## Cisco's 7th, 8th & J.V. Make Impressive Showing Thurs.

Cisco's seventh, eighth and junior varsity teams made an impressive showing here Thursday night as they decisively whipped visiting teams from Baird. The scores, all in favor of Cisco, were as follows: seventh grade game, 22-0; eighth grade game, 38-14; and the junior varsity game, 36-12.

In the seventh grade game, Cisco's Brian Wagon received the opening kick-off at his own 37-yard line and raced downfield for a 63-yard touchdown run. The try for two extra points, in the form of a pass from Cisco quarterback Lance Angel to Mark McGinness in the end zone, was good making the score 8-0 with only 11 seconds gone in the first quarter of the game.

On the next punt received by Cisco, Raiford Rattan raced 65 yards to the end zone, only to have the apparent touchdown called back due to a Cisco penalty. Later in the first quarter, another touchdown run, this time a 23-yarder by QB Angel, was called back because of a Cisco penalty. With the drive stalling on a fourth down and 19 yards to go play, Wagon punted for Cisco and a fumble by Baird was recovered by Cisco's Jarrod Jeffcoat at the Baird 13, putting Cisco in possession of the ball again.

Nine seconds into the second quarter of play, Cisco's Wagon scored on an 11-yard run. QB Angel took the ball into the end zone for two extra points making the score 16-0.

Following the ensuing kick by Cisco, Baird fumbled the ball on their first play and Cisco's Kevin Kirk recovered at Baird's 38-yard line. Rattan took the pitch-out from QB Angel and scampered 38 yards for the touchdown. The try for two extra points was an incomplete pass, making the final score 22-0 in the second quarter since neither team scored during the second half of play.

Cisco's eighth grade team made its first score when Jason Rattan received a Baird punt at Cisco's 45-yard line and raced downfield for a touchdown. The pass from quarterback Rattan to Ricky Chambers was good making the score 8-0 with 4:59 left in the first quarter of play. Brent Evtatt recovered a Baird fumble to set up Cisco's second scoring drive, starting at Baird's 34-yard line. A pass from QB Rattan to Steve Abbott netted the score and another pass from QB Rattan to Phillip Allen gained two more points. With 3:19 left in the first

# Thomas LeFlore Arrested In Slaying Of Debra Garcia Wed.

The third person has been arrested in connection with the November 29th brutal slaying of Debra Jo Garcia of Cisco.

During its Tuesday meeting the Eastland County grand jury of the 91st District Court handed down a sealed indictment resulting in the arrest of Thomas LeFlore, 41, formerly of Cisco on a capital

murder charge.

LeFlore was arrested by Eastland County Sheriff Johnny Morren Wednesday morning and is presently in the Eastland County jail under a \$50,000 bond set by District Judge Jim R. Wright.

The indictment of Thomas LeFlore resulted from a prolonged and thorough investigation surrounding the robbery, kidnaping, rape and murder of Debra Garcia who was a convenience store employee at the time she was taken from her place of employment about 5:30 a.m. in Cisco. Garcia was found in the afternoon of December 1, 1981, in a ditch northwest of Cisco.

According to District Attorney Emory Walton, this is

one of the most intensive investigations conducted by various city, county, and state law enforcement officers that he has seen in Eastland County. Walton said that Sheriff Morren and Texas Ranger Gene Kea particularly have spent an untold number of hours running down the many leads surrounding this incident and in fact various aspects of the investigation have been submitted to three different grand juries since early January, 1982.

LeFlore's brother, Charles LeFlore, 20, was the first person arrested in connection with the murder of Garcia. Charles LeFlore has previously entered a plea of guilty to the murder and was sentenced to the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville for a term of 65 years. Under Texas law, because he used a deadly weapon in the commission of the offense, he will have to serve a minimum of 20 years before even being considered for parole.

In a previous grand jury session, Brenda Andrews, 20, of Rising Star was the second person indicted for this same offense and her trial is pending at this time.

Under Texas law any person taking any part in the commission of the crime is also equally guilty and can be convicted of the same crime.

Walton said that he and law enforcement officers gratefully appreciate the help received on this investigation from the many citizens in Cisco and other areas of Eastland County.

Law enforcement officers have no additional suspects and consider the investigation to have been completed. In other action the grand jury handed down two indictments for a hot check in Cisco and a swindle charge.

Both DWI charges were tried by the jury.

In the first case Billy Joe Butler, 23 of Cisco, was arrested in Cisco after being involved in an accident with Mr. and Mrs. Allen Frazier on West 8th street in Cisco on October 4, 1981.

The jury was out with a verdict of guilty in five minutes. District Judge Jim Wright set punishment at 120 days in jail and a \$350 fine.

Butler was represented by Stan Boose of Cisco while District Attorney Emory Walton served as the prosecuting attorney.

In the other DWI case William Russell Edwards, 52 of Ranger, was found guilty after the jury met for only four minutes.

Edwards was arrested by Department of Public Safety trooper W.H. Condry on April 4, 1981.

District Judge Jim R. Wright has not set punishment, however, punishment will be set Friday, October 8th.

Edwards was represented by Ben Sudderth of Comanche while Walton served as prosecuting attorney.

Although the grand jury has adjourned for its term it is subject to recall until October 4th if needed.

One hundred twenty-seven outstanding 4-Hers will be recognized with special awards, medals and certificates. Also during 4-H week, the local 4-H club Scrapbook will be on display at the Eastland National Bank. So go by and see what the clubs have been doing.

This year's theme, 4-H Pathways To The Future, challenges members to become self-directing, productive and contributing members of society, points out Christy Fuqua and John Blair, County Agents, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M

University System.

Through practical hands-on learning experiences, 4-H members select and follow pathways that lead to success in personal and career development.

4-H, America's largest out-of-school program for boys and girls between the ages of 9 to 19, is the youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service of the state land-grant universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Some five million youth are involved in 4-H across the nation, with 140,000 of these in Texas.

The overall mission of the Extension Service in conducting 4-H programs is the development of youth individually as responsible, productive citizens.

4-H members learn specific skills in programs such as nutrition, animal science, forestry or gardening. They also learn to keep accurate records, make oral presentation, and develop

life-long management, consumer and communication skills.

They use their skills to contribute to community development through such projects as beautification, historic presentation, work with the elderly, energy conservation and involvement in civic affairs.

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# Pest Alert

## MULBERRY LEAFSPOT

Perhaps you have noticed the leaves of most fruitless mulberry trees are spotted, yellowed or in some cases defoliating. These conditions are caused by a leaf spotting fungus. In some extreme cases trees can be defoliated by this disease. Older trees are especially susceptible.

Infection and spread of the disease are favored by rainy weather. The wet weather we experienced in the early summer provided this fungus with the needed favorable weather conditions to initiate infection. Disease development is also favored by high

temperatures and therefore is the most destructive in winter months.

Severe infections or valuable specimen trees should be treated with a fungicide. Recommended fungicides include maneb, benomyl and chlorothalonil (Daconil or Bravo). However, this late in the year fungicide applications probably would not be extremely effective. The most effective applications of fungicide would follow early season rains or when signs of infection first appear.

Sanitation is also important. The fungus overwinters in plant debris. Therefore

the removal of fallen infected leaves should be of benefit.

Another disease which attacks mulberry is bacterial blight. The symptoms appear as water-soaked spots on leaves and shoots. They later become sunken and black. The leaves at the twig tips wilt and dry up.

Some control is obtainable on young trees by pruning dead shoots in autumn. Shoots should be pruned at least six inches below the infection site. Spraying with a copper fungicide (such as Kocide 101) the following spring is also recommended. Streptomycin sprays may also be effective.

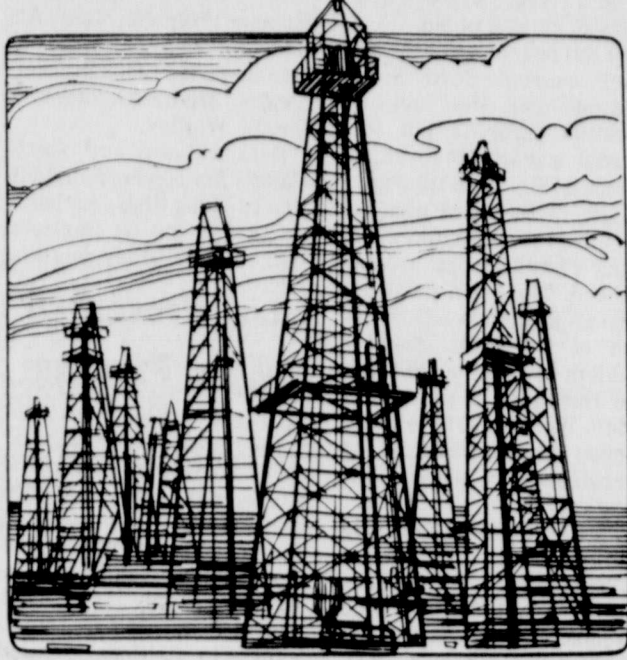
### Commission Approves Use Of Tapes

The Railroad Commission has approved a new procedure that will allow qualified oil and gas operators to file oil and gas transportation and production information on magnetic computer tapes rather than on RRC forms.

Beginning with January 1983 production, as many as 40 percent of the monthly reports sent to the Commission could be filed on magnetic tapes.

In order to send magnetic tapes, an operator must follow the steps in a Commission-prepared instruction manual, and file a test tape. If the test tape is approved, the operator will

be authorized to begin using the new method. Contact the Commission for further information.

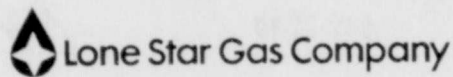

# PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 0-1981-10-13-B

AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND ESTABLISHING A TAX ENTITLED "HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX", CONTAINING THEREIN DEFINITIONS; LEVYING A TAX EQUAL TO TWO PERCENT (2%) OF THE CONSIDERATION OF THE COST OF OCCUPANCY OF ANY ROOM OR SPACE IN ANY HOTEL WITH CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS; PROVIDING FOR COLLECTION TO MAKE RULES AND REGULATIONS; DESCRIBING THE USE OF TAX REVENUE; DESCRIBING VIOLATIONS; PROVIDING FOR A FINE OF NOT MORE THAN \$200 FOR EACH VIOLATION AND THAT EACH DAY A VIOLATION EXISTS CONSTITUTES A SEPARATE VIOLATION; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES; AND FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the 65th Texas Legislature amended Art. 1269j-4.1, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, authorizing cities to levy a hotel occupancy tax not to exceed four percent (4%); and

WHEREAS, the revenue derived from this tax can be used to promote tourism and convention activities for the benefit of the City of Cisco, and other appropriate activities as allowed by State law; and

WHEREAS, the citizens of Cisco would benefit from such programs and facilities; NOW

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

**HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX**

Section 1. Definitions  
The following words, terms and phrases, for the purpose of this ordinance, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning, are defined as follows:

(a) "Hotel" shall mean any building or buildings, or other facility, in which the public may, for a consideration, obtain sleeping accommodations. The term shall include hotels, motels, tourist homes, houses or courts, lodging houses, inns, rooming houses, or other buildings or facilities where

rooms are furnished for a consideration, but "hotel" shall not be defined so as to include hospitals, sanitariums or nursing homes.

(b) "Consideration" shall mean the cost of the room, sleeping space, bed or other facility in such hotel and shall not include the cost of any food served or personal services rendered to the occupant not related to the cleaning and readying of such room, sleeping space, bed or other facility for occupancy.

(c) "Occupancy" shall mean anyone who, for a consideration uses, possesses, or has a right to use or possess any room or rooms, sleeping space, bed or other facility in a hotel for any purpose.

(d) "Occupancy" shall mean anyone who, for a consideration uses, possesses, or has a right to use or possess any room or rooms, sleeping space, bed or other facility in a hotel under any lease, concession, permit, right of access, license, contract or agreement.

(e) "Person" shall mean any individual, company, corporation or association owning, operating, managing or controlling any hotel.

(f) "Tax Collector" shall mean the Tax Assessor-Collector of the City of Cisco.

(g) "Quarterly Period" shall mean the regular calendar quarters of the year, the first quarter being composed of the months of January, February and March; the second quarter being the months of April, May and June; the third quarter being the months of July, August and September; and the fourth quarter being the months of October, November and December.

(h) "Permanent Resident" shall mean any occupant who has or shall have the right to occupancy of any room or rooms or sleeping space or other facility in a hotel for at least thirty (30) consecutive days during the current calendar year.

Section 2. Levy of Tax; Rate; Exceptions

(a) There is hereby levied a tax upon the cost of occupancy of any sleeping room or space furnished by any hotel where such cost of occupancy is at the rate of two dollars (\$2.00) or more per day. Such tax shall be equal to two percent (2%) of the consideration paid by the

occupancy of such room to such hotel.

(b) No tax shall be imposed hereunder upon a permanent resident.

(c) No tax shall be imposed hereunder upon a corporation or association organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable or educational purposes of which no part of the net earnings inures to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

Section 3. Collection  
Every person owning, operating, managing or controlling any hotel, shall collect the tax imposed in Paragraph 2 hereof for the City of Cisco.

Section 4. Reports  
On or before the last day of the month following each quarterly period, every person required hereby to collect the tax imposed by this ordinance shall file a report with Tax Collector showing the consideration paid for all room occupancies in the preceding quarter, the amount of tax collected on the City's behalf on such occupancies, and any other information as the Tax Collector may reasonably require. Such person shall pay over the tax due on such occupancies at the time of filing such report. There shall also be furnished to the Tax Collector of the City of Cisco at the time of payment of such tax, a copy of the Quarterly Tax Report filed with the State Comptroller in connection with the State of Texas Hotel Occupancy Tax.

Section 5. Rules and Regulation

The Tax Collector with the advice and consent of the City Attorney shall have the power to make such rules and regulations as are necessary to effectively collect the tax levied herein, and shall upon reasonable notice have access to the books and records necessary to enable him to determine the correctness of any report filed as required by this ordinance and the amount of taxes due under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 6. Use of Funds

The revenue derived from the hotel occupancy tax authorized by this ordinance may only be used for those purposes stated in Art. 1269j-4.1 Vernon's Ann. Civ. St. as it may be amended and any other purposes allowed under the laws of the State of Texas.

Section 7. Violations

If any person required by the provisions of this Article to collect the tax imposed herein, make reports as required herein, and pay to the Tax Collector the tax imposed herein, shall fail to file such report or shall fail to pay such tax, or if such person shall file a false report, such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200 and every day a violation exists shall be deemed a separate and complete offense.

Section 8. Penalties

If any person shall fail to file a report as required herein or shall fail to pay to the Tax Collector the tax as imposed herein when said report or payment is due, he shall forfeit five per cent (5%) of the amount due as a report, and after the first thirty (30) days he shall forfeit an additional five per cent (5%) of such tax. Provided, however, that the penalty shall never be less than one dollar (\$1.00). Delinquent taxes shall draw interest at the rate of six percent (6%) per annum beginning sixty (60) days from the date due.

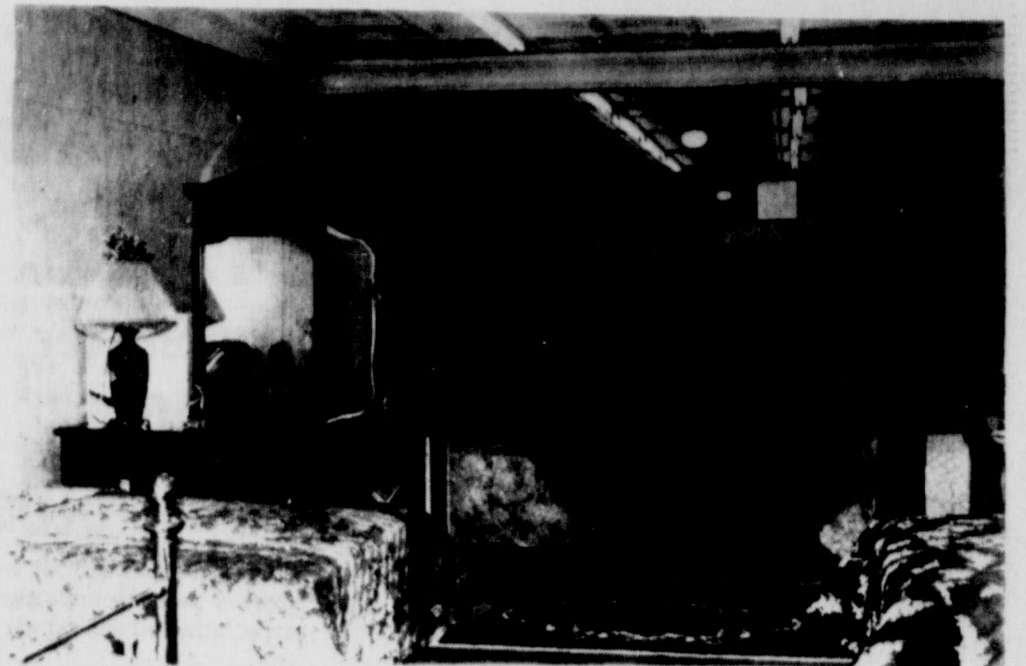

# GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

The use of fire as a tool to control brush on rangeland has been gaining interest in the last few years. Eastland County ranchers interested in getting a better handle on using fire in range management are invited to attend a special program at Goldthwaite on October 28.

Called a Prescribed Burning Symposium, the program will be at the Mills County Civic Center with registration beginning at 8:30 a.m.

Texas A&M staff and representatives of other state and federal agencies will be on hand to discuss various aspects of prescribed burning of ranges, with special emphasis on the proper use and effects of fire. Among considerations regarding prescribed burning are brush management

forage growth and effects on wildlife and the environment. Various types of assistance available to ranchers interested in using fire in range management will also be discussed.

The Extension Service has conducted three similar programs during the past few years. These have been held at Carrizo Springs, Kingsville and Junction.

Landowners interested in attending the program should contact our office for pre-registration materials.

Fall is always a critical time of the year for cow-calf producers because it's then that they must usually make marketing decisions. The best decisions, however, come after looking at all possible alternatives.

Marketing alternatives for cow-calf producers include holding calves over winter, backgrounding or feeding calves during the winter months, forward contracting retaining ownership through feeding by placement into custom feedlots, and simply marketing calves this fall.

Short-term prospects for feeder cattle must be considered when reviewing these various marketing alternatives.

Some positive factors for the feeder cattle picture are these:

1. Fed cattle prices should decline only slightly in the third quarter and show some strength late in the year.
2. Commercial cattle feeders have rebuilt some equity in recent months.
3. Total 1982 meat production will be down about 4 percent from last year.
4. Competing pork prices are expected to remain firm into the fall.

5. Cheap feed and good grazing exists throughout most of the west.

6. Available feeder cattle supplies appear no larger than last year.

Negative factors for the feeder cattle outlook are the following:

1. Profit margins for cattle feeding are narrowing.
  2. Equity positions of most cow-calf producers have been sharply eroded.
  3. Financing costs have come down but still remain high.
  4. Beef production is expected to increase in the last half of 1982 and throughout 1983.
  5. Unfavorable general economic conditions still prevail.
- All these factors—both positive and negative—must get careful attention as cow-calf operators look toward the months ahead and ponder their individual situations.

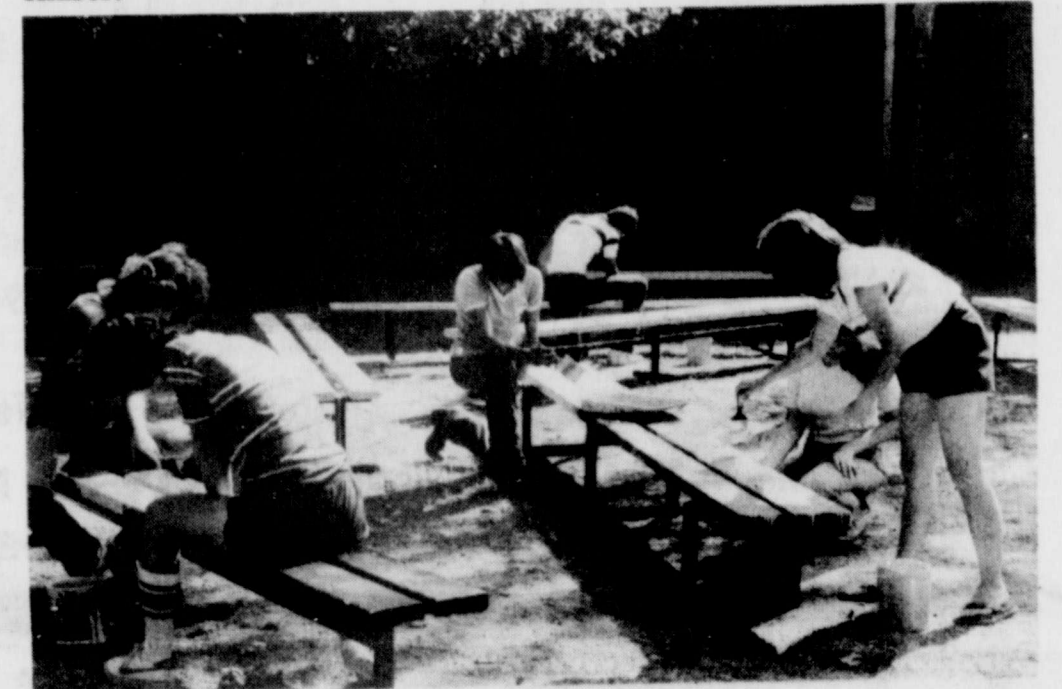

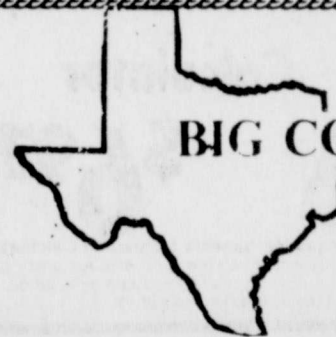

### A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK



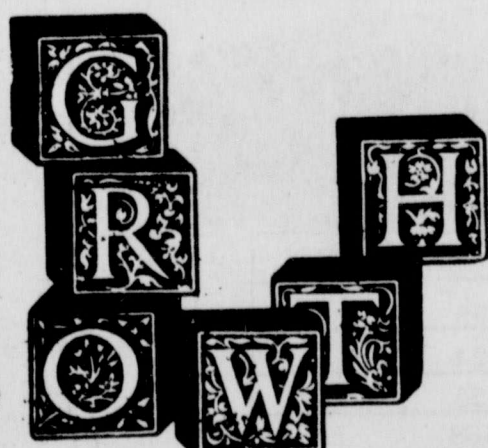

# People n Things

**OUR TRIP TO QUITO,** Ecuador, began Sept. 14th when we drove into Arlington to spend the night and to be on hand for a 7:30 a.m. check-in next day at DFW airport. And our Eastern Airlines plane (Boeing 737) left at 8:30 a.m. on Sept. 15th.

A highlight of the three-hour flight to Miami, Fla., was a nice breakfast served soon after takeoff. The airplane went to about 31,000 feet and you couldn't see the ground. We arrived at Miami around noon (Eastern time). Since there were no flights to Ecuador after our arrival, we had to spend the night in Miami. Our luggage had been checked to Quito and there was quite a hassle to retrieve it.

AT MIAMI, we stayed at the Sheraton Hotel as per arrangement by our sponsors. The hotel is a real fancy place and rooms cost about \$80 per day.

Ran into something new (to us) and interesting - a Par Course Fitness Circuit. This consists of a half-mile jogging track that circles the swimming pool, tennis courts and parking lot of the hotel plus eight or ten stations for exercising.

Each station on the Par Course Fitness Circuit has a sign board that instructs you to do push-ups or the like. Then, you walk on to the No. 2 station and engage in another type of exercise. You are given a pretty good workout by the time you get around the course. Then, you can either jog a few rounds or walk until you're tired. The area is lighted and fenced and perfectly secure. (The Par Course would fit nicely around the City Park in Cisco.) A company in San Francisco makes the signs and equipment used in the various exercises.

NEXT MORNING (Sept. 16), we checked in at Miami International Airport for the flight to Ecuador. Again, we were with Eastern Airlines as they have taken over the

routes that Braniff Airlines used to fly to Central and South America. Our flight began around 1 p.m. - an hour or so late. And a lunch (choice of fried shrimp or sirloin steak with all the trimmings) was served.

The flight route carried us over Cuba and you could see Havana 50 miles or so off to the right. After crossing the Caribbean, we came in over Colombia, South America, and landed at the capital - Bogota - where we were on the ground about an hour. Went into the airport terminal and browsed among the shops. Bogota is about 8,500 feet high, and the temperature was in the 70s at 3:30 p.m.

After Bogota, the plane flew an hour or so to Quito. Mountains are high and numerous and through broken clouds we could see many small villages. The clouds were solid as we arrived over Quito. The airplane circled for 15 minutes or so and the pilot announced that there was a severe rain storm in the airport area and, since mountains ring the airport, it would be impossible to land as scheduled.

So...the airliner went on 30 minutes to Guayaquil, Ecuador's largest city, on the west coast. Here, we rounded up our four bags (containing enough things for a stay of a couple of months or so) and went through customs. After we spread out our bags, the man waved us through.

WE WERE then told that we were to take our bags to Saeta Airlines and Eastern would send us back to Quito as the airport was now open. With the help of two young men, we and the bags got to the right place, obtained tickets and lined up to go aboard.

An hour or so later, the Saeta 737 landed at Quito. Water was everywhere, at-testing the fact that there had been a rain storm deluxe. Since the Eastern

plane had been unable to land as scheduled, there wasn't anybody there to meet us. And we rounded up our bags, engaged a taxi and went to our hotel, arriving tired and hungry around 9 p.m.

All in all, it was a pretty eventful day for folks from a small town in the middle of Texas.

THAT WAS ALL a few days ago as this was written Sept. 22nd. We've checked in at the newspaper and have about reached the point where the 9,500 foot altitude of Quito isn't noticeable. At odd times, we've done a bit of sight-seeing and are finding Quito and Ecuador very interesting indeed.

Will report later on people and things we meet and see.

Texas A&M Extension Department has released a little bulletin entitled, "Be A Super Snacker," which clearly indicates Texans are eating more food between meals, to the point that it has become part of our lifestyle.

Their philosophy is...Don't Fight It...We are going to eat these snacks between meals regardless what nutritionists say, so the Extension Service states, "Follow this trend, but eat nutritious snacks, kick the bad snack habit and be a super snacker!"

Snacks, the Department states, are an important source for your daily nutrient and calorie intake. Eating healthy snacks can be a choice, not a chance.

What type of snacks must be chosen to be classified as "Super Snacks"?

Make sure they include meats and other protein food for body building and repair. You may include in this peanut butter, jerky, canned fish, nuts or sunflower seeds.

If you consider the breads and cereals to enrich your iron content and some protein, you may want to snack on cereal snack mix or crackers. Milk and cheese, which assists our body with calcium, protein and riboflavin, may include non-fat dry milk and unopened pasteurized cheese spreads.

If you are a snacker, be a selective one, and be classified as a "Super Snacker."
