Some 1,500 Persons Tour Bank During Open House

Some 1,500 patrons and friends of the First National Bank in Cisco toured the new \$1,400,000 building and plant during an open house program from 1:30 to 4 p.m. Sunday.

President Lee D. (Dick) Woolley said the event was a good success. Patrons seemed well pleased with the new banking facilities, he said.

Mr. and Mrs. Woolley and daughter Sandra and Executive Vice President Jerry Morgan formed a receiving line to greet visitors as they entered the bank. All employees were at their desks and stations. Secretaries registered guests at their desks in front of loan officer's quarters.

Favors were distributed by bank tellers at their windows. Visitors were shown the various offices and departments, including the four bay drive-in department, bookkeeping and other offices. Visitors went into the community room for their final stop. Coffee, punch and cookies were served.

Mr. Woolley said banking operations were smooth in all departments as the 75-year old institution opened Monday for its second week in the new building. All computers were in operation as was equipment in the four drive-in bays.

Only the Banker 24 Service remained to be activated. Mr. Woolley said that the new service will require a special SWBell Telephone Co. line that is scheduled for installation within two weeks. This new service will enable patrons to transact business when the bank is closed to make deposits, withdraw cash, receive account balances, make account transfers and pay MasterCard accounts.

On the program for Tuesday night was a special open house for employees and officers of area banks who were invited to tour the new building and inspect facilities.

"We appreciated the many compliments that came to our employees and officers from our patrons and friends who expressed pleasure with our new facilities," Mr. Woolley said. "Their expressions of pleasure and confidence added to our pride in being able to provide the kind of banking service that our community deserves. We thank our patrons for the kind of support that has made it possible for us to grow and make progress."

The bank was decorated in Christmas colors and ornaments, including an attractive tree in the lobby. Numerous plants and flowers that came from well wishers were displayed about the lobby and in offices.

Under construction for about a year, the bank moved into the new building the previous weekend.

City Has Night Deposit Facility

Effective this week, the City of Cisco had night deposit facilities for the benefit of persons wishing to pay water bills or leave mail at the city hall after business hours. City Manager Mike Moore reported.

The new facility will permit water bill payment on weekends or at night, the city manager said. He suggested that those using the facility should write checks rather than leave cash in envelopes for safety reasons.

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers and Lady Wranglers are already enjoying their Christmas present-time off—and both teams can rest comfortably after closing out the first half of the season with 10-6 records.

Freshman David Jones and sophomore Bruce Coleman continue to engage in a see-saw battle for the top scoring spot for the Wranglers. Coleman has the edge in the season scoring, 19.4 to 18.8, but Jones is at 22 points a game and Coleman at 17.7 in Northern Texas Junior College Athletic Conference play.

The Wranglers are 2-1 in conference action and when they return to play Jan. 10, they'll have a non-conference game to help get them ready to resume league play against Southwestern Christian two nights later.

In their last outing, the Wranglers handily downed Texas State Technical Institute in Waco, 98-75, and Coleman's 25 points and 12 rebounds were a big factor in the win. Teddy Butler helped

out with 17 points and Jones threw in 14. Guard Dexter Caesar added 10 more.

Again, the Wranglers did what they've been doing all year in victory—shooting over the 50 percent mark. In this game, the Wranglers hit 52.6 percent of their shots, and they shot 76 times.

One of the big surprises in recent game has been the play of reserve guard Lincoln Jones. Jones (who has now earned a starting spot), has stepped in to help run the CJC offense and is averaging 7.5 points a game after playing in only six games.

The Lady Wranglers likewise are 2-1 in NTJCAC play and have time off until their Jan. 12 meeting with Southwestern Christian.

The second impressive win in as many games helped the CJC women to their 10th victory of the season as they pounded Texas State Technical Institute 89-37 last Thursday.

Freshmen Linda Bubert and Barbara Williams continue to pace the Lady Wranglers in scoring and rebounding. Both are scoring at a 15.3 clip in conference play, while Williams is 14.6

and Bubert 12.2 for the season.

Williams is the leading rebounder with 140 and Bubert has 96.

The team is averaging 72.7 points a game for the season and 82.3 for conference. CJC is averaging 38.9 rebounds a game through 16 games.

One other Lady Wrangler joins Williams and Bubert in double-figures scoring for the season as sophomore Sherrie Hill is hitting 11.3 points a game. She is at 11.7 in conference play.

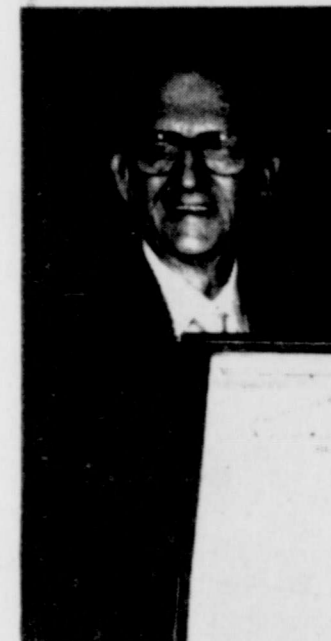
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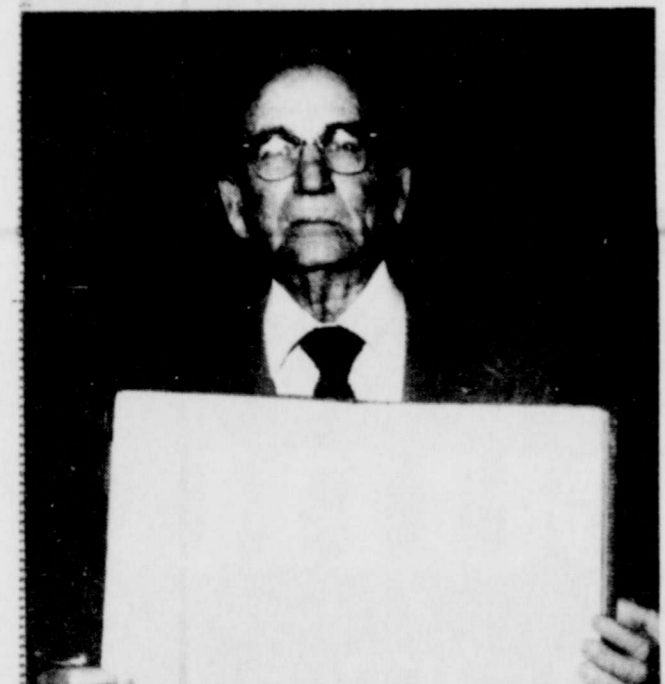
Birthday Party Is Held By Masons

heated by a fireplace and lighted with candles and that they either walked or rode horseback to attend the historic meeting.

"It is fitting that we pay tribute to those pioneers," Mr. Waters said. "We are today enjoying fruits of their efforts. In their honor, let us dedicate the beginning of the second 100 years to a positive program - one with a purpose."

Mr. Waters emphasized that worship of God and living by His teachings have always been a mission of Free Masonry. "We constantly show the world our love of God," he noted. "Masons will continue to make leading men in paths

of righteousness their most effective example."

E.D. Farley, long-time member of the Cisco lodge, gave a history of the lodge. He displayed a number of minute books that dated back to 1891 with significant data concerning events in the organization's history.

Mr. Farley noted that 20 men signed the original charter on Dec. 16, 1882, and each signed a \$25 note to raise money for the first lodge building that was destroyed by fire a few years later. The next hall was destroyed in the 1893 cyclone along with most of the lodge's records and belongings. A temporary building was used until a new hall was erected in 1906 at Conrad Hilton Avenue and 8th Street. This property was used until the present building was erected in the 1960s.

Charter members of the lodge were listed as follows: John F. Patterson, J.S. Bedford, E.F. James, J.H. Dickerson, W.E. Mancill, J.R.P. Chapman, B.S. Pate, L.R. Jordan, M.V. Mitchell, John R. Brumley, N.J. Whitfield, W.H. Johnson, W.D. Chandler, W.C. Pulley, W.A. Stephens, L.W. Walker, N.P. Spillers, W.S. Anderson, A.J. Carpenter and S.S. Ramsey.

The lodge has 27 50-year members, the Farley report showed. This group includes Dr. D. Ball, L.G. Ball, W.J. Britian, Dave P. Carlton, Charles F. Coats, Elbert Davis, W.A. Dennard, Ira J. Dobbins, Roy W. Dodson, Irvin P. Frazier, P.D. Glenn, Eugene M. Jacobs, R.G. Love, Charles E. Mayhew, Henry V. McCorkle, A.E. McNeely, G.B. Murray, S.S. Noblitt, John W. Ridgeway, Robt. A. Shepher, W.A. Smith, Geo. E. Wilson, C.H. Yeager, W.H. Britain, E.G. Darron, Joseph T. Kent and Wm. J. Anderson.

He, with the Eastland County Commissioners, voted to sponsor the project. Other sponsors were the Comanche County Commissioner's Court, the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation Dist., and the Upper Leon Soil and Water Dist.

As time went by, numerous individuals in Eastland and Comanche County assisted with various phases of the plans. Ross Wilson of Gorman, Manager of Southwestern Peanut Grower's Association worked for it. The various Judges of Comanche County, with the latest being Judge John Livingston, helped in every way possible. The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture did much work and study on the Watershed plan, and later assisted with an environmental impact study.

In 1969 the official sponsors from Eastland and Comanche County were asked to reaffirm their sponsorship, which they did.

From the start the plans to control the Sabanna floods envisioned 15 retention dams (14 in Eastland County) which would hold 540 acre ft. of impounded water. This would make a reduction in annual runoff of 811 acre ft., and reduce erosion on the flood plain by 80 per cent.

This would serve a number of purposes - recreational as well as practical. It was expected to enhance the whole environment of the area. Furthermore, it would give local people a number of jobs during the 8 yr. construction period.

During his years in Washington, Congressman Omar Burlison pressed for approval of the Sabanna Flood Control. Around 1970 the Congress, under Watershed Planning of the Rivers and Harbors Act, authorized the project. But funding was delayed.

About that time environmental concerns became more evident. More environmental studies of the project were required. Additional detailed - and even tedious - data on the project was assembled in book form. This volume of more than 100 pages was finished in 1977, and presented to agencies in Washington in 1978.

In 1978 the Carter Administration began to strike out or postpone various Rivers and Harbors projects. The Sabanna Flood Control Project was postponed, and referred back for more study. The Nov. 8, 1982 letter states the conclusions: "Planning assistance under PL-566 is being terminated on Sabanna River Watershed because a benefit-cost-ratio cannot be obtained under present conditions."

Officials from Eastland and Comanche Counties will be studying the situation, trying to determine what can be done. There has been no statement from the Office of Congressman Charles Stenholm at this time concerning the project. The Sabanna Flood Control seems to have no overload of friends in Washington.

"But it all depends on where the Government places its priorities," stated one local official. "It comes down to whether you want to bury a bunch of war missiles somewhere, or whether you want something beneficial to show for where you spend your money."

And in the middle - the old timers say the Sabanna will probably go on another big tear some of these days. And this time there will be some oil rigs in its path, as well as hay grazer and cattle.

Sabanna River Flood Plan Was Terminated

The recent letter from a Department of Agriculture Agency terminating the Flood Control Plan of the Sabanna River Watershed was a special blow to Eastland and Comanche County officials, who have worked on the project for many years.

It demonstrated that long, thorough work and even approval by Congress of a project can come to nothing if funding is refused. Yet the need for the retention dams for flood control remains, according to a number of citizens and officials.

"In my opinion," states Judge Scott Bailey, "There is a greater need now than ever for this project, due to drastic changes in the watershed, especially the clearing of land."

The 45 mile long Sabanna River (there is some dispute about the spelling of its name) rises in the hills of southeastern Callahan County. It flows through southern Eastland County and enters

Comanche County, where it joins the Leon River and flows into Lake Proctor. There it reportedly throws in plenty of silt.

The river drainage area is generally about 7 miles across, and takes in 199,040 acres. Of these 9,650 lie directly in a flood plain. About 30,000 adjoining acres are also affected by the flooding, and these were expected to be involved in a land treatment program. In 1977 there were 155 land owners and operators who would be directly benefited by the Flood Control Plan.

The Sabanna - fringed by pecan trees and bordered by oak-dotted pastures - has a tranquil appearance. It is often totally dry, for there are few springs on the river or its tributaries. But due to the nature of the terrain, and the quick heavy rains which sometimes fall in the headwaters, major floods occur every few years. The most damaging recent floods have been in 1941, '49, '56, '67 and '68.

During the last intensive study (1977) it was estimated that average annual damages in the floodwater plain ran over \$219,000. At that time the benefits coming from flood control retention dams were indicated as \$254,820.00 annually.

The cost of the project was estimated as \$3,470,000.00, of which the local share would be \$379,810.00. Since that time construction costs of the 15 flood retention dams have gone up considerably.

The official years of County Judge Scott Bailey almost parallel the work on the Sabanna Flood Prevention Project. The matter was first brought to public attention when Bailey was a State Congressional candidate in 1960. In March of that year he attended a meeting of area farmers and ranchers at Center Point school, near Carbon. He recalls that a Mr. McAlister, Head of the Soil Conservation, Stephenville, led out at the meeting and showed slides relating to flood control.

The farmers and ranchers discussed how tired they were of having crops destroyed, losing pecans to the flood water, having livestock washed away, fences torn down, and water gaps washed out. The question of County maintenance of roads and bridges in the flood plain was also discussed. This was the first of a number of such meetings.

After Bailey was elected as Congressman, he co-sponsored a bill with Congressman Ben Barnes of Comanche County which

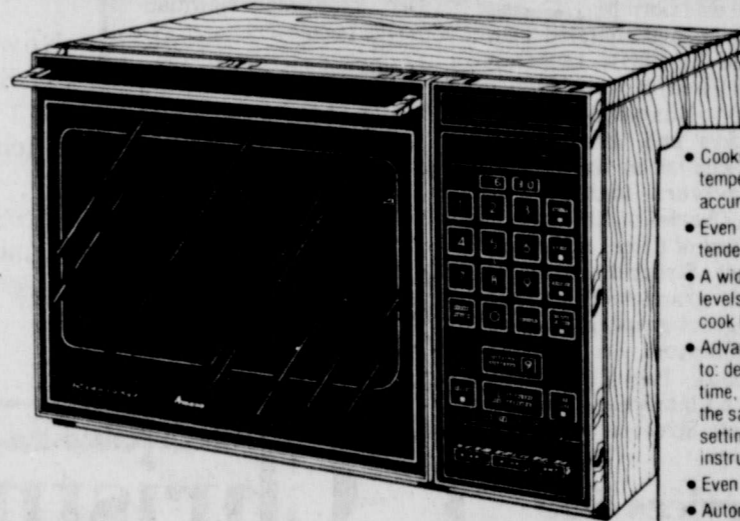

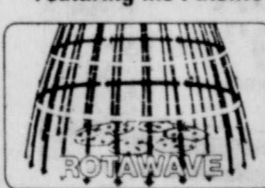

NOTICE TO WATER CUSTOMERS OF HIGH TURBIDITY

Dear Customer: The City of Cisco during the month of October, 1982, supplied water that exceeded the Texas Department of Health's "Drinking Water Standards," which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (US), for turbidity. The water supplied failed one or more of the following criteria: (1) the monthly average exceeded 1 turbidity unit (TU). The presence of excessive turbidity or cloudiness in drinking water may interfere with the effectiveness of disinfection of the

water. Permitting the turbidity level to exceed the standard may present a risk to the health of persons drinking the water.

However, up to five turbidity units (TU) may be allowed if the supplier can demonstrate that the higher turbidity does not: (1) interfere with disinfection, (2) prevent maintenance of an effective disinfectant agent throughout the distribution system, (3) interfere with microbiological measurements.

The water system is being studied to correct any high turbidity at any future date.

The notification of the public is in compliance with Texas "Drinking Water Act," as a means of keeping the public informed.

(Editor's Note: This beautiful story was repeated a number of times by Veterans after World War I. It was probably told publicly for the first time by Alexander Woolcott at a meeting of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Christ remain with all mankind, every day, so that all the horrible deeds of violence could be blotted out for all time!

It was Christmas Eve during World War I. Two hostile regiments faced each other

across the trenches. No activity was scheduled for that evening, and two warring troupes were celebrating Christmas in the freezing cold and slimy mud.

From the Allied trenches came the sound of singing and laughing as packages from home were opened and letter read from loved ones

far away. From the German, too, came sounds of revelry and - who knows - perhaps they too were reading letters from their wives and children. After a while, as the damp cold penetrated their bones, both sides became quiet.

Suddenly from one trench came a light tenor voice

singing in English, "Silent Night, Holy Night, All is calm, all is bright -" Other voices joined in one by one. Then - from the listening German - came a chorus,

"Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht -"

In a moment enemies of the day were singing together in the night.

Soon a head popped over the Allied embankment. "Merry Christmas, Fritz," called a voice.

"Froeliche Weinachten!" Roared a chorus. A man climbed over the German trench, hand extended.

"Froeliche Weinachten!" He shouted.

In another moment No Man's Land was filled with soldiers, German and Allied, shaking one another's hands, wishing one another a Merry Christmas, each in his own language, exchanging tobacco and candy.

For the rest of that Eve, there was a Christmas party in No Man's Land. Men who were to kill one another the next day sang together and shared with each other the little that they had. On that Eve men of good will walked between the trenches, and with them walked the spirit that is Christmas.

In selecting a Christmas gift for that gardener on your list is easier than you may think.

The first thought is some type of plant. Usually the avid gardener has already purchased any plant that he or she wants or needs. Most of the Christmas plants such as Poinsettias and Christmas/Thanksgiving cactus will not survive year round except in the extreme South.

Then you think about some tool that the gardener will use in his or her gardening. In this instance usually the gardener has already purchased the tool in order to save him time and improve his or her garden.

We have almost forgotten a category of Christmas gifts for the gardener. This category is gardening books. Then within this category we have two basic types of books. The one on a specific subject (plant) and the one on basic general gardening.

Here we have a major problem. There are many general gardening books that is written in other sections of the United States, that is foreign to the Southwestern area we live in. In many instances the weather is more severe in the winter and less severe in the summer, where the book is written than we have here in the Southwest. Also there will always be the difference in the make up of the various

Most condominium associations require owners to pay a fee, which may vary from \$10 to more than \$100 per month.

This money is used by the condominium association to meet its responsibilities for development, management and upkeep of the common areas. These include everything in the condominium except the interior space of the units. The association must spend funds for cleaning, lawn care, utilities, repairs, taxes and insurance.

There also may be special recreational and social facilities to maintain, such

as a pool or club house. In addition, the association may employ a professional manager to oversee these duties.

Monthly assessments are often the only source of funds to pay for all these services. For special purposes, such as a major repair, an additional assessment may be necessary.

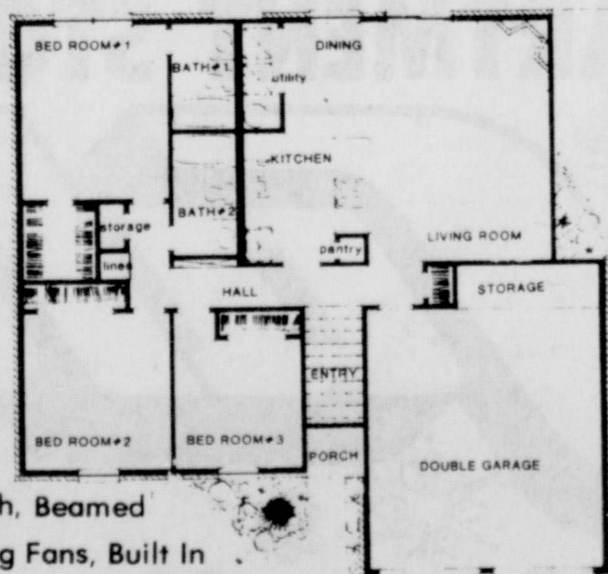

A 2,000-foot wildcat for oil is planned by M.M. White & Associates of Eastland at a drillsite nine miles southwest of Cisco, Eastland County. The location is in a 120-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 80, Blk. 3. Well's designation is the No. 2 Hagan.

TLC Development Corp. of Ft. Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 and No. 3 H.G. Beene, two projected 1,850-foot wildcats for oil or gas, two miles south of Scranton. The ventures will be in a 20-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 127, Blk. 3.

A wildcat for oil is scheduled for spudding two miles southeast of Throckmorton by Sierra Exploration Co., operator from San Antonio. The well will be known as the No. 1 Bert Davis, with projected total depth of 4,990 feet. It will be situated in a 203 acre lease in Eastland County's S.F. Shaw Survey, A-251.

Location has been staked by Hemispheric Oil & Gas Inc. of Carrollton for a 1,000-foot Eastland County wildcat. The explorer well will be known as the No. 2 Erma Lowe. It is in a 40-acre lease in the Louisa Pamplin Survey, two miles south of

Pioneer. It is aimed at either oil or gas production.

Regal Operating Inc., operating out of Eastland has recorded four successful development wells in the Midkiff Field. They are the No. 2-A, 3-A, 5-A, and 7-A Johnson, showing potential for 48, 44, 40, and 64 barrels of crude oil per day, respectively. All wells were tested on an open choke.

Drillsite was in a 510-acre lease for the 2-A and 7-A wells and a 509-acre lease for the 3-A and 5-A wells. The four new oilers are all located in the Mary Ann Clark Survey, Sec. 29, about 10 miles south of Cisco.

Total depth was 1,200 feet for each well with the pay zone being entered between 1,131 and 1,145 feet. Perforation intervals ranged between 1,131 and 1,155 feet.

Leslie Oil & Gas Inc. of Columbus, Ohio has filed for permit to drill a 3,999-foot wildcat four miles north of Okra, in Eastland County's Andrew Kent Survey, No. 344. The operator has 100-acres under lease.

Abilene-based Guard Oil Co. has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Bridges, a wildcat to be located 12 miles west of Cisco. With projected total depth of 700 feet, the well is in an 80-acre lease in Eastland County's BBB&C RR Co. Survey, Sec. 2.

Three wildcats for oil are scheduled for spudding 10 miles south of Cisco by Dallas Energy Development Corp., operator of Dallas. The three wells each have a projected total depth of 4,000 feet. The No. 1 Chambliss will be situated in an 80-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 77. The No. 2 and 3 St. Johns are to be in a 191-acre lease in the Mary Ann Clark Survey, Lot 4.

A 3,999-foot wildcat is planned by Leshe Oil & Gas Inc. of Columbus, Ohio, at a drillsite four miles southwest of Romney, Eastland County. The loca-

tion is in a 135-acre lease in the Mary Ann Clark Survey, Lot 2. Well's designation is the No. 5 J.B. Hunt "B".

The Davenport Field gained a new gas producer when the No. 1 Big Mike "A" was completed by Comanche Investments of Cisco, three miles east of Ranger.

On a 2-inch choke, the well showed ability to yield up to 390,000 CF gas per day. The absolute open flow came in at 2,000,000 CFD. Location is in a 20-acre lease in Eastland County's Andrew Bradley Survey, A-15.

Comanche took the hole to 3,576 foot bottom and perforated for production 3,367 to 3,389 feet into the wellbore.

Location has been staked by Mercury Exploration Co. of Ft. Worth for a 1,500-foot Eastland County wildcat. The explorer well will be known as the No. 1 A. Gilbert. It is in an 87-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 38, Blk. 3, five miles west of Carbon.

Roy T. Rimmer of Ft. Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. 1-S.W.B. Wright, a 1,600-foot developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field, two miles west of Eastland. The operation will be in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 28, Blk. 4.

The No. 1 Harris, a developmental try in Eastland County's Matt Finch Survey, A-134, is scheduled to be spudded four miles east of Eastland. With projected total depth of 3,800 feet, the well will be in the

Eastland Regular Field. John R. Thompson Operating Co. of Abilene is listed as the operator.

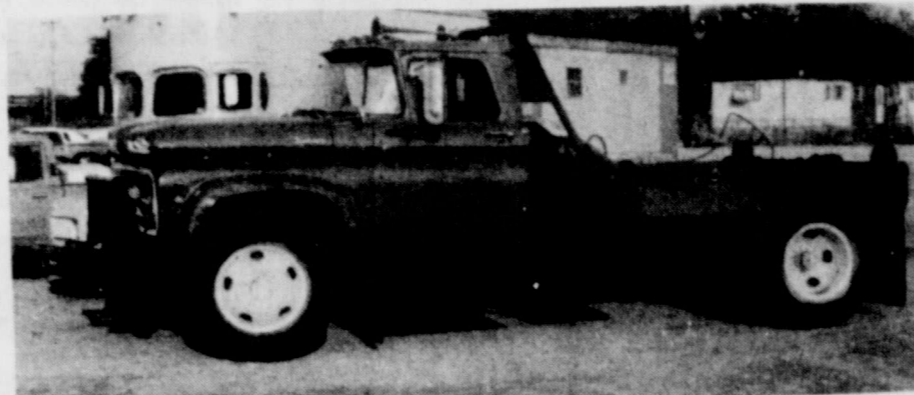
Southeastern Resources Corp. of Rising Star has revealed plans to drill a 4,200-foot developmental well in the MJM Field. A 4,500-ft. wildcat for gas is scheduled for spudding one mile northwest of Mineral Wells by Roanoke Corp. of Fort Worth. The explorer well will be known as the No. 1 Robert C. Willingham. It will be located in a 640-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

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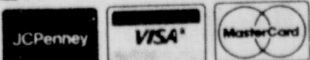

The HSU musicians will be featured in a 2 1/2 minute production number over CBS-TV during the first third of the parade which will begin at 9 a.m.

Cowboy band director Bill Woods, said the 48-member band will play a western medley of "I'm An Old Cowhand," "Home On The Range," "I've Got Spurs That Jingle, Jingle, Jingle" (by the percussionists), and "San Antonio Rose," during the spotlight over national television.

During the parade through downtown Dallas, the Cowboy musicians will feature their famous "cowstep," which moves the band along at 220 beats a minute, as opposed to the more sedate 120 used by most bands.

The Dallas audience will hear "The Eyes of Texas" and "Eagle Squadron" from the instruments of the bandmen as they march in Big D prior to the Cotton Bowl contest later that afternoon.

The invitation to the Cowboy Band and White Horse riders came from Jim Skinner, executive secretary of the Cotton Bowl Council.

The bandmen and coeds are scheduled to interrupt their Christmas holidays and travel to Dallas on Dec. 30 and 31.

They will go as a group to the Cotton Bowl New Year's Day and return to Abilene about 9 p.m. on Jan. 1.

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
