

Recently this material came to the Telegram from Fredericksburg, Texas, with no name listed as the sender.

It goes into detail as to what type of agreement a landowner should attempt to negotiate in order to protect himself when leasing land for oil.

The material has been checked by persons with professional knowledge of the subject, and they agree that the suggestions have some value.

Leasing is not simple matter at any time but suggestions such as these may offer ideas to consider. THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT

G & O LEASE There are many different versions of the so called "Form 88", each designed to fit the lessee's particular requirements. Before you sign a mineral lease read it carefully, word for word. You may be suprised at the little hidden, but important clauses. Check on HOW the clause is written.

THE LEASE: (Always check on Co. trying to lease) If you own rights to A large acreage, it is not a good idea to lease the entire mineral rights under one lease. It is best to lease smaller

acreage, even as from 40-80-or 100 acres.

Otherwise a Co. could tie up hundreds of acres for yrs. What are the terms of the lease in years? Is it for 1-2-3-5 or 10 years? Does the lease terminate if exploration and drilling are not started in a specified time?

Does the terms of the lease specify for oil and gas only? Hard minerals should be on a separte lease.

Adjacent or contigous lands under lessor rights are not included in lease unless

There should be a pooling clause for small mineral rights. The "Pugh Law" provides that after 2 years if land is not producing oil or gas, the lease is terminated and the land is returned to the lease. the pool.

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

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

Texas farmers and ranchers who would like to see how their 1983 hay crop stacks up have until Dec. 15 to submit entries for the Texas State Hay Show.

The show will be held Jan. 24 at the Sheraton Crown Hotel in Houston.

"The main purpose of the annual hay show is to give producers over the state an opportunity to put up their hay against the competition and to have it evaluated for its nutritional content," points out Don J. Dorsett, forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. He expects about 400 hay samples

to be entered in the show. Hay quality varies widely over the state in any given year due to growing conditions, the weather and other factors, notes Dorseti. 1983 has been a particularly interesting year in hav production, he points out, due to the adverse spring weather, lack of summer rains in some sections, and some late-season heavy rains in

various parts of Texas. Hay producers may submit one sample in each of seven classes in the show, says the forage specialist.










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Parker Receives Requests To Sponsor Legislation To Change Laws Concerning Private Clubs

This column has been too quiet too long so let's see if we can generate some healthy controversy this

Toward that end I will advise you that I have been requested by several people to sponsor a bill, in the next session of the Legislature, that would slightly amend and change the current laws dealing with the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages. More specifically I have been requested to carry legislation that would effectively eliminate "private clubs" in otherwise dry areas.

As the law currently stands, a political subdivision may hold a local option election to legalize or prohibit sale of liquor. Assuming the sale is prohibited, there is another method whereby alcoholic beverages can be sold in a dry area, that method being generically known as a private club license.

The procedure for licensing a private club is relatively simple and unless certain safety objections can be proven there is virtually no way to keep a private club from being licensed, member, temporary member, guest, ect. In practical operation at a private club either by payment of a nominal fee for temporary membership or

member, the member often being an employee of the private club.

Many of the people who have approached me about the matter I would have to characterize as good, levelheaded, rational thinking citizens who are not necessarily out to "rain on anyone's picnic" but simply feel that if the majority of voters of a political subdivision determine that they want their political subdivision dry, then it quite literally should be dry. I have to admit that if you follow the theory that the democratic process mandates rule of the majority then these folks are absolutely correct.

At the same time, one must look down from the diz-

of the realities of human nautre and realize that no law prohibits consumption of an alcoholic beverage in any public place, where the owner agrees, and that, in fact, the simple prohibition of private clubs in dry areas may have the most undesirable effect of allowing the same or similar type establishments to operate under the guise of no sale of alcohol, simply consumption of alcohol. Under this scenario there would be absolutely no regulation. Drinking could be conducted at any hour of the day or night and authorities, under the Constitution, would not even have the ability to go on the premises to see what type of conduct was being carried on for the reason that they would likely never have "probable cause" to do

This is a controversial issue and maybe I should not bring it up this close to Christmas when there is supposed to be "peace on earth, goodwill towards men" but I do not want my constituents to lose the spirit of involvement that has been so gratifying to me as your state representative; so "give me your best shot" and let me hear what you think of this

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

More than eighty friendly Indians came to the feast.



The legislation simplifies and standardizes the way acreage bases and yields are assigned to producers. Stenholm has been working on the project almost a year, along with the Texas Agricultural Forum, a coalition of farmers and agribusinessmen in the

"Right now, our system of bases and yields is a mess," Stenholm said. "It's not fair to many farmers; it's unpredictable for the rest; and it leaves too much discretion to USDA's bureaucratic whims. It needs to be chang-

HUTTON INSULATION

Bases and yields are now set by four-year farm bills, Stenholm said, which makes them subject to the political winds every four years. If the base and yield formulas were in permanent law, they would stay there unless repealed, and farmers would have a better idea how many acres they can plant.

"When unpredictable programs keep farmers from planning ahead," Stenholm said, "they often decide not to bother with the programs at all. But this usually means

Australia Has Oil Boom, Robert Kamon Finds

The Queenland area of Australia is enjoying an oil boom of considerable importance and part on the recent progress has been made on and adjoining acreage under which a Cisco oil company has substantial interests.

This report was made by Robert Kamon of Cisco, president of Golden Triangle Royalty and Oil Company, who has just returned from Australia where he spent a month.

Recently completed oil and gas production on a block adjoining GTRO holdings totals some two billion cubic feet of gas and 23,000 barrels of oil, representing income of about \$2,500,000 daily Mr. Kamon said. Two important discoveries were made during the final week of Mr. Kamon's visit there. On GTRO properties, Pan-

continental Oil Company's No. 1 Nockatunga has been completed as an oil well and two additional wells are planned for the coming year. A second well was in completion stages. GTRO owns 30,000 royalty acres in the 1,324,000-acre block.

Mr. Kamon learned that a new pipline was under construction to deliver oil from the area of development to connect with lines that run to Brisbane and refinery operations. The line, which will begin initially with 14,000 barrels per day, will eventually move up to 55,000 barrels of oil per day. In other areas where GTRO holds interests, Mr. Kamon found encouraging signs of oil and gas from seismograph survey work being completed. Drilling programs are due to be considered when the survey results are turned over to oil companies, he said.

While in Australia, Mr. Kamon visited his 4,500-acre beef cattle ranch in Queensland. He usually makes two trips per year to Australia to look after the interests of the oil companies with which he is associated.



Bond Issue Approved

A \$675,000 bond issue to complete financing for city water improvements and a new waste-water treatment facility was approved by more than 3-to-1 majority as some 475 voters went to the polls in an election here last

Voting results were reported by City Manager Mike Moore as follows:

Proposition 1, a \$100,000 sewer revenue bond - 356 for, 115 agaisnt.

Proposition 2, a \$475,000 general obligation bond for the new treatment plant –

357 for, 115 against.

Proposition 3, a \$100,000 water revenue bond to provide a constingency fund for contracted projects - 360 for, 111 against.

Mr. Moore said results of the election, which was held at the Corral Room of the Hotel Laguna, would be canvassed at the regular city council meeting Tuesday night. M.L. Bailey served as election judge.

Voting was not as heavy as city officials had anticipated. Some 1,000 voters had been expected to turn out.

Mayor Eris Ritchie told The Press that he was well pleased with the result of the voting. He believed that senior citizens and others

Mr. Moore expected that the council would begin work as soon as possible to build a new waste water treatment plant. A site will be selected as soon as state agencies complete inspections and work on the city's application.

Financing was arranged for the water system improvement program in April, 1982, when the community approved a bond issue of nearly \$2,000,000. Contracts have been let and work was getting underway this week on the improvements, including a new filteration plant.

Water and sewer rate increases will go into effect with the Dec. 1 billings, city officials have announced.

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
