Harpist Sally Goodwin Will Appear In Recital

Sally Goodwin, harpist, will appear in recital at Cisco Junior College, Thursday, October 13, at 7:30 p.m.

Miss Goodwin is already known to many Ciscoans from her concert at the First United Methodist Church in the summer of '82. At that time she was in route to California to perform at the Crystal Cathedral. Stopping in Cisco to visit her aunt, Mrs. Carl Gorr, she played to a capacity audience and was received with enthusiasm.

Goodwin received her training at the Juilliard School of Music in New York. In 1978 she made a debut at Carnegie Hall and then toured Europe, making her continental debut in West Germany. She received the prestigious Karl-Theodor Medal for her outstanding performance at the Schewet-

zingen Palace.

Presently, Miss Goodwin travels across the country as a visiting artist-in-residence and recitalist. Her artistry has placed her in demand on numerous university and artists series. Critics have not only praised her as the "musician's musician" but also acclaimed her for her charm and speaking ability. She plays the harp with sensitivity, warmth, and taste.

Wyley Peebles, chairman of the CJC Fine Arts Department, said that "it's not every day that one has the opportunity to hear a live performance on a harp. We are quite fortunate in having Miss Goodwin in this area."

Admission for the recital will be \$4 (\$1 for public school students). CJC students will be admitted on their activity cards.

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C.H.S. Junior Varsity Loboos Cage Baird Bears In 28-0 Win

Cisco High School's Junior Varsity Loboos football team caged the Baird Bear's J.V. Thursday night and romped across the field to a 28-0 victory in Baird. Their sound defeat of the Bears upped their season record to 2-2 and their district record to 2-0.

Cisco's John Gonzales received the opening kick-off at the Loboos 15-yard line and returned it to the 45 where Cisco began their first scoring drive of the night. With Gonzales at quarterback, the Loboos moved the ball downfield on runs by Danny Kearney and Stanley Callahan to Baird's two-yard line in eight plays. A pitchback from QB Gonzales to Kearney gained the touchdown with 6:20 left in the first quarter. The try for two extra points resulted in an incomplete pass making the score 6-0.

In the second quarter of play, Cisco again gained field position when Michael Wester returned a kick from Cisco's 35-yard line to Baird's 49. Runs by Kearney and pass-plays to Dusty Deitiker and James Berry moved the ball to Baird's 19 yard line in eight plays bringing up a fourth down and six yards situation. A pass from QB Gonzales to Wester was ruled incomplete putting an end to the only drive in the second quarter which threatened to score for Cisco.

In the second half of play, on Baird's second possession of the football, Baird fumbled and Cisco's Brian Nichols recovered the ball at the Loboos 40-yard line.

Runs by Callahan, Steve Abbott, Kearney and QB Gonzales moved the ball to Baird's 16 yard line in six

plays. The next play, a QB-keeper play around the left side made a touchdown for Cisco, but an official threw a flag for a penalty wiping out the score. Instead of a try for two extra points, Cisco now faced a second down needing 21 yards. With the ball resting on Baird's 31-yard line, Cisco QB Gonzales received the snap from center Brian Nichols and threw a pass to Abbott for the first down at Baird's 10-yard line. Callahan moved the ball five more yards on the next play and scored on his second carry from the five-yard line, making the score 12-0 with 1:20 left in the third quarter. A try for two points, in the form of a pitchback to Kearney was no good leaving the Loboos ahead by two touchdowns.

On Cisco's next possession

of the ball, they started out on their own 48-yard line.

Runs by QB Gonzales and Kearney moved the ball downfield to Baird's 42-yard line before penalties moved them back to their own 44.

Needing 25 yards for a first down, QB Gonzales threw two incomplete passes before hitting Abbott for a 56-yard touchdown pass play. This time Kearney took the pitchback from QB Gonzales into the end zone for two extra points making the score 20-0 with 7:27 left in the final quarter of play.

Not yet ready to turn the Bears loose, the Loboos took over the possession of the ball at Baird's 37-yard line late in the game. With Kelly Darr at center, QB Gonzales took the snap and pitched back to Kearney who

scampered to the Bear's 25-yard line for a first down. A handoff to Callahan netted six yards and Wester gained two more on his carry, placing the ball on Baird's 19-yard line.

With four seconds left in the game, Cisco's Callahan took the handoff from QB Gonzales and raced for the final touchdown of the night. A pitchback to Kearney netted the extra two points making the final score 28-0.

Eighth Grade Football Team Loses, But Plays Great Game

Cisco Junior High's eighth grade football team played one of their finest games Thursday night in Baird where they were barely beaten by the home team 12-10. Cisco is now 0-3 for the season.

Baird had first possession of the football but Cisco's defense was tough and forced Baird to punt after three

downs. Cisco's Jason Phillips received the kick at Cisco's 40-yard line and returned it to Baird's 46.

On Cisco's first play, quarterback Jarrod Jeffcoat took the snap from center William Pevey and handed off to Mark McGinnis who gained seven yards. Andy Woody, McGinnis and Brian Wagon moved the ball downfield in four more plays to the three-yard line of Baird. Another handoff to

McGinnis netted the touchdown with 3:20 left in the first quarter. A pitchback to Wagon gained the extra two points following the touchdown making the score 8-0.

Baird came back on their next possession and drove the ball downfield to Cisco territory. With 4:32 left in the second quarter, Baird's Erick Behrens scored on a handoff from quarterback Richard Payne. QB Payne kept the ball and tried for two extra points but he was stopped short of the goal, making the score 8-6.

With neither team able to gain much ground in the remainder of the first half, the half-time score remained at 8-6 in favor of Cisco.

Cisco received the ball in the second half kick-off and seemed to have a good drive going following Woody's return of the kick from Cisco's 20 to Baird's 47-yard line. Runs by McGinnis, Woody and Wagon moved the ball to Baird's 31-yard line in five plays. The drive was killed by Baird when Cisco's Wagon fumbled the ball and Baird's Eddie Neal Gunter came up with the recovery on their own 39-yard line.

From there, Baird marched the ball back downfield and QB Payne scored on a two-yard run early in the fourth quarter. An incomplete pass left the score

at 12-8 in favor of Baird with 5:45 left in the game.

The eighth grade defense of Cisco stiffened and forced Baird to punt the ball on a fourth down and 23-yards needed situation. Baird's punter, Guy Duncan, received the snap from the center and fell with the ball in the end zone for a Cisco safety making the score 12-10 with 43 seconds remaining in the game.

Cisco's offense received the ensuing free kick from Baird's 20-yard line and started their final drive from Baird's 46-yard line. Trying desperately to score again, Cisco's Wagon received the pitchback from QB Jeffcoat and twice passed the ball in the remaining seconds of the game. Both passes fell incomplete and time ran out on the Cisco team leaving the final score at 12-10.

C.J.C. Wranglers Defeat Texas Tech J.V. 27 to 24

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers upped their season record to 3-2 Thursday night in Lubbock where they defeated the Texas Tech Junior Varsity 27-24. Thursday night's game was Tech's first game.

Tech scored first in the game and took a 17-0 lead early in the second quarter. They scored on a 35-yard field goal to make the score 3-0. Then they scored on a 95-yard punt return by Selmon and the extra point kick was good making the score 10-0.

Tech strengthened its lead to 16-0 on a two-yard quarterback sneak. The PAT kick was good making the score 17-0.

CJC's offense then came back and cut the lead on a 32-yard field goal by Walter Rule making the score 17-3. Before half-time, CJC quarterback Scott Ellison hit Wayne Coffey for an 84-yard pass play for the touchdown. The PAT kick by Rule was good making the half-time score 17-10.

In the second half of play, Cisco tied the score on an

eight-yard run by Henry Canady. The PAT kick by Rule was again good, knotting the score at 17-17.

With only 40 seconds used up in the fourth quarter, Tech regained their lead on a 15-yard run. Their PAT kick was good for a 24-17 lead.

Cisco came back and Matt Tiemann sacked the Tech quarterback in the end zone for a safety making the score 24-19 in the final quarter of play.

With 4:14 left in the game, CJC quarterback Lanny Dycus completed a pass to

Matt Simpson for a 33-yard touchdown play to give Cisco the lead at 25-24. CJC gained two extra points on their conversion play, making the final score 27-24.

Dycus and Ellison, who alternate at QB for Cisco, each completed seven of 14 passes in the game and each had one touchdown pass. Ellison finished with 202 yards while Dycus had 100. Wayne Coffey caught three of their passes for 100 yards.

The leading rusher in the game was Henry Canady with 144 yards on 25 carries.

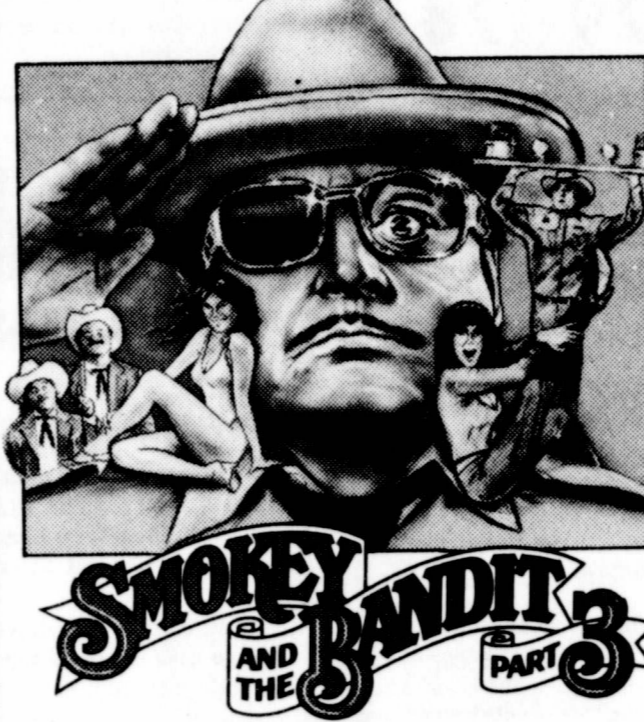

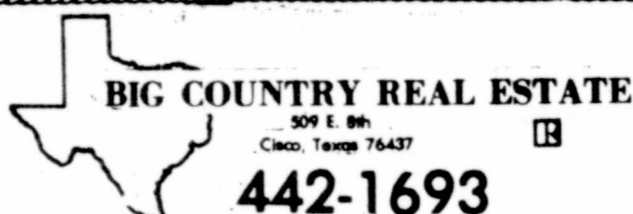

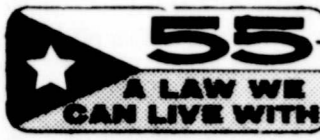
Weldon and Velma Lee lived in Eastland and Comanche counties, and in west Texas. In recent years they have lived in Billings, Montana.

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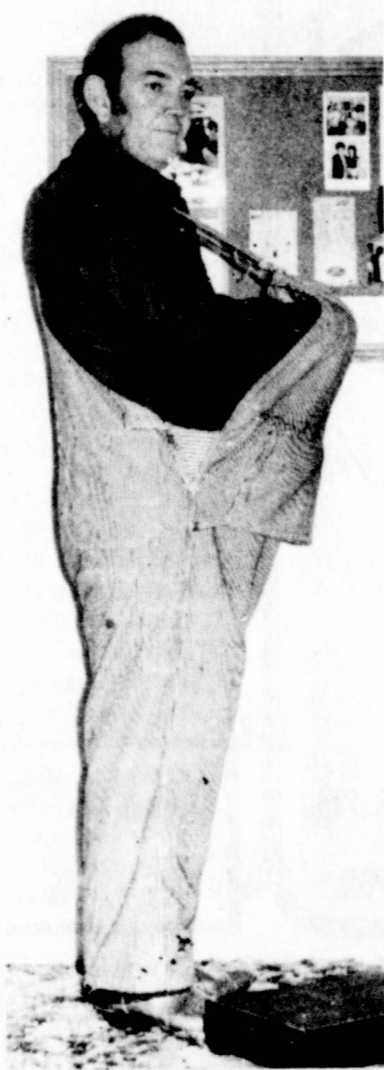

Fishing Report

Terry Wilson

Texas fishermen are confronted with a considerable number of rules and regulations when they load up a boat and head for a favorite inland lake.

They must be aware not only of state-imposed regulations, but in many cases have to consider rules established by the controlling authorities of various reservoirs.

This situation has prompted anglers to ask Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials numerous questions about which agency has authority to set regulations and charge fees for fishing.

The answer, according to TP&WD inland fisheries chief Ernest Simmons, is simple. No entity other than the Parks and Wildlife Commission has the authority to establish fishing regulations in public waters, and no agency other than the Texas Legislature and the Commission has the right to charge fees for fishing in public waters states Simmons.

Managing authorities such as power companies or river authorities can assess fees for entrance or activities such as camping. They also can close certain waters for safety reasons. They cannot, however, set fishing regulations or charge for fishing.

A good example of this is Fayette Power Project Lake near LaGrange, where the Lower Colorado river Authority charges an entrance fee and closes the

plant intake and discharge to fishing

Various managing authorities have posted signs banning the use of trotlines, but such prohibitions on public lakes are not authorized by law and are not enforced by department game wardens, Simmons said. The only public lakes closed to trotline use are Fayette, Bryson Lake in Jackson County, Cottonwood Lake in Wise County, Old Anson Lake in Jones County and several small lakes in Anderson County.

Simmons pointed out, however, that state law prohibits the use of trotlines in vicinity of public boat docks or swimming areas, or in any public area commonly used as swimming or bathing area. They also may not be used in bodies of water 500 acres or smaller which are totally within a state park or in the portion of a stream bordering a state park.

None of these laws affects owner of private lakes, who may charge for fishing privileges and may take their fish by any means which do not have adverse effects on the public or other property owners.

Where does this place our present regulations on Lake Leon? At the present a party of 3 persons fishing on Leon are required to purchase one fishing permit, per person plus 1 boat permit. While the same party which goes to skill is required to only purchase 1 boat permit, and

these revenues, forwarded to the Texas Legislature and the Commission as Mr. Simmons has stated as being the only persons with the authority to impose charges for fishing in public waters.

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Homemaking Hints

County Extension Agent

During the month of September, I presented the Extension Homemaker Club yearbook program on "Women and Estate Planning."

Part of the program stressed the importance of keeping a household inventory. The things inside your home are probably worth far more than you realize.

An inventory of household furnishings and possessions can help determine the value of your property. The inventory is important to estimate your need for insurance, and to settle insurance claims quickly and efficiently.

Your memory may fail you, especially under the stress of a disaster or a burglary, but an inventory will have information needed for a claim.

An inventory should note the date or year of purchase and purchase price for each item. If you don't know when you bought an item or what the purchase price was, you can estimate the replacement cost. This information can help you specify exactly what was lost and its worth.

No matter what type of inventory you make, it's critical to store it in a safe deposit box or some other secure place away from your home. Photographing each wall of every room in your house with all cabinets and drawers open is the easiest way to make an inventory. Also save the negatives from these pictures to make enlargements which could provide important details for an insurance claim. Pictures

should also be taken of such valuables as jewelry, silver, etc.

Another method for making an inventory is to list all household goods, room by room. Include everything on the walls, in the closets, food in the freezer or pantry and items in the garage.

If you have extensive collections of things that are difficult to photograph or tedious to write down, such as book or record collections, use a tape recorder to dictate the information onto a cassette. Microcomputer owners may wish to invest in a software package to maintain a household inventory on a disk.

The Extension Service has two excellent bulletins which are very good when making an inventory. These bulletins are free and may be requested by contacting Mrs. Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent, P.O. Box 189, Eastland 76448 or telephoning 629-2222. The bulletins are entitled Setting Your Household In Order B-1330, and Estate Planning Inventory L-774.

Recipe For The Week

Pears are in season at this time. This week I am featuring a delicious fresh pear cake. Sounds good with cooler, fall weather.

FRESH PEAR CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs, well beaten
- 1 1/2 cups salad oil
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon soda

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 3 cups thinly sliced, peeled pears

Cornbine sugar, eggs, and oil; beat well. Combine flour, soda, and salt; add to sugar mixture, 1 cup at a time, mixing well after each addition. Stir in vanilla, cinnamon, and pears.

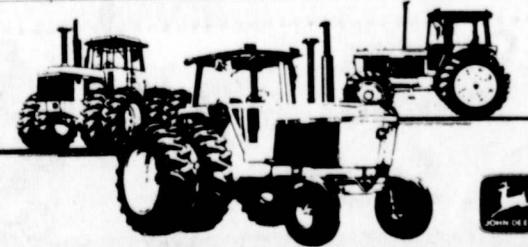

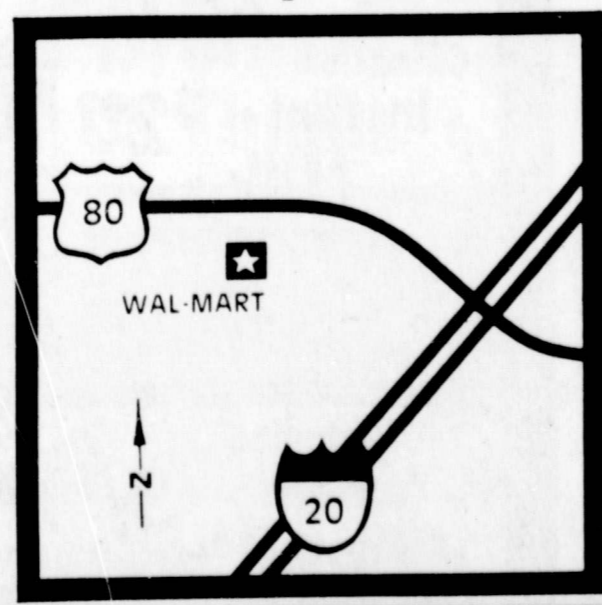

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Andrew Davis Honored On His 83rd Birthday

Thirty guests honored Samuel Andrew Davis, Jr. on his eighty-third birthday at a dinner on September 25, at the home of Roy and Venita Smith, Yellow Mound Road. Mr. Davis was born September 29, 1900 to Laurah Pencia and Samuel Andrew Davis Sr.

As he looked at the birthday cake decorated with an old man in a chair watching TV with four hound dogs at his feet - Mr. Davis smiled with a twinkle in his eye and said "My life may be limited now, but I recollect many great times in my life. I was born 5 miles west of Ranger, the oldest of ten children. When I was two months old we moved to a two story log cabin now known as the OLD DAVIS HOME PLACE. Mama gave birth to four more children in that log cabin and when I was ten years old on November 10, 1910 we moved to Chochoato, Oklahoma. It took us 21 days to make the trip in covered wagons. I drove 32 horses and mules down main street Ft. Worth - could have covered Ft. Worth with a saddle blanket then it was so small. I remeber how wet and cold I was - was getting close to winter. We went from Ft. Worth through Sherman to Chochoata. Things were humming along pretty good until daddy took typhoid fever for ninety-one days. Daddy almost died. He stayed sick most of those two years and we had to sell the property. In the fall of 1913, we left with two teams of horses and six kids and moved to McKinney, Texas. I went to work in a cotton gin compressing cotton. Daddy went to work in an ice hous shoveling coal into the boilers. In the fall of 1916 we moved back to Eastland County and then in 1917 we moved to Clay County to pick cotton. Buddy White and Dick Phillips went with us in wagons. Drilling had started in Holiday in the Panther Field so we got a job with 3 mules to a scrapper and fresno digging slush pits. Had fish tail bits in those days. The drillers' dirt man had quit him so I worked for \$4.50 a day for twelve hours a day. Was three months drilling that well.

In the fall of 1918 we moved back to Eastland, County. In 1919 I went to work two miles west of Ranger hanging pipe and digging ditches. In the fall of 1919 I went to tool dressing for Old Man Healey. Then Albert Flaherty was superintendent for Sun Oil Company - they were gonna drill three wells on the Higginbotham. Me, Aubrey Ramsour and Ellis Hensley dug slush pits 8 feet by 10 feet and 10 feet deep and the cellars for three locations. Bob Hess was driller for Smith and Hess. Bob thought I was smart and he started slapping me around, so I hit him with a nail bar, thought I had killed the old devil. I was pretty much of a man then, so I pulled him upon the rig floor and washed his head then I took him to old Dr. Lee and Dr. Howe, they were in the same office in Cisco. Then I started tool dressing for Smith and Hess and that started my life for 53 years in the oil field. I worked in the big boom in LeRay in 1919 - there were 36,000 people living in tents, houses and shacks; all that is left now is a cement slab where the train depot use to be. Guess I have worked in every oil patch in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. October 13, 1975, I had a stroke, I was working for Royal Reese at that time. So my life may be watching TV and taking care of my hounds and most old friends are gone now - but I have had many good times."

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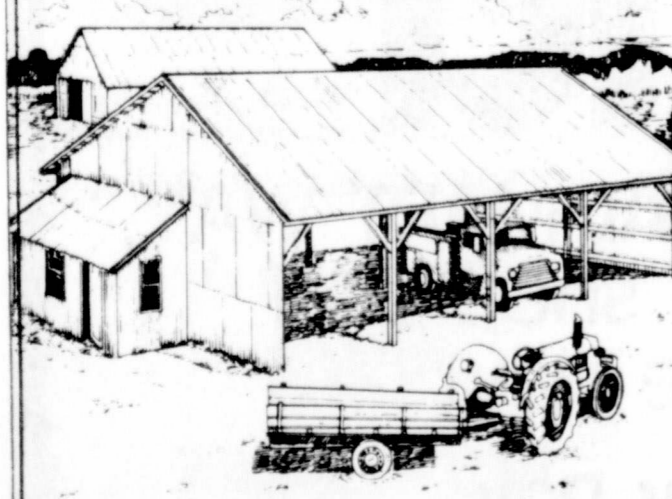

Inventory Property And Determine Value For Insurance

The things inside your home are probably worth far more than you realize. An inventory of household furnishings and possessions can help determine the value of your property, says home economist Nancy Granovsky.

The inventory is important to estimate your need for insurance, and to settle insurance claims quickly and effectively, says Granovsky, a specialist in family resource management with Texas A&M's Agricultural Extension Service.

"Your memory may fail you, especially under the stress of a natural disaster or a burglary, but an inventory will have information needed for a claim," she says.

An inventory should note the date or year of purchase and purchase price for each item. If you don't know when you bought an item or what the purchase price was, says Granovsky, you can estimate the replacement cost. This information can help you specify exactly what was lost and its worth, she explains.

No matter what type of inventory you make, it's critical to store it in a safe deposit box or some other secure place away from your home, notes the specialist.

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Program Repeal Urged

The Residential Conservation Service program required by Congress—and the companion Commercial and Apartment Conservation Service program soon to go into effect—are ineffective and should be discontinued, a Lone Star Gas Company official told Congress today.

Testifying before the House Energy Conservation and Power Subcommittee in Washington this afternoon, Lone Star Vice President Neal Hall said neither program merits and continuation.

"Neither program can ever be cost-effective and, as a consequence, places an unnecessary cost burden on Lone Star's customers," he told subcommittee members.

"Lone Star urges repeal of both of these programs to the benefit of its more than 1.2 million customers who otherwise must continue to pay needlessly higher utility bills."

Hall's comments refer to Congress's mandate that utility companies must offer home energy audits to all eligible customers, and must soon begin offering similar energy audits to eligible commercial and apartment customers. These conservation programs are required by the National Energy Conservation Policy Act of 1978 and the Energy Security Act.

"Unlike the many conservation programs and information Lone Star historically has offered, the RCS program is not cost-effective for our customers," Hall said. The reduction in natural gas usage by customers who have had the FCS audits is minute, particularly when you realize that some 97 percent of customers neither want nor use this program, Hall continued. It has cost Lone Star, and ultimately the customers, some \$2.1 million to date. In other words, Hall said, the RCS program has achieved conservation at the cost of more than \$82 per thousand cubic feet of gas conserved.

Speaking after the hearing, Hall added, "On behalf of its customers, Lone Star has opposed these programs since their inception." He also lauded Congressman Ralph Hall (D-Rockwall) for making the hearing possible. He said, "In doing so, the Congressman has provided consumers of this area an outstanding service."

Rep. Hall represents the 4th Congressional District of Texas.

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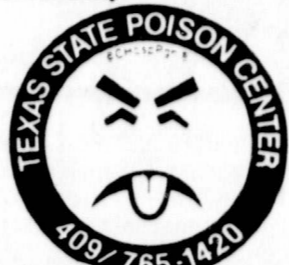
Farm Bureau To Build

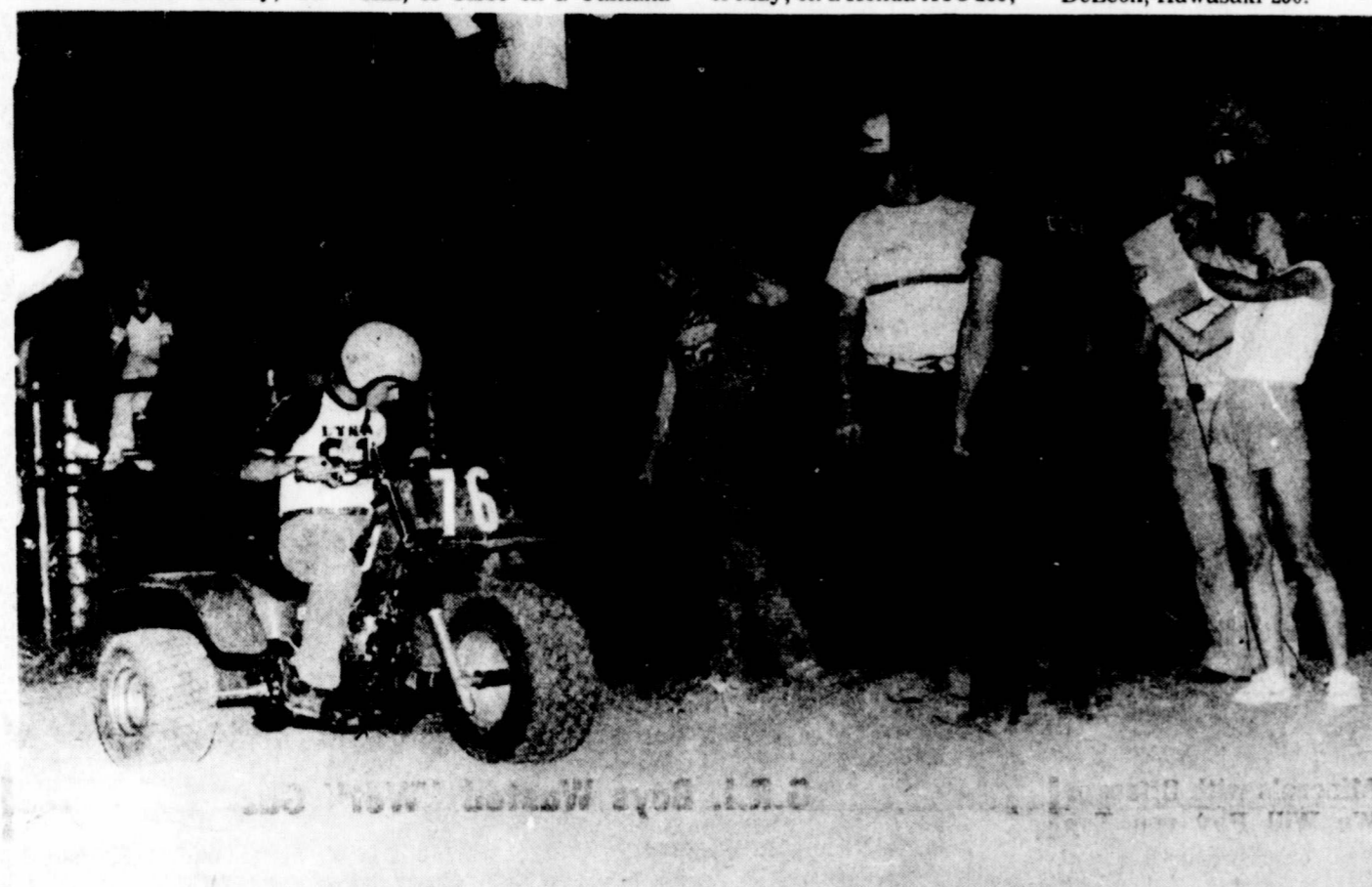

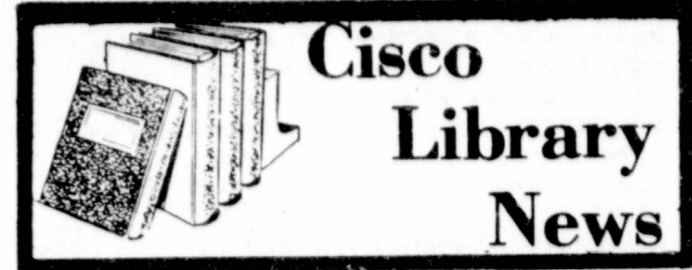

The third and most recent attempt by Abilene Oilman, Jack Grim, to locate the Titanic, that largest steamship of its day that sank in 1912 off the coast of Newfoundland and carried over 1600 passengers to their deaths, was unsuccessful, unless underwater photographs taken during this expedition and still being studied, prove to have located this ill-fated ship.

Mr. Grim reportedly has said he has not yet given up on his search. Nevertheless, no story of discovery could equal the dramatic, firsthand accounts from survivors of the Titanic and passengers of the rescue ship, the Carpathia, as told in a book at your Cisco

Public Library.

"The Sinking of the Titanic and Great Sea Disasters - Thrilling Stories of Survivors with Photographs and Sketches" was edited by Logan Marshall and published in 1912, just months after the Titanic, on Sunday night, April 14, 1912, collided with a gigantic iceberg in the north Atlantic, on its maiden voyage from Northampton, England, bound for New York. Within hours, the ship sank with a loss of 1635 persons from a passenger list of 2340 including some of the wealthiest and most influential citizens of Europe and the United States and passengers in the ship's steerage whose positive identification probably re-

mains unknown.

This book, given to the Library sometime in the past by W.G. Harder, now deceased, contains pictures and illustrations of this believed to be an unsinkable ship, its luxurious interiors, its too few lifeboats, and the area in which the ship's hull supposedly lies some 2760 fathoms below the ocean surface. There are accounts of heroism among crewmen, members of the Ship's band, husbands and wives faced with instant decisions in compliance with the order of the Titanic's Captain, E.J. Smith, of "Women and Children First to the Lifeboats." There are passenger lists, accounts of the Congressional investigation, and throughout the book are revelations of life, customs and philosophies of that era, written in a style that permitted personal opinions of the author to color very carefully some of the presentation.

This is a fascinating book, undoubtedly factual in most

instances, and it will captivate the interest of young and mature readers alike.

One interesting note among those who perished were George W. Widener and his son of Philadelphia. In a recent Library News account of a book of Art given in honor of Mrs. J.J. Porter, one of the contributors of art collections to the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C., was Peter A.B. Widener and son, Joseph, the father and brother of George Widener. The Widener collection was appraised at \$15,971,130.00

There are some new books in the Library, and also some excellent fiction of the not too distant yesteryear - top authors: Edna Ferber, John Erskine, Louis Bromfield, John Galsworth, Erich Maria Remarque, and many others. If it isn't "new," doesn't mean it isn't "good," and many times even "better".

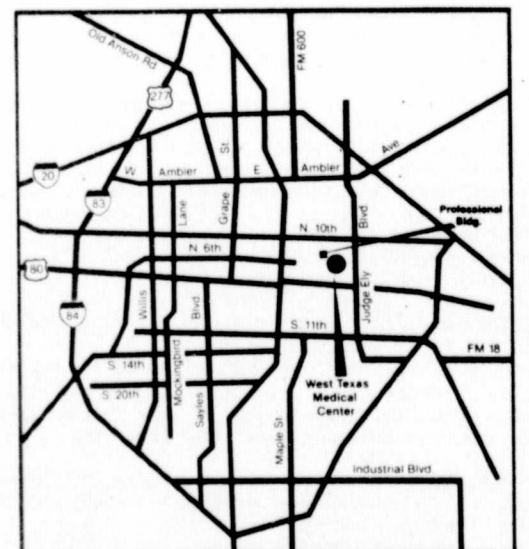

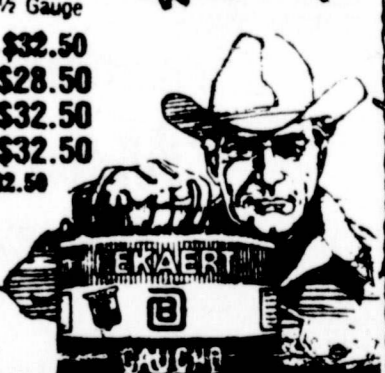
