## Good Crowd Turns Out For Chamber Breakfast

A good crowd turned out Thursday morning at 7:00 for the quarterly Chamber of Commerce breakfast held at the White Elephant Restaurant in Cisco. Chamber president Elaine Dixon called the group to order and Loyal Lundstrom gave the invocation.

Dick Woolley, spokesperson for the committee looking for a CofC manager, told those attending that financial problems are why the Chamber does not do more. He said the Chamber needs more members, because the more members it has, the more it can afford to do.

In the area of looking for a new manager, Mr. Woolley said they have three options. First to hire a young individual who has been trained to be a manager, but he said he thought the cost would be too high for Cisco's CofC to afford.

Second, the Chamber could look at the possibility of securing a retired person and paying him a salary to supplement his income; or, third, the Chamber could hire an untrained, young individual and groom him to the job.

Mr. Woolley stated the Chamber directors want a

unified movement on which course to follow in hiring a new manager. He stated the members support can guide the directors to do what is best.

He also said an informed membership is good to have and he asked that all members help in talking to others about joining the Chamber. It was explained that the Chamber offers business memberships or individual memberships to anyone who would like to support the Chamber.

The general consensus of those attending Thursday's breakfast seemed to be in favor of hiring an untrained individual and raising membership dues to help in paying him.

According to figures presented at the meeting, Cisco's Chamber has 150 members while Eastland has 210. Cisco's 1982 budget calls for \$20,000 while Eastland Eastland's calls for \$32,750.

President Dixon stated she believes a concentrated drive for members could probably double Cisco's membership, thus creating more money for the Chamber so it could do more for Cisco and its businesses.

## Baptist Student Center Sets Open House Sunday

The Baptist Student Center at Cisco Junior College will host an open house for the public in its new building Sunday afternoon from two until five p.m.

The new building, on the west side of the CJC campus, is constructed of logs, shipped in from Colorado, and built by volunteers from First Baptist, Calvary Baptist and East Cisco Baptist Church in Cisco. Wayne Webb acted as general contractor, with electrical work done by Tommy Lee, painting by Charles Preston, foundation work by Doug Hammer, heating and air conditioning by J&J Air Conditioning, and fireplace brick work by Gerald Jackson. Major suppliers included Cisco Lumber Company, S&M Supply Company, Reynolds

Manufacturing Co. Cabinets and vanities were supplied by Batteas Builders.

The new building replaces the previous center, a residence purchased by the three churches in 1968, next door. C.J.C. assumed ownership of that building. The three Cisco churches own the property, and receive financial support from the Cisco Baptist Association (34 churches in this area) and the Baptist General Convention of Texas in operating the center. Mrs. Ruth Skaggs is director of the center.

The center provides spiritual and recreational activities for dormitory and local students, with Bible studies, group projects and a weekly Sunday School class at the center on Sunday mornings.

The building contains 1500 square feet of space, including a large meeting room, kitchen, office and

rest rooms. The general public is invited to participate in the open house.

## Late Marion Ellis Fry Will Be Inducted Into Hall Of Fame

The late Marion Ellis Fry of Cisco will be inducted, posthumously, into the American Polled Hereford Association's Hall of Fame Monday, November 8, 1982. The induction will be at the 60th National Awards Banquet in Kansas, City, Mo., at 7:00 p.m. in the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

A picture of Mr. Fry and his hat, which will be bronzed, will be permanently kept in the Hall of Fame.

Mr. Fry was born September 5, 1887, in Brown County, Texas, and he passed away September 6, 1961, in Cisco, Texas.

A cattleman and rancher all of his life, Mr. Fry bought his first Polled Herefords in 1927 in Brown County. In 1943, he moved to Cisco and operated ranches in Eastland and Callahan Counties until his death.

In the early 1930s, Mr. Fry formed a partnership with his two sons and their ranches were operated under the name of M.E. Fry and Sons. The junior partners were the late Henry Fry, who maintained a herd of Polled Herefords until his death in 1982, and Douglas Fry, who continues in ran-

ching in the Cisco area.

Early in his ranching years, M.E. Fry recognized the growing interest in Polled Herefords and the need for organization in the development and promotion of the breed. He became a member of the American Polled Hereford Association in the early 1930s and was a lifetime friend of the late B.O. Gammon, a pioneer in Polled Hereford activities.

M.E. Fry was a charter member of the Texas Polled Hereford Association. He helped organize the Brown County Polled Hereford Association and served as its president for many years.

Using his natural ability and lessons learned from experience, M.E. Fry built the third largest herd of quality Polled Herefords in the United States. He sold breeding cattle in the Eastern market, but his primary interest was in the development of a market for Polled Hereford bulls for use on western ranges. He achieved considerable success in the field.

Over the years, M.E. Fry always found time to discharge fully all obligations of good citizenship.

To Speak At 4 P.M.



Marilyn Golightly, field coordinator for Region III of Texan's War on Drugs, will be in Eastland and Cisco on Tuesday, November 9. The public is invited and urged to come to these programs and hear Mrs. Golightly speak on the problems of drug abuse among our children and young people.

The first drug abuse program will be at 1:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church fellowship hall, 101 W. Plummer in Eastland. This program is being sponsored by the Eastland County Extension Homemakers Clubs.

At 4:00 p.m. Mrs. Golightly will be speaking at the Cisco High School. She helped with a teachers inservice in Cisco last year and spoke to the community.

The Parent Teacher Organization of Siebert Elementary School is spon-

soring a 7:00 p.m. program 7:00 p.m. Tuesday evening. As Texan's War on Drugs field coordinator, Mrs. Golightly covers the area on the north to Knox County, south to Del Rio and east to Cameron and Belton. She attended the University of Arkansas and University of Texas concentrating on Sociology and Early Childhood and Elementary Education. She taught nine years in the public schools.

Mrs. Golightly works out of the regional field office in San Angelo. Five other regional offices have been established strategically throughout the state for the purpose of reaching each citizen in its effort to diminish the use of drugs in Texas.

Eastland County has been identified as having a serious illegal drug traffic problem. School children are beginning drug and alcohol experimentation at earlier ages. With usage rates for marijuana and alcohol accelerating among 10 to 13 year old children, parents are learning the hard way the seriousness of what drugs can do psychologically and physically to young bodies and minds.

The Texan's War on Drugs commission has as its overall purpose to diminish drug and alcohol use among children and adolescents by educating and developing parent groups in Texas and the nation through Texan's War on Drugs.

The Texan's War on Drugs commission believes that a child's parents are the best bulwark against drug involvement. To fulfill that role, the parents must fully understand the subject and help others in the community to understand it. That means educating everyone who influences our youth—teachers, ministers, scout leaders, coaches, legislators, etc.

You too can help. Whether you are a parent, grandparent, teacher, business leader or a concerned citizen, you have a vested interest in the future of our youth. Everyone has the obligation to understand the problem of illegal drug abuse among our youth and to help find solutions. Texan's War on Drugs can assist in that effort.

# County Vote Pendulum Swings Back Democratic

Eastland County and other traditionally Democratic Texas voters flirted with Republican candidates long enough a few years ago to elect the first Republican governor since Reconstruction and encourage a record number of Republican office seekers in the General Election of '82 - but it appears to have been a passing fancy, as the voting booth doors proved to be revolving as voters went back to the Democratic columns in droves.

Countians stayed with their Democratic D.A.; four precincts joined to re-elect the Democratic County Commissioner; and fell in step with the rest of the state in going to the Democrats - which made Texas one of the key states in the nation where a "statehouse was lost" to the present ad-

ministration. Turnout of voters in this county was 5,537, above average, but far below the 10,000 eligible voters.

Democrat Mark White collected 3,294 votes in the county compared to Incumbent Gov. Bill Clement's 2,164. Guesses Wednesday went along this line: "Would Clements have gotten less if Mrs. Clements hadn't visited recently?"

Incumbent 91st District Court Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton got 3,818 votes for re-election, to Republican Challenger Stan Boose's 1,421 - a substantial three-to-one margin, but still a reminder that a great number would like to see more vigorous prosecution, less plea-bargaining and a general get-tough policy on crime.

Veteran Precinct Two County Commissioner Jack Blackwell won handily over Challenger Republican Robert Butler, 1,065 to 225.

Olden, Ranger, Desdemona and Lake Leon voters vote in that precinct.

On a total the county joined the state in okaying all of the six proposed constitutional amendments, with only Carbon voting against Nos. Five and Six, and Desdemona and Olden voting against No. Six.

From the top of the ballot, Eastland County voted with Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, 3,603 over Republican Jim Collins who got 1,848.

Cong. Charles Stenholm of the 17th District got 4,343 votes in Eastland County.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby got 3,461 and Strake, 1,874. Attorney General Candidate Jim Mattox got 3,436 and Bill Meier, 1,838. Comptroller Bob Bullock drew 3,298 and Challenger Mike Richards, 2,004 here. Treasurer Ann Richards, got 3,683 and Clark, 1,594. Mairs got 3,573 for land commissioner; Jim Hightower, 3,762 for Agriculture Commissioner; Jim Nugent 3,965 for Railroad Com.; and Democrats Robertson, Kilgarlin, Charles W. Barrow, John Onion, Charles

Campbell, Chuck Miller all drew big Eastland County votes for state judgeships.

State Sen. Bob Glasgow won a second term to the 22nd District getting 4,126 votes in Eastland County and winning in each of the 14 counties to making up the district.

Comanche Attorney Jim Parker got 3,342 votes here and led each of the six counties making up the 65th District to win election over Brown County Republican Gary Logan.

The County went with Incumbent Jewel Harris for State School Board with 3,605 votes, and local Resident, Unopposed Chief Justice of the 11th Court of Appeals Austin McCloud got 4,252 votes.

Other unopposed local candidates, all Democrats received votes as follows:

Carol Davis, who teaches food service sanitation and safety at TCU, and Dr. Phil Hartman, professor of biology states two hours is the longest you should keep food at room temperature.

They feel food should be kept below 45 degrees or above 140 degrees. Bacteria multiplies most rapidly between 60 and 120 degrees which includes most room temperatures.

Clean containers, clean hands and temperature control are three of the most important things for preventing food contamination.

Next week we will continue to discuss food poisoning.

# OILFIELD DISPATCH

Pumping 75 barrels of oil per day, the No. 4 Watson was completed successfully in the Rebecca (Marble Falls) Field by L.R. Pearson, Inc. of Abilene.

Drillsite is nine miles northeast of Cisco.

It was drilled to 3,945 ft. total depth and will produce from an interval 3,558 to 3,586 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on open choke.

The location is in a 310-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TCRR Co. Survey, Sec. 37.

At a location two miles northwest of Romney, Mercury Exploration Co. of Fort Worth has finished a new oil

### CHECK BUILDER'S CREDENTIALS

As with other consumer items, the quality of a new house varies according to the manufacturer. Before buying a new house, you should determine whether or not it was constructed by a reputable builder.

Good builders often have been in business a number of years under the same name and have customers who can attest to the quality of their house.

Many reliable builders are members of the registered builder program of the National Association of Home Builders. This program requires members to meet certain professional and financial standards.

Finally, we see if the builder is listed in the local telephone directory. Be cautious of builders who can be found only under the

name of a recent housing development and not under a permanent business identification.

A quick investigation of your builder can help assure that the house you buy is well built.

### KITCHEN STORAGE SPACE IN THE HOME

Before buying a home, examine the amount and configuration of the storage space in the kitchen. For a family of four, experts at the Federal Housing Administration recommended a minimum total shelf area of 50 square feet.

But beware of cabinets designed primarily to make the kitchen look like it contains a lot of storage space. Shelves which are only six inches deep are useless for storing most items.

FHA experts also recommend that a kitchen for the average family contain a minimum of 11 square feet of drawer space. Again, don't just look at the amount, but also the configuration.

Shallow drawers don't hold much, and the rear half of extremely deep drawers is hard to reach and tends simply to accumulate unus-

ed junk. Keep these suggestions in mind when shopping for a home—and remember to carry with you that one indispensable item: a measuring tape.

### WATCH TRAFFIC FLOW

Here are some tips that will help you select or design a home with good traffic flow patterns.

Experts suggest that your main entrance should lead people directly into the living room and be easily accessible from the driveway or street.

A separate family entrance with a sheltered walkway leading to the driveway also is desirable. This entrance can be used for bringing in groceries and wet or muddy children.

The room arrangement of the house should allow you to go from any room to any other room without passing through a third room, and the living room should be isolated from the normal traffic flow of the house to permit undisturbed conversation or entertainment.

The kitchen is the heart of the house and should be central to all areas. Finally, routes between all rooms in the house and the outdoor

areas should be short and direct.

### USING HOME SPACE TO GREATEST ADVANTAGE

If you are planning to build a home, plan the interior so you can use the available space to the greatest advantage.

For example, planning dual-purpose rooms can help. By combining the living and family rooms, less square footage is needed, the cost of partition walls is eliminated and the room appears more spacious.

Plan wall areas in relation to doors and windows and accommodate major pieces of furniture. Position doorways to form short traffic patterns and to prevent traffic through activity centers.

Major traffic patterns should be about four feet wide and minor ones one and half to four feet wide. Hang doors so they do not interfere with other doors or block light switches. The width of the interior doors usually is two feet six inches. Exterior doors usually are three feet wide.

The space in your home is valuable. Arrange it wisely.

### ENERGY BOOKLET FOR MOBILE HOMES

If you live in a manufactured home and want to save on your energy bills, then there is a new booklet available you should send for. It's called *The Energy Efficient Manufactured Home in Texas* and is published by the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council.

The booklet points out that regardless of what kind of home you live in, one good reason for using less energy is that energy costs will continue to rise.

In the last 10 years, average electricity rates in Texas have increased more than 400 percent and natural gas rates by about 700 percent. While these rates affect everyone, owners of manufactured homes have special ways to save energy, and this booklet can show you how.

## Check Builder's Credentials

### CHECK WATER SUPPLY BEFORE BUYING PROPERTY

The availability of water has a direct bearing on the value of land.

Before you buy rural property, locate the well. Examine the condition of the pump and other parts, and taste the water.

Find out if the property has a water meter. If it does, you can get water service from the local water system. If the property has no well or


water meter, you had better check with the local water association to see if it can serve your property.

Growth is a reality that rural water systems are facing throughout the state. They can not accommodate sudden growth and new customers are being refused.

Systems are being expanded and improved, but such projects can take years to complete. So, before you buy rural property, check the water supply.



To marinate venison, cover the meat with your favorite marinade and allow

it to stand in the refrigerator at least 24 hours. Then it will be ready to broil, roast or braise.

Or choose one of the wild-game marinades below:

- Vinegar to cover steak or roast
- French dressing
- Tomato sauce or undiluted tomato soup
- Fruit juice such as lemons or pineapple, or a mixture of many juices, 1/4 cup cooking oil, 1/2 teaspoon pepper and 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt.

- 2 cups water, 2 cups vinegar, 1 to 2 tablespoons sugar, 4 bay leaves, 1 teaspoon salt, 12 whole cloves, 1 teaspoon allspice and 3 medium-size sliced onions.
- Garlic salt, salt and pepper to taste, and equal parts of Worcestershire sauce and two of your favorite steak sauces. This gives a blend of flavors and also is excellent for basting game roasts or thick steaks during cooking.
- 2-tablespoons vinegar, 1 1/2 teaspoons ground ginger, 1 clove minced garlic, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 1/2 cup soy sauce and 3/4 cup vegetable oil

# Pest Alert

The small, silk weaving that resembles a Christmas tree ornament on your favorite evergreen is not there for decoration. Such woven bags protect the larvae and eggs of bagworms. Now is a good time to remove any bagworm pouches hanging on landscape. The most likely place to look is on juniper plants but they may be found on almost any nearby plant. Remove these bags and destroy them to prevent starting the cycle over.

Both broadleaf and coniferous trees and shrubs are attacked by this pest. These include: willow, cedar, sypress, white pine, box elder, locust, sycamore, maple, wild cherry, sumac, persimmon, arborviate, and other ornamental evergreens. Bagworms become exceedingly abundant every few years, but always present a persistent problem. There are several different species of this pest.

The bagworm larva builds tough, portable, silken case covered with layers of leaves, twigs and fragments of bark. The bag has a small opening at the lower end to expell refuse. A wider open-

ing at the top allows the worm to partially crawl out to feed. These bags are the most easily seen and identifiable feature of the insect. Infestations may not be noticeable at first, but if left unchecked, can completely defoliate trees and shrubs.

The adult female looks like a maggot, with no eyes, legs or antennae. The adult male resembles a small moth. After larval development subsequent pupation, adults emerge. The male escape through the lower end of their bags. The wingless females only emerge halfway and await mating.

After mating, the adult female deposits large number of eggs in her bag and then wiggles through the lower opening, drops to the ground and dies. Most species overwinter as eggs in the bags. As the larvae hatch, they let themselves down a single strand of silken thread and attach to adjacent limbs, where they begin building their own silk bags.

Handpicking the pest is the surest and cheapest means of control for small evergreen shrubs and trees in home landscapes. Be persistent and be sure to pick all of the bags and then smash

or burn them. If thrown to the ground, the eggs in the bags will still hatch in the spring and larvae may crawl back into the trees. It is useful at any time during the year to remove the bags. However, now is an important time to break the cycle before the eggs hatch in the spring.

When there are too many bags to handpick or the trees and shrubs are too large to reach safely, then the infested plants can be sprayed. However, insecticide application should be made in the spring soon after the eggs have hatched or while the larvae are small and actively feeding.



## Gordon Spot

We had frost in Eastland County this past week and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forages.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazing after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes non-toxic and can be grazed with 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poison acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In most acute cases, animals become affected within 10-15 minutes after eating toxic material and can die in two to three minutes. Symptoms may include a brief period of stimulation followed by depression and paralysis. Signs of colic may be present. Stupor (loss of sensibility), difficult breathing and frequent convulsions may result. Death is caused by suffocation since oxygen remains in the blood and is not exchanged to the tissues. This also causes the blood to appear bright red.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock follow these steps:

1. Allow plant material affected by frost to dry thoroughly before grazing. This may require a week or more of good sunlight.
2. Feed animals hay or a supplement before turning them in on plants that may contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will be limited.
3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.
4. Call a veterinarian immediately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from veterinarians.
5. Have suspect plant material checked by the

Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will be happy to submit samples for you.

The overall key to prevent prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed.

## Texas Independent Producers Support Legislative Actions

A major policy making committee of independent producers and royalty owners have recommended support of several legislative and regulatory actions to protect consumers and oil and gas owners in the natural gas market, reduce thefts of oil and gas equipment, and protect the interests of 650,000 Texas royalty owners in the event of bankruptcy of oil purchasing companies.

Hans Hansen, Midland, Chairman of the State Petroleum Issues Committee of the 5500-member Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, said in Austin that "Producers are angry because federal regulations have distorted the natural gas market and consumers nationwide are suffering price and supply problems. The regulations have tied the hands of state agencies who might otherwise cope with the problems."

"Texas consumers, royalty owners and producers are being especially impacted," Hansen related, and announced that the committee is recommending rule changes to the Texas Railroad Commission is recommending rule changes to the Texas Railroad Commission which will help insure that natural gas is taken equitably from prorated wells in the state. The committee also passed a resolution to work with the RRC and federal agencies to solve the problem of

interstate pipelines "dumping" excess gas into the intrastate market. "This practice is damaging Texas producers and royalty owners," Hansen reported, "and is driving up prices to some Texas consumers. Our state regulators must try to address this until corrections can be legislated in Washington."

The committee reaffirmed its support of a new bill proposed by Governor Clements which would allow royalty owners and independent producers to hold a lien against a bankrupt oil or gas purchaser. Under present Texas law, the owners of royalty oil are "unsecured creditors", who have small hope of recovering money owed for oil which has been delivered to buyers who subsequently go into receivership.

The committee said that oil theft amounts to millions of dollars per year, which eventually raises consumer prices. The committee is helping develop new legislation to prosecute oil field thieves, and this will be recommended in the 1983 Texas Legislature.

Additionally, the committee is actively supporting a proposed RRC manifest system, which will make it more difficult for thieves to transport stolen oil. The TIPRO committee includes two former RRC Commissioners - John Poerner and Bill Murray. Rex White, a former RRC

Oil and Gas Special Counsel, and a number of prominent Texas royalty owners and producers also serve on the committee.





## Book Review

## Lone Star And The Double Eagle

By Viola Payne

**LONE STAR AND THE DOUBLE EAGLE**  
 Author, Minetta Altgelt Goyne

Pub. 1982 by the Texas Christian University Press (Ed. Note: The book is available at Eastland Drug.)  
 There are people who are bored by history, and attempt to live in a one-dimensional present. Then there are people who appreciate history, and relish each detail it offers.

This new book, "Lone Star and The Double Eagle", subtitled "Civil War Letters of a German-Texas Family" will especially appeal to those history lovers who want authentic accounts.

For the main part of the book really does consist of old family letters, mostly written by a young man named Rudolf Coreth to his father, Ernst Coreth, and the rest of the Coreth family back in New Braunfels, Texas.

These Civil War letters were saved by Agnes Coreth Altgelt, mother of the author. They were deciphered and translated from the German by several individuals. Others provided specialized services and reference material.

The book delves into the ancestry of the Count Ernest Coreth family in Austria, then concentrates on experiences of the son, Rudolf. Occasionally there are letters back to Rudolf from the father, Ernst, at New Braunfels, or from some other member of the family.

The Ernst Coreth family was unusual in many ways. Although descended from a royal family in Austria, the Coreths joined the tide of German immigration to Texas in the mid 1800's. They reached New Braunfels in Dec. 1846.

Like many other German emigrants, the Coreths had barely settled into their new home and lands when the

Civil War posed a terrible problem. There was little sympathy for slavery or secession. Yet they decided to fight with Texas and the south, unlike many other citizens of the German Colonies.

Eventually other sons beside Rudolf joined the Southern Army, and two died during the war. Rudolf was mainly stationed in Southern Texas, so he survived.

Rudolf's letters are well-written, sensitive documents, giving an ac-

count of his daily hardships and his effort to find a meaning in them. His deep attachment for his father and family radiates through the material. There is also his priceless commentary on politics, frontier problems, human behavior, and the stupidity of military actions.

There have been too few authentic, readable books about the German settlers of Central Texas, and this one is bound to have a sure place. Its Bibliography is lengthy, and includes many papers and unpublished material. The Epilog of

Rudolf Coreth is also interesting, for he became a businessman and world traveler after his Civil War experiences. The author accomplished a tremendous task in assembly all this material.

But beyond the historical, the greatest value of the book lies in its humanity - its ability to help us understand the thoughts of an intelligent young man caught in a bad situation not of his own making. Rudolf Coreth was far from us in time and place, yet he seems to live again.





**Over Production**  
 For the past several decades the forecast by the government and news casters have told us that shortly we would not be able to produce enough food to supply the fast increasing population of the world.

This somehow has not been the case, other countries have begun to produce not only enough for themselves, but also a surplus to sell abroad.

The U.S. farmers have bought larger machinery, rented the land that we had in the lay out program and have over produced Cotton, corn, wheat and feed grains.
