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CHS Plans Homecoming Friday, Loboes Will Take On Baird Here

8th & JV Will Play In Baird Thurs.

CJC'S WRANGLERS will play the Texas Tech J.V. in Lubbock on Thursday night. The Wranglers are presently 2-2 for the season.

THE COUNTY Fair in Eastland started on Wednesday and will continue through Saturday night. If you can find time between football games be sure and plan a night out at the fair or go on Saturday during the day-time.

The Cisco High School Loboes will be taking on the Baird Bears Friday night in Cisco for the annual Homecoming Game at Chesley Field. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

On Thursday night, Cisco's seventh grade team will probably play an inter-squad scrimmage in Cisco, since Baird does not have a seventh grade team. Coach John Parchman said the players need to do something this week, so they will probably scrimmage each other at 5 p.m. in Chesley Field.

The eighth grade and Junior Varsity games will be played in Baird Thursday night as scheduled. The eighth grade will begin play at 6:00 p.m. and the J.V. at 7:30 p.m.

CHS's Lobo Varsity is now 2-2 for the season and 0-1 in district play following their 21-7 loss to the Winters Blizzards last Friday night. Tailback David Seabourn twisted his knee in that game and Coach Parchman said it is doubtful whether he will play this Friday. He stated

that everyone else is healthy and ready to go for this Friday's game.

Baird is also 2-2 for the season and 0-1 in district play, having defeated Cross Plains and Merkel while losing to Gorman and Albany.

Coach Parchman said "they are an option football team and they throw the ball quite a bit." He stated they are an inconsistent team, "sometimes they look good and sometimes they don't. They have their backs against the wall and this will be an important game for them. In the past they have played well against Cisco."

He said the Loboes will come out of losing to Winters last week and be ready to play good football against Baird in Friday night's Homecoming Game.

In last Friday night's game in Winters, Cisco was not able to get their offense going until the final quarter of play when they got their only touchdown of the game.

On Winters second possession of the game, they began their first scoring drive from their own 24-yard line. With Bill Wheat at quarterback, the Blizzards moved the ball downfield in nine plays to Cisco's 39-yard line. QB Wheat, Kentt Billups and Ronnie Lujano were instrumental runners in the drive. On a first and ten from Cisco's 39-yard line, Blizzard Kentt Billups took the pitchback from QB Wheat and scampered to the end zone, with John Mesey holding the ball, Lujano booted the PAT kick for the extra point making the score 7-0 in the first quarter of play.

Cisco's Doug Hendricks received the ensuing kick from Jujano around Cisco's three-yard line and returned it to the 26. On the first play of the drive, a handoff from Cisco quarterback Joe Perry to Johnny Ramirez, the ball was fumbled and Winters recovered at Cisco's 27-yard line.

With runs by Billups and Dale Gray, Winters moved the ball to Cisco's four-yard line in four plays. A pitchback to Billups netted Winters second touchdown of the first quarter. Again

Mesey held the ball while Lujano kicked the extra point making the score 14-0.

Winters threatened to score again in the second quarter after driving the ball from their own 25-yard line to Cisco's 23 in four plays. Gray and Billups moved the ball on the ground, while a pass play from QB Wheat to Eric Belk netted 38-yards. On the next play, a handoff from QB Wheat to Billups, the ball was fumbled and Cisco's Travis Long came up with the recovery to stop Winters' drive.

In the second half of play, Cisco's defense came up with the ball in a third quarter pass from QB Wheat. The ball was deflected by Cisco's Sean Manire and Lobo Josh Potter came up with the interception to give Cisco the ball at Winters 42-yard line.

Unable to get a first down in four plays, Cisco's Butch Jessup was forced to punt the ball which landed in the end zone.

A Winters penalty on the punt, brought the ball only out to the ten-yard line for Winters. The Blizzards were unable to sustain a drive and had to punt the ball from their own 14-yard line.

Cisco received the punt at the 50-yard line, but a Winters penalty moved the ball to the Blizzards 42-yard line. The Loboes began to move the ball downfield in their only scoring drive of the night. Runs by Ramirez, Hendricks, QB Perry and Potter moved the ball to Winters 14-yard line in nine plays. A touchdown pass from QB Perry to Tommy Elrod in the end zone was wiped out by a Cisco penalty when officials said the quarterback was beyond the line of scrimmage when he threw the pass.

On the next play, in a fourth down and 19-yards situation, Cisco QB Perry again threw a touchdown pass, this time a 19-yard pass play to Hendricks, for six points. With Glen Starr holding the ball, Jessup prepared to kick the extra point but an official's whistle stopped the play and gave the Loboes a penalty for

delay of game moving the ball back five yards. Again Starr held the ball and Jessup put the ball between the uprights on his kick making the score 14-7 early in the fourth quarter.

On Winters next possession of the ball, the Blizzards came back and moved the ball from their own 21-yard line to Cisco's 33 in five plays with runs by Billups, Lujano and Gray. A handoff to Billups netted him his third touchdown run of the night, this time a 33-yard jaunt up the middle. Mesey and Lujano again teamed up for the PAT attempt which was good making the final score 21-7.

Winters almost added some more points in the final quarter of play, but Cisco's defense stiffened and did a real fine job of preventing the Blizzards from crossing the goal line. Winters had started their drive from their own 49-yard line and Billups, Lujano, Belk and QB Wheat had moved the ball to Cisco's one-yard line in six

plays. In a fourth down and one yard situation, Cisco's defense kept Winters Billups from crossing the goal line for another touchdown.

Standouts on Cisco's defense included Doug Hendricks, Josh Potter, Craig Foster, Robert Sherman, Travis Long and Glen Starr. Defensive standouts for Winters were Bill Wheat, Kentt Billups, Greg Guevara, Ronnie Lujano, Don Kvapil, Edward Rocha, Jeff McDorman and Eric Belk.

Plans for the annual Eastland County Fair and Parade have been completed. The fair is scheduled to kick-off at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday with an exhibition by the Eastland County 4-H Horse Club. It will include precision, drill team, and western pleasure as well as barrel and pole races. A magic show at 7 p.m. will close Wednesday's activities.

Exhibition booths will be set up Thursday until noon, and from noon until 6 p.m. the items to be displayed, with the exception of baked goods, will be brought in Friday from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. Judging will be all day Friday.

Senior Citizens' Day will be Thursday afternoon and

the Cisco Senior Citizens' Band and Eastland Senior Citizens' Choir and singing groups will entertain under the big tent.

Lonnie Chevie, Master Magician, will perform the amazing Houdini Straight Jacket Escape at 7 p.m. Wednesday, and 6 p.m. Thursday and Friday.

Three-wheeler barrel races will be held Thursday at 8 p.m. in the Sheriff's Posse Arena. Registration will begin at 7 p.m., and a \$5 entry fee will be charged. A trophy will be awarded to first place, and ribbons to second and third places. Dale McBride, country and western and gospel singer from Lampasas, will sing at 8 p.m.

Highlight of Saturday's activities will be the parade at

10 a.m. in Eastland. Nearly 90 entries have signed up for the parade, including Miss Texas, Hardin-Simmons University's Six White Horses and riders, several bands, floats, antique cars, and horses. The parade route will go straight east on Main Street.

Activities at the fair Saturday include a free cookout from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., sponsored by Ranger Savings, Eastland Savings and Olney Savings of Cisco; a Happy Clown Magic Show with Beverly Massagee at 1 p.m.; and Sheriff's Posse sponsored play day at 1:30 p.m. with the dollar entry donation going to the MH/MR Center.

Also Saturday at 2 p.m. there will be a children's pet show with eight classes:

largest pet, smallest pet, with longest tail, longest ears, prettiest, best costumed, most unusual and best all around pet. The show is open to pre-school and school age children, and the dogs and cats must be vaccinated for rabies, and all pets must be on a leash, in a cage or under control.

Exhibits will be released from 5 until 7 p.m., and Western Swing, a band from Albany, will entertain at 7:30 p.m.

A carnival with lots of exciting rides and booths will be at the fair Wednesday through Saturday.

Admission to the fair will be charged Saturday only—\$1 for adults and 50 cents for children. Free passes for children are being passed out at area schools.

County Has Spanish Mission

Gilbert Hernandez moved to Eastland for a while, saw what he considered a need, then set out to do something about it. He no longer lives here, but the need is being met.

Unable to locate a Spanish church in Eastland County, Mr. Hernandez saw a need for a church with services in Spanish as well as English, as there are Spanish speaking people in the area who do not speak or understand English.

Joining the Harmony Baptist Church while living in Eastland, he soon went to Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth. But remembering the need in Eastland, he made regular trips back, and in 1981 he started a Spanish Bible class in the home of his brother here.

As the Bible class grew, a larger meeting place centrally located in the County so that it would be within a reasonable drive of people in

the area towns was needed. Derrrell Monday, who was the pastor of the Bethel Baptist Church at the time, became interested, so the Bethel church became that meeting place.

Under the sponsorship of the Harmony church, the Bible class became a mission meeting in the Bethel church fellowship hall.

In October of 1982, according to Eddie Gonzales, he was called here by the Lord from the Kerrville Mission which he was pastoring. He says that it was hard and rough not having a house here and having to drive here on weekends from Stamford, but that that was what he was called to do.

Mr. Gonzales started holding the mission services, which are in both Spanish and English, and trying to reach out to the Spanish people in the surrounding area.

The Cisco Southern Baptist Association saw the need

for a permanent Spanish church here and helped Mr. Gonzales to move here, which he did on August 29.

In addition to the Association, some area churches and the Texas Southern Baptist Convention are supporting him as a full time minister.

Mr. Gonzales is available to help at other churches, especially where there is a language problem, in addition to pastoring the mission which is averaging over 20 in attendance with crowds of up to 40 at times.

The mission, which has been meeting at 2:30 on Sundays, will be meeting at 11 a.m. starting this Sunday. It will also continue meeting on Thursday nights from 7 until 8.

They hope to start a Sunday School, but room is limited at the Bethel Baptist Church which will be having services at the same time in the sanctuary and the rest of

the building.

Sunday night services are also planned for sometime in the future.

They are on the lookout for a building of their own if the mission can become a church with continued growth.

Mr. Gonzales says that the fruit of a Christian is another Christian and that it is logical for a Spanish Christian to bear Spanish fruit.

Born in Brownsville, Mr. Gonzales was reared in Stamford where he surrendered to the ministry in a mission.

There was a need for someone to preach in Spanish in services the Baptist River Ministry was conducting along the Rio Grande, and Eddie Gonzales was asked to.

At his first sermon 23 young people were converted, but he says he still wanted to be sure of the calling before he continued to preach.

He pastored in Lamesa and Anson as well as Kerrville.

He also went from some churches back to help with the River Ministry at times as did his wife, Mary Ann, who has also worked with Acteens and served as a Women's Missionary Union Director.

She was a native of San Antonio.

Now living in Olden, they have two girls, Lilly Ann and Evana, and a boy, Eddie Jr.

Mr. Gonzales attended what is now the Hispanic Theological Baptist Seminary in San Antonio.

Among his other interests and hobbies are carpenter work, upholstery and the refinishing of small furniture, and working with bicycles and motors as a mechanic.

Mr. Gonzales can be contacted through the Bethel Baptist Church in Eastland.

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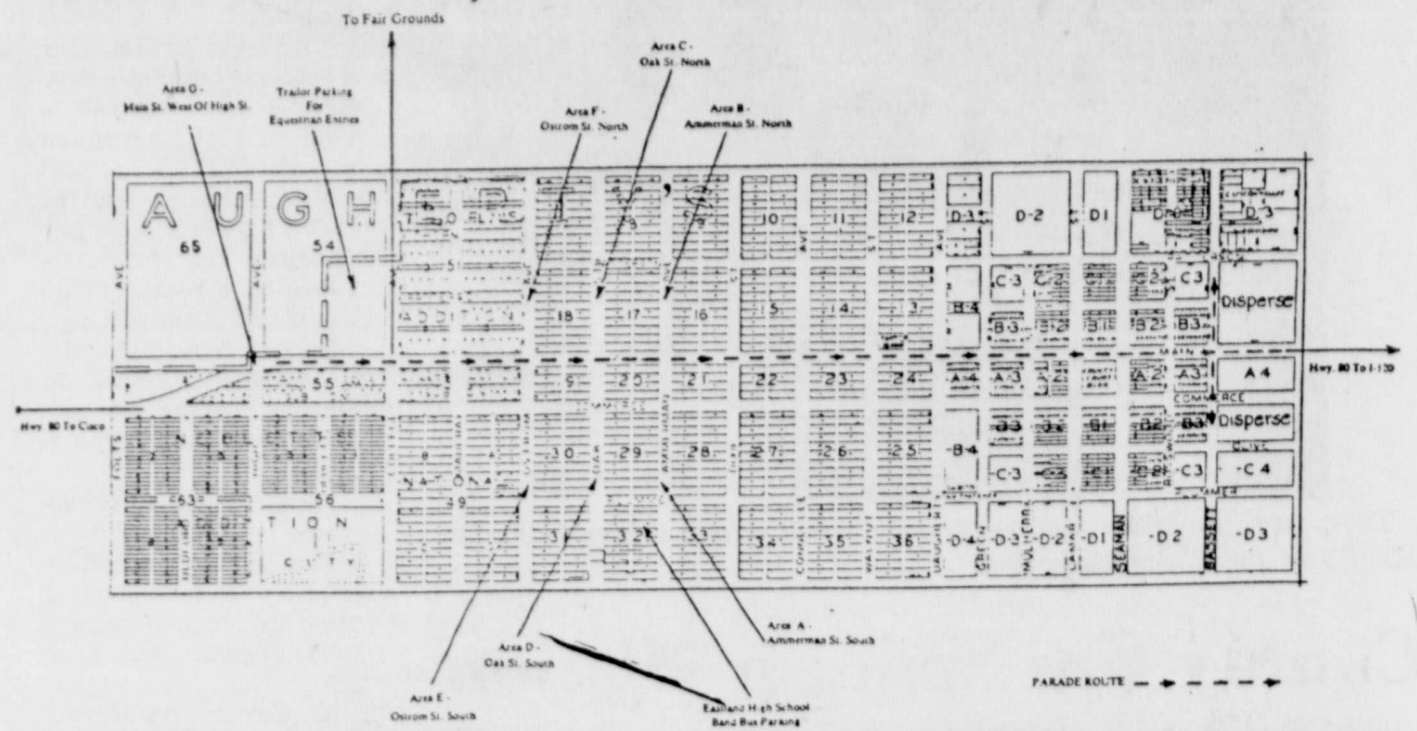

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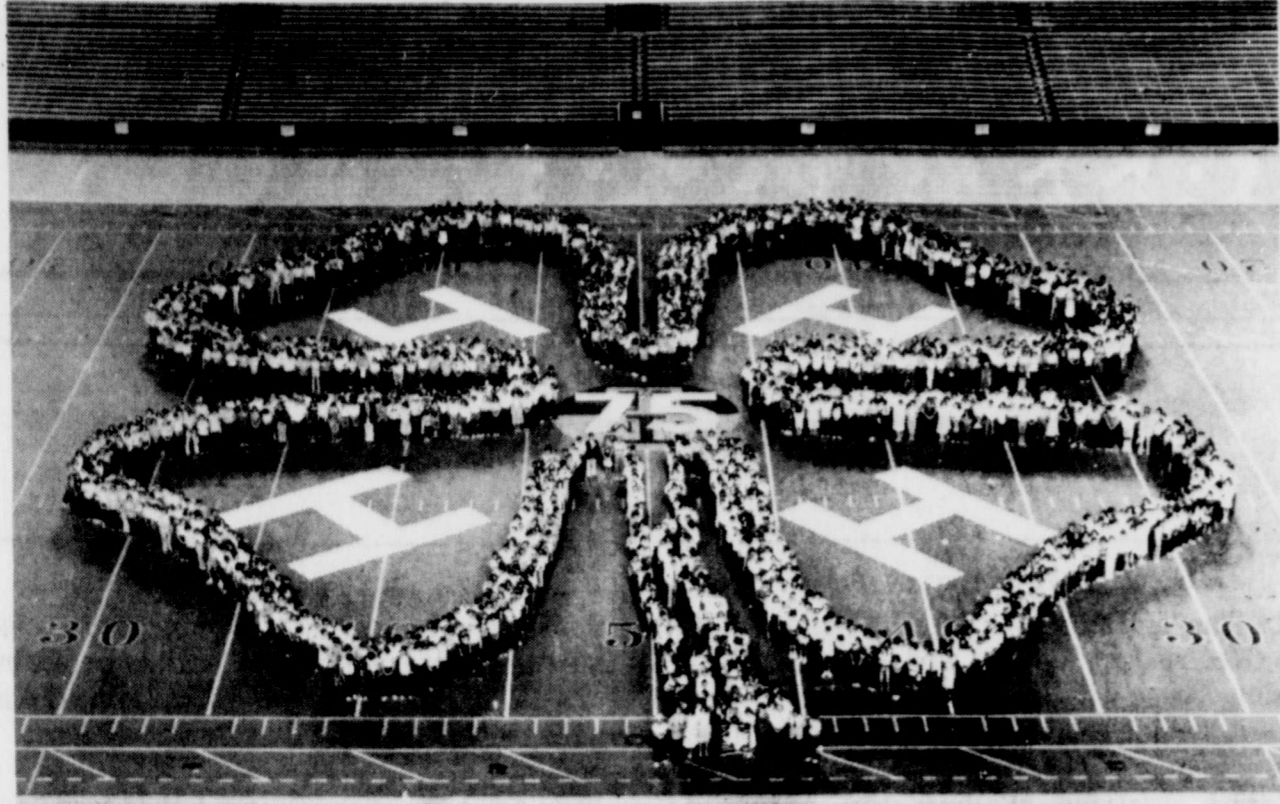

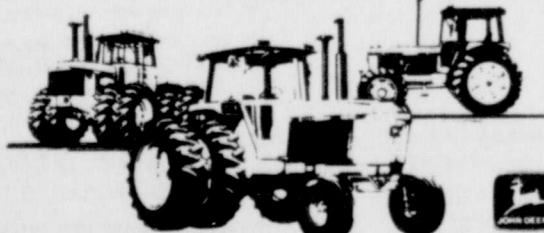

Coveted Award Presented To John D. Isenhower

It was "John D." Day in Putnam Monday - but it could have well been Every-American Day.

The spirit of the occasion typifies everything that's good about this country.

John D. Isenhower was the honoree and the occasion was the presentation of the coveted John Campanius Holm Award for his contribution to the National Weather Service over the past 40 years. Relatives, friend, neighbors from throughout Putnam, officials and friends from throughout Callahan County and Neighboring Eastland County as well as the United States Congressman were all on hand to thank "John D."

To serve effectively as a volunteer weather observer, one must accurately record and report high and low temperatures, rainfall and other data day in and day out to help provide the total weather data disseminated by the Weather Service.

Presiding as master of ceremonies was Bob Manning of the Fort Worth office of the Weather Service and he introduced guests.

Cong. Charles Stenholm accompanied by Bill Longley, made special ar-

rangements so he could be in Putnam for the event, and to officially make the presentation. Only about 25 such awards will be made this year.

Eastland County Judge Scot Bailey, accompanied by Commissioners C.B. Dill, Richard Robinson and L.D. Owens and Rising Star Constable Gene Hicks presented Mr. Isenhower a citation from the Eastland Court naming him a "good neighbor."

"We're neighbors to the east and you can be sure we're concerned about the weather in Putnam," Judge Bailey said. The Callahan County Commissioners Court, noting that Mr. Isenhower had never severed on the county level, make home an honorary member of that court.

Skip Eally, Weather Bureau official of Fort Worth, presented Mr. Isenhower a bound 70-year record of Putnam weather data.

After making the Holm Award, Cong. Stenholm, in saluting Mr. Isenhower and his wife Roberta, said, "This is what America is all about. Volunteerism is the key.

America could not tick without it."

He jokingly challenged John D. to go for the national record of weather observing: 78 years, and reminded the packed Putnam Community Center audience that the only promise he'd ever made as a politician was to guarantee a "three-inch rain." "When it comes, remember who brought it," he joked.

Turning serious, the Congressmen said that he will be back in Wahington Tuesday afternoon when Congress takes up the War Powers Act, regarding the Marines in Lebanon. "They should have never been sent there," said. "We're presently under a ceasefire and I hope and pray that the Lebanese people will be able to work out their own problems." He said he would vote "no" on keeping the Americans there, but admitted that

plans for removing them now is not easy.

America has strategic interest in many troubled spots of the world, he said, and at home, Congress isn't doing a very good job of reducing government spending. "We're putting back items that were cut earlier."

"But don't let anyone say that we're over-spending on defense." There can only be

peace through a strong America, he emphasized. As a percentage, we're spending less on defense than ever, maybe not as wisely as we should.

"We need to do a better job of prioritizing," he said, "we can't provide all the services that government should without paying for them. You can't have it both ways. Citing Mr. Isenhower's

Texas Land Values Increase

The man was from an adjoining county, and drove over to the Eastland County newspaper offices to put in his advertisement.

"Wanted," he said, in part - "A small piece of land where I can have a garden and keep a few animals..."

This bit of copy seemed to express not only his own wish, but was actually a universal one. For everybody needs a small

piece of land, a little place where he can grow something and feel at home. Wars have been fought over less.

But what is that little piece of land costing these days? A glance at current real estate markets indicates that Eastland County land is priced at \$500 an acre up. That may sound high, but it is in line with prices around the state. For rural land values

in Texas have moved steadily forward during the last 10 years. The jump in 1982 was 17 1/2%.

However, according to Gary Vaughn, vice president of credit operations and standards at the Federal Land Bank in Austin, this upward trend has not been nationwide. Nationally, the market for rural land in a large number of states is reported to have slowed, and in some cases declined during 1982.

Vaughn, who tracks land values for processing loans through the Federal Land Bank, reports the the median price per acre of Texas land reached \$946 in 1982.

"Economic forces behind the demand for rural land in many regions of the state have not been entirely dependent on the net returns from agricultural enter-

prises for many years," Vaughn notes.

He cites the large amount of mineral activity in Texas in the late 1970's and early 1980's as well as urban growth as having a decided influence.

The desire for land as a homesite, for recreation, or just for and investment also helped bring prices up. And on the purchase of land, sentiment plays a part on the decision of which tract to buy. If land "looks" good, or if it is located where a buyer wants to live it will probably bring a premium price.

Foreign land ownership plays a role in prices, more in the south and west than elsewhere. It is difficult to pinpoint everything that is foreign owned, since Americans sometimes make transactions for foreigners.

The latest figures from the USDA show that foreign ownership has increased one million acres over the previous report, with more than one percent of the land foreign owned. This is concentrated in the south (34 percent) and west (31 percent).

The Federal Land Bank has designated a number of land Market Regions for Texas, and studies them for trends in marketing. The only 1982 exceptions to the general rule of increasing land values were noted in the

Canadian River area of the Panhandle, and the Big Bend area.

Various factors were noted as having a bearing on prices in those areas. In some places little desirable land ever comes up for sale. In others, such as the lower

Rio Grande Valley, there are small tracts for sale - but the median price per acre is among the highest in the state.

People often ask the Federal Land Bank Association if land is still a good investment.

Vaughn does not like to give a blanket answer to this question, due to varying conditions, but he indicates there will be a continued interest in rural land.

"It's a basic, limited natural resource," he says, "And remains an attractive

hedge against inflation."

He feels that the upward trend should continue through the next few years, barring any major disaster. And this will continue to provide Texas farmers and ranchers options during severe times for agriculture.

The Garden Editor

Located in North Louisiana at Many, Louisiana, is one of the most beautiful public gardens, and it is the nation's largest privately operated parkland and wild life refuge. Hodges Garden combines multi-level formal gardens with natural scenic walks and drives, picnic areas, conservatory, greenhouses and a dramatic monument illustrating the Louisiana Purchase.

In the early 1940's, A.J. Hodges, a pioneer conservationist, began a vast restoration project in Northwest Central Louisiana to restore barren, cut-over land. Mr. Hodges planted 39,000 acres of pine seedlings and created a 4,700 acre experimental arboretum. In this area an abandoned stone quarry was found. Mr. Hodges and his wife recognized its potential and planned an unique scenic garden using the natural rock formations. The gardens were first opened to the public in 1956, and at the death of Mr. and Mrs. Hodges a foundation was established to perpetuate their dream of the "Garden in the Forest."

The gardens offer an ever-changing floral panorama throughout the four seasons. Camellias, Pansies, Anemones, Narcissus and other plants lend their beauty to the winter gardens, and spring brings forth an outpouring of Tulips, cultivated and wild Azaleas and Dogwoods. Summer will feature Roses, Day Lillies, Crepe Myrtle and annuals. Fall is very vivid with Roses, Chrysanthemums, along with the colorful fall foliage and the various berried shrubs. The lovely Conservatory and Greenhouse

feature exotic collections as well as old favorites.

You may see interesting wildlife which include deer, elk and wild turkey, as well as many migratory and native birds along the scenic routes at Hodges Gardens. The Dogwood, red bud and crab apple are fantastic in the spring. One of my favorites is the hanging purple wisteria.

To go through the gardens, allow a full day, and wear comfortable walking shoes. For those who would be more interested in particular plant cultivars, they should allow some additional time to enjoy the magnificent beauty of the particular plants they are interested in.

Hodges Gardens is a photographer's delight with all the various colors and shapes of plants gathered together in one location. When you visit Hodges Gardens there are two things to remember to bring—your camera and comfortable walking shoes.

You will find Hodges Gardens located twelve (12) miles south of Many, Louisiana on U.S. Highway 171, which intersects with I-20 at Shreveport. 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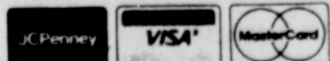
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
