# County Fair Will Begin Wednesday

This week is County Fair week for Eastland County. The fair starts on Wednesday with a work day for those helping with the fair in the afternoon, but with the first event for spectators starting at 5:30 in the evening. It will continue through Saturday night.

At 5:30 on Wednesday the first event will be an exhibition by the Eastland County 4-H Horse Club. It will include precision, drill team, and western pleasure riding as well as barrel and pole races much as would be seen in a rodeo, but there won't be any times kept or awards given.

The Horse Club is meeting at 6 p.m. each Tuesday at the Sheriff's Posse Arena and it is a chance for people, especially young people, to learn to ride.

The second event and the last one scheduled for Wednesday is a magic show at 7 p.m. It will feature and outstanding magician.

On Thursday morning from 8 until 12 the Home Craft, Agriculture, Art, Photography, Living Plants, and Ceramics exhibit booths are to be set up.

From noon until 6 p.m. the items to be displayed in these booths, with the exception of baked goods, are to be brought in.

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# The Garden Editor

For many years your Garden Editor as well as serious gardeners have waited for a fertilizer. As far back as 1786, Achard conducted and published research on humans. Sprengel showed it could be extracted from soil in 1826 but little or nothing of significance along this line was added during the next 100 years.

The gardening world has known for years that humic acid would act as a catalyst and enable the plants to take up all the nutrients with in the soil or with in the fertilizer as it is being applied. This enables the plant to be healthier with larger blooms or fruit. Many inexperienced nursery personnel have referred to humic acid as a root stimulator. As you will learn from this article humic acid is NOT a root

stimulator.

The fertilizer industry has long emphasized the importance of maintaining the humic content of soils to ensure good productivity. Extension and research agronomists have engaged in the study of the humic substances for many years, and many scientific data are regarding them are common knowledge to most agricultural workers. Humus is the Latin word for soil. Humus and related chemicals' derivatives are mainly responsible for the brown and black color of the fertile soils. Humic materials are the partly decayed and otherwise transformed organic matter built up or accumulated in soils through natural biochemical processes over the ages, and which convert mineral dusts into soils.

Humic matter is continuously being formed into soils, and at the same time, it is continuously being destroyed.

Humus is the organic matter of soils that has decayed sufficiently to have lost its identity with regards to its origin. The most important biochemically active group of the many degradation pro-

ducts of soil organic materials is the alkali-soluble fraction commonly called the humic acids. The salts of the humic acids are known as the humates. Humates supply the growing plants with food, but they serve in much more important ways to make soils more productive and farming more profitable. They in-

crease the water capacity of soils, and thus, soils contain-

ing relatively large amounts of humate material resist

droughts more effectively and produce better yields

where rainfall or irrigation may be insufficient.

## Back Pain Complaints Rival Common Cold

Back pain now rivals the common cold as a major health complaint of Americans.

According to the American Medical Association and insurance company data,

some 22 million Americans experience back discomfort during the course of a year; over 16 million will be hospitalized.

Only about 20 percent of back problems are caused

by actual disease of the bones and joints of the back. "The vast majority of back problems are simply due to poor daily lifestyle habits," says health educator Dr. Mary Ann Shirer.

A major cause of back pain is improper body mechanics of poor posture when standing, sitting, bending and lifting, and lying down, says Shirer, a specialist with Texas A&M University's Agricultural Extension Service.

Improving posture and body alignment in all daily activities—whether sitting at a desk, doing housework, or driving a tractor—will relieve strain, protect the back from injury and slow down "back wear" from the aging process, notes the specialist.

Poor muscle tone, weak muscles and a lack of flexibility also cause back pain. Faithfully following an exercise program to strengthen abdominal and back muscles and to increase body flexibility can alleviate existing back problems and reduce the risk of

developing back problems.

But an exercise program takes a daily commitment to be effective, says Shirer, and should not be started while you have severe back pain. It's also a good idea to get your doctor's approval, especially if you have back problems, other medical conditions, or are over 35 years of age, cautions the specialist.

Being overweight or obese is another contributing factor to back pain. Excess weight shifts the body's center of gravity and puts an added strain on the back, especially if the excess weight is carried around the abdomen, she explains.

"Even mental stress and anxiety can play a role by causing the back muscles to become tense and aggravate back pain," says Shirer.

For the person who has weak muscles, poor posture, is overweight and has poor stress management skills, even the slightest mechanical stress can cause a back injury of strain, whether the person does heavy lifting or not.

## Deer Permits To Be Announced In October

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials remind hunters and landowners that dates and locations for issuance of antlerless deer hunting permits will not be announced until October.

Department field personnel currently are collecting deer census data to be used in determining permit issuance rates in individual counties and portions thereof.

Landowners may obtain their permits, normally issued at the county courthouse or other public facility, in late October or early November.

In most counties offering an archery-only deer season Oct. 1-3, bowhunters may take antlerless deer without a permit unless the county is designated as "bucks only" for the archery season.

As a result of passage of

the Wildlife Conservation Act by the Texas Legislature in its last session, the Parks and Wildlife Department now has authority over wildlife resources in all counties. Some counties may offer antlerless deer harvest where it was not allowed in the past, but permits may not be issued in some counties where deer populations are low.

Another result of Wildlife Conservation Act was the removal protection for "spike" bucks in all counties having a deer hunting season. Spike bucks are treated as any other buck under the current system, officials said.

## Allowable Continues At 100%

**September Statewide Oil and Gas Production Allowable Hearing**  
The Railroad Commission today continued the Texas oil production rate for October 1983 at 100 percent of market demand.

Commissioners Buddy Temple and Jim Nugent directed the continuance of the top production allowable after reviewing oil companies' October nominations to buy a total of 2,425,894 barrels of Texas oil per day. The October nomination total, a decrease of 19,054 barrels daily when compared to September purchases nominations, indicates market demand.

Although next month's state total for the permissible rate of production is calculated to average 2,857,702 barrels per day, actual production is estimated to reach 2.35 million barrels per day. Actual production in October 1982 was 2,373,699 barrels of oil per day. October 1982 nominations totaled 2,462,509 barrels daily. The Commission first went to the ceiling level for oil production in April 1972, and October marks the 80th month in a row for the maximum allowable. It applies to fields in the state except those that are assigned lower legal rates of production so that reservoir pressures will not be depleted before the max-

imum amount of oil has been recovered.

Temple also reported that October 1983 nominations for the purchase of Texas gas totaled 19,260,594 Mcf/d (thousand cubic feet per

day). Gas nominations for September amounted to 19,428,237 Mcf/d. October 1982 gas nominations totaled 20,713,241 Mcf/d.

The next statewide oil and gas production allowable

hearing will begin at 9 a.m. on Thursday, Oct. 20, at the La Posada hotel in Laredo.

Major purchases filed these floor nominations for Texas oil in October:

Amoco Production Co., 161,000 barrels daily, down 2,000 from the previous month; Citgo Petroleum Corp., 73,000, down 1,000; Conoco Inc., 64,000, unchanged; Exxon Co., U.S.A., 271,200, down 2,500; Gulf Oil Corp., 103,000, unchanged; Marathon Petroleum Corp., 66,820, unchanged; Mobil Oil Corp., 173,900, up 1,000; Phillips Petroleum Co., 72,000, down 100; Shell Oil Co., 157,000, down 2,000; and Texaco Inc., 87,000 down 1,000.

Significant changes in October nominations were submitted in writing by these

purchasers of Texas crude oil:

Coffield Pipe line Co., 815, down 4,117; Cosden Oil & Chemical Co., 38,100, down 1,950; Diamond Chemicals Co., 19,270, down 1,130; Dorchester Pipeline Co., 15,400, down 2,500; Getty Trading & Transportation, 32,097, down 2,376; Koch Oil Co., 88,463, up 1,725; Mesa Pipe Line Co., 24,765, down 1,127; Navajo Refining Co., 3,518, up 2,029; P & O Falco Inc., 19,047, up 1,516; PMI Crude Gathering Co., 2,600, down 1,100; and Texas City Refining Inc., 4,806, down 1,216.

Commissioner Temple reported that crude oil and petroleum products imported into the U.S. averaged 6,076,000 barrels daily for the four weeks ending Sept. 2, up 1.4 million barrels per day from the same period a year earlier.

## Gas Rate Decrease Approved

Austin-The Railroad Commission has approved a decrease in contract gas rates between South Cen-Tex Gas Co. and Intrax Gas Co. The decrease will affect city gate customers of Intrax.

The city gate is the point at which a city's gas distribution system gets its gas from its supplier. The rate the distribution system pays for gas at that point is the city gate rate.

The new rate will be \$3.80

per MMBtu (million British thermal units) of heat. Although Btu value varies with the quality of the gas, a thousand cubic feet of gas contains approximately one million Btu's of energy on the average. The old rate was \$4.26 per MMBtu.

With the change, South Cen-Tex's estimated annual revenues will decrease by approximately \$452,933.

The effective date for the change is Aug. 5.

## Trucks Must Have Papers On Oil

Austin-The Railroad commission has adopted a new rule that requires oil trucks to carry identification papers for the oil they are transporting.

The new rule requires a cargo manifest for each load of liquid hydrocarbons transported by an oil tanker vehicle. The manifest must include an identification of the lease of facility from which the oil was removed, the name of the lease operator, the amount of oil

removed, the date and hour of the removal, identification of the transporter, and the intended destination.

Upon request by a Commission agency or other law enforcement official, the transporter must produce the cargo manifest immediately.

A copy of the manifest of a document with the same information must be left at the ease of facility from which the hydrocarbons were

removed, or delivered to the lease of facility operator or his representative.

The manifest must be kept for two years by the transporter, and must be available for inspection.

Another provision requires oil tanker trucks to be identified on both sides or on the front and back with the name of the transport company, the number of the certificate or permit authorizing the service.

## Stanley Williams Receives Doctor Of Philosophy

Stanley Carl Williams received his Doctor of Philosophy in Mathematics at the North Texas State University Commencement exercises, August 13, 1983. His dissertation was entitled: Universally Measurable Sets and Nonisomorphic Subalgebras.

Stanley was born in Cisco, Texas (Graham Hospital) on November 30, 1952. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J.N. Williams and the grandson

of Mr. and Mrs. Luke Pippen and the late Mr. and Mrs. Roy Lee Williams of Cisco.

Stanley's father, Jay, was head football coach and math teacher at Cisco High School during 1952-57. His mother, Betty, graduated from Cisco High School in 1943.

Stanley has accepted a position as assistant math professor at the Utah State University in Logan, Utah and is presently residing there.

Morgan Building Corporation, north of Eastland on Highway 69, is a bustling complex occupying 28 acres. The company recently added 17 acres onto their existing site, making room for future development.

The local Morgan corp. is part of Morgan Building Systems Inc., the world's largest manufacturer of portable buildings. The Corporation has five other large plants in the United States, and it is estimated that over 300,000 Morgan buildings are presently in use in this country.

The Eastland plant includes a sales office, a collection of offices and areas where the company's buildings are manufactured, and colorful displays of portable buildings and prefabricated housing. Trucks and people seem to rotate around the sound of welding.

the hub of this activity is the office of Plant Manager Lee Gardner, who is usually called "Lee" by the people around him.

Even-voiced Gardner deals with a variety of things - a customer on the phone wanting delivery of something-or-other, bolts that won't quite fit somewhere, and the question as to whether a load leaving the yards will clear a certain underpass.

Signs posted above his desk: "Mental Images Control Action", "Management is Something You Do With People, Not To Them", probably define the inner tranquility which keeps Gardner going. Add to that informality of his work center.

Displays on another wall of his office divided company data under Labor, Budgets, Quality, Trucking,

and Maintenance, giving a constant update of the picture.

A wall map of the U.S. gives the scope of distribution of the Eastland plant. Bright pins designate 13 company sales lots, 12 Franchise dealers and other outlets in North Central Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, New Mexico, Lubbock, Dallas, Ft. Worth, and Austin.

"We manufacture around 100 buildings per week here," says Gardner, "And that adds up to an annual sales total of around 10 million dollars. Of that, over \$500,000 goes in annual wages to employees here."

"At this time we have 68 employees, including 24 Cambodian men and women. About 40 percent of the Cambodian refugee families who first located here have moved to Metropolitan areas on either the east or west coast."

"The ones who have stayed on are all hard workers who are interested in becoming part of the community. Most are taking College or G.E.D. classes, trying to learn all they can."

"We have a good work force from all groups of our employees, I believe the best we've ever had."

"There are job openings right now at the plant for both skilled and unskilled workers. We are planning to expand, and we are strongly committed to this location. Eastland has supported our company well, and it has a lot of advantages."

"For one thing, there is a reasonably good climate here. We move all our finished products out by trucks, and there are good roads with very little snow."

"We have a good rail line

to bring in materials to work with. These include aluminum, steel, wood, and plastics."

"After buying out Fuqua Homes here in 1977, Morgan went almost totally into portable buildings for awhile. Now we are diversifying moving into the manufacturing of modules which can be arranged into schools, churches, offices, homes and greenhouses."

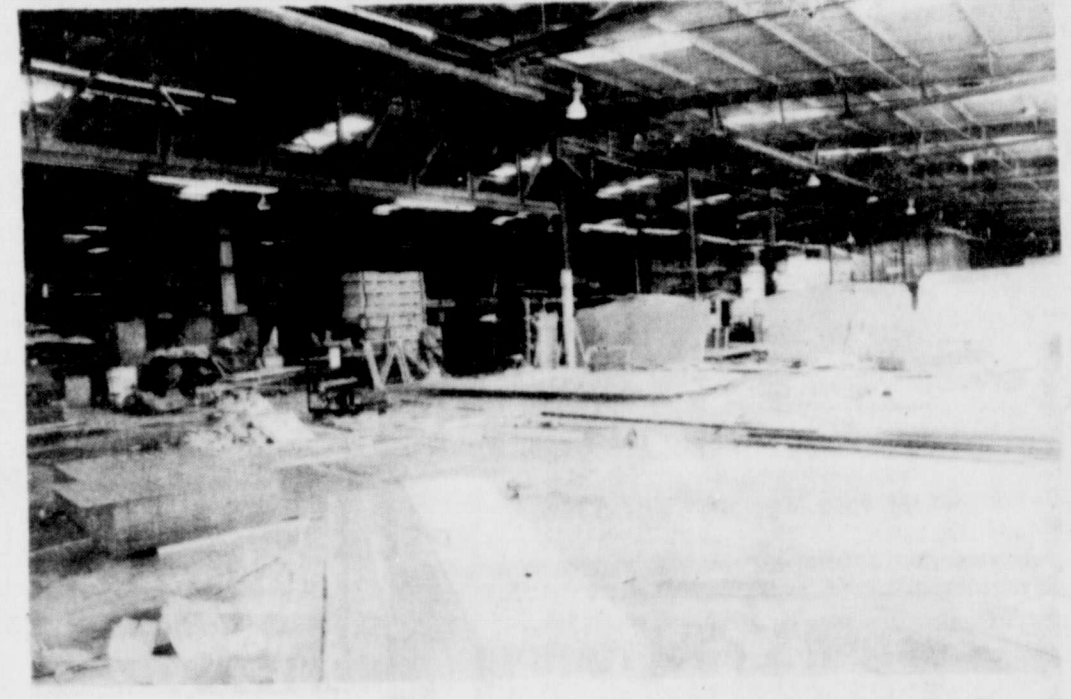
"We have just finished a 36 x 72 ft. church in Irving. We have also constructed a 20 unit Motel in Dallas, and manufactured six classrooms for the Jim Ned School District near Abilene."

"Our prices start at \$375 for a small portable structure - something almost everyone can afford. Or, if a person wishes, we can make large, elaborate buildings with almost any type of interior finish and siding, in any price range desired."

Lee Gardner explains that he is sold on Eastland not only as a plant location, but as a place to live as well. He and his wife and two children moved here in 1981, and have enjoyed it.

Gardner, a native of Ohio, had a varied preparation for his work at Morgan Building. But no engineering, he explains with a smile. He was an economics major in college, then spent eight years as a banker and 12 years in the mobile home business.

"That certainly gave me



some ideas about what the public wants," he comments. "I believe the business here is filling a need, and I see nothing ahead but expansion."

**About That Old Camera...**

**Q:** Recently I dug out my brother's old Voigtlander folding camera with intentions of using it once in a while. It takes 120-size roll film and, since it has two red windows on the back marked "A" and "B", apparently has provisions for taking 16 pictures on a roll, instead of 8. I remember this from the Ansco camera I had when in high school. It took 16 pictures on a roll. I carried that camera to New Guinea and back, taking pictures to remember my life in the service.

Back to the Voigtlander, shouldn't there be some kind of mask to put in the camera to block out the other half of the film that normally is part of the bigger picture when only the "A" window is used for 8 exposures per roll? If so, do you have any idea of where one of these could be obtained? I realize that the camera is over 40 years old, but I would like to use it.

**E.N., Wausau, WI**

**A:** Yes, you do, indeed, have a split-format Voigtlander-Bessa with optical finder on your hands, and it did rely on a mask to enable the user to choose his format of exposure—either 2 1/4 x 3 1/4 full-frame or 2 1/4 x 1 5/8 half-frame. With the small-picture mask in place, each numerical figure is set once in the lower and once in the upper window. In other words, the first exposure is made with the number "1" in the lower window; the second with the number "1" in the upper window; the third with the number "2" in the lower window; the fourth with the number "2" in the upper window, and so forth, resulting in 16 half-frame exposures.

As for where to obtain a mask for the Voigtlander, check with Peter J. Sheldon, dealer in antique, classic, and rare photo equipment and materials in Mequon, WI (414) 241-8399. He may be able to find one for you. Otherwise, you might try placing an ad in the newspaper or in Shutterbug Ads, the photographic classified newspaper, Box F, Titusville, FL (sample copy is \$2). If you can't turn up a mask, you'll have to content yourself with taking 8 full-frame exposures on a roll.

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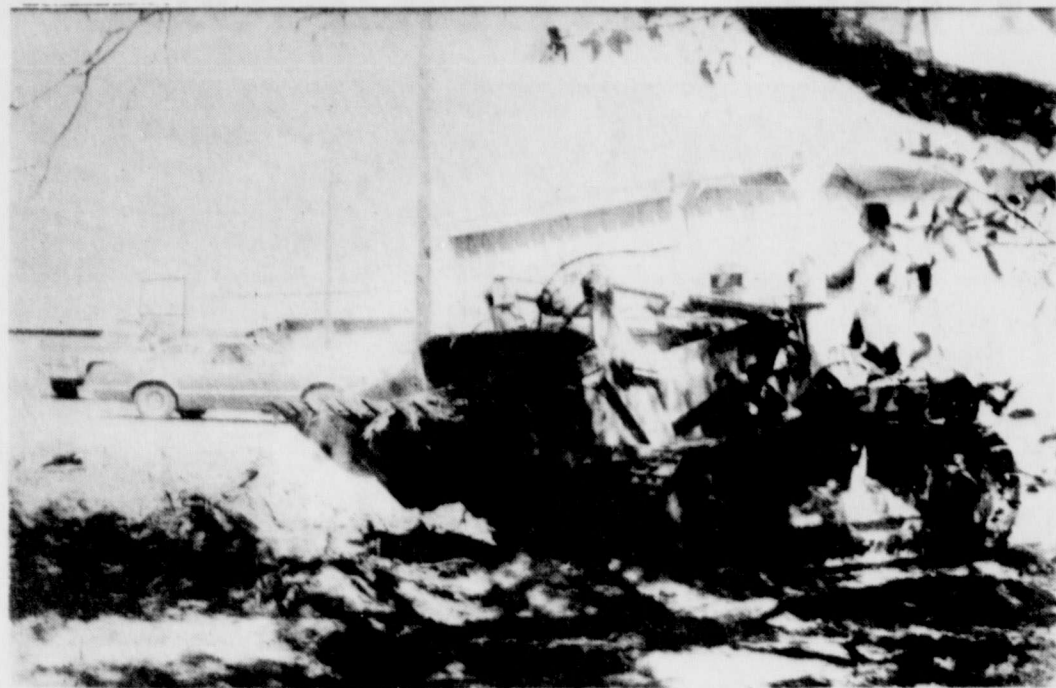
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**What's Going On At the Farm Bureau**



## IRS News And Information For October

October 31 is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 social security and withheld federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1983 and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service says.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approve commercial banks. They are allowed until November 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can order one through the Forms/Tax Information number listed in the phone book under U.S. Government. IRS Publication 15, Circular

Internal Revenue Service says.

Although most taxpayers will never need the services of PRP, the IRS says that taxpayers with a persistent tax problem will find PRP willing and able to help. Taxpayers can contact PRP through the IRS assistance number listed in the phone book under U.S. Government.

From a tax standpoint, cash winnings, lotteries, races, games of chance, and raffles are viewed as income on the federal tax return, the

Internal Revenue Service says. Similarly, contest prize money and awards from employers are also considered as taxable income by the IRS adds that property items won in contests or donated by employers, such as household appliances, all-expense-paid vacations, or cars must also be included in income at fair market value.

**Oct. 4, 10:30**

The eleventh annual Eastland County hayshow will be on October 4 in the Moylan show barn at the county livestock show grounds near Eastland. A program will begin at 10:30 a.m.

Dr. George Alston, Extension Service Agronomist, will discuss the hay show results and production of quality hay.

Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon reports that there are 32 entries in the hay show. Ribbons and plaques will be presented to exhibitors during the program. Prior to the program Dr. Alston will judge the hay entries. The chemical score (crude protein) will be averaged with the physical score to determine the final classification score. The physical factors will include maturity, texture, leafiness, freedom from foreign material, and color. Ribbons will be awarded based on final score. Plaques will be given to exhibitors with the highest scoring entry in each of the following classes: Coastal Bermudagrass, Sudan-Sorghum Hybrids, other perennials, and oats and other annuals.

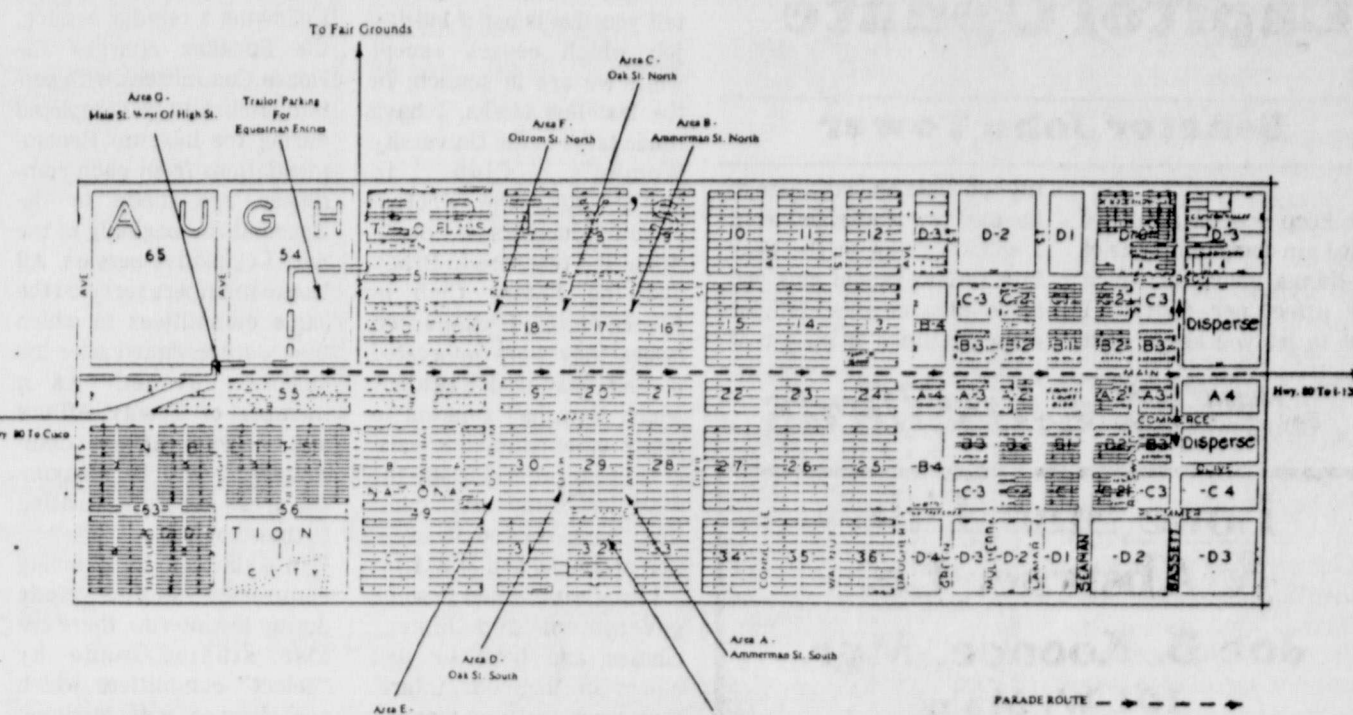

# Capitol Update

Senator John Tower

To keep you all aware of what I am doing and some of the things going on which may affect our district, I want to let you know what

my schedule has been like in the past few weeks and what I will be doing in the near future. This should give you some idea of some of the responsibilities of the job of

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state representative which you elected me to fulfill.

Right off the bat, let me tell you this is not a 140-day job which ceases except while we are in session. In the last few weeks, I have made talks to the University Women's Club in Brownwood, the Professional Educators in Santa Anna, the teachers in Brady and the Rotary Club in Brownwood. I discussed issues they were interested in and answered questions which they had relating to many other state interests. (For your information, the most commonly asked questions have related to education problems and D.W.I.)

I have also talked to some government and history classes and hope to visit others in the near future. Next week I will be meeting with the people at the Brownwood State School. Besides keeping constituents informed, there are

other responsibilities and meetings which must be attended out of the district. Following a regular session, the Speaker charges the House Committees with certain studies to be completed during the interim. Recommendations from each committee are made to the House at the beginning of the next Legislative session. All House members serve on the same committees to which they were assigned after the session covered. As a member of County Affairs and Judicial Affairs Committees, I will be studying the areas generally relating to these topics.

In addition to the standing committee studies made during the interim, there are also studies made by "select" committees which are charged with studying and making recommendations on a specifically selected subject. Generally the members of these select committees are composed of a few members from the House appointed by the Speaker, a few members from the Senate appointed by the Lt. Governor and a few citizen members appointed by the Governor. Recently Speaker "Gib" Lewis requested that I serve as a member of the Select Committee on the Judiciary. This committee has been charged with making a com-

prehensive study of judges, their jurisdiction, salaries, retirement system; and courts, their creation, organization and jurisdiction.

Both the regular and select committees meet several times as a whole during the

interim as do the subcommittees within each full committee. You can see this will involve both time in the actual meetings as well as time in preparing for the meeting; however, I look forward to the challenge and responsibilities involved in

these studies and feel they will be both interesting to me and important to the district.

I have particularly enjoyed meeting people from my district and feel it is my responsibility as your representative to try to keep you abreast of current issues

and answer any questions pertaining to state government. I want you all to be informed, take an interest in state government and share your views with me. Your input helps me be able to do a better job of representing you.

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**September 18-24**

This week, September 18-24, is National Farm Safety Week. President Reagan has signed a Proclamation making this week a time for nation-wide emphasis on farm safety activities. The 1983 theme for the week is Safeguard The Future. The focus is on the protection and safety training of our younger generation to whom we must look to take over the tremendous job of feeding and clothin our nation and many others around the world.

According to preliminary National Safety Council estimates, agricultural work-connected accidents were responsible for about 1,800 deaths and 180,000 disabling injuries in 1982. Many of these casualties were children or youths. Many young farm and ranch residents also were killed or seriously injured in home, traffic and recreation mishaps.

In fact, accidents are no respecter of age. About one person in three killed accidentally in the U.S. - or more than 30,000 - is age 24 or younger. Accidents lead as a cause of death for all persons ages 1 through 38 and by far for those ages 1 through 24. Possibly 100 times that 30,000 plus suffer disabling injuries each year, tens of thousands of whom will be burdened with lifelong impairments.

We must and can protect our youngsters from harm, then as they grow-up teach them how to perform all their activities safely. If we make safety part adn parcel of yung person's attitudes and way of life, then he or she can't help becoming a safer worker, driver and home manager.

Farm and ranch children are probably subject to more life-or-limb threatening hazards than most youngsters living in non-farm settings. For one, the tools of agriculture are just outside the back door, - the tractors, the chemicals, the livestock, the power tools, the pond... People in other occupations usually leave home to do their work and their families are not endangered by hazards they face on the job. Farming and ranching parents must be aware of all home place hazards and try to keep their children out of harm's way. For example, they should not let children ride on or play near operating farm equipment.

They should keep things that could harm a child safely out of reach or locked up. And they should be sure that all play equipment, bikes and such are in goo, safe condition.

Children old enough to help with home and farm tasks should only be given jobs within their capabilities. As a young person develops strength, or responsible assignments. Parents and those in charge of young workers should train them well, then supervise them until they can be relied on to do every job safely and well.

This Farm Safety Week - and all other weeks of the year as well - help to safegaurd agriculture's future. 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# President Reagan Begins Wearing Hearing Aid

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7 - President Reagan has begun wearing a custom made, technologically advanced hearing aid in his right ear after experiencing increased difficulty hearing high pitched sound.

Mr. Reagan, who is 72 years old, began wearing the device last week, according to the White House. He wore it today in public for the first time, at a meeting of business and education leaders on the subject of adult literacy.

The hearing aid is fitted into the ear canal and is barely visible.

Larry Speakes, the White House spokesman, said the President's hearing aid was prescribed after he visited

Dr. John William House in Los Angeles August 22. Dr. House, an associate of the House Ear Institute, a research and training facility, has been treating Mr. Reagan for his hearing problems since 1979.

A White House official said Mr. Reagan had already developed the habit of using and then removing the hearing aid at will, much like a pair of glasses. The official

said the President had told aides he intended to use it mostly for meetings at the White House.

Among Presidential advisers, Mr. Reagan's use of a hearing aid revived speculation on whether his age would be an issue if he seeks re-election next year. The general feeling was that it would not.

Both Dr. House and a spokesman for the manufacturer of the device said in interviews that Mr. Reagan's hearing problems were common. They also expressed the hope that his wearing a hearing aid publicly would set an example for others who might be reluctant to use one.

Mr. Reagan's hearing problems date from the 1930's, when a .38-caliber pistol was fired near his right ear while he was acting in a movie. Dr. House said the impairment "affects the right ear primarily."

Many people who have spent time with the President have noticed his hearing has deteriorated in the last year or so. Reporters have been told to speak loudly when they interview him, particularly from the right side.

Dr. House said of the President's hearing, "It's not really deteriorated much from last year." He said he had recommended that Mr. Reagan use a hearing aid not so much because the hearing had worsened but because there had been many recent technological advances.

"There have been many improvements in hearing aids recently, particularly in the area of quality of sound they can produce," the doctor said. "There have also been improvements in miniaturization. That's the reason we felt we could make the recommendation that he use one."

He said Mr. Reagan suffered a deterioration in the auditory nerve, which picks up sound vibrations in the inner ear and converts them to electrical impulses to the brain. He said the nerve was

damaged by the old gunshot noise.

The hearing aid, manufactured by Starkey Laboratories of Minneapolis, is powered by a small battery and is designed to amplify higher sound frequencies. Because it can selectively amplify these higher frequencies, the device has the effect of making what Mr. Reagan hears not just louder but also clearer, Dr. House said.

Jerome Buzicka, director of manufacturing for Starkey Laboratories, said the ability to make a hearing aid that could amplify some frequencies more than others was a major technological gain of the last year or so.

Another recent improvement cited by Mr. Buzicka is the ability to fit the hearing aid into the ear canal itself rather than restricting it to the outer part of the ear.

Mr. Buzicka said liquid material had been injected into Mr. Reagan's ear canal so an impression could be

made when the material hardened. The hearing aid was then molded to conform to this impression.

"There's a big cosmetic appeal for a canal hearing aid," he said. "It's pretty obvious that with a President, you have an advantage to having it out of sight."

"That seems to be the problem with millions of people who need hearing aids," Mr. Buzicka continued. "One

reason they don't want to wear one is that they don't want it hanging over their ear or sticking out of their ear. This one is tucked securely in the canal and, in most cases, it's out of sight."

Mr. Buzicka said the President's hearing aid was donated by Starkey Laboratories and Burton Associates, the Los Angeles distributor. The device, custom fitted, retails for \$900

to \$1,100, he said. Dr. House said one out of three people over the age of 60 had hearing problems. "Hearing loss is the most common problem in the country," he said. "It affects one in 10 of the general population. Maybe the President's doing this will help others realize that they can ease their problems with a hearing aid. I would hope so."

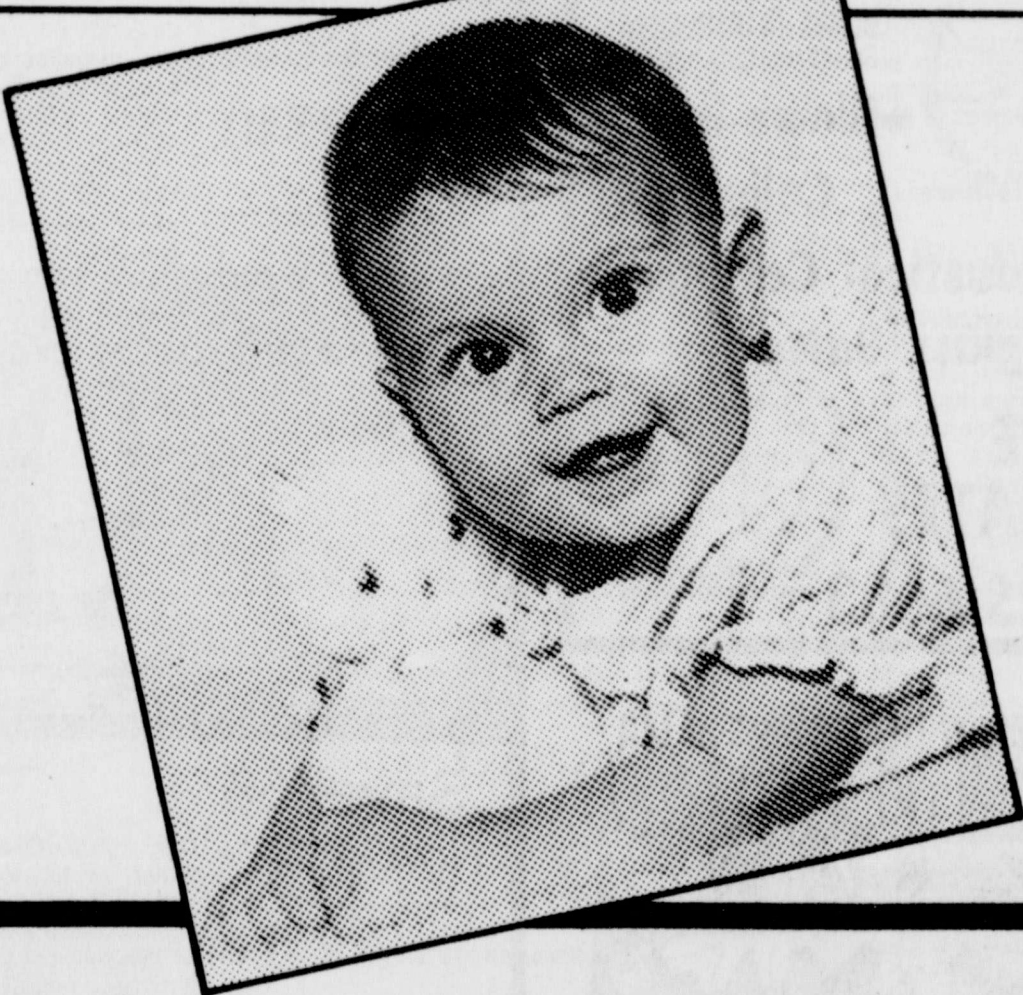

# 33-Year Naval Reserve Career Ends Saturday

When he is relieved of his command in a formal change-of-Command Ceremony Saturday, September 24 in Dallas, a thirty-three year naval reserve career will be ending for Roy L. Dunlap, a rear admiral in the U.S. Naval Reserves.

His sister, Mrs. Nolan (Willie) Butler of Eastland speaks proudly of her brother. "Our parents, Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Dunlap, taught at the Morton Valley School north of Eastland in 1946 and 1947" she said. "Roy visited when he was on leave from the service and was discharged while my parents were teaching there."

Dunlap worked as city coordinator for Hamlin, then served as city manager for Snyder six years before moving to Killeen to serve as city manager there. While serving in the capacity, he was called into active duty during the Vietnam conflict, along with the battalion he commanded Mobeke Construction Battalion 22. He served over ten months in Vietnam and remained Commanding officer of MCB 22 until 1971. He since has served as Commander, Ninth Reserve Naval Construction Regiment and Chief of staff for the First Reserve Naval Construction Brigade. He was promoted to the grade of rear admiral on June 1, 1979 and that October was assigned as director, Facilities Engineering Program. On November 1, 1980 he was assigned the Collateral duty of deputy Chief of Staff for Construction management for Commander in Chief, U.S. Naval Forces Europe in wartime. He assumed his present assignment on October

1, 1981.

"I'm the only peon that ever made it this high" Dunlap laughingly told his sister. His command is the largest single Navy Command in the Navy reserve program. He commands units as far west as Guam, as far north as Alaska, as far south as Puerto Rico and as far east as Rota, Spain. He is commander of the Reserve Naval Construction Forces. Approximately 17,000 reser-

vist answer directly to him.

Dunlap admits it is unusual for a man who is a civilian employee at Fort Hood to achieve a rank in the Naval reserves that is equivalent to a major general in the U.S. Army.

Dunlap told his sister "it's time I quiet." "I can't go any higher anyway" he laughed. He has his boat painted and plans to spend some time 'just plain fishing.'

In civilian life, he is involved in the Greater Killeen Chamber of Commerce, Military Affairs Committee and Killeen Rotary Club. He works as a private civil engineer consultant.

He and his wife Riley Faye have one son, Roy Joe, who works for the Internal Revenue Service in Austin.

According to Sweeten, a specialist with Texas A&M's Agricultural Extension Service, recent research shows that recipes prepared with non-nutritive sweeteners such as saccharin or aspartame produce satisfactory results with only minor flavor differences.

But the non-nutritive sweeteners do have limitations as cooking ingredients, she adds.

"Be prepared for a few failures when cooking with non-nutritive sweeteners because the sugar-equivalency ratios given on the packages are not always reliable in cooking," says Sweeten. "Also, the degree of sweetness may vary according to the other ingredients in the recipe."

Saccharin can be used in quick breads and other simple baked goods with no adjustments, says the specialist, but it's risky to use in cakes, yeast breads and some cookies that require the carbohydrate of

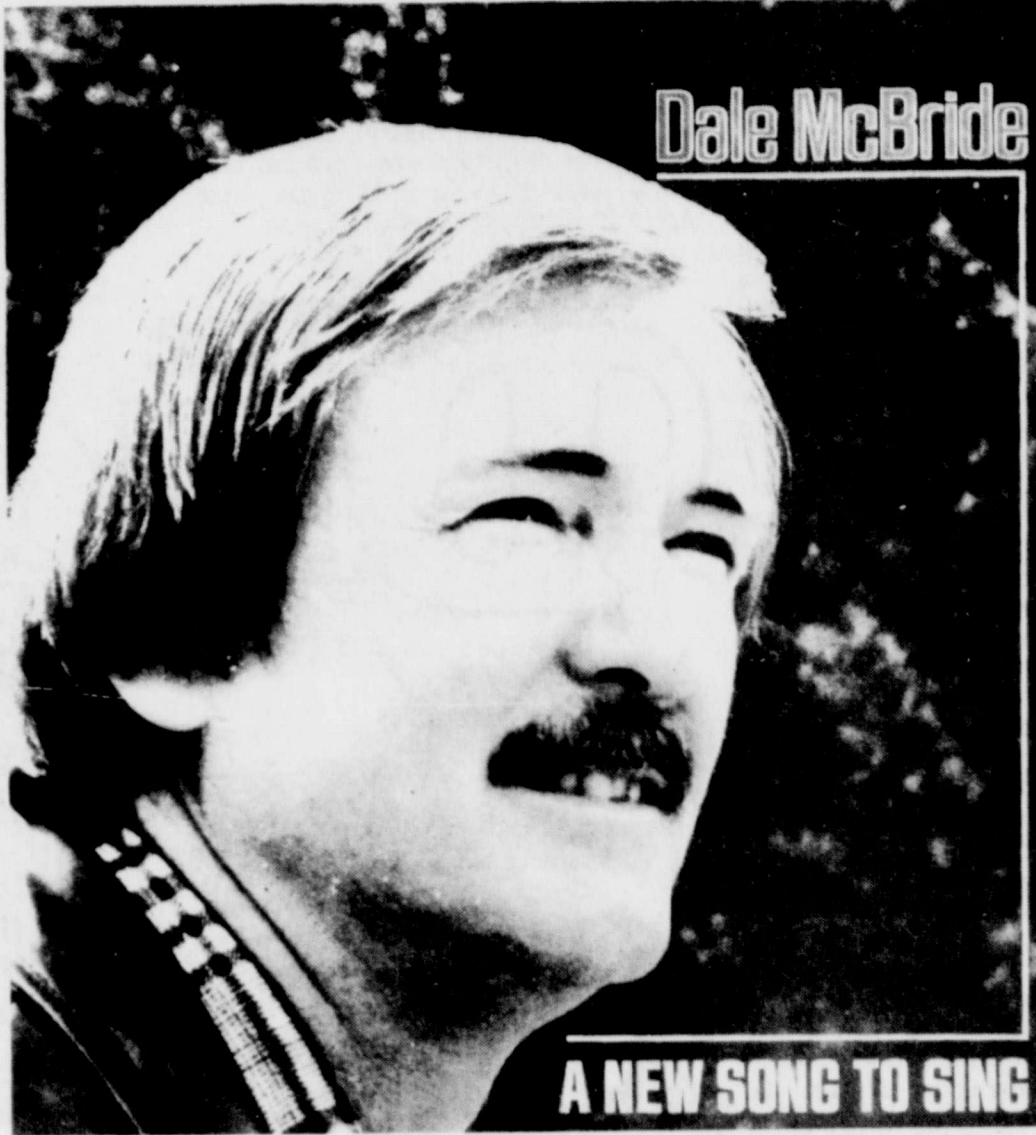
sugar for proper balance.

To reduce the aftertaste from saccharin, Sweeten suggests adding it after heating, rather than before or during the process.

While aspartame does not have a noticeable aftertaste, it cannot be used in cooking

or baking, since its chemical structure breaks down under high temperatures. But aspartame can be used in cold foods and dissolves easily when stirred into custards, creams or other liquids, says the specialist.

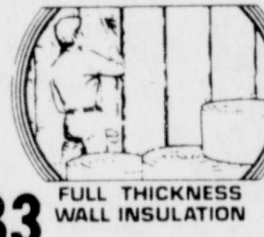

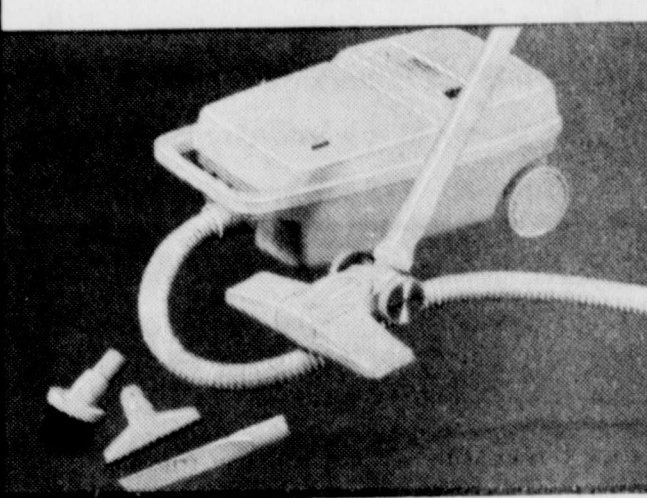

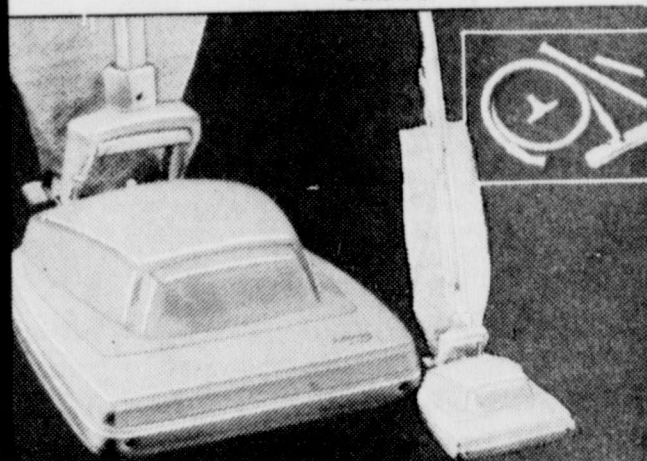
