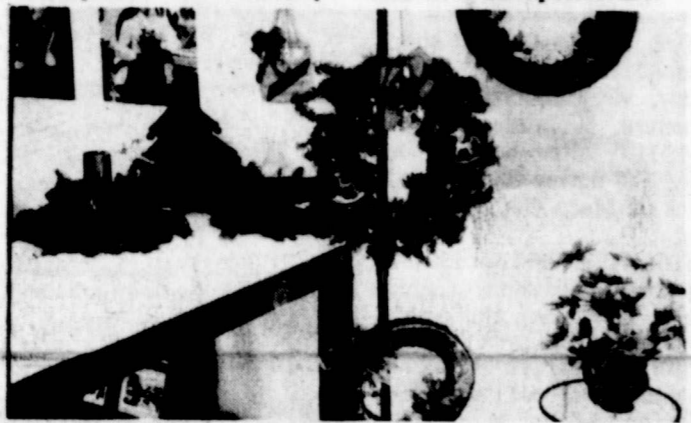
## The Flower Shop Plans Open House

## Construction On Olney Savings Office Begins In Gainesville

Olney Savings Association has begun construction on their new office in Gainesville, Texas, according to Alan D. Myers, Jr., president and chief executive officer.

The Fambro Construction Co. of Stephenville had men and equipment on the job in the College Hill area to begin ditch digging for the new 12-inch water main line from the reservoir through town. This firm's contract calls for 150 working days.

Bond issues approved by the voters in April, 1982, and last month are financing the program.

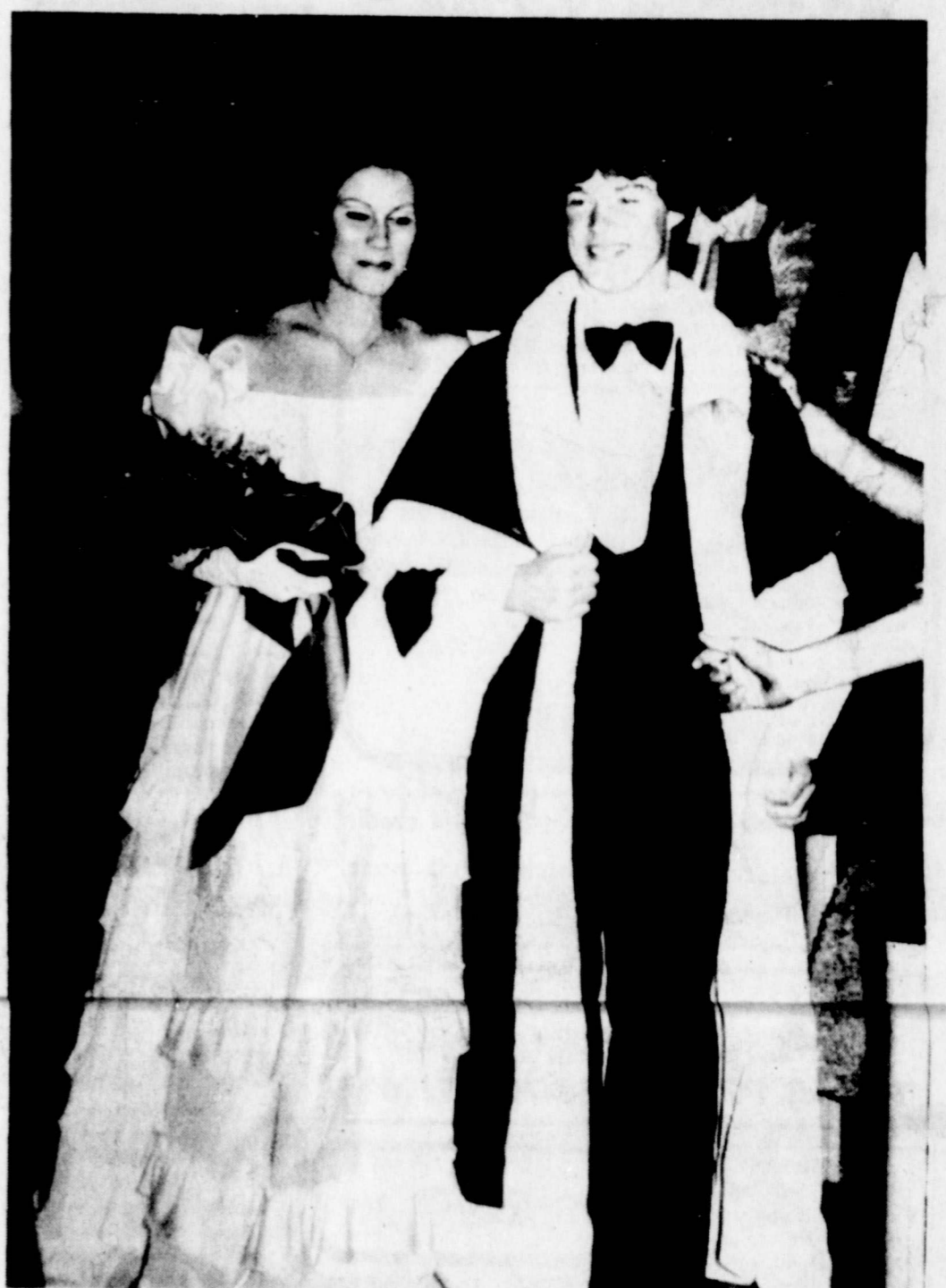

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# CRIME: It's Not Pretty In This County

Can major crime be as serious in Eastland County as it is in Texas and the rest of the nation?

Citizens and Chambers of Commerce want to say "No," but statistics have a way of painting grim realities.

The accompanying chart shows seven years of crime records pointing to a record high of 1980, with slight decreases in '81 and '82 - but

with big question marks for the books when they are recorded for 1983.

"Worse, for its size, I've ever seen," said a recent visitor, a private detective working on a case here, commenting on crime in this county. He was quoted by Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton, speaking to a service club group here this week.

"And it looks like we're on our own," the D.A. said,

"there's no help coming from the state. At least three Grand Juries have requested help from the state for narcotic control, and we can't get anything."

Of course there's been tremendous federal and state fund cuts, so we know they're short-handed too, he said, but it looks like the time has come for Eastland County to get some help for the Sheriff's Department, the Police Departments or

somebody, Walton said.

The citizen involvement groups are having an enormous impact, he said, as he urged participation and help to the Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (M.A.D.D.) and People Against Dangerous Drugs (P.A.D.D.), and to serve on juries when called.

Crimes included in the statistics, taken from a report, Crime in Texas,

Department of Public Safety, include murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and the break-down shows crime worked by the sheriff's, and each of the three major police departments (Cisco, Eastland and Ranger) and totals for the four units.

Total crimes reported by the four units in 1976 was 237; 338 in 1977; 369 in 1978; 429 in 1979; 570 in 1980; 394 in

1981; and 385 in 1982.

What about 1983? Well, Eastland alone has had one murder, three rapes and not telling how many burglaries.

The District Attorney credited the citizens groups for helping curtail the DWI total in the past year in this area.

A dozen murders in the seven previous years may not be a record, but it's an average that most local folks aren't proud of.

Surprisingly the County Commissioners Court by its inaction, vetoed a virtually-free assistant prosecutor by not accepting a grant available to pay the salary, and a number of citizens are still looking for the logic in that.

A current Department of Commerce report shows that federal aid to states dropped 2.7 percent in 1982 and amounted to \$66 billion. Major decreases were in funds

for highways, down \$1.1 billion; education, down \$1 billion; and aid for miscellaneous purposes, down \$1.2 billion.

Until you see in the past seven years:

A dozen murders; 16 rapes; 27 robberies; 147 aggravated assaults; 1,387 larcenies; and 155 motor vehicle thefts.

## Hospital Advantages Outlined At Lions Club

The advantage offered E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital by virtue of its affiliation with Western Hospital Affiliates, Inc., a subsidiary of Hendrick Medical Development Corporation, were outlined in a talk by Mrs. Helen Orr, administrator of the local hospital, last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club.

Property adjoining the hospital has been acquired for use in building a medical clinic in the near future, Mr. Orr reported. The hospital's parent organization has an

active physician recruiting program that promises to pay dividends for Cisco, she added.

Hospital authorities are optimistic that a young family practice medical doctor will move his wife and three children to Cisco by the year's end to begin work in the Cisco area, Mrs. Orr reported. She said the young physician has made several visits here and has met with local doctors and hospital officials.

Other pluses for affiliation with the Hendrick organization is that medical person-

nel, including doctors, are available for weekend emergency coverage when local physicians are out of town, Mrs. Orr said.

Effective Dec. 1, employees of E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital will be covered by an employee annuity program similar to workers in other units of the Western system. This plan will provide employees with free insurance for themselves and coverage for their families at attractive rates, Mrs. Orr said.

The hospital has 53 employees, including five who have 10-year service records and 11 with five-year service records. The hospital needs additional registered nurses, Mrs. Orr said, and anyone interested in these jobs was invited to contact the hospital.

Since joining the Hendrick organization on Feb. 1, 1983, the local hospital has upgraded its equipment in the laboratory, the x-ray department, surgery equipment, and elsewhere, Mrs. Orr said.

"We have fine equipment for a 30-bed community hospital," Mrs. Orr said. "Our intensive care unit is especially well equipped for a small town. And we can always call on Hendrick any time there is a need for equipment that we need and do not have."

Mrs. Orr noted that the Hospital Auxiliary program is making a valuable contribution to the medical facility. This organization of volunteers provides office workers, operates the gift shop and makes other valuable donations of service and materials, she said.

Mrs. Orr, who has been with the hospital since they moved here six years ago, said the hospital project began on Jan. 24, 1967, at a meeting of community leaders who appointed a number of committees, including a site selection group.

The hospital was completed and opened its doors on Nov. 30, 1970—13 years ago on Wednesday.

"The patient is the most important person at our community medical facility," Mrs. Orr said. "Our mission is to care for the patient's needs and comfort."

The hospital is fully accredited with state and national agencies and carries on a continuing program to maintain the high standards set by these organizations, Mrs. Orr said. Maintaining these standards assures the patient of better care, she added.

The program was arranged by Lion Jay Richardson, and Mrs. Orr was introduced by Lion Walter Knowden. Cliff Andrews of Cisco was a guest.

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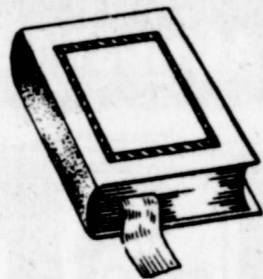

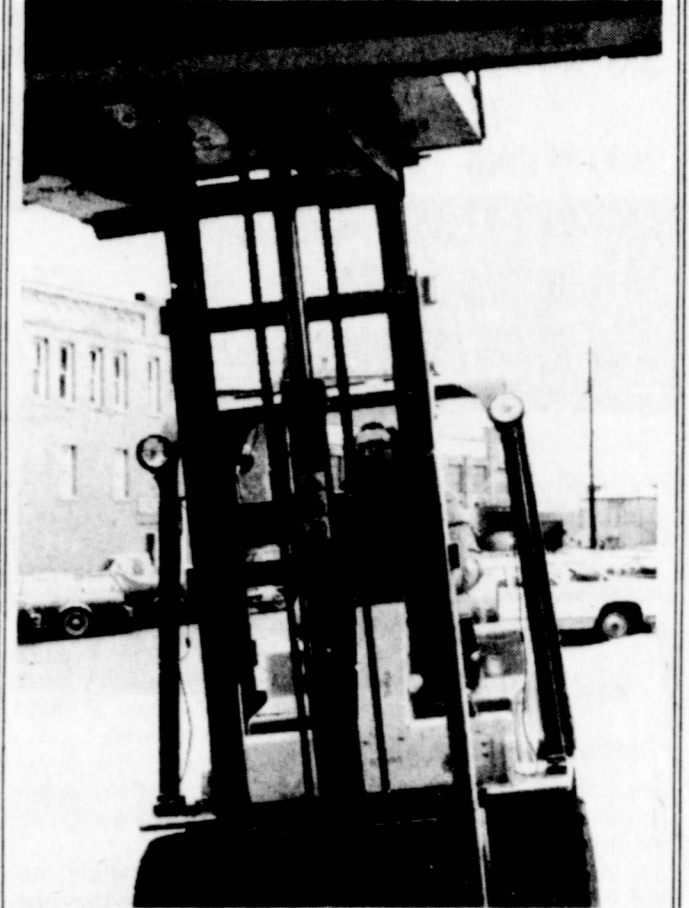
The Wrangler scored a 99-to-70 victory over McMurry College's junior varsity in basketball action at the local gym last Tues-

The entries must be registered and entered on Friday morning, Dec. 9 from 8 a.m. until 11 a.m. Judging begins at 11 a.m. Recipes should accompany all bake show entries.

Entries in the adult bake show division will be returned to their owners between 4

and 5 p.m. on Friday, Dec. 9. Entries not claimed will be sold to the public and money will go to the Extension

Homemaker Council treasury fund.

The Eastland Chamber of Commerce sponsors the cash awards for the Bake Show which are 1st place, \$2.50; 2nd place, \$1.50 and 3rd place, \$1.00. The Grand Champion is awarded \$5.00 and Reserve Grand Champion \$4.00.

All pecan bake show entries should be entered on disposable plates, foil, or pieces of stiff cardboard. All baked products need to be covered with clear plastic wrap.

A Pecan Centerpiece division will be held during the 31st Eastland County Pecan Show on December 9 and 10 in the Courthouse lobby.

The Pecan centerpiece division is open to all adult and youth (9-19) years old youth residing in Eastland County.

This division will consist of centerpieces and arrangements made with pecans or some part of the pecan plant.

Entries need to be entered

by 11 a.m. on Friday morning, Dec. 9, and remain in place until noon on Saturday, Dec. 10. Centerpieces should

be original and must have been created during 1983.

The Pecan Growers Association sponsors the

cash awards for the centerpiece division which are as follows: first place \$5.00; second \$2.50 and third \$1.50.

## County Pecan Show

### To Be At Courthouse

The Eastland County Pecan Show will be held next week, December 9 and 10 for the 31st consecutive year, reports Dan Childress, president of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The pecan show is sponsored by the grower's association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. The event will be in the courthouse lobby.

The quality of the pecans should be good this year and the crop will be larger than last year's according to County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.

Anyone producing pecans in 1983 may enter the pecan show. An entry consists of 43 pecans of one variety and native pecans from any single tree. All entries should be sacked and labeled with the grower's name, address and variety of pecans.

All entries of nuts must be entered by 4 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 8. They may be sent or left at the County Agent's office in Eastland prior to December 8. Growers are limited to one entry of each improved or papershell variety.

The first place entries will be sent to the Regional Pecan Show. Entries not winning first place will be sold to pay expenses of the show.

Any alteration of pecans shells by marking, filing, or polishing will disqualify the entry so treated. However, exhibitors are encouraged to remove all traces of husks and foreign matter from the shells.

Gordon said there will be a class for every variety provided there are at least two entries in that class. There will be a class for the smallest pecans, native pecans, seedlings as well as all varieties. Plaques will be given to exhibitors of champion in-shell, shelling and native entries. Rosettes will be awarded for reserve champions and the first three place ribbons will be given in each class.

Pecans will be judged by Extension Service and Experiment Station Horticulturists. They will judge pecans based on size, color, appearance, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality and other factors.

After the pecan show on Saturday, the growers association will sell shelled

pecans and in-shell pecans that do not win first place to help pay expenses of the pecan show reports Childress.

## Bake Sale To Be Held At Show

Let the Eastland County Extension Homemakers do your holiday baking. The Extension Homemakers Clubs will sponsor a bake sale in conjunction with the annual Eastland County Pecan Show this coming Friday, December 9. The Bake Sale will be held all day in the Courthouse lobby.

## Drilling Bits

AU - NA Oil and Gas has filed for permit to drill the No. 2A, 7, 8 and 14 Texas State Lease -A-, four 1,400 ft. developmental wells seven miles south of Cisco. Locations are in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR CO A-1980 Survey. The well are in the Nimrod Field.

A 2,000 ft. developmental well is planned by Scranton Exploration of Cisco at a drillsite one mile east of Scranton. The location is in a 10-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. A-1215 Survey. Well's designation is the No. 1-A Puckett. It is in the Eastland Reg. Field.

At a location one mile south of Scranton, Western Production Co. of Fort Worth has finalized a new oil producer in Eastland County's Scranton Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 H.G. Beene, pumping oil at the rate of nine barrels per day on open choke.

Location is in a 21-acre lease in the H&TC RR CO. Survey. Bottomed at 1,900 feet, the well will produce from perforations 1,667 to 1,669 into the hole.

3-B Oil of Lovington, N.M.

has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Scranton Field. The No. 3 Stuart showed potential to make 30 barrels of oil per day on an open choke.

The operator has 13 acres leased, with drillsite in Eastland County's CT & Mc RR Co. Survey, one mile south of Scranton.

The well will produce from an interval 1,629 to 1,639 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,725 feet.

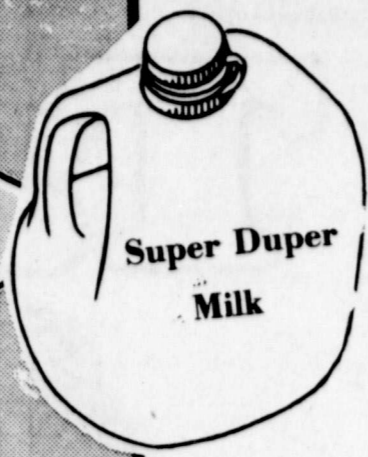

Fall is the season for trees to lose leaves, but it's also the time to set out new trees.

Fall is the best time to plant trees because their root systems have time to develop and become well established before top growth begins in the spring.

Plant only container-grown or balled and burlapped trees during the fall as bare-root trees do not transplant readily until January and February.

Choose trees that will adapt to this area and that will provide the desired landscape. We have a list of adapted trees for the Eastland County area. Contact our office if you would like this list. After selecting the tree and the site, we suggest the following planting guidelines.

First, dig a pit large enough to allow six inches clearance on all sides of the root ball. The pit should be as deep as the root ball so that it will rest on undisturbed soil. Plant the tree at the same depth it was in the nursery. This should be indicated by a discolored ring on the trunk.

Place the tree in the pit carefully by handling the ball, not the trunk. Handling the tree by the trunk could cause a broken ball and excessive root damage.

Next, fill the pit around the ball with top soil or a prepared mixture of soil, sand and peat moss or pine bark. Do not fertilize the tree until after spring growth occurs.

After filling in, stake the tree to secure it against the wind so roots can become well established. It's also a good practice to wrap the trunk of the newly transplanted tree to protect it from sunscald, drying winds, and storms and borers attacks.

Finally, water the tree as needed during the dry winter periods.

With the holiday season approaching, livestock producers need to be aware of the hazards of marketing animals during this time of the year.

Many local livestock auction markets close over the holidays. It pays to make a phone call before loading up any animals destined for market.

Most market news reports are also discontinued or skipped certain days during the holiday period. Price information may be hard to find.

Watch for some possible heavy movements of livestock to markets at times during the next few weeks.

Christmas and New Year's Day are on Sunday this year and the official holiday is Monday. This normally is a heavy slaughter day—so the supply impact of two Monday holidays this year may be quite substantial.

Price levels are also influenced by the holidays. In general, if prices for cattle are moving upward going into the holidays, a period of stability usually occurs until the new year arrives. If, however, prices are moving downward, further market weakness during the holidays is a certainty. Fortunately, this year prices should show some strength for the holiday period.

The demand for red meat is greatly influenced by holidays. Not too many consumers are eagerly anticipating a steak dinner on Thanksgiving or Christmas Eve.

"Use caution in your marketing decisions" is probably the best advice for livestock producers during the holiday season.

**Homemaking Hints**

The Consumer Product Safety Commission issues this special safety alert concerning chimneys used for wood burning stoves and fireplaces. While the Commission is aware of house fires associated with both masonry and metal factory-built chimneys, this safety alert is particularly aimed at consumers who have metal factory-built chimneys attached to their stoves.

An estimated 22,500 house fires each year are associated with metal factory-built chimneys connected to wood and coal burning stoves. The CPSC urgently warns consumers to be aware of the potential fire hazard associated with these chimneys.

Now that the nation has

reached another heating season, the commission strongly urges consumers, if they have a stove or fireplace connected to a metal chimney, to check for any damage that may have occurred in the past. Now is the time to identify the damage and have it repaired if it has not been done up to this time.

Most fires in metal factory-built chimneys occur because of improper installation, use or maintenance. The Commission staff is aware of the following causes of fires:

\*Improper chimney installation causing ignition of nearby wood framing.  
 \*Structural damage caused by creosote burning in the chimney; (Creosote is a tar-like substance that forms in chimneys from burning wood.)  
 \*Chimney corrosion resulting in exposing wood framing to excessive temperatures.  
 \*Buckling and collapsing of inner liners of chimneys. (This can result from too hot a fire, especially in high-efficiency stoves and in fireplace inserts).

Masonry chimneys can also present a fire hazard when the inner tile liner and the surrounding brick or block surface cracks and separates. This condition may be brought by the ignition of creosote. Hot flue gasses then can escape through these cracks and ignite nearby combustibles.

The commission stresses that even when heating appliances are properly installed, consumers should frequently check the chimneys for deposits of creosote, soot, or other obstructions, or signs of physical damage. This should be done as often as twice per month if deposits of creosote build up rapidly. If the consumer suspects a problem or has experienced a chimney fire, qualified chimney cleaners, or "chimney sweeps", should be contacted immediately to conduct a complete safety inspection of the chimney.

**RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:**  
 Ham and turkey are Texas favorites during the holidays, and Texans like ample amounts of each. The following recipe is a creative way to "make over" the leftovers.

**HOLIDAY TURKEY CASSEROLE**

1/4 cup all purpose flour  
 1/2 cup instant non-fat dry milk  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon curry powder  
 1 cup chicken broth  
 1 cup evaporated milk  
 1 cup sour cream  
 3/4 cup butter  
 3 cups herb seasoned croutons or stuffing mix  
 4 cups cooked cubed turkey  
 8 ounces shredded Swiss cheese

1 (10 ounce) package frozen chopped broccoli, thawed  
 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese

Combine flour, dry milk, salt and curry powder. Gradually add broth and evaporated milk. Cook until thick. Add sour cream and stir until well blended. Melt butter in skillet and brown the croutons or stuffing mix. Butter a 9 x 13 inch baking pan and layer 1/2 of the turkey, 1/2 of the croutons or stuffing mix, 1/2 of the Swiss cheese, 1/2 of the sauce and 1/2 of the broccoli. Repeat layers reserving 1/2 cup of croutons or stuffing mix for topping. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 50 minutes.

**County To Acquire Two Graders**

Eastland County Commissioners agreed to the lease-purchase of two graders for use in the Precincts and 1 and 4 at Monday's regular meeting.

Commissioners authorized Emma Morris, county auditor, to investigate a computer system that would be compatible with the county's operations.

In other action, commissioners agreed to transfer \$4,995 from the county's road and bridge funds to purchase

a 1982 Ford van for use in maintaining roads and bridges in Precinct 1.

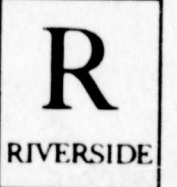

**Stored Gas Ready For Colder Weather**

Texas and Oklahoma residents have already had a brief taste of cool weather, but as colder weather approaches, Lone Star Gas Company customers can anticipate reliable natural gas service even on the coldest days.

According to George McCorstin, director of gas control, Lone Star will enter the 1983-84 heating season with about 52 billion cubic feet of natural gas secured in nine underground storage reservoirs. This energy in storage can be withdrawn and routed to homes and businesses which represent nearly 1.2 million customers. Fifty-two billion cubic feet in storage is equivalent to customer demand for a 30-day period of average winter weather.

The special versatility and necessity of storage come into play when temperatures drop below average. According to McCorstin, Lone Star expects to have about 125 million cubic feet per day more natural gas available this winter than last, because storages were 75 percent full the first of November. "By the onset of winter," he added, "storage will be ready to supplement deliveries from producing wells tied directly to our pipeline system."

Lone Star Gas Company planners estimate that customer demand could peak at about 3.1 billion cubic feet during a 24-hour period when the temperature throughout the utility's service area averages 15 degrees above zero.

During periods of heavy demand, industrial and electric power generation are normally subject to temporary curtailments as provided by contract with Lone Star. This is done, when needed, to assure uninterrupted gas deliveries to residential and other human need customers.

Lone Star's curtailment procedure was approved in 1973 by the Railroad Commission of Texas.

### Lot of Folks Work For This County

About 50 area leaders involved with community services, health care, education and conservation met for an Agency Awareness Information Day Program at K-Bob's Steak House, Eastland on Nov. 30. A luncheon was served prior to the noon meeting.

The Eastland County Extension Service sponsored the event, stating that the purpose of the Program was for agencies and others who make referrals to become more knowledgeable of each agencies mission and purpose.

County agents present were DeMarquis Gordon, Janet Thomas, John Blair and Faith Ballard. County officials Judge Scott Bailey and Commissioner Richard Robinson, Precinct 1 were in attendance and seated at head tables.

A wide range of information was given by various speakers during a two hour program. Dorothy Underwood of Ranger, Chairman of the Program Builders Committee of the Extension Service, began the program by welcoming the group.

She remarked that the types of services available make a better and more prosperous county for all of us.

Sherry Watson of Brownwood, Director of the Texas Employment Commission for this area, spoke

on the Unemployment Insurance, job placement and other services offered by the agency.

The Employment Commission meets periodically in the Eastland County Courthouse. The next meeting will be Dec. 8. Watson mentioned that the labor force of Eastland County is 8,640 with 8,149 presently working.

Faye Grant of Abilene, head of the area Social Security office, outlined services available to Eastland County from the agency. She suggested that most of this business could be transacted by phone, by mail, or by meeting with Social Security workers who come into five of the county towns.

The S.O.S. (Special personal services) of the Eastland National Bank

were explained by Inez Bourdeau of Eastland, bank official. These services aid persons with health or personal problems.

The Eastland County Red Cross, explained Roy Cartee of Cisco, Director, also deals in problems, and seeks to prevent them in various ways. He mentioned aid to servicemen and CRP classes as some of the current involvements.

Director Ruth Cartee of Cisco, Eastland and Rising Star Senior Centers, and Mary Faircloth, Ranger, Director of the Ranger and Gorman Center, told of the projects and programs which make life easier for the Seniors. Listed were meals, recreation, transportation and other services.

Joe Housson, Eastland Director of the Home Nursing and Medical Services of the Eastland County Department of Human Resources, spoke and introduced other workers present from the Department. They were Alice Pritchard, Eastland, Child Protection Services, and Maria Duncan, Eastland, Services to Aged and Disabled. Housson outlined ways in which per-

sons of all ages may obtain help from this Department.

The Texas Department of Health, Region 4, was represented by the Region Director, Arleen Dicranian, R.N. of Abilene. She explained that this agency reaches across 44 counties and has six local Departments, including the one in Eastland.

The two Home Health Care Services, Girling and Outreach Home Health of Midwest Texas, had spokesmen to explain the various types of help available for homebound people. Daniel B. Dickson, Abilene, Chaplain for Girling, also described how he tries to meet the spiritual needs of the ill or handicapped. Jackie Tucker, R.N., of Carbon, Director of Outreach, told of the unique services offered by this agency. She introduced an assistant, Joyca Speedka of Breckenridge.

Director Dennis Noska of the Eastland MHMR Center spoke on the mental health services available to citizens of all ages. Idella Taylor of Cisco, Director of the Berta Hardin Johnson Workshop, also attended from this agency.

Bruce Leland of Abilene, Director of the Texas Predatory Animal Control Services, spoke of work in the 30 counties his department covers. Continuing with material of special interest to farmers and ranchers, Jack Phillips of the Farmers Home Administration in Eastland outlined the types of loans available through his office.

The Green Thumb Inc. program is funded by the

Texas Farmer's Union, but furnishes workers for a large scope of programs. Dianne Parrish, area supervisor of Waco, spoke. John Williamson of Waco was also present.

Central Texas Opportunities Inc. had several department heads in attendance. Laquita Lane of Eastland spoke for the group explaining the varied programs offered for low in-

come people. Mike Zuniga Jr., Executive Director from Coleman, attended, as well as Mike V. Montoya and Lorenzo Silvas of Coleman.

Bill Ricks of Cisco spoke on the aims and purposes of the AA organization, and how all alcoholics seeking help are welcome to attend. He mentioned the need of a permanent meeting place for the AA in Eastland County.
