Loboes Keep Hopes Alive With Win Over Albany

Teams Will Take On Anson This Week

The Loboes of Cisco High School kept their hopes alive for a possible District 9-AA play-off position Friday night when they defeated the Albany Lions 15-14 in a tough, district contest. The game was played in Albany and was not decided until the final seconds of the game.

The Loboes will be taking on the Anson Tigers here Friday night as district competition continues. Kick-off in Chesley Field will be at 7:30 p.m.

The Loboes are now 2-1 in district play and 4-2 for the season. Anson's varsity team has not won a game this year and they were defeated last Friday night by Jim Ned with a final score of 26-13.

Thursday night, the seventh, eighth and Junior Varsity football teams will travel to Anson for their games. The seventh grade game will begin at 5 p.m., followed by the eighth at 6 and the J.V. at 7:30 p.m.

Anson's seventh grade team is 1-2 for the season while Cisco's seventh grade is 0-2. The eighth grade team of Anson is undefeated at 4-0 for the season while Cisco is 0-4.

Cisco's Junior Varsity is undefeated in district play with a 3-0 record, while their season record is 3-2. Anson's J.V. is undefeated for the season with a 5-0 record.

In last Friday night's game against Albany, Lobo fans were kept sitting on the edges of their benches as the two teams battled it out on the field to see who would claim the final victory. As Cisco scored its final touchdown and two-point

conversion, Lobo fans seemed to go crazy with enthusiasm for the Loboes.

Both Cisco and Albany's teams only gave up two touchdowns each during the hard-fought battle for points. The offense for each team was able to score a touchdown and extra point in the first quarter of play.

Albany came back and scored another touchdown in the second quarter of play while the Lions defense held the Loboes scoreless for the remainder of the first half of play. Neither team was able to score in the third quarter.

In the final quarter of play, Cisco's defense tightened up and held the Lions from breaking loose for any long-distance runs. However, Cisco's offense began working for more points to be added to the scoreboard.

With less than three minutes left in the game, Cisco scored the final touchdown of the game and trailed the Lions by only one point. Electing to go for the win, Cisco completed a successful conversion play for two extra points to put the Loboes ahead by one. Then it was up to the defense to hold Albany until the remaining time left in the game expired.

The game started out with Albany receiving the opening kick-off and beginning their first drive from their own 32-yard line. Four plays later, a handoff was fumbled and Cisco covered the ball at Albany's 47. With Joe Perry at quarterback and Craig Foster at center, the Loboes started out their first drive of the night with a handoff to Johnny Ramirez who picked

up a first down and moved the ball to Albany's 29-yard line. Ramirez took the second handoff from QB Perry, but this time the ball was knocked loose and Albany's James Schkade recovered it for the Lions.

Beginning the drive on their own 31-yard line, Albany moved the ball up to the 41 and gained a first down in three plays. The Lions were then pushed back by Cisco's defense and three plays later, on a third and 14 situation, Schkade fumbled the pitchback and Cisco's Johnny Seabourn came up with the recovery for the Loboes at Albany's 29-yard line.

The Loboes began their second drive of the game and lost one yard on the first play, a pitchback to Doug Hendricks. Another two yards was lost on the next play as the result of a Cisco penalty. With the ball resting on Albany's 33-yard line, QB Potter threw an incomplete pass to Patrick Qualls on

third down. Facing a fourth down and needing 13 yards from Albany's 33 for a first down, Cisco elected to go for the yardage. Another pass, this time to Tommy Elrod in the end zone, was caught and juggled, but Elrod held onto the ball for the touchdown. Glen Starr held the ball and Butch Jessup kicked the extra point to give Cisco a 7-0 lead with 6:37 left in the first quarter.

Albany received the following kick-off from Cisco's Jessup and started their own drive from the 19-yard line of the lions. Runs by Bart Tucker, Schkade and Albany's quarterback Jimmy Walsworth picked up three first downs in nine plays and moved the ball to Cisco's 22-yard line. A pitchback from QB Walsworth to Schkade netted the touchdown for the Lions. Jimmy Cooper held the ball for the extra point while

Wranglers Are 4-2 After 43-10 Defeat Of WTS-JV

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, now 4-2 for the season following their sound defeat of the West Texas State Junior Varsity, will be on the road again this week as they take on Texas A&M's junior varsity at Kyle Field in College Station Thursday. Kick-off will be at 7:30 p.m.

CJC soundly defeated West Texas State in an afternoon game last Friday in Canyon by the score of 43-10. Cisco scored two touchdowns in the first quarter, a touchdown, a field goal and a safety in the second quarter, a field goal and a touchdown in the third quarter and a final touchdown in the fourth quarter.

Cisco's defense only allowed West Texas State to score a field goal in the first quarter and a touchdown in the third quarter.

Twenty seconds into the game, Cisco scored on their second play from scrimmage with a 74-yard pass play from quarterback Scott Ellison to Matt Simpson.

Walter Rule booted the extra point making the score 7-0. West Texas State's lone score in the first quarter came on a 40-yard field goal kick by Ted Cotinski.

Cisco came back in the same quarter and scored on a nine-yard pass from quarterback Lanny Dycus to Wayne Coffey. The kick by Rule was good for a 14-3 first quarter score.

In the second quarter, CJC scored on a 12-yard pass play from QB Dycus to Coffey. The extra point kick by Rule was good giving Cisco a 21-3 lead.

Two more points were added to Cisco's lead when Wrangler Marvin Williams trapped a West Texas State running back in the end zone for a safety. The score was then 23-3.

The final points of the first half were made by Rule when he boomed a 54-yard field goal to set a CJC school record. The half-time score was 26-3.

In the second half of play, Rule opened the scoring in the third quarter with a 38-yard field goal moving Cisco's lead to 29-3. Mike Robertson then added six more points to the score on an eight-yard pass play from QB Ellison. The PAT kick by Rule was good for a score of 36-3.

West Texas State then came back for their only touchdown of the night on a 69-yard pass play from quarterback Tony McCray to Brent Buttain. Cotinski kicked the extra point for a 36-10 score.

Cisco added its final points to the scoreboard in the fourth quarter of play on a nine-yard run by Ty Harding. Rule's kick was again good, making the final score 43-10.

In individual statistics, Coach Bob Keyes stated Tuesday that freshman Marvin Williams had a very good game against West Texas State. The 185-pound linebacker from San Antonio was credited with being the number two tackler in the game, blocking a field goal attempt, recovering a fumble, and trapping a running back for a safety.

Quarterback Scott Ellison completed 9 of 16 passes for 202 yards and two touchdowns, while quarterback Lanny Dycus completed 8 of 23 passes for 93 yards and two touchdowns. Coach Keyes said Dycus also put two, long, 70-yard, passes into his receivers hands for possible touchdowns but they were both dropped.

Ellison is a 200-pound sophomore from Brady and Dycus is a 210-pound sophomore from Abilene Cooper.

Also of Abilene is Wayne Coffey, a 150-pound split end who carried the ball seven times for 73 yards and two touchdowns. Walter Rule, a 150-pound freshman kicker from Corpus Christi, had a perfect game last Friday when he hit all his extra points and kicked two field goals.

Cisco's defense also sacked West Texas State's quarterback six times throughout the course of the game.

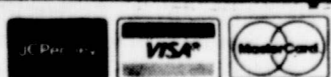



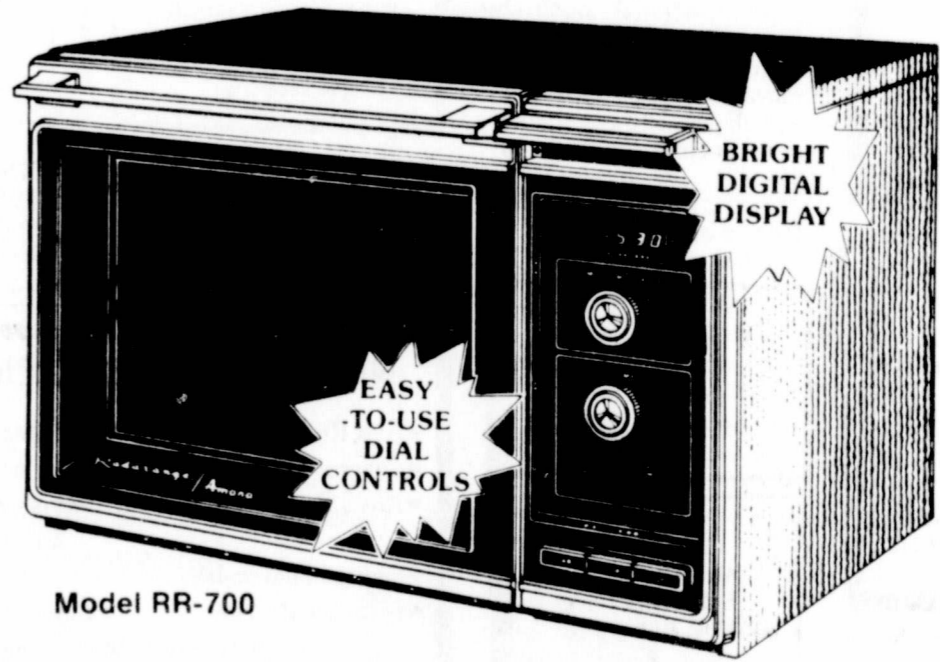

Credit Directors Attend Conference

Stephenville-Directors of Credit Association (PCA) the Stephenville Production joined approximately 160

other Farm Credit officials attending the 1983 PCA Directors Conference held recently in San Antonio.

Directors representing the association were Chairman Bill Evans of Dublin, Fred Klutts of Hamilton, and Jackie Laughlin of Bluff Dale.

The purpose of the conference, held annually, is to update members of Production Credit Association boards of directors on matters concerning Farm Credit.

Featured speaker for the occasion was Peter J. Carney, president of the Federal Farm Credit Banks Funding Corporation. Carney explained how the Farm Credit System obtains the funds eventually passed along to the nation's agriculture industry.

A highlight of the conference was presented by J.A. Rogers, president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas, of a commemorative plaque honoring the Production Credit Association's 50th anniversary. The association was chartered in January of 1934.

Stephenville PCA is one of 30 member-owned Production Credit Associations in Texas. Collectively they serve more than 16,000 of the state's agricultural producers. Last year more than \$2 billion was loaned through Texas PCAs.

At mid-year the Stephenville Production Credit Association had more than \$40 million loaned to 571 member-borrowers in Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Hamilton, Hood, Johnson, Parker, Somervell, Tarrant, and Wise counties.

PCAs have been a source of agricultural loans since the first association was chartered on September 11, 1933 in Champaign, Illinois. On October 10, the first PCA loan was made to Milton W. Warren at Mansfield, Illinois. The loan was for \$830.00 and was used to purchase 30 head of 850 pound cattle.

Today, there are 442 PCAs with more than \$2 billion in loan volume. Nationally they serve the credit needs of more than 38,000 farmers and ranchers.

If you are feeling great and all's right with the world, you'd better read the sports section - the part about the Cowboys.

My ruminations - mental, not physical - began when I started working on a crafts kit I bought to make up for a Christmas present - because I liked it and because I could use the patterns and directions to make gifts for several people. (Remember that I'm the one who's gung ho for the personal-touch gift.)

The kit is for needlepointed butterflies to the back of which tiny magnets are attached. The butterflies will stick on your refrigerator door until you get tired of them. Then you can drop them in a kitchen drawer until you feel like chasing butterflies again or until the person who gave them to you comes to see you.

The first thing to do when you buy a kit of any genre is to check the contents. I did. One yarn color short.

Short on yarn was not really serious. One place or another I probably have enough yarns on hand to

crochet an afghan for the courthouse. But I paid for "the who-ole thi-ing." I didn't get what I paid for.

After adding the needed yarn, I began filling in the holes in the needlepoint canvas per printed directions with references to the color photographs of the finished product - also as directed.

What I was producing did not match the photos. Well aware that I might not be actually following directions, I checked. And rechecked.

So, I compromised. Using the directions, the pictures and the knowledge from

years of needlepointing, I came up with some pretty nice butterflies, and I can make some more.

I am not satisfied with this. All my life I have emphasized the importance of following directions. I have been careful when I give instructions, and I expect them to be followed.

If I hadn't worked enough needlepoint to recognize quickly that what I was doing didn't match the pix, I'd have had nothing to show for my time and money.

A beginner, no matter how eager for the end desired, would be neither encouraged

nor interested in pursuing needlepoint as a hobby.

Nor other things.

A misprint may cause a recipe to have a Tablespoon of salt instead of a Teaspoon. The taste difference is considerable, not to mention noticeable.

These are minor examples. The economy is not going to shatter if I never buy another crafts kit of any kind. The budget won't collapse because one dish of food is ruined.

What about the errors that cause the recall of all these cars?

What about the blueprints,

or inattention to blueprints, that cause buildings and bridges to collapse?

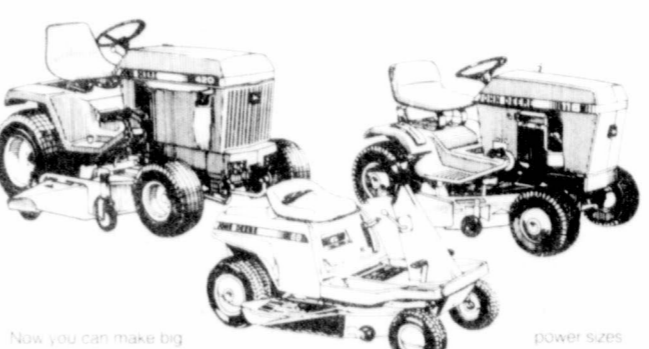
A lopsided wing on a yarn butterfly is no big deal, but a lopsided wing on an airplane is.

Schkade kicked it between the uprights to tie the score at 7-7 with 2:11 left in the first quarter of play.

Cisco's Hendricks received the ensuing kick around Cisco's 10-yard line and returned it to the 31 to set up Cisco's next possession of the ball. Hendricks then picked up two yards on a handoff from QB Perry and Mike Williams gained one yard on a reverse play. QB Perry then kept the ball on the Lions 13-yard line. Another keeper play by QB Perry moved the ball three more yards. Two incomplete passes brought up a fourth down and seven yards situation from Albany's ten-yard line. Lobo Jessup attempted a 30-yard field goal which was ruled no good, leaving the score tied at 7-7 with 11:44 left in the second quarter.

Albany took over possession of the ball at their own 20 but two plays later, Schkade fumbled the ball and Cisco's Ramirez recovered the fumble at Albany's 39-yard line.

Unable to gain a first down, Albany retook possession of the ball their own 35

to begin their second, and final, scoring drive of the game. On the first play of the drive, a handoff from QB Walsworth pass to Jeff Balliew set the ball on Cisco's ten-yard line. A quarterback sneak gained three more yards and a handoff to Schkade got the go-ahead touchdown for the Lions. Again Schkade split the ball with the ball held by Cooper to make the score 14-7 with 6:59 left in the second quarter.

On Albany's next possession of the ball, they started out on their own 30-yard line but in eight plays they were knocking on the door of Cisco's goal line with the ball resting on the one. The ball was moved downfield on runs by QB Walsworth, Tucker, Mike Ivy and Schkade. Needing just one more yard for another touchdown, Albany's Tucker took the handoff and fumbled the ball which was recovered by Cisco's Sean Manire at the three-yard line.

Unable to gain a first down again, Cisco was forced to punt the ball and Jessup's kick was high and short coming down at Cisco's own 36-yard line. With only 36 seconds remaining in the first half of play, Albany went to the air to try and add some more points to the scoreboard. The Cisco defense and a penalty by the

Lions pushed the ball back to Cisco's 43-yard line making the Lions need 17 yards for a first down. Time ran out in the first half with the Lions still trying for a first down or a touchdown.

Both teams came back in the second half of play determined to keep the other from scoring. Both defenses did good jobs during the third quarter of play with only one first down given up by each team during the first six possessions of the ball.

Late in the third quarter, Albany received a Cisco punt at their own 20-yard line to set up an Albany drive. On the first play, a handoff to Schkade, the ball was fumbled and Cisco's Starr recovered the loose ball at the 20.

Cisco then went to work in their best drive of the quarter, gaining two first downs in six plays and moving the ball to Albany's one-

yard line. The ball was moved downfield on runs by Ramirez, QB Perry and Josh Potter. Needing only one yard for a touchdown, Cisco's QB Perry tried and then Ramirez tried for the score, but the game officials ruled they did not cross the goal-line, turning the ball over to Albany at their own one-yard line.

In ten plays, Albany moved the ball to Cisco's 45-yard line picking up three first downs in the process. The Lobo defense stiffened and Albany was forced to punt the ball in a fourth down needing five yards for a first.

Cisco Hendricks fielded the ball around the Loboes 15 and returned it to the 25 where Cisco put the ball into action. Four plays later Cisco's Jessup punted the ball on a fourth down with the Loboes needing 20 yards for a first, following a QB sack by Albany's Brad

Petree at Cisco's 15.

The ball was touched by Albany's Cooper at the Lions 46-yard line, but he was unable to hold onto the ball and Cisco recovered the kick at the Lions 48.

Runs by Hendricks, Ramirez and Potter moved the ball to Albany's 32-yard line in three plays. A QB

keeper play moved the ball into the end zone, but game officials ruled that QB Perry had stepped out of bounds at the three-yard line of Albany. Runs by Ramirez and QB Perry failed to gain any yardage on the next three plays, but a handoff to Hendricks on the fourth down netted the touchdown. With only 2:36 remaining in the game and the Loboes trailing by the score of 14-13, Cisco decided to try for a two-point conversion. On the snap from center Foster, QB Perry kept the ball and ran

into the end zone giving Cisco the winning points of the game, making the final score 15-14.

Lundstrom Case Verdict Appealed

The verdict rendered last month in the case of the State of Texas vs. Loyal Lundstrom has been appealed to the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland and detail work in connection with the matter is now being done, Defense Attorney Bill Hart told this newspaper Monday.

A 91st District Court jury found Lundstrom guilty in the shotgun slaying of his wife in Cisco last March and assessed a life term penalty. Lundstrom was taken to the State Penitentiary a few days after the trial ended on September 6th.

A transcript of the trial, which lasted for some two weeks, and other papers will be filed with the Eastland appeals court and observers said it would probably be early 1984 before the court can hold a hearing in the case.

County Commissioners

At Monday's meeting, County Commissioners granted a request from Dayton Hall, Eastland County probation officer, to allocate funds for office equipment.

Hall explained that his salary and the salaries for part-time help is paid by the state from probation fees. But his various office expenses are not paid, Hall said.

Cost of equipment, including a desk, typewriter, filing cabinets and an air conditioner is estimated to be about \$4,000. Commissioner C.B. Dill said the furnishings would come under law enforcement expenses and could be paid for out of revenue-sharing funds.

Hall's request to purchase

two two-way radios already owned by the county would be available for Hall to use. The commissioners gave permission to Houston Saterwhite of Sun Exploration and Production Co. to cross county road No. 459 in Precinct 2 with a 16-inch oil pipeline.

A delegation of about 25 Lake Leon residents requested that county funds be used to repair the road to

their property. The road runs from Farm-to-Market Road 570 south to the Lone Cedar Contry Club and serves about 39 houses on the north side of the lake.

Commissioners took no action, and instead informed the residents that the Texas Highway Department would have to make the decision about repaving the roadway.

Bill Greenhaw, representing the Desdemona Fire

Department, asked commissioners to explain the loss of county funds to his department this month.

He was informed that as of Sept. 12 each fire department must submit a monthly written report in order to collect the \$100 subsidy from the county. Greenhaw, who said he was unaware of the new requirement, agreed to comply with the request.

In other business, Steve Mills, an insurance agent, discussed possible insurance plans for county employees.

A total of 2,367 drilling applications were processed by the Railroad Commission in September.

In August, 12,320 applications were processed as oil and gas operators sought to avoid a \$100 drilling permit fee that went into effect on Sept. 1. The fee will provide funds for plugging abandoned wells and general enforcement of state pollution prevention laws involving oil and gas operations.

The September total included 1,820 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 55 applications to deepen existing holes, 193 applications to plugback existing holes, and 24 applications for service (non producing) wells. Operators also filed 275 amended drilling applications.

Applications for new oil and gas holes in September included 260 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 49 in the Refugio area (District 2), 139 in the Southeast Texas (District 3), 111 in deep South Texas (District 4), 49 in East central Texas (District 5), 76 in East Texas (District 6), 294 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 123 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 219 in the Midland area (District 8), 208 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 220 in North Texas (District 9), and 72 in the Panhandle (District 10).

In September a year ago, the Commission processed 2,667 new oil and gas test applications, 79 deepening applications, 236 plugback applications, 77 service well applications, and 785 amended applications.

In September 1983, the Commission processed 25 oil and 98 gas discoveries. For the same period a year ago, 52 oil and 128 gas discoveries were processed.

In September, operators reported 487 oil and gas dry holes.

People n Things

AS EVERYBODY knows, the nicest thing about any trip is getting back home. And we're glad to be back after a delightful month in Jamaica, a comparatively new nation with dominion status in the British Empire. They're in their 21st year as an independent country.

The trip home began last Saturday at 10:30 a.m. (Cisco time). The Air Florida airliner, a Boeing 737, needed only an hour and a half to fly over Cuba and into Miami, Fla. There, a two hour layover gave us time enough to go through customs and get baggage to American Airlines for the two and a half hour flight to DFW Airport.

The Miami-DFW flight was in a DC-10, one of the super big airliners. They haul around 400 passengers and there were perhaps 275 aboard for the Saturday flight. The passenger area has seats nine in a row in three compartments. They served lunch, which was your choice of chicken breast or fillet steak with all the trimmings.

The big plane arrived at DFW around 4 p.m.—during half-time at the Texas-OU football game. The Longhorns were three points behind when we first heard but the third quarter, which we heard on the car radio,

had the Longhorns scoring three TDs to put the game on ice.

After spending Saturday night with relatives in Arlington, we drove home Sunday. We needed some concentration to keep on the right side of the roads after driving on the left side for the past month in Jamaica.

PICKING UP the Saturday morning Star-Telegram in Fort Worth, we read an interesting item in their editorial page "Sidelights" column by Miss Karen Potter of the state news staff. Miss Potter recently was in Eastland for several days covering the Lundstrom murder case for The Star Telegram.

We quote Miss Potter's "Sidelights" piece, as follows: "The Eastland County Courthouse is my favorite of those that I've visited in The Star-Telegram's circulation area. Horned toads are alongside the Lone Stars of Texas that are sculpted in the plaster border around the district courtroom. Yep, horned toads and the scales of justice and the Lone Star symbol proud of plaster right next to each other. Toads are important to the people of Eastland County, they tell me.

"And in a display case at

one entrance to the courthouse is a stuffed toad in a velvet-lined coffin. He is Old Rip, and folklore has it that he was an incredible survivor—still alive after being buried in the cornerstone some 50 years earlier. Of course, he's dead now. But Constable Bill Hunter, who is 79 and says he has survived most of the old-timers who believed in that tale, disputes the Old Rip story. There's no way a toad could have survived without food and water and air, he says.

"And it seems that the men of Eastland County can't survive without their chew and spittoons. Under each of the wooden benches in the courtroom are two or three white metal spittoons. They clink with use. And they are used during even the most grisly of trials. But there are limits to Eastland County's tolerance. Signs are posted warning of a \$5 fine for spitting on the walls or floor."

LAST SATURDAY was world citizenship day and Lions Club across the land observed it with special projects. Cisco Lions Club members took items of food to their luncheon last Wednesday, and the club treasury added \$50 to buy more food.

Saturday morning, President C.B. (Runt) Dill and Secretary Jasper Cook prepared three nice baskets of food. The baskets were then taken to the homes of three single adult senior citizens and presented to them.

"We wished that we could do something like this every week," we were told by Mr.

Cook. "We literally felt ten feet tall. It was a very rewarding experience."

THE WORLD'S most expensive coffee is probably Jamaica's Blue Mountain Coffee and it is produced on a mountain near Kingston where we've been spending the past month.

We're told that pure Blue Mountain Coffee brings some \$25 per pound and that the bulk of the annual crop—some 800,000 pounds—goes to Japan. The Yutaka Trading Company markets Blue Mountain Coffee along with tea from Ceylon and Formosa, cocoa from Ghana and Trinidad and spices from India.

Our reporter says that a cup of Blue Mountain Coffee brings up to \$5 at expensive hotels in Tokyo.

Blue Mountain Coffee was introduced to the gourmet and fancy food restaurants in the USA four years ago, and imports now run about 5,000 pounds per month. Known as the finest coffee in the world, Blue Mountain has acquired a mystique that goes back centuries to the days of the buccaners and Spanish galleons, we're told.

A few months ago, Japan sent a 29-man delegation to Kingston and they provided \$5,000,000 to help Blue Mountain folks increase their coffee output.

In Japan, various products are made from Blue Mountain coffee, including coffee jelly in eight-ounce jars, canned roasted coffee beans, coffee sticks for instant use made from Jamaican rum and Blue Mountain Coffee, and blended coffee.

Coffee is one of Jamaica's

leading items for export. They have a number of blends and brands and it's more expensive to buy here than coffee costs in the USA.

A CUSTOM IN Jamaica that folks are hoping to change is funeral services and burial after a relative passes away. Presently, the body lies in state in his or her home for maybe a week. And during that time, relatives and close friends remain close to the home and feeding them is the obligation of the deceased's family. This can cause funeral costs to run up to \$8,000 or so and it places a considerable burden on the family of the dead person. Often, they must mortgage their property for money to defray the heavy funeral expense.

The Kingston newspaper had an editorial the other day expressing the thought that changes were in order. Certainly, it would seem so.

ENJOYED A visit to the National Art Gallery of Jamaica the other day. Displayed were paintings, carvings, drawings and so forth from around 1920 to 1983. Jamaica as a country is now in its 21st year. Previously, the country was a British possession for 150 years or so.

The art gallery has had some support and encouragement from the USA's Smithsonian Institute. For the most part, the exhibits that occupy two floors of a large building are a credit to Jamaica and to art generally.

AN INTERESTING Sunday trip was by mini bus to Ocho Rios (eight rivers), a distance of some 60 miles across mountains to the north shore of Jamaica. Although the town is only about 8,500, it is a delightful resort type area with beautiful beaches, big hotels, colorful scenery and

the like. Particularly interesting was Dunn's River Falls Park. Here, the river then flows down from mountains falls over huge rocks from a distance of 100 feet or more with pools here and there. Folks hire guides to lead them up through the rocks and water and back down again. Made pictures of it all.

The trip through the mountains went past the bauxite (Aluminum) ore areas complete processing plants.
