In Lundstrom Hearing:

Judge Jim Wright Denies Change Of Venue Motion

A change of venue was denied Thursday by Judge Jim Wright in 91st District Court in the matter of the State of Texas vs. Loyal Lundstrom in a pre-trial hearing that lasted all day

and continued into Friday. Lundstrom, 59-year old Ciscoan, faces charges of murder in the March 3rd shotgun death of his wife, Doris, at their Cisco Motel apartment. This was the second and final pre-trial hearing in the matter.

Defense Counsel Bill Hart had subpoenaed Eastland County newsmen as well as Fort Worth and Abilene newspaper circulation managers to appear Thursday in his bid to move the trial from Eastland County on the contention that too much publicity had made obtaining a jury impossible.

The motion was opposed

by District Attorney Emory Walton who told the court that he has talked to people from all areas of the county and they agree that prospective jurors would not reach an opinion without hearing all evidence.

The newsmen were released without being questioned as Attorney Hart decided not to use them.

Judge Wright took under advisement Thursday a motion to suppress evidence about a shotgun that was found in the Lundstrom apartment three days after the discovery of Mrs. Lundstrom's body. Police Chief Randy Whittle of Cisco, who

directed the investigation, and Cisco Detective Jackie Hobbs were questioned.

Hart told the court "Lundstrom was out of town. He wasn't there. He's not guilty." The defense said the gun was not found when the apartment was first searched. Mr. Whittle told the court that burglars had broken into the apartment and that nothing appeared missing or disturbed.

The motion to suppress evidence regarding the shotgun was taken under advisement by Judge Wright.

The motion to suppress use of anything concerning any previous trials was considered. Judge Wright ruled that use of such evidence would first be discussed in court by lawyers with the jury absent before a final decision as to its use. Lundstrom was convicted of murder in Minnesota in the death of his first wife but was later freed on a technicality.

Due for consideration Friday was a motion to suppress a letter written by Lundstrom to the Rev. C.L. Reneau, pastor of Lundstrom's church at the time of the murder. Attorney Hart said the letter "is a privileged pastor-parishioner communication."

An oral statement Lundstrom made to Cisco police was the subject of a motion to suppress Thursday afternoon. He reportedly made the statement after he was taken in custody at D-FW Airport when he voluntarily surrendered 11 days after the discovery of his wife's body. This motion was also under advisement by the court.

Observers believed that Lundstrom's murder trial probably would be set for 91st District Court in July. The June docket has already been arranged and is too full for a case that would consume considerable time, it was believed.

District Attorney Walton reported that "we are ready to go."

The final report of the Dallas Forensic Laboratory has not been received, Mr. Walton said. Mr. Hart told the court that he had gone to Dallas and obtained part of it. The lab serves more than 100 counties and usually is several weeks behind in final reports, officials said.

Lundstrom, neatly dressed, appeared in court Thursday and Friday with his attorney. He recently accepted with court approval a job with a monument manufacturing company in another city.

A mental competency hearing for Thomas LeFlore, 41, charged with murder in the death of Debra Ju Garcia here in 1981, will be held Monday in 91st District Court in Eastland.

LeFlore is a brother of Charles LeFlore who pled guilty to murder charges in the case and received a 65-year penitentiary sentence last August.

Defense and state attorneys will present psychiatrist reports and witnesses in the hearing before Judge Jim Wright.

Ranchers Host Demonstrations

Brush and cactus are major problems for Eastland County rangeland owners. The plants compete with

grass and often make land almost useless. Several new chemicals are now on the market for brush and cactus control. Some of these new chemicals are

formulated so that landowners can treat individual plants very effectively. County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon established two brush control demonstrations May 6 to help Eastland County producers determine the most effective and economical methods of controlling these unwanted plants.

The demonstrations were established on H.L. Ferguson's place on Highway 183 northeast of Cisco and on Mac McWhorter's ranch northwest of Eastland. Dr. Tommy Welch, Extension Range Brush and Weed Control specialist from Texas A&M, and Extension Agent John Blair assisted with the demonstrations.

On the Ferguson place three plots of mesquites were treated with three different rates of Velpar L. This liquid is deposited on the ground around mesquites. Another plot of mesquites were treated with 2,4,5-T and oil. This material is an old treatment, but used as a comparison in the demonstration. Another material, Garlon 4, was applied to the base of mesquites in another plot.

Tordon 10 K pellets were applied to prickly pear in a plot. This material has been a very effective control for various types of cactus.

A new chemical known as

Graslan bullets were applied to oak shinnery on McWhorter's place. The bullets are about 3/4 inch long and are dropped on the ground around the plants. Three bullets are needed for each inch of trunk diameter. In addition to the shinnery a block of catclaw was

treated.

These demonstrations will be evaluated and results will be in the demonstration result handbook that is distributed every spring. In the fall a tour will be conducted of these brush control demonstrations Gordon says.

The field day will be at Charles Walker's orchard south of Eastland beginning at 9:30 a.m. The orchard is located on Highway 6 about four miles south of Interstate 20.

Several types of sprayers will be demonstrated. Extension and Experiment Station specialists will show growers how to calibrate various types of sprayers.

Other topics will be mixing chemicals, reading labels, and determining the most economical methods of controlling insects, diseases, and weeds.

Speakers will be Drs. Chip Lee, Sammy Helmers, Jesse Cocke and Jody Worthington. County Agent DeMarquis Gordon says this field day will be helpful to owners of commercial orchards and native pecans.

Everyone interested in pecan management is invited to attend.

Eastland County ranchers have an opportunity to attend one of the most extensive educational programs ever developed for the Southwest ranching industry, the International Ranchers Roundup (IRR).

The 1983 IRR will be held at the San Angelo Convention Center, August 1-5.

Over 100 noted ranching experts, key agricultural policy makers and industry leaders from 12 states and several countries will share their expertise with an expected gathering of 750 ranchers.

A general theme, "Innovative Ranch Management," carries throughout the week-long event that includes a general session featuring industry leaders and policy makers, plus three days of concurrent sessions in beef cattle, brush management, sheep and goats, wildlife, marketing, business management for the ranch family, and a computer workshop.

All six concurrent sessions will be going simultaneously so producers may attend desired talks in any session. Most sessions will be repeated.

Keynote speakers include Dub Waldrip, president, National Cattlemen's Association; Hon. Tom Loeffler, U.S. Congressman; Dr. Cas Maree, successor to famed South African rangeman Jan Bonsma; Dr. Arthur G. Hansen, Chancellor of the Texas A&M University System; and Dr. Fee Busby, head, University of Wyoming Department of Range Management.

This year's Ranchers Roundup is one of the most comprehensive and practical educational programs ever coordinated by the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It keys in on many of the real problems facing Eastland County ranchers. Those who attend will have the opportunity to participate in a variety of different sessions featuring some of the top agricultural minds in the world.

Also on tap is a rancher panel discussion of the Savory Grazing Method, one of the most talked about grazing systems ever introduced. Several ranchers who have experience with this intensive method will offer their comments.

Four ranch tours will close out the conference on August 5. Participants can select between day-long visits on top West Texas ranches noted for their innovative management practices in beef cattle, sheep and goats, and range management. Each of these tours will visit

a ranch using the Savory Grazing Method. The wildlife tour will visit selected wildlife management areas in the Texas Hill Country, including an overnight stop in Kerrville.

Roundup registration information and tour details are available through the Eastland County Extension office or by calling (629-1093). Interested persons can also write directly to IRR, P.O. Box 1849, Uvalde, Texas 78801. Since July 1 is the tour registration deadline, prompt attention is encouraged.

Each participant will be provided a copy of the bound 480-page proceedings book which contains narratives of most talks presented. Many ranchers have found this book to be an excellent reference text and ordered extra copies for neighboring ranchers.

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

Well Service To Drill Developmental

Welcome Well Service of Coahoma has revealed plans to drill a 1,200-foot developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operator has 80-acres under lease, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 22 Blk. 1 and has designated the venture as the No. 1 Charles Little. Drillsite is 13 miles southeast of Eastland.

Pumping 99 barrels of crude oil per day and 149,000 CF casinghead gas, a new producer has been finalized in the Reb Field by Richey & Co. Inc. of Ft. Worth.

The location is in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-216, five miles northwest of Eastland. Well's designation is the No. 1 J.B. Greer.

Total drilling depth was 3,999 feet and the pay zone was entered at 3,587 feet. The well was perforated to produce from an interval 3,587 to 3,698 feet into the hole.

A wildcat for oil is scheduled for spudding three miles northeast of Cisco by Katiaco Operating Inc. of Lubbock. The well will be known as the No. 6 Fee "B", with projected total depth of 4,200 feet. It will be situated in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-237.

Locations have been staked by Dallas Sunbelt of Dallas for eight 1,300-foot developmental probes in Eastland County's Hawk-Eye Field, one mile west of Romney. The wells are designated as the No. 16 through 20 and 24, 25, & 26 Tarver B. Drillsites will be in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 76, Blk. 3.

Putnam Oil Production of Albany has revealed plans to

drill a 1,400-foot developmental probe in the Eastland Regular Field, five miles south of Cisco. The well will be located in a 20-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 62, Blk. 3 and is to be designated as the No. 1 Carl A. Ziehr.

Abilene-based Morrison Energy Inc. has filed for permits to drill the No. 4 Martin Unit No. 4 and the No. 7 Martin Unit No. 7, two wildcats for oil or gas to be located four miles south of Carbon. With projected total depths of 3,400 feet, the wells are in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's George Robinson Survey, Sec. 34 for the No. 7 well and the Nugent Survey, A-164 for the No. 4 well.

Richey & Co. Inc. of Ft. Worth has posted initial production figures for the No. 1 V. Daniel, new oil well in the Reb Field, five miles northwest of Eastland.

The well indicated potential for 30 barrels of oil per day on an open choke. With drillsite in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-213, the well had total drilling depth of 3,872 feet. It entered the pay horizon at 3,458 feet and will produce from a set of perforations 3,458 to 3,470 feet into the wellbore.

Flowing natural gas at the rate of 1,067,000 CF per day on a 1-inch choke, the No. 3 Murdock is a successful new wildcat in Eastland County. Katiaco Operating Co. of Lubbock is the operator.

The well exhibited absolute open flow potential of 2,370,000 CFD. Location is in a 40-acre lease in the Stephens Survey, A-693, about two miles northwest of Cisco.

After entering the pay strata at 3,480 feet, the well

bottomed at 4,071 feet and will produce from a set of perforations ranging from 3,480 to 3,516 feet into the hole.

Flowing at the rate of 39 barrels of oil per day, the No. 1 Spencer has been completed in the Eastland Regular Field by Hurst-based Sentinel Petroleum Corp.

Located 12 miles southwest of Cisco, the well is in a 20-acre lease block of Eastland County's Maryan Clark Survey, Sec. 8. In addition to the crude oil, the well indicated ability to yield casinghead gas at the rate of 190,000 CFD.

The well was tested on a 22/64 choke and showed flowing tubing pressure of 145 PSI.

It was drilled to a total depth of 3,230 feet, after entering the pay zone at 3,150 feet. It will produce from a perforated interval of 3,150 to 3,170 feet.

The Jessie Lee Field gained a new gas producer when the No. 1 George Fee Estate was completed by Hanvey Production Co. of Dallas, two miles northeast of Cisco.

On a three-eighths-inch

choke, the well showed ability to yield up to 875,000 CF gas per day. The absolute open flow came in at 950,000 CFD. Location is in an 80-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 76, Blk. 4.

Hanvey took the hole to 4,160 foot bottom and perforated for production 3,706 to 3,711 feet into the hole.

At a location two miles northwest of Olden, Sun Exploration & Production Co. of Abilene has completed the No. 1 Coker-Gregory "A", new oil well in the Eastland Regular Field.

Drillsite was in a 73-acre lease in Eastland County's B.B.B. & C. RR Co. Survey, A-43.

The well showed daily potential for 36 barrels of oil per day on an open choke. Production will be from an interval 3,298 to 3,320 feet into the hole. Well's total depth was 3,629 feet, with top of pay logged at 3,298 feet.

Snow Oil Company of Ft. Worth has added a new natural gas producer in the Eastland Regular Field. It is the No. 1 Van Zandt-East,

located in a 190-acre lease in Eastland County's C. Messer Survey, A-372, four miles southeast of Eastland.

The well flowed at the rate of 134,000 CF per day on a three-eighths-inch choke. The absolute open flow came in at 140,000 CFD.

Drilling went to 1,630 foot bottom, after the production zone was entered at 1,003 feet. The production interval will be perforations 1,003 to 1,010 feet.

Sentinel Petroleum Corp., operating out of Hurst, has recorded a successful development well in the Eastland Regular Field. It is the No. 1 D.D. Foster, showing potential for 12 barrels of oil per day on an open choke.

Drillsite was in a 40-acre lease in the Frederick Scranton Survey, six miles southeast of Ranger, in Eastland County.

The well was drilled to a total 3,778 foot bottom, after entering the pay structure at 3,450 feet. It was perforated to produce from an interval 3,450 to 3,459 feet into the wellbore.

Lubbock-based C.R. Gallagher Jr. has turned in first production figures for its No. 1 West, a successful developmental well in Eastland County's Reb Field.

Pumping oil at the rate of 6 barrels per day plus 230,000 CFD casinghead gas, the

well was tested on an open choke.

Drillsite was in a 30-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 15, Blk. 4, four miles north of Eastland. The well was taken to a total depth of 3,850 feet, after entering the pay zone at 3,468 feet. Production interval will be 3,468 to 3,486 feet into the hole.

Drilling Report

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace announced that Texas operators reported 101 gas and 68 oil discoveries in April 1983.

One year ago, 126 gas and 57 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in April included 33 in deep South Texas, 19 each in Southeast Texas and the Refugio area, eight in the Midland area, seven each in North Texas and West Central Texas, three in East Texas, two in East Central Texas, and one each in the Panhandle and the Lubbock and San Angelo areas.

Oil discoveries included 14 in Southeast Texas, 11 in North Texas, nine in the San Angelo area, eight in the

Midland area, six each in deep South Texas, West Central Texas and Refugio area, four in the San Antonio area, two in East Texas, and one each in the Panhandle and Lubbock area.

In April, operators reported 465 exploratory and field test wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,402 in April, which was the same total for these tests during the same month a year ago.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in April amounted 2,799 against 2,767 a year earlier.

Operators filed 731 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 898 amended requests.

Kamons Back Home After Stay Of Three Months In Australia

Robert and the Kamon combined business with pleasure when they spent three months recently in Australia and New Zealand to look after the interests of oil companies in which they are interested, to check on operations of a ranch they own and to visit places and points of interest.

Mr. Kamon is president of Golden Triangle Royalty & Oil, Inc., and his wife is the corporate secretary. They returned last weekend from the trip that began in mid-February.

The first stop of the business-vacation trip was Honolulu where the Kamons spent a week resting and relaxing. They flew then to New Zealand and rented a car for a tour of the south island where they admired water falls, botanic gardens, scenic mountains, glaciers and the like.

Flying next to Brisbane, the Kamons renewed friendships with old associates, including the country's minister of mines, the director general, and others. They were honored at several luncheons and dinners and were guests at a parliament session.

Following the series of socials and business conferences, the Kamons

bought a four-wheel drive vehicle and drove some 200 miles to their 4,300 acre cattle ranch, Maryborough Downs. They inspected operations there where some 500 head of cattle are kept. They enjoyed a ten-day stay at the ranch, which is near the ocean.

In early March, Mr. Kamon flew to Melbourne to attend the Australian Exploration Association's annual conference where he learned that Australia reached its all-time peak for oil exploration in 1982 and set new records for discoveries.

Next, the Kamons visited GTRO's AP 274P, an oil concession of some 11,923,000 acres under which the firm owns royalty interests. En route, they noted production, wildcat drilling and seismicographic work on adjoining interests.

Other GTRO interests were also inspected and it was learned that drilling plans on some of them are scheduled to start soon. A 50-man crew was at work on the large concession to locate likely drilling points, Mr. Kamon reported.

Vacation highlights included a visit to the Heron Islands, a bird sanctuary with a resort. Here, Robert went fishing in a coral reef

area and landed a large coral trout. They flew by helicopter to the Queensland east coast. They saw new towns and points of interest in a mountain drive through woods, wild flowers galore, picturesque scenery, a rain forest, beautiful lakes, waterfalls and the like.

The Kamons admired fruit orchards and nut farms. They noted that economic conditions generally are good in Australia. Prince Charles and Lady Diana and their son visited there while the Kamons were in Australia.

This was Mrs. Kamon's second trip to Australia. They stopped there in 1979 during a family around-the-world trip. Mr. Kamon has been going to Australia for a good many years in the interest of the several oil companies in which he holds interests.

When they arrived home, the Kamons learned that a magazine writer from Australia was in Houston and was calling for an interview with Mr. Kamon.

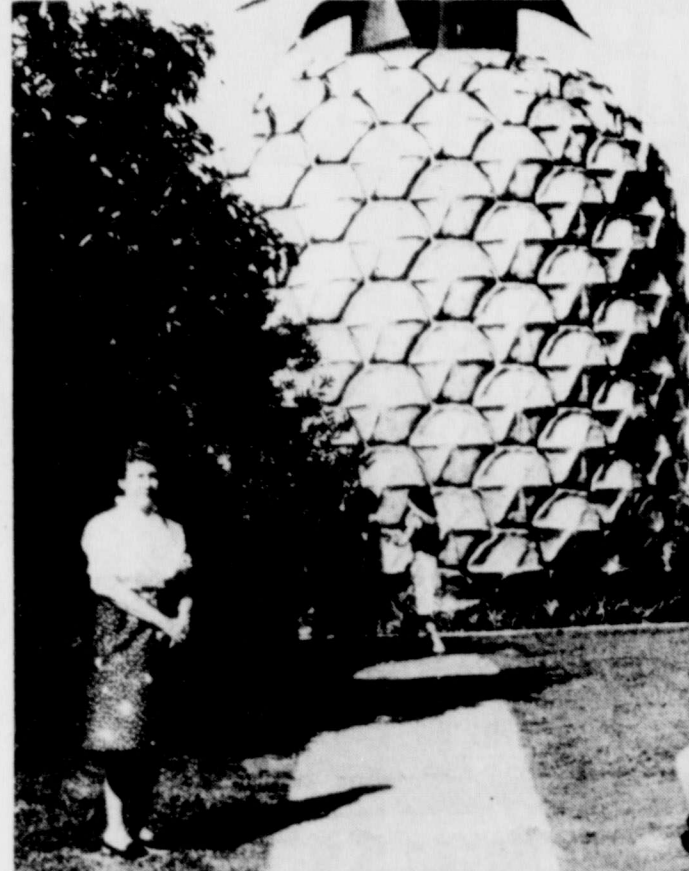

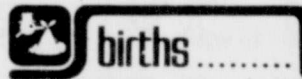
Architects are currently completing details on plans and specifications. Officials said they hope to have a contract for the project by July 1. The congregation has approved the floor plan, they said.

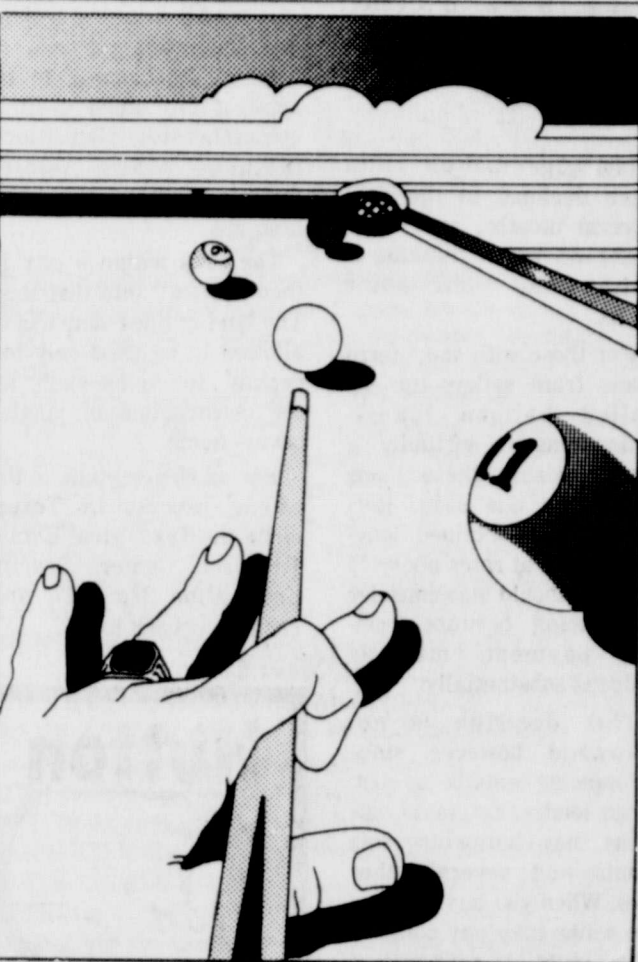

Mortgage interest rates have declined in the past several months, and many homeowners are thinking of refinancing their home loans.

For those with short-term loans from sellers—the so-called balloon loans—refinancing is virtually a must because these loans will come due soon. Borrowers who obtained long-term loans at rates above 15 percent should also consider refinancing because monthly payments may be reduced substantially.

This decision is not automatic, however, since refinancing entails a cost. When lenders originate new loans, they charge discounts points and several other fees. When you buy a home, the seller may pay some of these costs. At refinancing, you pay all the costs.

Consider refinancing costs as an investment. The return comes in the form of reduced mortgage payments as long as you retain the loan. The longer you expect to live in the home, the more feasible is loan refinancing.

ZONING IN TEXAS

In most Texas cities and across the nation, zoning is almost universally accepted as the way to more orderly

urban development. It is especially seen as a way to maintain the integrity and character of residential neighborhoods.

Yet, few citizens make a distinction between zoning as a land-use control technique and urban planning in general. For zoning to be legal, a city must draft a comprehensive plan which includes roads, public facilities and services and land use.

The area within a city is then "zoned" into districts. The land in these districts is allowed to be used only for certain functions—such as the construction of single-family home.

For an 80-age guide to the zoning process in Texas, write the Texas Real Estate Research Center. Specify publication No. 377 and enclose a check for \$2.

ENERGY TAX CREDITS

The federal government offers tax incentives to homeowners willing to invest in energy efficiency.

The government allows a credit of 40 percent of the installation costs on a solar energy system. For other energy conservation, the government offers a tax credit of 15 percent on the first \$2,000 spent on buying and installing approved energy-saving items.

The list includes: insulation, caulking, weatherstripping, exterior storm and thermal doors and windows, automatic set-back thermostats, replacement burners, automatic flue dampers, furnace ignition systems and meters that monitor the cost of energy use.

A maximum credit of \$300 applies to home built before April 20, 1977. The credit can be taken all in one year or applied to items you install each year through 1985. For

more information, check your local Internal Revenue Service office.

ASSUMING A LOAN

In many cases, an attractive method to buy or sell a home when financing is required is to assume a loan.

If the seller has a mortgage loan on the real estate, the lending institution is asked to transfer the debt from the existing homeowner to the new buyer. Financial advisors often recommend this method as being of great advantage to the buyer and seller and a safe way in which to make a loan.

The seller receives cash for the equity. The buyer assumes the loan and makes the payments to the lending institution. If interest rates have substantially increased

since the time when the seller made the original loan, the lending institution may negotiate a new interest rate which is below the prevailing market rate of interest but above the original loan rate.

If you're considering a loan assumption, ask your broker to explain the benefits and drawbacks of such financing.

MEASURING HOUSING AFFORDABILITY

Traditionally, affordability of housing has been measured by comparing annual housing expenses to annual income.

Expenses totaling 25 to 39 percent of the income were considered the upper limit.

A more valid measure is to add up three monthly figures: (1) mortgage in-

terest payments (2) the alternative return a homeowner can get for equity invested in the home, and (3) the cost of insurance, maintenance, repairs and property taxes. From this total, subtract monthly tax deductions and expected capital gains.

Using this method, potential buyers can get a more realistic look at cash flow requirements for home ownership and the type of mortgage they should seek.

For example, with interest rates drifting downward and home price appreciation slowing, or stopping, graduated payment mortgages could become less popular. Traditional fixed-rate and fixed-term mortgages could regain their popularity.

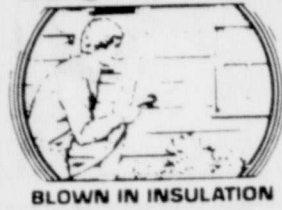

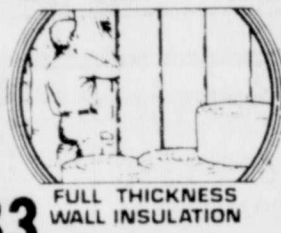

Congressional Comments

Cong. Charles Stenholm

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Abilene, Texas, is as close to the capital of El Salvador as it is to our own nation's capital, Washington, D.C. No fact can make clearer the importance of the grave situation in that Central American country to the security of the United States.

The question currently before the U.S. Congress, and the entire nation, is just what role the U.S. should play in this extremely critical — and politically sensitive — area.

It is difficult to discuss our involvement in another country's internal affairs without raising the ghost of our painful involvement in

Vietnam a decade ago and reexamining the "domino theory" that was central to our country's position in Southeast Asia. One need only view that tragic area of the world today under the Communist Vietnamese regime and its spreading tentacles of misery and destruction in Cambodia, Laos and now the shelling of Thailand, to say, sadly, yes, there is validity to the domino theory.

And the last domino in Central America is Mexico — a country that shares 1,933 miles of border with the U.S., almost half of it with the state of Texas. Think for just a moment: Thousands of refugees from Southeast Asia flooded into this country following the downfall of Vietnam, and, along with multitudes of refugees into Florida from Cuba, placing severe strains on this country's financial ability to absorb entire cultures. Those economic and related social problems cannot be ignored.

If you question the ultimate inclusion of Mexico in current plans of leftist Central American guerrillas, consider the open statement by the Sandinistas in Nicaragua, as reported recently by The Wall Street Journal, that they are a part of a "revolution without frontiers," or the statement by the former Communist leader in El Salvador, "the revolutionary process in

Central America is a single process. The triumphs of one are the triumphs of the other. Guatemala will have its hour. Honduras its. Costa

Rica, too, will have its hour of glory. The first note was heard in Nicaragua." Can Mexico, long simmering with social unrest, possibly

be excluded from Communist plans? I think not. If we accept then, that the U.S. does indeed have an important interest in El

Salvador and other Central American countries, how can that interest best be protected? Elements of U.S. policy in

that area must include the recognition of social unrest and work to strengthen reforming elements in these governments must continue, as well as the establishment of verifiable checks to stop human rights violations.

depends solely on a military answer, likewise, is also unwise. Negotiation, economic development, internal reform and human rights are all elements of ultimate policy segments as well.

We must also recognize that there are other countries whose interest are as valid as those of this country and whose experience and efforts toward a negotiated solution cannot be ignored by the U.S. — the Contadora group, made up of Mexico, Venezuela, Columbia and Panama, immediately comes to mind.

As debate on this issue gets underway in the U.S. House of Representatives, I strongly support a policy that includes economic development, increased military aid, regional negotiations, internal reform and human rights assurances in El Salvador. This crisis is just too close to home for comfort.

This week I think I really need to write about a much misunderstood action by the House of Representatives last week. As you know, I have written an earlier column referencing the open container legislation and had made certain predictions as to its ultimate success or failure.

Under the Rules of the House of Representatives, all legislation is referred to a committee so that interested persons, both for and against the legislation, can testify on that specific issue and so the issue can be intensively studied by the committee. Of

course, with 5,000 pieces of legislation, the legislature itself cannot give in-depth consideration to each and every bill and has to rely on the committee system.

Now, the point of the article is the widely publicized vote on the House Floor to bypass the committee system and take up and consider the open container legislation. My position is and has to be, that we have to honor and maintain the integrity of the committee system to preserve the democratic process. While the open container legislation may well be a desirable

law for the state of Texas and assuming it would even pass on the House Floor, to circumvent the rules that we operate by would be analogous to giving a baseball player a fourth strike simple because he was a good person and had merit. The point is, you have got to live by the rules even when the rules do not necessarily suit you.

Ironically, the same people who are strongly in favor of the open container legislation are the same people who adamantly oppose pari-mutuel gambling. Had the House circumvented the committee system and brought the open container issue directly to the Floor, I

can guarantee the next issue that was done that way would have been pari-mutuel betting had it still been in committee. Until a member of the Committee on Urban Affairs changed his vote today, both measures were locked in committee. Please note a committee member changed his vote. The committee system was not circumvented.

Many of you who have written me with criticism for my decision to abide by the rules, established over 100 years before I got here, should realize that this is a perfect example of a situation where "those who live by the sword, died by the sword."

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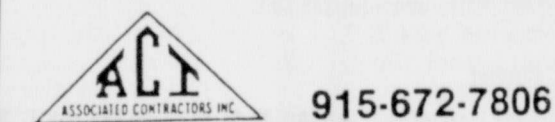

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Tips For A Healthier Living

It has been said that God helps those who help themselves. It is true that He expects us to use wisdom. We are told if any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally. James 1:5.

Does it not seem logical that what one puts into his body determines how it functions?

Bran, for instance, hastens the removal of waste material from your body. Because of this, it is thought to offer unique cancer protection, and to protect against or treat gallstones. Why don't you buy a box the next time you are at the grocers and try it?

Carolyn Wade authored the book, "The Book of Bran." Here is a summary of it "5 step plan to low-meat, high fiber intake."

1. Cut calories at least in half. You can do this by cutting your intake of sugars and fats, refined flour breads and processed cereals in half.

2. Replace meat in the protein group. Use white grains and legumes--rice, corn bread, peanut butter and a whole wheat sandwich is a

good combination. Nuts are also good.

3. Increase the use of low-fat milk products such as cottage cheese.

4. Add more whole-grain bread and bran cereals.

5. Use plenty of fruits and vegetables.

You might like to try this vegetable recipe.

Layer Salad
Use a 9" by 13" dish or pan. Line dish with pieces of head lettuce. Cover this with fresh spinach. Continue to layer these vegetables.

1 cup frozen peas
1/2 cup green onions (chopped)
1/2 cup celery (chopped)
1 cup cauliflower (separated into flower-lets)
1 cup salad dressing.
Spread over top of vegetables.

2 boiled eggs (sliced)
1 cup of grated cheese. (Parmesan)
Cover and refrigerate overnight.

Homemaking Hints County Extension Agent

Efforts to achieve good health and a longer life reflect a current trend among Americans today. People are exercising more, improving their eating habits, and giving up smoking. As a result, they feel better and are helping themselves to a healthier life.

May is National High Blood Pressure Month. This is a good time to have your blood pressure checked and if it is high, make needed adjustments to lower it. If your pressure is high, like exercise and a good diet, treating it can help you to a longer healthier life.

With one in every six Americans having high blood pressure, it's not surprising that high blood pressure has received a lot of attention in the last 10 years. Even with the local and national attention, three-fourths of the American public do not know some of the most important facts about high blood pressure and efforts to control it. In a response to those statistics and in an effort to promote, coordinate and increase support of needed high blood pressure control services, I want to remind you of facts concerning high blood pressure.

1. High blood pressure increases the risk of premature illness or death from coronary heart disease, strokes, and heart and kidney failure.

2. Even people who were ever told that their blood pressure is just "a little

higher than normal" should visit their doctor and have their blood pressure checked. The findings of a recent study conducted by the National Institutes of Health showed that even people with "borderline" high blood pressure received benefits from treatment that helped to bring their pressures back into the normal range.

3. There is no cure for high blood pressure, but it can be controlled.

4. To control high blood pressure, doctors usually prescribe medication. The medicine must be taken every day.

5. Doctors often tell people who have high blood pressure to make changes in their diet. They ask them to lose weight, cut down on salt, and exercise more. For some people with high blood pressure, losing weight, cutting down on salt, and exercising more is enough to bring their blood pressure back to normal. Other people have to take the medication every day plus make changes in their diet. If you have high blood pressure, do everything the doctor advises so you can keep your blood pressure under control.

6. High blood pressure can affect anyone. Some people think that only tense or anxious people have high blood pressure, while relaxed and calm people have low or normal blood pressure. This isn't true. Anyone can have high blood pressure.

7. The Extension Service, county Health department

and doctors want to prevent this disease and save lives. For more information on high blood pressure contact one of the offices listed above. If you have not had your blood pressure checked lately, do so during National High Blood Pressure Month. **NEW RECIPE FOR THE**

COKE CAKE

2 cups flour

1½ cups sugar
1 cup margarine, softened
1 cup Coke
3 tablespoons cocoa
½ cup buttermilk
2 eggs
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup small marshmallows
Mix in large bowl flour and

sugar. Heat butter, cocoa and coke to boiling. Pour over the flour and sugar mixture mixing thoroughly. Add buttermilk, eggs, soda, vanilla and marshmallows. Beat and mix well. This will be thin with marshmallows floating on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes.

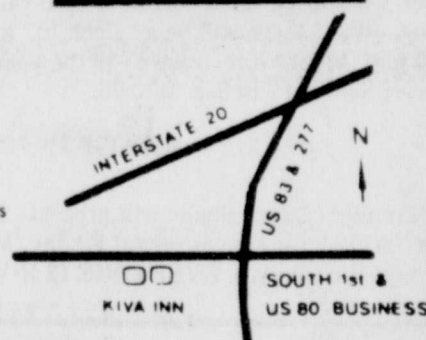

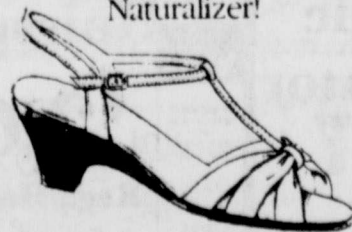

Alcoholism Training Session Held At Senior Center

Former Congressman Wilbur Mills, Doc Severinson of the "Tonight Show", and Ralph Waite of "The Waltons" all have at least two things in common: they used to suffer from alcoholism, and they now

have much better lives after coming to grips with the disease.

The stories of these prominent people were part of the information provided to more than 125 Green Thumb workers attending a special

alcoholism training session at the Senior Center in Cisco on May 10. Green Thumb employs about 1,000 persons aged 55 and over in community service projects across the state.

In a film entitled "They Do Recover," Waite, Mills, and Severinson discussed the development of their alcohol problems and the paths they followed to find relief.

"The fact that these well-

known people are alcoholics helps to show the disease—and alcoholism is a disease—can strike anyone, rich or poor, lonely or in the spotlight," said Green Thumb district governor Susan Armstrong, who conducted the training.

"Mills and Severinson suffered from severe blackouts, and Mills was afraid he had a brain tumor until examinations revealed his problem

was alcoholism," she said. "Waite says he often felt 'dead and alone,'" Armstrong said, "even though he was a national celebrity. Many of our workers—especially widows and widowers—know the feeling. We want to demonstrate that alcohol will only make any existing problems worse."

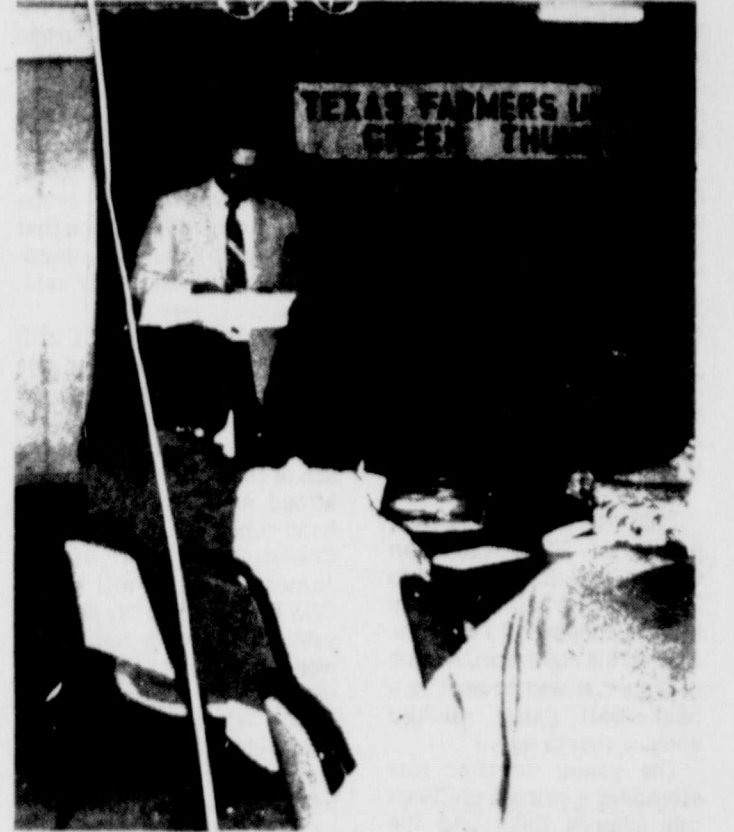
She said some of Green Thumb's enrollees have lost their jobs because of drink-

ing, and for these people the future is dim. "They've lost their income and their self-respect, and few of them will have the resilience and energy to fight back. Prevention, whether you're young or old, is the best answer."

The Green Thumbers also heard a program update from state director Diane Parrish of Waco.
