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## Council To Consider Street Light Contract At Meeting

The City Council will consider a new street lighting contract that proposes a rate increase of some 295 percent at a town hall type meeting Tuesday night, June 28, at the Cisco High School

auditorium. The public was urged to attend.

The agenda for the Tuesday night meeting, which is a regular semi-monthly session of City Council, lists only two items, it was reported by City Secretary Ginger Johnson. The first item is to consider the impact of increased utility rates on the city budget, and the other is to consider the new five-year contract offered the city by West Texas Utilities Co.

The Council decided to hold the public meeting when the new contract came up for consideration at their regular session June 14th. Action of the contract was delayed until the second meeting this month.

The city's street lighting bill has been \$675.95 per month for some 850 lights since October 1, 1973, and WTU proposes to raise rates to \$2,674.37 per month for the

same service in a contract that will be effective July 1, 1983.

In delaying action, Mayor Eris Ritchie said the increase would have a substantial effect on the city budget. Alternates to accepting the new rates, which have been approved by the Public Utilities Commission for cities served by WTU, were listed by the mayor as (1) Turn off part of the lights, (2) Take money allocated for other city services, or (3) Raise city taxes by 5 to 7 percent.

Manager Jack Kennedy of WTU's Cisco offices wrote city officials the following letter in presenting the new contract:

"Reference is made to the Street Lighting Contract between ourselves dated October 9, 1973.

"The terms, as stated in Article VII, was for an initial period of five years from July 1, 1973, and unless 30 days notice in writing is given by either party to the other, prior to the expiration of the first five year term, said agreement shall be automatically extended for an additional period of five years, and from year to year thereafter, unless 30 days notice in writing is given by either party to the other, prior to the expiration of any contract period.

"This letter is to serve as our notice to you that it is our desire to terminate our present Street Lighting Contract on July 1, 1983.

"Service rendered after July 1, 1983, will be provided on the most recent street lighting rate which has been approved by the proper regulatory authority having jurisdiction. A new Street Lighting Contract to become effective on July 1, 1983, is hereby submitted for your approval."

## Paving Plans To Be Studied Here

City officials will meet with representatives of the Zack Burkett Company of Graham at the city hall here at 2 p.m. Monday to discuss plans for the beginning of work to pave Front Street from West 8th to 2nd Street.

The Burkett company was the successful bidder for a contract on the project when bids were opened May 28th. Their bid was \$71,227.33. The price was expected to be raised some \$9,000 as the Ci-

ty Council approved plans at their June 14th meeting to remove the brick pavement and replace it with gravel. Curb and gutter will also be replaced in the area of the brick pavement.

City Manager Mike Moore, Engineer Billy Jacob and other city officials are expected to meet with the Burkett officials at Monday's hearing.

Work on the paving project was expected to begin about July 1.

Members of the Cisco Lions Club began making plans for their annual July Fourth Carnival at their weekly luncheon last Wednesday noon at the Colony Restaurant. The carnival will be held Monday, July 4, at City Park as part of the community's holiday program.

Chairman Bruce Smith said the club will have six booths plus a food concession that will sell barbecue and drinks throughout the day. Committees to handle each

booth are being organized and will be announced soon, he said.

President Ivan Webb said the club's volunteer work crew hopes to have the picnic pavillion ready for use during the carnival. It will be occupied by the food concession on carnival day, he said.

Workers made good progress during the past week, Chairman Bob Conner reported. Volunteers are working there almost every afternoon in order to complete the project, which will be a memorial to deceased Lions.

Funds earned by this year's carnival will help finish the pavillion, Mr. Webb said. A big item yet to be done there is the cement floor.

Lion Walter Knowlden showed picture slide presentations on "How to Protect Your Home" and "How to Conduct a Security Survey" as the entertainment feature.

The slides provided information on the installation of burglar alarms, securing windows and doors, safety measures to prevent burglaries, and methods to minimize loss by fire or storm. The picture slide presentations were obtained by Mr. Knowlden from the AARP.

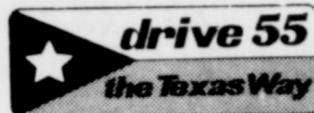

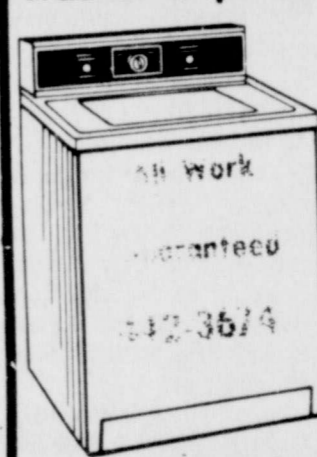

Eastland County cattlemen who have not treated their cattle for grubs should do so between now and September 1.

Grub control can be achieved with a variety of systemic treatments which includes sprays, dips, pour-ons, spot-ons and feed mixes. However, insecticide impregnated ear tags being used for biting fly control do not control cattle grubs.

During late fall and winter, grubs appear on the backs of livestock. It's too late to begin control measures then since most of the damage has already been done.

In addition to controlling cattle grubs, an insecticide used now will also provide contact control of horn flies for two to three weeks. This makes the overall cost of treatment favorable.

Insecticides suggested for grub control include coumaphos (CO-RAI), phosmet (Prolate), trichlorfon (Neguvon), famphur (warbex) and fenthion (Tiguvon). Read and follow directions on the insecticide label before treatment. Cattle that are sick or under stress should not be treated. Dosage is determined by the body weight of the animal.

The cattle grub is the larval stage of the heel fly. The adult fly has no mouth parts, so it causes no pain to the cattle. However, it frightens cattle, making them difficult to manage. Animals often seek relief by standing in shade or shallow water.

The life cycle begins when the heel fly lays its eggs on

an animal. The eggs, glued to hairs, hatch within a few days, and larvae (worms) enter the skin at hair follicles. The immature stages then migrate through the animal's body for six to eight months and reappear in the animal's back in the fall and winter, forming knot-like marbles or cysts.

Cattle grub losses are displayed in a variety of ways. Besides damaging meat and hides by their feeding activity, they lower beef cattle gains and reduce milk production throughout the year. Profit losses are estimated to cost Texas cattle producers \$8-10 million each year.

## Final Insured Peanut Planting Date Set

WACO, TEXAS—July 15, 1983 is the final planting date for insured PEANUTS (FALL SPANISH) in Eastland County, Texas, according to Ardell Kalmach,

Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

"Acres of FALL SPANISH PEANUTS planted by July 15, insured by FCIC (or by a

private company reinsured by FCIC), must be reported by July 30 to receive full crop insurance coverage," says Kalmach.

Acres planted after July 15 must also be reported on the July 30 acreage report as being planted too late for insurance.

"Farmers unable to plant prior to July 15 because of excess moisture conditions

may sign a 20-day late planting agreement, which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower guarantee due to the late planting," Kalmach explained.

Farmers wishing additional information about the new late planting agreement should contact their local authorized crop insurance agent.

## Screwworm Battle Being Waged

COLLEGE STATION—Due to the successful screwworm eradication program in the continental United States, a large joint program has been implemented in Mexico to overwhelm the insect pest, emphasizes Dr. Clifford E. Hoelscher, entomologist based at Texas A&M University.

Hoelscher, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says the

success of the U.S. program was achieved by a cooperative effort of individual livestock producers, various livestock organizations and agencies and the dedicated work of programs scientists and personnel.

The Mexican program, headquartered in Mexico City, involves a work force of approximately 1,800 Mexican and 50 American scien-

tists. "The technology and expertise developed in the U.S. eradication effort was helpful in Mexico," Hoelscher reports.

Eradication procedures involved several management strategies. Sterile flies were air dropped in large numbers to mate with native fertile fly populations. These matings resulted in the development of eggs which

did not hatch.

Wound treatment, improved animal health conditions and the use of an insecticide impregnated bait system were also used to eliminate the target pest from infested areas.

"The combination of eradication procedures all applied simultaneously to an area accomplished the desired results," Hoelscher says.

A barrier zone eventually will be established at the Isthmus of Tehuantepec to prevent re-entry of the fly into areas to the north where the insect pest has been eliminated.

The tropical areas of central and southern Mexico provide a year round habitat for fly development—special problem for program operations.

The sporadic infestations of screwworms in south Texas and northern Mexico in the past few years have been quickly eradicated once they were identified.

"Watchful" is the key word for Texas livestock producers to enhance surveillance for the screwworm," Hoelscher says. Continued checking of all animals by owners for the pest is of prime importance, Hoelscher adds.

He urges owners to send a sample of at least 10 larvae found deep within wounds of pets or livestock to the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Laboratory for identification. The complete address is P.O. Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572.

## Pot Plants Enrich Home & Business Landscapes

COLLEGE STATION—Pot plants have enriched home and business landscapes for a long time, but their popularity has increased sharply in recent years, says Dr. William C. Welch, a landscape horticulturist.

Welch, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, notes that a big advantage of plants growing in containers is their portability, enabling "instant landscaping."

"A wide variety of plants with different cultural requirements can be grown in containers since individual soil, water, pH (acidity), fertility, light and other requirements can be provided for each plant," the horticulturist points out.

Place plants in containers to dramatize them and make them more important visually. Deciduous or evergreen trees, shrubs, vines, annual and perennial flowers make excellent choices.

"Determine plant locations and amounts of available sun, moisture and protection present," Welch advises. "Annual flowers prefer at least a half day's sun but evergreens and tropicals do well with less."

For better design, do not combine plant species in one

container since they often compete visually, says Welch. Clusters of similar plants and containers may be preferable to a single plant. Also, large, open-growing plants may look best with a groundcover.

Select containers of simple design that feature the plant.

"Pot plants usually require more care than those grown in the ground," says Welch. "Most need frequent watering, especially during hot weather, and added protection in cold weather."

Use a planting medium high in organic matter, such as peat or compost. A good mix is five parts garden loam soil, four parts organic matter and one part coarse builder's sand.

Repot plants every three or four years in a new medium since organic matter breaks down and decomposes. Periodically apply small amount of fertilizer, suggests Welch.

## Wildlife Income Available For Southwestern Ranchers

SAN ANGELO—Wildlife may be the most overlooked, if not underrated, source of income available to southwestern ranchers. Hunters now travel great distances and spend tidy sums of money for their occasional adventurous trips to the great outdoors. Many ranchers are beginning to capitalize on this resource, but countless others haven't as yet.

There are many ways to make hefty sums in the "wildlife market" as specialists and ranchers will point out during wildlife concurrent sessions that are part of the International Ranchers Roundup (IRR). It will be in the Convention Center in this West Texas ranching hub August 1-5. Ranchers can obtain program and registration details from their county Extension agent or by writing to IRR, P.O. Drawer 1849, Uvalde, Texas 78801.

Persons interested in wildlife can attend talks relating to Importance of Marketing in a Wildlife Enterprise, Marketing Hunting and Fishing Through Organized Groups, Impact of Wildlife Recreational Use on Land Value, Marketing Exotic Wildlife in Texas, Tax Deductible Conservation Practices and Govern-

ment Sponsored Incentives, Trophy Hunt Management, Pond Management and Marketing Fisheries Recreation, and Financial Impact of the Wildlife Enterprise from a Banker's Viewpoint.

Key speakers are Charles Schreiner IV, Y.O. Ranch, Mountain Home; Gary Wolfe, Vermejo Park Ranch, N.M.; Allen Strand, American Sportsman Club, San Antonio; Tom Woodward, Texas American Bank, Fort Worth; Norman Brints, Independent Consultant, Vernon.

Also, Jim Stribbling, Texas Real Estate Research Center, College Station; Don Steinbach, fisheries specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service; and Duery Menzies, Gillespie County Extension agent.

Wildlife session participants can also attend talks in beef cattle, sheep and goats, grazing management, marketing, ranch family business management, and a computer workshop during the five-day conference. Over 100 speakers from 10 states and South Africa have been confirmed to speak.

In addition, a two-day wildlife tour will visit innovative ranches which

manage wildlife operations in the scenic Texas Hill Country. The tour leaves San Angelo on August 4, stays overnight in Kerrville, and returns August 5, concluding the IRR. Three other tours are available which visit progressive beef cattle, sheep and goats, and grazing management operations in West Texas July 1 is the tour registration deadline for any of the four ranch tours.

IRR participation will be limited to the first 750 persons who register. Late registration can be done at the door, if space is available.

### Garden Hints

The most common and damaging insect in home gardens is the corn earworm, also known as the tomato fruitworm. Corn earworm moths lay eggs on many frequently-grown plants. These eggs hatch and newly-emerged larvae feed directly on leaves at first, then bore into the fruit.

Cutworms are thick-bodied caterpillars that chew through the stems of young plants near the soil surface at night. Much of the plant is not consumed, but it falls over, wilts and dies as a result of stem feeding activity.

## GUARDIAN'S RESPONSIBILITIES

All of us need help from time to time. But some people such as youngsters not of legal age, or others because of impaired mental or physical function, may need help all the time.

When the situation arises that extensive help and management is required the court may appoint a guardian.

The person who is appointed guardian is charged with the responsibility to account for and conserve any assets.

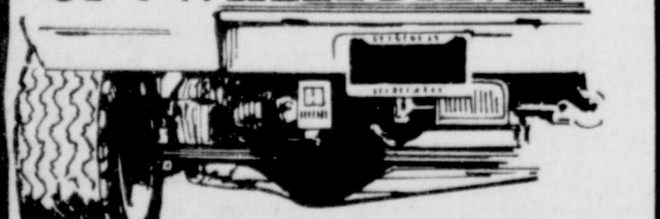

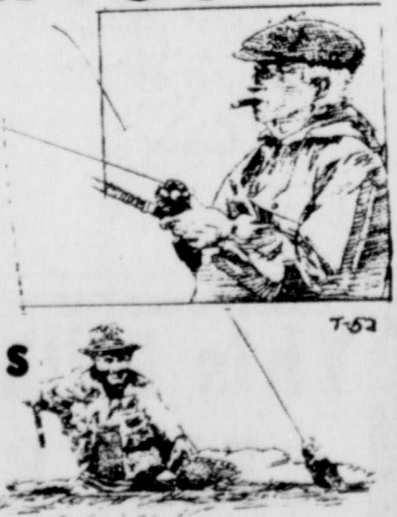

Today's working woman has a dilemma - her busy lifestyle demands a well-rounded wardrobe, but her paycheck is gobbled up by food, housing and transportation costs.

Yet the working woman can stick to her budget and also be well-dressed if she will sit down and sew.

"Easy for them to say," says the working woman who hasn't thought about sewing since she made an apron in the seventh grade, and what about the working woman who owns a sewing machine, but doesn't think she has the ability or time to sew?

Home sewing has changed greatly in recent years. Anyone who fumbled over the fundamentals so long ago should take a second look. Sewing today can be enjoyable, easy, efficient and economical.

Fabric, pattern and notion companies have streamlined sewing to make it adaptable to busy working women.

Fabric companies have concentrated on blending natural and man-made fibers into fabrics which are easy to work with, care for and wear. Today's home sewer can choose natural fibers, such as silk or linen, or their fabric look-alikes in more economical man-made fibers or blends.

Pattern companies have developed fashion pattern that can fit easily into an employed woman's schedule because the garments can be made in a few hours or in a week-end. Each pattern uses simplified construction, requires limited sewing time and creates a welcome addition to any wardrobe.

Notion companies have created new sewing aids to help cut sewing time and make projects easier. For example:

\*Fusible interfacing is quick to use and gives excellent results.

\*A loop turner turns drawstrings right side out quickly and easily.

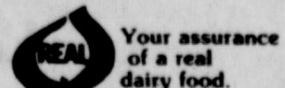

Bake at 350° for 25-30 minutes or until well heated. Makes 6 servings.

Zoning is a means to control the use and development of land for the benefits of the citizens in a community. Ideally, these controls on real estate lead to compatible land uses within the community.

Generally, each municipality is divided into districts based on land use. The three principal districts in an urban area are residential, commercial and industrial.

Each of these types of districts can be subdivided into additional, more restrictive districts. For example, the city of Dallas has 32 types of zoning districts, the city of Lufkin has 12 and the city of Mineola has five.

The larger the municipality, the more numerous the types of zoning districts.

The uses of real estate are limited to those defined by the zoning ordinance. Most zoning ordinances list the permitted uses in each district. If you want to know more about zoning in your city, call your city planning offices.

### HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS FOR DISABLED VETERANS

The Texas property tax code makes several provisions for disabled veterans or their survivors.

These veterans or survivors may be eligible for homestead tax exemptions or tax exemptions on property other than the homestead. They also may be eligible for exemptions in the general homeowners category.

The disabled provision allows the disabled veteran to apply the tax exemption to the homestead or other property, but not both, to qualify for this special homestead or property tax treatment, the veteran must apply before May 1 or each year at the office of the county's chief appraiser.

At the time of application, the taxing jurisdiction will request documents from the Veterans Administration or the appropriate branch of service to show the percentage of the veteran's service-connected disability. For more information, contact the chief appraiser's office in your county.

**WRITTEN LEASE CAN REDUCE MISUNDERSTANDINGS**  
About to rent an apartment? Before signing a lease, read it carefully and ask questions about anything unclear.

A good lease is one that reduces the potential for misunderstandings. Since the terms of the lease determine the responsibilities of each party and the rules to be followed if a disagreement arises, a comprehensive lease is better for both parties than a short, oversimplified or oral lease.

Obtain everything in writing, including the lease, changes in the lease, notices, requests or other agreements. Keep a copy of the lease signed by you and the manager.

Remember, oral communications are the source of most faulty assumptions and misunderstandings. Renting can be a pleasant experience if the tenant and the manager understand and uphold their obligations. And these obligations should be specified in a written lease.

### TALKING HOUSES SELL THEMSELVES

Don't be surprised if the next real estate "for sale" sign you pass begins talking to you.

Actually, the sign doesn't

talk. The house does.

A Minnesota firm is marketing tiny radio transmitters which are used in combination with a cassette tape player to broadcast information about the house. The real estate sign instructs motorists to tune to a particular frequency on their car radio.

When tuned to the correct frequency, listeners learn more about the house—square footage, number of rooms, age of the home, special features or anything else the real estate agent feels appropriate.

One advantage of this marketing technique is that buyers can shop at their leisure. The broadcast range of the transmitter is only two or three blocks, so if you see a sign and want to hear more about the house, don't keep

driving. Stop and listen. Then decide whether or not to look.

### HOME ENERGY CONSERVATION EFFECTIVENESS

The effectiveness of home energy conservation efforts was underscored recently by an energy department report.

Over a three-year period ending in 1980, households in the U.S. cut energy use by 17 percent. This production reflects moves to increase insulation, maintain more modest temperatures in the home and convert to alternative types of energy.

Although there was much public information urging conservation, undoubtedly the primary impetus was economic. Fuel costs were rapidly increasing, and

federal tax credit was created as an incentive for investment in conservation improvements.

Energy costs rose so rapidly that the average household actually paid higher bills in 1980 than in 1978, despite the reduced use. Without conservation, however, the bills would have been higher.

Before I begin this, I'm aware that I'm whipped. Knowing I'm fighting a losing battle builds up my frustration level to the blood-boiling point—as if the weather's temperature didn't get me hot enough!

"Unique" (only one of its kind) set me off this time. A TV announcer's use, specifically. With such a high rate of exposure, it should be a point of honor for media reporters to offer the public correct grammar, no matter how sleazy or biased their materials.

"Unique" does not have a

comparative nor a superlative degree. A thing is unique or it is not. Your cat is going to have kittens, or she isn't. Considering the prolific nature of cats, it is unlikely one will wind up in the unique column within the next few billion years.

The reckless disregard for matching singular subjects and verbs—plurals, too—grits my teeth. (I'm in a terrible shape—blood boiling and teeth clenching, and tranquilizers send me right around the bend.)

"None of your children are

here." No; absolutely not, and "No way, Jose." "None" is the subject, so the verb used should be "is," not "are."

One of my not-so-long-ago,

sixth grade girls wept as she protested, "He don't sounds a lot better than 'He doesn't.'" Hearing "He/she don't" all her life, of course, it didn't sound right.

This is a touchy point for teachers. When a youngster stoutly tells you, "My daddy says 'I have went,' so I'm gonna say 'I have went,' too," it does not become a teacher to take a hard line against ol' Dad any more than it would to go against

God, mother country and apple pie.

Explain that it is not the child's place, nor yours, to correct the father, but the father is sending Sonny to school to learn the right way to speak. Maybe ol' Dad did not have a teacher who pointed out the errors of his grammar, but Sonny should profit by one who does.

Another usage I deplore, but I've heard it so many times that I am guilty of using it myself—but rarely—is "Everyone should do their part." An admirable sentiment if expressed correctly: "Everyone should do his part." "Everyone" is singular, and it is indeed singular to hear the correct usage.

The English language is a hodge-podge of other tongues, too. The rule for any word's usage is often qualified by, "except..." My

point is that media people would be careful to use grammar correctly because of the example they set for so many people. Let our children know what they should be using whether or not they will do so.

Songwriters really offend more often and more deeply than do reporters. Teenagers aren't likely to go

around humming or whistling a newscast, but they pick up on the songs. They can't help it when all those decibels assault their ears at all hours. They absorb errors.

They also absorb life-style errors which will come back to haunt them. There is no way to tell them so they will hear—it's like talking to a

person in a soundproof room. That's the reason I know I've lost before I begin to fight. If I could talk to a bookmaker (not a publisher!), he wouldn't even bet me that a commentator ever would know I'm in anguish about TV grammar.

I am prone to err myself, though I hate to think so. I'd much rather be as confident

as the old lady who said, "I ain't never made but one mistake in grammar and I seen it as soon as I done it then."

I mean for that to rouse a chuckle, even if it is an oldie, but I think it's a bit sad that such a statement is considered a joke. Or is my blood-boiling about "English as she spoke" unique?

## Rising Star Corporation Files To Drill In JMJ Field

Southeastern Resources Corp. of Rising Star has filed for permits to drill the No. 2 & 3 M.K. Courtney "C" and the No. 1 & 2 M.K. Courtney "E", four 4,400-foot developmental wells in Eastland County's JMJ Field, five miles northwest of Eastland.

The "C" wells are situated in a 320-acre lease of the H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-32. The "E" wells are to be located in a 160-acre lease of the H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-33.

The No. 4A and 5A R.O. Duncan, two developmental wells in the Eastland Regular Field, are scheduled to be spudded seven miles southeast of Eastland. With projected total depths of 1,700 feet, the wells will be in a 32-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 10, Blk. 2. Caraway Operating Co. of San Angelo is listed as the operator.

The No. 1 Walker-West is slated to be drilled in the REB Field by Snow Oil Co. of Fort Worth. With projected total depth of 4,000 feet, it will be spudded in a 40-acre lease of the H&TC RR Co. Survey, five miles north of Eastland, in Eastland County.

EnRe Corp. of Cisco has staked locations for the No. 9 and 10 Mitcham Estate "H" in Eastland County's DRS Field. They are each scheduled for 4,200 feet of hole making. The locations are in a 640-acre lease in the SPRR Co. Survey, about 10 miles northwest of Cisco.

The Dallas Group Inc. of Mesquite has revealed plans to drill a 1,400-foot developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field. The operator has 80-acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-255 and has designated the venture as the No. 31 McMinn. Drillsite is three miles west of Romney.

Snow Oil Co. has also staked location for the No. 1 Williamson-Homeplace in Eastland County's Snow Field. It is scheduled for 4,000 feet of hole making. The location is in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 6, Blk. 4, about six miles northeast of Eastland.

Texfel Petroleum Corp. of Abilene has filed for permit to drill the No. 2-4-21 "B", a projected 4,050-foot wildcat for oil or gas, four miles north of Eastland. The venture will be in a 133-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 21, Blk. 4.

SRG Oil Corp. of Abilene has revealed plans to drill a 1,100-foot developmental well in the Dead Horse Creek Field. The operator has 336-acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey,

Sec. 9, Blk. 3, and has designated the venture as the No. 4 Holt. Drillsite is four miles northwest of Carbon.

The No. 7 A.G. Dunn, a developmental well in the Eastland Regular Field, is scheduled to be drilled three miles northwest of Rising Star. Dean Production Corp. of Abilene is listed as the operator. Location is in a 60-acre lease in Eastland County's E.T. RR Co. Survey, Sec. 26, Blk. 2. Projected total depth is 1,150 feet.

Dallas Energy Development Corp. of Dallas has posted initial production figures for the No. 4-B, 5-B & 6B A.H. Stover, three new oil wells in Eastland County's Midkiff Field, 10 miles south of Cisco.

The wells indicated respective potential for 31, 23, & 25 barrels of oil per day, all on an open choke.

The well will be located in an 84-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 127, Blk. 3, and is designated as the No. 1 Hafernick.

Pumping at the rate of 86 barrels of crude oil and 124,000 CF casinghead gas per day on an open choke, the No. 3 Hagman (South) was completed in Eastland County's Northwest Ranier Field by Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge.

Drillsite is in a 2,715-acre lease in the William Sybert Survey, A-434, two miles northeast of Ranger.

After entering the pay

zone at 3,230 feet, the well went to 3,750 foot bottomhole. It was perforated to produce from an interval 3,232 to 3,325 feet.

Abilene-based Hailey Energy Corp. has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Maples, a wildcat for oil or gas to be located four miles southeast of Romney. With projected total depth of 1,600 feet, the well is in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's John F. Sapp Survey, A-34.

The Eastland Regular Field gained a new gas producer when the No. 4 Taff was completed by T-Square Petroleum of Rising Star, one mile southeast of Pioneer.

Location is in a 79-acre lease in Eastland County's ET RR Co. Survey, Sec. 20. On a 5/16 choke, the well showed ability to yield up to 135,000 CF gas per day, with absolute open flow being rated at 170,000 CFD.

The well was taken to 2,616 foot bottom and perforated to produce from an interval of perforations 2,395 to 2,400 feet into the hole.

Location has been staked by Cauble Drilling Co. of Albany for a 2,000-foot Eastland County wildcat. The explorer well will be known as the No. 1 First National Bank of Albany. It is in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 98, Blk. 3, 11 miles south of Cisco.

169-acre lease of the T&NO RR Co. Survey, A-583, the S.J. Robinson Survey, A-424, and the R.B. Truly Survey, A-652, six miles northwest of Ranger, in Eastland County.

A 650-foot wildcat is planned by Southwestern Energy of Burleson at a drillsite three miles north of Scranton, in Eastland County. The location is in a 76-acre lease in the BBB&C RR Co. Survey, Sec. 2, Blk. 2. Well's designation is the No. 2 Jewell.

Richard Neal Wilson of Cross Plains has posted first production figures for the No. 1 Carter, a marginally successful gas well in Eastland County's Foster Field, about 11 miles south of Cisco. The well flowed at the rate of 40,000 CF of gas per day on a 3/16 choke. It was given a 75,000 CFD rating on absolute open flow.

The well bottomed at 3,140 feet and will produce from perforations 2,995 to 3,077 feet into the hole. Drillsite was in a 42-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 35, Blk. 3.

A new wildcat in Eastland County has been financed by Katlaco Operating Inc. of Lubbock. Designated as the No. 5 Katlaco Fee "A", the well indicated capacity to produce 8 barrels of oil and 255,000 CF of casinghead gas per day on an open choke.

The well located two miles northeast of Cisco, in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-237.

Bottomed at 4,044 feet, the well will produce from an interval of perforations 3,446 to 3,453 feet into the hole. The pay formation was first encountered at 3,440 feet.

Showing potential to yield gas at the rate of 802,000 CF per day on a 1.25-in. choke, a new producer has been brought on line in Palo Pinto County's PK Dam Field, five miles northeast of the Brad community.

Absolute open flow came in at 2,200,000 CFD.

The well will be known as the No. 2 B.R.A. Williams Petroleum Co. of Burkburnett is the operator. Bottomed at 4,325 feet, the well will produce from a set of perforations in a Conglomerate structure, 4,000 to 4,009 feet into the wellbore. The operation is in a 423-acre

The No. 1 well showed ability to make 247,000 CF gas daily and was given a 322,000-CFD rating on open flow.

It was drilled to 3,800-ft. bottom and will produce from a perforated interval in the Marble Falls Formation, 3,348 to 3,392 feet. It showed capacity to yield 26 barrels of oil daily, plus 115,000 CF casinghead gas.

Ridge also has completed the No. 3 Hagaman in the Northwest Ranger Field. Location in Eastland County's sector of the field, it was tested on open choke and showed potential for 86 barrels of oil plus 124,000 CFD casinghead gas per day.

Location has been staked by Piranha Production Inc. of Graham for a 4,999-foot developmental well in Stephens County's Ira-Lee Field, five miles southeast of Eliaville. The well is designated as the No. 9 Ed Hinson. Drillsite will be in a 320-acre lease in the SP RR Co. Survey.

A pair of 1,900-ft. wildcat for oil or gas are scheduled to be drilled three miles east of Pickwick in Palo Pinto County by Steve Warren and Associates Inc. of Arlington.

Location will be in a 258-acre lease block in the John Smith Survey. The wells will be known as the

No. 3-C and No. 5-D L.L. Bridges.

A new gas producer has been brought on line in Palo Pinto County's O'Laughlin Field by M.O. Rife Jr., independent operator from Fort Worth.

Rife's No. 26 M.H. McMurray flowed 129,000 CF gas per day on a quarter-inch choke. It was given a 139,000-CFD rating on absolute open flow.

Located in a 1,780-acre lease assembly in the S.F.

Harding Survey five miles west of Grafrod, the well went to 4,420-ft. bottom. It will produce from a perforated interval 2,812 to 2,894 feet into the hole.

The No. 7 T.D. Williams, a 4,100-ft. developmental try, is ready for spudding in Palo Pinto County's North Strawn Field six miles north of the Strawn townsite. Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge is the operator. The well is in an 840-acre lease, T&PRR Survey.

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## Reflections In Perspective

Have I told you of Kevin Metford (not his real name, of course) who was our Medical Officer at Jebel Dhanna? Jebel Dhanna was that faraway place with a strange-sounding name on the desert coast of Abu Dhabi near the Qatar border. Another "pioneer outpost project", it had to be completely self-sufficient. And that meant that, with 37 "Staff Types" and almost 300 Indian, Pakistani and Arab craftsmen and coolies, medical facilities had to be provided. Dr. Metford, his Indian male nurse and their two-bed "dispensary" provided those facilities.

Our British partner had recruited Dr. Metford, straight out of school and internship. And he was indeed something else. Born and brought up in the Limehouse Section of London, he had never been off the tight little island kingdom before. Indeed, he'd hardly ventured outside the limits of the City of London. He'd never learned to drive an automobile!

Very good-natured, but naive; he became the recipient of the sharp end of a wide variety of practical jokes. He took them in stride, frequently expressing his pleasure at having this golden opportunity to practice medicine so soon out of his residency at St. Mary's. And he even learned to drive the Land Rover which we had fitted out as an ambulance. We frequently, in the course of his learning to master that British counterpart to our American Jeep, thanked Heaven that we were in the desert and that the only vehicular traffic was that of dump trucks whose major activity was far from the camp. Dr. Metford was one of those people whose lack of co-ordination made it difficult to climb a stepladder while chewing bubble gum. But he mastered the vehicle, and delighted in roaring off the sand dune where the Staff Camp was located into the hardpan flat a few hundred yards away where the tent-city housing the "locals" was situated. There was never a report of having torn through the ropes of a coolie tent.

As the second phase of our project was drawing to a close, more than a year after the inauguration of the first phase, we began winding down. Meanwhile, quite a village had sprung up nearby. One of the drilling contractors working in the new field some forty miles inland had set up a base at Jebel Dhanna, as had at least two production service companies. And the dependents of the coolies and artisans employed there had followed their menfolk, as dependents have a way of doing the world over. More and more we saw Bedouin women, with their watery-eyed children in tow, near the dispensary. Usually they were being treated by the Indian nurse, but now and then "Dr. K." would be seen taking the little one inside for treatment. Dr. Metford had built up quite a thriving practice. Highly unprofitable, but certainly a golden opportunity to practice medicine.

And as we began planning to break camp, a French catering contracting firm, under an agreement with the oil company, moved in for the purpose of constructing and operating a "guest house" and for the further purpose of providing in the facility quarters and mess-rooms for the oil company's staff which would be required in the operation of the terminal which we were in the process of completing.

Included in the services which the oil company insisted were those of a medical nature. A qualified Medical Officer would be in residence at Jebel Dhanna. The French, not noted for their extravagance in such matters, took advantage of Dr. Metford's position of being on the verge of being declared redundant, offered him the assignment as Medical Officer...and he accepted. He conditioned his acceptance on our closing down our operations.

Dr. Metford was delighted. He'd come to love his practice. He had a captive market for his medical

skills, and no general practitioner ever had a greater opportunity. The "black tent village" on the other side of the ridge and where the families of the coolies at Jebel Dhanna lived had almost outgrown "village" proportions. But French parsimony again came to the surface. We offered to sell Dr. Metford's "ambulance" to the French company. They could not see that he needed an ambulance. He had no materials to transport. His principal load consisted of his small black bag, and that could be handled quite nicely on a bicycle. Kevin was in a state of depression for quite some time following our loading out of his beloved ambulance, with its bright red cross painted on each side and on its roof.

His cheerful good nature came to the fore, though. In almost no time at all he could be seen almost daily, making his rounds through the coolie camp, his derby at a jaunty angle and his pillbag strapped to the luggage rack on the bicycle. But he began disappearing from camp for a day or so, at odd intervals. There was no explanation, and the French likely shrugged it off as "some British idiosyncrasy". Until the time when he was gone for five full days.

## Medical Officer

Word was passed to the Trucial Oman Scouts at Al Hamra Outpost. An all out search, air and land, was launched. And before he was found, Dr. Metford returned to camp. Riding a camel! Now Kevin had learned quite a bit of Arabic in the couple of years he'd been in the desert, and had made a deal with a bedouin for the beast. A part of the deal was that he be taught how to handle the animal. He'd become quite expert. And then the fun began. Using countless dousings of laundry soap, and gallons and gallons of precious water, that camel was scrubbed and washed until it literally glistened.

To properly identify the camel and its place in the pecking order, a huge cross was shaved on each side of the animal, and the cross was painted with mercurochrome. Every morning Dr. Metford would be seen, pillbag dangling from the saddle and derby still at the angle...making his rounds through the coolie camp and the neighbouring village.

All of which was quite amusing to the French as well as to almost everyone else, including even the Arabs. Until one day, when disaster struck. A drillship was working several miles offshore, installing channel markers. One of the

workmen on the drillship had fallen from the mast onto the steel deck, and was suffering from multiple fractures, some of which were compound in nature. The ship radioed ashore, seeking medical aid.

A radio message to Bahrain put a charter plane on its way, and a call went out for the Resident Medical Officer. He was nearby. Instructing a driver in the loading of a stretcher, splints, blankets and stuff into a Land Rover, Dr. Metford proceeded to mount his camel. Striking off toward the harbour, he was overtaken in minutes by the Head Frenchman, who insisted he get into the Land Rover, but immediately. "No, thank you." Cooly spoke the Meical Officer. "I have me transport. Quite dependable, the camel!"

He managed to arrive at the harbour ahead of the boat which was bringing the injured man ashore. The Frenchman, recovering from a near stroke of apoplexy, couldn't but admire the coolness with which Dr. Metford went about the work of patching up the injured workman for the flight to hospital in Bahrain. And on the following morning, parked in front of Dr. Metford's quarters was a Land Rover. With a red cross painted on both sides...and on the roof.

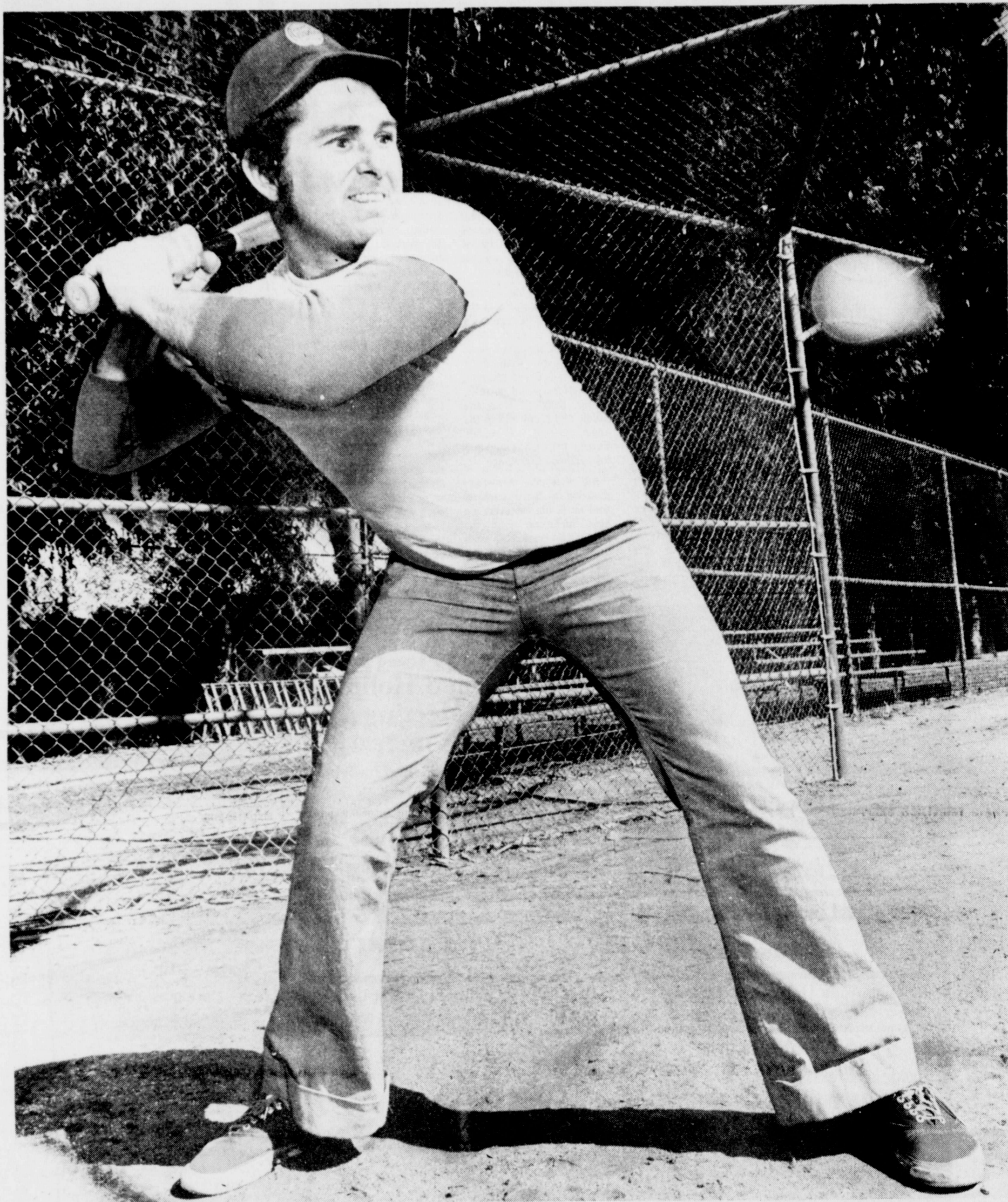

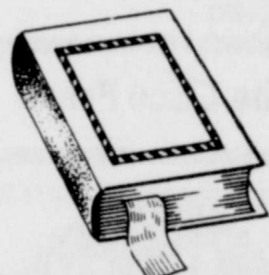

## Department of Public Safety Predicts 49 Traffic Deaths

Captain G.J. Matthews, Highway Patrol Commander of the Abilene District of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Excessive speed and Driving While Intoxicated will prove to be highway killers during this July 4th holiday weekend."

"Those two violations of the traffic law will in all probability, account for more than one half of the estimated 49 traffic deaths during this holiday weekend," Captain Matthews said.

Last year, during the July 4th weekend, 64 traffic deaths were tabulated by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The DPS will again be conducting "Operation Motorcide" during this weekend. "Operation Motorcide" is a time when all fatal traffic accidents are reported to the DPS headquarters in Austin so they can be tabulated and information can be released to the news media. This is done to try to focus public attention on the dangers of driving during peak holiday periods, hoping to hold the death toll as low as possible, Matthews added. He stated, "We have to have voluntary compliance of the traffic laws, by the majority of the motoring public in order to be successful in reducing accidents."
