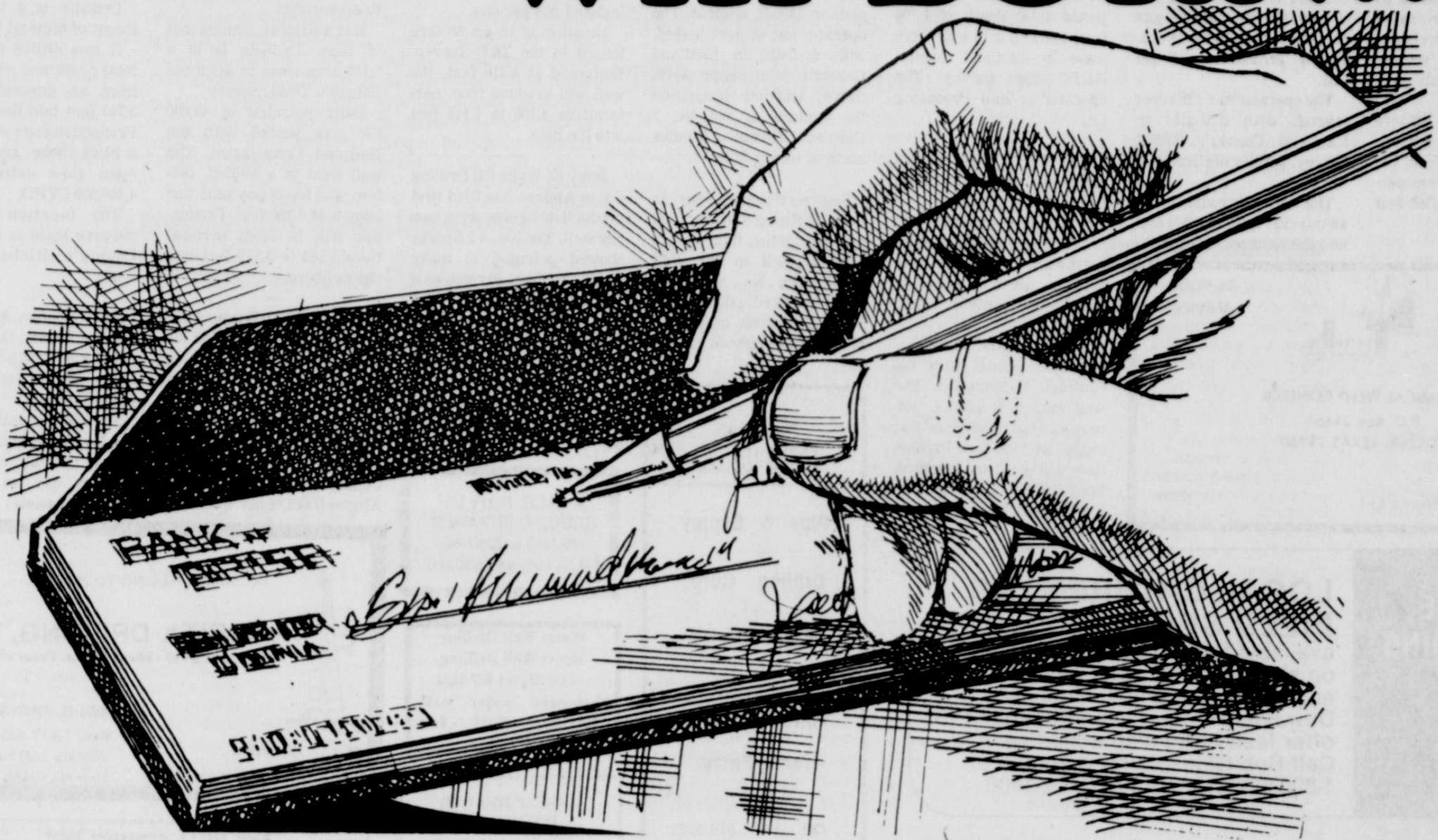

Oil and Gas Report

At a location 2 miles North of Ranger, Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge has finished a new oil producer in Eastland County's northwest Ranger Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Thomas, flowing oil at the rate of 81 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for 84,000 cubic feet of gas per day.

Location is in an 82-acre lease in the BBB&C Survey. Bottomed at 3,450 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,326 to 3,348 feet into the hole.

Petrolero Exploration, Inc. of Abilene has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Eastland Regular Field. The No. 1 Scott "A" showed potential to make 38 barrels of oil and 300,000 CF casinghead gas per day on a 18/64 choke. Tubing pressure in at 125 PSI.

The operator has 125 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's SPRR Survey, 2 miles northwest of Cisco.

The well will produce from an interval 3,471 to 3,500 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,098 feet.

An Eastland-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Kinnebrew, a wildcat to be located 2 miles west of Eastland. With projected total depth of 1,700 feet, the well is in a 320-acre lease in Eastland County, H&TC A309 survey. The operator is Ball Producing Co.

The No. 2 W.R. Layton Heirs was finished by EnRe Corp. of San Antonio.

It is a developmental well in the TeeJay Field, 12 miles northwest of Cisco. Drillsite is in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's TE&L Survey.

Daily potential of 28 barrels was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 4,050-ft. bottom, and top of pay zone was logged at 3,990 feet. Production will be from perforations 3,990 to 4,001 feet into the wellbore.

At a location 3 miles north of Ranger, Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge has finished a new oil producer in Eastland County's Northwest Ranger Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Wagstaff, flowing oil at the rate of 20 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for 80,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas per day.

Location is in a 50-acre lease in the F.M. Harms A-161 Survey. Bottomed at 3,525 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,396 to 3,436 feet into the hole.

Lyles Energy, Inc. of Ore City has revealed plans to drill an 1800-ft. wildcat. The operator has 40 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's John Snapp A-435 Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 1 Dolores. Drillsite is 6 miles north of Rising Star.

Southeastern Resources Corp. of Rising Star has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the JMJ Field. The No. 4 Claude Hearn showed potential to make 10 barrels of oil and 45,000 CF casinghead gas per day.

The operator has 160 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, 8 miles northeast of Cisco.

The well will produce from an interval 3,455 to 3,457 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 3,970 feet.

At a location 15 miles southeast of Breckenridge, Ben F. Hobbs of Breckenridge has finished a new oil producer in Stephens County.

The well is designated as the No. 1-G E.E. Langford-G, flowing oil at the rate of 30 barrels per day. The well also showed potential for 48,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas per day.

Location is in an 80-acre lease in the T&P Survey. Bottomed at 4,410 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,108 to 4,148 feet into the hole.

Jerry E. Wylie Oil Drilling Co. of Abilene has filed first production figures on a new gas well. The No. A 2 Sparks showed potential to make 83,000 CF of gas per day on a 3/8 choke. Absolute open flow estimated at 95,000 CFPD.

The operator has 200 acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's T&P Survey, 6 miles north of Caddo.

The well will produce from an interval 4,008 to 4,138 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,534 feet.

A 3,300-ft. developmental well is planned by Petroleum Corp. of Texas of Breckenridge at a drillsite within the Breckenridge city limits, Stephens County. The location is in a 42-acre lease in the LAL Survey. Well's designation is the No. 6 Rosenquest. It is in the Stephens County Regular Field.

The No. 3 Ed Ford "A" was finished by Petroleum Corp. of Texas of Breckenridge.

It is a wildcat, 5 miles east of Ivan. Drillsite is in a 1,120-acre lease in Stephens County's TE&L Survey.

Daily potential of 45,000 CF was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 4,403-ft. bottom, and top of pay zone was logged at 3,160 feet. Production will be from perforations 3,162 to 3,179 feet into the wellbore.

International Western Oil Corp. of Dallas has filed for permit to drill the No. 1-A Kimmell O'Conner, a 3,400-ft. developmental well 10 miles northwest of Leary. Location is in a 160-acre lease in Stephens County's T&P Survey. The Kimmell O'Conner well is in

the Manning-O'Conner Oil and Gas Field.

A Dallas-based operator has staked location for the No. 1 Puckett Creek, a wildcat to be located 12 miles northwest of Breckenridge. With projected total depth of 4,600 feet, the well is in a 240-acre lease in Stephens County's Stephens County Regular Field, TE&LA - 490 Survey. The operator is Eldorado Oil & Gas, Inc.

Flowing 2,300,000 CF of gas per day, the No. 1 Kizer was completed successfully in the Kessler Field by RAW Energy Corporation of Weatherford.

Drillsite is 2 miles northeast of Mineral Wells.

It was drilled to 4,575 ft. total depth and will produce from an interval 3,704 to 3,746 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on a 20/64 choke, and absolute open flow estimated at 4,400,000 CFPD.

The location is in a 304-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's Richard Starr A-392.

At a location 5 1/2 miles south of Brazos, Dallas Trust Co. of Fort Worth has finished a new gas producer in Palo Pinto County.

The well is designated as the No. A-2 Sparks, flowing gas at the rate of 1,240,000 CF per day on a 1-inch choke. Absolute open flow

estimated at 1,292,000 CFPD.

Location is in a 160-acre lease in the J.W. Clark A-831 Survey. Bottomed at 4,359 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,317 feet to 4,322 feet into the hole.

A 2,000 ft. wildcat is planned by Mike Becher of Louisburg, Kansas at a drillsite 10 miles northeast of Strawn, Palo Pinto County. The location is in a 210-acre lease in the T&P Survey. Well's designation is the No. 1 Riebe.

Richard D. Atkins of Midland has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Kessler Field. The No. 1 Barnes showed potential to make 324,000 CF gas per day on a 16/64 choke. Absolute open flow was estimated at 360,000 CFPD.

The operator has 20 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's T&P Survey, 4 miles southeast of Mineral Wells.

The well will produce from an interval 3,714 to 3,734 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 3,896 feet.

The No. 1 Riebe was finished by RAW Energy of Weatherford.

It is a wildcat, 10 miles north of Strawn. Drillsite is in a 465-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T&P Survey.

Daily potential of 100,000 CF was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to 3,995-ft. bottom, and top of pay zone was logged at 3,734 feet. Production will be from perforations 3,734 to 3,738 feet into the wellbore.

Dubco Drilling, Inc. of Graham has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 Wilbar, a 1,800-ft. developmental well to be located 2 miles West of Gordon. Location is in a 40-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's James Latham Survey. The Wilbar well is in the Palo Pinto Reg. Oil and Gas Field.

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Tickets For Lions Club Benefit Bowl Are On Sale

Tickets for the Fifth Annual Lions Club Benefit Football Bowl went on sale today according to Gary Hamil of the Breckenridge Lions, chairman of this year's game. Lions from the local clubs will be selling the tickets for the big grudge match between Cisco Junior College and Ranger Junior College to be played Saturday, September 25th, at 7:30 p.m. at Buckaroo Stadium in Breckenridge.

The Benefit Bowl has grown into one of the biggest charity fund raising projects among area Lions and this year promises to be even bigger. Lions from Breckenridge, Carbon, Cisco, Ranger, Albany, Baird, Clyde and Eastland will participate.

During the last four years close to \$25,000 has been raised by the Benefit Bowl for Lions charities. This money has gone to the Texas Lions Camp for Crippled, Blind and Diabetic Children, The District 2F-1 Eye Bank, the Lions-CARE program, the Lions International Foundation and local Lions projects.

The football game also has all of the makings of being the best ever. Ranger rolled up six victories in 1978 and 1979 en route to their two best seasons in history, victories in the Beef Bowl and Rodeo Bowls, a national championship and a 21 game

winning streak. That streak came to an end in 1980 at the hands of Cisco in the Benefit Bowl. Cisco used that momentum to propel themselves to their finest season in recent memory, and a national ranking. Last year Ranger rebounded with a victory after a hard fought contest.

To say there is bad blood between the two schools is an understatement. Although they used to play each other twice in a season, the games got so hard on both coaches that they reduced the rivalry to a once a year melee. Now the Benefit Bowl has truly

Hobby Campaigns For Father

 "My father, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, is running on his record," said Paul Hobby in Eastland this week, while campaigning for his father's re-election, Lt. Gov. Hobby is opposed in the race by

George Strake, Republican. Twenty-one year old Hobby, who resembled a David more than a Goliath of the political arena, found Eastland County business and civic leaders waiting for him in the Commissioners

courtroom.

He said that he was "pleased and a little surprised" at the turnout. He stated that he was here to "listen to people and get acquainted, rather than to make speeches."



He did, however, make a brief talk concerning the importance of the office of Lt. Governor, and Lt. Gov. Hobby's interest in education, better roads, responsible state finance and strong county government. He noted that his father had held the office for ten years, and that the Lt. Governor serves as President of the Senate and Chairman of the Legislative Budget Board, which as broad authority over the State government's financial affairs.

Hobby mentioned that this was his first visit to Eastland County - that he was taking a year out of college to travel from his home in Houston through the state "because I believe in my father, and what he is doing."

Young Hobby graduated from the University of Virginia this spring with a B.A. in History. He plans to enter Law School at the U. of

Texas in Austin in 1983. He has also worked in several types of journalism and media communication.

He stated that he appreciated the encouragement along his 1,000 mi. per week trip, and the people who remembered his father and grandparents - Oveta Culp Hobby, head of the W.A.C.'s in WWII, and Governor of Texas and newspaper publisher Wm. P. Hobby.

An information question and answer period followed, with a number of topics being discussed. A School Superintendent voiced concern about the need from a group teacher health plan and the cost of education. He stated that small schools, for example, are getting hurt by large insurance premiums, which have doubled during the past year. The cost of buying a bus and providing transportation has grown more difficult to meet on the current state school budget.

Hobby replied that education was a top priority for his father, and this problem would find a responsive ear. This was a critical time for education, he said.

The plight of the state unemployment fund came up next.

"We will need a special session of the Legislature to tackle that," Hobby said. "The fund is in bad shape. There is no way the taxes can keep from going up on this."

"The fund was designed in 1937. This system is behind the times."

Hobby was asked how his father, a Democrat, had worked with Republican

Gov. Bill Clements.

"Less fireworks than predicted," he answered. "I suppose it is a matter of professionalism. There is a degree of respect between them. They deal, you can say, on an issue-to-issue basis."

"In my travels around the state, I have found a lot of people unhappy with Gov. Clements. So I think he and Attorney General Mark White will have a close race."

"Yes, I think Texas may be headed toward a two-party system. In a way, everyone will be the better for it. We are seeing more split tickets, and members of different parties pulling together to work for the common good."

"My father, as a loyal Democrat, has always supported the national ticket."

"But he studies issues and exercises his vote in a rational manner."

The question arose up about George Strake's comments referring to Lt. Gov. Hobby's alleged "happiness" over the Supreme Court decision to require states to educate the children of illegal aliens.

"To say he was 'happy' with that decision is silly," replied Hobby. "What he feels is that it is the only rational decision to make under the present circumstances."

"The Federal Govt. has not protected our borders, and illegal aliens are here. They will become welfare or

crime statistics if we don't make them employable."

"My father has received some personal attack on this and other issues. But he is running on his record - not against anyone and not on personalities."

Hobby was asked if the Lt. Gov. was in favor of a Public Referendum law covering taxation.

"No, he is not. That issue come up all the time. But that would be a circumvention of the system of government we now have - which is the most rational thing we can come up with."

Hobby was then asked: "Is that one of the issues the Lt. Gov. has major differences with Gov. Clements on?"

"Yes, that and teacher's salaries. These are major differences."

After that Hobby thanked the citizens again for coming out to the meeting, and lingered to answer several more questions from the news media. He stated that his father was in favor of the "right to work" law in Texas - would like to leave that as is. On current taxation, the Peveo bill, and related subjects, he stated that the whole matter required more study. Life was indeed becoming more complicated, especially for citizens on fixed incomes.

As Hobby walked out of the

courthouse, he remarked that the interior of the courthouse was "irreplaceable"

"As a History major, I'm interested in things like this. I want to come back when I have more time - see all the places of historic interest in this county."

"I wonder if the people who

built this courthouse realized what a wonderful job they were doing?"

Then he stepped into the intense heat, looking across the Square with clear, dark-blue eyes.

"What is the general direction of Cross Plains from here? I need to go there."

Senior Citizens Nutrition Menu

Dr. Edward Weiss, director of the book entitled "Nutrition in Later Life" states careful storage and/or cooking of vegetables prevents loss of vitamins and minerals.

He states keeping peas and lima beans in their pods until used, saves nutrients and keeps them from drying out.

He indicates vitamins, C, B-1, and folacin are destroyed when added to the water while cooking. The practice, he says, started years ago because it helped vegetables keep their green color. The result was a bright green color, but important vitamins are destroyed. How we handle foods helps determine the amount of nutrients lost. Saving nutrients saves us money.

Dr. Weiss states minerals are rather stable during the cooking process, but like many vitamins, minerals can be lost when the liquid used to cook the food is discarded. To some extent this is also true when the vegetables are cut and peeled. He feels scarce tactics in preparation of foods will not be his function, but encourages "good common sense" is needed in cooking.

Next week we will review Dr. Weiss' thoughts in the storage process of foods.

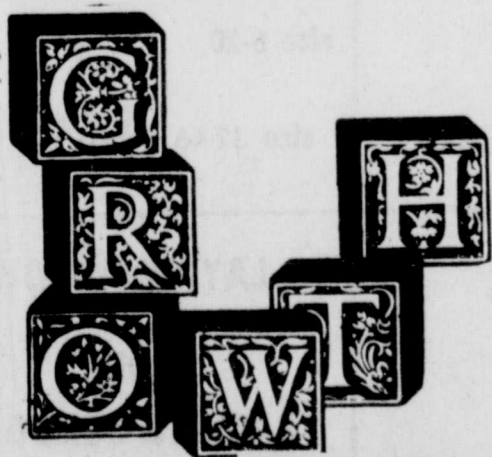

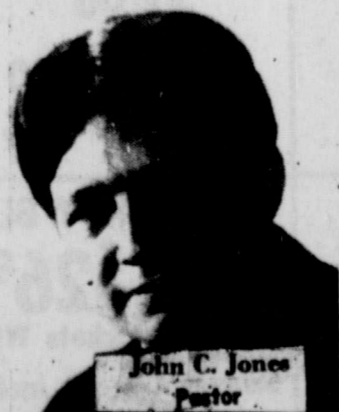
