Their lives are filled with simple joys of living guided by their ability to take adversity with gentle humor and an abiding faith in God.

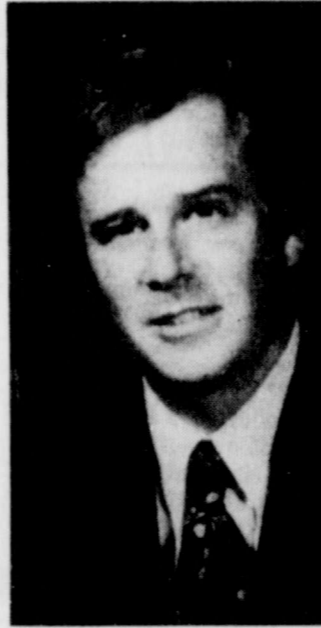

## Contract Let For Stadium Facility, Teachers Hired

A contract was awarded for the construction of new rest rooms at Chesley Field and five teachers were hired to complete the faculty for the 1983-84 school year at the monthly meeting of the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District Monday night.

Linton Batteas, local contractor, was the low bidder for the contract to erect a 15x30 foot rest room facility just east of the concession stand on the north side of the football stadium, Supt. James Couch reported. The facility will cost \$16,793.

The new facility will house men's and women's rest rooms, Mr. Couch said.

Work will start in the near future and the contract calls for the facility to be finished by the time football season opens. There will be five stalls and two lavatories for women, and the men's facility will have two 25-foot urinals, two stalls and two lavatories. Both will have facilities for the handicapped.

Debbie Barton of Cisco to teach biology; graduate of Cisco High School, Cisco Junior College and Tarleton State University. Married to Tim Barton, local contractor.

Mary Lewis of Copperas Cove, to teach high school English, and speech; graduate of North Texas State University; single.

Caroline Kenealy, native of Winnsboro, to teach home economics in high school; graduate of Texas Woman's University; single.

Suzette Hagan Eisenbach, native of Cisco, moving to Cisco from Brownwood; to teach 5th grade at Intermediate School.

Melinda Stephenson, native of Midland, to teach physical education at Intermediate School; has

taught two years at Austin, graduate of Texas Tech; lives with her husband southeast of Cisco.

The board also approved the resignations of Mrs. Nancy Hammes, who has accepted a position on the faculty at Cisco Junior College, and Miss Judy Mashburn, who resigned as biology teacher to accept an assistantship at ACU where she will study for a master's degree. She had been on the CHS faculty one year.

In other action, the board voted to close the junior high school campus during the noon hour for the coming school year.

### Seal Coating Streets Underway

The City of Cisco's new street paving crew was expected to complete seal coating Avenue N, from 8th to 14th Streets, on Tuesday and to move to Royal Lane, City Manager Mike Moore reported.

After Royal Lane, the equipment will move to Primrose and Simms Streets and then to 21st Street, from Hilton Avenue to Beech. If there is any of the 6,000 gallons of asphalt left, it will be used on streets in Humbletown, Mr. Moore said.

The city purchased a sweeper, roller, and other equipment in order to do seal coating work. This enables the street department to repair streets at a considerable savings, the city manager said.

"We hope to continue this work as long as we have the money and materials," Mr. Moore said. He said that 6,000 gallons of the asphalt costs \$5,000 and that the white chat used with it is expensive.

Mr. Pike is presently living in Fort Worth. A graduate of Baylor University, he is presently attending Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth.

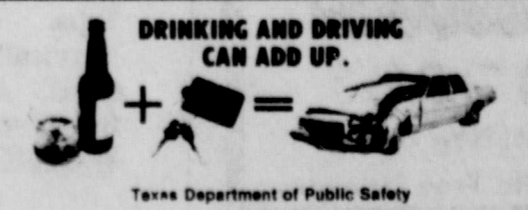

## Gordon Spot County Extension Agent

Eastland County residents who have elm trees in their yards should keep a watchful eye on the trees to spot infestations of elm leaf beetles.

The beetles are a serious pest of elm trees as they eat the surface of the leaves, leaving only the veins. The skeletonized leaves turn brown and eventually fall from the trees. The damage weakens the trees and makes them more susceptible to borers that attack elms.

The adult beetles are oval and about a quarter of an inch long. They are yellowish to olive-green in color with a black stripe along each side of the wing covers.

The beetles lay yellow eggs on the undersides of elm leaves. Full grown larvae are about half an inch long, dull yellow in color with black stripes on their back, and have a distinct black head.

Although many insecticides will kill the adult and

larvae beetles, the major problem is thorough coverage of infested trees. Trees often have to be sprayed several times because there are at least three or more generations of beetles a year.

High-pressure, high-volume sprayers are necessary to completely cover the foliage. Some degree of control can be obtained by spraying the trunk and lower limbs when the larvae move down to the ground to pupate.

Bag worms are also destructive pests on evergreen and deciduous shrubs and trees. If you have not treated ornamentals for these pests you should check to see if you have a problem.

The young worms or caterpillars construct a small tapered bag of silk-like material and attach to it pieces of bark and foliage.

The bagworm protrudes its head and front feet from the bag as it moves about the plant feeding but will withdraw into the bag when

disturbed. In late summer the bag is attached to a branch and the mature caterpillar pupates within the bag. At that time it is not possible to control the worms with insecticides. The bagworms are easier to

control when they are young. Webworms have been a noticeable problem recently. Usually, there is only one infested branch per tree. The best control is to remove the infested branch and dispose of it.

Our seasons seem to be very late this year. Spring came late and summer has been late arriving. This has confused many insects. The pecan nut casebearer usually begins infestations about May 25 in Eastland County.

This year we did not find eggs of the casebearer until about June 6. At that time most pecan growers sprayed and thought that pest was controlled. However, the casebearers continued to hatch and cause damage un-

til about June 20, almost later than usual.

The rainfall in Eastland County has been less than most areas around us. While many areas are experiencing a wet year we are a little

behind the average rainfall rate. Ronald Bailey's weather records show that we have had 13.25 inches of rain during the first half of the year. Our average rainfall for the first six months is about 15 inches.

## Garden Editor

Each year we kill more house plants by over watering than we do from the lack of water. Just too much T.L.C. (Tender Loving Care). When we go beneath the surface of the water our oxygen supply is cut off and eventually we die. This of course is called drowning. Exactly the same thing happens to our plants when we over water them. The oxygen can not get to the roots so we end up killing our plants by drowning them.

Oxygen is made available to plant roots in several ways: through dissolved oxygen in irrigation water, by diffusion through the air spaces in the soil, diffusion through soil water and by oxygen transport downward from shoot to root within the plant itself. Oxygen diffusion through air is much faster than through water.

If diffusion of air into soil pores is minimized, the amount of oxygen contained in the irrigation water becomes much more important. In the study of soil aeration due to oxygen diffusion from the surface of the soil, flooded conditions would prohibit the upward diffusion of oxygen through the soil and limit diffusion from the surface due to the soil being constantly wet, with few available air spaces. Under these circumstances, the effect of the oxygen contained in the watering solution becomes more important.

The Chemist at The Plant Research Laboratories in Irvine, California have been well aware of this problem

and have developed a formulation containing air dissolved oxygen and oxygen that is available from urea peroxide. This formulation is called "Oxygen Plus."

I have been familiar with this problem for many years trying many different ideas looking for a solution. After making many changes from the original formulation of "Oxygen Plus" these scientists have found the right formulation to correct this problem. I have used "Oxygen Plus" on chrysanthemums as well as many house plants and have that "Oxygen Plus" is the answer to this problem of over watering our house plants as well as all container grown plants and is truly "A Gardener's Dream Come True".

Theme of the 10th annual

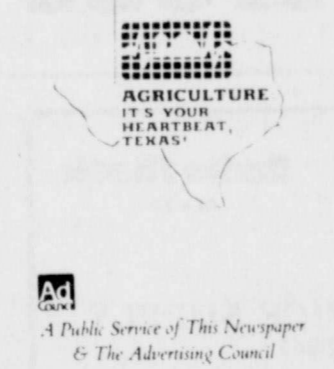
congress is "Celebrate Citizenship."

Some old ideas about husband and wife homebuying behavior are falling by the wayside as new research reveals modern couples are sharing the decision on which home to buy.

It was once believed one spouse was dominant in the decision-making process but some recent research indicates most persons are willing to discard any alternative not acceptable to both spouses.

If one spouse is going to be dominant in the homebuying process, it is more likely to occur among relatively inexperienced buyers. What appears to be dominance may be misleading. More commonly one spouse gives in to the other to avoid conflict.

Couples in the market for a new home often are under pressure to buy soon and keep each other happy. Couples should talk about their preferences regarding homes. An open evaluation makes home buying more enjoyable.

**ENCOURAGING TENANTS**  
If you are a landlord, here are some tips that may encourage vacating tenants to stay in your apartment or office building a little longer.

Many apartment dwellers will stay a few extra weeks or months if you rent the apartment to them at a slight discount. This possibility applies especially

to tenants who are building or buying a house.

Tenants in an office complex usually plan to move at the end of their lease term, even if that happens to be a busy time in the business cycle. Many such tenants will take advantage of an offer to extend their lease for a short time.

Such an extension will help them avoid disruption during a peak business period, and it will give you more time to find a new tenant.

### INTERCITY HAVENS FOR BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Many inner city areas are in need of private investment and new jobs. The problem is how to encourage businesses to locate in such areas.

The solution may be to give these areas an advantage by suspending taxes and regulations on

businesses within a defined zone. These "enterprise zones" may then become havens for new business development.

While the enterprise zone concept has not been tried in the United States, it is not untested. Hong Kong has developed rapidly under a policy of limited government regulation, and Great Britain is currently experimenting with the idea, having established 11 zones in or on the fringes of depressed urban areas.

The success of these foreign experiments could decide whether the concept of enterprise zones become accepted in this country.

### MAINTAINING A MOBILE HOME

Here are some tips for keeping up the appearance and the resale value of your mobile home.

Deterioration of the finish can be retarded if the exterior of the home is cleaned and waxed regularly.

## Husband-Wife Homebuying Behavior

Periodic washes will get rid of surface dirt and grime.

The roof should be inspected and cleaned at least twice yearly. Remove loose debris and rust and repair any cracks. The roof should not be walked on unless absolutely necessary. Most roof inspections and repairs can be done from a ladder.

The Manufactured Housing Institute suggests coating or painting a metal roof at least every other year and preferably once a year. Special care is required for refurbishing vinyl roofs. While inspecting the roof, check the stacks, vents and moldings. If these units are damaged or in poor condition, replace them.

### CHANGES IN INTEREST RATE CEILINGS

The Texas Legislature has

acted to insure loanable funds are available to borrowers. The legislature simplified the usury laws and raised the maximum legal interest rate.

Under the law, consumer loans for personal items like cars, appliances and owner-occupied houses have an interest rate ceiling of between 18 and 24 percent. The ceiling for business loans would

vary between 18 and 28 percent. A loan made for real estate—other than for an owner-occupied home or condominium unit—probably will be construed as a business loan.

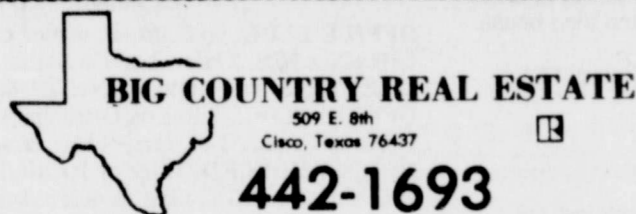

## Home Sewing Is More Sophisticated

COLLEGE STATION—The average \$2.75 home sewers must pay for a pattern isn't the result of inflation alone. "Home sewers are paying for far more sophisticated products than they used to," explains Dr. Ann Vanderpoorten, a clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

In the past, company designers usually created the ideas for garments. To-

day, pattern companies are just as likely to purchase the rights to originals from well-known designers, says Vanderpoorten.

After purchase of the design, the company begins the process of making a pattern that home sewers can use. According to the home economist, the design is first draped on a dress form or made in a trial pattern.

Then a test garment is constructed and checked for fit

on a dress form and a live model. It is also checked for suitability of use with different types of fabrics, such as plaids, stripes and various textures.

All through this process involves marking the notches, dots, buttonholes, grain lines and other important features. The pattern is then graded to all sizes by computer, although the original is made in a size ten.

Along with the pattern, ac-

curate instructions for the home sewer must be prepared, says the specialist. An instruction sheet and information for the pattern envelope are written. Technical illustrations are prepared to accompany the instruction sheet. Finally, the instructions are checked against the actual garment.

Then the company is ready to print the pattern pieces, envelopes and pattern catalogs.

"The pattern industry is also trying to appeal to home sewers who are more interested in making something simple and fast than in making designer fashions," notes Vanderpoorten.

Some companies have introduced reduced lines of patterns that can simply be displayed on a fabric store rack. The patterns have fewer pattern pieces, only one view to consult, and instructions that allow for a graded fit. These patterns are also less expensive, averaging about \$1.19 each.

The variety offered by designer styles, standard patterns and simplified versions now give home sewers more choice for their money, adds the specialist.

## Commission Grants 21 Permits In June

AUSTIN—Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that 21 permits to operate new pipelines in Texas were granted by the RRC in June. In May, the Commission ap-

proved 12 permits, and 17 were granted in June 1982. Fifteen of the new permits were for gathering pipelines, two were for gas plant lines, and one was for a trunk transmission line. Three

were for multi-purpose lines. Gathering lines bring oil and gas from production leases, while a trunk transmission line is larger diameter line into which smaller lines connect. At gas plants, gas is

stripped of the liquid hydrocarbons usually present in wellhead gas.

Sixteen of the newly-permitted lines will transport gas, three will carry crude oil, one will

carry products and another will move salt water.

In June, four permits each were granted to operate pipelines in Southeast Texas, West Central Texas, and North Texas; two each in

East Texas the San Antonio and San Angelo areas; and one each in East Central Texas and the Refugio and Midland areas.

Gathering lines approved: Bengal Gas Transmission Co., San Antonio, gas, Callahan County; Corsicana Drilling Co., Corsicana, crude oil, Navarro County; Gene Powell Investments Inc., Longview, gas, Rusk County; Woodham Oil Corp., Fulshear, gas, Zavala County; B&B Gathering Inc., Jacksboro, gas, Jack County; LTX Inc., Abilene, gas, Fisher County; petro Rose, Bay City, two lines—one for

crude oil and another for salt water in Matagorda County; Bravo Gas Co., Lufkin, gas, Rusk and Panola County; Richards Producing Co., Houston, gas, Wharton County; Allico Exploration Co., Houston, gas, Madison County; Champlin Gas Pipeline Inc., Midland, gas, Sterling and Reagan counties; Morrow Resources Inc., Odessa, gas, Tom Green County; Bethany Oil Co., Shreveport, La., gas, Shackelford County; Buffalo Pipeline Co., Breckenridge, crude oil and condensate, McMullen County.

The No. B-1-B. Harrison, a developmental try in Eastland County's JMJ Field, is scheduled to be spudded eight miles northwest of Cisco. With projected total depth of 4,200 feet, the well will be in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC

RR Co. Survey, A-946. Richey & Co. Inc. of Fort Worth is listed as the operator.

OBK Inc. of Fort Worth has posted first production data for the No. 1 Waddel-Teichman, a new wildcat

gasser located three miles west of Santo. Drillsite was in a 320-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T&P RR Co. Survey.

With total depth of 3,998 feet, the well entered the pay stratum at 3,735 feet and will produce from an interval

3,735 to 3,738 feet. It showed potential for 360,000 CF gas per day on a 3/8-inch choke. Absolute open flow was rated at 400,000 CFD.

Austex Energy Inc. of Fort Worth has revealed plans to drill a 4,300-foot developmental well in the Austex Field. The operator has 822-acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's L.B.T. The wells are located five miles west of Dennis in Parker County. The No. 1 Billy Cardwell is situated in the Thomas Hamilton Survey and has a proposed total drilling depth of 4,700 feet. The No. 1 P.M. Cardwell is located in a 79-acre lease in the A. Jackson Survey, it has a proposed drilling depth of 2,700 feet.

JJB Oil & Gas Inc. of Mineral Wells has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Hicks, a projected 5,800-foot wildcat for oil or gas, four miles northeast of Tintop. The venture will be in a 133-acre lease in Parker County's J. Welch Survey.

## RR Commission Requests

### Funds To Seal Mine Shafts

AUSTIN—The federal Office of Surface Mining has approved a Railroad Commission plan to seal abandoned mercury mine shafts near Terlingua and the Commission has requested federal funds to pay for the operation.

Since an initial inspection in the fall of 1982, technicians from the Commission's Surface Mining and Reclamation Division have identified 81 open, vertical shafts

resulting from mercury ore mining operations decades ago in the Terlingua area. Some of the shafts are 900 feet deep.

Chairman Mack Wallace and Commissioners Buddy Temple and James E. (Jim) Nugent have been pressing for almost a year for federal funding to plug the shafts because they are located in a heavily-travelled tourist area and pose a serious safety hazard. The shafts are located along Farm Road 170

which is the only highway between Presidio and the northern entrance to Big Bend National Park.

To get federal abandoned mine land funds for plugging the shafts, the Railroad Commission first obtained an \$80,000 grant from the Office of Surface Mining to locate the abandoned shafts in the area and develop a plan to seal them. The plan approved by OSM calls for backfilling 70 of the shafts. Each of the remaining 11, which are too deep to backfill, will be sealed with a steel grate.

If federal funds for the operation are approved, bids will be sought from area companies to do the work.

While studying the abandoned mines, Railroad Commission staff members discovered another hazard. At one mine site, lightning ignited an old wooden structure and the fire spread into a mound of mine tailings consisting of tar sands and mercury ore located nearby. The smoldering fire is vaporizing mercury in the ore, releasing mercury vapor into the air.

The plan approved by OSM calls for taking the mound apart, layer by layer, and spraying the material to extinguish the fire. The material will then be restacked and an earthen dike erected around the pile to prevent erosion or runoff due to rain.

Under provisions of the federal Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act of 1977, a state with an approved abandoned mine program is eligible to apply for federal abandoned mine land funds. The Texas program which has been approved by OSM, is administered by the Commission's Surface Mining and Reclamation Division.

## RR Commissioner Reports June Oil & Gas Discoveries

AUSTIN—Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that Texas operators reported 158 gas and 83 oil discoveries in June 1983.

One year ago, 122 gas and 75 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in June included 52 in deep South Texas, 37 in the Refugio area, 20 in West Central Texas, 18 in Southeast Texas, 16 in East Texas, five in the San Antonio area, four

in East Central Texas, three in North Texas, two in the Panhandle, and one in the San Angelo area.

Oil discoveries included 23 in West Central Texas, 16 in Southeast Texas, 10 in deep south Texas, eight each in North Texas and the San Angelo area, six in East Texas, four in the Refugio area, three each in the Midland and Lubbock areas, and two in the Panhandle.

In June, operators reported 435 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes.

New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,684 in June, as compared to 2,586 during the same month a year ago.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in June amounted to 3,085 against 2,945 a year earlier.

Operators filed 744 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 891 amended requests.

## Departments Fight Pasture Blaze

The Volunteer Fire Departments of Eastland, Ranger and Cisco have been called out to fight a number of fires recently. On Sunday afternoon July 11 a large pasture fire about 7 mi. S.E. of Cisco burned 100-150 acres of rangeland in the area of the Autry, Kerr, Pounds and Honea property.

This was the largest of the blazes, although the Eastland Dept. received a call about a fire near Morton Valley while fighting the big one. Ranger Volunteer Firemen took the Morton Valley call while Cisco and Eastland departments stayed with the first fire. Jack Graham, Eastland Fire Chief, and C.W. Guthrie, Cisco Fire Chief, directed the efforts.

The fire was first spotted in the middle of the Frank Pounds property about 5:00 p.m. The blaze, whipped to the N.W. by a high wind,

spread toward the David Kerr, J.B. Autry and Honea pastures. At one time a "wall of fire" ran out of a valley toward a hill on the Autry ranch, threatening to spread to timber and on to the Sneed ranch.

Eastland furnished one fire truck and Cisco two. About 15 firemen responded, as well as local property owners. The Sneed ranch furnished a bulldozer, while an H.T.C. tank truck brought extra water when the supply ran out. The fire proved difficult to control, but was diverted from the area of the David Kerr residence. It burned around one oil storage tank without igniting

it. The Autry ranch received the most damage to grassland.

The blaze was under control by dark. On Monday morning, however, it reignited in some timber of the Pounds place, and Eastland Firemen worked for two more hours before putting it out.

Late Sunday, after controlling the Morton Valley blaze, Ranger Firemen were called to Lake Leon. Seven fires had been set along a roadway. These were put out speedily.

Property owners in the Autry-Kerr ranch area express appreciation for the

hard work of all the Volunteer Firemen and their Chiefs. It was noted that the Chiefs and other people stayed out on the windward side of the fire a lot of the time.

"This was a dangerous blaze," stated Eastland Chief Graham. "With the high wind, I was afraid it would go all the way to the Sneed place."

Graham urges that all persons use extreme caution with fire.

"As dry as it is, one spark from a roadway or in a pasture can ignite a very damaging blaze. We are in a difficult fire situation right now."

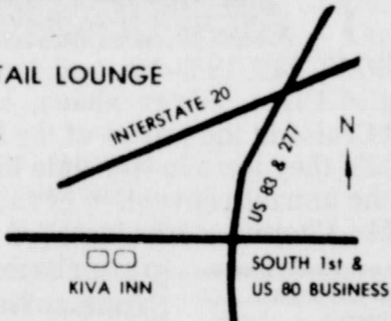

Mrs. Opal Lee Isenhower was the only daughter and the fifth of six children born to W.T. Brown and Mrs. Bertie House Brown, of Albany.

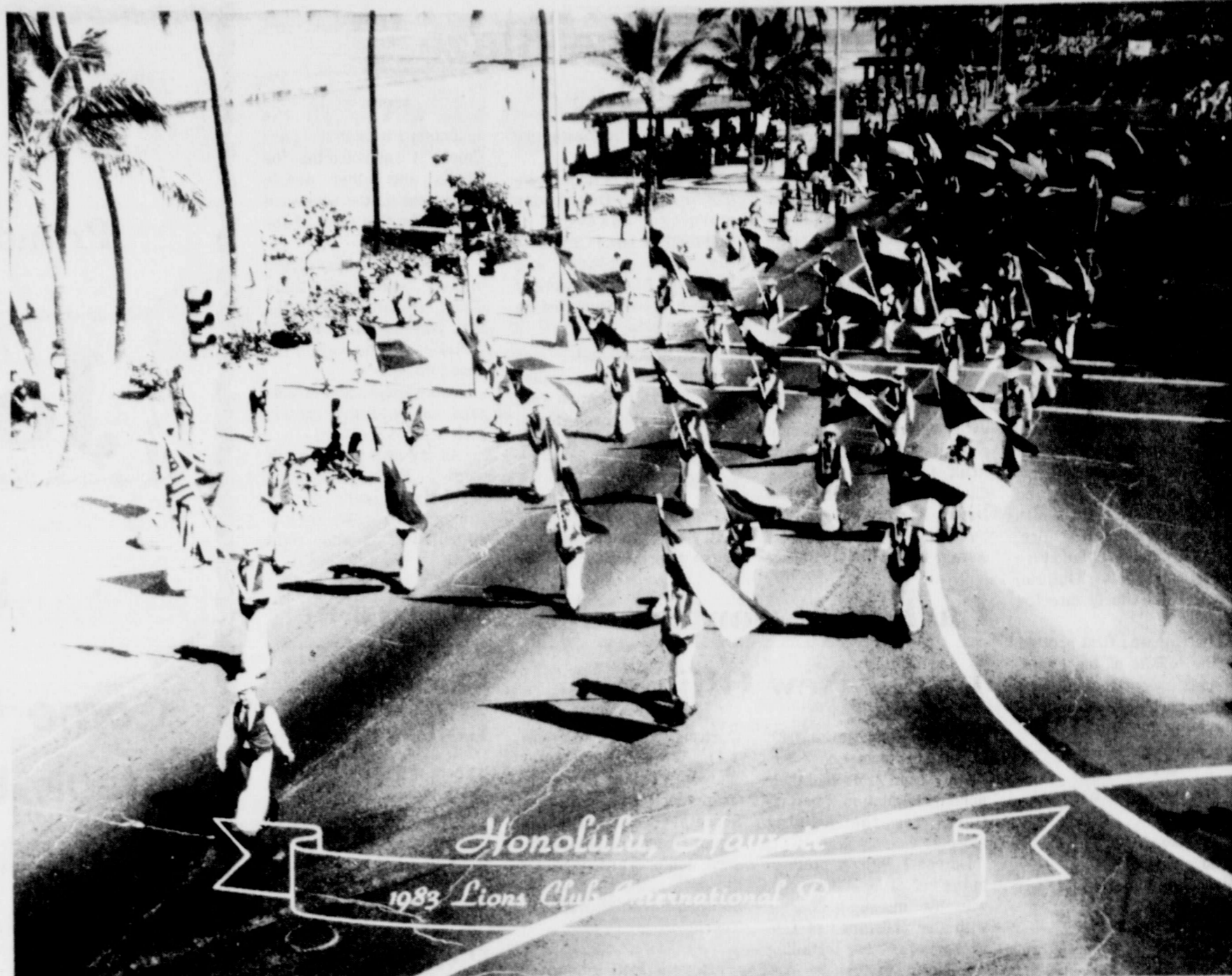
Reared in Albany, Mrs. Isenhower was a graduate of Albany High School and Ranger Junior College. She began a lifetime of service to the Methodist Church when she became a member in childhood at Albany.

On Sept. 4, 1937, in the home of the groom's mother at Putnam, she became the bride of Charles Martin Isenhower, a son of Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Isenhower. Their wedding ceremony was performed by Don Morris, who later was to serve for many years as president of Abilene Christian University. Just prior to Mrs. Isenhower's marriage, she was an employee in the Shackelford County Clerk's office at Albany.

Two daughters were born to the Isenhowers — Wanda Jeanne (Mrs. Michael B. Stone) and a second, who died in infancy.

Following their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Isenhower resided at Aransas Pass and Ingleside, where he was employed with Humble Oil and Refining Company, now known as Exxon, until 1944. She also was helpful to him during the terms he served as Mayor of Clifton.

In his memorial tribute to "Opal," as she was known by her many friends, the Rev. Mr. Morton emphasized that Mrs. Isenhower "kept the faith" with members of her family, her city of residence, and her church.

Mrs. Isenhower was one of the organizers of the Girl Scouts of America in Clifton and later made many trips to Waco during her service on the district board of directors. For many years, she was Bosque County chairman of the American Red Cross and also helped collect monies for other causes.

livestock industry representatives.

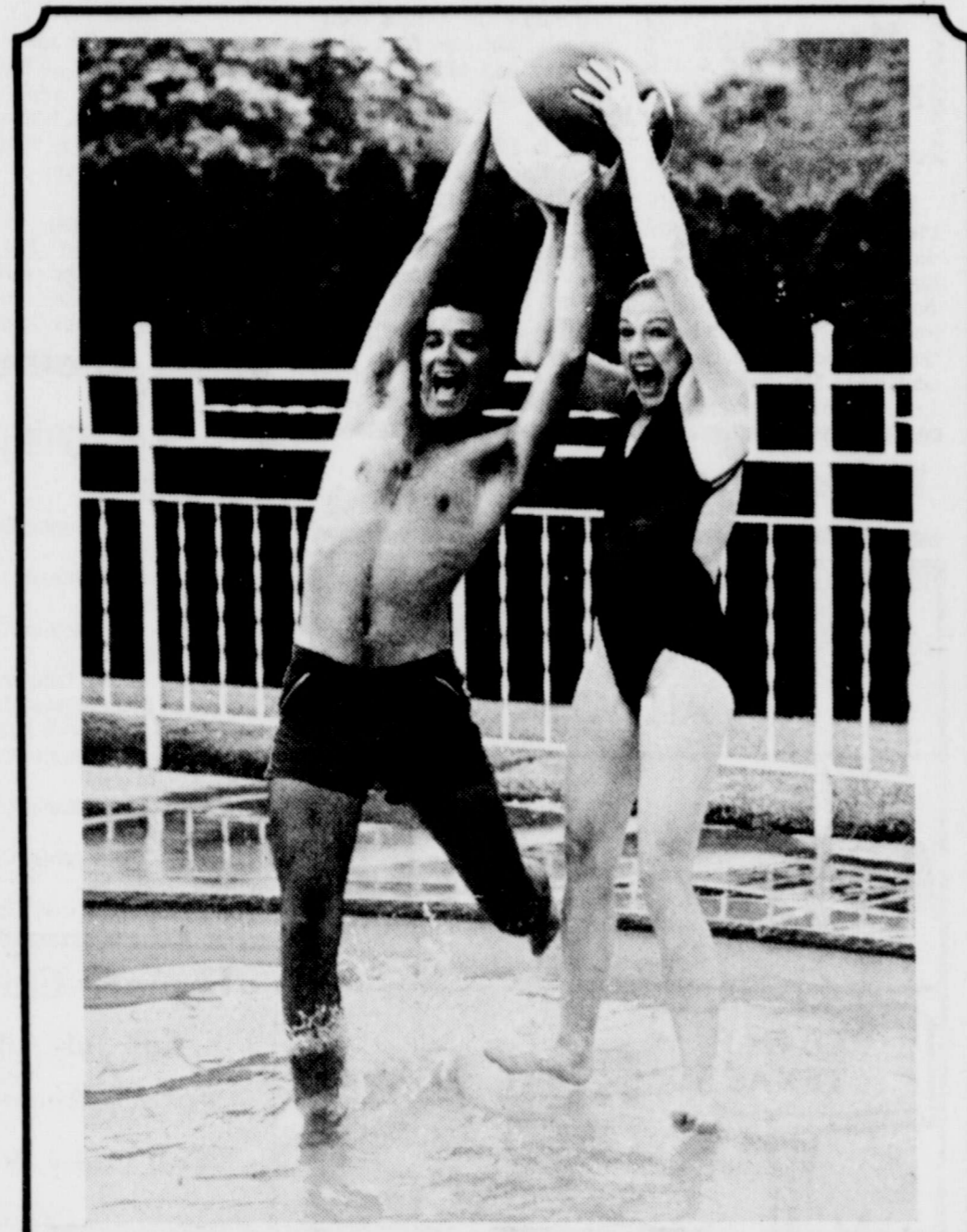

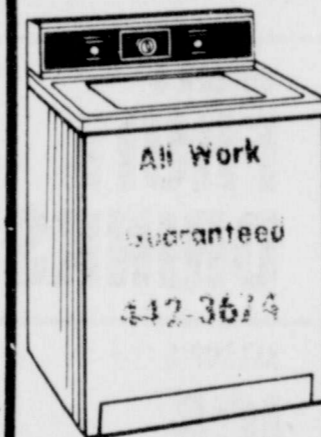

# FOCUS

## Well-Defined Imagery

If the conversation suddenly turns to photography and you discover you don't know the difference between a normal lens and a normal childhood, perhaps you ought to spend a little time on this continued list of important photographic terms.

**Maximum Density.** The darkest area (least exposed) in a color transparency. When maximum density (or "D-max") is low, the transparency will suffer from lack of contrast and unnatural color in the shadow areas.

**Normal Lens.** A lens judged to produce perspective roughly equivalent to that produced by the unaided human eye. On a 35mm camera, that's a lens of around 50mm focal length.

**Normal Childhood.** Something every parent with a camera attempts to convey through family photographs.

**Panchromatic Film.** The most frequently used black-and-white film, sensitive to all readily visible colors in the spectrum.

**Parallax.** The difference in point-of-view between the lens and a separate viewfinder, such as that on a rangefinder camera. Most modern cameras capable of producing parallax have built-in parallax correction to minimize that difference to a degree.

**Perspective.** The apparent "depth" of a photograph — the amount of distance or space which apparently exists between near and far elements. When far elements are large in relation to near ones, the perspective is termed "flat."

**Rangefinder Camera.** A camera with one lens for taking photographs and a separate optical-mechanical device used for viewing and determining distance. The difference between taking and viewing "lenses" results in parallax (above).

**Shutter.** A device used to control the exposure of film. When the shutter is opened, light passing through the

lens and into the camera body strikes the film, creating a latent (or invisible-to-the-eye) image. When the shutter is closed, light is prevented from striking the film.

**Shutter Speed.** The length of time the shutter remains open, usually represented on the camera as numbers representing fractions. For example, 500 represents 1/500 second exposure time; 60 means 1/60 second, etc. Used in conjunction with lens aperture, shutter speed controls the amount of light allowed to strike the film, resulting in exposure.

**SLR.** A single-lens reflex camera which allows taking and viewing through the same lens via means of a hinged mirror and a pentaprism.

**Speed.** When referring to the lens (lens speed), the widest or maximum aperture of a lens. A "fast" lens may have a maximum aperture of f 1.4, while a "slow" lens may have a narrower maximum aperture of only f 2. In referring to film (film speed), the ASA rating of the film, indicating the film's sensitivity to light. In referring to the shutter (shutter speed), see above.

**Stop.** F stop, or lens aperture. Each stop admits 100 percent more light than the next smallest stop. F 8 admits 100 percent more light than f 11, the next smallest stop, etc.

**Stopping Down.** Using a smaller stop.  
**Strobe.** Electronic flash.

**TLR.** A twin-lens reflex camera which requires two lenses — one for taking and a second for viewing — positioned one above the other.

**Wide-Angle Lens.** A lens with a shorter-than-normal focal length, reducing image size and allowing a photographer to get more of a scene into a limited amount of space or at a closer distance to the subject.

**Zoom Lens.** A lens with a variable focal length. It may cover an infinite number of lengths between a given maximum and minimum. An 80-150mm zoom lens, for instance, may be set at any stepless interval between and including 80mm and 150mm, thus making it a versatile and creative tool for the user of cameras accepting interchangeable lenses.

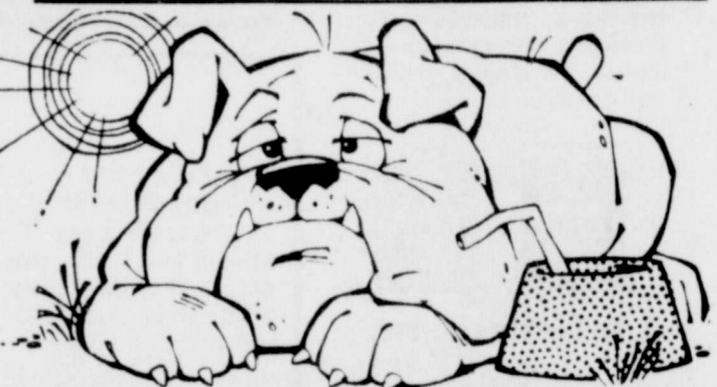
