However, as the hot and dry weather continues through the summer, it will be necessary to continue the odd/even, morning only out-

side watering restrictions. Until further notice, homes with even-numbered addresses are to water on even-numbered days only and odd-numbered addresses on odd-numbered days, DURING THE MORNING HOURS ONLY. While we truly regret the inconvenience and problems involved with the restrictions, we must solicit your continuing sup-

port and cooperation to try to stay ahead on this ever-present problem of low water pressure.

Again, thank you Cisco for your support and community spirit of working together for each other.

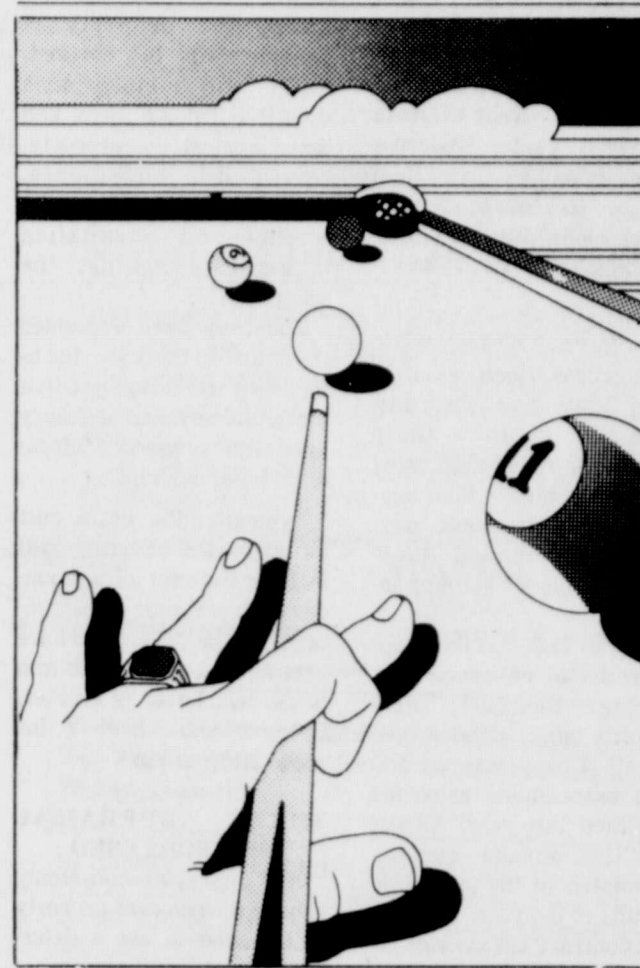

For the past several years, savings and loan associations have had difficulty holding onto their depositors. As interest rates rose much higher than savings and loans could pay, depositors moved their money to higher yielding investments.

Late in 1982, this trend appeared to reverse. Net savings—basically new deposits minus withdrawals—in all Texas savings and loan associations exceeded \$5 billion last year. Almost half this amount was accumulated in the last three months of the year.

In contrast, net savings for 1981 were little over \$1.6 billion and several regions experienced net withdrawals of savings. Two factors helped create this turnaround: short-term interest rates declined rapidly, and savings and loan associations were allowed to offer new, higher yielding accounts. Apparently these accounts were well received by the state's savers.

TITLE INSURANCE COVERAGE CAN GIVE PEACE OF MIND

If you are contemplating the purchase of property, you should have some knowledge of the items covered by a title insurance policy.

As a general rule, only the items which are recorded in the county land records

where the property is situated will be covered. These will include such things as unpaid liens and taxes against the property, recorded easements, outstanding third-party interests and unsatisfied judgments against the seller.

You may want expanded coverage. In this case, the title policy will insure you that the actual physical boundary lines of the property conform to its legal description.

Typically, the extra cost for expanded coverage will include the cost of a boundary survey plus a percentage of the title insurance premium or a minimum price, whichever is greater. Contact your broker for more information.

THREE APPRAISAL METHODS USED

An appraisal—commonly required when real property is financed—is not a deter-

mination of value but an estimate of value. Appraisals may vary in length and style from a short verbal telephone report, to an elaborate, formal written report.

There are three approaches used traditionally by appraisers to estimate the value of a given property: the market data approach, comparing current sales prices of similar properties; the cost approach, based on an estimate of the present cost of reproducing the property, less depreciation; and the income approach, based on evaluating the stream of expected income from the property.

Lenders usually require professional appraising services, but the person seeking the loan generally pays for them. Because an appraisal is a professional opinion, it is not unusual in a real property transaction to involve more than a single appraisal.

Savings & Loans

NEWCOMERS SHOULD REVIEW TEXAS ESTATE LAWS

Property acquired by husband and wife in Texas through their joint efforts during marriage is considered community property. Each spouse owns one-half interest. All property acquired during marriage is treated as community property unless it can be shown to be separate property.

People having separate property, such as property owned before marriage or received by gift or inheritance, can preserve its separate nature by maintaining reliable records. Couples wishing to convert community property to separate property may do so by agreement. By preparing a proper will, a spouse's separate property and his or

her interest is community property can be inherited as intended.

If you are a newcomer to Texas it would be wise to have an attorney review your will. Good planning in other states may be poor estate planning in Texas.

INSPECTION AND REPAIR CAN PROLONG ROOF LIFE

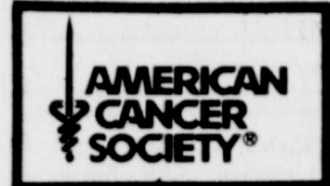
An annual inspection of your asphalt roof shingles—followed by appropriate maintenance—can give your roof years of extra life.

Your first step should be to remove all the debris on the roof, especially from the valleys and gutters. Then, after winter and spring storms and before hot weather, inspect the roof for damaged shingles. If any are found pry them out and

replace them. Inspect the underside of the roof deck to detect leaks. Flashings are the most vulnerable points. And remember, no roof can be better than its installation.

Fasteners should not be exposed, unless installation procedures call for it. Bent and protruding fasteners and those with heads driven through the shingle should be removed and the holes packed with plastic cement.

These simple inspection and repair procedures could more than pay for themselves in lower, long-term maintenance costs.

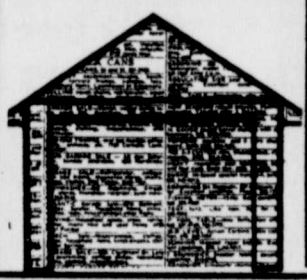

been confirmed by the Texas Senate. He assumed the duties for his six year term on July 16, 1983.

The Texas Department of Health is an agency of State

Government which is entrusted by the legislature and the Governor with implementing health programs as funded by the legislature. The Board of Directors that oversees the implementation of these programs is composed of 18 members with staggered terms of six years each. Six of the members are physicians. Dr. Raines is replacing Charles Max Cole, M.D., of Dallas who is seeking the presidency of the American Medical Association.

The State Department of Health has a budget of ap-

proximately 200 million dollars per year and includes in their program such areas as: infectious and communicable diseases, veterinary medicine, inspection of long term care, state health planning and resources, vital statistics (births and deaths), licensing and certification, consumer health protection, radiation control, solid waste management, immunization, maternal and child health programs, as well as many other programs.

Dr. Raines is a member of

the Board of Directors of Johnson County Memorial Hospital, serves as medical examiner of Johnson County and is on the Board of Directors of TEXPAC. He is also a

Texas Medical Association Delegate, on the Texas Medical Association Council on Legislation Consultants and serves as chairman of the Pastoral Parish Relations Committee of the First United Methodist Church.

Dr. Raines represented Eastland County four years as State Democratic Executive Committee.

County Included In Future Highway Projects

EASTLAND—Construction projects to preserve and enhance the mobility of Eastland County motorists are included in future highway planning, Supervising Resident Engineer R.P. Haun said here today.

In an effort to look ahead and provide for an adequate transportation system in the face of projected growth, as well as to preserve existing roadways, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has recently undertaken a "long, hard look at future construction and reconstruction needs," Haun said.

Noting that provisions have been made for small as well as large projects, based on verified needs, Haun listed a number of construction and reconstruction projects to be considered for this area during the next several years. Among them are:

- Widening of US 183 in Cisco to four lanes, with curb and gutter, from IH 20 to 12th Street.
- Reconstruction of SH 16 from a point five miles north of Comanche county line to four miles south of IH 20, strengthening the base and widening the bridges and several small structures.
- Replacing the bridge and approaches on FM 101 at the West Fork of Colony Creek.
- Improving FM 2461 and FM 1864 with additional base and surface materials to correct damage caused by oil field traffic.
- Widening and reconstruction of FM 570 from IH 20, east to FM 2214.
- Strengthening FM 8 from SH 6 in Gorman to the Erath county line.

"There is no doubt that an expanded transportation system will be required to cope with economic and population growth," Haun said. "By taking a functional approach and applying modern management and engineering techniques, I am confident that, given adequate funding and personnel resources, the department can provide the required construction and reconstruction of our highway system to ensure that Eastland County motorists will enjoy adequate mobility in the years ahead."

Palo Pinto Field Gains New Gasser

The Palo Pinto Regular Field gained a new gasser when Amatex Exploration Inc. of Graham finished its No. 1 Judith Shepard seven miles west of Mineral Wells. It flowed 250,000 CF gas

per day on a .626-in. choke and was rated at 310,000 CFD on absolute open flow. The operation is in a 244-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. Amatex bottomed the hole at 4,346 feet and per-

forated for production 2,289 to 2,298 feet into the wellbore.

Palo Pinto County's Brazos (Strawn) Field gained a new producer when the

No. 1 Chesnut was finished by LHL Oil and Gas of Fort Worth four miles northwest of the Brazos community. It flowed natural gas at the rate of 184,000 CF gas daily on a quarter-inch choke. The

absolute open flow came in at 300,000 CFD. The wellbottomed at 1,254 feet and will produce from Strawn Formation perforations 1,060 to 1,087 feet.

The same operator has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 Chesnut in the same 168-acre lease, T&PRR Survey. It is scheduled for maximum depth of 1,200 feet and is aimed at either oil or gas pay.

At a location a quarter-of-a-mile north of Albany, Jones Co. of Albany has finished a new oil producer in Shackelford County's South Albany Atoka Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Sedwick "20", pumping oil at the rate of 20 barrels of oil per day on open choke.

Location is in a 186-acre lease in the T&PRR Co. Survey. Bottomed at 4,608 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,370 to 4,71 feet into the hole.

R.H. Chambers of Brownwood has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Shackelford Regular Field. The No. 1 R.H. Chambers "B" showed potential to pump 16 barrels of oil per day on open choke.

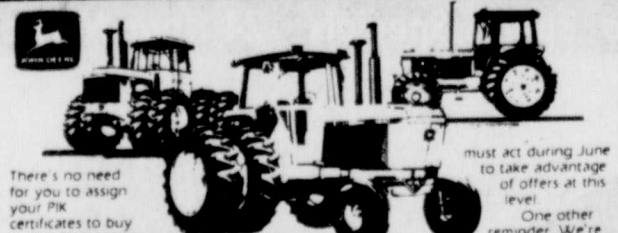

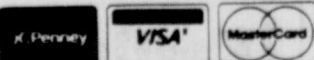

Reflections In Perspective

When was the last time you saw a pearl button on a man's shirt. No; wait a minute. Not a synthetic, pearlite-flavored imitation which came from the drippings out of a drum in an ethylene plant. I mean a genuine pearl button, made from...actually, cut from

the mother-of-pearl which is the inside of a sea shell. I thought so. Must have been back the time country baseball games were played under the watchful eye, and the stentorian voice of a single umpire who stood just back of the pitcher. In any case, it was awhile back.

Some of you older folk may find one in a button box in the lower lefthand drawer of the sewing machine. As for you youngsters. Forget it. Of course, what with the high price of crude oil, from which the synthetic buttons are finally made; it may be that the genuine pearl buttons may come back onto the market. Only maybe. Most

likely the machines with which they were made have long since been melted down and reincarnated in the field of making shoestrings. Or something. The interesting little island off the southern shore of Iran is just that; an interesting little Island. Known for centuries as the Island of Sheikh Schwaib,

several of the Trucial States on the Arab side of the Persian Gulf laid loose claim to the island. Shaikh Raschid bin Makhtoum al Qassemi, the Ruler of Dubai said to me once that... "Oh, yes. I am quite familiar with the Island of Sheikh Schwaib. I allow the Shahanshah to claim it, since it is nearer to his mainland. But the people

of the island are my people" He smiled wryly as he made that remark. There could have been a modicum of truth in his observation, though. The Shahanshah of Iran never showed much interest in the ownership of the island until foreign oil companies began bidding for the concession to explore for oil in the waters

off the island. The government of Iran immediately changed the name of the island to "Lavan", for what good reason it was never disclosed. Navigation charts have for well over a hundred years identified it as "Sheikh Schwaib". But, never mind. It is now, and perhaps from now on is and will be known as Lavan Island.

Back in the mid-sixties, the principal concession-holdre drilled a wildcat well on the island. In the course of the drilling of that well, a very good landing strip was constructed simply by scraping a runway into the caliche subsoil of the island. It was on that strip that I first landed on the island. At that time the only foreign inhabitants on the island consisted of a team of observers who kept weather data and relayed it via shortwave radio to their principal office in Kuwait, almost a thousand miles away and on the other side of the Gulf. We gave notice of our intent to land by buzzing their radio shack. We were promptly picked up by the only automotive vehicle on the island...the weathermen's Land Rover.

Lying twelve miles off the coast of Iran, and with a dimension of some mile and half by thirteen miles, it runs somewhat northwesterly-to-southeasterly, roughly parallel to the mountainous coast of Iran which is twelve miles awal. Geographically, Iran has every right to claim sovereignty.

The site of an ancient Portuguese fort which dates back to the fifteenth century when that nation was a colonial power and exercised control over the shipping lanes in the Persian Gulf; the island has three distinct "villages". The principal village is situated on the northerly side of the island near the southeastern end. Another village, known locally as "The Black Village" is just that. It is populated by people reputedly descendants of African slaves and servants who served in the fort during the heyday of Portuguese rule. That village is located on the seaward side of the island about three miles from the main village. The third village lies at the extreme northwestern end of the island, and is the smallest of the three.

The principal village boasts two "headmen". They seem to get along quite well, but how they divide their authority is quite a mystery. "Hajji Yussuf" and "Hajji Ibrahim" share the title, together with its rights and emoluments. As you know, the title "Hajji" indicates that both of those worthy gentlemen have made "the Haj", or the pilgrimage to Mecca. And it would appear that the principal income of both of the headmen came from their dealing in pearls.

For many generations, the principal income of the island came from the sale of pearls. In recent years, smuggling of goods from the Arab side to the mainland has supplanted this ancient source, but pearl diving is still thriving to a degree. I couldn't imagine why they were saving all those shells...with the smell, and the flies. Hajji Ibrahim explained it quite simply. Seems that every year or so a vessel put in and bought the shells. And Hajji Ibrahim explained... "For the button your shirt".

Sheikh Raschid's claim to the island was somewhat verified when I met the young "Literary Corpsman" who was sent by the Shahanshah to set up a school on the island. A very nice, clean-cut young man, he had arrived with his footlocker filled with primary school materials; pencils, paper, books...what he would need to teach the children (and their elders) to read and write.

When I met him, shortly after his arrival, he very politely observed that he was faced with a minor problem. No one on the island spoke the language of the Persians. And he was just beginning to learn, from the natives, to speak Arabic. Dried fish provided another source of income for the islanders, but that is another story.

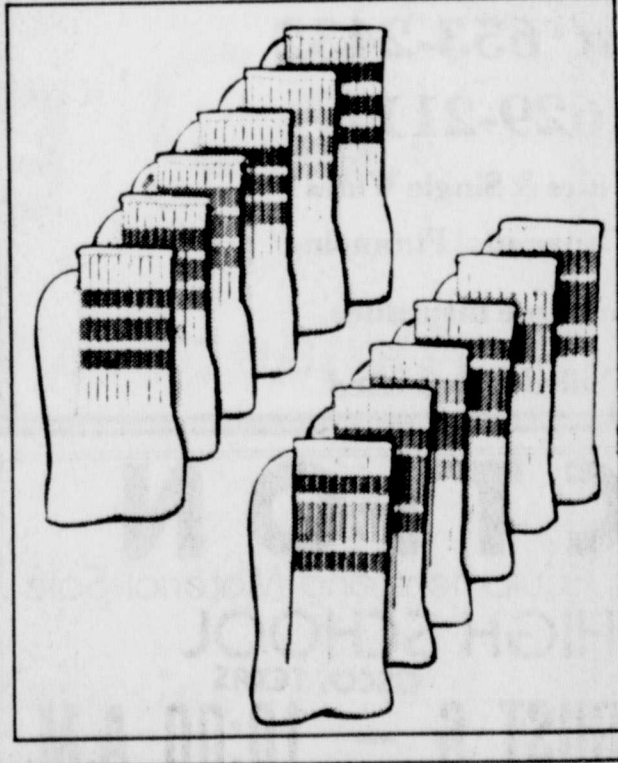

Diverse Population Of Beef Cattle In America

SAN ANGELO--Among many other things, America is blessed with the most diverse population of beef cattle found anywhere in the world. Name it and we have it, or we can try to breed it.

Fortunately, among these breeding stocks are some of the most productive cattle ever to graze the earth. Yet, some of the poorer cattle are found on our ranges as well.

A major problem facing the beef cattle industry is to sort out the most useful cattle and place them into effectively designed genetic programs, says Dr. Marvin Koger, professional of animal science at the University of Florida and one of the industry's most respected animal geneticists. Among major problem to be addressed by cattlemen, Koger points out, is how to best utilize the major breed groups in genetic

problems in order to maximize efficiency of beef production in sustained commercial programs.

Koger will discuss several genetic options designed to counter those basic industry problems during beef cattle sessions at the International Ranchers Roundup (IRR) August 1-5 in the San Angelo Convention Center. He will also present his ideas of the best breed combinations in producing crossbred dams as developed by observations and research. Registration information is available from the San Angelo Convention Bureau (915/653-1206).

Koger says a three-breed terminal cross calf from an F-1 dam is theoretically the ultimate in crossbreeding since the 3-breed calf is heterozygous at all loci and has an F-1 dam. This maximizes heterosis in both cow

and calf. Koger points out that from a practical point of view F-1 replacement heifers are expensive and generally difficult to acquire. Further, the F-1 females frequently are generated in an environment different from where they are to be used, generating cost in movement and getting them adjusted to the area where they are to be utilized as dams, he knows of only one commercial operation that has successfully maintained a three-breed terminal cross over of substantial period of time.

Koger also like a two-breed-of sire rotation, starting with available females assigned to the breed of sire where they best fit. Thereafter, daughters of breed Z sires are mated to A bulls and daughters of A sires are mated to Z bulls.

He says the only inconvenience associated with simple two breed-of-sire rotational crossbreeding is that cows must be sorted into two breeding herds during the breeding season in order to pair cows with the appropriate breed sires.

Most philosophical discussion would include three breed-of-sire rotations. Yet, in his opinion, a three breed-of-sire rotation generally will result in no more hybrid vigor than the right two-breed rotation and is more difficult to manage.

A final alternative, a return to upgrading, utilizes available females mated generation after generation to sires of the preferred breed. Although now not a popular system, Koger believes it still has merit for all situations.

The Ranchers Roundup speaker says achievement of

real genetic improvement in straightbred cattle is a slow painstaking process. Making the best use of the genetic resources already at our disposal, however, is another matter. Through simple sustained crossbreeding programs, production efficiency can be increased by plus or minus 25 percent. He notes this can be achieved just as rapidly as crossbred cows of the right breed combinations are brought into production.

Koger says a companion management practice to systematic crossbreeding should be to eliminate all open cows at weaning time and replace them with a heifer. He emphasizes that this practice will do more than all other strategies combined to improve production efficiency in a commercial cow herd.

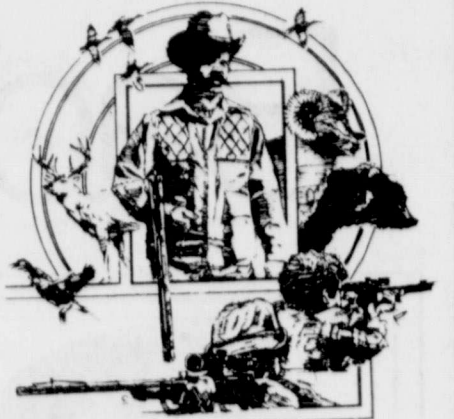

Zinnia

Though coming in last in the alphabetical list of annuals the Zinnia is first in preference of many gardeners.

The Zinnia is a native to Mexico. The Zinnia that we know today have come a long way in development and improvement from its ancestry of a Mexican wild flower.

The Zinnia is very showy when planted in masses and blooms all summer and into fall. There are shades of red, salmon, yellow, lavender, cream white and there is one flower arrangers find intriguing - "Envy" - a chartreuse green. All Zinnias need full except the green one which need semi-shade.

The giant double dahlia flower types along with giant cactus with twisted petals are the most popular cultivars. Some of these cultivars will have seven to eight (7-8") inch blooms on strong wiry stems with narrow leaves. The California Giant Zinnia falls into these two cultivars mentioned above. Thanks to the hybridizer we now have multicolors and striped varieties. There are small cultivars and singles. There is a small pom-pom cultivars, these sometimes are referred to the tumpnellia variety. Mass plantings, along walks and edges of beds as well as around pools, give mounds of color throughout summer and fall. This is one of the few annuals that you have so many choices of color and sizes to select from. You cannot find an annual more suited for this Southwestern area with so many choices of color.

The Zinnia is planted normally from seed, even though they are available as started bedding plant. All the seed catalogues usually

offer a good selection of Zinnia seed. This gives you all winter to enjoy picking the sizes and colors you want next summer in your garden.

Some of the more vital statistics for Zinnias are the height at maturity of eight to thirty-six inches. Plant the seed eight to fifteen inches apart depending on the final size of the plant. The seed may be started indoors while there is still danger of a frost. They may be started or transplanted outside when the night temperature does not go below fifty degrees. The period of germination for Zinnia seed is five days. Zinnias like hot weather and

simply just stand still in cool weather.

The Zinnia likes full sun, with the one exception mentioned above. Zinnias are not as particular in the soil requirements as other annuals. They will bloom in good garden soil, but you can tell a remarkable difference when a little time is spent to improve the soil condition before planting. Work in some superphosphate and add a good compost to your bed before planting will be rewarding when the blooms are produced in the summer. You will have some larger bloom specimens and a much richer and deeper color. A feeding of a well-

balanced fertilizer will also be beneficial to your Zinnia.

There are many Zinnias in bloom now in this area. If you do not have any Zinnias, pick out the colors and cultivars that you like and plan on planting them. There is still time this year.

EAST OUT of Yellowstone National Park takes you immediately into "Cody County" - and specifically to the Buffalo Bill Historical Center, destination of a long-held dream-to-visit. Out of the Park Eastgate you drive through the spectacular Wapiti Valley, Shoshone Canyon, Rattlesnake Mountain with winding river and rapids all the way and into

Cody, Wyo., where you find the Center (really four museums in one) is the centerpiece for the old Western town.

It all began in 1917 after Cody's death when the Memorial Association was established. "The Scout", bronze equestrian statue by Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney was unveiled and presented in 1924; it stands today at the west end of the

main downtown street. In 1935, the sculptor donated a 40-acre site for the center and in 1959, the Whitney Gallery of Western Art was dedicated. In 1969, the Buffalo Bill Museum complex was completed and the Plains Indian Collection added. In 1976, the Winchester collection arrived and was installed for display.

The Buffalo Bill museum brings the almost-legendary hero to life with a massive collection of personal and historic memorabilia of Cody, Pony Express, soldier, buffalo hunter, Scout and Wild West showman. Some have labeled Cody the "P.T. Barnum" of the West, and certainly he was a showman who didn't do anything to hinder his own fame, but in so doing, did a lot for the preservation of the American West and that heritage.

The Whitney Gallery of Western Art houses perhaps the world's most inclusive collection of western art. Works by the foremost artists of the period, Bodmer, Miller, Bierstadt, Moran, Remington, Schreyvogel, Russell, Koener, Oliver, Johnson and others. There's an entire wing dedicated to the works of Russell and Remington; paintings, sketches, sculptures and even a re-creation of Remington's studio.

The Plains Indian Museum is a showplace, a school, a continuing research project, a postitory, a shelter for sacred artifacts and a hub of education in old and new Indian workmanship and culture.

The Winchester Museum, begun in 1860, was brought west from New Haven, Conn., and includes samples of 16th century French guns of primitive design to the most ornate of engraved modern firearms. From the

Cody County

smallest guns ever made to the Kentucky rifles of the Civil War, single shot muzzle loading blunderbusses to galling guns, they're all on display.

The Center conducts an old-movie series to help preserve the western lore and though we didn't get to see an old Johnny Mack Brown or Tim McCoy, we did get a howl out of an hour-long, 1944 black and white Roy Rogers, Dale Evans western "musical" - "The Yellow Rose of Texas," with the original Sons of the Pioneers.

"Old Trail Town" is another Cody Must-See, put together by a single family it houses cabins, wagons, and tons of early-west memorabilia not to mention graves of local and national folk heroes (Jeremiah Johnson?).

Out of Cody south, you hit Thermopolis, a "health resort" touting the therapeutic benefits of soaking in the hot mineral water found in Hot Springs State Park - among many other tourist-oriented attractions, including what appears to be the biggest of the year, the annual demolition derby.

Leaving Thermopolis you hit the Wind River Canyon along U.S. 20 toward Shoshone - it's a panorama of over a billion years of geology formations. The Wind River flows northward (?) out of the Wind River Basin and is impounded by an earth-filled dam to create Boysen Reservoir about 13 miles south of Thermopolis and south of the Canyon. The Canyon of the Wind River is about ten miles long, and it is in this area where they've marked "the wedding of the waters" - the Wind River changes name and becomes the Big Horn River. A geology major would have a treat here, observing all the

exposed strata.

One town was advertising the coming of the 5-ring Carson and Barnes Circus. Didn't they play Eastland once? There's a Gift of the Waters pageant, typical of the hundreds of events geared to attract and shalack tourists. Legends and lore are refined, tailored and mixed with local color to make all these areas attractive to "stay one more day". We could learn a lot from them.

Optional phone purchase again being emphasized

You may have noticed recently the national advertising reminding customers that they now have the option of buying certain telephones which are currently being leased on a monthly basis.

As you'll recall, this optional sales plan became effective in Texas in March. Should you buy your telephone? The decision is yours. One of the biggest advantages of buying your phone is that you'll eliminate the monthly leasing charge. On the other hand, one of the biggest advantages to leasing is that we'll continue to repair your set for no additional charge.

Telephones which may be purchased include the Standard, Princess and Truline models — both desk and wall units with either rotary or Touch-Tone dialing — plus certain "functional" sets such as the Action Phone*, TeleHelper** Answer and Record Unit, TeleHelper Speakerphone, Touch-a-matic S, Touch-a-matic 16 and Touch-a-matic 12 dialer.

In addition to the above listed telephones which are presently in service, the company also has the same type of sets for sale from its inventory. The price of in-inventory phones is higher, though, since those sets are either brand new or completely reconditioned.

All single-line customers in Texas — both residence and business — are eligible to participate in this plan. Because of FCC regulations, party-line customers are not eligible at this time to buy their leased telephones.

Speaking of party-line customers, we received a call the other day from a party-line customer with a question. "Have you folks forgotten about your party-line customers?" he asked.

This customer was concerned — understandably so — about what will happen in the future to party-line phones. We haven't said much about the future of this service in talking about changes coming in our business. We don't have all the answers yet, but this we do know: Party-line customers will not lose their service. We certainly have not forgotten about these customers.

It may be that customers on party-lines will be able to purchase their phones, if they wish. This can't be done now because of the wiring. Or it may be that these customers still will lease their phones.

The point is, though, that party-line customers need not worry about having phone service. One thing you can be certain about. Telephone service will still be available to you.

Incidentally, you may have heard you will be forced to buy your phones after January 1, 1984. That's not true. You may continue to lease your phones, whether they're owned by Southwestern Bell or AT&T.
