**Triple-Amputee
Vietnam Vet
Elected To
Lead DAV**

"Just let me die!" whispered the young soldier to his platoon sergeant seconds after a Viet Cong "booby trap" land mine mangled his body.

Unwilling to listen to such talk, the sergeant ordered Dennis A. Joyner to stop wishing for death, telling him he had much to live for. "Right then," the Vietnam combat vet says today, "my whole attitude turned around. I wanted to be a winner - to overcome any obstacle life put in my way."

After losing both legs and an arm, the Apollo, Pa., man found life's obstacles steep, but he came out a winner. Today, his fellow members of the tree-quarter-million-member Disabled American Veterans (DAV) chose him to lead their organization through the coming year. The election took place at the DAV's national convention in Los Angeles.

Joyner fears his year at the DAV's helm will be one of the most difficult years in the history of veterans' affairs. "A full decade has passed since the signing of the Paris Peace Accords ended the Vietnam War," he commented. "And so many have forgotten that veterans' benefits are part of the cost of war, that our country has a moral obligation to those who spilled their blood or lost their health while defending us."

"Combine that forgetfulness with the demand for reduced government spending," he continued, "and you've got a real problem for veterans, particularly disabled vets."

In response, Joyner said, he'll work to increase membership in the DAV, a nonprofit association to which more than a third of all service-connected disabled veterans already belong. He's shooting for a million DAV members by 1985. And, Joyner stated, "The DAV needs to further increase its effectiveness in our nation's capital."

Joyner has served the DAV well at the national, state, and local levels. He was elected to several DAV national vice command offices prior to attaining the office of national commander. At the state level, he served as the DAV Department of Pennsylvania second and third junior vice commanders, and he was commander and chapter service officer of DAV Chapter 36 in his hometown of Vandergrift, Pa. In 1977, the triple amputee was selected as the DAV's national Outstanding Disabled Veteran of the Year.

Joyner, the fourth Vietnam veteran to hold a one-year term as DAV national commander, was wounded in June 1969 while patrolling the Mekong Delta in Vietnam as a member of the U.S. Army's 9th Infantry Division. His acts of bravery and devotion to duty earned him many citations, including the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart, Army Commendation Medal, Vietnam Service Badge, and Combat Infantry Badge.

Joyner lives in Apollo, Pa., with his wife, Donna. He is the father of two young sons, Dennis, Jr., and Paul.

Hunting - Fishing Licenses Expire

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials have announced that 1983-84 hunting and fishing licenses should be available at department offices and at most retail outlets across the state.

All Texas hunting and fishing licenses expire on Aug. 31 each year.

Resident hunting and resident fishing licenses are priced at \$8 each, and the resident combination hunting-fishing license is \$12.

Officials said the new hunting and fishing regulations guides also will be available at that time, including a map of the state's new three-zone alignment for dove hunting.

Texas dove hunters who may be unsure about the new three-zone hunting alignment in the state are urged by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to obtain a map showing the dove hunting zones when they purchase their 1983-84 hunting licenses.

The licenses, zone maps and hunting regulation guides are now available at department offices and most hunting license outlets across the state.

The Central Zone, south of I-20, will be Sept. 1-Oct. 30 and Jan. 7-16. Bah limit will be 12 per day, not to include more than two whitewings. Shooting hours will be 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset. The Panhandle Zone, north of I-20, season is Sept. 1-Nov. 9. With the same daily limit and shooting hours as the Central Zone.

Officials remind hunters the law requires that anyone hunting white-winged doves in any zone must have a \$6 white-winged dove stamp.

September is the month when thousands of hunters take to the field after doves. It also is the most dangerous month for hunting accidents.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department hunter education officials said last September's 23 reported ac-

cidents was the largest total of 1982.

"Dove hunters need to be especially careful about their zones of fire," said J.D. Peer, assistant hunter education coordinator. "Many accidents occur when hunters swing on birds flying over or near other hunters. That's why you should always keep the location and movements of other hunters in mind when firing."

Officials hope the 1983-84 hunting seasons will be safer than 1982, when 97 accidents were the second highest total since record-keeping began in 1966.

Comanche County Co-Op Requests First Rate Increase In 45 Years

The Comanche County Co-op, which furnishes electric power for much of rural Eastland County, has filed for its first rate increase since its beginning, 45 years ago.

After review of the rate study and projected future trends, the Board of Directors (elected by the membership) authorized the filing with the Public Utility Commission in Austin.

It was set for approximately \$826,038 or a 9.5 percent increase in the gross revenues based on the test year of 1982.

Although the rate increase was filed in July, it will be a

about five months, depending on Commission and REA approval, before any change in rates will be effective.

During a recent report to the membership, Manager Bill Parker of Comanche discussed the possible increase.

"The request has been studied and carefully considered by your Cooperative's management and Board of Directors," said Parker. "I assure you that the request is reasonable and in the best interests of the Electric Co-op."

The Comanche County Co-op was cited as being one of the last groups in the state to file for a rate increase.

For instance, Yesterday, I wrote out a sales ticket for a pizza to be used as a prize for some young person' accomplishment of a physical objective for a charitable cause.

Two days ago the request was for munchies for refreshment in the course of a similar activity.

Several days before that, it was a request (sales pitch) to help put out a pamphlet about drug abuse with the information slanted toward the scene.

Three special news publications wanted to be sure The Pizza House had an ad to honor the area's football teams, and one person called in the middle of lunch hour about a map.

I am not positive the map had anything to do with the younger generation. Unless younger generations have changed, the last thing they need is a map of their own stompin' grounds.

So, What's to fret about? Not the pizza nor the potato chips. The monetary

cost to The Pizza House, and to the other businesses have been nagging me until I have reached the view-with-alarm stage.

Why do these youngsters have to have a concrete reward for reaching an objective that should be fulfilling in the attainment?

Maybe I give the younger generation more credit than it deserves, but I don't think they have to be paid for being decent. I believe they have imagination enough, empathy enough—that they are humane enough to be able to feel that contributing to an effort to eradicate a crippling disease or to provide medical care for an accident victim is sufficient "pay."

Don't tell me they are doing this on their own time, without pay! I'll give you about one tenth of one percent who are on their own—and no, I do not consider myself a cynic.

I would not mind being approached to sponsor a youngster to doomafitche if this is better than donating a specific amount of money. 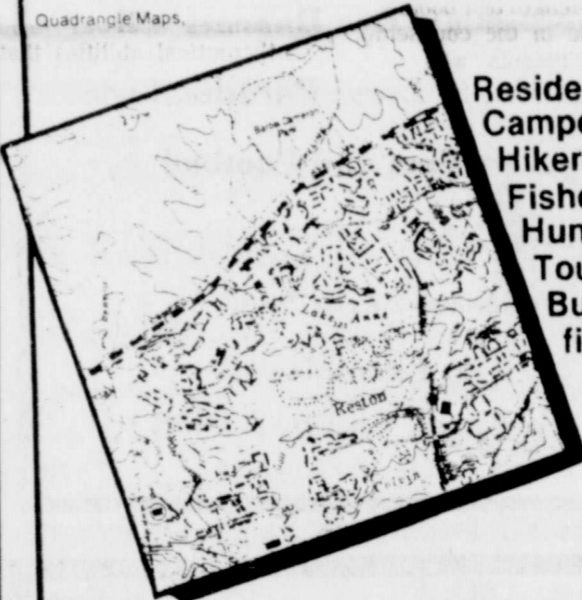

Rule Deregulate Transportation

The Railroad Commission has adopted on an emergency basis a new rule that will deregulate the transportation of certain agricultural commodities in Texas.

The rule exempts from RRC-approved rates the transportation of certain agricultural commodities for farmers, ranchers or cooperative organizations between points of production, processing or storage or to any point of first manufacture.

However, agricultural commodity carriers will still be required to have a Commission permit and comply with the Commission's safety, vehicle registration, and insurance requirements. Such a permit will be valid for one year throughout the state.

The new rule also requires that an agricultural carrier keep record for each shipment showing the origin and destination, identity of the shipper and receiver, and shipment weights.

Each agricultural shipment must also be accompanied by a consignor bill of lading and a agricultural permit holder's waybill. The bill of lading must contain a

certificate signed by the consignor (shipper). The waybill must contain a certificate signed by the agricultural permit holder. These documents must be presented to RRC officials of officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety on request.

To apply for an agricultural permit, a carrier must meet the Commission's cargo, liability, and workmen's compensation insurance requirements, file a report detailing the equipment the carrier plans to use, and file a \$25 filing fee. For more than five vehicles, a carrier must file an additional \$5 per vehicle.

Before the adoption of the new rule, a carrier could get a seasonal agricultural permit from the Commission that would exempt certain commodities from Commission-approved rates. A seasonal permit was valid for 120 days and a 75-mile radius.
