Important District Game Is Set For Lobos With Jim Ned Friday

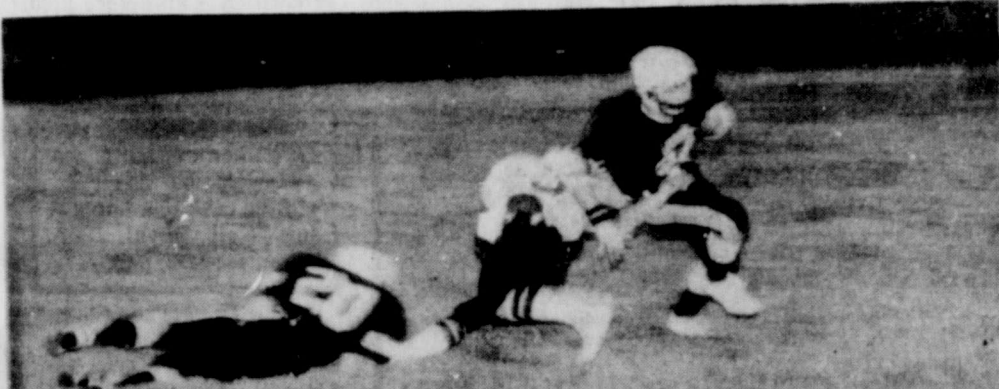
Cisco High School's Varsity Lobos will be playing an important District 9-AA game Friday night in Tuscola as they take on Jim Ned High School's Indians. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

Following last Friday's win by the Lobos over Hawley and Jim Ned's win over Albany, Cisco and Winters are now tied for second place in District play.

Should Cisco win this Friday night and Winters lose, Cisco will advance to the playoffs. At the same time, if Cisco loses or Winters wins, Winters will go to the playoffs. Winters, who is 4-1 in District play and 4-1 for the season, will be playing Albany this Friday in Winters.

Cisco's Junior High and Junior Varsity Lobos will play against Jim Ned in Cisco Thursday. The seventh grade game will begin at 5 p.m., followed by the eighth grade and J.V. games.

Lobo Head Coach Jim Puryear stated, "Jim Ned is your average team, but they have been improving during the past few weeks. They moved their quarterback to tailback and that helped them."

The Indians are 2-3-1 in District play and 4-4-1 for the season. The Lobos district record is 3-2-1 and they are 5-3-1 for the season.

Coach Puryear said on Tuesday that it is doubtful whether Mike Gallegos, Kenneth Preston or Robert McCulloch will play this Friday. He said, "They seem to be getting better every day, so they may be ready by Friday."

Concerning last week's game with Hawley Coach Puryear said, "The boys played tough when they had to. We had some injuries early in the game and for a while we had to almost play without the right side of the line." He also said some of the players saw more action than usual, since they had to play both offense and defense.

In last Friday night's game with the Hawley Bearcats, Cisco scored once in the first quarter of play, twice in the second and once each in the third and fourth quarters.

Cisco's first scoring drive was set up by a fumble recovery on Hawley's five yard line. A hand off from quarterback Randall Rattan to Jason Potter netted one yard. Greg Sipe took the next handoff in for the touchdown with 8:08 left in the first quarter. With Glenn Starr holding the ball, Cisco's Kenneth Preston booted the extra point making the score 7-0.

Later in the first quarter, Hawley recovered a Lobo fumble and started their first scoring drive from midfield. With Mason VanCleave at quarterback, Hawley's Mike Smith, Calvin Cooley and Dennis Gooch all took a part in moving the ball to Cisco's six-yard line. From there, Smith took the handoff from QB Van Cleave for the

touchdown. Cooley held the ball for Gooch who kicked the extra point tying the score a 7-7 with 1:40 left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Cisco received a Hawley punt and started a scoring drive from Cisco's 44 yard line. A pass from QB Rattan to Larry Adams placed the ball on Hawley's 31 yard line. Runs by Sipe, David Seabourn and Potter moved the ball to Hawley's 15 yard line. A pass from QB Rattan to Butch Jessup for the touchdown with 5:41 left in the second quarter. Jessup then booted the extra point, replacing Preston who was hurt several plays earlier, giving Cisco a 14-7 lead.

Hawley received the ensuing kick-off and started a scoring drive from their own 21 yard line. Smith, Cooley, Robby Baker and QB VanCleave all fought for yardage moving the ball to Cisco's one yard line in seven plays with two first downs. A handoff to Smith netted the touchdown and Gooch kicked the extra point. With 2:05 left in the second quarter, the score was tied at 14-14.

Cisco received the kick and started another scoring drive, this time from Cisco's 41 yard line. Runs by David Seabourn, Doug Hendricks and QB Rattan moved the ball to Hawley's 11 yard line. During the drive Cisco had six incomplete passes but a pass interference call against Hawley gained Cisco 16 yards and a first down. QB Rattan took the ball in for the 11 yard touchdown with 30 seconds remaining in the first half. The extra point kick by Jessup was good putting Cisco in the lead, 21-14.

Cisco received the second half kick-off and began their fourth scoring drive of the night, following a 21 yard run

back by Seabourn, from their own 46 yard line. Brian Fleming, Hendricks, Potter and QB Rattan moved the ball to Hawley's four yard line in nine plays with three first-downs. Potter scored the touchdown on a handoff from QB Rattan. The extra point kick by Jessup was good making the score 28-14 with 8:23 left in the third quarter.

Later in the third quarter, Rattan received a bad snap, on an attempted fourth down punt, which sailed over his head. He was tackled on Cisco's 12 yard line setting up Hawley's final score of the game. Smith and QB Van Cleave moved the ball to Cisco's one yard line in three plays. A handoff to Cooley netted the touchdown with 2:14 left in the third quarter. The extra point kick by Gooch was good making the score 28-21.

The final score of the game was set up when Cisco's Rattan intercepted a Van Cleave pass at Hawley's 48 yard line and returned it to their 31 yard line before being tackled. Cisco then used David Seabourn and Potter to move the ball to Hawley's 12 yard line in three plays. A handoff to D. Seabourn gained the touchdown and Jessup kicked the extra point. With 3:42 left in the game, the final score was 35-21.

Outstanding players on Cisco's defense were Randall Rattan, David Seabourn, Greg Sipe, Johnny Ramirez, Brad Hawari, Mark Petree, Johnny Aebourn, Sean Manire and Robert Sherman.

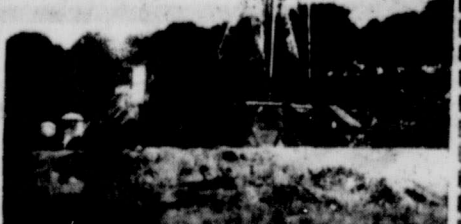

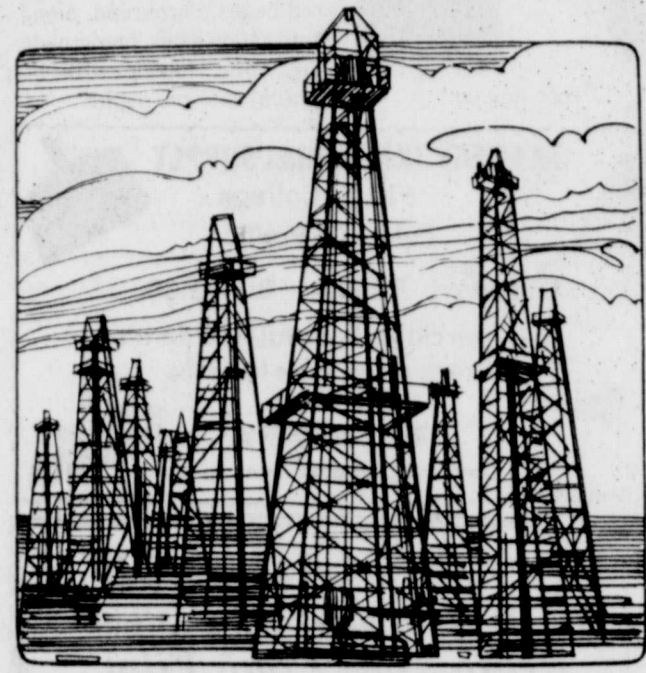

INSPECT HOME'S INTERIOR BEFORE BUYING

When you examine a house that's for sale, inspect the interior carefully. Such an inspection will help you evaluate the house's overall condition.

Items to check inside the house include the condition of the plumbing, heating, cooling and electrical systems. Climb into the attic and check the underside the roof for evidence of leaks.

Examine the walls for cracks, which could indicate the foundation has settled or cracked. Make sure the appliances work and ask about warranties on household items and about builders' warranties if the home is new.

Most importantly, get a professional inspection, if you have any doubts. Few homes are perfect, but you

will be much better off if you know about possible problems before you buy.

SIX COUNTIES RATE TOPS IN GROWTH

The 1980 Census shows that Texas counties with the biggest cities had the biggest increase in numbers of people. But it also shows that other counties have experienced higher rates of population growth.

In fact, in six Texas counties, the number of residents more than doubled during the 1970's. These were Hood, Montgomery, Fort Bend, Collin, Rockwall and Williamson.

Hood County led the list with a population growth rate of 158 percent and Fort Bend was next with a growth rate of 150 percent.

Hood County's population jumped from only 6,000 to 17,000 in 1980; and Montgomery County's went from 49,000 to 128,000.

All this growth helps the economy, but increases the demand—and the cost—for housing.

ADJUSTABLE RATE MORTGAGES TIED TO VARIOUS INDEXES

If you are looking for a mortgage loan, you may be

offered one which allows the lender to vary the interest rate. Several factors determine how much the lender may adjust to your rate.

First, the rate must be varied in relation to an objective index. One such index represents the average rate that lenders must pay to obtain funds from depositors and other sources. This type is generally used with the more frequently adjusted loans.

A second index is based on the average rate on new mortgage loans and is used with less frequently adjusted mortgages. In addition to the index, some loans limit the absolute amount of each payment—change and the overall variance from the original interest rate.

EARNEST MONEY CONTRACT IS AGREEMENT TO SELL

A real estate sales contract is an agreement to transfer the title to a piece of property at some later date. In Texas it's called an earnest money contract, because at the time it is signed, the buyer normally puts

up money to show good faith. The money is held in escrow by the real estate broker. If the prospective buyer fails to complete the contract through no fault of

the seller or agent, all or part of the deposit money may be forfeited.

The earnest money contract also allows both parties

enough time to perform certain tasks. The buyer needs time to obtain financing for the sale, and the seller needs time to obtain title from a local abstract company.

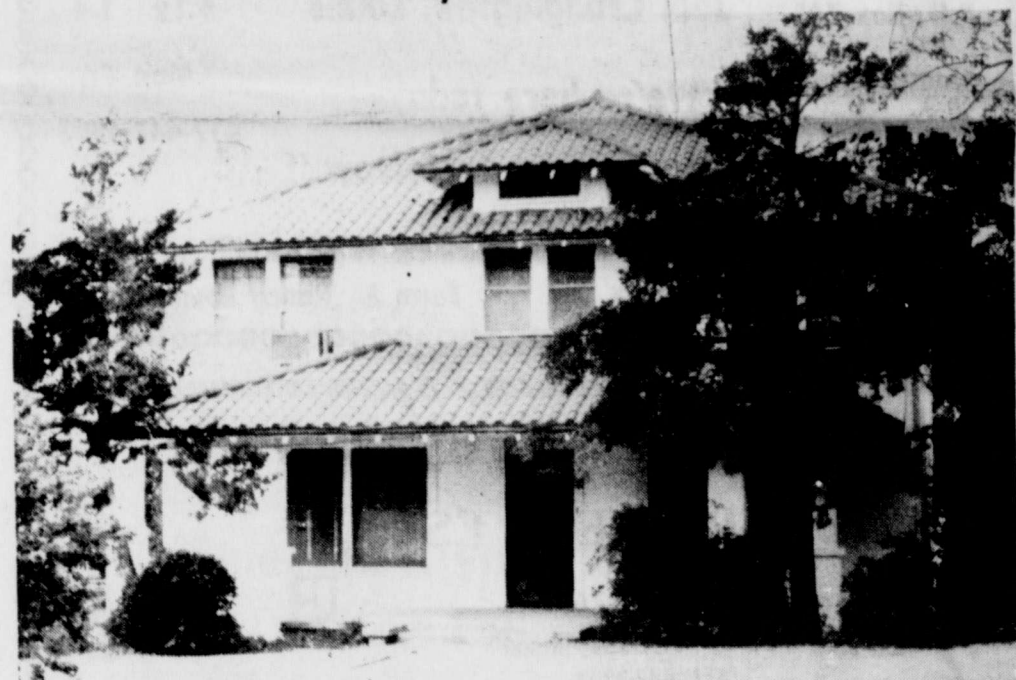

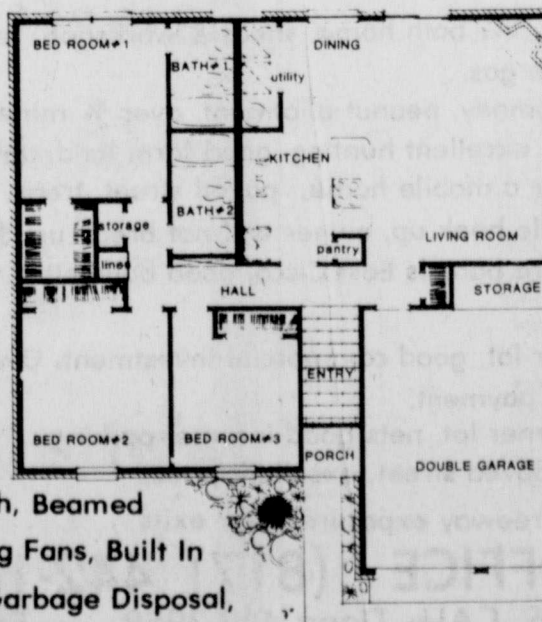

Crime Victims Have Rights Too

The following article is a public service by the Eastland Co. Newspaper Co. through the cooperation of Emory Walton, Criminal District Attorney and The Prosecutor Council. Its purpose is to make you aware of a prosecutor's role, of your responsibility as a resident of Eastland County and how we can work together to alleviate some of society's problems.

CRIME VICTIMS HAVE RIGHTS TOO!

Victims of crime have always been among society's most forgotten members. Criminal law and the American system of justice focus primarily on criminals—on apprehending, punishing, treating and rehabilitating them. Little attention has been paid to victims, who have usually been left to recover as best as they could.

Mary Ellen Gray, a twenty-three year old homemaker, was beaten and raped in her home one morning by a man who said he was there to repair the telephone. Her assailant was never caught. Mary Ellen lives in terror that it will happen again.

Sam Clark, a forty-five year old retail merchant, was assaulted and robbed of his day's earnings on his way to the bank. His medical costs were over \$6,000 and he lost two months of work.

Mabel Dembitz, a seventy-four year old widow, returned from her local senior center one afternoon to find that her home had been burglarized and vandalized. Repairs to Mabel's home cost over \$400 and the offender stole \$800 worth of sentimental valuables.

All were innocent victims of crime. All faced the task of rebuilding broken lives filled with new fears and pain. And any one of them could have been a friend or relative: one in three American households were victimized by crime last year.

What happens when you are a victim of a crime or witness the commission of a criminal act? Very often the first reaction is emotional and charged with tension. Such a reaction is a normal one, particularly if the crime is one of violence or threatened violence, or if your home or personal property is involved.

And once this upsetting incident comes to include police, public prosecutors, judges and courtrooms, it is just as natural to become confused by the system. The United States criminal justice system is tuned to providing constitutional safeguards for defendants or those who are accused of committing crime. The Constitution promises nothing to innocent victims or to witnesses of crime.

But victims and witnesses have rights, too. The National Organization of Victim Assistance has adopted a bill of right for victims and witnesses in every state and locality. For example, victims and witnesses have the right to:

- (1) be treated with dignity and compassion.
- (2) protection from intimidation and harm.
- (3) be informed concerning the criminal justice process.
- (4) counsel from persons outside of the criminal justice system such as a counselor, clergyman, or victim advocate.
- (5) receive financial compensation for physical and/or emotional injuries, expenses, or property loss incurred as the result of a crime.
- (6) preservation of property and employment.
- (7) due process in criminal court proceedings.

Another aspect of victim assistance is compensation in the form of the payment of public funds to persons injured by a violent crime. Under Texas' Crime Victims Compensation Act, persons injured during a crime (or their dependents) can be awarded compensation up to a maximum of \$50,000 for the cost of: (1) medical, hospital, nursing or psychiatric care or counseling and physical therapy; (2) loss of income not to exceed \$150 per week; (3) care of minor children, so that the victim or spouse can return to work; and (4) loss of support by a dependent and funeral and burial expenses if the victim dies. Victims

cannot receive compensation for pain and suffering or loss of property. The Texas program pays only for actual financial losses due to injury or death.

To qualify, a victim must be a Texas resident, must have suffered "financial stress" as a result of injuries and must file a claim with the Industrial Accident Board within 180 days after the crime.

The program receives its funding from special court costs levied throughout the state. A fee of \$15 is assessed

persons convicted of felony crimes and \$10 is assessed persons convicted of class A or B misdemeanors. Unfortunately, since its inception in 1979, the program's funding mechanism has been unable to generate enough revenue to compensate all of those victims who qualify for assistance.

We cannot prevent all crime, or eliminate all of its adverse effects. But we can reduce many of the burdens borne by victims and witnesses. Recognition of their rights to be free from

needless harm is the recognition of the human right to compassion, dignity, and justice.

Your local prosecutor and his staff can help to minimize the inconvenience and lack of communication which often characterize a victim's or witness's contact with the criminal justice system.

The Drug Abuse program is being sponsored by the Eastland County Extension Homemaker Clubs in conjunction with their annual Extension Homemaker Achievement Day.

parent, teacher, business leader or a concerned citizen, you have a vested interest in the future of our youth. Everyone has the obligation to understand the problem of illegal drug abuse among our youth and to help find solutions. Texans' War on Drugs can assist that effort.

Eastland County has been identified as having a serious illegal drug traffic problem. Let's all help stop this. The first step is to educate our parents and concerned citizens.

Gordon Spot

Asparagus seems to be gaining popularity with Eastland County vegetable gardeners. We have had several questions recently about the care of asparagus plants in the fall and winter.

The asparagus tops should be left until after the first freeze. Then you should cut the tops at ground level and cover the asparagus bed with mulch. In early February remove the mulch and fertilize with 1 or 2 pounds of 10-20-10 or a similar analysis fertilizer per 20 feet of row. You can begin harvesting the new sprouts in late February or early March.

If you would like more information on asparagus call or come by the County Extension Office and ask for the asparagus publication, L-1593.

Several of the common peach, nectarine and apricot diseases are best controlled with a spray either just before or just after leaf-fall in the Fall of the year. These diseases are peach leaf curl, bacterial leafspot, coryneum blight and bacterial canker.

The peach leaf curl and the coryneum blight are fungal diseases while the others are bacterial in nature. The peach leaf curl is the disease which causes the grotesque, warty look on the leaves of the peach in the early spring. This warty, growthy appearance can also sometimes be seen on the fruit. The leaves and fruit which are infected will fall off.

The bacterial leafspot and coryneum blight are very similar in physical appearance. The leaves with bacterial leafspot usually turn yellow and fall, whereas the leaves that are affected with coryneum blight are not so apt to fall. In both cases there is a spotting of the leaf and this spot usually falls out. There is a somewhat "shot hole" or a very ragged appearance to the leaf surface.

Bacterial canker on the other hand, is a disease that is more commonly seen in the twigs. Usually after the bark splits the tree is severely damaged and many times production will be lost and tree death will follow. In each of these diseases the organism that causes it overwinters in the tree bark and debris left in the tree.

The best recommendation for control is good sanitation in combination with sprays of a copper-containing fungicide, such as Kocide 101, either immediately prior to leaf-fall or immediately after. This can be followed with a spray a few weeks later if the situation is so bad that is warranted. Kocide 101 at the rate of two pounds per 100 gallons of water, sprayed on the exposed branches after leaf-fall has been shown to be very helpful in controlling these diseases. They are very hard to control and where they have established themselves over a period of years, they will be almost impossible to bring under complete control. However, we can certainly decrease loss with this method.

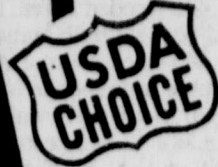

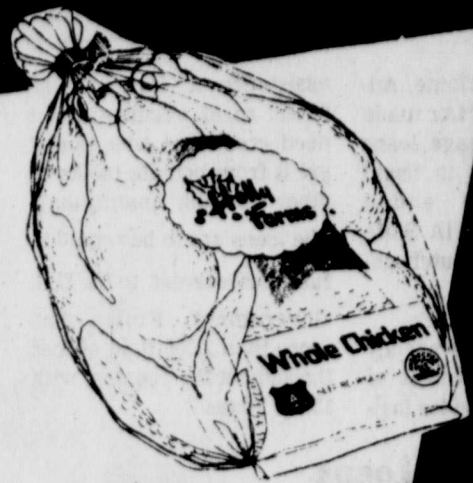

FmHA Makes Home Mortgage Loans

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) made 3,228 home mortgage loans to Texas families in fiscal year 1982 that ended September 30, FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch announced today.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan

assistance to farmers and other rural residents who need credit but who cannot get it from private banks or other lending institutions. The loans are to be repaid in full, plus interest, to the U.S. Government. FmHA has more than 2,000 field offices throughout the country, with 130 in Texas.

Preliminary figures show that nationally the agency provided more than 78,000 loans to families across the country who were without safe, decent, and sanitary housing. Another 30,000 families were afforded an opportunity at better housing through 1,428 loans that financed rental housing construction. The total amount

of FmHA housing loans for the fiscal year was \$3.5 billion.

"In Texas, FmHA provided 3,170 single-family home loans totaling \$90,840,700," J. Lynn Futch said. Fifty-eight rental housing loans were made for \$50,757,920. Total housing loans for the year amounted to \$141,598,620.

Farmers Home Loans

USDA Interest Rates Drop

Interest rates for loan programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration, which were lowered last month, will drop again effective November 1, Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block announced today.

Block said the additional reductions, which are as much as two percentage points for some loans, are possible because of the general move toward lower interest rates across all sectors of the economy.

"Lower interest rates for Farmers Home Loan Programs will be of great benefit to the entire rural economy and particularly for the nation's farmers who depend on credit so heavily," he said.

In the Farmer Programs, the interest rates for farm operating loans will go from the present 13.25 percent down to 11.5 percent. Farm ownership loans will be reduced from the present 13

percent to 11.5 percent. Interest rates for limited resource farm operating loans will be lowered from 10.25 percent to 8 percent and limited resource farm ownership loans drop from 6.5 percent to 5.75 percent.

Some loans to help farmers recover from natural disasters will have a lower interest rate. The rates for production loans to farmers who need financing above the actual loss but who cannot get credit elsewhere will be lowered from 15.5 percent to 14 percent. The rate for actual loss loans remains at 8 percent. The rates for economic emergency loans will also be reduced. Economic emergency production loan rates will be reduced from 13.25 percent to 11.5 percent and economic emergency real estate loans go from 13 percent down to 11.5 percent.

Interest rates for single family housing loans will drop from 13.125 to 11.5 per-

cent except for those who can afford the rates charged by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Their rates will drop a full

point from 13.5 to 12.5. Loans for multi-family housing will be reduced from 13.125 to 11.5 percent.

Comptroller Sends City Share Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent \$35.6 million to 967 Texas cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for October.

The 1982 Statewide total so far this year is up 11% over the 1981 total through the same date of last year.

Eastland County, however, rose far above the State average, with an impressive gain of 23.30%.

Divided among the towns in the County, the payments this period were: Eastland, \$10,474,24, with 1982 payments to date of \$189,161.80. Gain from same period in 1981: 39.33%. Cisco, \$9,755.95, with 1982 payment to date of \$173,730.89. Gain from 1981: 29.79%. Gorman, no payment this period, 1982 payments to date \$20,943.35, loss from 1981 -9.21%. Ranger, this period \$8,002.39, 1982 payments \$113,300.79, gain over 1981 2.13%. Rising

Star, no payment this period, 1982 payments to date \$16,208.66, gain over 1981 27.60%.

These figures reflect the overall economy in the County, and are generally very good, with sizable increases in most of the towns.

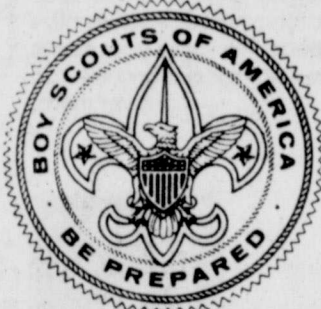

4. Exhibits must be entered on an individual basis. No organizations may sell... EXCEPTION: Nursing homes and Senior Citizen Centers may sell and display as a group. No articles entered will be judged on a competitive basis.

5. Exhibitors must be responsible for their own sales. Exhibitors should bring money for making change.

6. Exhibit articles should have a label attached given the owner's name and price of article (if the article is to be sold). All money from the sale of articles will go to the owner. Exhibitors should bring a cloth or sheet and cover their exhibit display when it is left unattended. (Exception is that house plants do not need to be covered.)

7. The Bazaar will be held in the Rebekah Lodge, 300 N. Lamar, Eastland. Entries should be brought in on Thursday, November 4 between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. All articles, not sold, should be removed from the building by 5 p.m. on Friday, November 5.

8. Tables will not be furnished. Space will be available for two (2) card tables per person.

9. Past winners of the Oldest Man and Woman Exhibitor award are ineligible to receive the honor during the current year's Bazaar.

10. The Oldest Man and Woman attending the Bazaar opening ceremonies on Thursday, November 4 at 10 a.m. will receive special recognition as part of the program.

11. Extension Homemaker Clubs will sponsor the concessions during the Bazaar.

PREPARING YOUR GARDEN AND YARD FOR WINTER

Though the first freeze of winter may be only a few days off or several weeks off it is time to get ready for it. We have already had temperatures that have set many records in this area this year. You can learn a lot from Old Mother Nature about weather conditions. In observing the squirrels you will note that they are extremely busy gathering their winter feed supply. This is quite natural but this is the first year in a long time that the squirrels have not been

chattering among themselves as they gathered their food. They are busy working very quietly and fast. Does this tell us that we are going to have an early winter or a hard winter? I have already seen flocks of geese going over this Southwestern area. Another factor to consider is that the trees in the Ozarks have already changed colors about three weeks ahead of schedule this year. I feel sure that we will have an early winter or a hard winter if not both.

Plant material freezes at different temperatures. Some plants freeze at 38

degrees while other plants freeze at 28 degrees or lower. Still there are tropical plants that can NOT take temperatures below 60 degrees.

For plants in your yard, a good application (2 inches deep or better) of mulch should protect your root system against a freeze. Stop all fertilizing now. This will prevent new growth that could be nipped by a freeze. When a freeze is predicted, you should water your plants heavy the night before. This will help to protect them if it does freeze as predicted. However, some plants will need additional protection. A

simple framework can be constructed to cover the particular plant that need this additional protection. You can stretch either cloth or plastic over this framework.

Remember that hanging baskets are very easy to freeze and are also very easy to protect from possible freezing damage. After thoroughly watering your hanging baskets pull a plastic leaf bag up over the basket and tie it at the top of the hanging wire. Leave your basket protected this way until it warms up. This should give you ample protection from the freeze.

If you have a green house at home you may want to take your plants in for the winter. You also can move large patio or tropical plants inside the green house for protection. If you do not have a home green house you can move your large patio or tropical plants inside your house or into your garage. When you move plants inside try to give them the same amount of light that they had been getting outdoors. If you plan to keep your plants in all winter try to give them the same amount of light that they had been getting outside, and be sure and keep them out of drafts. Don't put them around windows and doors. They can get too much light and atmospheric such as heat coming through the window glass can be very harmful to your plants. Use Grow-lux types of lights to simulate outside conditions.

If you have to do any pruning or removing of any damage limbs at this time of the year, it is extremely important that you seal over the open wound area with a pruning paint. It is advisable not to do any pruning or limb removal now unless absolutely necessary. For your lawn, stop fertilizing now in order to prevent new young top growth. Cut your grass short and let the clippings of your next cutting fall back onto the lawn. Do not catch or rake them and if your lawnmower has mulch attachment use it. This last cut grass should decay by the time it freezes to form a mulch for the root system of your lawn. Keep your grass cut low on a regular schedule which may mean mowing once a week until it freezes.

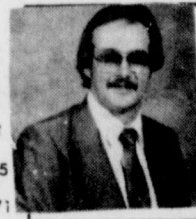

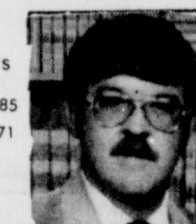

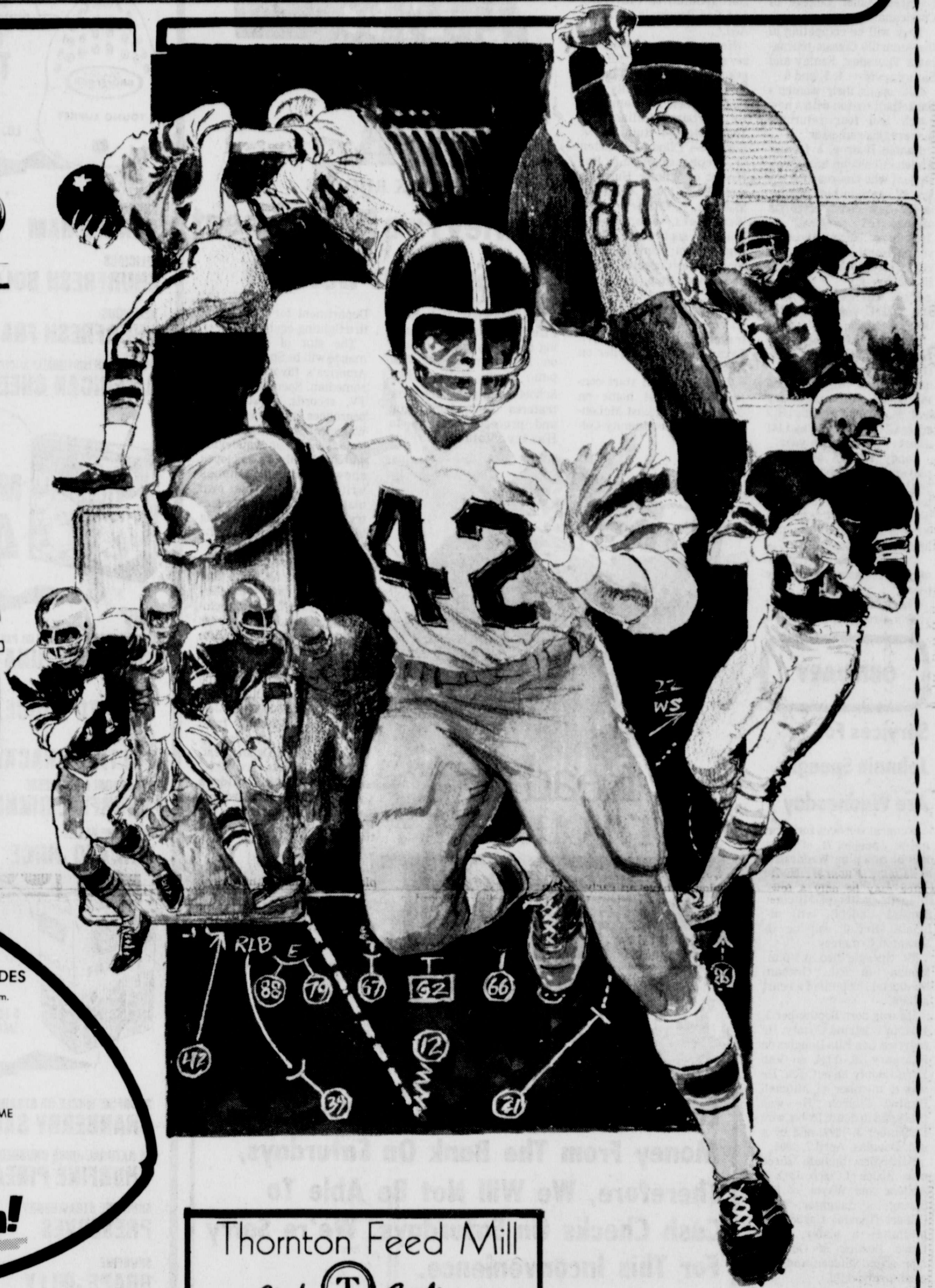

CJC opens their women's basketball season with a new coach and four returning players this semester.

Hearne is counting on seven freshmen to fill the graduation gaps: 5-10 Laney Oliver of Archer City; 6-1 Linda Bubert of Hamilton; 5-9 Barbara Williams of Thorndale; 5-7 Ruth Hill of Boyd; 5-4 Dinda Pendleton of Stephenville; 5-8 Pat Wright of Wilmer Hutchins and 6-0 Nancy Click of Merkel. Other CJC Wranglers are Kathy Phillips, sophomore, Cisco High School; Kim Malcolm, sophomore, Copperas Cove, and Sharon Culp, freshman, Clifton.

CJC will host a tourney November 11-13 before traveling to the Western Texas Classic in Snyder on November 26-27.

Cisco will then start conference play at home on December 1 against McLennan County Community College.
