Widespread Search Here Ends Wednesday Morning

Loyal Lundstrom Surrenders To Local Police

A widespread search for Loyal Lundstrom, Cisco business man, ended at 8:10 a. m. Wednesday when he surrendered to local police as he deplaned from an Eastern Airlines flight at Dallas-Fort Worth Airport.

He had been sought since March 5th in the shotgun slaying of his 27-year old wife Doris at their Cisco Motel Apartment home.

Police Chief Randy Whittle and Detective Jackie Hobbs met Lundstrom at the DFW airport in accordance with arrangements worked out after the fugitive telephoned a close friend in Cisco.

After his surrender, Chief Whittle said they immediately took Lundstrom to the police station in nearby Grapevine where his rights were read to him. Then, he

was handcuffed to Detective Hobbs for the trip to Cisco. The family friend accompanied the two Cisco officers to DFW and rode home with them and Lundstrom, 59.

In Cisco, Lundstrom was taken to City Hall where police planned to question him. He has been a member of the City Council in Cisco for some two years and is well known at City Hall. Observers believed that he would soon resign as a Councilman and mayor pro tem.

After arriving at the Police Station Lundstrom decided that he should have legal counsel before making any statement so police did not question him. He was taken before Justice of the Peace A.C. Holder, who again read his rights to him. The original \$50,000 bond set when murder charges were

filed last week was raised to \$100,000.

Police then took Lundstrom to the Eastland County jail where he was photographed, fingerprinted and logged in at 4 p.m. Wednesday. Sheriff Johnny Morren said that Lundstrom was a model prisoner and that he had had no company and would only be allowed company on Wednesdays - visitor's day - until such time as he makes bond. He had conferred with an Eastland attorney who told The Press that he had not been retained as of late Thursday.

Chief Whittle spent Thursday in Dallas working on details of the case. An autopsy report last week showed that Doris Lundstrom, mother of the couple's five children, died from a

shotgun blast. District Attorney Emory Walton told interviewers Thursday that "they've got a weapon now." A shotgun was reportedly found at the motel. Details were not expected to be released immediately.

Chief Whittle said that Lundstrom indicated in conversation that "he got tired of running and wanted to come home and get things in order." Authorities said he apparently had traveled extensively, including a stay in Florida. His bond was raised, the district attorney said, "because of the fact that he had been all over the country and he used aliases."

The body of Mrs. Lundstrom was found by a family friend at the motel apartment early Saturday, March 5. Autopsy results showed that she probably died around 2 p.m. March 3rd, several hours after she was last seen alive. Lundstrom disappeared that day. The family's automobile was found a few days later in the DFW airport parking lot.

As the search for Lundstrom began, it was learned that he had been convicted of manslaughter in 1968 in the death of his first wife, Helen, at Brainerd, Minn. His conviction in the case was subsequently overturned by the Minnesota Supreme Court. Lundstrom was not re-tried because, the prosecutor there told interviewers, there was a lack of new evidence.

There had been no reports of Lundstrom's whereabouts until he contacted the Cisco friend, first by letter and then by telephone, authorities said.

Lundstrom was carrying light luggage and was neatly groomed when he was met by authorities at DFW airport, Chief Whittle said. He appeared tired from his travels during the nearly two weeks. He expressed concern for his children, officers said.

Chief Whittle said the family friend had requested that he not be identified and that the request would be honored if and as long as possible. He said that his hesitancy in discussing some details was based on lack of confirmation and efforts to comply with the laws governing criminal investigations.

The district attorney said they expected to present the case to the 91st District Court grand jury and ask for a murder indictment no later than March 30th. The murder charges as listed in the arrest warrant will be the only charge considered, Mr. Walton said.

Authorities had "no comment" to questions as to whether Lundstrom had made a statement to police as to a motive in the shooting.

The community was shocked when the shooting was reported and the manhunt began. Lundstrom was described by many people as a model citizen and family man, active in church and community affairs, and well known as a business man. Besides the motel, the Lundstroms served as community bus agents and operated a grave marker business.

Meanwhile, the motel was open and the children had resumed their normal routine with their maternal grandparents, Fred and Eileen Oehlke, living with them at their home.

In Jail Interview:

Lundstrom Says He Will Resign From Council Seat

Loyal Lundstrom told this newspaper that he will soon resign as a member of the Cisco city council and mayor pro tem in an interview at the Eastland County jail Friday. He was being held there under \$100,000 bond in connection with the shotgun slaying of his wife, Doris, on March 3rd.

Lundstrom, 59, surrendered to authorities (see story elsewhere) Wednesday after being sought since the discovery of his wife's body. He had "no comment on advice of counsel" to all questions pertaining to where he had been and to the murder case.

Lundstrom said he decided to return home and surrender "because of my concern for my children." He and Doris are the parents of five children, and he has children by a previous marriage.

"I like Cisco and its people," Lundstrom said. "I have thoroughly enjoyed working as a member of the City Council and feel that it is nothing but right that I should resign in view of circumstances."

Lundstrom added that "I greatly appreciate the prayers of many people, particularly my pastor (Rev. Cliff Reneau, Church of the Nazarene).

Lundstrom was born and raised at Hollywood, Minn., "a filling station, general store and post office all-in-one sort of town," he said. He went to public schools at Montecello, Minn., and attended a Bible College in St. Paul.

Lundstrom said he spent 15 years as manager of the ice cream department for Foremost Dairies in Montevideo, Minn., and then spent three years in sales work for a water softener

company at Brainerd, Minn. He next went to St. Paul, Minn., and spent four years as a machinist. The Lundstroms moved to Cisco nearly 12 years ago, he said.

Lundstrom said he hoped

to complete details to obtain legal counsel soon. He was dressed in white coveralls, like all prisoners in county jail, and said he was being well treated. He shares a cell with three others.-JWS

Fred Oehlke Files Suit

To End Parental Rights

A suit was filed in 91st District Court of Eastland County Thursday by Fred W. Oehlke seeking to terminate the parent-child relationship between Loyal Lundstrom and his five children by his wife Doris and to name Mr. Oehlke as their managing conservator or guardian.

The suit, filed by Cisco Attorney Wm. B. Wright, Jr.,

of Cisco, was set for hearing in the 91st court on March 25th.

Mr. Oehlke and Eileen Oehlke, grandparents of the five children, have been living with the children at the Lundstrom residence since the death of their daughter and the disappearance of Loyal Lundstrom in early March.

Statement To The People Of Cisco

From Eris Ritchie, Mayor

The Friday, March 18 morning edition of the Abilene Reporter-News in a lead story carried a quotation from me that was completely out of context. It was of course regarding the Lundstrom case and its various ramifications. I would like to relate to the citizens of Cisco just how the Reporter-News happened to even have that quotation from me.

Repeatedly over the past two weeks I've been questioned by reporters, including the major wire services and the Abilene and Dallas-Ft. Worth media. I've made every effort to answer all their questions in as factual a manner as I could. When I have stated that I was completely unaware of Mr. Lundstrom's previous record in Minnesota, I was being entirely truthful. Up until the article of March 18 I had been quoted correctly, so far as any news reports that I have read.

However, in the March 18 article, there are two paragraphs regarding Mr. Lundstrom's previous record in Minnesota, followed immediately with a quotation from me stating, "We've just not been concerned with it...We're more concerned with the tragedy of five children without a mother."

Those were the words I said, but I was in no way referring to our not being concerned about Mr. Lundstrom's previous record. I was answering a question about what the city council was going to do regarding Mr. Lundstrom's council seat. The news media has been very persistent in queries about what we plan to do about the council seat, the Mayor Pro Tem position, etc., and I have each and every time told them that the matter would be resolved one way or another in due time, but that we were not concerned with the council seat matter now. We were more concerned with the great tragedy that had befallen our community and this family, with five children left behind with no mother. The matter of the council seat seemed relatively unimportant in view of the trauma and tragedy at the present time.

I believe the Reporter-News was demonstrating irresponsible journalism in taking a quotation out of context in this way, and I am advising them of same in a Letter to the Editor.

Telephone Company Is Being 'Restructured'

Despite "massive operational restructuring" Southwestern Bell will continue providing the highest quality telephone service, according to Bob Cox, community relations manager for Southwestern Bell. Mr. Cox spoke March 16, to the Cisco Lion's Club.

Two sets of changes - not directly related - are effective January 1, 1983 and January 1, 1984.

An FCC decision dating back to 1980 will result in changes effective in 1983 that

will "detariff" telephone equipment. The ruling allows Southwestern Bell to provide only telephones which are presently in inventory. No new phones can be added to existing inventory.

"This doesn't mean we won't have any phones," Cox said. "There will be a declining inventory of telephones to offer customers who want new or additional instruments."

The ruling provides for a new company, a separate subsidiary of ATandT, known as American Bell to be established to sell telephone equipment.

Cox emphasized that Southwestern Bell will continue to provide dial tone for local and long distance calling and continue leasing equipment already on company premises. Telephone repair service will remain unchanged for lines and equipment owned by Southwestern Bell.

In January 1984 the second set of changes will go into effect-these changes result from an ATandT and Department of Justice settlement reached early in 1982. It establishes Southwestern Bell as a stand-alone company, completely separate from ATandT.

This agreement provides for continuance of local service by the local Bell operating companies under the regulation of the Texas Public Utilities Commission. The local Bell company will still provide custom calling features such as call forwarding. Production of white and yellow page directories will remain with the local companies.

ATandT will continue to provide long distance service under regulation and be allowed to offer equipment and other services on a competitive basis.

Changes are proposed in the way long distance will be handled since the agreement allows local companies to retain some long distance business.

Customers who already have telephones in place will see little change in 1983 Cox said. While customers who move or require new service are more likely to notice changes.

Pricing of basic telephone service may go up because of inflation and the loss of revenues from other profitable services such as long distance, due to competition in the telephone marketplace.

"We don't know exactly how future local rates will be structured. Nor do we know how much local rates will go up. We do know, however, that local rates must increase in order to come nearer paying their own costs."

Cox closed his remarks with a pledge to keep customers informed of changes as they occur. He was introduced by President Ivan Webb.

Co. In Top 10 Oil Producers

Late oil reports put Eastland County in the U.S. top ten in drilling activity. Eastland, along with Young, Archer, and Jack counties, ranked among the top in both Texas and the nation.

The completion total does not reflect the current decline in drilling, which began during the last months of 1982. Strong activity in early 1982 accounts for the year's increased completions.

The Petroleum Information Corporation of Denver, Colorado, which compiled the figures, predicted strong levels of activity in 1983. These were expected to run below 1982 and 1981, however.

The largest production year for Eastland County during the current boom has been 1981. In that year 1,837,637 barrels of crude were pumped, valued at \$63,380,100. Natural gas was valued at \$32,878,540, making a total product value of \$96,258,640. A total of 562 wells were drilled, including 298 oil, 71 gas, and 193 dry holes. There were 43 wildcats. Royalty payments were 12,032,330, and the payroll for the industry was recorded as \$12 million. The work force was listed as 680 persons.

The Bend Arch Province, which includes Eastland County and the surrounding

area, was also ranked among the top 10 U.S. geologic Provinces in total completions during the year 1982. P I reported a total of 5,594 completions in this information during the year. The Bend Arch extends almost to the Ft. Worth Basin.

On April 1, 1982, there were 1,586 producing wells in Eastland County, including 1,182 oil and 404 gas.

The current drilling includes such spots as the shallow production in the Nimrod-Romney area, and the oil recovery project by Sun Oil Co. in the old Ranger Boom Field. Water is being brought from Possum Kingdom Lake to flood the Ranger field project.

Eastland Group Files For MADD Charter

A group of Eastland parents have filed for a charter for Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD) with the head office of MADD in California.

Mrs. JoAnne Tannich of Eastland is heading up the project and says that Eastland should know within the next two weeks if Eastland can get a charter to MADD.

Mrs. Tannich said, "We filled out a questionnaire and sent it in several weeks ago. It takes 4 to 5 weeks to get a charter so we should be hearing something within the next two weeks. I don't think we will have any trouble getting a charter. We already have 20 or so people involved with us."

The four main things that the MADD organization tries to do is: 1) support for the victim. 2) public awareness with the problems associated with drunk drivers. 3) work with the Courtwatchers program. 4) help pass stricter drunk driving laws.

MADD organizations in the state are working on three projects, two of which are before Congress and the other is bill before the Senate. The bills that are before Congress are for raising the drinking age and to make it illegal to carry an open container of alcohol in an automobile. The bill before the Senate is for stiffer DWI penalties.

Mrs. Tannich commented on the progress of the charter by saying, "Right now our support is good. We have been working with the Abilene Charter and with Mrs. Betty Prude in trying to get started."

Mothers Against Drunk Drivers

MADD is supporting a bill to get the state law changed to make 21 the legal drinking age nationwide in order to combat drunken driving and reduce highway deaths.

In the early 1970's, after the voting age was lowered to 18, minimum ages for drinking were lowered in 24 states. The change was accompanied by an increase in the number of traffic deaths related to the use of alcohol. Since 1976, 14 states have raised the minimum age again.

Texas Director of MADD, Marinelle Timmons, points out that when the drinking age in Texas was raised from 18 to 19, the overall reduction of fatal accidents was reduced.

A study conducted by the University of Michigan on the effects of raising the drinking age in nine eastern states reflected a 28 percent reduction in fatalities in the 18-19 year old group.

Although many individual polls have been taken, it appears the public is supportive of raising the drinking age, however much opposition is expected from the liquor industry and the restaurant and convenience store owners.

According to the Allstate Insurance Company teenagers are involved in one out of every five traffic deaths in which alcohol is a factor. The main cause of death among young people 16 to 21 years old is alcohol related automobile accidents.

"The grim fact is that 8,000 teens and young adults die in drinking-related accidents every year", according to Health and Human Services Secretary Richard S. Schweiker.

The MADD organization in Texas asks that interested citizens initiate petition drives or write letters supporting raising the drinking age to 21.

The Texas Legislature will soon be considering a bill banning open alcohol containers in the passenger section of moving vehicles.

Texas is one of 16 states where it is legal for the operator of a car to drink if the driver isn't drunk.

Texas ranks second in the nation behind California in beer

consumption at 15.2 million barrels annually. Texans drink an average of 45.1 gallons of beer each year, tied with Montana for fourth highest in the nation.

Senate Bill number one is the bill currently before the Senate and would stiffen DWI penalties.

Among the charges that would be stiffened would be DWI, first, second and third offenses, serious bodily injuries relating to DWI, involuntary manslaughter and refusal to take a breath test.

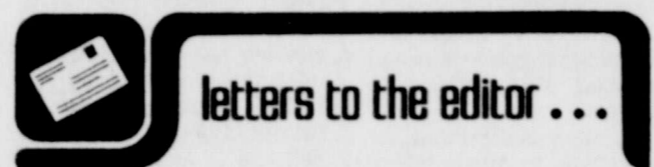

CJC Accepting Applications For LVN Class

Cisco Junior College is now accepting applications for the August, 1983 Licensed Vocational Nursing program at Cisco.

In accord with certification requirements, applicants must make application in advance and pass a pre-entrance physical and examination.

The twelve month program will hold classes on the campus with clinical work in the E.L. Graham Hospital in Cisco and the Eastland Memorial Hospital in Eastland on a rotating basis.

Satisfactory completion of the program entitles the student to a certificate from the college, and qualifies him/her to take the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiner's examination.

A prospective student must be at least 17 years of age and must be in good physical and mental health. Students must be high school graduates or have successfully taken the GED examination establishing high school equivalency. The GED examination is given on the CJC main campus in Cisco.

The Case Against Jimmy Rutherford Is Dropped

According to District Attorney Steve Ellis, a Motion to Dismiss has been filed in the case of the State of Texas versus James R. Rutherford Jr. Rutherford, age 33, was indicted by a Brown County Grand Jury in November, 1982, for possession of marijuana in an amount less than 50 pounds, but more than five pounds.

The indictment followed an October 11, 1982, raid on a ranch in northern Brown County, approximately four miles southwest of Rising Star.

Texas Department of Public Safety Nar-

cotics officers had prepared and executed a search warrant authorizing the search of the Brown County ranch, and they included a legal description of the ranch. There was a defect in the description of the property to be searched, making the subsequent search of a mobile home found on the property an unconstitutional search. The Department of Public Safety officers had assumed that there was one ranch involved when in fact there were two separate pieces of property. Although the officers

searched the correct location, the legal description in the search warrant was for the other piece of property.

On December 20, 1982, there was a hearing on Rutherford's Motion to Suppress. District Judge Gordon Griffin subsequently granted the defendant's motion concerning all items found in and near a mobile home located on the property searched.

According to Ellis, the evidence suppressed was critical in linking Rutherford to the growing marijuana found on the property.

Since the granting of the Motion to Suppress in January of this year, the investigating officers have been pursuing other potential affirmative links connecting Rutherford to the growing marijuana. These efforts have proved unsuccessful.

"We have no real alternative in my opinion but to dismiss this case. I regret that this action has become necessary, but it is a fruitless endeavor to pursue this case and waste the taxpayers' money in a trial that we could not possibly win since the critical evidence could not be introduced," said Ellis.

The Motion to Dismiss is on the grounds that there is insufficient evidence to sustain a conviction.

Rutherford was represented by Ed Paynter, an Abilene attorney.

The 1983 Wildcat Show will feature art, water color, wood carvings, wall hangings, jewelry, antiques, barbed wire, coins guns, indian relics and rock collections.

The winners of the sacking contest will receive \$400.00, second place \$200.00, and third place \$100.00.

Waco. The Rattlesnake Round-up and Wildcat Show kicks off on Saturday, March 19, at 10:00 a. m. Saturday evening the Annual Rattlesnake Dance will be held at Brownwood's newest night club, The Last National Bank. Admission to the dance is \$4.00 per person. 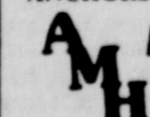

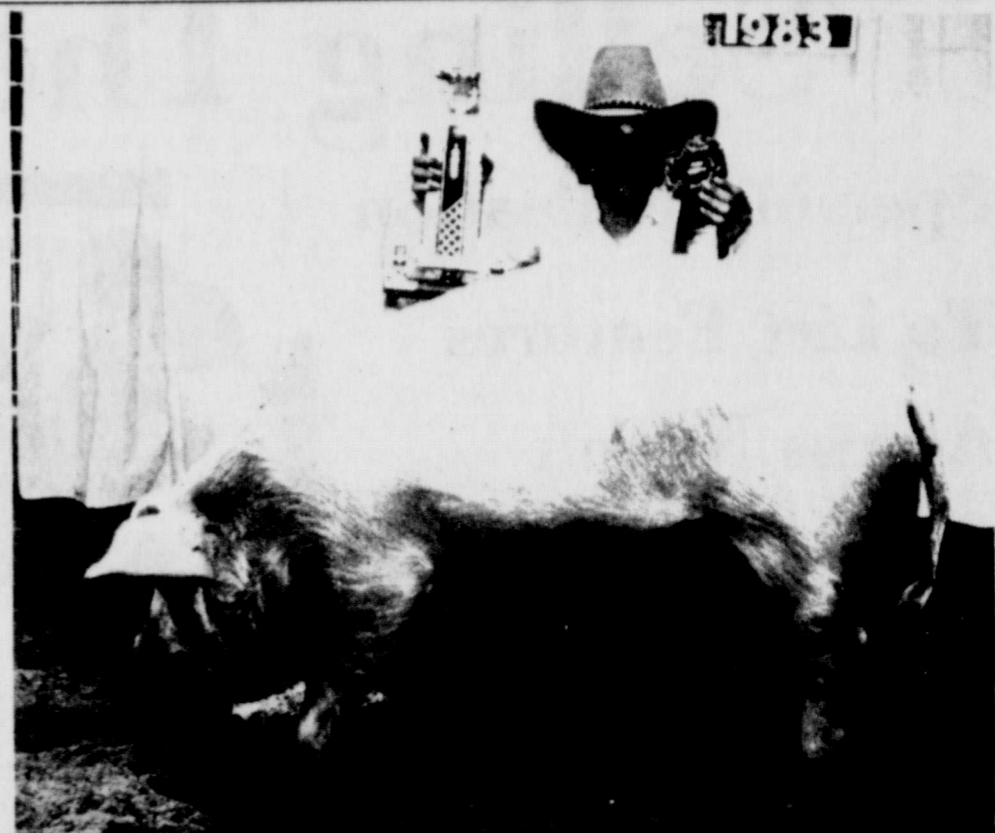

Appraisal District Reminds Residents To Render Property

Steve Thomas, chief appraiser for the Eastland County Appraisal District, reminds district residents that everyone required to render their taxable property for taxation must file these statements with the appraisal office by May 2.

The Texas Property Tax Code is specific in listing property which must be rendered to the chief appraiser for taxation.

A taxpayer must render all taxable personal property used for the production of income if, on January 1 of the tax year, he owns the property or manages and controls it as a fiduciary.

Tax law also requires banks located in Texas to file a statement listing assets and liabilities.

The chief appraiser may also require a person to render any other taxable property that he owns or manages and controls as a fiduciary on January 1. The chief appraiser will deliver

written notice that a rendition statement is required and attach the appropriate form.

Rendition statements are filed with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the property is located.

Any taxpayer who believes

that his property's value has decreased during the preceding tax year, for any reason other than normal depreciation, may submit a "report of decreased value" to the chief appraiser. This report describes the property involved and states the nature and cause of the

decrease.

Forms for rendition and the report of decreased value are obtainable from the Eastland County Appraisal District office. Anyone filing a rendition or report must include all the information requested on the form, and it must be signed by the property owner or an

authorized individual.

When rendering property, it is not necessary to state a market value for it; however, a taxpayer may continue to include his opinion of its market value and thus be assured of official notification in case the appraisal office places a different value of the property.

All renditions and property reports are now confidential and no longer open to public inspection.

The forms should be filed with the Eastland County Appraisal District office located on the 2nd floor of the Eastland County Courthouse by May 2, 1983. For more information, call 629-8597.

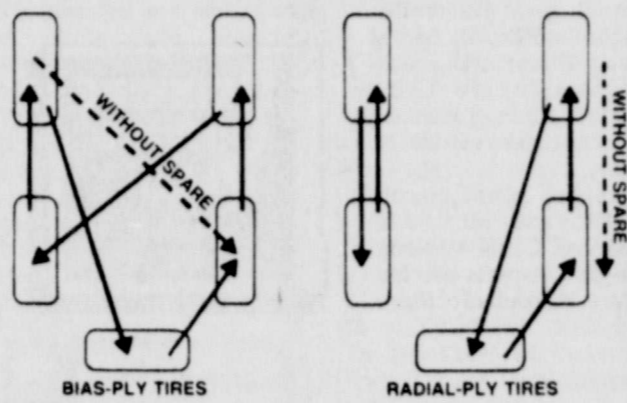

Give Your Tires TLC



The average automobile tire starts life with only 1/4 inch of tread, and that slim bit of rubber can last anywhere from 40,000 miles to twice that figure—if you give it Tender Loving Care. The way you drive is a factor. Jackrabbit starts and screaming stops and turns can peel off thousands of miles worth of tread every

store. Don Chaikin, automotive editor of *Mechanix Illustrated*, offers this tip to check if a tire is worn out. All you need is a Lincoln-head penny. Insert the penny, head down, into the tread groove, and if the top of the head is completely exposed, it's time for new rubber.

Tire pressure should be checked with the change of seasons, before any major trip and if you are planning to carry an unusually heavy load. Don't trust the gauges in gas stations; they're notoriously inaccurate. You can buy a good gauge for only a few dollars in any hardware or auto supply

Bias-ply and radial-ply tires should be rotated differently. The two patterns are shown in the chart above. Some experts believe that front-wheel drive autos should not have their tires rotated, since the rear tires last a long time, and you'll only have to replace the front ones.

The traditional throwing of the bride's bouquet and garter were caught by Sandra Nichols and Roger Davis of Cisco.

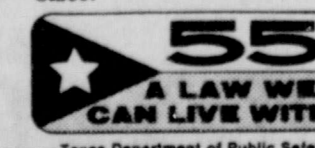

Since Texas is part of the Sunbelt, it's only natural that many people in this part of the country look to solar power as an alternative to conventional heating. However, solar heating in Texas is cost effective only under certain circumstances.

For example, solar hot water heaters are only feasible as an alternative to electric hot water heating and then only under the assumption that electricity will continue to increase in price.

In general, solar heating of water and space is feasible only as an alternative to the conventional all-electric system.

The limited feasibility of solar heating systems is due primarily to the relatively small proportion of the total energy bill associated with heating Texas homes. The possible development of solar cooling systems promises a much greater potential for energy savings in Texas.

UNDERSTANDING A LEASE

Most disagreements between tenants and landlord center on the lease. As a tenant, there are several ways for you to avoid a misunderstanding with your landlord.

For example, before you

sign a lease be sure to read it carefully. In general, a comprehensive lease that reduces the chance for a misunderstanding is better than a simplified one.

Also, it's a good idea to have everything in writing. This includes changes in the lease and other agreements. After you sign the lease, keep a copy signed by you and the manager.

Make a checklist of the condition of the dwelling and its contents at the time you move in. Go over the list with the manager when you move out. Be sure to pay rent on time, otherwise you become subject to eviction and liable for the remaining months of rent for which you contracted in the lease.

Remember, the cause of most landlord-tenant problems is a lack of communication.

PUBLIC OPINION ON MORTGAGES

Although many new types of mortgages have been introduced in recent years, the fixed-rate mortgage is still preferred by most borrowers.

That is one of the findings of a recent Louis Harris poll conducted for the Federal National Mortgage Association.

The fixed-rate loan was preferred by slightly over half of the respondents. Considering the advantages of fixed-rate loans to the borrower, it is perhaps surprising that the percentage was not higher. Only 13 percent stated they would accept a fixed-rate loan only.

The next most acceptable loans were the graduated payment mortgage, which features low payments in early years, and the growing equity mortgage, which allows the loan to be paid off quickly. More than half the respondents would accept an adjustable rate mortgage if the initial interest rate was at least three points below fixed-rate loans.

Whether such discounts become available in the market remains to be seen.

DEED RESTRICTIONS ARE POPULAR

Deed restrictions, or restrictive covenants, are popular tools used by some Texas developers to preserve the value and protect the attractiveness of property.

Developers use restrictive covenants to regulate the size, type, architecture and location of structures on the property.

Covenants may prevent commercial activities within an exclusively residential area. The party imposing the restrictions must own the

land. The covenants are then transferred from the original owner to subsequent owners who are legally bound to the terms and conditions.

Buyers should know that a covenant will be transferred even if the covenant is not referred to in the conveying instruments. To be enforceable, restrictive covenants must be legal, reasonable and in agreement with the public policy. If you're buying a house that has restrictive covenants, be sure you read and understand those covenants.

REGULATING FOREIGN OWNERSHIP

Because of increasing concerns about foreign ownership of U.S. land, Congress passed the Agricultural

Foreign Investment Disclosure Act in 1979.

The act requires that if foreign owners hold more than 5 percent of any corporation's stock, all the corporation's land is considered foreign-owned for reporting purposes.

The latest findings by the U.S. Department of Agriculture indicate that foreign investors own approximately 800,000 acres of agricultural land in Texas, which represents about \$1.1 billion. The percentage of Texas land owned by foreigners is only one-half of 1 percent.

DPS Releases Accident Figures

During the month of February, 12 persons were killed as the result of eight fatal rural motor vehicle traffic accidents in the 25 counties of the Abilene District of the Texas Department of Public Safety, according to figures released by Captain G.J. Matthews, Commander of the Texas Highway Patrol in Abilene. This brings our totals for

the year to 18 deaths out of 13 fatal traffic accidents, Captain Matthews said. He also stated that these totals for the year are the same as was recorded last year through the first two months of the year. The total number of accidents is down substantially over last year however, he said. For the first two months of 1982, 594 accidents had occurred with 18 persons

killed and 344 injured. This year, 417 traffic accidents have occurred with 18 deaths but only 213 persons injured. Highway Patrol Troopers in Eastland County investigated 16 traffic accidents during the month of February according to Sgt. Jerry Mathews of the DPS office in Eastland. Sgt. Mathews said 10 of those accidents injured 13 persons.

Sgt. Mathews was quick to point out that the number of accidents are down from February a year ago when 28 accidents were investigated with one being a fatal accident killing one person and nine accidents injuring 14 persons. Sgt. Mathews stated that for the first two months of this year, 39 accidents have been investigated as compared to 54 a year ago. He said 24 persons were injured last year as compared to 25 injuries this year during the first two months. "Both years," Sgt. Mathews said, "we have experienced one fatal accident with one person fatality injured in the first two months of the year."

Sgt. Mathews stated, "if drivers would drive as they know how and as they know they should, taking into consideration the other motorists on the highway and having consideration for the other motorist, we can avoid the majority of the traffic accidents."

County Receives Less Income From Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock returned \$34.9 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities who levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"Statewide, these payments are running 4.5 percent behind last year," Bullock said.

Eastland County received \$27,448.00 compared to \$47,585.67, which is down considerably from last year. Total payments to date is also down from \$167,894.46 last year to \$153,164.41 paid in to date this year.

Eastland net payment this period was \$9,796.07 compared to \$12,304.99 of the prior year. This could be due to the closing of our Gibson's store.

SPTB Informs Taxpayers

AUSTIN--Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced the beginning of a statewide program for 1983 to inform property owners in Texas of their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

In conducting the multifaceted program, Graeber said, SPTB will be working with appraisal districts, local tax offices and the state's news media to help make Texans aware of property rendition requirements, available tax relief measures of what pro-

perty owners must do to obtain any tax relief to which they are entitled.

"It is important that taxpayers file renditions and applications for tax relief by May 2 this year," Graeber said.

"Major changes in the state's tax laws were effective last year with implementation of the Texas Property Code and the new central appraisal district," he noted.

Graeber said that provisions of the code not only make it possible for taxpayers to file all exemption application and property renditions with one office in a county rather than with multiple tax offices, but also permit one-time applications for homestead exemptions and special open-space land valuation, rather than annual applications as previously required.

However, the tax official said that in appraisal districts which did not implement their operations in 1982, requirements for taxpayers to file renditions and applications will differ. In all except 15 of the state's 254 counties, he said, appraisal districts were in full operation in 1982. Fourteen of the remaining districts started full operations this year, and the Harris County Appraisal District began serving a portion of that county.

In districts which began full operation in 1982, property owners who received homestead exemptions and open-space ("1-d-1") land valuation last year need not apply again for 1983, unless the chief appraiser requests conformation of current qualification by sending a notice and an appropriate application form, or unless their eligibility has changed.

Graeber noted, though, that applications must be made this year for homestead exemptions and 1-d-1 valuation by taxpayers who have never received

them on their present homes or land and by property owners in the 15 appraisal districts implementing for the first time this year.

Applications for disabled veterans' exemptions and agricultural ("1-d") valuation must be made annually in all appraisal districts.

Exemption applications should be filed with the appraisal district office, or, in the case of Harris County, with the district or appropriate local tax offices.

"State law also requires any person who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 to file a rendition statement with the appraisal district," Graeber said.

Special rendition procedures pertain to property on which an exemption applicable on January 1 terminates during the tax year. In such a case, the person who owns or acquires the property on the date eligibility for the exemption terminates must render the property for taxation within 30 days.

Additionally, the chief appraiser may require rendition of other taxable property upon notice to the owner or manager.

Transportation companies subject to regulation by the Railroad Commission must render the value of their intangible property to the State Property Tax Board.

Banks and railroads must file special rendition statements with the appraisal district chief appraiser.

Graeber said rendition forms are available from appraisal district offices or local tax offices in Harris County. Transportation business may obtain property report forms from the SPTB.

Complete information on available tax exemptions and rendition requirements for the general public is contained in "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities," a pamphlet pro-

duced by the SPTB.

The pamphlet also includes suggestions on how to prepare and present an appeal to the appraisal review board and is available at no charge from appraisal district offices or from the SPTB in Austin.

"The property tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas," Graeber noted. "It

will generate about \$7 billion this year to help fund operations of public schools, cities, counties and special districts."

"We urge all property owners to become familiar with the tax process, to file renditions and to apply for all exceptions or other tax relief measures to which they are entitled," Graeber concluded.

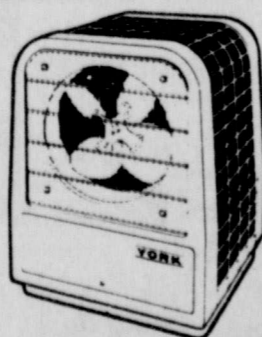

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Eleventh Appeals Court Has Best Record

AUSTIN--The growing backlog of criminal appeals in Texas, which reached crisis proportions from 1974 to 1980, has nearly been brought under control by the State's 14 Courts of Appeals, the Texas Judicial Council reported Tuesday.

From 1974 to 1980--when original criminal appeals were heard exclusively by

the single Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin--the backlog had grown by an average of 44.4 percent per year.

During 1982, the first full year in which the intermediate Courts of Appeals had jurisdiction over criminal cases, the pending case backlog increased by only 7.1 percent, Texas

Judicial Council figures showed.

There were 4,463 criminal cases and 2,432 civil cases pending in the 14 Courts of Appeals as of January 1, 1983.

These courts disposed of 6,837 total cases during 1982, an average of 90 dispositions per justice. A total of 7,611 cases were added to the dockets of the Courts of Appeals during the year, which included 4,691 criminal cases and 2,920 civil cases.

One measure of the success which Courts of Appeals have had in handling criminal cases is their record in disposing of cases transferred to them by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

When the Courts of Appeals first began exercising criminal jurisdiction on September 1, 1981--as the result of a constitutional amendment--the Court of Criminal Appeals transferred 1,637 pending criminal cases from its docket to the various Courts of Appeals.

Of the 1,637 cases transferred, all but 76 had been disposed of by the end of February 1983, the Texas Judicial Council reported.

According to the Judicial Council, controlling growth of the criminal backlog was made more critical by the unexpected surge in criminal case filings which occurred after the Courts of Appeals began hearing

criminal cases.

Nearly 50 percent more criminal cases were added to the dockets of the Courts of Appeals in 1982 than were added to the docket of the Court of Criminal Appeals in 1980.

Actual reduction of the huge backlogs, both civil and criminal, is the next goal for the Courts of Appeals, the Judicial Council reports.

The size of this task was illustrated as follows: if no more new cases were filed in the Courts of Appeals, and each of the 79 current justices continued to dispose of 90 cases per year, it would still take almost an entire year just to eliminate the 6,895 case backlog.

Two of the Courts of Appeals are located in Houston. One each is located in Fort Worth, Austin, San Antonio, Dallas, Texarkana, Amarillo, El Paso, Beaumont, Waco, Eastland, Tyler and Corpus Christi.

They range in size from 13 justices on the Dallas Court to three justices each on the Texarkana, Beaumont, Waco, Eastland and Tyler Courts. During 1982, there was an average of 76 justices serving on the Courts of Appeals.

Considering civil and criminal cases together, the

Fifth Court of Appeals in Dallas had the highest average number of cases filed per justice (126) during 1982. State average filings were 100 per justice.

The Eleventh Court of Appeals in Eastland disposed of the largest number of cases per justice (120) during 1982. State-wide average dispositions were 90 per justice.

The largest number of pending cases per justice at the end of the year (120) was the Fourth Court of Appeals in San Antonio. The lowest number was in the Tenth Court in Waco (34). State-

wide average for pending cases was 88 per justice.

Approximately 25 percent of all cases filed in a Court of Appeals in Texas in 1982 were filed in one of the two Courts located in Houston. Approximately 20 percent of all cases filed in the State were filed in the Dallas Court.

The Texas Judicial Council was created in 1929 to serve as an advisory body for the Supreme Court, the Legislature and the Governor. One of its primary duties is to gather and report statistics on court activity throughout the State.
