Wayne's mother reported Wednesday that she was "Sorry to say he wasn't feeling so good at this time. But he does enjoy visits and cards from his many friends from time to time."





Beautiful England By Auto -- Steering From Right, 5-Speed

Roses, heather, and poppies were growing all along the railroad tracks from Paris to Calais. We saw some evidences of World War II bombings and found concrete picket fences interesting.

We had the interesting and uneventful experience of going through customs in Folkstone after crossing the English Channel by ferry.

We were fortunate that both our crossings of the channel were in good weather and we had maximum benefit of sight seeing.

We arrived back in London by train about 7:30 p.m. and went back to the Hotel Kennedy where our heavy luggage was stored during our trip to Paris. Our door man welcomed us like long lost friends. We talked about what a good living he must make because he was very good at his job.

We went to Good Friends, a Chinese restaurant, that evening to eat. We had euten there during our stay in London before going to Paris. The same Chinese waiter waited on us and each time he insisted we eat every bite we were served. Even though we had eaten too much of the delicious food, we ate the remainder at his insistance. This Chinese waiter made me thankful again for my U.S. citizenship, because he told us how much he wanted to come to the United States. He said it was impossible unless someone like us sponsored him. He almost begged, telling us he has a British passport which would help.

We went back to the hotel, repacked and fell in bed around midnight.

We left the Kennedy at 8:00 a.m. on the 29th of June. We had loved London and there was so much more to see, but we were anxious to pick up our rented car and get out in the countryside and visit the people.

Les and Helen took the luggage and went by taxi to the place where we were to get the car. Marian, Clyde, Gilbert, and I went by tube.

The car was a lovely new Peugot station wagon. The man was telling Gilbert some things about it, and I heard Gilbert say in a voice I had never heard him use before, "But don't you have an automatic." We drove out into the 9:00 a.m. London traffic in this nice, new station wagon with the steering wheel on the right side, five speed gear shift to be shifted with the left hand, driving on the left side of the road. Gilbert says, "With four people screaming wrong directions to him." Marian was too scared to assist us in direction giving.

We were not out of London good when a truck passed us, and a piece of timber, which looked like a cross tie, fell off right in front of us. It was bouncing and hit the ground just as we drove over it. Gilbert held steady, and we got through it fine with a little damage to the station

For a while, I thought, since the driving in England was so much harder than any of us had anticipated, it was going to ruin the trip. However, Gilbert with his sense of humor just added to the fun of our feeling of independence and never let the wrong directions we gave him upset him at all. He would just laugh, turn around and try it again.

Our lunch was a picnic in a beautiful park in Oxford. We made a stop in North Leach that afternoon for tea. The young couple who ran the tea room had lived in Dallas briefly. I think they enjoyed our visit with them as much as we did. Their quaint little place was over 300 years old. All the houses in North Leach had slate or thatched roofs as did all the houses in the area in which we traveled. The streets were extremely narrow. Our Peugot was a large car compared to most, and we were really crowded when meeting other

After passing through

Ross on Wye, Tintern and then down a narrow sandy lane, we arrived at Brookland Farm at 5:30. The farm is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Stockdale. We were awed by the beautiful view around the farm. Everything was so green and there were flowers just everywhere.

Mrs. Stockdale served us a wonderful dinner of gazpacho, baked chicken, stuffing with bread sauce, sausage rolled in bacon, cauliflower, potatoes, English peas, scones with butter, and lemon pie. The meringue on the pie was very crisp and was served with whipped cream over it.

After dinner we had coffee in the drawing room. With our coffee we discussed the drive we had had that day. Helen called it "white knuckle day" because of the narrow escapes we had during the drive to Brookland

Gilbert was fascinated by a hover lawn mower which Mr. Stockdale used. It had no wheels, and the centrifugal force of the blade raised it off the ground. Mr. Stockdale said that it is very dangerous, and many feet have been cut with hover

After a restful night, we had a large breakfast. Coffee, cereal, milk, grapefruit juice, toast and homemade marmalade were on the table when we sat down. We ate that and all of us except Les thought that must be our breakfast. We were ready to leave the table, but Les insisted we stay. Sure enough Mrs. Stockdale came in and served us eggs, sausage, ham, and broiled tomatoes.

Mr. Stockdale was very friendly and talkative; while Mrs. Stockdale, though friendly, was somewhat shy. They had traveled a good deal and lived in other countries before retiring from 32 years in the army. Mr. Stockdale expressed doubt that the United States would help England if they were involved in war. He also said he did not think England had the will to fight another war

such as the World Wars. June 30th was the day which Helen had been waiting for. We were to visit Cordiff, Wales, where she had taught school for a year.

We enjoyed the ride from Tintern to Cordiff. We drove through quaint little towns with narrow streets, houses with thatched or slate roofs, and friendly people. Part of the trip was made on the motorway which is the same as our interstate highways. Everywhere we stopped people were ready to give us directions or just visit.


When we arrived in Cordiff, we drove directly to the school where Helen had taught. Though it had been 20 years since Helen had taught there, one teacher was still teaching there. A friendly, young, Welsh man teacher was moving some books and he gave me a set of first grade books which they had used.

We then went to the house where Helen had roomed, and she was so pleasantly surprised when the little old lady with whom she had lived answered the door. We went in and had tea with this real Welsh lady. She kept saying, "I can't believe you came back to see me.'

After a wonderful day of visiting with the Welsh people, we returned to Tintern and strolled through the ruins of the old abbey there. It was founded in 1131.

Mrs. Stockdale had a delicious dinner of fruit cup, lamb roast, mint sauce, current jelly, carrots, cabbage, scones, raspberries and cake with cream. We again had coffee in the drawing room.

After dinner, we enjoyed a walk along the narrow, country roads. All the roads were paved, and hedge rows growing on both side were much taller than we were. The roses, fuschia, rhododendron and cottoneaster were beautiful all along our walk. I was especially interested in the cottoneaster, because I had bought one several

years ago just because it was different and I had never seen one before.

It was cool enough for us to wear light sweaters, and this was the last time we needed any wraps at all

On Friday, July 1, we ate our breakfast of homemade raspberry jam, marmalade, orange juice, cereal, toast, eggs, ham, sausage and coffee, packed the car, took pictures of the Stockdales and their dog, Heidi, said, "Goody-by", and were on our way

Our destination was the Hawkins' dairy farm, Cutsey Farm, which is just outside Taunton. On our way we drove over Bristol Bay and headed for Bath.

In Bath, we took our time during the ruins of the baths which were built by the Romans between 30 and 40 A.D. The bath house is fed by thermal springs. While in Bath, we did some shopping and found good buys in woolen clothing.

We drove on to Wells. While we were in a tea room having tea and pastry, a policeman was giving us a parking ticket.

While the men fretted over the parking ticket, Helen, Marian, Clyde, and I visited Wells Cathederal which I thought was more beautiful than St. Paul's in London.

When we returned to the men, we found they had received advice from a policeman to throw the ticket away.

Driving from Wells, we headed to Taunton and Cutsey Farm. After we reached Taunton, we turned onto country roads where the hedgerows were much taller than the car, and they touched the car on both sides. The roads were a hopeless maze, so we stopped to ask for help. The doctor who lived in the house where we stopped sent his son to lead us to Cutsey Farm. The roads are so confusing there is no way he could give us directions.

With the help of the doctor's son, we did find Cutsey Farm. Mrs. Hawkins was prepared for us. Our flat had three bedrooms, a bath, a large living room with color T.V., and a kitchen which was completely equipped with all the ususal things plus a clothes washer, dish washer, electric tea kettle, iron and ironing board. She had placed a fresh flower arrangement in each room. The arrangements were made of snapdragons, roses, and the largest sweet peas I had ever seen. She served us tea and had put milk, eggs, and bacon in the refrigerator and a loaf of freshly baked

bread on the cabinet. Before we started to drive into Taunton the next morning, Saturday, July 2, we put a Cowboy football sticker on the back of the car and a sign that said, "U.S.A. Driver." We saw almost no new building, but many places were being renovated. . Even though we saw no

terracing, there was no evidence of erosion even in the hilly country. We ate a picnic lunch in

the park near Dunster Castle in Dunster. This was a most elegantly furnished castle which had been carefully maintained and lived in until a few years ago. Only two families have owned it since it was built 1000 years ago. On leaving Dunster, we

headed for Bristol Bay. The country was very mountainous and Gilbert drove in low gear for miles and miles. We saw many different kinds of sheep in this area; the most interesting having very long shaggy wool. In this area, we saw moors. The tedious drive seemed worth it when we looked down upon the beauty of Bristol Bay.

We saw many people sitting in lawn chairs enjoying the sunshine along the roadside. There would be no park or house in sight. They simply drove out into the country. set up their lawn chairs and sat there enjoying the sune.

We always got lost in the maze of narrow (always paved) roads with their hedgerows back to Cutsey Farm. All the cross roads looked just alike. When we found Cutsey Farm again, we had driven 141 miles that day. That doesn't sound like much in the U.S., but it was a long way on those narrow, crooked roads.

We got up early on July 4th, had breakfast, packed a lunch and headed out for another day of adventure. We crossed the Rye River on the way to Salisbury where we did some sight seeing. We then drove to Stonehenge crossing Avon River on the

Stonehenge was an amazing sight. There is no evidence to indicate who built this massive structure of why, although it is thought that it was erected about 4,000 years ago as a religious and cultural center of early herding clans. Farmers were baling hay only 50 feet away from the huge stones.

William Hawkins, the oldest son, took us out to see their 90 dairy cows that afternoon. William, who had his eighteenth birthday while we were there, had taken the entire responsibility of the dairy because of his father's terminal illness. This young man amazed us with his knowledge about each cow. He knew absolutely everything about each one. Standing there in the pasture, he told us how many heiter and bull calves each cow had had, the temperament of each cow, whether the cows calves had good temperaments or not, the amount of feed each cow received, how much milk she produced, the butter fat of the milk, how old she was, and on and on. They fed the cows according to the amount of milk given. The less milk a cow gave; the

less feed she got It took Williams two hours

We enjoyed our evening so much, but we dreaded trying to find Cutsey Farm after dark. We found it easily by 11:00 p.m., and were all so grateful for the experience which we had had.

July 6th was a restful day, for we did not leave the flat until about 11:15. We went into Taunton to a good museum then drove to Wellington to the monument to the Duke of Wellington. It was built in 1817. The citizens said the Duke never visited Wellington, but they just wanted to build a monu-

ment for him. We were up at 5:45, had breakfast, and left the flat by 7:45 on July 7th. We planned to go to Exeter but on the way we decided to go to Plymouth instead.

We found Plymouth and the bay to be a beautiful place with such friendly people we found it hard to believe we were strnagers in a foreign country. There are many modern buildings (a rare sight) as it was bombed severly during World War II. The ruins of a large cathederal were left as a memorial for the Civilians who were killed during the

As we sailed along the bay, seeing frigates that had participated in the Falkland Islands War, nuclear subs, warships, and a World War II submarine, it was hard to imagine the Pilgrims sailing away from here in the Mayflower so many years

We had seen clotted cream in grocery stores ever since we started traveling about the country and wanted to try it. We did eat some with strawberries in Plymouth. It was rich and good but not what we had expected. Mrs. Hawkins had told us that it is a lot of trouble to prepare.



We had driven 1194 miles in our rented car, and I still marvel at how wonderfully Gilbert handled the task of driving while giving all the rest of us many good laughs because of his even disposition and good sense of

We had to leave our hotel at 7:45 a.m. on July 9th to go to Gatwick Airport. Gilbert left his cowboy hat on the bus, and we didn't thing of it until we were already in the

American Airlines line to check to our luggage. We just said "So what, it's gone." We turned around to see the bus driver coming toward us with cowboy hat in hand. When he spotted the hat on his bus he got it and

We landed at D.F.W. at 1:15 p.m. to end a trip we could never forget because of a beautiful country of friendly, helpful people.







A 4,500 ft. developmental well is planned by Delta Oil & Gas Co. of Breckenridge. The location is in Stephens County's T&PRR Co. Survey. Well's designation is the No. 1 Garland Coody "B". It is in the Stehphens Regular Field.

Seely Oil Co. of Ft. Worth has filed for permit to drill below casing on the No. 2 T.P. Robertson "61". It is a 4,500-ft. developmental well in the Ann T. (Mississippi) Field. Drillsite is one mile northeast of Crystal Falls. Location is in a 160-acre lease in Stephens County's BBB&CRR Co. Survey.

At a location two miles east of Brazos, Chester R. Upham, Jr. of Mineral Wells has finaled a new gas producer in Palo Pinto County's Calabria Conglomerate Field.

The well is designated at the No. 1 Calabria Dobbs Valley. It indicated ability to flow 412,000 Cf gas per day on a 7/8-in choke. It was rated at 1,075,000 CFD on ab-

solute open flow.

Location is in a 160-acre lease in the Allen Williams Survey. Bottomed at 4,365 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,800 to 3,806 feet into the hole.

-The No. 2 Bert Simmons indicated ability to flow 176,000 CF gas per day on a half-inch choke. it too was given an identical rating on absolute open flow. The well, located in the Palo Pinto Regular Field, is located in a 280-acre lease three miles south of Brad. The well will produce from an interval 3.544 to 3,705 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,200 feet.



11 Amendments

Let me begin by saying that you are in for some very "dry" reading. There is no way to make constitutional amendments sound exciting but please do read about them.

On November 8th, eleven (11) constitutional amendments will be on the ballot for the people to vote either for or against. For the benefit of the voters in my district, over the next few weeks I will be explaining each proposal stating the views of both supporters and opponents of each. I do this in hope that you will all get out to cast an infromed ballot wether or not you are in favor or opposed to the proposed amendments.

Proposition -1 on the ballot would allow counties with a population of less than 30,000 to have fewer than 4 constable and justice-of-the -peace precincts.

Supporters say many small counties do not need 4 constables and 4 JP's and requiring that many for smaller counties serves no purpose and waste the county's money. They feel it is much better to have one qualified and adequately paid JP and constable rather that 4 to 8 who are underqualified and underpaid.

Opponents say lowering the number of elected local officials sets a bad precedent and could be cited by a future Legislature to help justify cutting th number of county commissioners.

Proposition -2 would replace the urban homestead exemption from a \$10,000.00 limit to a one acre limit and would be retroactively applied to all homesteads in Texas.

Supporters feel since urban land values are inflated, the constitutional exemption is protecting fewer and fewer urban homesteads from forced sale for debt. The \$10,000.00 exemption used to be reasonalbe but now may represent just a traction of the value of a newlypurchased lot, leaving anyone purchasing a lot for more than that amount without homestead protection. Since more and more often creditors stand to gain something by forcing a sale, naturally they are doing so and the currrent exemption does not protect people's homesteads as it was intended. Supporters also say basing the exemption on land area instead of value would make periodic revisions of the exemption limit unnecessary. Rural homestead exemption has always been figured by area, not dollar

value. Opponents feel one-acre for an urban homestead is too much and treats claimants in different locations unfairly. Land in an affulent section of a large town is more valuable than land in a poorer section. They feel making it retroactive would be harmful to creditors who now have contracts and might be found to unconstitutional. Some opponents feel

the \$10,000.00 is too generous since it does not include improvements, such as a home, and a homestead claimant can invest large sums of money making improvements yet creditors would not be able to get money owed to them because the investment was in the homestead.

Proposition -3 would authorize the Legislature to enact legislation (which it has already done contingent on passage of this proposal) that permits commodity boards to collect a refundable fee on product sales if the fee is approved by a referendum of the producers. The fee would be used by the board to promote the production and marketing of that agricultrual product. Passage of this proposition would allow SB 7 to take effect. This legislation which was passed last session permits commodity boards established before September 1, 1983 to adopt a rule denying an exemption of the fee at the time of process or sale of the product; however, the producer may still apply for a refund of that fee. Should any commodity boards be established after September 1, 1983 or should the territory of an existing board be expanded, producers, themselves, could vote to deny the exemption. Refunds of the fee would still be allowed. Should this proposition fail SB 7 would have no effect.

Supporters say that commodity boards do a good job which is beneficial to producers and that they need the fees to carry out their programs of promotions, marketing and researching their products. If revenue is cut, the influence of Texas boards will be diluted a time the national commodity organizations are enlarging or expanding foreign

markets for their members. Opponents say that even though the fee is refundable upon request, it is still a forced fee if there is no option for exemption in the first place. They feel commodity boards are not so popular with agricultural producers that they should be granted special taxing powers. Opponents say Texas voters have rejected similar propositions twice before and it should be permanently laid

Hopefully these admittedly very brief explanations have been informative and will help you in making a decision on how to vote on the propositions. Next week I will continue discussion on propositions 4, 5, and 6. It is not my intent to sway you in anyway; however if you would like additional information on a particular proposition, please contact my Austin office for a more complete analysis which has been done by the House Study Group, a research group funded through money from many representatives' office budgets.







This day and time we hear the word recycle used with almost everything. The gardeners have been recyleing for hundreds of years by using compost.

There is no item in the original state that has a claim on the word compost. Compost is a decayed product of nature that has changed from its natural state into a decomposed state. To understand the composting procedure, think of it as a way of speeding up the natural decomposition of organic waste material (plant, vegetable and fruit) by micro-organisms, such as fungi and bacteria which consume this waste and produce nutrient-rich compost. In the forset this process takes many years.

There are packaged compost items made from animal manure, gin waste, rice hulls, sugar cane, pine, saw dust ect.

You can make your own compost. This can be done by accumulating your grass clippings, leaves and garbage in what is called a compost pile. These items are added to a controled pile and the decayed or composted material is removed from the bottom of the pile. As the items decay the center of the compost pile builds up a very high heat and in some commercial companies piles of compost has caught fire with this extream heat. Composting micro-organisms produce heat within the pile due to the excess energy they release. This in turn promotes faster composting. However, it is necessary to prevent this excess energy from escaping at a faster rate than it is generated.

Micro-organisms require water for reproduction and decomposition activities; therefore. the material must remain moist. It is necessary to regulate the moisture content which will vary with the type of material. Basically the moisture is sufficient when the surface of the particles glisten - the material should be as damp as a well squeezed-out sponge. You should check the moisture

content frequently. If there is an excess of highin-carbon materials (dead leaves), extra nitrogen may be added as an activatior. The best organic activators are packaged or animal manuers, dried blood, real bone meal, and hoof and horn meal. Some commercial activators are high in nitrogen but chemically prepared (such as lawn fertilizer), and thus may adversely effect efficient natural organisms including earthworms. The resultant compost may also not have the same disease-resident properties.

Most commercially prepared activators contain innoculants of several types of organisma, enzymes and hormones which have to be dissolved in water. This often makes the conditions tooo wet, and causes an unpleasant putrid smell. These chemical preparations are not essential if local bacteria are present from garden soil. I recommend compost by Phostrogen, applied in powder form.

There are many home compost bins some are very good but most lack several of the necessary items needed to make good compost. The English have been composting for many years and we can benefit from their years of experience.
