Chamber Announces 'Golden Harvest Day' Sale For Oct. 16

Cisco's Chamber of Commerce has announced plans for a "Golden Harvest Day" sale Saturday, October 16, in Cisco. The sale day will be Chamber-sponsored by the Retail Trade Committee.

Local merchants are being asked to participate by having sidewalk sales on that day. Local clubs and organizations are also being urged to plan on setting up

booths downtown alongside the merchants.

Persons interested in setting up private booths for the sale of antiques, collectibles, hand-crafted or new items are also encouraged to contact the Chamber office. If there is enough interest shown in the private booths, space will be made available on a vacant lot near the downtown area.

A cake walk, sponsored by the Cisco Civic League is scheduled for that day and tentative plans call for musical entertainment to be provided.

Bill Austin Jr., chairman of Retail Trade Committee, has stated that local merchants seemed to be pleased with the turnouts for Cisco past two sidewalk sales this year. He said such events

are for the good of the townspeople, as well as for the merchants, because some great bargains may be found.

Mr. Austin said the Chamber-sponsored sidewalk sales will probably become an annual event three times a year.

Final plans for the October 16 sale will be announced at a later date.

Rita Clements Will Be Parade Marshall

Rita Clements, first lady of Texas, will be leading the Eastland County "Oil Show" parade to be held on Saturday, October 23, 1982 in downtown Eastland beginning at 10:00 a.m.

Mrs. Clements is the wife

of William P. Clements, Jr., Governor of Texas. She is well known throughout the state for her work in three major areas: education, volunteerism and historical preservation, along with placing special emphasis on the recruitment of qualified women as she participates in the gubernatorial decision-making process for the appointment of persons to state boards and commissions.

She was born in Newton, Kansas, and moved to Brady, Texas in 1941. She attended Wellesley College, and graduated Cum Laude from the University of Texas with a major in Spanish. She and her husband have four children.

Mrs. Clements has been very active in education throughout our state and is presently a member of the Governor's task force on higher education, a life member of the board of the Hockaday School in Dallas, a member of the Centennial Commission at the University of Texas, a member of target 2000 committee at Texas A&M University, a member of the selection panel of the White House fellowship competition, and is a former ex-officio member of the Governor's advisory committee on education. She formerly was a member of the women's advisory committee at the University of Dallas, the former chairman of the board of the special care school for retarded children in Dallas, and a former member of the board of St. Michael School in Dallas.

Along with her work in education, Mrs. Clements has done much volunteer work throughout her lifetime, serving as co-chairman of the Texas volunteer conference, and former member of the national voluntary service advisory council. Also, she serves in an informal advisory capacity in the Governor's office for volunteer services and personally promotes the office's programs which stress local and corporate volunteerism in state agencies.

Mrs. Clements is also very active in the historical preservation of Texas and is honorary chairman of the Friends of the Governor's Mansion Foundation, which raised over \$2 million from private donations for the refurbishing of the Governor's mansion, built in 1856. Along with this she is advisor on the main street project in Texas which is part of a national effort to revitalize downtown areas of small cities. Mrs. Clements also is presently serving as chairman of the Capitol Centennial Celebration.

Politically Mrs. Clements has always played an active role in the national, state, and local politics. She has served on the Republican National Committee, was a

Republican National Convention Delegate, and has served on the National Federation of Republican Women. Statewide Mrs. Clements is very active in the Republican party of Texas, the Texas Federation of Republican Women, and formerly served as state chairman for the Women for George Bush, and was a delegate to the Republican State Convention for many years. She has not only stayed busy with national and state political work, but has locally served as Precinct Chairman, County Canvass Chairman, Candidates Recruitment Committee, along with being active in the Park Cities Republican Women's Club.

Mrs. Clements is a former member of the board of KERA-TV, a former director of the Lange Company in Dallas, and a member of the Texas 2000 Commission. Culturally, she is on the Fine Arts Committee of the

Department of State, a member of the National Governor's Association Subcommittee on the Arts, is honorary chairman of the Smithsonian Institute Archives of American Art, Texas Project, and serves as vice-chairman and executive committee member of the Wolf Trap Foundation for performing arts. If this were not enough to keep her a busy, active person she formerly served as a board member of the Dallas Society for Crippled Children, the Adventure Trails for Girls, The United Way in Dallas and Austin, The Economy Task Force of Goals for Dallas, and is former president of the Junior League of Dallas, Inc.

Eastland is very thankful to have Mrs. Clements serve as our parade marshal, and all citizens are encouraged to hear her speak immediately following the parade on the south side of the courthouse.

The 10th annual Eastland County Hay Show was conducted by the county livestock and forage committee Friday, October 1st. Four producers received plaques for having the champion bale in the class according to County Agent De Gordon.

Charles Walker of Eastland won two plaques, one for the champion coastal bermudagrass entry, and one for the champion sorghum-sudan grass hybrid. N.E. Richardson of Ranger won a plaque for the best other perennial grass hay. This champion hay was

Kleingrass. C&D Feed store of Eastland had the champion alfalfa hay and Burt Montgomery exhibited the champion annual grass hay.

The plaques were given by the Production Credit Association office in Eastland. Cecil Crenwedge, Manager, made the presentation.

Walker's champion coastal had a protein content of 12% giving it a chemical score of 100. The judge gave the bale a physical score of 88 resulting in the total score of 94.

Other coastal entries winning blue ribbons because they had a total score of 85 or above were S. Walker, Dr. L.R. Gohlke, N.E. Richardson, M.O. Underwood, Wayne Carlile, Mathew Housson, Burton Phillips, and Weldon Tankersley. Red ribbon winners in the coastal class were Jay Carter, L. Walker, Danny Meroney, Burton Phillips, Truet Hart, Delores Tankersley, Wayne and Terry Huff, Ray Neal and Melissa Little. Coastal exhibitors winning white ribbons were Wayne Mathews, Casey Mezell, M.D. Lee and Mrs. Weldon Tankersley.

The white ribbon winners in the sorghum-sudan grass hybrid class were Dr. L.R. Gohlke, Melvin Adams and

Burton Phillips.

The blue ribbon winners in the other perennials which include Kleingrass and Johnsongrass were Truet Hart and N.E. Richardson. Red ribbon winners were C&D Feed store, Dr. L.R. Gohlke, Morris Underwood, and N.E. Richardson. J.T. Wilson won a white ribbon in this class.

The hay judge, Dr. George Alston, classified all the hay based on its chemical and physical score. Ribbons were awarded based on the following scores: 85 or above - blue ribbon, 70 to 85 - red ribbon, 50 to 69 - white ribbons. Ribbons were furnished by the Texas Plant Food Institute.

Dr. Alston, Agronomist for the Extension Service, presented a program on hay quality during the afternoon session at the livestock show barn. Each exhibitor received a computer printout which gave the amount of feed supplement, if any, if needed to be fed with the hay.

Gordon said the hay shows have helped producers to know how to produce better quality hay. Hay is an important crop in Eastland County and its quality is very important to livestock men who are trying to trim the cost of livestock production.

Listed below are the 1982 Eastland County Fair Rules:

HOME CRAFT DIVISION GENERAL RULES

1. There will be no entry fee.
2. All entries (except baked goods) will be accepted from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 21, with judging to be Friday morning. Baked goods entries will be accepted from 9:00 to 1:00 p.m. on Friday morning, with judging at 1:30 p.m. Friday, Oct. 22.
3. No entries will be accepted after 6 p.m. excluding baked goods.
4. Only one entry per class per contestant. Due to limited space, only one item will be accepted, i.e., one pillowcase, one book end, etc.
5. NO HOME CRAFT ENTRIES WILL BE PICKED UP BEFORE 6:00 P.M. SATURDAY IN ORDER THAT THE PUBLIC MAY VIEW ALL ENTRIES. ENTRIES MUST BE CHECKED OUT BY DIVISION WORKERS BEFORE BEING RELEASED TO OWNER.
6. Each division will have the following classes: Adult - 18 years and over; Youth - Kindergarten to 3rd grade; Youth - 4th to 7th grades; Youth - 8th to 12th grades.
7. Ribbons will be awarded to 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.
8. Best of show awards will be given to each division. Winners to be chosen from the 1st place winners in each class.
9. Regardless of number of entries, article must be worthy of rating before it is given a ribbon.
10. Decision of the judge will be FINAL.
11. All entries (excluding handicrafts) must have been prepared during the previous 12 months. Entries in the Handicrafts division must not have placed in any previous County Fair.
12. Entries need not be new but must be clean.

13. The Fair Association will not be responsible for any damages, loss, or injury to any person or article while participating in the Eastland County Fair. There will be a watchman on duty at night.

14. No name tags shall be on articles to be judged. Numbers will be assigned upon registration.

15. Names of winners will be posted in each division after judging is completed.

BAKED GOODS

- NOTICE: Baked entries become the property of the County Fair and will not be returned.
1. Participant must abide by the general rules.
 2. No commercial mixes may be used.
 3. Each participant shall bake his own entry. No entry group will be accepted.
 4. A recipe must accompany each entry.
 5. Entries requiring refrigeration will not be accepted, i.e., gelatin, whipped cream, ice

cream. (All entries not keeping six (6) hours will be sent to be sold.)

6. Baked goods will be sold at the booth where they were entered. Entries will be sold at 4:00 p.m. Friday, October 22 after judging.
7. All entries must be on disposable containers and wrapped securely, (plastic bags).

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Pest Alert By Gordon Woolam

This is the time of year when people begin to notice insect galls which may have been formed on their oak trees. Galls are abnormal swelling of plant tissue caused by insects, fungi, bacteria or nematodes. Insect-induced galls are the most common galls in urban areas. These galls can be a nuisance, but one which must be tolerated as control measures are largely ineffective.

Galls are caused by the abnormal growth of plant cells, formed in response to a specific stimulus. Among the insects causing galls are certain moth caterpillars, beetles, flies, aphids and small wasps. The galls provide the insects food and shelter during certain stages of their developmental cycles. Galls always take on characteristic sizes, shapes and colors.

After a usually brief period of cell growth, gall development stops completely. The insect becomes confined within its "house" and feeds only on gall tissue during its development. It is important to understand that once formed, these growths do not continue to drain the

host plants of its nutrients. Galls may cause concern to homeowners from fear that these abnormal swellings may increase to the point that plant health is endangered. Evidence to date suggests that insect-induced galls in Texas do not result in noticeable or measurable plant injury. The exception is found in the damage caused by phylloxera galls on pecans.

Galls occur on a wide variety of plants. Some host plants support only one or two species of gall-inducing insects. Oaks are particularly susceptible, some such as live oak may have more than five different types of galls at a given time.

Once a gall begins its development, it is impossible to stop its growth with chemicals. Unless chemicals can be applied with gall-inducing insects fly, they offer no effective means of control. Lack of actual plant damage from galls and the difficulty in proper timing of insecticide applications pose strong arguments against the use of insecticides. Conservation Dist. Dir. Election, Tour Is: Thurs., Oct. 14

also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old. Zone 4 covers approximately the west half of Eastland County and includes the cities of Rising Star, Cisco, and Carbon.

Oil and Gas Report

Flowing crude oil at the rate of 102 barrels per day, the No. 2 Sneed "C" has been completed in Eastland County's North Mangum Field by Adobe Oil and Gas Corp. of Midland.

The well is located in an 80-acre unit in the H&TC Survey, about four miles southeast of Cisco. In addition to crude oil, the well showed ability to yield up to 110,000 CF/D casinghead gas. Adobe took the hole to 3,452-ft. bottom and perforated the Marbles Falls Formation for production 3,312 to 3,344 feet into the hole.

Lance Oil of Abilene has

revealed plans to drill a 1,000-ft. Eastland County wildcat for oil pay 7.5 miles southwest of Carbon. It will be known as the No. 1 Schaffner. Location will be in a 251 acre lease in the GC&SFRR Survey.

Operating out of Fort Worth, Mercury Exploration has brought the No. 5 V.P. Simpson on line in Eastland County's Hawkeye Field, two miles northwest of Romney.

Pumping on open choke, the well showed capacity to make 60 barrels of oil and 55,000 CF gas per day. It was drilled to total depth of 1,210 feet and was perforated to produce from the Adams Branch Formation, 1,134 to 1,147 feet.

The operation is in a 243-acre lease in the H&TC Survey.

At a location three miles north of Ranger, Ridge Oil of

Breckenridge is preparing to spud the No. 2 Thomas, a 3,500-ft. developmental probe in Eastland County's Northwest Ranger oil field. The well will be located in an 82-acre lease in the BBB&C Survey.

Ridgeway Oil Exploration of Houston has posted initial production data on the No. 6 Delbert Taylor, pumping 30 barrels of oil per day on open choke in Eastland County's Hawkeye Field.

Location is in a 40-acre unit in the H&TC Survey, about one mile west of Romney. The well was drilled to total depth of 1,132 feet and was perforated in the Adams Branch Formation, 1,105 feet to bottomhole.

Parker Operating of Fort Worth has filed for permit to drill two developmental wells in Eastland County's Scranton Field, about a half mile south of the town of Scranton. The wells will be known as the No. 9 and No. 10 Neely. They'll be spudded in a 160-acre unit in the H&TC Survey A-191. Both are slated for 1,850 feet of hole making.

Breckenridge-based Smile Energy Inc. has successfully completed a gas well in Eastland County's North Desdemona Field, about six miles north of the Gorman township.

Tested on a .375-in. choke, the well flowed at the rate of 150,000 CF natural gas per day. It was given a

393,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow. The well is designated as the No. 1 Dillinger "D".

It was drilled 3,439-ft. bottom and was perforated in conglomerate structure, 3,006 to 3,350 feet into the wellbore. Location is in a 20-acre lease, McLennan School Land Survey.

Two 1,500-ft. developmental ventures are planned in Eastland County's Hawkeye Field by Nimrod Operating of Abilene. The wells are designed as the No. 16 and No. 17 McCall. They are situated in a 42-acre lease in the G.A. McCall Survey, about 1.5 miles southwest of Romney. They are aimed at either oil or gas pay.

Cordova Resources Inc. of Dallas has filed initial potential figures for a new oiler in the Eastland Regular Field, one mile north of the Pioneer community. It is the No. 1404 North Pioneer Unit, pumping four barrels of oil daily, along with 40,000 CF/D gas, on open choke.

Cordova bottomed the well at 2,572 feet and perforated the Caddo Formation for production, 2,518 to 2,542 feet into the wellbore. The operation is in a 1,351-acre lease assembly in the T. Benson Survey A-21.

Lee Brothers Oil and Gas of Rising Star has staked drillsite for the No. 2 J.A. Rutherford, a 1,200-ft. developmental venture in the Eastland County Regular Field, about four miles northwest of Rising Star. It will be situated in a 175-acre lease in the ETRR Survey.

Operating out of Lubbock Robert E. Byrne has taken out a permit to drill a 3,550-ft. developmental well in the R&B Field, about four miles north of Eastland. It will be known as the No. 1 White, with drillsite in a 40-acre unit, H&TC Survey.

Louis Crude Oil and Gas Inc. of New Orleans has finaled a new wildcat oil producer in Eastland County, six miles south of the Romney township. The explorer well will be known as the No. 1 Alexander.

Pumping on open choke, it indicated ability to yield 10 barrels of crude and 100,000 CF gas per day. Flowing tubing pressure stood at 50 PSI. The well was drilled to 3,000-ft. bottomhole. The operator perforated the Caddo Lime for production 2,372 to 2,434 feet into the hole.

The drillsite was in an 80-acre drilling unit in the ETRR Survey.

Texas Crude Production Starts Upward In July

Texas crude oil production totaled 73,372,589 barrels in July, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent.

The figure compares with reported June production totaling 71,358,946 barrels and July 1981 production of 75,475,024 barrels.

Texas oil production averaged 2,366,858 barrels daily in July, down from 2,378,632 barrels daily in

June and down from 2,434,678 barrels daily in July 1981.

The July allowable totaled 96,194,640 barrels.

The preliminary July summary indicated Texas oil production was 23.72 percent under the allowable for the month.

Through the first seven months of this year, Texas has produced 509,066,594 barrels of oil.

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Have Information Ready To Speed S.S. Benefits

People in the area who are planning to apply for Social Security retirement benefits soon can help speed the application process if they get some information together first, Glyn Hammons Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

A person will need proof of his or her age. The best evidence is a public or church record of birth recorded before age 5. If this cannot be submitted, other evidence may be used. The best is often the oldest, Hammons said.

Other records that might be used include school, church, State or Federal census, insurance policies, marriage, passports, employment, military service, children's birth certificate, union, immigration and naturalization. There are other records as well that may prove acceptable.

A person needs his or her Social Security card or a record of the number.

Also requested are W-2 forms for the past 2 years,

or, if self-employed, copies of self-employment tax returns and proof of filing for the past 2 years.

If the worker's wife or husband is also going to apply, she or he will need the same documents. In addition, it

would be a good idea to have the marriage certificate available because they are sometimes required. Birth certificates should be available for any eligible, unmarried children as well as their Social Security numbers.

Other documents may be needed in some situations, but these will be enough in most cases, Hammons said. Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Uncertified photocopies are

not acceptable.

Questions Of Prospective Homeowners

Many people who are in the market for a home have school-age children. To these people, the quality of schools where they are home-hunting help make the decision of whether to locate there or not.

The Texas Real Estate Center, Texas A&M University, has developed some questions a prospective homeowner would be wise to have answered.

Does the School District attract and retain good teachers? What percentage of local graduates go on to college? What is the rating of students in the local system on national achievement tests?

What is the level of education of local citizenry? What is the response of the local citizenry to school tax levies?

How much is spent per child, compared to other systems? Is there a well-developed local vocational education system?

A system which can give a positive answer to these questions can go a long way toward providing a pleasant living environment for a family.

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Homemaking Hints

Suicide is second only to accidents as the leading cause of death in 15 to 24-year-olds.

The Suicide Prevention Center in Los Angeles, California, estimates 50 percent of teen suicides are disguised as accidents. Adolescent females make 15 to 20 percent of all suicide attempts. Since there are many more attempts to commit suicide by adolescents than by adults, experts see this as a cry for help.

Many suicides can be prevented if parents, families, peer, teachers, school counselors and children themselves take preventive measures.

Research indicates the following factors are involved in the teen suicide problem:

1. A home environment in which the teen feels unloved, unwanted, and a burden on parents and the family.

2. Parent/children difficulties which result in a loss of love and parental approval.

3. Some research reports that a confusion of role identity caused by the current blurring or blending of roles by males and females and divorce of parents plus the blending of several families to form stepfamilies are influences on potential teen suicide.

4. Loss of someone—especially a parent—through death, divorce, separation, or the break up of an adolescent romantic relationship precipitates suicide.

5. Stress of school competi-

tion and actual or anticipated failure contributes to suicide.

6. Depression and problems in dealing with sexual identity.

7. The normal process of growing and developing through the adolescent life stage can sometimes be so stressful that teens will try to commit suicide. However, most suicides are due to multiple factors, not just being an adolescent.

Prevention of teenage suicide should begin early in the child's life.

Some things families can do are:

1. Provide opportunities for gradual acceptance of responsibilities and experience in making decisions and solving problems so teens are not overwhelmed with suddenly learning to do things while going through one of the most stressful life stages.

2. Establish positive lines of communication, encouraging the child or teen to talk with you about anything, especially their feelings, values, and problems.

3. Provide healthy opportunities to deal with death so the death of a parent will not be quite as stressful.

4. Encourage children to do well in their school work, but refrain from stressing the competitive aspects. Let children and teens know you accept them and not just their grades.

5. If there is a divorce, assist the child in having as stable a home life as possible. Provide the child with experience in having an opposite gender parental figure. This may be accomplished through a relative, volunteer organization, church or remarriage.

6. Understand your child/teen well enough so that you become aware of any noticeable changes in behavior, moods, grades, emotional and peer relationships, eating, sleeping, and personal hygiene habits. A combination of these changes can indicate depression, a prime factor in suicide.

Teen suicide is probably one of the most difficult crises a family can experience. Prevention is a key and the family is the most important factor in providing an environment in which a teen can develop in ways which will lead toward their desiring life, not an escape from it through death.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Fall is here! I would like to suggest you try this delicious bread.

YAM SWEET BREAD

1½ cups mashed yams, canned or fresh
1¼ cups sugar
¾ cups salad oil
3 eggs
1¾ cups sifted all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans
1 cup raisins or pitted and sliced prunes

In large bowl, add mashed yams to sugar, oil and eggs and mix until smooth. In another bowl, sift together flour, baking powder, salt and spices. Add raisins and nuts to coat them. Slowly stir dry ingredients into yam mixture. Turn into greased and floured 9" x 5" loaf of fluted pan. Baked at 350° F. approximately 1½ hours or until bread tests down. Cool 30 minutes and remove to rack to finish cooling.

HONEST ANSWERS TO FAIR QUESTIONS

Our Customers Are Concerned About The Cost of Quality Electric Service, and So Are We. Here's a Sample of the Questions They're Asking and the Answers We're Giving.

Q. Why is WTU asking for a rate increase?

A. There are three related reasons: inflation, the rising cost of capital, and WTU's massive construction program. Mainly, the request is based on capital expenditures during the past year.

Q. When was the last time you raised retail electric rates?

A. WTU has had only three rate increases in its history, while it has lowered rates 14 times. The last increase was February, 1982, and it amounted to an average of just over 8 percent.

Q. Why is WTU having to raise its rates again so soon?

A. The rate relief granted to us by the cities and the Public Utility Commission of Texas last time proved inadequate. It did not keep up with the cost of additional plant, inflation and high interest rates. Our revenues have not provided an adequate rate of return.

Q. What are other utilities doing about rates?

A. Without exception, all electric utilities are having to increase their rates. Some have been filing rate cases every year. Bill comparisons reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas show that WTU's rates are second lowest among investor-owned utilities in Texas.

Q. Why are you building a big new plant? Isn't energy use declining?

A. Energy use in WTU service area is growing. This summer our peak demand reached 994 megawatts. Our current generating capacity is 1,054 megawatts. The summer peak left us with insufficient reserve margin. We will purchase power from neighboring utilities as a stop-gap measure, but the time has come when we must expand our own generating system, if we are to continue providing service our customers are used to.

Q. What would happen if you could not get a rate increase?

A. The financial condition of our Company would deteriorate rapidly. Our credit rating would suffer. We would no longer be in position to attract capital at reasonable interest rates to finance necessary major construction. We would have to pay higher interest rates at the expense of our customers.

Sidelights and Spotlights

Before dawn October 12, 1492, the lookout on the PIN-TA yelled, "Land! Land!" Thus Columbus discovered America, and nothing has been the same since.

That's the way I heard it. However, what the lookout probably shouted was, "Tierra! Tierra!" Why would a Spanish ship have an English lookout—even if the commander was Italian?

The dauntless explorer was about ready to admit he was daunted and agree with his men that the trip was a washout when, as one writer put it, "Columbus blundered into one of the outlying islands of the Caribbean archipelago and thought he was somewhere else."

For Columbus Day to be such a big deal in the United States, Canada, Central and

South America, Spain and Italy, there seem to be a lot of blunders connected with the affair.

It's reasonably certain Columbus was born in Italy, but sixteen different towns have been claimed as his birthplace with the honors generally agreed on as Genoa. However, in 1930 a four-hundred-year-old manuscript from the pen of a friend of Columbus says Milan was where the sailor first saw the light of day.

Wherever the place, the date, it seems, was 1451. This was during the Renaissance, so it wasn't surprising that Columbus acquired enough

learning to bury himself in the "Travels of Marco Polo." He learned the weaving trade, but at fourteen he ran away to sea. He returned home but not for long—Polo's influence probably kept him on the move.

An account of Columbus Day, written by Sechrist, says Christopher was "making navigation charts and maps to support his wife and children" in Portugal in 1470. At nineteen?

Columbus' ship had been wrecked off the Portuguese coast, which does lead one to question the brilliance with which Sechrist credits Christopher's navigation. I can see where his insistence on a round world might get little attention!

Anyway, neither Italy or Portugal gave any financial support to this fellow who didn't follow the current notion that the world was flat, for goodness' sake! The Renaissance could only go so far in absorbing a new idea or refurbishing of an old one.

Queen Isabella assured herself a place in history by pulling out all the stops to back Christopher. Ferdinand probably went along with her idea just to get a little peace and quiet around the palace. They were pleased when Columbus came back in triumph from "India," but they were surprised, too.

It is ironic that Columbus died in 1506 without, it is written, ever knowing he had discovered a new world. However, I find it hard to swallow that a fellow, saturated with Polo's accounts of the East and capable of drafting navigational charts, wasn't smart enough to recognize the lack of similarity between the lands and people he found and those Polo wrote about.

Columbus was honored but briefly.

The new lands were not named for him; in his lifetime he didn't bring Spain much but claims to the place; and after Isabella died so inconsiderately, Columbus didn't even get the property rights he was promised.

Columbus died three years

after Isabella. He wasn't buried where he asked to be—in Santo Domingo, land of his discovery. He was buried in Seville, but when his son died in 1542, both bodies were sent to Santo Domingo where they remained until the French possession of the island in 1792. Then a coffin, supposedly containing both bodies, was sent to Havana but in 1877 Santo Domingo restored a cathedral and said the identified bodies were still there. Seville built a monument for the bodies from Havana—well, as with his birthplace, you can take your pick of where the body of the "Discoverer of America—First Admiral" now lies.

What is certain: in 1934 President Franklin Delano Roosevelt issued a proclamation for all states to observe October 12 as a national holiday. It is the only day which all Pan-American lands join in celebrating.

I do hope Christopher Columbus know he's still on the hero list.

Eastland County Man Elected To MHMR Board

The Board of Trustees, Central Texas Mental Health Mental Retardation Center, met in regular session on September 28 in Brownwood to elect board officers for the agency's current fiscal year.

Elected to the offices of Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer were Gloria Willen, Randy Harkey, Lee Ruth Campbell, and John Davenport respectively. Their tenure as officers of the MHMR center's governing board coincides with the agency's Fiscal Year (FY) 1983, which began September 1 and runs through August 31, 1983.

Mrs. Willen, who served as the center's first director of mental health services when the agency began operations in 1970 is a former member of the Tarleton State University faculty, having headed that school's undergraduate program in social work until June of this year. The board's new chairman, who begins her third year as an MHMR trustee, resides in Brownwood with her husband Jim.

In her election to board chairman, Mrs. Willen succeeds Janie Clements, whose association with the MHMR center dates back to its very beginning; Mrs. Clements, board chairman during the first three fiscal years of the 1980's, was instrumental in the founding of the Central Texas MHMR Center, whose sheltered work training program bears the name of one of the state's and nation's most respected advocates for the needs and rights of the mentally handicapped.

Mrs. Clements will continue her association with the center as Brown County representative to the board. Randy Harkey's election to the office of vice chairman marks his return to the center's board of trustees, of which he was a member during FY's 1977-78. Harkey resides with his wife Suzanna and daughters Amy and Emily in San Saba, where he is associated with the James B. Harkey Distributing Company.

Lee Ruth Campbell's term as secretary coincides with her third year as Mills County representative to the MHMR center's policy-making body. A retired school teacher and an active participant in the civic and spiritual affairs of her community, Mrs. Campbell resides with her husband Howard in Goldthwaite.

John Davenport, owner-operator of the Davenport Sporting Goods store in Brady, begins his second term as treasurer and third year as McCulloch County representative to the MHMR center's board of trustees. His wife Donna is employed as a speech pathologist with the Brady Independent School District.

Other members of the nine-member board of trustees include: James Dudley, prominent Comanche County lawyer-rancher; Lois McCarty, well-known advocate for the needs and rights of mentally handicapped persons in Coleman County; Don Jones, retired lieutenant-colonel, USAF, who resides in Ranger and represents the interests of Eastland County on the board; and the Hon. W.T. Harlow, popular political personality and long-time mayor of the City of

Brownwood. Trustees are appointed by their respective county commissioners to two-year terms on the MHMR center's Board of Trustees. They may be reappointed for consecutive terms, as long as they wish to serve.

As policy makers, trustees influence the center in developing and delivering programs which will meet the mental health needs of their separate constituencies and the combined constituencies of the center's 7,000 square-mile catchment area.

Each trustee serves as the chief communication link between county residents and the community mental health/mental retardation center to ensure that his or her constituents have a voice in the development and delivery of services for their respective communities, and to ensure that community residents are aware of

MHMR services available to them.

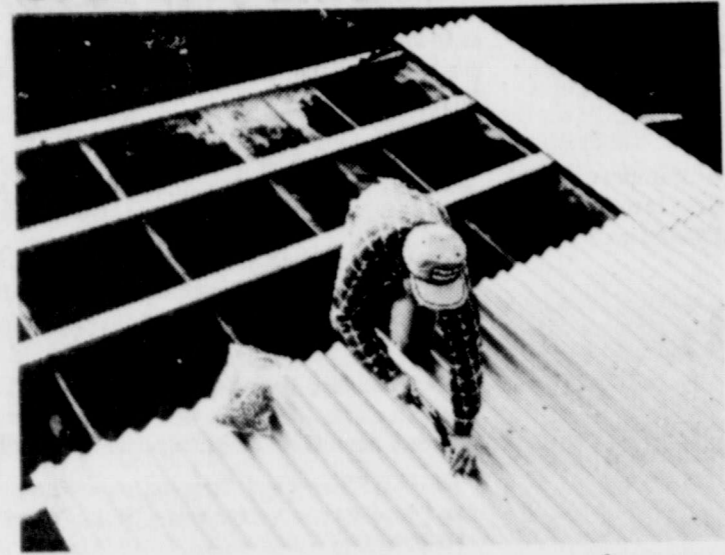

P.A.D.D. Organized To Fight Drug Traffic

Representatives from every city in Eastland County met this week and formally organized a county-wide effort to curtail the illegal drug traffic in this county.

Selecting the name People Against Dangerous Drugs, citizens from all walks of life are banning together to offer support and encouragement to law enforcement authorities and to work toward a public education program to warn of the dangers of mind-scrambling drug abuse.

PADD has an active arm in each community and the county group will help coordinate the efforts of these, as well as sponsor and assist with public programs to help stem the tide of illegal drug sales and use.

Already, even in the formulating stages, the concerned citizens are benefiting by sharing information and discussing common problems and setting goals.

Strong local organizations are already functioning in Carbon, Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Ranger and Rising Star.

Goals of the effort is to rid the communities of all illegal drugs and to encourage and help authorities enforce laws as well as to foster education and cooperation among parents, teachers and young people in order to help the young people take responsibility for themselves and reach adulthood free of illegal drugs. The group will encourage communication and involvement by students and parents in the activities of the school and communities.

Objectives include: that all meetings and literature and communication be constructive and non-blaming of parents, teachers or students; to include the total community; to develop a structure of on-going parent education concerning drugs; to encourage the development of a school policy so that parents will be called by school person as soon as any drug use is suspected without fear or threat of legal suit; to encourage referrals to counselors and physicians; to ask the juvenile courts to be involved in the program; and to work toward developing healthy social activities and to encourage students and parents to participate in all kinds of school-sponsored activities.
