



## **CJC Wranglers & Ladies Now Have 10-6 Records**

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers and Lady Wranglers are alread enjoying their Christmas present-time off-and both teams can rest comfortably after closing out the first half of the season with 10-6 records.

Freshman David Jones and sophomore Bruce Coleman continue to engage in a see-saw battle for the top scoring spot for the Wranglers. Coleman has the edge in the season scoring, 19.4 to 18.8, but Jones is at 22 points a game and Coleman at 17.7 in Northern Texas Junior College Athletic Conference play.

The Wranglers are 2-1 in conference action and when they return to play Jan. 10, they'll have a nonconference game to help get them ready to resume league play against Southwestern Christian two nights later.

In their last outing, the Wranglers handily downed Texas State Technical Institute in Waco, 98-75, and Coleman's 25 points and 12 rebounds were a big factor in the win. Teddy Butler helped

threw in 14. Guard Dexter Caesar added 10 more.

Again, the Wranglers did what they've been doing all year in victory--shooting over the 50 percent mark. In this game, the Wranglers hit 52.6 percent of their shots, and they shot 76 times.

# Birthday Party Is Held By Masons

Members of the Cisco heated by a fireplace and Masonic Lodge were challenged to enter their second century with ambition and purpose by Bob Waters of Arlington, deputy grand master of the Grand Lodge of Texas, in an address at their 100th anniversary meeting last Saturday night at the Masonic Hall.

Mr. Waters presented Virgil Murphy, master of the lodge, a framed centennial certificate commemorating the 100th anniversary of the organization.

The speaker recalled conditions under which 20 men met to organize Cisco Lodge 556, AF&AM, on Dec. 16, 1882. He noted that they very probably met in a room

historic meeting. "It is fitting that we pay tribute to those pioneers,' Mr. Waters said. "We are today enjoying fruits of their efforts. In their honor, let us dedicate the beginning of the second 100 years to a positive program - one with a purpose

Mr. Waters emphasized that worship of God and living by His teachings have always been a mission of Free Masonery. "We constantly show the world our love of God," he noted. 'Masons will continue to make leading men in paths

of righteousness their most effective example.

E.D. Farley, long-time member of the Cisco lodge, gave a history of the lodge. He displayed a number of minute books that dated back to 1891 with significant data concerning events in the organization's history. Mr. Farley noted that 20 men signed the original charter on Dec. 16, 1882, and each signed a \$25 note to raise money for the first lodge building that was destroyed by fire a few years later. The next hall was destroyed in the 1893 cyclone along with most of the lodge's records and belongings. A temporary building was used until a new hall was erected in 1906 at Conrad Hilton Avenue and 8th

Street. This property was used until the present building was erected in the 1960s. Charter members of the

lodge were listed as follows: John F. Patterson, J.S. Bedford, E.F. James, J.H. Dickerson, W.E. Mancill, J.R.P. Chapman, B.S. Pate, L.R. Jordan, M.V. Mitchell, John R. Brumley, N.J. Whitfield, W.H. Johnson, W.D. Chandler, W.C. Pulley, W.A. Stephens, L.W. Walker, N.P. Spillers, W.S. Anderson, A.J. Carpenter and S.S. Ramsey. The lodge has 27 50-year members, the Farley report showed. 



## **Sabanna River Flood Plan Was Terminated**

### **By Viola Payne**

The recent letter from a Department of Agriculture Agency terminating the Flood Control Plan of the Sabanna River Watershed was a special blow to Eastland and Comanche County officials, who have worked on the project for many years.

It demonstrated that long, thorough work and even approval by Congress of a project can come to nothing if funding is refused. Yet the need for the retention dams for flood control remains, according to a number of citizens and officials.

"In my opinion," states Judge Scott Bailey, "There is a greater need now than ever for this project, due to drastic changes in the watershed, especially the clearing of land.'

The 45 mile long Sabanna River (there is some dispute about the spelling of its name) rises in the hills of southeastern Callahan County. It flows through southern Eastland County and enters

created a Municipal Water Comanche County, where it District to deal with water joins the Leon River and from Lake Proctor. This flows into Lake Proctor. There it reportedly throws in plenty of silt.

The river drainage area is generally about 7 miles across, and takes in 199,040 acres. of these 9,650 lie directly in a flood plain. About 30,000 adjoining acres are also affected by the flooding, and these were expected to be involved in a land treatment program. In 1977 there were 155 land owners and operators who would be directly benefitted by the Flood Control Plan.

The Sabanna - fringed by pecan trees and bordered by oak-dotted pastures - has a tranquil appearance. It is often totally dry, for there are few springs on the river or its tributaries. But due to the nature of the terrain, and the quick heavy rains which sometimes fall in the headwaters, major floods occur every few years. The most damaging recent floods have been in 1941, '49, '56, '67 and

During the last intensive study (1977) it was estimated that average annual damages in the floodwater plain ran over \$219,000. At that time the beneifts coming from flood control retention dams were indicated as \$254,820.00 annually.

The cost of the project was estimated as \$3,470,000.00, of which the local share would be \$379,810.00. Since that time construction costs of the 15 flood retention dams have gone up considerably. The official years of County Judge Scott Bailey almost parrallel the work on the Sabanna Flood Prevention Project. The matter was first brought to public attention when Bailey was a State Congressional candidate in 1960. In March of that year he attended a meeting of area farmers and ranchers at Center Point school, near Carbon. He recalls that a Mr. McAlister. Head of the Soil Conservation, Stephen-

The various Judges of Comanche County, with the latest being Judge John Livingston, helped in every way possible. The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture did much work and study on the

Watershed plan, and later assisted with an environmental impact study. In 1969 the official sponsors from Eastland and Comanche County were asked to reaffirm their sponsor-

ship, which they did. From the start the plans to control the Sabanna floods envisioned 15 retention dams (14 in Eastland County) which would hold 540 acre ft. of empounded water. This would make a reduction in





(Editor's Note: This beautiful story was repeated a number of times by Veterans after World War I. It was probably told publically for the first time by Alexander Woolcott at a meeting of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Christ remain with all mankind, every day, so that all the horrible deeds of violence could be blotted out for all time!)

It was Christmas Eve during World War I. Two hostile regiments faced each other

across the trenches. No activity was sheduled for that evening, and two warring troups were celebrating Christmas in the freezing cold and slimy mud.

"Froeliche Weinachten!"

He shouted. In another moment No Man's Land was filled with soldiers, German and Allied, shaking one another's hands, wishing one another a Merry Christmas, each in his own language, exchanging tobacco and candy.

For the rest of that Eve, there was a Christmas party in No Man's Land. Men who were to kill one another the next day sang together and shared with each other the little that they had. On that Eve men of good will walked between the trenches, and with them walked the spirit that is Christmas.
